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ISRAEL'S VIEWS ON EISENHOWER DOCTRINE TO BE DISCUSSED IN WASHINGTON

JERUSALEM, May 8. (JTA) -- The Israel Embassy in Washington will hold talks with the State Department on the wording of an Israel declaration concerning the Eisenhower Doctrine before the Israel Cabinet meets here again on the matter, it was indicated here today.

It is understood that Israel wants to be certain whether its wording would be agreeable to Washington, and if it were Premier David Ben Gurion would have a powerful argument for turning the opposition of the Achdut Avodah and Mapam, partners in the coalition government.

Senator Hubert Humphrey of Minnesota, who is currently touring the Middle East, spent 90 minutes in conference with Premier Ben Gurion today, discussing Israel's economic problems and how the United States can be of assistance. Later, Sen. Humphrey toured the Northern Negev and was a guest of Mrs. Golda Meir, Foreign Minister, at dinner.

Two Americans, one an aide of Sen. Humphrey, and the other a United States Embassy aide in Israel, were shaken up yesterday when the plane on which they were travelling over the Negev hit a large air pocket. The rocking of the plane caused several seats to buckle, spilling the two Americans. The two men were treated at a hospital and are back on their jobs today.

HAMMARSKJOLD ARRIVES IN ISRAEL TODAY FOR TALKS WITH BEN GURION

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y., May 8. (JTA) -- Secretary General Dag Hammarskjold, accompanied by his chief Middle East expert, Dr. Ralph J. Bunche, undersecretary, will arrive in Israel tomorrow for a series of conferences with Premier David Ben Gurion and Foreign Minister Golda Meir.

In his party will also be Claude de Kemoularia, a French national, a personal assistant and adviser to Mr. Hammarskjold since the Middle East crisis developed last fall. He will also leave with him William Ranallo, his personal aide.

There is no specific agenda for the talks between Mr. Hammarskjold and Premier Ben Gurion, according to high UN sources. These sources said that the Secretary General initiated a correspondence which has resulted in the joint decision by Mr. Ben Gurion and Mr. Hammarskjold that a "useful purpose" would be served at this time by the visit.

(From Jerusalem it was reported today that Mr. Hammarskjold's detailed proposals for the Israel Government will be prepared by him and his aides when they arrive. It seems, however, that the talks will be devoted to the general problem of Israel-Arab relations and the chances for peace in the Middle East and will not turn toward specifics unless progress is made in the general talks.)

Mr. Hammarskjold last saw Mr. Ben Gurion for two days in July, 1956. The present visit is expected to last two days or possibly three, and Mr. Hammarskjold will return directly to headquarters, according to present plans. It is not expected that he will go to Cairo on this trip.

A spokesman for the Secretary General, when asked whether Mr. Hammarskjold has yet received any reply from Egyptian President Gamal Abdel Nasser about whether the Cairo Government still insists that it has "right of belligerence," said here today there has been as yet no reply to pending questions from either Israel or Egypt.

SAUDI ARABIA PROTESTS TO U. N. ON ISRAELI NAVAL MANEUVERS IN AKABA

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y., May 8. (JTA) -- The Government of Saudi Arabia delivered today a sharp protest to the United Nations against Israeli naval maneuvers in the Gulf of Akaba and warned that it reserves to itself "the full right to defend its vital interests and its territorial integrity."

Today's protest was the second from Saudi Arabia in connection with Israel's insistence that it has the right to exercise freedom of passage in the Gulf of Akaba and

the Strait of Tiran. Abdullah al-Khayyal, permanent representative of Saudi Arabia here, addressed the first protest to Secretary General Dag Hammarskjold on April 12.

Israeli circles here said they knew of neither a "provocation" nor a "challenge" of the type referred to in the Saudi Arabian communication. "If Saudi Arabia keeps the peace," the Israelis said, "she has nothing to fear from Israel."

In today's letter the Saudi Arabian representative declared that Israel has "continued aggression which threatens the security and peace" of the Gulf of Akaba area over which Saudi Arabia has sovereignty. The letter detailed a number of trips by Israeli destroyers, frigates and military airplanes which, according to the protest, "engaged in maneuvers near the western coast of the Gulf of Akaba situated between Elath and Dhabah and crossed toward the Saudi Arabian, eastern coast of the gulf."

"Such acts in which Israel is engaging against Saudi Arabia's territorial waters, the letter continued, "is naught but a continuation of Israeli aggression. They are at the same time a provocation and a challenge." The Saudi Arabian requested that Mr. Hammarskjold's office circulate the letter to all members of the UN, specifically to Security Council members.

BILL TO ADMIT 5,000 JEWS FROM EGYPT INTO U.S. INTRODUCED IN SENATE

WASHINGTON, May 8. (JTA) -- Republican Senator Clifford Case, of New Jersey, today introduced a bill to amend the Eisenhower refugee program by permitting 5,000 refugees from non-Communist countries to be included among the 68,000 escapees from Communism admitted annually.

While the new Case amendment does not refer specifically to Jewish refugees from Egypt, a spokesman for Sen. Case said this was the intended application and that it had the backing of the State Department. Co-sponsors of the amendment are Republican Senators Jacob K. Javits and Irving Ives, both of New York, and Sen. H. Alexander Smith of New Jersey.

In correspondence with the State Department, the amendment's sponsors made known their desire to provide a measure of relief to Jews escaping from Egypt. The State Department supported the idea although the Department's correspondence avoided specific reference to Jewish escapees or Egypt. The State Department said it favored the amendment because it recognized "imminent problems of escapees from dictatorships of any kind."

The measure was referred to the Senate Judiciary Committee. Hearings may be held after the committee concludes consideration of civil rights matters.

JEWS FROM POLAND ARRIVE IN ISRAEL WITH 61 HEAD OF CATTLE

TEL AVIV, May 8. (JTA) -- For the first time in Israel's history, immigrants arrived here with livestock. The Jewish Agency, meanwhile, revealed it has made arrangements for more immigrants to bring livestock with them.

Seven Jewish farmers from Poland arrived at Haifa yesterday with 61 head of cattle. Their families arrived two days earlier. All of them will settle near Affuleh after the cattle are released from quarantine.

There are 200,000 Jews throughout the world willing to emigrate to Israel this year and Israel plans to take in 100,000 of them during 1957, Zalman Shragai, chairman of the Jewish Agency's immigration department, said today. The fact that Jews were coming from countries where there has been no Zionist or Jewish education for more than 30 years represented the greatest victory for the Zionist idea, he stated.

STANDARDS OF CIVIL AVIATION IN ISRAEL EQUAL U.S., EXPERT REPORTS

JERUSALEM, May 8. (JTA) -- The standards set for civil aviation in Israel equals anything established for European or American civil aviation, Robert Ashton, head of an International Civil Aviation Organization mission in Israel, declared today.

Mr. Ashton, a British aviation expert, has served as a consultant to Israel for the past five years under the expanded United Nations technical assistance program. Mr. Ashton, who left here today upon the completion of his tour of duty, said that aircraft overhauled in Israel were given universally recognized certificates of airworthiness which guaranteed that the job need not be reinspected at their home fields.

ISRAEL IS EUROPE'S OUTPOST IN THE ORIENT, FRENCH EX-MINISTER SAYS

TEL AVIV, May 8. (JTA) -- Diomede Catroux, one-time Minister of Air of France, told the Israel-French Friendship League last night that if the world permits the disappearance of Israel, Europe too will disappear because "Israel is Europe's outpost in the Orient." He called for the formation of a European-Israel bloc to withstand both the USSR "lust for power" and the "dominating desire of American dollars."

U. J. A. SUMMONS LEADERS FOR TWO-DAY PARLEY; SEEKS \$50, 000, 000 IN CASH

NEW YORK, May 8. (JTA) -- Jewish leaders from all over the country have been summoned by the United Jewish Appeal to New York to attend a two-day National Rescue Conference which will culminate the collection of \$50, 000, 000 in cash inaugurated nationally this week as part of the UJA campaign, it was announced here today by William Rosenwald, UJA general chairman. The conference will take place on June 8 and 9.

Mr. Rosenwald also announced that Philip W. Lown, of Boston, and Samuel Rothberg, of Peoria, Ill., have been named National Cash Chairmen to direct the nationwide \$50, 000, 000 cash collection. Declaring that the influx to Israel of Jewish refugees from Egypt, Hungary, other Eastern European countries and North Africa not only continues unabated, but is increasing, Mr. Rosenwald pointed out that the current immigration is placing an intolerable burden on the people of Israel unless the American Jewish community "takes over the financing of the transportation and maintenance of the new arrivals."

Z. O. A. TO ESTABLISH LOAN FUND FOR AMERICAN SETTLERS IN ISRAEL

NEW YORK, May 8. (JTA) -- The Zionist Organization of America will establish a special loan fund to assist American settlers and prospective settlers in Israel, it was announced here today by Dr. Emanuel Neumann, ZOA president. He also announced a plan for one year of work and study in Israel by young American adult Zionists.

The year-in-Israel program, approved by the appropriate departments of the Jewish Agency, is designed to familiarize young adult Zionists in the age group of 21-30 with all aspects of life in Israel by enabling them to spend a period of one year in orientation study courses and in work in their various professions under conditions approximating those in the United States. Four months are to be devoted to the study of Hebrew, Israel geography and development, and basic problems relating to government, economics and other subjects.

The following two months will be devoted to working in various towns and settlements, including the ZOA Agricultural Training Institute, Kfar Silver. In the remaining six months, each of the participants will work in his own profession or field of service in private enterprises or public institutions. The participants in this program would comprise young professionals, college graduates or others having special skills. It is expected that the first group will leave for Israel in the Fall of this year.

The loan fund to assist American settlers and prospective settlers in Israel is intended to ease some of the strains encountered by American settlers, especially young professionals. In administering this loan fund, the ZOA will invite the cooperation of Hitachdut Olei America (The Association of American Settlers in Israel), Dr. Neumann said.

At the same time, Dr. Neumann announced that a group of 30 youths, members of ZOA Young Zionist Districts, will go to Israel this summer to participate in the Jewish Agency's Leadership Training Institute in Jerusalem. The group of young Zionists will leave New York by plane July 14th and is due to return August 30th. The fee for the Summer Institute is \$795 per person, including transportation to and from Israel and all other expenses on the spot.

DR. GOLDMANN HONORED BY JEWISH COMMUNITY OF BUENOS AIRES

BUENOS AIRES, May 8. (JTA) -- Dr. Nahum Goldmann, president of the Jewish Agency, was honored today by the Buenos Aires Jewish Community with which 45, 000 Jewish families in this city are affiliated. Dr. Abraham Mibashan, president of the community, welcomed the guest.

Dr. Goldmann praised the organization for the manner in which it held the community together and rallied the support of Buenos Aires Jews in behalf of Israel. As president of the Conference on Jewish Material Claims Against Germany, Dr. Goldmann promised the help of the community in developing educational programs for the Argentine Jews. He was particularly laudatory of the manner in which party differences were forgotten in the functioning of the community organization.

(The World Jewish Congress in New York was informed today by its Montevideo representative that Dr. Nahum Goldmann's visit to Uruguay beginning this Friday, has been declared an official one by the Uruguayan Government. Dr. Goldmann is proceeding to Uruguay from Argentina.)

BARON JAMES ROTHSCHILD DIES IN LONDON; WAS ACTIVE IN JEWISH AFFAIRS

LONDON, May 8. (JTA) -- Baron James A. de Rothschild, elder son of Baron Edmond de Rothschild and an active member of a number of Jewish organizations in this country and abroad, died yesterday at the age of 78.

Regarded as a leading spokesman for the Jewish community Baron de Rothschild was liberal in his philanthropies and widespread in his Jewish activities. Among others, he was active for the Hebrew University of Jerusalem, the Economic Board for Palestine, Palestine Electric Corporation and the Jewish Colonization Association. He was particularly active in the JCA, where he held the post of president, and in promoting Jewish settlement in Israel.

ISRAEL'S INDEPENDENCE DAY OBSERVED IN MANY LANDS; EISENHOWER GREETINGS

WASHINGTON, May 8. (JTA) -- President Eisenhower, expressing "best wishes" on the ninth anniversary of Israel's independence, said in a message last night to a dinner of the America-Israel Society, that "as the peoples of the world learn to appreciate the mutuality of their hopes and interests, we can face the future with confidence."

Israeli Ambassador Abba Eban told the gathering that no one is in a position today to judge Israel's decision to resist Egypt's Nasser. He warned that the United Nations is "falling short of its international duty" in allowing Nasser to control the Suez Canal. It is in Israel's "supreme national interest," Mr. Eban said, to maintain the right of free maritime passage. He predicted that "new vistas" for Israel were opened with international recognition of Israel's rights in the Gulf of Akaba.

Sen. Leverett Saltonstall, Massachusetts Republican, commended Israel for keeping "hands off" Jordan in the recent crisis. He said he could not predict what would happen if that policy of restraint did not continue. The dinner was attended by a number of ambassadors, government officials, and other dignitaries.

JERUSALEM, May 8. (JTA) -- Observance of Independence Day was concluded here last night with the distribution of 15 annual "Israel Prizes" to outstanding figures in theology and the arts and sciences. The awards carry a cash prize of 1,000 pounds. Recipients were:

Prof. Haim Schirman, for Judaic studies; Rabbi Reuven Margoliot, for theology; Dr. Yochanan Levi (deceased) for philosophy; Yaacov Pichman and Ur Zvi Greenberg, for belles lettres; Eliezer Shmueli, for juvenile writing; Dr. Z. Lehman, for education; P. Daikam, for sociology; Prof. S. Hestrin, Dr. M. Feingold and Gad Avigad, for the exact sciences; Prof. Saul Adler, for medicine; Prof. H. Horowitz, for agriculture; Dov Carmi, for architecture, and P. Ben Haim for music and the arts.

VIENNA, May 8. (JTA) -- Austria's newly-elected President, Adolf Schaerf, was one of the guests at an Israel Independence Day reception given by Israel Ambassador Bentsur. Mr. Bentsur toasted President Schaerf, who speaks Hebrew fluently and who was supported by Jewish voters. Foreign Minister Leopold Figl toasted the State of Israel and Premier David Ben Gurion.

ROME, May 8. (JTA) -- Special services were held in Rome's Great Synagogue in commemoration of Israel Independence Day. Services honoring the dead of the Jewish Brigade who fought in Italy against the Nazis were conducted at the Allied Cemetery near Ravenna.

BUENOS AIRES, May 8. (JTA) -- Dr. Arie L. Lubovi, Israel Ambassador to Argentina, gave a reception last night in honor of Israel's ninth Independence Day. Among the guests were Dr. Alfonso de Laferrere, Argentina's Foreign Minister, Dr. Angel Cabral, Communications Minister, Dr. Francisco Martinez, Health Minister, and Dr. Nahum Goldmann, president of the Jewish Agency, as well as the ambassadors of a number of other states.

RIO DE JANEIRO, May 8. (JTA) -- Brazil's largest evening newspaper, "O Globo," published a special 24-page supplement today dedicated to Israel's ninth Independence Day. The newspaper has a circulation of 150,000.

SANTIAGO, Chile, May 8. (JTA) -- Leading Chilean newspapers today devoted articles to Israel in connection with the ninth anniversary of Israel's independence, the state-owned radio stations played Israel music and also announced President Ibanez' greeting to the Government of Israel. A reception given here by the Israel legation was attended by many leading personalities.

ISRAEL'S SOCCER TEAM WELCOMED BY VICE PRESIDENT NIXON IN WASHINGTON

WASHINGTON, May 8. (JTA) -- Fourteen members of Israel's championship Hapoel soccer team were welcomed by Vice President Richard M. Nixon who told them that a small country like Israel can survive only if it has a situation with its neighbors that would assure peaceful relations.

He welcomed the Israelis on behalf of the American people and wished them luck on the field of play. The delegation was greeted in the formal reception room of the Capitol building. Mr. Nixon was presented with a silver-bound Old Testament Bible and a lifetime pass to soccer games in Israel. Members of the Senate and House joined in welcoming the Israelis.

Mr. Nixon expressed hope that efforts would lead to peace and the right of Israel to maintain and strengthen itself. The Vice President said he always believed in goodwill tours such as the team is making. He said countries can disagree on issues but can share constructive benefits of such exchanges.
