U.S. GOVT. STAND ON ISRAEL REPORTED BY EBAN TOKNESSET COMMITTEE

JERUSALEM, June 26. (JTA) -- A report on the current relations between the United States and Israel was made today by Ambassador Abba Eban at a session of the Parliamentary Committee on Security and Foreign Affairs. Mrs. Golda Myerson, the new Israel Foreign Minister reported to the committee on the foreign situation.

Mr. Eban reported on his latest talks with Secretary of State John Foster Dulles and on the chances of Israel's securing action from the State Department on its application to purchase American arms. The Israel Ambassador also reported in detail on the latest session of the United Nations Security Council at which the Arabs scored a victory by forcing the Western Powers to bow to their demand that the phrase dealing with "mutually accepted" Arab-Israel peace be dropped from the resolution.

Premier David Ben Gurion was criticized at the session for having stated in Parliament last week that Dr. Peretz Bernstein, leader of the General Zionists, advocated preventive war against Jordan, in a speech to this committee. The criticism of the Premier was voiced by Herut deputy Menahem Beigin, who pointed out that committee members were enjoined to secrecy.

Mr. Beigin argued that if Premier Ben'Gurion could 'leak' information about committee matters, no other members could be held to secrecy. Meir Argov, Mapai chairman of the committee, agreed with the Herut leader. It was decided to call on Mr. Ben Gurion, as Defense Minister, to explain his conduct at a Knesset session next week.

FRENCH GOVERNMENT WATCHES MOROCCAN STAND ON JEWISH-EMIGRATION

PARIS, June 26. (JTA) -- The position taken by the Moroccan authorities in banning Jewish emigration from Morocco was discussed here today by Israel Ambassador Yacov Tsur with the former Moroccan Resident General Gilbert Grandval.

No details of the discussions were available. However, it is understood that the French Government is watching the Moroccan developments in relation to Jewish emigration. Prior to Morocco becoming independent, Moroccan leaders made promises to France that they would respect the wishes of the Jews in Morocco. Similar promises were made at that time to leaders of major Jewish organizations.

The French press continued to carry reports of the desperate situation of the Jews who liquidated their homes and came from remote parts of Morocco to Casablanca only to find that they were not permitted to leave the country. Jewish organizations are, however, reluctant to issue reports that are reaching them from their representatives in Morocco, in the hope that some understanding might still be reached with the Moroccan authorities on some form of Jewish emigration.

(From Istanbul it was reported that the government-owned Turkish Maritime Lines has accepted an Israeli offer to charter the S.S. Istanbul, with a capacity of 600 passengers, to move Moroccan Jewish emigrants-to Israel.)

LABOR PARTY DELEGATION ASKS BRITISH GOVERNMENT TO ARM ISRAEL

LONDON, June 26. (JTA) -- A request that the British Government supply Israel with defensive arms was believed made to Foreign Secretary Selwyn Lloyd by a British Labor Party delegation which conferred with him last night.

The delegation objected to Britain's having backeddown before the Arabs in the matter of the Security Council resolution instructing UN Secretary General Dag Hammarskjold to continue his good offices with the Arabs and Israelis, and discussed the consequences of the resignation of Foreign Minister Moshe Sharett. It also covered Anglo-Jordan relations and big power consultations on the Middle East.

Jordan Protests Against British Map Showing Israel As Country

LONDON, June 26. (JTA)/-- The Jordan Ministry of Education plans to protest to the British Government because an examination given Jordan students in Amman on proficiency in English contained a map of the Middle East on which Israel was shown as a country, it was reported here from the Jordan capital. The examination was for purposes of matriculation at the University of London.

WARSAW RADIO REPORTS RENEWAL OF ANTI-JEWISH PROPAGANDA IN POLAND

VIENNA, June 26. (JTA) -- Radio Warsaw today admitted in a broadcast that "signs of anti-Semitism have lately appeared in public life" in Poland. It pointed out that the present manifestations of anti-Semitism "cannot be liquidated by orders from above" and emphasized the need to appeal to all the people of the country to combat them.

The broadcast indicated that the present stirring of anti-Semitism may be attributable to the fact that certain Jews are among the principal spokesmen for the more critical-minded views that have lately come to the fore in post-Stalin Poland. Other sources believe that circles close to Edward Ochab, the new first secretary of the Communist Party, are deliberately tolerating or even encouraging an anti-Semitic whispering campaign as a by-product of an anti-intellectual drive.

Until recently, the existence of anti-Semitism in Poland was vigorously denied in the Polish press and radio, but under the new trend of reporting now permitted, a number of publications have recently confirmed the perseverance of anti-Jewish prejudice and excesses. An article by Leszek Kolakowski in the student magazine "Po Prostu," which was headlined "Anti-Semites -- A Warning," has attracted much attention.

BONN GOVERNMENT APPROVES DRAFT LAW ON REICH RESTITUTION OBLIGATIONS

BONN, June 26. (JTA) -- The West German Cabinet approved and forwarded to Parliament for further action the draft of a law to take care of restitution obligations of the former German state.

Involved are a wide variety of claims—the one-billion mark fine imposed upon the Jews of Germany after the Paris assassination of German diplomat Ernst vom Rath by Hershel Grynszpan in November 1938; discriminatory taxes and levies of various kinds; real estate and houses taken over by the state; silver, gold, jewelry and art works that had to be delivered to municipal pawnshops, and furniture and personal effects seized and auctioned off.

In the Paris Conventions and in the Hague Agreement, the liability of the West German Government for all such claims was arbitrarily limited to \$357,000,000. It is understood that the Jewish successor organizations for heirless property have been offered a lump-sum payment of \$18,000,000 for the restitution claims against the Reich that fall within their jurisdiction.

BRITISH GOVERNMENT TO ALLOCATE FUNDS FOR CHARITY FOR NAZI VICTIMS

LONDON. June 26. (JT/.) -- The British Government will set aside a sum up to 250,000 pounds (\$700,000) which it receives from German enemy property for charitable purposes intended to relieve the suffering of racial, religious and political victims of Nazism, Peter Thorneycroft, president of the Board of Trade declared in Parliament today.

Mr. Thorneycroft, in a report on the final disposition of German enemy property, said that it was too late to consider individual applications for the return of assets by German nationals who suffered at the hands of the Nazis. The British Government planned to make "some provision to help cases of real suffering caused by this persecution." All sums accruing from enemy property over 250,000 pounds would revert to the British Exchequer, he revealed.

GERMAN YOUTH CENTER IN WEST BERLIN NAMED "ANNE FRANK HOME"

BERLIN, June 26. (JTA) -- A new \$75,000 municipal youth center in Berlin's Wilmersdorf district has been given the name. "Anne Frank Home" - in the words of borough Mayor Dumstrey, "so that young people will ever remember what cruelties and inhumanity were inflicted upon human beings. The fate of Anne Frank must be an obligation for German youth."

At the opening ceremony, actor Wolfgang Kuehne read moving passages from Anne Frank's diary. At the invitation of the municipal authorities, the president of the West Berlin Jewish Community, Heinz Galinski, delivered a stirring talk in which he lauded the borough administration for not choosing "the easy path of forgetfulness." Therein lies a guarantee for the future, he declared.

CHRISTIAN-JEWISH SOCIETY ASKS HAMBURG TO ERECT MEMORIAL TO HEINE

HAMBURG, June 26. (JTA) -- The Society for Christian-Jewish Cooperation of Hamburg has called on the local city government to erect a monument to the poet Heinrich Heine to replace two other monuments in this city to the German Jewish poet destroyed by the Nazis. The move has the endorsement of the Hamburg Free Academy of Fine Arts. The Christian-Jewish group in Hamburg is under the leadership of Erich Lueth, initiator of the 'Peace with Israel' movement.

ANTI-SEMITISM MAKES NO HEADWAY IN BRITAIN, JEWISH GROUP REPORTS

LONDON, June 26. (JTA) -- Neither anti-Semitism nor fascism seem to be making any headway in Britain, but constant vigilance is still required, according to the annual report of the defense committee of the Board of Deputies of British Jews released here today.

The continual attempts of Sir Oswald Mosley's "Union Movement" to keep itself before the public and to take advantage of a difficult economic situation—together with the underground activities of less publicized organizations—are sufficient evidence of the importance of the committee's work, the report asserted.

The committee, which operates in a manner similar to that of the B'nai B'rith Anti-Defamation League in the United States, also reported that "other anti-Semitic organizations, which donot indulge in open air public meetings but content themselves with the publication of virulently anti-Semitic journals, continue this form of attack. Fortunately, these journals, at the moment, have a limited circulation," the report declared.

REFORM RABBIS WARN OF ATTEMPTS TO BRING RELIGION INTO PUBLIC SCHOOLS

ATLANTIC CITY, June 26. (JTA) -- Widespread efforts are being made 'to breach the traditional wall of separation between church and state, which is part of the very foundation of American democracy and spirit and constitutional law, 'according to a report submitted tonight to the 67th annual convention of the Central Conference of American Rabbis, which is attended by about 700 Reform rabbis.

The report, submitted by Rabbi Herman E. Snyder, of Springfield, Mass, chairman of the Commission on Church and State of the CCAR, warned that "a dangerous threat to church-state separation is represented by those vague programs allegedly intended to teach 'moral and spiritual values,' 'factual teaching about religion's or a 'common core religion in the nation's public schools."

These are dangerous, "the commission report explained, "because they are so elusive, but when analyzed, each of these programs would involve the public school in a program of religious education for which the public school is not equipped and for which the public school was not created. The teaching of religion is the business of the church, the synagogue and the home--not of the public school."

The commission report expressed dismay at the fact that despite the United States Supreme Court decision of 1948 which termed unconstitutional all released-time programs held on public school premises, 32 percent of the country's public school systems permit released-time classes to meet in public school buildings.

-Plead for Cooperation between Psychiatry and Religion

Pleas for greater cooperation between psychiatry and religion were voiced at a session commemorating the 100th anniversary of the birth of Sigmund Freud. Under the chairmanship of Rabbi Henry E. Kagan of Mt. Vernon, N.Y., a panel of rabbis emphasized that "couch and pew" have problems in common. "Freud strove for man's emotional security, while Judaism contains much that has striven for spiritual maturity," said Rabbi Joseph R. Narot, of Miami, Florida: "Both represent the ideal, the final growth from the infantile to the adult."

The commission protested against "compulsory Sunday laws which give no relief and recognition to those of other faiths whose Sabbath day of rest is on a day other than Sunday day" and called for the introduction of legis ation which will give relief where such Sunday laws may now be in existence.

The practice of the New York Children's Court in employing probation officers on a religious quota basis was also condemned by the commission, which protested that the implications of such a policy seemed "far reaching." The commission called on the convention to go on record as demanding "that probation officers, as in theinstance of public school teachers, should be employed on the basis of professional merit and not on the basis of religious affiliation."

JEW ELECTED MAYOR OF DUBLIN; IS ONLY JEWISH MEMBER OF PARLIAMENT

DUBLIN, June 26. (JTA) -- Robert Briscoe, only Jewish member of the Parliament of Eire, was elected Lord Mayor of Dublin yesterday. Both Mr. Briscoe and Denis Larkin, outgoing mayor, each received 19 with the city council so their names were put in a hat and Mr. Briscoe's was drawn.

Mr. Briscoe, 62, is a native of Dublin. He has served in Parliament as the first and only Jewish MP since 1927 and has been the first and only Jewish member of the city council since 1928. Mr. Briscoe, a Revisionist during the time-of Vladimir Jabotinsky, has been active in the Jewish community of Dublin and has served as president of the Board of Schechita since 1951. He helped found a B'nai B'rith lodge in Dublin two years ago and is a member of its executive committee.

In his speech of acceptance, Mr. Briscoe told his colleagues that his election as Mayor was a "magnificent gesture" that would point out to the world that "in Ireland, at least, there was absolute tolerance and that in this Catholic country a man of faith could habe the goodwill of his co-citizens if he deserved it and was prepared to give service to his fellow citizens."

ISRAEL BOND ORGANIZATION TO HOLD NATIONAL CONFERENCE IN WASHINGTON

NEW YORK, June 26. (JTA) -- A two-day national conference to launch the Fall campaign for the sale of Israel bonds in this country will be held in September at the Shoreham Hotel in Washington, it was announced here today by the Israel Bond Organization. The conference, which will be addressed by key American and Israeli personalities, will be devoted to plans for achieving maximum results in the sale of bonds during the Fall.

INDONESIA SCORED IN U.S. FOR BARRING ISRAELI STUDENTS FROM CONFÉRENCE

NEW YORK, June 26. (JTA) -- The Government of Indonesia was branded today as "short-sighted and ungenerous" for her refusal to admit two Israelis into Indonesia to attend the annual business meeting of World University Service, an international student welfare organization. The charge was made by Dr. Arthur J. Lelyveld, vice-chairman of the American organization, in a statement explaining the reasons for cancellation of the Indonesian site as a meeting place.

"We were surprised and dismayed by the decision of the Government of Indonesia preventing the Israeli delegates from attending," Dr. Lelyveld stated. "We find Indonesia's action shortsighted and ungenerous, and we have decided to search elsewhere for a meeting place. World University Service is a non-political organization that provides technical and educational assistance to needy universities and students throughout the world. Our program operates without discrimination as to race, religion, or nationality. We shall continue to adhere to these principles in the conduct of our program and in the meetings at which these programs are planned."

MAYOR OF TEL AVIV HONORED IN BUENOS AIRES; ADDRESSES, HUGE AUDIENCE

BUENOS AIRES, June 26. (JTA) -- Several thousand Argentine Jews gathered in Buenos Aires' largest theatre last night to honor Chaim Levanon, Mayor of Tel Aviv, in a rally sponsored by the United Jewish Campaign. The meeting was chaired by the co-chairmen of the campaign, Samuel Rabinovich and Leon Cajani, and heard a message from Israel Ambassador Arieh Kubovi, who could not attend because of illness.

Mayor Levanon told the audience that 500 Argentine Jews live in Tel Aviv and that Israel has 22 settlements of Argentine youths and that he brought greetings from them to their families in this country. He spoke glowingly of Israel's achievements, but stressed the Arab threat along the borders. He compared relations between Egyptian Premier Nasser and Soviet Foreign Minister Shepilov to the Molotov-Ribbentrop meeting "from which Jews suffered horrors."

ISRAEL ENVOY TO MEXICO PRESENTS CREDENTIALS TO MEXICAN PRESIDENT

MEXICO CITY, June 26. (JTA) -- Israel's new Ambassador to Mexico, Brig. David Shaltiel, has presented his credentials to Mexican President Adolfo Ruiz Cortines in a ceremony at the Palacio Nacional here. The new envoy also conveyed a message of warm regard to the Mexican chief of state from President Itzhak Ben Zvi of Israel. Also present at the presentation ceremony were Mexican Foreign Minister Luis Padilla Nervo and Yerachmiel Yaron, first secretary of the Israel Legation here.

In his new capacity, Brig. Shaltiel will serve as Israel's diplomatic representative not only in this country, but in Cuba and all the Central American republics as well. At a press conference following the presentation of credentials, the Israeli envoy told newsmen of Israel's desire for peace and cooperation with her Arab neighbors in the Middle East. His first official ceremonial act in his new capacity was the laying of a wreath at the monument to the heroes of the Mexican struggle for independence.

BRITISH AMBASSADOR IN U.S. HONORS RABBI BRODIE; TENDERS KOSHER LUNCHEON

WASHINGTON, June 26. (JTA) -- British Ambassador Sir Roger Makins today tendered a luncheon at the British Embassy here in honor of Rabbi Israel Brodie, Chief Rabbi of the British Commonwealth. Sir Roger and Lady Makins arranged to have a kosher caterer come to the Embassy to prepare the luncheon. It was attended by Associate Supreme-Court Justice Felix Frankfurter, Sen. Herbert H. Lehman, and other personalities.

AMERICAN-ISRAEL SHIPPING CO. NAMES CHOWERS EXECUTIVE VICE-PRESIDENT

NEW YORK, June 26. (JTA) -- Gottlieb Hammer, president of the American-Israeli Shipping Company, announced today the election of Arieh Chowers as executive vice-president of the company. The company is the U.S. representative of the Zim Israel Navigation Company of Haifa, Israel's largest shipping firm.

Mr. Chowers has been the Zim Lines' operations manager in Haifa since 1951. Prior to that he served as treasurer of the Shoham Maritime Services, Ltd., a wholly owned subsidiary of Zim, and was the Line's European representative with headquarters in Paris.
