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U. N. TO AUTHORIZE HAMMARSKJOLD TODAY TO CONTINUE HIS "PEACE MISSION"

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y., May 30. (JTA) -- The United Nations Security Council will continue tomorrow its debate on the British resolution requesting UN Secretary General Dag Hammarskjold to "continue his good offices" with Israel and the neighboring Arab countries with a view to strengthening his recent cease-fire achievements on the Arab-Israel frontiers, in the hope that this will pave the way for further Arab-Israel agreement.

In presenting his resolution to yesterday's meeting of the Security Council, Sir Pierson Dixon, head of the British delegation, said that the Council must not lose sight of the need for a mutually acceptable settlement of the differences between Israel and its Arab neighbors. "We believe that full compliance with the armistice agreements can be the bridge which may lead to progress on these differences," he said.

Sir Pierson made it clear that while his resolution does not ask the UN Secretary General to go back to the Middle East immediately, the Council should ask him "to make himself available" and leave it to him to decide exactly what to do. The view of the British Government, he said, was that Security Council action at this stage should be based on three premises:

First, they should take advantage of the successful contacts between the Secretary-General and the parties, in order to consolidate the gains already made and to keep up the momentum toward truly peaceful conditions. Second, the Council "should confine itself to fostering this process and should not force it." They should recognize the need to build up confidence between the parties. Third, they should work at this stage toward putting into effect practical measures already agreed on, and getting still more of such measures agreed on and put into effect. At the same time they should try to achieve full compliance with the armistice agreements.

Arabs Oppose British Resolution; Find It "Unacceptable"

While seven of the eleven members of the Security Council -- including the United States and France -- supported the British resolution at yesterday's session, the delegate from Iran said he might submit an amendment to the resolution. The Soviet delegate will make his stand clear tomorrow, and so will the representatives of Israel and the Arab countries who have been invited to the meeting of the Council. None of the latter is a member of the Security Council.

Outright opposition to the British resolution was expressed today by the Syrian delegation at the United Nations. A spokesman for the Syrians said that the resolution was "unacceptable" to the Arabs and that they will fight it "mercilessly." Syria's chief objection to the resolution is that under this resolution the UN Secretary General could undertake a second "peace mission" to the Middle East without asking the Security Council.

In spite of Arab opposition, it is expected that the resolution will be adopted at tomorrow's meeting of the Security Council. The Soviet delegation indicated that it may suggest "minor changes" in the text of the British resolution, but the adoption of the resolution, perhaps with some revised wording, is considered in United Nations circles as certain.

U. N. Action on Arab-Israel Issue Debated in British Parliament

LONDON, May 30. (JTA) -- The only way to get a satisfactory solution of the Egyptian blockade of the Suez Canal against Israel shipping is to get a settlement of the whole Israel-Arab conflict, Selwyn Lloyd, British Foreign Secretary, told the House of Commons today during a debate on United Nations action in the Middle East.

Replying to Laborite questions in the debate, Mr. Lloyd insisted that the discussions now under way in the United Nations Security Council were a better guarantee of ending the Suez blockade than "by threats against Egypt in this House." In reply to other questions, the Foreign Secretary admitted that the governments of the Middle East had not yet permitted full implementation of the agreements on the demarcation line borders and on the posting of UN observers along those lines. These agreements had been negotiated by the governments with UN Secretary General Dag Hammarskjold during his recent Middle East visit.

ISRAEL PROTESTS TO SECURITY COUNCIL AGAINST NASSER'S WAR THREATS

JERUSALEM, May 30. (JTA) -- The Israel delegation at the United Nations was instructed today to submit a complaint to the president of the UN Security Council against a statement by Egyptian Premier Col. Nasser of Egypt's preparations for war against Israel. The statement, containing war threats against Israel, was published in the Egyptian press.

A spokesman of the Israel Foreign Office said today that the Israel complaint to the Security Council will emphasize the fact that Nasser's statement constitutes a violation of the United Nations Charter and of the existing armistice agreement. The President of the Security Council will be asked to circulate Israel's protest among the members of the Council, the spokesman stated.

\$63,000,000 AID FOR ISRAEL AND ARAB NATIONS PROPOSED BY UNITED STATES

WASHINGTON, May 30. (JTA) -- The International Cooperation Administration today made known that development assistance totalling \$63,000,000 is proposed for five nations: Israel, Egypt, Jordan, Lebanon and Libya combined.

The amount of Israel's share was not revealed. These funds will help finance programs to accelerate desperately needed economic development. Israel will also share with ten other Near Eastern and African nations in \$34,000,000 of technical cooperation funds for economic growth, improving public administration, health and education.

BRITAIN URGED TO ACT ON ARAB BOYCOTT OF FIRMS DEALING WITH ISRAEL

LONDON, May 30. (JTA) -- The British Government was urged today to intervene with the United States against action by Arab propagandists in the U.S. who have been spreading boycott propaganda against British firms dealing with Israel. It was also asked to take other concrete action to end the Arab states boycott of British shipping or other business firms which deal with Israel or firms whose executives or shareholders are Jews.

In all cases, Foreign Secretary Selwyn Lloyd responded that the government would like more specific information about the cases cited before doing anything concrete. He also reiterated the British Government's opposition to such Arab activities and said the government had made this position clear to the Arab states on a number of occasions.

Labor MP Kenneth Robinson charged that Kamel Abdel Rahim, Yemen representative to the United Nations, was directing the Arab Boycott Committee's actions against British firms trading with Israel from the Arab Information Center in New York. He charged that the office had an annual income of \$4,000,000 which was chiefly obtained from American oil companies. He asked that representations against Rahim's activities be made in Washington.

Another Laborite asked the government to "back to the hilt" British ships which were discriminated against by the Arab states because they carried cargoes to Israel. Mr. Lloyd retorted that there were very few such ships that went through the Suez Canal and that he wanted information about any such cases. He also asked for information, confidentially given, about British firms who suffered from Arab discrimination because of the race or religion of their personnel or owners.

ISRAEL ORTHODOX CABINET MEMBERS THREATEN TO RESIGN OVER "PORK BILL"

JERUSALEM, May 30. (JTA) -- Premier David Ben Gurion today received the Mizrahi and Hapoel HaMizrachi Ministers who asked that a bill now before the Cabinet on the raising and sale of pork in Israel be worded so as to give municipalities the right to ban both the breeding of pigs and the sale of pork, under pain of their parties quitting the Cabinet.

Since the matter was so serious, Mr. Ben Gurion told the Orthodox members of his cabinet that he wanted a few days, past the time of the next Cabinet session, before replying. The bill currently proposed in the Cabinet is one which would give the municipalities the right to restrict the raising and sale of pork, but not to ban such activities.

WORLD JEWISH CONGRESS DISCUSSES COMPOSITION OF DELEGATION TO RUSSIA

JERUSALEM, May 30. (JTA) -- The Israel section of the World Jewish Congress will meet here tomorrow to name a representative to participate in the WJC delegation invited to visit the Soviet Union by Rabbi Solomon Schleifer of Moscow. The meeting will be attended by Dr. Nahum Goldmann, president of the WJC, who will report on the negotiations which led to the invitation.

The names of the full delegation are expected to be made public after the meeting. It was said here today that Dr. Goldmann may lead the delegation and may be joined by Dr. Israel Goldstein of New York, and A.L. Easterman of London. The delegation is also expected to include WJC leaders from France, Argentina and North Africa.

ISRAEL NAMES MINISTER TO POLAND; POST WAS VACANT SINCE 1952

JERUSALEM, May 30. (JTA) -- Katriel Katz, currently Charge d'Affaires of the Israel Legation in Budapest, has been named Minister to Warsaw, the Israel Foreign Ministry announced here today. He is the first Minister appointed by Jerusalem since Dr. Ariele Kubovi was named persona non grata by the Polish Government in 1952.

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PRIME MINISTER EDEN ADDRESSES JEWISH TERCENTENARY DINNER IN LONDON

LONDON, May 30. (JTA) -- Leaders of Britain's political, social and religious life and outstanding personalities in Jewish life in Britain joined last night in marking the 300th anniversary of the return of Jews to Britain. The contributions of Jewry to Britain and the welcome the Jews had received in this land were honored at a tercentenary banquet in London's historic Guildhall.

Prime Minister Sir Anthony Eden, in an address to the diners, said that no people in history had been a "magnet for so much cruelty and persecution" as the Jews. The world, he continued, is forever in the moral debt of the Jews for the pogroms practiced against them by dictators and for the "depths of unimaginable bestiality" turned on them by the Nazis. "From all that suffering we pray that one lesson has been learned: the freer development of racial tolerance. Tolerance is a test of civilization," the Prime Minister asserted.

Sir Anthony "gladly acknowledged" that the "Jews have made a contribution to our society which is both distinctive and highly valuable. Let us rejoice," he went on, "that now for 300 years the British Jews have found security from their enemies and scope for their talents in this country. Let us freely acknowledge that they have richly repaid their welcome and may we wish them Godspeed for the future."

Duke of Edinburgh Proposes Toast to Anglo-Jewish Community

The Duke of Edinburgh, proposing a toast to the Anglo-Jewish community, declared that the "Jewish community's record in this country is truly remarkable. Every part of our national life has been enriched by your contribution over the years." The members of the Jewish community, the Duke pointed out, "have achieved great things which have left or made a lasting impression. Perhaps the greatest achievement of the community as a whole throughout the 300 years has been its success at fitting itself into the life of its adopted country, yet at the same time retaining a sense of common interest and reverence for all the best traditions of the Jewish faith and culture."

"The community has proved again and again that it has the same interests at heart, the same loyalties as its fellow subjects." After citing the record of the Jewish community in both World Wars, the Duke said: "This year Jews and Gentiles in this country alike can thank God that they have come through so many years without a stain on their honor. Intolerance on the one hand and provocation on the other has often tried to make its appearance, but the good sense of both communities has always kept them in check." He concluded his toast with the statement that "Britain and the Commonwealth are richer for the talents and the achievements of the Anglo-Jewish community."

The Bishop of Chichester, representing the Archbishop of Canterbury, head of the Church of England, expressed the hope that "not the least of the fruit of this gathering would be the determination to resist tyranny and intolerance wherever it lifted its head within range of British influence and to insist that at least in the British Commonwealth, the colonies and protectorates, racial and religious discrimination would find no room."

Lord Samuel, Lord Reading Reply to Greetings; Present Volume to Queen

Chief Jewish speakers at the banquet were Lord Samuel and Lord Reading, Minister of State for Foreign Affairs. Lord Samuel, who replied to the Duke of Edinburgh's toast, noted that Britain and other countries which treated their Jewish citizens well "flourished" while those who abused the Jews had "declined." This was not surprising, he added, since the Jews made out well in an atmosphere of liberty, tolerance and equality of justice--just the type of atmosphere in which great nations developed.

Lord Reading, speaking of the Duke of Edinburgh, underlined that this was not the first occasion on which he had "honored" British Jewry by his interest in its activities and progress. Chief Rabbi Israel Brodie urged the British Government to "use its power and to apply its wisdom to securing peaceful cooperation between Israel and the Arab states and peaceful cooperation between East and West."

Lord Samuel presented the Duke of Edinburgh with a book containing the descriptive catalogue of the Tercentenary Exhibition and an account of the purposes of the anniversary celebration. He requested the Duke to present the volume to Queen Elizabeth II, who is a patron of the Tercentenary council.

Among the other distinguished guests present at the banquet were Cardinal Griffin, head of the Roman Catholic Church in Britain, and Eliahu Elath, Israel's Ambassador to Britain. Overseas Jewish organizations represented at the affair included the American Jewish Tercentenary Committee, Central Jewish Board of Bombay, Executive Council of Australian Jewry and the Rhodesian and South African Jewish Boards of Deputies. Recordings of the speeches were broadcast later throughout Britain and overseas, over the facilities of the British Broadcasting Corporation.

RUMANIA, HUNGARY INVITE ISRAEL RABBINATE TO INVESTIGATE KASHRUTH

JERUSALEM, May 30. (JTA) -- Rabbi S. Efrati, head of the Kashruth Department of the Israel Chief Rabbinate, left yesterday for Rumania and Hungary to investigate the state of kashruth conditions in those countries. His visit is on the invitation of their governments. He will spend two weeks in Bucharest and then proceed to Budapest.

J. D. C. DIRECTOR FINDS MIXED MARRIAGES RISING IN LATIN AMERICA

BUENOS AIRES, May 30. (JTA) -- Assimilation and mixed marriages are on the rise and cultural and spiritual activities are declining among Jews in much of Latin America, Sydney Nelson, Joint Distribution Committee director for Latin America, declared here today.

He made known his findings to a press conference following his return from a twelve-nation tour on behalf of the JDC and the Conference on Jewish Material Claims Against Germany, which has in recent years aided Jewish institutions in Latin America as well as elsewhere in the world. Mr. Nelson visited: Bolivia; Peru; Ecuador; Colombia; Panama; San Salvador; Guatemala; Mexico; Cuba; Venezuela; Brazil; and Uruguay. Basically, Mr. Nelson was interested in finding out what had happened to the large number of Jews who had immigrated to Latin American countries in recent decades.

The general situation, he said, was pointed up by a lack of Jewish educators and teachers, virtually no Jewish education, few Jewish libraries and publications, no conferences on Jewish themes; a lack of rabbis and synagogues, the maintenance of very few social or athletic centers for Jewish youth. Mixed marriages are increasing and assimilation is "progressing rapidly," Mr. Nelson said. There is no "Jewish spirit" to combat this condition, he added. The major exceptions to this picture, he stressed, were the Jewish communities of Uruguay, Brazil and Mexico.

Organizationally speaking, he noted, the Sephardic and Askenazi communities are in competition and there are no coordinated activities. Fund-raising campaigns do well, but erratically because they are not unified. The Jews are economically well off and local organizations take care of the indigent. There is no Zionist youth work and there is no immigration of Jews into these countries, except for Brazil, Uruguay and Venezuela. There is a "flight" of Jews from the smaller countries in Latin America to the larger ones.

Mr. Nelson asserted that the Jews in the countries he visited look to the United States and Argentina, the largest two Jewish communities in the Western Hemisphere, to send them teachers. They also need help from the Claims Conference, he said.

As a result of his own experiences, Mr. Nelson called for the conducting of a basic sociological study of the Jewish communities in the countries he visited, pointing out that there is difficulty in obtaining accurate figures about almost everything. He revealed that last year the Claims Conference had allocated \$250,000 to 50 institutions in Latin America, including organizations which cared for the sick, the aged, the immigrant and other social welfare aspects, as well as cultural organizations, seminaries and those that offered legal assistance.

ALEXANDER KAHN, NOTED JEWISH LEADER AND J. D. C. FOUNDER, IS 75 TODAY

NEW YORK, May 30. (JTA) -- Alexander Kahn, noted American Jewish leader and one of the founders of the Joint Distribution Committee, will observe his 75th birthday tomorrow modestly at his desk as general manager of the Jewish Daily Forward, largest Jewish newspaper in the world, it was learned here today. He turned down all suggestions of public celebrations.

Born in Smolensk, Russia, he came to the United States at the age of 12. While studying law at the New York University, he became interested in the Socialist labor movement, to which he later devoted his life. He was one of the outstanding labor lawyers in the country until 1939, when he was elected general manager of the Forward.

Active in the Joint Distribution Committee as vice president, Mr. Kahn is also known for his devotion to Israel. He is a staunch supporter of the Histadrut campaign in the United States and of other Israel causes. He was a member of the Administrative Committee of the Jewish Agency under the League of Nations. He is also active in the United Jewish Appeal, United Hias and numerous other organizations. His wife, Sarah, has been a leader of the Pioneer Women--the women's labor Zionist group in the United States--for many years.

FORESTS PLANTED IN ISRAEL IN HONOR OF PENNSYLVANIA GOVERNOR, 25 MAYORS

PHILADELPHIA, May 30. (JTA) -- One thousand persons from all parts of Pennsylvania gathered here to pay tribute to Governor and Mrs. George Leader, prior to their departure for Israel, and honor 25 mayors and other prominent Pennsylvanians in whose name forests had been planted in the Leader Woodland in Israel by their communities. It was reported that 10,000 trees had already been subscribed to in the Woodland.

Addressing the gathering, Mayor David Lawrence of Pittsburgh, called upon the United States to rectify the imbalance in arms in the Middle East. He asserted that Israel should be given the tools with which to defend herself and to protect what he termed democracy's vital flank. Other participants in the program included Philadelphia's Mayor Richardson Dilworth, Lt. Governor Roy Furman, State Senator Israel Stiefel, William H. Sylk, Fredric R. Mann and Lawrence G. Horwitz.
