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MOSCOW SENDS NEW WARNING TO ISRAEL; DEMANDS COMPENSATION FOR EGYPT

LONDON, Nov. 15. (JTA). -- A strongly worded warning was addressed to Israel Premier David Ben Gurion today by Soviet Premier Nikolai Bulganin, the Moscow radio reported.

Premier Bulganin warned of a danger that Israel's action against Egypt would ultimately threaten the existence of the Jewish State. He said Egypt was entitled to compensation for Israel's Sinai action and that Israel troops must be immediately withdrawn.

(In Jerusalem, the Israel Cabinet met in extraordinary session today to hear Premier Ben Gurion report on political and security developments. The Cabinet approved emergency regulations enabling the government to increase the work day and eliminate the weekly day of rest for workers during the present emergency.)

U. N. GETS DOCUMENTS REVEALING EGYPTIAN INTENTIONS TO ATTACK ISRAEL

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y., Nov. 15. (JTA). -- Israel proved to the United Nations today, through captured top secret Egyptian army documents, that massive concentrations of troops and materiel in the Sinai Peninsula had been organized for the purpose of annihilating the Jewish State and not for defense.

Ambassador Abba Eban, chairman of Israel's delegation here, today sent copies of the captured Egyptian documents to the president of the Security Council, with a request that the copies be circulated among all members of the United Nations. Dag Hammarskjold, Secretary General, who has been given prime responsibility as the UN negotiator regarding the Middle East crisis, will also receive copies of these documents.

The documents show that not only had Egypt prepared vast armaments at its bases, intended for Israel's annihilation, but that the supplies of clothing, personal effects, and other such materiel were much larger than could possibly have been used by Egypt's Sinai forces which numbered, at most, about 40,000 men. One item cited by Mr. Eban was blankets--of which 1,000,000 were captured by the victorious Israeli army as it swept through the Egyptian bases. "Certainly, these men could not have used a million blankets," Mr. Eban pointed out. "There were enough supplies there to equip an army much larger, a force that could be rapidly expanded."

The documents consisted of photostatic copies in the original Arabic, plus English translations. Originating with the Egyptian "Headquarters of the Military Area of Palestine," marked "Operational," the documents bore the inscription "Top Secret." Copies of the orders were sent to an Egyptian infantry division in Gaza and to a brigade commander; the orders were that the directives be passed along to all officers above certain ranks. However, officers were warned not to transmit the orders in writing "to a formation lower than battalion."

An introduction to the orders stated: "Every commander is to prepare himself for the inevitable campaign with Israel for the purpose of fulfilling our exalted aim which is the annihilation of Israel and her destruction in the shortest possible time in the most brutal and cruel battles." A closing clause in the orders warned "our aim is always: the destruction of Israel. Remember it, work for its fulfillment."

At a crowded press conference in which he made the documents public, Mr. Eban declared that the interpretations furnished with the original Arabic documents are, in part, "expurgated." The original language is much sharper than indicated in the English version.

"The mass of equipment, the quantities, distribution and intensity," said Mr. Eban, "surprised even ourselves. The equipment was the most modern in the hands of the great military powers. Its dimensions and categories were formidable." The Israel Ambassador refused, however, to name any of the "great military powers." Correspondents who tried to identify one of these powers as the Soviet Union were told by the Israeli that they were entitled "to make your own guesses."

The documents, said Mr. Eban, show not only the "historic and moral responsibility" for what happened in the area, but point also to what would have happened if Israel had not destroyed the Egyptian bases.

ISRAEL'S FOREIGN MINISTER CONFERS WITH DIPLOMATS AT UNITED NATIONS

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y., Nov. 15. (JTA) -- Mrs. Golda Meir, Foreign Minister of Israel, started a round of conversations today with other foreign ministers and various delegations here. This morning Mrs. Meir saw Christian Pineau, Foreign Minister of France, and later conferred with Lester B. Pearson, Canada's Minister for External Affairs. Mr. Pearson is the author of the General Assembly resolution which established the UN international police force.

Meanwhile, the spokesman for the French Foreign Ministry told correspondents here that Israel's attack on Egypt was preceded by a "tremendous threat to try to wipe Israel off the map." He said that "among the \$50,000,000 worth of weapons captured by Israel there were some that were so deadly that experts still wonder what they could have been intended for. We are very much concerned as to what can happen there. It is fortunate that those unusual weapons are now in the hands of the Israelis."

The French spokesman said that his government was greatly concerned about the threat of "volunteers" coming into the Middle East and hoped that the United Nations would find a way of halting the flow of "volunteers" into the Middle East. In answer to a question about the French Government's viewpoint regarding Israel's promise to withdraw its troops from Egyptian territory, the spokesman said that in the view of Paris there is no implication that Israel should withdraw its troops from the Gaza strip.

BRITISH ENVOY URGES NEGOTIATED ARAB-ISRAEL PEACE SETTLEMENT

WASHINGTON, Nov. 15. (JTA) -- British Ambassador Harold Caccia today called for a negotiated peace settlement between Israel and Egypt which both sides could accept because it would give them justice. He said one could not have a true compromise in which both sides were fully satisfied. He thought neither side would be fully satisfied, but that such a settlement as he envisaged would be for their own good. He spoke at the National Press Club here.

A charge was made by Mr. Caccia that Egyptian President Nasser has put himself into the position of being "a tool of Russia." He said Russia had supplied President Nasser with arms "at a time when President Nasser was openly proclaiming his policy for the ultimate destruction of the State of Israel and his ambition to establish an empire stretching from the Atlantic to the Persian Gulf."

U. S. JEWISH LEADERS TO HOLD TWO-DAY CONFERENCE ON MIDDLE EAST CRISIS

NEW YORK, Nov. 15. (JTA) -- An extraordinary conference convened by presidents of major American Jewish organizations will be held Nov. 26 through Nov. 27 in New York City, attended by delegates from most states in the union, it was announced here today.

The conference, which will take place at the Delmonico Hotel, has been called to consider the present crisis in the Middle East as it affects world peace, American interests and the security of Israel and to express the profound concern of American Jewry, both as Americans and Jews, "in this hour when the fate of Israel and the United States are so obviously inseparable."

ASSEMBLY OF JEWISH FEDERATIONS HEARS REPORT ON HUNGARIAN JEWS

TORONTO, Nov. 15. (JTA) -- The General Assembly of the Council of Jewish Federations and Welfare Funds opened its four-day session here tonight in the presence of 750 Jewish communal leaders from all parts of the United States and Canada. The session will discuss local, Middle East and world Jewish affairs.

At the opening session tonight Moses A. Leavitt, executive vice president of the JDC, reported here that more than 700 Jews have arrived in Vienna from Hungary and have to be cared for. Gustav Saron, executive secretary of the Jewish Board of Deputies of South Africa, described the development of Jewish communal life in his country. Although there are many indications that the South African Jewish community is ready to establish overall community services, there is a lack of trained leadership, he reported.

MORE JEWS FLEE FROM HUNGARY TO VIENNA; FUGITIVES INCLUDE RABBIS

VIENNA, Nov. 15. (JTA) -- Another 108 Jews from Hungary arrived here today, bringing the total number of Hungarian Jewish refugees registered with the Jewish Community of this city to 360. Most of the new arrivals are from the Hungarian towns of Cserna and Kapuvar and included among them are the Rabbi of Cserna, Arthur Kaufmann, and the Rabbi of Kapuvar, Jandos Loewenstein.

The latest group of fugitives had managed to get hold of a tractor as they fled, which enabled them to bring some of their belongings with them. The Jewish Community here provided overnight accommodations for them in hotels, and will now transfer them to the new Talmud Torah.

Meanwhile, two Jewish truck drivers formerly employed by the Hungarian Red Cross, told newsmen here that the Russians had opened fire on a convoy of Red Cross trucks, killing all the persons in the first three trucks of the convoy.

While it is still impossible to estimate the exact number of Hungarian Jewish refugees in Austria, since they are registered in various places, it is thought that at least another 500 who came over the border are now transferring from one government camp to another. It is generally believed that the number of those in this floating camp population is greater than the number registered with the Viennese Jewish Community.

Since the Austrian Government is unable to accommodate all the refugees now in this country, the Jewish Community here is making arrangements to accommodate them in various homes. It is known that 40 Hungarian Jews are still in the Traiskirchen Camp, while another group, whose number is not known exactly, is on its way to Salzburg.

(In New York, the Joint Distribution Committee announced today a contribution of 20,000 Swiss francs to the International Red Cross to be used for Hungarian refugees of all faiths. Moses A. Leavitt, executive vice president of the JDC, also revealed that the agency would provide the Red Cross with kosher food for those Jewish refugees who require it. The JDC is already providing, directly and through subsidies to the Jewish Community of Vienna, food, clothing, housing and special care for Jews who cross into Austria from Hungary, Mr. Leavitt said.)

GOVERNOR OF CASABLANCA REAFFIRMS FRIENDSHIP FOR MOROCCAN JEWRY

CASABLANCA, Nov. 15. (JTA) -- Si Ahmed Bargach, Governor of the city of Casablanca, reaffirmed today his feelings of friendship toward the Moroccan Jews and underlined his belief that they were part of the general Moroccan population, sharing both its joys and its sorrows.

The occasion for his statement was a visit from a delegation of the Committee of the Jewish Community, whose members told the governor that Moroccan Jewry was behind Sultan Mohammed V in his condemnation of the British-French-Israeli "aggression of which Egypt was the victim." The delegation asked that the circumstances of the Egyptian action "should never be allowed to interfere with the good relations which have always prevailed between Moslem and Jew in Morocco, nor should it affect their attachment to His Majesty."

Meanwhile, the Casablanca committee of the Joint Jewish-Moslem Association--El Wifah--issued a statement censuring the "aggression carried out by British, Israeli and French Governments against the Egyptian nation." This "desperate endeavor by imperialist countries cannot but reinforce the determination of Moroccans, as well as all men of goodwill throughout the world, to support the struggle against colonialism." At the same time, the committee called on "Moroccans of all faiths to remember it is their duty to remain united as brothers" and to avoid provocation.

NO EVIDENCE OF ANTI-SEMITISM SEEN IN U.S., JEWISH EXPERT REPORTS

KIAMESHA LAKE, N.Y., Nov. 15. (JTA) -- There is no evidence of "any appreciable growth of anti-Semitism" in the United States, it was reported at the four-day convention of the National Women's League of the United Synagogue of America which concluded here last night. About 1,500 delegates representing 170,000 members of the sisterhoods of the Conservative synagogues attended the parley.

Addressing the convention, Jules Cohn, coordinator of the National Community Relations Advisory Council, said: "The general climate appears to be as hostile to anti-Semitic vandalism, violence and defamation, as it has been for the past several years." This was "despite the emergence of anti-Semitism as an element in the southern white citizens councils, and despite an increase in Arab propaganda" in the United States "designed to provoke divisiveness and religious hostility among Americans."

The convention decided to undertake a \$500,000 project to build a dormitory for women students at the Teachers Institute of the Jewish Theological Seminary of America. League president, Mrs. Louis Sussman, told the delegates that, "because of the need for qualified Hebrew teachers, and the anticipated enrollment of women students from all parts of the United States and Canada, this dormitory building is a necessity. She asked the organization's members to raise the necessary funds within three years."

CANADA TO ADMIT 777 JEWS FROM NORTH AFRICA, OFFICIALS ANNOUNCE

MONTREAL, Nov. 15. (JTA) -- Canadian immigration officials announced today that 316 North African Jewish families, totalling 777 persons, will be admitted to this country under a special immigration program requested by the Canadian Jewish Congress.

The Congress, which originally asked that 800 families be admitted, has undertaken to assist immigrant families for two years, if necessary. The first 50 families are expected to arrive in Canada early in 1957.

OSE DECIDES TO RESUME ITS WORK IN ISRAEL; WILL CONDUCT FUND-RAISING

PARIS, Nov. 15. (JTA) -- The executive committee of the World OSE Union meeting here this week decided to do everything possible within its means to re-open OSE institutions in Israel, in agreement and with the assistance of the Ministries of Health and Social Welfare, it was announced here today. The executive also entrusted its chairman with the formation of a Friends of the World OSE movement in Paris to strengthen the social character of the organization as a whole and to form a committee for fund-raising and education.

The announcement said that the executive had received cables from the Mayor of Haifa, the Israel Minister of Social Welfare and the chairman of the Knesset Committee for Social Service requesting the OSE Union not to close up its institutions in Israel under any circumstances and thus avoid inflicting hardships on children, parents and community.

The executive expressed its "great disappointment" at the Joint Distribution Committee's decision not to provide financial assistance to OSE institutions in Israel and declared that "this was contrary to the agreement signed by the two organizations." The view was expressed that the abandonment of OSE work in Israel "would result in the risking of the very existence of the OSE Union as a world organization." The executive passed a unanimous vote of confidence in its chairman Abel Shaban.

U. S. STUDENTS IN ISRAEL PREFER TO STAY THERE, DR. CHURGIN REPORTS

NEW YORK/ Nov. 15. (JTA) -- "Hundreds of American youths in Israel are resolutely continuing their scientific, cultural and religious studies confident that the forces of freedom will not let Israel down," Dr. Pinkhos Churgin, president of Bar-Ilan University in Israel reported today. "Far from being anxious to return home, they consider themselves extremely fortunate to be in the Jewish homeland in its hour of great trial."

Dr. Churgin, who arrived in the United States last night to help launch the 1956-57 campaign of the American Committee for Bar-Ilan University, brought with him personal messages from the 15 American students currently enrolled in freshman classes at Bar-Ilan University. Although the Israeli mobilization drafted several members of the faculty and administration and many of the Israeli students, Dr. Churgin said that all classes have been continued and the college routine is proceeding as near to normal as possible.

ARGENTINE ZIONISTS APPROVE INDIVIDUAL MEMBERSHIP IN FEDERATION

BUENOS AIRES, Nov. 15. (JTA) -- The principle of individual affiliation with the proposed Argentine-Zionist Federation was unanimously approved here today at a two-day session of the Argentine Zionist Assembly. The assembly, composed of delegates of all Zionist groups in the country, was convened by the Zionist Central Council to act on a resolution adopted by the 24th World Zionist Congress last Spring to establish such territorial federations.

The meeting today also adopted an ideological program which calls for: immigration to Israel; pioneering in Israel; unconditional support of the Jewish State, and the establishment of a program of national education and culture. Some 160 delegates from various parts of the country attended the sessions.

MAURICE SAMUEL RECEIVES 1955 STEPHEN S. WISE AWARD

NEW YORK, Nov. 15. (JTA) -- The 1955 Stephen Wise Award of the American Jewish Congress was presented yesterday to Maurice Samuel, author and lecturer, at a reception at Stephen Wise Congress House. For his "significant contributions over three decades" to Jewish education and culture, Mr. Samuel received a bronze plaque and a check for \$1,000 from Dr. Israel Goldstein, president of the congress.

CORNERSTONE FOR SYNAGOGUE LAID IN GERMAN TOWN; MAYOR PRESENT

TRIER, Germany, Nov. 15. (JTA) -- In this Moselle city also known under the name of Treves, the cornerstone for a modest new synagogue was laid by communal president Benno Sueskind. Local Jewish attorney Dr. Vorenberg reminded the audience that Jews have lived here since Roman times. Lord Mayor Dr. Raskin described the cornerstone laying as an occasion for rejoicing by the entire city.
