ALLEN RETURNS TO U.S.; FAILED TO GET EGYPT TO CANCEL RED ARMS DEAL

WASHINGTON, Oct. 6. (JTA) -- Assistant Secretary of State George V. Allen flew back to Washington today from Lebanon after warning Arab leaders of the dangers of accepting arms from the Communist bloc. Mr. Allen did not persuade Egypt's Premier Gamal Abdel Nasser to cancel his arms deal with Czechoslovakia. But, the U.S. envoy declared he thinks his flying mission to Egypt and Lebanon has alerted Arab leaders to the possibilities of increased Communist penetration in the Middle East,

Mr. Allen said on his departure from Lebanon that he thought his trip was fruitful 'in clearing up misconceptions about U.S. policy." He told newsmen one of the main reasons for the trip was to stress U.S. concern over the dangers of an arms race which would increase Arab-Israel tensions in the Middle East.

(The Times of London reported from Beirut today that Mr. Allen, in a conference with Lebanese Prime Minister Rashid Karameh, offered Lebanon American arms on condition they would not be used for aggressive purposes and that an American training mission be permitted to enter Lebanon. The Times also stated that Mr. Allen told the Lebanese Prime Minister that Egypt had acted in her own interest in the arms deal with Czechoslovakia but that he had urged Premier Nasser not to enter into an anti-American campaign,)

Officials in Washington expressed surprise today over a statement in Cairo yesterday by Egyptian Premier Nasser to the effect that he had warned Washington in June he would accept arms from the Soviet bloc if the United States refused to provide weapons which Egypt had requested. The officials stated there was no hint at the American-Egyptian talks in June that the alternative to arms from the U.S. was arms from Communist countries.

The U.S. officials stressed that the Egyptian request, which included limited quantities of tanks, aircraft and artillery, was approved "in principle." This meant that, if the Egyptians had been able to pay the price, they could have had the arms. The Egyptians at the end of June asked if they could pay in local currency or in cotton and were told this was not possible under the law. Although aware of the possibility, they did not ask for an "extended payment" credit arrangement.

U. N. Urged to Express Opposition to Czech-Egyptian Arms Deal

Walter P. Reuther, C. I.O. president, today issued a statement urging the United Nations to express its opposition to the Czechoslovakian arms deal with Egypt. He also asked that the UN call all parties to explore every possible avenue for a peaceful settlement of Middle East differences.

Mr. Reuther said that he is gravely concerned lest an armament race be touched off between Egypt and Israel as a result of the announcement that Egypt is about to acquire armaments from Czechoslovakia. The solution for the difficulties, he said, is the development of a mutual security pact between Israel and its Arab neighbors to guarantee national borders and to insure peace and stability in the area.

He added that Secretary of State Dulles had announced the willingness of the U.S. to contribute to a stable settlement. The CIO believes that the suggestion which Sec. Dulles reiterated in his address at the UN General Assembly last week, "ought to be explored by all of the parties concerned in good faith to arrive at a solution," Mr. Reuther said,

Egypt's Statements on Israel Arms Called "Fantastic Distortions"

PARIS, Oct. 6. (JTA) -- The Israel Embassy is in constant touch with the French Foreign Ministry on the Middle East arms situation and both parties are close to the situation, it was indicated here today,

Commenting on Egyptian Premier Gamal Abdel Nasser's statements about secret French sales of war materiel to Israel, sources close to the Israel Embassy said that the Israel-French arms deal were not secret at all. Col. Nasser's statements were "fantastic distortions" of a report published by the Near East Information Center, it was pointed out,

MAJOR DEPOSITS OF IRON ORE REPORTEDLY DISCOVERED IN ISRAEL

JERUSALEM, Oct. 6. (JTA) -- Major deposits of iron ore have been discovered on the slopes of Mt. Tabor, near Nazareth, it was learned here today. Extensive exploration will be carried out within the next few days to determine whether it exists in quantities which would make its exploitation commercially feasible.

ISRAEL'S LARGEST PASSENGER SHIP DOCKS AT HAIFA; BUILT IN GERMANY

HAIFA, Oct. 6. (JTA) -- Israel's newest and largest passenger liner, the Germanbuilt "Israel" docked at Haifa today with 257 passengers and a cargo of 4,000 tons of German goods, which like the ship itself are reparations payments.

The entire port was lit up as the vessel was docked in the early morning hours by three tugs. Both the ship and the port were decorated with flags in celebration of the arrival of the vessel which will become the flagship of the Israel merchant marine.

EL AL BUYS PASSENGER PLANES IN U.S.; REPLACES CRAFT DOWNED IN BULGARIA

TEL AVIV, Oct. 6. (JTA) -- El Al-Israel National Airlines has purchased two new four-engine Constellation passenger planes, it was announced here today by Dr. Abraham Rivkind, general director of the company. The two ships, purchased in the United States, cost \$1,650,000.

One of the aircraft will replace the Constellation shot down by the Bulgarian fighters last July and the second will be used to expand the airline's service. Dr. Rivkind noted that of the 63,000 tourists who entered Israel in the first nine months of this year, 40 percent came by El Al planes.

BANK OF ENGLAND APPROVES \$5,600,000 LOAN TO ISRAEL FOR TRADING

LONDON, Oct. 6. (JTA) -- The Bank of England and the capital issues committee of the British Treasury have approved a loan of two million pounds sterling (\$5,600,000) to Israelt of inance the purchase of British capital goods, it was confirmed today.

Israel circles here hailed the decision as displaying a more favorable attitude toward Israel on the part of British economic authorities since, in the past, it was virtually impossible for Israel to make such financing arrangements here.

Financial circles linked the loan to a prospective purchase by Israel of 500 passenger buses from the Leyland Motors Corporation but Israel circles said there was no connection. A spokesman for the Leyland concern said that protracted negotiations with Israel transit authorities had not yet had any concrete results. If a deal is made, payment would be from proceeds of the new loan.

ISRAEL PLANS IMMIGRATION OF 1,000 FAMILIES FROM LATIN AMERICA

TEL AVIV, Oct. 6. (JTA) -- A program providing for the immigration and absorption of 0,000 families from various Latin American countries was presented here today to a cuvention of immigrants from Latin America. The conference was addressed by Knesseth Speaker Joseph Sprinzak, Labor Minister Golda Myerson and member of the Jewish Agency Meir Grossman.

A total of 3,505 immigrants arrived in Israel during September, according to preliminary figures released here today by the Jewish Agency. Of the total, 3,200 came from North Africa. Eighteen arrived from the USSR and the Communist states of East Europe. All have been old people.

A party of 123 recent immigrants was today sent to Demona, an urban center near Sdeh Boker in the Negev, to begin settlement of that town, which is expected to have a population of 1, 000 by the end of this year. The new settlers found homes, a medical clinic, a school and a kindergarten ready for them when they arrived. Most of the settlers are young jeeople with new families and the breadwinners will be employed on a nearby development project.

A new settlement in the Lachish settlement region southwest of Jerusalem was establised today. It is named Neve Chen, in memory of the 58 persons who died in the flaming crash of the El Al airliner shot down by Bulgarian fighters last July. Another new settlement, named Neveh Micha, after the late Micha Joseph Berdichevsky, Hebrew writer who died in 1921, was dedicated yesterday in the Lachish area.

SIR HENRY D'AVIGDOR GOLDSMID APPOINTED PARLIAMENTARY SECRETARY

LONDON, Oct. 6. (JTA) -- Sir Henry d'Avigdor Goldsmid, M.P., has been appointed Parliamentary private secretary to Duncan Sandys, Minister for Housing and Local Government. Sir Henry is president of the Jewish Colonization Association and chairman of the Jewish Trust Corporation for Germany, a British Jewish successor organization operating to recover heirless and communal Jewish property in Germany.

NATIONALIST LEADER APPEALS TO MOSLEMS IN TUNIS TO HALT ATTACKS ON JEWS

TUNIS, Oct. 6. (JTA) -- Habib Bourguiba, leader of the nationalist Neo-Destour Party of Tunis, appealed today to the Moslem population to halt attacks on Jews and not to sack their stores. M. Bourguiba has made consistently pro-Jewish statements since his return from exile recently when the nationalist movement won an agreement for greater autonomy from France.

Today's appeal followed a number of recent incidents in which Jews have been injured and Jewish stores have been looted by Moslem gangs. Yesterday, a mob of unemployed Moslems, attempted to loot Jewish stores in the native quarter. Police were called and two Moslems and a Jewish boy were wounded when police used gunfire to disperse the mob which had turned on them.

LOOTED JEWISH STORES IN ISTANBUL REPAIRED; BANKS EXTEND CREDITS

ISTANBUL, Oct. 6. (JTA) -- Most of the Jewish-owned shops damaged, destroyed and looted in last month's riots have been repaired and re-stocked, with assistance from various private and overnment sources.

Banks have extended credits to tide over store owners and the government has postponed collection of taxes due in order not to further burden the stricken businessmen. In addition, assistance is expected from the large public funds collected throughout Turkey to aid victims of the anti-minority riots. Many Jews contributed to these funds and it is anticipated that Jews in need will be among their beneficiaries.

There has been no concerted movement by Turkish Jews to leave the country as a result of the disorders. Turkish Jews seem determined to rebuild their economic positions and none are known to have registered for immigration to Israel as a specific result of the riots.

Meanwhile, Premier Adnan Menderes, in a public address, has assured all minorities that the government has acted to ensure their safety. The newspaper Cumhuriyet, in an editorial, has assured the Jews that there is no anti-Semitism in Turkey and that there has always been complete religious tolerance. It criticized the riots as "betraying the country's civilization and even her independence."

EXTINCTION OF MANY JEWISH COMMUNITIES IN GERMANY PREDICTED

NEW YORK, Oct. 6. (JTA) -- The Jewish population in Germany has become stabilized for the moment at 25,000 and a "marginal" Jewish community will survive in some of the major south German cities and Berlin unless there is a major international up-ieaval, Paul W. Freedman, JTA correspondent in Germany, told a luncheon meeting tendered him by the World Jewish Congress here yesterday. He added that many of the now existent local communities would become extinct during the present generation.

Mr. Freedman, who will return to Germany at the end of the month, noted that the majority of the 2,000 Jewish children in Germany today are of elementary school age. All of them attend German schools since efforts to establish Jewish all-day schools have thus far been unsuccessful, he said.

U.S. GOVERNMENT ASKS AMERICAN FIRM TO STOP PRODUCTION OF NAZI TOYS

FRANKFURT, Oct. 6. (JTA) -- The complaint raised in Parliament against the sale of American-made toys with Swastika insignia scored a positive result. The United States Embassy in Bonn today informed the German authorities that the U.S. Department of Commerce has asked the responsible firm to discontinue the delivery of such toys to Germany. The firm has also agreed to stop production of toys with Nazi insignia altogether.

JEWISH COMMITTEE NOT OPPOSED TO EMIGRATION OF JEWS FROM NORTH AFRICA

NEW YORK, Oct. 6. (JTA) -- Declaring that the situation of the Jews in Tunisia has become safer now than it was several months ago, but that in Morocco their situation is still serious, Irving Engel, president of the American Jewish Committee, told a press conference here today that his organization is not opposed to assisting in the emigration of Jews from North Africa, but seeks at the same time to secure equal rights for the 250,000 Moroccan Jews and their integration in Morocco on the basis of full legal equality,

Mr. Engel emphasized that the danger exists that Jewish emigration from Morocco may soon be severely restricted by the authorities. He salt that one of the objects of the American Jewish Committee is to secure for Moroccan Jews the right of free movement with their belongings. He urged maximum support of the United Jewish Appeal so that more Jews who wish to emigrate from North Africa can be helped to do so,

Mr. Engel also announced that the American Jewish Committee is conducting studies in democratic European countries of Jewish community life there, especially with regard to educational. religious, cultural and communal affairs. The survey is being conducted by a team of two experts, the AJC president stated.

147 COMPLAINTS OF JOB BIAS FILED WITH PRESIDENT'S COMMITTEE

WASHINGTON, Oct. 6. (JTA) -- President Eisenhower's Committee on Government Contracts, which is empowered to enforce anti-discrimination clauses of government contracts, reported here yesterday that it had réceived 147 complaints of bias in hiring or promotion in the past two years. The committee is headed by Vice President Richard M. Nixon.

Of the total, the committee had disposed of 71 cases and is still working on the remainder. The disposition consisted of "corrective action" in 21 cases, findings of no violation in 21 others, dismissal of 16 cases for lack of jurisdiction, and dismissal of 13 cases for inadequate information. The committee said that many more complaints would have been filed except for a ceneral "reluctance" on the part of victime.

Addressing an American Jewish Committee meeting in this city yesterday, Dr. John Slawson, executive vice-president of the AJC, declared that United States industry could save "many billions of dollars" by helping to banish racial discrimination. Accepting people for their individual worth would save "astronomical sums now lost in purchasing power, skilled executives and labor, and social problems produced by discriminatory practices," he said,

TRUMAN LAUNCHES BOSTON'S JEWISH APPEAL CAMPAIGN; 13,000 ATTEND

BOSTON, Oct. 6. (JTA) -- More than 13,000 persons jammed the Boston Garden tonight to hear former President Truman address a public rally which launched the 1955 Combined Jewish Appeal of Greater Boston campaign for \$5,055,000.

This is the first public rally to launch a CJA drive since 1949; and was seen here as a demonstration of the unity of the Greater Boston community. Sharing the platform with President Truman was Dr. Abram L. Sachar, president of Brandeis University. (Neither President Truman nor Dr. Sachar had spoken by the time the Bulletin went to press).

ISRAEL SCIENTIST TO HELP URUGUAY UNIVERSITY ON SOLAR RADIATION

HAIFA, Oct. 6. (JTA) -- Dr. Nathan Robinson, head of the Solar Radiation Laboratory of the Technion, Israel Institute of Technology, left Israel for Uruguay for a series of scientific conferences in connection with his work. The Technion scientist has been invited by the University of the Republic of Uruguay at Montevideo to help lay the groundwork for the establishment of an Institute of Solar Radiation and Applied Climatology at the University. He will spend approximately one month in Uruguay.

He will later proceed to the United States where he has been invited to deliver the opening paper on solar machines at the First World Symposium on Applied Solar Radiation to be held in Phoenix, Arizona, on November 2. More than 1,000 scientists from the major countries of the world will attend the symposium.

HEBREW UNIVERSITY PRESIDENT PRESENTS SCROLL TO U.S. JEWISH WOMEN

NEW YORK, Oct. 6. (JTA) -- Prof. Benjamin Mazar, president of Hebrew University in Jerusalem, presented a scroll to the board of directors of the National Council of Jewish Women today, expressing "profound gratitude for the outstanding support, both moral and financial, they are rendering to the University's Department of Education, the only institution in Israel training secondary school teachers.

The parchment scroll states that "the Council is playing a vital role in the raising of educational levels in the country and the maintenance of high academic standards." The scroll was accepted in behalf of the 62-year-old educational and social mediare organization by Mrs. Moise S. Cahn of New Orleans, its president. The NCJW board which is holding a four-day meeting here today appointed Mrs. Frances T. Cahn of San Francisco as the Council's national executive director.

LEADING AMERICANS ATTEND JEWISH FUNERAL SERVICES FORGEN. ADLER

NEW YORK, Oct 6. (JTA) -- Funeral services were held here today for Maj. Gen. Julius Ochs Adler, general manager and first vice-president of the New York Times, who died Monday at the age of 62. Later in the day, he was buried at Arlington National Cemetery with full military honors.

The services this morning were held at Temple Emanu-El, with Rabbi Julius Mark, senior rabbi, officiating. Present at the funeral was an honor guard of combat veterans of the 307th Regiment of the 77th Infantry Reserve Division, which Gen. Adler commanded until his retirement last December.

Henry Cabot Lodge, Jr., United States chief delegate at the United Nations, led the honorary pallbearers as President Eisenhower's personal representative. Among the pall-bearers were civil and military leaders of the nation and associates of the General's from the Times.
