DEFIANCE OF ARABS TO BRITISH RESOLUTION WILL BE TESTED AT U. N. TODAY

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y., June 3, (JTA) -- The British delegation at the United Nations, supported by the United States, France, and a majority of members of the UN Security Council, but deserted by the Soviet Union, will have to show tomorrow whether it submits to Arab defiance of its resolution on the Arab-Israel issue or intends to seek a formal vote on the draft which aims to further the reduction of tensions on the frontiers between Israel and the Arab countries.

The Arabs succeeded in blocking a vote Friday, and the Security Council adjourned until tomorrow afternoon. Vehement pressure was used by the delegates of Syria, Egypt, Jordan and Lebanon, and threats were voiced by them that Arab-Israel tension will be "se than ever if the Council 'dares' to pass the British resolution calling for ultimate 'peaceful settlement' of conflicts on a basis 'mutually acceptable' to Israel as well as to the Arab armistice signatories.

The "dare" was voiced here a dozen times during the long debate last week by all of the Arab delegates, led, in this campaign against ultimate peace, by Ahmed Shukaify of Syria. The clause in the British resolution to which the Arabs object would declare that the Security Council is "conscious of the need to create conditions (in the Middle East) in which peaceful settlement on a mutually acceptable basis of the disputes between the parties can be made."

As far as the Arabs are concerned, they made clear here, there is no possibility of "mutually" agreeing with Israel on basic issues. To Syria, as Mr. Shukaify insisted, Israel does not exist. He said that to him "Palestine is only Southern Syria." Soviet delegate Arkady Sobolev, in backing the Arab delegations in their drive to delete the clause which mentions the possibility of a "mutually acceptable" Arab-Israel peace move, surprised the British delegation by his attitude, since the Soviet leaders Nikita Khrushchev and Premier Nikolai Bulganin coined the phrase "mutually acceptable peace" for the settlement of the Arab-Israel conflict.

The British delegation was expecting today instructions from its government in London as to how to act tomorrow in the light of the rough treatment which the Arabs, backed by the Soviet delegation, are giving the resolution. The Israel delegation has expressed itself in favor of the resolution, which came in consequence of the report submitted to the Security Council by UN Secretary-General Dag Hammarskjold following his return from his "peace mission" in the Middle East where he succeeded in securing a cease-fire pledge both from Israel and the neighboring Arab countries.

Eisenhower Gets Report on Arab Defiance at Security Council

WASHINGTON, June 3, (JTA) -- The developments which are now taking place in the United Nations Security Council with regard to the Arab-Israel issue were outlined to President Eisenhower this week-end by Henry Cabot Lodge, Jr., head of the American delegation to the United Nations.

It is believed that Mr. Lodge reported to the President on the opposition which the Arabs are now displaying at the Security Council against the British resolution, seeking to further the reduction in Arab-Israel tensions which was brought about by the recent visit to the Middle East of UN Secretary-General Dag Hammarskjold. The role which the Soviet delegation at the UN is playing in supporting the Arab defiance of the British resolution, which has received the support of the United States and France, was also believed to have been brought to President Eisenhower's attention by Mr. Lodge.

In the meantime, it was learned today that leaders of the Republican Party intend to ask President Eisenhower to publicly denounce the barring of American Jewish service men from U. S. military installations in Saudi Arabia. The President has so far not answered letters sent to him by the American Veterans Committee, and by Jewish organizations asking him for a clear-cut statement on the "un-American and discriminatory policy" with regard to Jewish GIs.

ALGERIANS ATTEMPT TO ASSASSINATE CONSTANTINE RABBI AT SYNAGOGUE DOORS

PARIS, June 3, (JTA) -- An attempt was made to assassinate Rabbi Cuedj of Batha, as he was leaving the synagogue in Constantine, eastern Algeria, Friday night. The two men who made the attempt succeeded in escaping. The rabbi was rushed to the hospital, where reports said his life was not in danger.

SYRIAN MILITARY OFFICERS RECEIVE COMMANDO TRAINING IN THE U. S.

WASHINGTON, June 3. (JTA) -- Syrian military officers are being given U. S. Army commando training at Fort Benning, Ga., and will graduate this month, it was revealed here today by the Defense Department following the arrival in this country yesterday of Sheik Mounir Takieddine, Director-General of the Ministry of Defense of Lebanon, for a three-week tour of United States military bases and airplane plants.

Accompanied by two Lebanese military officers, Sheik Mounir came to this country at the invitation of the U. S. Air Force. The three visitors will inspect Army and Navy bases and Air Force establishments in various parts of the country as Air Force guests. They will also be taken to aircraft factories in California.

ARABS KILL JEWISH ORTHODOX STUDENT FIGHTING BLAZE IN JERUSALEM

JERUSALEM, June 3. (JTA) -- Mordecai Glassner, 22-year-old theological seminary student, was killed here today by a bullet from an Arab Legionnaire while fighting a blaze in the Paagi quarter of this city on the edge of the No-Man's Land which separates the Israeli section of the city from the Jordanian side.

Glassner, along with other students from his seminary, had volunteered for three days' civil defense work in the Paagi quarter. When shots from across the demarcation line, originating in a former British police depot, set fire to some weeds, Glassner rushed to extinguish the blaze. There was a renewed burst of firing from the Arab Legionnaires on the Jordanian side, and the young seminarian was killed instantly.

ARAB BOYCOTT OF JEWS REACHES BELGIUM; DIAMOND TRADE RECEIVES WARNING

BRUSSELS, June 3. (JTA) -- Concern was expressed today by Jewish circles in Antwerp following the receipt of a warning from Saudi Arabia extending its anti-Jewish boycott to the diamond trade. The warning posted on the premises of the "Diamond Office" in Antwerp, was transmitted by the Belgian Legation at Jeddah, and set up rules for diamond trade with the Arabian kingdom. It stated that firms making offers to Saudi Arabia should not be of Jewish origin.

Diamond dealers were surprised that a notice of such a nature should have been circulated by the Belgian Legation and that it was transmitted by the Belgian Office of Overseas Trade to the Diamond Office. There was also general regret that the latter had seen fit to post such a notice.

TURKEY RELEASES ISRAELI FISHERMEN; CONFISCATES THEIR FISHING VESSELS

ISTANBUL, June 3. (JTA) -- Seven Israeli fishermen arrested in Turkish waters several weeks ago on charges of illegally fishing in Turkey's territorial waters were released today. The fishing vessels remain confiscated.

Failure on the part of the Turkish Government to reply to requests for exit visas for a Turkish championship basketball team, which has been invited to visit Israel, is being interpreted here as part of the Turkish Government's campaign to give no open sign of friendship for Israel lest it alienate the Arab states.

The team, known as "Galatasaray," an Istanbul group, has been invited to participate in the "Hapoel Festival" in Israel. The Israelis had made all travel arrangements for the Turkish team.

SLOVAK NAZI SENTENCED TO DEATH; SENT JEWS TO NAZI GAS CHAMBERS

LONDON, June 3. (JTA) -- The death sentence has been imposed by the Slovak Supreme Court on Michael Vilhardt, former leader of the right-wing Hlinka Guard, convicted of carrying out acts of violence and robbery against Jews and confiscating Jewish property. The court found that Vilhardt was directly responsible for sending a number of Jewish families to the Nazi gas chambers, it was reported today from Prague.

SOVIET GOVERNMENT URGED TO PERMIT EMIGRATION OF JEWS TO U. S.

NEW YORK, June 3. (JTA) -- The Soviet Government and other Communist countries were urged today to open their doors and permit the emigration of those Jews who wished to join their relatives in the United States and in other lands.

A resolution to this effect was adopted at the 26th annual convention of the Council of Organizations of the United Hias Service, held at the Hotel Commodore. More than 3,000 delegates from labor, fraternal and religious organizations attended the one-day convention, at which changes in the present U. S. immigration law were requested by New York's Lieutenant Governor George B. De Luca and Murray Gurfein, president of United Hias, the Jewish world-wide migration agency. "We should change the quota system in our immigration law, to eliminate quotas based on national origins in conformity with our democratic ideals," Mr. Gurfein said.

U.S. ZIONISTS STRESS NEED TO FIGHT ASSIMILATION AMONG AMERICAN JEWS

NEW YORK, June 3, (JTA) -- The need of strengthening the Zionist movement to insure the cultural and spiritual survival of the Jewish community in this country, parallel with efforts to safeguard the security of Israel, were stressed here today at the conclusion of the two-day meeting of the National Administrative Council of the Zionist Organization of America at the Biltmore Hotel.

The issues facing the Zionist movement in the lands outside of Israel were discussed in the light of the decisions of the 24th World Zionist Congress recently concluded in Jerusalem. The discussions brought forth the unanimous agreement for an intensified effort by American Zionists not only in the rallying of public support for Israel in the realm of public relations and economic aid, but likewise in the furtherance of Jewish and Hebrew education and in the fostering of spiritual values and cementing of the cultural bonds between this country and Israel.

Mortimer May, ZOA president, who just returned from the Jerusalem sessions of the Zionist Congress, said that the Congress indicated that "slowly but surely the center of gravity in the world Zionist movement is tending toward The Diaspora, with the realization that still about 80 per cent of world Jewry is outside the State." He added that "it is realized pretty generally that Diaspora Jewry faces foes less obvious than to the State, but whose insidious and subtle work can prove very dangerous; that the enemy - assimilation - must be fought if we are to survive."

Dr. Emanuel Neumann, addressing the session charged the Administration in Washington with "deliberately temporizing" with the entire problem of Middle East peace "in view of the coming national election." He said that Washington is evidently hoping to put the Middle East crisis on ice through palliative actions in the United Nations which solve nothing basically. He urged the recall and replacement of the U.S. Ambassador to Egypt. Henry Byroade, whom he described as "long an apologist for the Egyptian dictator."

Dr. Neumann charged the State Department with engendering a "false sense of optimism" following the Hammarskjold mission to the Middle East and the cease-fire agreements obtained. "These agreements, welcome as they are, have not removed the danger of war," he warned. "Indeed, they could even serve as a convenient smokescreen for Nasser's aggressive designs against Israel; facilitate his preparations for war by providing him with the time he requires to absorb the Communist arms shipments, and enable him to launch a surprise attack when he believes he is ready for blitzkrieg."

Attended by several hundred Zionist leaders from all parts of the country, the meeting was presided over by Dr. Harris J. Levine, chairman of the National Administrative Council and president of the Jewish National Fund of America. Other speakers included Jacques Torczyner, ZOA vice-president, and Dr. Sidney Marks, executive director of the ZOA.

Rabbi I. Usher Kirshblum, national chairman of the ZOA membership committee, reported the enrollment of 15,000 new members during the last nine months, since the beginning of the new fiscal year, bringing the total current membership of the organization to 103,000. He appealed to all ZOA chapters to step up their membership campaigns in order to secure even larger membership totals before the opening of the ZOA convention August 24 in Washington, D. C.

PAN-AMERICAN OSE CONFERENCE MAPS PLAN OF ACTIVITIES IN LATIN AMERICA

MEXICO CITY, June 3, (JTA) -- Plans for developing health activities in Jewish communities throughout Latin America were mapped here today at the First Pan-American conference of the OSE, world Jewish health organization, which is headed by Abel Shaban, chairman of the World OSE Union. Delegates from the United States, Mexico, Argentina, Uruguay, Chile, Colombia, Ecuador, Venezuela and other countries on the American continents are attending the four-day parley.

The conference was opened by Dr. Jacobo Yaconoz, OSE president in Mexico, and was greeted by leaders of the Jewish Community of Mexico, Jewish Central Committee, Zionist Federation of Mexico and others. Greetings were also received from the Israel Legation in Mexico, expressing appreciation of the work which the OSE conducts in Israel, as well as from France, Italy, Finland, Tunisia and other countries where the OSE is maintaining Jewish health institutions.

In addition to the delegates, more than 500 guests, representing various Jewish groups and institutions in Mexico, attended the opening session of the conference which took place in the Jewish Sport Center. Principal speakers at the opening session included Mr. Shaban; Dr. I. Gofik, executive director of the world OSE Union; Dr. L. Wulman, director of the American OSE; and others. The Jewish press in Mexico is warmly greeting the gathering and devotes much of its space to covering the event.

YESHIVA UNIVERSITY TO CONSTRUCT \$1,500,000 STUDENT RESIDENCE HALL

NEW YORK, June 3, (JTA) -- Architectural plans for the construction of a \$1,500,000 seven-story student residence hall as a part of the Albert Einstein College of Medicine of Yeshiva University, were made public yesterday by Dr. Samuel Belkin, president of Yeshiva University.

JEWISH CONGRESS REPORTS INCREASE IN MIXED MARRIAGES IN CANADA

MONTREAL, June 3, (JTA) -- Although the absolute number of mixed marriages in Canada involving Jews and non-Jews is not alarming, the rate of increase is very serious, according to figures published here by Louis Rosenberg, demographer attached to the staff of the Canadian Jewish Congress.

Some 3 per cent of Jewish persons marrying in the province of Quebec marry out of the faith. In the other two provinces where a considerable number of Jews reside, Ontario and Manitoba, the percentage rises to 7. However, in British Columbia a quarter of all Jews who marry do so outside the community.

The rate of this intermarriage has doubled in Quebec during the past 25 years, and has nearly tripled in Ontario, Manitoba and Saskatchewan. The intermarriage rate seems to be in obverse proportion to the density of Jews among Anglo-Saxons, and to the quality of Jewish educational facilities available.

STUDENTS FOR REFORM RABBINATE TO BE ABLE TO GRADUATE IN NEW YORK

CINCINNATI, June 3, (JTA) -- The Board of Governors of the Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion voted this week-end to re-establish the Jewish Institute of Religion in New York as a graduate school with a five-year program leading to ordination of Reform rabbis. Since 1953 students of the Jewish Institute of Religion had to spend the last three years of their study at the Hebrew Union College in Cincinnati. The new decision makes it possible for the students to spend their final three years either in Cincinnati or in New York.

In announcing this decision, Dr. Nelson Glueck, president of the HUC-JIR also stated that an expansion program will be established in Los Angeles. In the West Coast city, students will be able to take a two-year course leading to the degree of Bachelor of Hebrew Letters, after which they will be eligible to spend their last three years leading to ordination either here or in New York.

Rabbi Louis Newman, founder of the Academy of Liberal Judaism which was established in New York last year, revealed that discussions concerning a consolidation of the academy and the Jewish Institute of Religion in New York had been going on for the last two weeks. These discussions, he added, involved the students and the faculty at the academy, various other items and "adequate local participation in the administration at the grass roots of the New York school." He said that the academy would continue until these problems were adjusted.)

The 72nd commencement exercises of the HUC-JIR were held here yesterday. Among those who received honorary degrees of humane letters were Governor Abraham Ribicoff of Connecticut, and Frank P. Graham, United Nations mediator and former Senator from North Carolina. The doctorate of philosophy degree was conferred on Mrs. Mary Gray, of Berkeley, Calif., who is the first woman to receive that degree under the school's graduate interfaith fellowship program. She is a 31-year-old Congregationalist Minister who studied the Old Testament and Semitic languages at the Hebrew Union College here.

U. S. LABOR ZIONISTS TO ESTABLISH "ISAAC HAMLIN HOUSE" IN ISRAEL

TEL AVIV, June 3, (JTA) -- An Isaac Hamlin Earband House, a project established in honor of Mr. Hamlin, a Labor Zionist leader in the United States who recently settled permanently in Israel, will be opened early in July. It was announced here today. A large delegation of Labor Zionists from the United States and Canada will visit Israel to attend the opening ceremonies.

Mr. Hamlin, who remains active in Histadrut work in Israel, has in the past few weeks participated in the inauguration of a number of institutions in Israel for which funds were raised by the Labor Zionist movement in the U. S. and Canada. Among these was the Hadera Trade School, established with the aid of the Toronto Amalgamated Union; a Histadrut building in Ramleh, erected with the financial assistance of the Detroit Jewish community, and a medical dispensary opened at Neve Monosson, a small settlement near Lydda airport named for Fred Monosson, New England Zionist leader.

JEWISH COMMUNITY IN TRIESTE SENDS NC: NT MARBLE ARK TO ISRAEL AS GIFT

TRIESTE, June 3, (JTA) -- A finely sculptured marble Ark of the 18th Century has been shipped to Israel; it was learned here today. The Ark, packed in 45 cases, is a gift of the Jewish community of Trieste to the Jewish State.

The Ark was built for a synagogue in Trieste inaugurated in 1745. In 1937, the synagogue was razed to make room for a public building, and the community packed away the marble Ark. It was hidden during the war and has remained unused to this day.

J. B. LIGHTMAN JEWISH SOCIAL WORKER NAMED ASSOCIATE PROFESSOR AT MCGILL

MONTREAL, June 3, (JTA) -- The appointment of J. B. Lightman, director of the Ann and Harry Bronfman Fund for Social Work Education and Training, as Associate Professor at the McGill University School of Social Work was announced here today by Dr. John J. O. Moore, director of the school. Mr. Lightman has been active in Jewish communal work in the United States and Latin America as well as Canada.
