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MRS. MEIR BACK IN HOSPITAL AS BEN GURION PREPARES TO LEAVE

JERUSALEM, Nov. 6. (JTA) -- Mrs. Golda Meir, Israel's Foreign Minister, returned to Hadassah Hospital today for a check-up of her condition following the injuries she suffered a week ago Tuesday when a bomb was thrown into the Knesset. Since her release from hospital last week, she reportedly continued to be troubled by the after-effects of antibiotics which were administered to her and her recovery was described as slow.

Premier David Ben Gurion, who has been held in the hospital since last Tuesday, was described by his doctors tonight as fit and ready to leave the hospital any day. He may be discharged tomorrow. Speaker Josef Sprinzak and members of the Knesset presidium visited him today.

Moshe Carmel, Minister of Transport, who received a broken arm in the bombing, will be discharged from hospital tomorrow. Moshe Shapira, the Minister of Religions and Social Welfare, most seriously injured of the bomb victims, was said tonight to be making favorable progress.

ISRAELI KILLED WHEN SYRIANS FIRE ON LAKE TIBERIAS VILLAGE

TEL AVIV, Nov. 6. (JTA) -- An Israeli policeman was killed and a civilian injured today when Syrian forces opened fire from their positions on a group of Israel workmen at Tei Ketzira, on the eastern bank of Lake Tiberias. The Syrians fired only a few rounds and then ceased action.

Subsequently, Syrian authorities announced that Israel had been massing forces in the vicinity and had attacked a Syrian village in the demilitarized zone, withdrawing after an exchange of fire. They said they would file a complaint with the Israel-Syrian Mixed Armistice Commission.

U. N. FORCE AT GAZA, AKABA PREVENTED TROUBLE, LODGE SAYS

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y., Nov. 6. (JTA) -- There would be "trouble" along the Gaza Strip frontier and in the Akaba area leading to Israel's port of Elath if it were not for the presence of the United Nations Emergency Force in those regions, Henry Cabot Lodge, chairman of the United States delegation, declared here tonight. He gave that evaluation of the situation in a statement marking the first anniversary of UNEF, which was created by the General Assembly exactly a year ago.

"Last year, at this time," Mr. Lodge noted, "the world was in the middle of an unprecedented and highly dangerous crisis. The United Nations Emergency Force... made it possible for the attacking forces to withdraw. It has brought quiet to the Gaza Strip and to the Strait of Tiran. It has thus enabled the world to take a turn away from war.

"It is gratifying that, one year later, the areas patrolled by the United Nations Emergency Force are still quiet. I might add that, without the UNEF, it is clear, to me anyway, that once again there would be trouble."

Mr. Lodge, in his statement, voiced warm congratulations to the General Assembly for creating UNEF to Secretary General Dag Hammarskjöld and the Force commander, Maj. Gen. E. L. M. Burns, for using "tact, wisdom and energy" in setting up the Force and directing its operations; and to the officers and men of the Force, whom the American wished "continued success in their vital work of keeping the peace."

KHRUSHCHEV RENEWS CHARGES U. S. INCITES ISRAEL TO ATTACK SYRIA

LONDON, Nov. 6. (JTA) -- Soviet Communist Party boss Nikita Khrushchev renewed his charges today that the United States was inciting Israel and Turkey to attack Syria. He told a special session of the Supreme Soviet, held to mark the 40th anniversary of the Bolshevik revolution, that "the Americans are plotting against Syria and inciting Israel and Turkey to provocations."

The Russian dictator renewed his call for a "high level meeting of representatives of capitalist and Socialist countries so as to reach agreement on excluding war as a means of solving political questions." He blamed the West for keeping the world constantly on the edge of war. He pledged the USSR would not use "means of destruction" unless attacked.

GOLDMANN URGES ISRAEL TO IMPROVE RELATIONS WITH U. S. S. R.

NEW YORK, Nov. 6. (JTA) -- Dr. Nahum Goldmann, president of the World Zionist Organization and the Jewish Agency, warned today of mounting Soviet hostility towards Israel but expressed the belief that this hostility had not yet crystallized into the position that Israel must disappear from the Middle East scene. He voiced the conviction that Israel could and should take steps to secure relaxation of tension in the Middle East and to improve Soviet-Israel relations.

Dr. Goldmann confirmed reports that he had had a series of talks with the Soviet Ambassador to Israel, at the envoy's initiative, relative to the situation of the Jews within the Soviet Union and a possible visit by him to Moscow to discuss it with Soviet officials. He said no decision had been reached but that he would be ready to make the trip, as president of the World Jewish Congress, if he were assured of the possibility of high level talks. He said he was "not hopeful" of emigration of Jews from the Soviet Union in the near future but indicated such emigration might become a possibility if tension in the Middle East were reduced and Soviet hostility towards Israel abated.

The Jewish Agency head told a press conference here that "the East-West conflict in the Middle East has spurred tensions and has emboldened Arab extremists." He noted that the contest between the two great power blocs tended to make "tension and instability a permanent feature of the Middle East landscape" and said that while there was "no apparent immediate danger of armed conflict," the situation remained "riddled with political and military dangers."

Dr. Goldmann pointed out that the Arab-Israel conflict had been overshadowed by the "fierce competition" between the Eastern and Western blocs and stressed that "the Soviet Union has, in the past two years, established itself firmly in the area. There is very little chance that its footholds can be completely dislodged. The result is a fierce jockeying for position, with disastrous effects for the area generally and for Israel particularly."

During his recent visit to Israel, Dr. Goldmann said, he had conferred with representatives of several of the political parties who had elicited his views on the situation and had emphasized his belief in the need for Israel to secure abatement of Soviet hostility. Among measures Israel could adopt in this direction, he said, might be support for an arms embargo to the Middle East.

The Jewish Agency chairman said that a six-month immigration quota of 25,000 had been adopted and provided for arrival of 12-15,000 Jews from Eastern Europe, 3-4,000 from Egypt and the remainder from other countries. Regularly arriving now are about 500 Jews monthly from Iran and 400 monthly from Tunisia. As far as Eastern Europe was concerned, Dr. Goldmann noted, there was "no quota" and as many immigrants would be taken from those countries as could leave. There was, likewise, "no quota" for Jews from Egypt.

CHARGE SOVIET UNION SEEKS 'RUSSIFICATION' OF ITS JEWS

LONDON, Nov. 6. (JTA) -- R.N. Carvalho, president of the Anglo-Jewish Association, charged last night that Soviet Russian leaders "seem to be adopting a policy that Russian Jews must be wholly Russian without any Jewish affiliations whatever." He told a meeting of the Association's Council, that "the Communist Government has had to accept the failure of its attempt to solve the Jewish problem by regarding Jews as simply another cultural community."

He said that the enthusiastic reception given Israel delegates by Russian Jews this summer proved beyond doubt that the bulk of Russian Jews were still staunchly Jewish in interests and sympathies, and that they were anxious to establish once more the closest bonds with Jews outside the Soviet empire.

The British Jewish leader said that "brutal force" might intine enable the Soviet leaders to eliminate all Jewish aspects from the lives of Russian Jews "but not without resistance, if only passive, from Russian Jews who seem courageously determined to keep alive their Jewishness."

Asserting that "unfortunately, Russia's attitude toward its Jewish citizens is bound up with its anti-Israel policy and Middle East ambitions," he appealed to the Western Powers to issue some kind of declaration guaranteeing immediate assistance to Israel if the Jewish State was attacked. He expressed the hope that such an eventuality was entirely "hypothetical," adding that even if it happened "we can be sure of Israel's ability to defend itself."

EBAN CONFERS AT STATE DEPARTMENT ON 'ECONOMIC COOPERATION'

WASHINGTON, Nov. 5. (JTA) -- Problems of mutual interest were discussed today by Israel Ambassador Abba Eban and William Rountree, Assistant Secretary of State for Near Eastern Affairs. Mr. Eban later told newsmen the discussion covered "certain economic programs now in operation." He said "practical economic and commercial cooperation" was discussed.

Mr. Eban said the fact that Syria was not mentioned at all in his talk today with Mr. Rountree indicated tension in the area had subsided. He pointed out, however, that "the basic question of security--meaning the independence and integrity of states in this area--remains."

DIPLOMATS GREET PRESIDENT BEN ZVI AT INAUGURATION RECEPTION

JERUSALEM, Nov. 6. (JTA) -- The ceremonies inaugurating President Itzhak Ben Zvi's second term as Israel's chief of state, which began last Wednesday when he formally took the oath of office, were completed today with a diplomatic reception at the President's residence at which he received the congratulations of the heads of all the diplomatic missions here.

At an earlier reception, President Ben Zvi received the members of the Knesset, the presiding justices of the courts, the religious and cultural leaders of the country and the heads of the minority communities.

ASK KNESSET TO WITHDRAW IMMUNITY OF ARAB COMMUNIST DEPUTY

JERUSALEM, Nov. 6. (JTA) -- A Knesset House Committee was asked today to withdraw parliamentary immunity from Communist deputy Tweifk Toubi who was involved in a brawl with military police during a Communist-inspired effort to make political capital out of the first anniversary of the Kafr Kassem killings.

Attorney General Haim Cohen submitted evidence that the deputy on October 26 sought to enter Kafr Kassem despite a police barrier set up to prevent incitement to villagers to demonstrate on the anniversary of the killing of 47 Arab residents. The deputy was reported on a visit to Russia to participate in the celebration of the 40th anniversary of the Russian revolution.

ISRAEL VOTES FOR 24-NATION DRAFT OF DISARMAMENT RESOLUTION IN U. N.

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y., Nov. 6. (JTA) -- Israel was one of the 57 nations which voted today at a first committee meeting of the UN General Assembly to adopt the 24-power draft resolution on the question of disarmament.

The draft resolution was developed by the Western Powers and strongly opposed by the Soviet bloc for linking suspension of nuclear weapons testing with the prompt installation of effective international control.

BONN FOREIGN MINISTER SEES DELAY ON ISRAEL RECOGNITION

BONN, Nov. 6. (JTA) -- Once again today, West German Foreign Minister Heinrich von Brentano threw cold water on the idea of Israel-West German diplomatic relations. Replying to questions at a press conference here, von Brentano said it was "inadvisable under the present circumstances" to exchange diplomatic representatives between the two states. Mutual diplomatic recognition, the Foreign Minister continued, "would be of benefit to no one," but is "bound to cause harm to many."

He stressed the tensions in the Middle East and insisted that while they existed it was incumbent upon the Bonn Government not to exacerbate the situation.

Earlier this year, there was a feeling in Bonn and Jerusalem that after the September 15 national elections in West Germany negotiations would get under way for the establishment of diplomatic relations. However, since then, Saudi Arabia, Egypt and Syria have applied pressure on Bonn not to recognize Israel, reportedly threatening to recognize East Germany in reprisal.

Von Brentano, who seemed favorably inclined toward Bonn-Jerusalem overtures, subsequently grew cool and five weeks ago stated that "a decision (on recognition) ought not to be made at an inopportune moment."

Herut Leader Pleuges Fight Against Diplomatic Relations with Germany

JOHANNESBURG, Nov. 6. (JTA) -- There is a "deep feeling" in Israel, even in the ranks of the Mapai Party, against the establishment of diplomatic relations with the West German Government, Menachem Beigin, leader of the Israel Herut Party, said here today prior to his departure for Rhodesia, Belgian Congo and then Paris. Mr. Beigin, who spent three months in this country, said that here and elsewhere in the Diaspora there was vehement opposition to dealings with Bonn.

Mr. Beigin said that if the Israel Government were to attempt to negotiate a diplomatic exchange with Germany, the Herut would seek to enlist the support of all parties in the Knesset to overrule the decision and would urge Jews throughout Israel and the entire world to demonstrate their abhorrence of the idea.

MONUMENT TO MARTYRED DUTCH JEWS TO RISE ON SITE OF NAZI CAMP

AMSTERDAM, Nov. 6. (JTA) -- A national monument to the memory of the 100,000 Dutch Jews who passed through the former concentration camp of Westerbork en route to the extermination camps of Hitler's Germany and Poland will be erected at the Westerbork camp site, it was announced today.

The plan was disclosed by Dr. Jan Cramer, governor of the Drente province, at a meeting here in behalf of Israel Bonds.

AGUDIST FOUNDATION OFFERS 20 SCHOLARSHIPS IN HONOR OF ROSENHEIM

LONDON, Nov. 6. (JTA) -- The Rosenheim Foundation announced today it was making available 20 scholarships at yeshivot in four European countries in honor of the 87th birthday next Saturday of Jacob Rosenheim, founder and life president of the Agudas Israel World Organization.

The four countries are England, Switzerland, France and Belgium. The scholarships are intended mainly for pupils from Eastern Europe and North Africa and are included in the program of UNESCO headquarters, the Foundation said.

The Foundation added that pupils from Poland and Czechoslovakia might be able to accept scholarships and that talks for that purpose were now taking place with the delegations of those countries at UNESCO.

YIDDISH THEATRE OF POLAND ENTHUSIASTICALLY RECEIVED IN EAST GERMANY

VIENNA, Nov. 6. (JTA) -- The National Yiddish Theatre of Poland recently gave two performances in Leipzig, East Germany, receiving enthusiastic applause from capacity audiences in the Leipzig Opera House, according to East German sources. At the first of the performances given by the Yiddish players from Warsaw, 80 percent of the audience consisted of German youth, a report declared. Bravos were shouted, and there was, reportedly, special acclaim for the principal members of the Polish-Yiddish troupe, including Ida Kaminska, H. Buzgan, Meir Melman and Rivkah Schiller.

QUARLES HAILS B'NAI BRITH MEMBERS' CONTRIBUTIONS

BALTIMORE, Nov. 6. (JTA) -- Members of B'nai Brith Menorah Lodge were told last night by Deputy Defense Secretary Donald A. Quarles that many of their number were "making significant contributions to America's national defense and to the security and betterment of our way of life."

Mr. Quarles addressed the lodge on the occasion of its presentation of an award to the president of Johns Hopkins University, Dr. Milton Eisenhower. Dr. Eisenhower is a brother of President Eisenhower.

SEN. MORSE SAYS ISRAEL'S TEN YEARS PROVES ITS NEED FOR PEACE

NEW YORK, Nov. 6. (JTA) -- Senator Wayne Morse of Oregon declared tonight that Israel, in its ten years of existence, "has given the world eloquent testimony of its love and need for peace, that its major interest is in the upbuilding of the land, the expansion of its industry, the development of its farms, the irrigation of its earth and the exploitation of its natural resources." The Senator addressed more than 400 labor and management leaders and religious and civic spokesmen at an Israel bond dinner here.

DEWEY STONE HONORED FOR AID TO ISRAEL'S SCIENTIFIC DEVELOPMENT

TEL AVIV, Nov. 6. (JTA) -- Dewey D. Stone, of Euston, was honored tonight at a dinner tendered by the Weizmann Institute at Rehovoth in recognition of his efforts in behalf of scientific development in Israel. Speakers included Finance Minister Levi Eshkol, Dov Joseph, Jewish Agency treasurer, and Isaac Wolfson, British industrialist.

CLAIMS CONFERENCE NAMES DR. ROBINSON RESEARCH COORDINATOR

NEW YORK, Nov. 6. (JTA) -- Appointment of Dr. Jacob Robinson as coordinator and consultant on research and commemoration projects on the Nazi persecution of the Jews was announced today by the Conference on Jewish Material Claims Against Germany.

Dr. Robinson is a former member of the Lithuanian Parliament. Later he was legal adviser to the Jewish Agency, a consultant to the American prosecution in the Nuremberg Trials and a member of the Israel delegation to the United Nations. He was the head of the Institute of Jewish Affairs of the World Jewish Congress for several years and is now chairman of the joint commission of the Yad Vashem Authority in Jerusalem and of the YIVO Institute for Jewish Research in New York.

INTERNATIONAL CHILDREN'S CONFERENCE TO BE HELD IN JERUSALEM

PARIS, Nov. 6. (JTA) -- The next international educational conference of the International Federation of Children's Communities, sponsored by UNESCO, will be held in Jerusalem in March, 1958. This decision was taken at a meeting of the executive committee of the IFCC after members from all countries had expressed a desire to visit Jerusalem and view for themselves the rehabilitation and educational programs of the Youth Aliyah.

AMERICAN INSTITUTE FOR BIBLICAL STUDIES TO BE HELD IN ISRAEL

JERUSALEM, Nov. 6. (JTA) -- An Institute for Biblical Studies for American Protestant students and religious lecturers will be held in Israel next summer, the Ministry for Religious Affairs announced. The school will be under the direction of Dr. G. Douglas Young and will feature both American and Israeli lecturers on a variety of subjects including Bible geography and archaeology.
