ISRAEL FOREIGN MINISTER ARRIVES IN U.S. TODAY WITH PLAN FOR U.N.

JERUSALEM, Nov. 13. (JTA) -- Israel's Foreign Minister, Mrs. Golda Meir, left Israel today for the United States where, according to newspaper reports, she will present to the United Nations General Assembly an overall plan for solving Arab-Israel issues. Mrs. Meir, who will arrive in New York tomorrow, was seen off at the airport by United States Ambassador Edward B. Lawson, French Ambassador Pierre Gilbert and other diplomats.

Meanwhile, Israel was consolidating its position in the Gaza Strip and in the port of Elath which, as a result of the Sinai campaign, has been opened to traffic from the Red Sea. The first train from Israel territory to Gaza was scheduled to arrive today. Railroad gangs, augmented by local Arabs hired for this job, have been working around the clock to replace several miles of railroad-track torn up after the war of 1948 when the Egyptians took over the strip. When this is completed the line will run down the coast from Haifa to El Arish.

Zim Navigation Company, Israel's largest maritime corporation, announced today its decision to open an office in Elath. Zvi Herman, company representative, announced that a special staff will shortly proceed to the port city to set up the branch office. He revealed that during the recent emergency, Israeli shipping maintained its full schedules for cargo and passenger service, although foreign ships cancelled their calls in Israel.

The day's peaceful developments were marred today when a border policeman was killed and four others wounded when they raced to the protection of a tractor driver attacked by fedayeen near Gonen, in Upper Galilee. The car in which they were struck and detonated a landmine. Other fedayeen attacks resulted in the blasting of water lines and pumps, but no casualties were reported.

At El Arish, Sinai crossroads village, the local Arab inhabitants today appealed to the Israeli authorities not to withdraw. They fear that the Arab refugees in the area will riot, loot and massacre local inhabitants. Israeli authorities have brought in food for all the people in the area and set up an emergency clinic to provide medical service. Doctors and other professionals fled with the retreating Egyptian army.

Syrian Army units were seen today patrolling the walls of the Old City, in Jordan-held Jerusalem. The bulk of the Syrian troops which have poured into Jordan in the last two weeks are garrisoned at Nablus.

ZIONISTS WARN AGAINST IMPOSED SOLUTION OF MIDDLE EAST PROBLEM

NEW YORK, Nov. 13. (JTA) -- Top leaders of the world Zionist movement issued tonight a grim warning against the perils of a United Nations imposed solution which would restore conditions as they existed before the present Middle East crisis. They characterized such a solution as a UN "Munich" which, they said, would leave the way open for the seizure of the Middle East by Soviet military power. The warning was coupled with an appeal to the United States to press for direct peace negotiations between Israel and Egypt.

The Zionist leader's spoke at an emergency meeting held at Hunter College Auditorium under the auspices of the Zionist Organization of America. Speakers were Dr. Nahum Goldmann, president of the Jewish Agency; Avraham Harman, member of the Jewish Agency executive; Rabbi Irving Miller, chairman of the American Zionist Council, and Dr. Emanuel Neumann, president of the Zionist Organization of America. Another speaker was James G. McDonald, first U.S. Ambassador to Israel.

Dr. Goldmann, in his address, said that while Israel's security situation has improved appreciably as a result of the destruction of a large portion of Egypt's fighting power, "the political situation which has led to the military action of the past few weeks remains unresolved, plagued by uncertainty and pregnant with peril."

The world Zionist president further maintained that "the disunity of the Western world and the unity of the pro-Arab bloc create an untenable situation for Israel." He pointed out that "the danger is as great today, as it had been before Operation Sinai, that Israel

might find herself politically isolated, confronted by a UN-imposed solution fashioned by the pressures of the Soviet bloc and the majority of the Arab-Asian bloc."

He cited the following formidable dangers in the present situation confronting the peace in the Middle East. "First, there is the danger that, the present maneuvers on the diplomatic front will resolve themselves not in a permanent peace, but in some tenuous status quo ante-situation with all its insufferable perils. Secondly, there is the danger, already referred to, of a UN-imposed pro-Arab settlement in the event of an Arab refusal to enter into direct negotiations with Israel."

U.S. Stand Will Be the Decisive Factor, Dr. Goldmann Says

Emphasizing that "the decisive factor will be the position of the United States of America," Dr. Goldmann charged that "it is unfortunate that on all essential questions of a definitive settlement between Israel and the Arab states, American policy is lacking in clarity and consistency and firmness." He maintained that "this situation invites the Soviet bloc and Asian-African friends of the Arabs to jockey for position and move into the vacuum created by American vacillation." He stressed the need for the millions of American friends of Israel, both Jews and non-Jews, to comprehend this danger and to "bend all their efforts to prevent the success of pro-Arab strategems in the United Nations."

"America has never had," Dr. Goldmann continued, "a greater opportunity to demonstrate its maturity and its title to world leadership. The decisive front is no longer the Sinai desert or the Gaza Strip, or the councils of the Arab rulers. The decisive front is in Washington, Moscow and New Delhi. The latter has shown little of the moral courage to which it lays claim. Moscow has clearly demonstrated its disruptive intent. Hope lies with Washington, and those who shape our country's policy must be made aware that Israel has the moral and articulate support of friends the world over who entertain confidence in America's sense of equity."

Dr. Goldmann warned that "unless these friends, especially in the United States, speak out forcefully and unambiguously with the voice of conscience and the vigor of moral conviction, the present crisis will linger on for years to come and the entire world will stumble in the twilight of an eruptive armed armistice." He further said that "only the Soviet bloc can benefit, today and tomorrow, as indeed it has always done, from Western vacillation and Middle Eastern chaos. I sincerely believe that those who argue for a peace through direct negotiations are working for the best interests of all peoples of the Middle East and the welfare of free nations," Dr. Goldmann stated.

U.S. Unwittingly Played into Soviet Hands, Dr. Neumann Says

Dr. Emanuel Neumann told the audience that the United States has "unwittingly played into the hands of the Soviet strategists." He said: "We failed to stop the Soviet penetration and military build-up in the Middle East in its incipient stages. We did not act to prevent the vast shipments of Soviet arms in the complacent belief that only Israel was thereby threatened. Both the Soviets and Nasser, their willing tool and confederate, were emboldened by our acquiescence. They were further emboldened when Nasser, with Russian encouragement, grabbed the Suez Canal."

Dr. Neumann further asserted that the "next step in the Moscow-Cairo timetable was a concerted attack to be launched against Israel by Egypt, Syria and Jordan, with the help of Soviet arms and technicians; and the fall of Israel was to serve, in turn, as a prelude for further stages in the totalitarian conspiracy against the free world." He referred to the revelations that have come from London and Paris "of the fantastic quantities of arms valued at hundreds of millions of dollars which the Soviets have poured into Egypt and other Arab states; and the contingent of Russian experts and technicians--over 1,00 in number--already on the spot."

Rabbi Miller said that to "achieve" real peace in the Middle East the United Nations and especially the United States and the other NATO powers must strive without delay to achieve: 1. A peace agreement negotiated directly between Egypt and Israel; 2. The end of the economic boycott of Israel by the Arab states; 3. Free passage of ships flying the Israeli flag through the Suez Canal and the Gulf of Akaba; 4. Rectification of Israel's frontiers with the neighboring Arab states which would consider Israel's need for a strategic defense line; 5. A Western guarantee of Israel's frontiers."

The speaker further stressed that the knowledge that "an attack on Israel, whether by Russia or the Arabs, will mean a conflict with the NATO powers is the only thing that will deter Soviet aggression in the Middle East and turn Nasser's pan-Arabism back from its hysteria of anti-Israeli incitement to ways of peaceful progress and development."

STATE DEPARTMENT GETS ISRAEL'S VIEWPOINT ON CURRENT SITUATION

WASHINGTON, Nov. 13. (JTA) -- Israel Minister Reuven Shiloah today made known Israel's viewpoints on the current situation and on United Nations issues at a meeting with Robert D. Murphy, Acting Under Secretary of State. Mr. Shiloah described the talk as including a general review of the situation in the Middle East and matters at the United Nations.

U. S. ASKED TO INTERVENE AGAINST MASS DEPORTATION OF JEWS IN RUSSIA

NEW YORK, Nov. 13. (JTA) -- Acting Secretary of State Herbert C. Hoover, Jr. was urged by the American Jewish Committee today to take "immediate and effective action towards halting the current mass deportation of Jews from the Russian-Polish border to exile and imprisonment in concentration camps in Siberia."

At the same time, the Committee asked that the United States government vigorously condemn "this new act of inhumanity" before the current session of the United Nations General Assembly. In its statement, the Committee called for a two-fold approach through parallel actions which included representation by the State Department to the Soviet government and United States action in the United Nations. The appeal came in the form of a letter signed by Irving M. Engel, president of the Committee. It urged the State Department to:

1. Make representations to the Soviet government through our Ambassador in Moscow that deportation of inhabitants of the border territories annexed to Poland and Lithuania cease forthwith;

2. Make representations to the Soviet government urging that all persons and families already deported from these areas be immediately returned and re-established in their former homes and occupations;

3. Alert American diplomatic missions and consular offices in Eastern European countries, particularly in Hungary, to the danger of forced removals of population, including Jews, to concentration camps or to exile with a view to taking every possible preventative measure. Attention should be paid also to the forced separation of families.

The Committee's statement pinpointed the areas of deportation as being in the now Soviet areas of Lvov (Lemberg) and Vilna which were annexed during World War II by the Soviet Union. It linked the deportations to the "Soviet concentration of military forces along the Polish-Soviet border, aiming at the intimidation or suppression of Poland's quest for freedom."

J. L. C. Seeks United Nations Action on Soviet Deportation of Jews

NEW YORK, Nov. 13. (JTA) -- A delegation of the Jewish Labor Committee today presented United States Ambassador Henry Cabot Lodge, chief of the American delegation to the United Nations, with a memorandum urging that the United States Government "without delay" bring the matter of the deportation of Jews from Polish and Lithuanian territories annexed by Soviet Russia after World War II, before the United Nations General Assembly.

Simultaneously, Adolph Held, national chairman of the Jewish Labor Committee, today wired President Eisenhower urging that "imperative United States action in the United Nations be taken" to aid those who have been deported or have been marked for deportation to Siberia by the Soviet Union. Mr. Held said that "this is a matter of immediate urgency."

The memorandum to Mr. Lodge said "it is incumbent upon the Government of the United States to immediately bring before the United Nations without delay the following actions:

"1. A resolution ordering the Soviet Union to cease and desist from any further deportations of Jews and other nationals from the above mentioned territories annexed by the Soviet Union after World War II and to permit those now deported to return to their homes. 2. Send UN observers to ascertain the intensity of the deportations and to report back to the General Assembly."

The JLC memorandum stated that "compounding their brutality in repressing the revolt for freedom of the Hungarian peoples, the Soviets have simultaneously renewed mass deportations begun by Stalin after World War II. Hundreds of thousands of Jews perished in the same Siberian outposts to which Jews are now being sent. The future of those being deported is either suicide before deportation or death after in the cold darkness of Siberia."

"The conscience of the free world can no longer tolerate, remain mute, or condone by inaction, either mass murders or mass deportations perpetrated by governments," the JLC said.

GERMAN STATE VOTES ADDITIONAL \$2,100,000 FOR NAZI VICTIMS

WIESBADEN, Nov. 13. (JTA) -- Chiefly to provide for Nazi victims from Germany who emigrated during the Nazi epoch and now return for permanent settlement to this country, the budget committee of the Hesse legislature has voted to make available \$2,100,000 above the appropriation originally established for the current fiscal year. Such "returnees" are entitled to certain payments under the Amendment to the Federal Indemnification Law enacted in June.

1,500 IMMIGRANTS ARRIVE IN ISRAEL; SENT TO NEW SETTLEMENTS

TEL AVIV, Nov. 13. (JTA) -- Nearly 1,500 immigrants arrived in Israel during the last few days. They were taken to new settlements in various parts of the country.

5,000 ATTEND NEW YORK LABOR RALLY SUPPORTING ISRAEL; WARN RUSSIA

NEW YORK, Nov. 13. (JTA) -- Support for Israel in her "hour of triumph and peril" and a warning that a Soviet attack on the Jewish State could precipitate World War III were voiced in a resolution adopted by 5,000 persons attending a mass meeting here last night. The meeting was arranged by the Labor Zionist Assembly and the American Trade Union Council for Histadrut in Israel.

Declaring that Egyptian Dictator Gamal Abdel Nasser is a tool in the hands of Soviet rulers, the resolution added that the attacks on Israel are "merely a first step on the road to Communist domination in the Middle East." The statement expressed regret that "in the face of threatened Soviet military intervention, the Government of the United States is not giving the State of Israel the support it has a right to expect. On the contrary, our Administration is still entertaining false hopes of placating the Arab dictators by further concessions at the expense of Israel."

"We salute the people of the State of Israel and pledge them unstinting support in their struggle to preserve the Jewish national homeland, established after millennia of untold Jewish sacrifices," the resolution continued. "We urge the Jews of the United States to close ranks, muster their full strength, and marshal all their resources to assist Israel in the struggle for survival. We call upon liberty-loving people everywhere to come to the aid of the democratic State of Israel."

The meeting also heard addresses by Avraham Harman, member of the Jewish Agency executive; Berl Locker, member of the Knesset, and Louis Segal, general secretary of the Farband. Mr. Harman declared that "Israel and the Jewish people will not permit any new Auschwitzes and Treblinkas." Mr. Locker reiterated Israel's desire for peace with her neighbors. Mr. Segal, who chaired the meeting, paid tribute to Israel's Army and reiterated that the latest events had demonstrated that Communism is--as it has always been--a danger to all mankind.

B'NAI B'RITH CONVENTION ADVANCES PROPOSALS ON ARAB-ISRAEL PEACE

WASHINGTON, Nov. 13. (JTA) -- B'nai B'rith's 113th annual meeting last night endorsed five proposals directed at stabilizing peace between Israel and the Arab states. The group called upon the United Nations to do the following:

1. To halt the fedayeen raids and guerrilla warfare practiced against Israel;
2. To insure secure boundaries for all nations in the Middle East;
3. To insure free passage for ships of all nations, including Israel, through the Suez Canal;
4. To promote a cooperative plan for improving the economic and social conditions of Middle East countries;
5. To assure "clement and intelligent" handling of the Arab refugee problem.

CHIEF JUSTICE WARREN RECEIVES FIRST LOUIS D. BRANDEIS GOLD MEDAL

WALTHAM, Mass., Nov. 13. (JTA) -- Chief Justice Earl Warren of the United States Supreme Court has received the first of 20 gold medals struck for Brandeis University by the United States Mint, the university has announced. The medal, commemorating the centennial of the birth of the late Supreme Court Justice Louis D. Brandeis, will also be struck in bronze in a run of 3,000 for distribution to faculty, alumni and friends of the university as mementos of the centennial celebrations.

(In Albany, Gov. Harriman today saluted the late Justice Brandeis, who was an associate justice for 23 years on the United States Supreme Court. The Governor fixed today as Brandeis Centennial Day in New York State.)

LIPSKY NAMED HONORARY FELLOW BY WEIZMANN INSTITUTE OF SCIENCE

TEL AVIV, Nov. 13. (JTA) -- Louis Lipsky was honored at the Weizmann Institute of Science at Rehovoth today for his contributions to the institution which five years ago established exchange fellowships in his name. Mr. Lipsky was named an honorary fellow of the Weizmann Institute, the 14th to be so named in its history. The American Zionist veteran then delivered the annual Weizmann Memorial Lecture, speaking on "Theodore Herzl, Chaim Weizmann and the Jewish State."

Mr. Lipsky's 80th birthday was marked here yesterday at a reception given in his honor by the Histadrut executive. Speaker of the Knesset Joseph Sprinzak and Isaac Hamlin, American Labor Zionist leader who now lives in Israel, joined in tributes to Mr. Lipsky and his contributions to American and world Zionism.

HADASSAH RECEIVES AWARD FOR WORK IN FIELD OF ADULT EDUCATION

NEW YORK, Nov. 13. (JTA) -- The School of Education of Long Island University conferred a special award on Hadassah this week for the organization's work in the field of adult education. The award was accepted by Dr. Miriam Freund, Hadassah president.

Presentation of the award was made at a reception given by the Hadassah to seven Jewish historians who collaborated in the five-year Hadassah project to study "the basic ideas, ideals and values of the Jewish historical experience and their relevance to contemporary life in the United States." Results of their survey were published by Random House under the title, "Great Ages and Ideas of the Jewish People."
