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U. S. PONDERES PARTICIPATION OF ISRAEL IN U. N. DEBATE ON SUEZ ISSUE

WASHINGTON, Oct. 2. (JTA) -- The manner and form desired by the United States for the presentation of Israel's views during the United Nations Security Council discussion of the Suez Canal issue--which is to start this Friday--has not yet been decided by the State Department, Secretary of State John Foster Dulles told his press conference here today.

Mr. Dulles made it clear, however, that he certainly thought Israel's case, because of Egyptian denial of Israel maritime rights under the 1888 international pact on passage of ships through the Suez Canal, would come to the attention of the Security Council in some manner. He indicated he was not inclined to favor Israel's "full participation" in the Security Council debate.

The question of Israel's joining in the Security Council discussions on the Suez issue, Mr. Dulles told the press conference, may come up again this week after being adjourned for a decision last week. He added that the question must be handled with care to prevent "everybody" from coming into the Security Council's consideration of the Suez crisis. State Department sources later said that by "everybody" Secretary Dulles referred to Arab states hostile to Israel.

Newsweek, widely-read weekly magazine, today reported that Britain is putting "sharp pressure" on Israel not to raise the question of Egypt's blockade of Israeli shipping-issue at this week's Security Council debate on Egypt's seizure of the Suez Canal. "The British fear this would cost the backing of Iraq and Jordan, whose support, open or under cover, is considered vital to the West's cause," Newsweek said.

The same publication reported that the United States has come to a "firm decision" to force the fall of Col. Nasser, the Egyptian President, as soon as some kind of a Suez solution is patched. "The weapons used against Nasser," Newsweek says, "will be mostly economic: the State Department will stop asking Congress for Egyptian cotton quotas; aid will be withdrawn; and Israel's perennial request for arms will get a warm reception."

EISENHOWER MAY TOUCH ON ISRAEL ISSUES DURING SPEECH IN NEW YORK

WASHINGTON, Oct. 2. (JTA) -- Political sources predicted today that President Eisenhower may touch on the Israel issues when he makes a political appearance in New York City in late October.

The President's intention to appear in New York for campaign purposes was made known today by White House spokesman James Hagerty following a call on the President by Jacob K. Javits, Republican Candidate in the New York Senate race.

ARAB STATES MEET TO CONSIDER COLLECTIVE ACTION AGAINST ISRAEL

LONDON, Oct. 2. (JTA) -- An "emergency meeting" of representatives of Egypt, Syria, Lebanon and Jordan took place today in Cairo to consider "collective measures" against Israel in connection with Israel's retaliatory raid on Jordan last week, a cable from Cairo reports.

Simultaneously, representatives of these four Arab states met in Beirut to draft a protest to the United Nations against "Israeli aggression." A report from Damascus said that Iraq has stationed a mobile division near her Jordanian frontier in preparation for sending troops into Jordan to help "resist Israel's aggressions."

MOROCCAN GOVERNMENT ASSAILS ISRAEL; ASKS U. N. TO ACT AGAINST ISRAEL

CASABLANCA, Oct. 2. (JTA) -- The Moroccan Government issued today a blast against Israel for its retaliatory raid on Jordan last week and demanded that the United Nations act to end Israel's "aggressive attitude and attacks against Arab countries which threaten the peace and security of the Middle East."

The statement expressed the solidarity of the Moroccan Sultan and people with their "Jordanian brothers after the odious and deliberate Israeli attack which cost the lives of numerous innocent Jordanians." The statement deplored the "violence which the Israelis unceasingly display and (their) jeering at the United Nations and the principles of the rights of man."

CANADA REJECTS ARAB PROTESTS AGAINST SALE OF JETS TO ISRAEL

OTTAWA, Oct. 2 (JTA) -- Canadian Prime Minister Louis St. Laurent, at a press conference here, rejected Arab protests against the Canadian decision to sell Israel 24 Canadian-manufactured jet fighters.

Defending his government's action, Mr. St. Laurent insisted that the sale of planes to Israel would not increase tension or upset the power balance in the Middle East. He noted that the Arabs could obtain all the arms they want from Soviet bloc countries or other sources, while Israel's sources of supply were limited. However, he indicated that Canada was not the only country providing Israel with defensive weapons.

NEW YORK MAYOR URGES U. S. TO SEND ARMS TO ISRAEL AS MILITARY AID

NEW YORK, Oct. 2 (JTA) -- The United States was urged last night by Mayor Robert F. Wagner to send arms to Israel as a gift because Israel is the only friend of the Western Powers in the Middle East. Speaking at a meeting of the United Shoe Workers Union, the New York Mayor said the U. S. Government must put Israel on the same footing as other nations in the free world which are receiving free military assistance.

"Not only should we send arms to Israel," he said, "but in my humble opinion we should not ask them to pay for them. We send arms to countries that are less friends of ours and if we charge Israel for armaments we give for nothing to other countries then we are not their real friends. I know that little fighting republic is our only real friend in the Middle East and if that country is lost everything goes down the drain."

Jacob K. Javits, Republican candidate for U. S. Senate from New York, was asked by reporters for comment on the statement made by Mayor Wagner, his Democratic opponent. Mr. Javits declared: "I believe the United States should show its responsibility for the security of Israel in any way it needs to be shown, including the giving of arms." He said he is for continuing economic aid and mentioned Israel's pending application for a \$75,000,000 Export-Import Bank loan for irrigation development.

BEIGIN OPENS HERUT CONVENTION; ADVOCATES COOPERATION WITH BRITAIN

TEL AVIV, Oct. 2 (JTA) -- The national four-day conference of the right-wing Herut Party opened here today with an address by Menahem Beigin, leader of the movement, who outlined his stand towards Israel's security problem. Speaking before an audience of 470 delegates and hundreds of guests, he said the Israel Government's policy of retaliation to Arab border raids was "too late."

Israel faces three dangers, Mr. Beigin declared: firstly, all war fronts are under a united Arab command; secondly, the Arabs have arms superiority, and finally, Israel is isolated politically.

Israel can overcome this isolation, he insisted, particularly when her interests coincide with that of France and the United States. Russian agents are training Egyptian troops in the use of arms which are directed at all the democracies, as well as at Israel.

If Britain is willing to "go along with Israel against the common enemy" then Israel should go with Britain despite the past history of strife between the British Government and the Israeli community, said the erstwhile leader of one of the more ferociously anti-British underground movements in Israel.

Mr. Beigin recommended to the conference that all negotiations for a merger with the General Zionists be dropped because the centrists will not agree to including in a common program the Herut demand for an Israel extending on both sides of the Jordan River, and because the General Zionists want a two-thirds majority on all operating bodies of the proposed united party. Mr. Beigin also called for an "open door" policy on foreign investments and the elimination of foreign currency controls.

ISRAELI SAILOR REPORTS ON TORTURES SUFFERED IN EGYPTIAN PRISON

TEL AVIV, Oct. 2 (JTA) -- Menahem Kavalkin, an Israeli sailor removed from the Swedish flag ship S. S. Birkland by Egyptian authorities in the Suez Canal, declared today that he was beaten and tortured throughout most of his 84-day detention in an Egyptian prison. His body covered by bruises and wounds, Mr. Kavalkin returned to Israel today from Cyprus where he transferred from a Norwegian ship which took him from Egypt.

"I was tortured cruelly and was not left alone for one minute," the sailor said. He reported that his Egyptian jailors attempted to beat out of him "Israeli Army secrets," of which he was totally ignorant. All his personal belongings were stolen by his jailors and he was treated slightly better only on the last few days before his release.

5,000 GERMAN WORKERS, SCHOOLCHILDREN VIEW NEW ISRAELI LINER

HAMBURG, Oct. 2. (JTA) -- The new Israeli liner "Theodor Herzl," built under the Israel-German reparations agreement and launched here yesterday, was sent to drydock today for completion of her interior fittings. The vessel will not be turned over to Israel until February. Meanwhile, all decorating is under the direction of Israeli interior decorators who plan to make liberal use of Israeli art works.

Five thousand persons were present at the launching yesterday to cheer as the 9,000-ton liner, the first major passenger vessel built in Germany in the last 15 years, slid down the ways. Several thousand shipyard workers took time off to watch the ceremonies and hundreds of Hamburg schoolchildren, accompanied by their teachers, came down to view the Israeli ship. Also present were officers of Zim-Shoham Lines, for whom the "Theodor Herzl" was built, and Israeli and German diplomats. German press, radio and television covered the event.

The star of the ceremony was Mrs. F. E. Shinnar, wife of the head of Israeli purchasing mission in Germany, who broke a bottle of Israeli champagne across the bow. Dr. Shinnar, in a brief address, spoke of the vessel as a symbol of Israel's peaceful intentions and desire for an amicable settlement with its neighbors. At a post-launching reception, Mrs. Shinnar was presented with a sum of money to be used for welfare purposes in Israel instead of the customary gift for her.

GERMAN COURT SEEKS TESTIMONY FROM JEWISH WOMEN STERILIZED BY NAZIS

TEL AVIV, Oct. 2. (JTA) -- At the behest of a West German court, the Tel Aviv district court today took testimony from several Jewish women now living in Israel who were sterilized in Nazi concentration camps. The testimony will be used in the trial of Karl Clausberg, Nazi physician, who experimented on Jewish camp inmates on methods of inducing sterility.

The women, and a Jewish physician who had once been employed as a prisoner-doctor in the Auschwitz concentration camp, described the injection treatment which sterilized the women and left them in continuous pain. The court today appealed to more former inmates of notorious "block ten," where sterilization guinea pigs were kept, to come forward and testify. The witnesses today were shipped to the death camp from Greece and Belgium.

"DIARY OF ANNE FRANK" OPENS IN SIX GERMAN THEATRES TO OVATIONS

BERLIN, Oct. 2. (JTA) -- The Diary of Anne Frank, stage dramatization of the autobiographical war-time notes jotted down in her cramped and clandestine Dutch hiding place by an adolescent Jewish girl from Germany who was later seized by the Nazi Gestapo and murdered in the Bergen-Belsen concentration camp, opened last night in five West German theaters, as well as in Dresden, East Germany.

First-night audiences everywhere gave rousing ovations to the casts, but the degree of acceptance by a larger public in Germany remains to be seen, particularly in the light of widespread reluctance to be reminded of the events connected with the Jewish persecution by the Nazis. The German edition of the Anne Frank book has had a negligible sale, and attempts to introduce it into the schools have, as a rule, been rebuffed.

In the West Berlin Schlosspark Theatre, where Johanna von Koczian performed the part of Anne Frank, the play was produced by Boleslaw Barlog, director of all municipal theatres here. In Duesseldorf, Luitgard Im portrayed Anne Frank under the direction of Karl-Heinz Stroux, while the male lead role of Peter was played by Tom Braut, a German who not long ago studied acting in America. Premieres were also held last night in Hamburg, Karlsruhe and Constance.

"The Diary of Anne Frank" is scheduled for performances, later in the season, in Munich, Frankfurt, Stuttgart, Nuremberg, Augsburg, Hildesheim, Mayence and Aachen. Next year, it will be presented in East Berlin.

JEWSH CONCERTS GIVEN FOR FIRST TIME IN SIBERIA; JEWS CROWD HALLS

LONDON, Oct. 2. (JTA) -- Jewish concerts have met with great success in a number of cities in Siberia and in the Urals, according to a report from the Soviet Union published in the Warsaw Yiddish newspaper "Folkshtimme" which was received here today. This is the first time that Jewish concerts were given in that part of the Soviet Union.

The report says that Jewish workers and students filled the concert halls to capacity in the cities of Irkutsk, Sverdlovsk, Omsk, Ufa, Cheliabinsk in their hunger for Jewish music and Yiddish songs. In Sverdlovsk two concerts were given at the local philharmonic orchestra hall and tickets were all sold out.

PRESIDENT OF FRANCE TO UNVEIL MEMORIAL FOR JEWISH MARTYRS

PARIS, Oct. 2. (JTA) -- President Rene Coty of France today informed the Committee for the Erection of a Memorial for the Unknown Jewish Martyrs that he will preside over a ceremony unveiling the memorial on October 30 and in which Jewish delegations from many countries--including countries behind the Iron Curtain--will participate.

The ceremonies marking the unveiling of the memorial will last four days, and will include a dinner in honor of Dr. Nahum Goldmann who, as president of the Conference on Jewish Material Claims Against Germany, helped to secure funds for the erection of the memorial building. A section will be a museum devoted to material dealing with the annihilation of 6,000,000 Jews by the Nazis. The Israel Embassy in Paris will tender a reception in honor of the delegates.

Isaac Schneersohn, president of the World Committee for the Erection of a Memorial for the Unknown Jewish Martyrs, today announced that among other countries where the Jewish communities will send delegations to participate in the ceremonies here, will be a four-man delegation from Poland, a four-man delegation from Rumania, and a three-man group from Czechoslovakia.

There will also be delegations from Bulgaria, Hungary and Yugoslavia. Delegates have already been designated by the Jewish communities in these countries, Mr. Schneersohn said. This is the first time that Jewish communities in countries behind the Iron Curtain are all sending delegations to an international Jewish ceremony abroad.

In addition, the unveiling ceremony will be attended by diplomatic representatives from many countries, including the United States, and by high officials of the French Government. The Conference on Jewish Material Claims Against Germany has contributed \$300,000 towards the project. Contributions were also made by Jewish communities in various countries.

BIOGRAPHIES OF 4,000 JEWISH SCIENTISTS PUBLISHED IN UNITED STATES

NEW YORK, Oct. 2. (JTA) -- Brief biographies of about 4,000 Jewish scientists from more than 70 countries are contained in "Jews in the World of Science," a biographical dictionary which made its appearance here today. The volume is published by Monte Publishers and is dedicated to the memory of Prof. Albert Einstein to whom tribute is paid in an essay by Dr. J. Robert Oppenheimer, noted physicist.

The volume is co-edited by Dr. Harry Cohen, and Dr. Itzhak J. Carmin. Among the group of special articles, Dr. Cohen offers a comprehensive account of the achievement of top Jewish scientists in physics, medicine and social sciences. Meyer W. Weisgal, chairman of the Weizmann Institute of Science in Israel presents an account of the contributions of Israel's first president, the late scientist-statesman, Dr. Chaim Weizmann. The work of Dr. Jonas E. Salk is the subject of an article by Prof. Louis Gershenfeld of the Philadelphia College of Pharmacy and Science.

FIRST EXHIBITION OF MODERN ISRAELI PAINTINGS OPENED IN URUGUAY

MONTEVIDEO, Uruguay, Oct. 2. (JTA) -- The first exhibition of modern Israeli paintings here was opened at the National Gallery of Fine Arts in a ceremony attended by Israeli representatives, Uruguayan government officials, diplomatic representatives and local artists. The exhibition, which includes the work of 14 Israeli artists, is sponsored jointly by the Israel and Uruguayan governments. In all, 107 paintings are on view.

The opening ceremony heard addresses by Israel Minister M. Hinde, the Rector of the University here, Leopoldo Agorio, and Julio Caporale Scelta, representing the Uruguayan Ministry of Education. The opening exercises were broadcast by the official government radio system and the Uruguayan press gave it wide and favorable coverage. The ceremony was followed by a guided tour arranged by all local Jewish organizations.

SO. AFRICA ABOLISHES TOURIST VISAS FOR ISRAELIS; RECIPROCITY REACHED

JERUSALEM, Oct. 2. (JTA) -- As of today Israelis and South Africans visiting each other's country or stopping off in transit elsewhere will not be required to obtain visas. The agreement to abolish visas between the two states was negotiated in August.

YOUTH ALIYAH SENDS CLOTHING TO VICTIMS OF BELGIAN MINE DISASTER

BRUSSELS, Oct. 2. (JTA) -- The Youth Aliyah, Jewish child rescue movement, will send clothing and food to the families of 300 Belgian miners killed in the recent mine disaster. Moshe Kol, director of the Youth Aliyah, announced this gesture of sympathy with the families of the victims just before he left Belgium today.

HERZ AKZIN, JEWISH AUTHOR, DEAD; EDITED MAGAZINE OF JEWISH HUMOR

LONDON, Oct. 2. (JTA) -- Herz Akzin, Jewish short story writer, who was also publisher of a Jewish humor magazine "Ashm edai" in 1922, died in Riga, capital of Latvia, last month, it is reported in the Warsaw Jewish newspaper "Folkshtimme" which reached here today. He was 67 years old.
