FIVE CABINET MEMBERS INJURED BY MADMAN'S BOMB IN KNESSET

JERUSALEM, Oct. 29. (JTA) -- Five members of the Israel Government, including Premier David Ben Gurion, were injured today when a deranged immigrant threw a home-made bomb into the Parliament of Israel. The explosion occurred at 5:15 P. M. local time. (10:15 A. M., New York time).

Mr. Ben Gurion suffered superficial wounds of both hands and the left leg, and Mrs. Golda Meir, Foreign Minister, was hit in the left foot by a bomb splinter. Both were hospitalized overnight for observation.

Minister of Religion Moshe Shapira was the most seriously hurt, suffering wounds of the abdomen and head. He was carried out of the Knesset chamber bleeding profusely. An emergency operation was performed this evening. (At the time the Daily Bulletin went to press, Mr. Shapira had been in the operating room for over three hours.)

Minister of Transport Moshe Carmel suffered a broken right arm and his left hand was hit by a splinter. He was hospitalized. Israel Barzilai, Minister of Health, was injured slightly but was not hospitalized.

Bomb-Thrower Is Young Immigrant From Iraq

The bomb-thrower, 25-year-old Moshe Douek, an immigrant from Iraq, who hurled the explosive missile from the visitors' gallery of the Knesset Chamber, allegedly confessed to the police tonight. Arresting officers, who nabbed him moments after the blast rocked the building, rescued him from visitors who wanted to lynch the young man.

When he was questioned, it was reported, he babbled complaints against the Jewish Agency, Youth Aliyah and the Israeli authorities whom he held responsible for "losing a million." Police officials said that Douek had been in a mental institution previously and had attempted to set fire to a bed in the Beilinson Hospital when he was a patient there.

Eye-witnesses reported that after the bomb went off, every deputy and Minister in the House ducked under a chair or table until it became apparent that the attack was over. The Premier, described by one admirer as "the calmest man in the House," picked himself off the floor and walked into the lobby. Dr. Ben Zion Harel, a General Zionist deputy and a physician, immediately gave first aid treatment to the wounded.

As police reconstructed the incident, Douek's projectile bounced off the Speaker's rostrum and rolled under the Cabinet table which absorbed much of the force of the blast, probably saving the lives of the Ministers. Mizrahi deputy Yitzhak Raphael was speaking on foreign policy when the bomb was thrown. Shards picked up after the Knesset was evacuated indicated that the bomb was painted red.

The Knesset was cordoned off tonight as a huge crowd collected after the news of the bombing broke.

Three hours after the bomb throwing the Knesset resumed its session and continued the foreign policy debate. Speaker Joseph Sprinzak intervened to report on condition of the five who had been injured. Then Mr. Raphael took up where he had been interrupted.

Earlier, during the recess, President Ben Zvi had inspected the scene and congratulated the Ministers who narrowly escaped injury and death. He also called at the hospital to express his best wishes to Mrs. Meir and Messers Ben Gurion and Carmel.

Eliahu Elath, Israeli Ambassador to London, narrowly escaped death as he walked out of the Knesset minutes before the explosion. He had been sitting in a special section reserved for distinguished visitors located directly behind the Cabinet table. The seat which he had occupied was smashed.

(Switchboards at the Jewish Telegraphic Agency offices in New York and London were taxed to capacity today with calls from individuals, newspapers and organizations seeking information about the bombing. A newspaper as far away as San Francisco and Hamilton, Ontario, called the JTA in New York for details.)

DULLES SAYS NO GREAT AID PROGRAM IS PLANNED FOR THE MIDDLE EAST

WASHINGTON, Oct. 29. (JTA) -- Secretary of State Dulles told a press conference today that no vast new program of economic assistance to the Middle East is contemplated to bolster that area against Communism.

Mr. Dulles recalled that he told the United Nations that if a solution were found to regional political problems in line with principles he had enunciated in August, 1955, considerable aid might be extended. But, at the moment, he said, there was no concrete new program that was great in scope.

(The Wall Street Journal, in a dispatch from Damascus, said today that the Soviet-Syrian aid agreement signed in Damascus yesterday "was a clear indication the Soviets have a Mid-East doctrine of their own," it added that "the 'Khrushchev Doctrine,' now rapidly evolving, is even patterned after Eisenhower's-- it offers economic help and military support for Arab lands interested in defending themselves against aggression. The enemy the Russians are pointing to, of course, is 'imperialist aggressors' not the least of which, the Russians would have the Syrians believe, is Turkey. But the list also includes Israel, Britain, France and the United States.")

Mr. Dulles said the Soviet desire to move into the Middle East was nothing new. However, the influence the Soviets today exert in Syria was new, he said. According to Mr. Dulles, the Soviet Union has been recently talking much more toughly and their charges in the United Nations have been characterized by language that was indeed tough.

SOVIET, SYRIA CONTINUE ASSAULT ON ISRAEL IN GENERAL ASSEMBLY DEBATE

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. , Oct. 29. (JTA) -- Syria and the Soviet Union continued today their earlier efforts to include Israel as one of the parties to blame for the tensions along the Turco-Syrian border, but the debate on Syria's complaint against Turkey has just about petered out.

Saleh el Bitar, Syrian Foreign Minister, who spoke today, tried hard to keep Israel involved in the dispute. As he did last week, he again kept referring to what he calls the "Zionist-imperialist conspiracy" in the Middle East. It was that "conspiracy" that was responsible, he said, for last year's Israeli "aggression" against Egypt, and it was that policy, backed by Britain, France and the United States, which forms the "true background of the tensions in the Middle East" today.

The same general line was followed by Moscow's Foreign Minister, Andrei A. Gromyko. He referred to the manner in which, he said, Israel, Britain and France had professed peaceful intentions "only two or three days before the armed forces of these countries attacked Egypt." But, on the whole, Mr. Gromyko's long speech today, in which he reiterated all of his previous accusations of U.S. -Turco-Israeli "perfidy," was seen by most observers here as striking a subdued note. Neither Syria nor Russia introduced a resolution to back up their calls for a commission to probe the situation along the Turco-Syrian frontier.

COMMUNISTS CLASH WITH POLICE IN DEMONSTRATION ON KAER KASSEM

TEL AVIV, Oct. 29. (JTA) -- Communist efforts to exploit the first anniversary of the slaying of 49 Arabs in Kafr Kassem village led today to a police crackdown in which many Communists were arrested following a clash with police in the streets of Nazareth.

The demonstrations were organized by local Communists to mark the anniversary of the killings which occurred on the eve of the Sinai operation but police issued a ban against any meetings.

Emile Habibi, a Communist member of Knesset, reportedly headed the demonstrators. Police had orders to use force in dispersing the demonstration.

The clash was the second Communist-inspired effort to gain political capital from the Kafr Kassem slayings. The first was an attempt by Tewfik Toubi, also a Communist deputy, to break into the Arab village despite a police cordon. He claimed, after he was forcibly prevented from entering, that he was assaulted by police.

The Attorney General reportedly was considering revocation of Toubi's parliamentary immunity to permit action against the deputy on charges of attacking police on duty.

BBC ANNIVERSARY PROGRAM HAILS 'BRILLIANT' SINAI CAMPAIGN

LONDON, Oct. 29. (JTA) -- Israel's Sinai operation, launched one year ago today, was described here on a BBC television program as "the shortest fighting campaign in history, brilliantly conceived and brilliantly executed."

This summary was made by commentator Richard Dimbleby, in a first anniversary review of the effects of the Sinai operation, a program for which Peter Flynn, BBC correspondent in Israel, was brought specially to London.

Flynn said that as a result of the Sinai campaign, the Egyptian army was smashed, Egyptian war equipment valued at 15,000,000 pounds was captured, the Gulf of Akaba was opened to make possible present weekly arrivals of oil cargoes at the port of Elath, infiltration attacks have almost ceased and a "great access of national confidence" developed in Israel.

CABINET APPROVES PLAN TO REPLACE IMMIGRANT CAMPS IN ISRAEL

JERUSALEM, Oct. 29. (JTA) -- The Israel Government has approved a three-year plan to liquidate the maabaroth (immigrant camps) in which some 18,000 families are still housed, it was learned today.

The first stage of the plan, which will involve an expenditure of nine million pounds (\$5,000,000) is scheduled for completion before the end of the current financial year. The Ministerial Economic Committee blueprints call for completion of 2,000 housing units by next March 31.

The new housing units will be allocated to families on the basis of "first in, first out," with priority going to those families which have lived the longest in the temporary housing of the immigrant camps. Some families were said to have resided in the camps as long as six years.

U. J. A. SURVEY MISSION TOURS NEGEV MINES, VISITS ELATH PORT

TEJ, AVIV, Oct. 29. (JTA) -- The 100-man United Jewish Appeal Study Mission today visited Elath and the area surrounding Israel's Red Sea port. They were accompanied by Development Minister I. Bentov, who described the development projects planned for the southern Negev and Elath.

Later the UJA leaders visited the Timnah mines, also known as King Solomon's mines. Joseph Baratz of Degania, who entertained the group at a luncheon at the Soldiers House in Elath, was host.

Edward M. M. Warburg, chairman of the Joint Distribution Committee, announced the appointment today of Louis D. Horwitz as director general of Malban, succeeding Charles Passman, who will continue with Malben in a consulting capacity.

Mr. Warburg also said the world budget for the JDC has been set at \$32 million, half of which will go to Malben institutions in Israel. He said the call on world Jewry to provide help would be greater this year because of the increased needs.

ORT APPROVES EMERGENCY PROGRAM FOR REPATRIATED POLISH JEWS

GENEVA, Oct. 29. (JTA) -- An emergency program of vocational training for Jews repatriated to Poland from the Soviet Union was announced today by the World ORT Union. There are now about 10,000 repatriated Jews awaiting resettlement in Poland.

The World ORT executive committee, meeting here during the past two days, approved the resolution to resume ORT work in Poland to meet "urgent needs." The resolution declared assurances had been received from the Polish Government that ORT would have "freedom of action in setting up and directing schools and projects."

These were listed as including "one accelerated course for adults, two pre-apprenticeship classes in existing Jewish schools and technical aid to artisans."

The executive committee, representing ORT branches in 27 countries, approved a target budget of \$5,000,000 for the coming year. Dr. William Haber of Ann Arbor, Mich., presided at the meeting.

REPATRIATED POLISH JEWS IN 'MISERABLE CONDITION,' JORDAN REPORTS

TEL AVIV, Oct. 29. (JTA) -- Most of the 10,000 Jews repatriated from Russia to Poland are in "miserable condition," Charles Jordan, European director-general of the Joint Distribution Committee, said here today at a press conference.

He said the JDC had undertaken the task of looking after thousands of the repatriates, particularly in providing medical care and education which they have lacked for a long time.

He said the aid would depart from usual JDC patterns to work through local committees for social help together with the Central Cultural Committee of Polish Jewry.

An additional 20,000 repatriates were expected from Russia very soon, he reported, adding that while the Polish Government extended help to the returnees, such help was inadequate and additional aid would have to be provided.

TALMUD PROFESSOR NAMED CHIEF RABBI OF THE ARGENTINE

NEW YORK, Oct. 29. (JTA) -- Rabbi Avigdor Cyperstein, professor of Talmud at Yeshiva University, has been granted a leave of absence to serve as Chief Rabbi of the Argentine, University president Dr. Samuel Belkin, announced. Rabbi Cyperstein, 52-year-old native of Poland, will assume his new post of spiritual leader of the fifth largest Jewish community in the world, about November 15.

JEWISH WOMEN'S CLUBS TO MARK ANNIVERSARY OF EMMA LAZARUS' DEATH

NEW YORK, Oct. 29. (JTA) -- The 70th anniversary of the death of Emma Lazarus, the American Jewish poetess whose paean to the United States as a haven for refugees is inscribed on the base of the Statue of Liberty, will be marked here and in many cities throughout the country by the Emma Lazarus Federation of Jewish Women's Clubs during the week of November 19.

BAN STANDS ON USE OF 'INTERFAITH' DECALOGUE IN N. Y. SCHOOLS

ALBANY, Oct. 29. (JTA) -- The New York State Board of Regents refused yesterday to review a decision by State Education Commissioner James E. Allen, Jr., banning the use of an "inter-denominational" version of the Ten Commandments in the schools of New Hyde Park, a suburban community on New York City's limits. The Board averred that it lacked the power of review.

Commissioner Allen's formal opinion last Summer asserted that the use of the neutralized version of the Decalogue had stirred "controversy and bitterness." He held that education was not served by "acts which create divisiveness, ill feeling and unwholesome controversy." The appeal against the Ten Commandments in the schools was brought by a local resident.

RABBIS, SOCIOLOGIST CLASH ON SIGNIFICANCE OF RELIGIOUS REVIVAL

NEW YORK, Oct. 29. (JTA) -- Two leading Orthodox rabbis asserted last night that the revival of religion in the United States was a meaningful one. Their view was opposed by a rabbinically-ordained sociologist who called the revival "essentially superficial" and founded on "such weak props as social conformity and secular popularity."

Participants in the debate, held at the opening session of the Young Israel Institute for Jewish Studies here, were Rabbi Solomon Sharfman, president of the Rabbinical Council of America; Rabbi Emanuel Rackman, past president of the New York Board of Rabbis and Yeshiva University faculty member, and Dr. Bernard M. Lander, director of the Yeshiva University Graduate School.

Rabbi Sharfman argued that "the force of materialism" had left man adrift and that as a consequence "he is returning to the true values of his traditionally ancestral faith." One result, he said, was that "Orthodox Judaism is experiencing a form of revival which is most assuring for the future development of a dynamic Judaism."

Rabbi Rackman said traditional religion was "permeating the daily behavioral patterns of an increasing number of adherents of all faiths" and he cited in proof of Jewish return the "growth of the all-day school enrollment, increase in congregational membership, greater respect for the Sabbath and a host of other things."

Dr. Lander replied that it was "fashionable" for suburban community residents "to join a neighborhood synagogue or community center for purposes of communal identification. These joiners have never committed themselves to the eternal and all-engrossing verities of a deeply-rooted religious experience."

CONGRESSMAN HITS DULLES 'FUMBLING, BUMBLING' MID-EAST POLICY

BOSTON, Oct. 29. (JTA) -- Secretary of State Dulles' "fumbling, bumbling foreign policy in the Near East" may push us over the brink of war, Rep. Wayne L. Hays, Democrat of Ohio, charged here tonight. This "muddling, bungling" policy may cost the United States the "friendship of our true friend and ally-- Israel," the Congressman added.

He spoke at a banquet session of the Pioneer Women of America's 15th biennial convention. Almost 1,000 women from 490 clubs throughout this country and Canada attended.

"The sterility of the so-called Eisenhower Doctrine has been clearly demonstrated by recent events in the Near East," Rep. Hays asserted. He further charged that "Mr. Dulles' hysterical rushing of arms to Jordan" had, in the words of Arab leaders, provided arms that "will never be used against other Arabs, but against the Arab's blood enemy-- Israel."

Yesterday, the women's clubs voted a special \$100,000 project to set up two training centers for Israel's new immigrants. This move, in honor of Israel's tenth anniversary, is in addition to the \$2,500,000 voted for the organization's educational, welfare and cultural program in Israel for 1958.

MRS. ROOSEVELT CALLS AID TO ISRAEL ESSENTIAL FOR FREE WORLD

NEW YORK, Oct. 29. (JTA) -- American aid to Israel is essential to the welfare of the entire free world, Mrs. Eleanor Roosevelt declared here today at a luncheon initiating the fall campaign of the New York Women's Division of the Israel Bond Organization. "Helping Israel is not just a matter of compassion," she pointed out, "it is really part of the whole struggle between the free world and the Communist world."

Mrs. Roosevelt was the chief speaker at the luncheon which honored her and nine other "First Ladies" in various fields of endeavor. More than \$250,000 in Israel bonds was sold at the function.

MRS. VICTOR SEGAL RE-ELECTED PRESIDENT OF WOMEN'S ORT

CHICAGO, Oct. 29. (JTA) -- Mrs. Victor Segal of Philadelphia was re-elected national president of the Women's American ORT at the conclusion here of the organization's 14th biennial convention. More than 1,000 delegates, representing 45,000 members in 20 states, attended the parley.
