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ANTI-JEWISH TERROR CONTINUES IN ALGERIA; SYNAGOGUE BOMBED; JEW KILLED

PARIS, June 10. (JTA) -- Anti-Jewish terror continued in Algeria yesterday. A bomb was thrown into the entrance of a synagogue in the Algerian city of Bone just as the Jews emerged from the Sabbath morning prayer session. One of the Jews, Edmond Levi, was killed when the bomb exploded. There were additional Jewish victims, according to a report received here today.

SHARETT NOT EXPECTED TO RESIGN AS FOREIGN MINISTER, HISTADRUTH SAYS

TEL AVIV, June 10. (JTA) -- There will be no changes in the Foreign Ministry, Davar, the Histadrut newspaper, reported here today. The labor paper discounted reports that Foreign Minister Moshe Sharett would resign to take over the post of general secretary of Mapai, Israel's Labor Party.

Meanwhile, the evening newspaper Maariv reported that a Cabinet shuffle based on Mr. Sharett's resignation which was expected today has been postponed for two or three weeks. The delay was occasioned by pressure from other members of the Cabinet. Maariv asserted, stating that the crisis had not been averted, merely delayed. The paper predicted that Mrs. Golda Myerson will eventually take over the Foreign Ministry's post.

Other expected changes listed by Maariv include the recall of Ambassador Abba Eban from the United States to Jerusalem to head the political section of the Foreign Ministry, with Ambassador Eliahu Elath leaving London to take up Mr. Eban's posts at Washington and the United Nations. For the London post, Maariv said, the name of Dr. Walter Eytan, director general of the Foreign Ministry, has been suggested.

EBAN CONFERS WITH DULLES; CONGRESS HEARS PLEAS FOR AID TO ISRAEL

WASHINGTON, June 10. (JTA) -- Israel Ambassador Abba Eban conferred at great length yesterday with Secretary of State John Foster Dulles on "a broad view" of regional security, political and economic questions. He was accompanied by Israel Minister Reuven Shiloah who returned recently from consultations in Israel.

The importance of Middle East oil to Western diplomacy was stressed by Secretary Dulles yesterday in an address at Iowa State College. He said that the Middle East "produces the oil required for the industry of Western Europe and for the military establishment of the NATO." He said that the estimate of expenditure for military aid and defense support for these countries in the next year is in the neighborhood of \$800,000,000. It is believed he referred to the member countries of the Baghdad Pact.

Strong anti-Egyptian and pro-Israel sentiments were expressed by a number of members of Congress during the Foreign Aid Bill debate in the House which concluded this week-end. Egypt was denounced for ties which her Premier, Col. Nasser, is expanding with Communist countries. Israel was named among those of America's allies who deserve military aid from the United States.

Among the Congressmen who lauded Israel was Rep. Robert C. Byrd, West Virginia Democrat, who earlier this year reflected anti-Israel views. He referred negatively to Egypt as did a dozen other Democratic members of Congress.

Pointing out that "Iron Curtain arms are pouring into Egypt," Rep. Thomas J. Dodd, Conn. Democrat, asked what diplomatic steps were being prepared by the United States to "induce the Arab states to sit down with Israel." He added: "I do not believe in a policy of assisting those who openly defy us and align themselves with the Communist bloc while we leave an avowed friend naked and alone."

Rep. Victor L. Anfuso, New York Democrat, said: "I strongly urge that we should not appropriate a single cent to Egypt, to Saudi Arabia, to Syria, and to the other Arab countries because they have betrayed the cause of the free world by their actions in making possible Russia's intrusion into the Middle East." At the same time, he urged that Israel's defense situation be appreciated and that "we appropriate the necessary military aid for her legitimate self-defense."

FIFTH OIL WELL IN HELETZ FIELD YIELDS OIL; STRONG PRESSURE REPORTED

TEL AVIV, June 10. (JTA) -- Heletz Five, the fifth oil well in Israel's first proved field, was brought in late Friday with a huge gush of black, crude oil. The pressure in the well is so great that it, like two of the other four wells in the Heletz field, will supply oil under its own pressure without pumping.

Meanwhile, production of crude oil began at Heletz Two, the most promising of the five wells. The Israel Oil and Lapidot Oil Companies, which have brought in these five wells, have decided to drill new ones in the field and will try to tap deeper strata.

Gov. George Leader of Pennsylvania, who is touring Israel as a guest of the Israel Foreign Ministry and the Israel Bond Organization, visited the oil field this week-end during a trip through the Negev. Gov. Leader is accompanied on the tour by his wife and Pennsylvania Jewish leaders.

TITO ANXIOUS TO OFFSET HIS VISIT TO CAIRO BY VISITING ISRAEL

GENEVA, June 10. (JTA) -- Yugoslavia's Marshal Tito plans to pay an official visit to Israel, it was learned here today from unimpeachable diplomatic sources.

These sources asserted that the Yugoslav Premier wants to visit the Jewish State to allay certain "misunderstandings" which he feels have arisen in Israel regarding his recent visit to Cairo. At the same time, it was indicated, Marshal Tito wants to emphasize to Israeli leaders that Yugoslavia is not a party to any bloc, be it in Europe, Asia or the Middle East.

W. J. C. DELEGATION WILL SEEK TO CHECK ASSIMILATION IN U.S.S.R.

PARIS, June 10. (JTA) -- Dr. Nahum Goldmann, president of the World Zionist Organization, arrived here from Israel to address a number of important meetings and to discuss various problems with French Jewish leaders. He will be the guest of honor at a luncheon tendered by Israel Ambassador Yaacov Tzur.

Replying to questions about the forthcoming visit to the Soviet Union of a delegation from the World Jewish Congress, of which he is president, Dr. Goldmann said the delegation would study ways of halting the assimilation of Jews in the USSR and of reviving the traditions of the Jewish faith. The delegation will appeal to the Soviet authorities to grant more rights to Jewish congregations and to establish Jewish schools and synagogues.

(In London, the executive committee of the World Jewish Congress discussed today the invitation from Moscow's Chief Rabbi Solomon Schleifer to send a delegation to the Soviet Union. It was decided to place the matter on the agenda of the WJC European executive which convenes in Paris June 28-29.)

KHRUSHCHEV DEFENDS CURB ON JEWS IN PROFESSIONS IN SOVIET UNION

NEW YORK, June 10. (JTA) -- Nikita Khrushchev, head of the Soviet Communist Party, defended a curb on the number of Jews in the Soviet professions in a conversation with a French Socialist delegation in Moscow last month, the Jewish Daily Forward reported here this week-end in a cable from Paris.

The dispatch said that Mr. Khrushchev admitted that the number of Jews in the professions had been restricted to the relative proportion of Jews to the general population--between one and one and a half percent. After the Bolshevik Revolution, Mr. Khrushchev reportedly told the French group, Jews occupied a disproportionately large number of such positions because relatively few trained people were available. Now, he continued, there are many more trained Russians and the high proportion of Jews in responsible positions is no longer needed.

The Communist leader is reported as having stated to the French delegation that the Soviet Government had received frequent protests from various Soviet republics that too many Jews held "desirable" posts. He pressed Lazar M. Kaganovich, then the only Jew in the Cabinet--Mr. Kaganovich resigned yesterday--to confirm his statements to the French delegation. Mr. Kaganovich said only "correct," the French delegates reported.

MOSCOW IMMIGRANTS FROM SOVIET BLOC COUNTRIES ARRIVE IN ISRAEL

TEL AVIV, June 10. (JTA) -- A party of 19 immigrants from Soviet bloc countries arrived here today. The party includes three people from Soviet Bukovina and the remainder from Hungary and Rumania.

One of the immigrants, 41-year-old Pessia Weinrich, a school teacher from Czernowitz, the capital of Bukovina, reported having been able to listen to broadcasts by Kol Israel, the Israel national radio, beamed at Eastern Europe. She also said that the situation in the country improved greatly after Stalin's death. The other Czernowitz inhabitants were Eddo Natsovitze, a 43-year-old violinist, and his wife.

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U. J. A. PASSES \$40,000,000 CASH MARK; \$15,000,000 PRESENTED AT PARLEY

NEW YORK, June 10. (JTA) -- The United Jewish Appeal today concluded its two-day National Action Conference with an announcement that \$40,350,000 in cash has been raised during the first half-year of its campaign, including \$15,000,000 presented by leaders from numerous communities at the final session this morning. More than 750 leaders of UJA campaign units from all parts of the country participated in the conference.

The mid-year total of cash gave the UJA \$32,250,000 for its regular campaign in behalf of the United Israel Appeal, Joint Distribution Committee and New York Association for New Americans, and \$8,100,000 for its Special Survival Fund to make possible this year's resettlement in Israel of the tens of thousands of Jews streaming into it from troubled North Africa.

Despite this near-record mobilization of cash, the delegates gave endorsement to an extraordinary project for securing a second \$40,000,000, this to be borrowed from the country's principal Jewish communities. The endorsement was given "to help the UJA keep pace with sharply rising humanitarian needs in Israel and North Africa." This endorsement came after a report on the Jewish position in North Africa which told of Jews being kidnapped for ransom, the looting of Jewish shops and the sharp worsening of the Jewish economic lot.

Moses A. Leavitt, executive vice-chairman of the Joint Distribution Committee, who returned several days ago from visits to Morocco and Tunisia, told the delegates that "while many of the Moslem leaders have expressed a concern for the rights of the Jewish minority, the Jews of North Africa are filled with anxiety and apprehension as a result of the statements made by extreme and irresponsible elements."

"No one questions the sincerity of the leaders in Morocco and Tunisia when they say that the Jewish minorities will receive the same rights and privileges as the rest of the population," Mr. Leavitt declared. "These assurances, however, do not satisfy the Jews when at the very same time no stop is put to the looting of Jewish stores and the kidnapping for ransom of leading Jewish personalities."

In addition, he said, "economic conditions have worsened considerably, particularly in Morocco, during this transitional period when the governmental apparatus is being taken over from the French authorities. The Jews feel the economic pinch more severely because the bulk of the Jewish population lives, and has always lived, on the verge of need and want. As a result," Mr. Leavitt emphasized, "the urge to emigrate has become much more widespread than previously."

Edward M. M. Warburg, the UJA president, who presided at the final session, told the delegates that "not since Hitler's attack upon the Jews of Europe have so many Jews been in danger and in need of help." He cited in particular "the danger of attack that faces Israel's people, including hundreds of thousands of refugees who fled to Israel because they were facing attack elsewhere, and the tension in North Africa which has led thousands of Jews to ask for resettlement in the new State."

The \$40,000,000 loan project, which the delegates approved, is headed by Dewey D. Stone of Brockton, as well as Morris W. Berinstein, of Syracuse, N. Y. Both are national chairmen of the UJA. The loans are being sought for periods ranging up to five years and will be repaid out of anticipated future proceeds.

Rosenwald, Friedman Stress Immediate Needs; Ben Gurion Appeals for Aid

William Rosenwald, general chairman of the UJA, addressing the conference last night, declared that "North Africa continues to be the area of tension and turmoil and of greatest concern, this due in part to Egyptian funds and propaganda which have been whipping up animosity there. From North Africa," Mr. Rosenwald declared, "more Jews than ever before are asking for help to leave for Israel." Beginning with last October, when the Egyptian arms deal was revealed, the people of Israel stepped up the rate of immigration from 30,000 to 45,000 annually," Mr. Rosenwald reported. "Actually this immigration has been proceeding at the rate of 50,000 annually, and last month it rose to a rate of 60,000 annually," he said.

Rabbi Herbert A. Friedman, UJA executive vice chairman, told the delegates that while moves for Arab-Israel peace are welcome, "it would be a mistake in the light of what is actually happening on the borders of Israel to lull ourselves into a false sense of security." The recent UN cease-fire, Rabbi Friedman said, and the statement by the Russians that they would help contribute to a settlement of the Arab-Israel conflict are not enough to warrant a relaxation of watchfulness and concern. He pointed to "implacable hatred of Israel and the huge preponderance of arms the Arabs now possess from the Soviet arsenal" as prohibiting a let-down of what he termed "American Jewry's guard."

Rabbi Friedman listed three immediate goals which he urged all American Jews to fulfill through the UJA. He gave these as the immediate goals facing American Jews and the UJA: 1. Helping Israel's people through the present period of danger. 2. The rescue of as many Jews from North Africa as possible, while there is still time. 3. Con-

vigilance of the Soviet sphere with respect to its treatment of the more than 2,500,000 Jews living there.

The conference was also addressed by Col. Chaim Herzog, Commander of the Jerusalem Military District of Israel's defense forces. He said that the United Nations cease-fire has made "little or no difference" to the Arabs and that they are continuing their border violations, killing and wounding Israelis.

Israel Premier David Ben Gurion, in a cable to the conference, told the assembled Jewish leaders that "the atmosphere of peril" will prevail this summer in Israel with even greater intensity than before. "We have given our solemn word to abide by the wish of the United Nations for a cease-fire," Mr. Ben Gurion declared. "But we have made it clear that if we are attacked, we will strike back with all our might and every fiber of our being. We hope that this attack will never come. But we are faced by a grave crisis now that the Arab States have acquired considerable quantities of modern arms from Czechoslovakia, which they intend to use against us."

Mr. Ben Gurion called upon "the great and devoted men and women who compose the United Jewish Appeal, to maintain their vigilance "especially during the summer now unfolding." He called for a continuation through the UJA of their "superb efforts in behalf of our fellow Jews in North Africa, and in support of the many thousands of immigrants who have come to us in the past and for whom our gates must remain open. Your faith in us," he declared, "is one of our greatest strengths."

AMERICAN ORT WOMEN CONTRIBUTE \$500,000 FOR TRAINING CENTER IN ISRAEL

TEL AVIV, June 10. (JTA) -- Ground-breaking ceremonies were held here today for the new ORT Vocational Training Center in the eastern section of this city which will be built with the help of the American Women's Division of ORT which contributed \$500,000 for the purpose.

Prominent city and national officials--including Labor Minister Golda Myerson, and Tel Aviv Mayor Levanon--as well as representatives of the American Embassy in Israel and women ORT leaders from the United States, headed by Mrs. V. Segal, participated in the ceremonies. A speech hailing the efforts of the ORT women's division in the United States as well as Dr. Aron Syngalowski for development of ORT vocational centers in many countries was delivered by J. Shapira, ORT chairman here.

The new vocational school will occupy a 30-dunam plot of land containing workshops, classrooms, laboratories, a library, auditorium, dining room and sports field. It will accommodate 550 pupils, 350 of whom are at present students at an ORT school using unsuitable quarters in Jaffa. Among subjects to be taught will be included electro-mechanics, training for radio technicians, electronics and precision mechanics.

FRANKFURT UNIVERSITY INTRODUCES LECTURES ON JEWISH HISTORY

FRANKFURT, June 10. (JTA) -- Frankfurt University has embarked on a five-year series of lectures on Jewish history, culture and religion under the Philosophy Faculty of the University. The series has been made possible by a bequest in the will of the late Eda Kuhn Loeb, of New York.

Next Wednesday, Dr. Alexander Altmann, rabbi of Manchester, England, will deliver a lecture on the "Beginnings of Jewish Neo-Platonism." The program, named the "Loeb Lectures," was initiated by Dr. Leo Baeck, former Chief Rabbi of Berlin and currently head of the World Union for Progressive Judaism.

NON-JEWISH BUTCHER PERMITTED BY LONDON RABBIS TO SELL KOSHER MEAT

GLASGOW, June 10. (JTA) -- A non-Jewish butcher has been given permission to open a kosher meat shop in this city by Chief Rabbi Israel Brodie and the Beth Din of London.

The Chief Rabbi confirmed a previous decision to grant a license to James Ferguson, a Glasgow butcher, to open a kosher meat shop on the following conditions: that he set up a separate shop for selling kosher meat, and that the Glasgow Beth Din appoint a "shomer"--watchman--to see that kashruth rules are adhered to.

In a letter to the Glasgow Board of Schechita, the Chief Rabbi noted that it is not a practice to grant such a license to a non-Jew where a community has a Jewish butcher. But, the letter continued, he was prepared to make an exception if his conditions were met. A member of the Board of Schechita commented that the decision would make history in this community.

PRESIDENT OF ECUADOR ATTENDS PERFORMANCE BY CHALUTZIM IN QUITO

QUITO, Ecuador, June 10. (JTA) -- The Ecuador-Israel Institute of Cultural Relations organized a gala performance in honor of Ecuador's President, Jose Maria Velasco Ibarra, with the participation of a group of Argentinian chalutzim who are now touring Latin America on their way to Israel.

The performance, at which the chalutzim presented Israeli dances and songs, was attended by the President, the Vice President, members of the Cabinet and of the diplomatic corps. President Velasco Ibarra was greeted from the stage by Dr. Max Weiser, Israel's Honorary Consul in Ecuador.
