ISRAEL EXPELS RUMANIAN DIPLOMAT; INVOLVED IN AFFAIRS AFFECTING SECURITY

JERUSALEM, July 22. (JTA) -- The Israel Foreign Ministry announced today the expulsion of Stelian Perianu, the Second Secretary of the Rumanian Legation, apparently in retaliation for the expulsion by Rumania of Joseph Vereş, Second Secretary at the Israel Legation in Bucharest.

The Israel Foreign Ministry communique said that the Rumanian Minister was called in and informed that the Israel Government had proof that Perianu had "most seriously violated diplomatic usage by maintaining contact with Israel citizens in matters affecting the security of the state." Perianu was asked to leave Israel within three days.

Vereş was declared persona non grata by the Communist satellite government on charges of having persuaded Rumanian Jews to migrate to Israel and of having advised them how to leave. The Israeli Charge d'Affaires denied the Rumanian charges and submitted a strong protest about the expulsion order.

The Vereş expulsion was the second in two weeks by a Soviet satellite, Poland having ousted Jacob Barmor, Second Secretary of Israel in Warsaw. It was reported that in view of the generally good Israeli-Polish relations, the Israel Government was not planning to expel any Polish diplomat in retaliation.

"SUMMIT" PARLEY MAY DISCUSS ARAB-ISRAEL CONFLICT, BRITISH MINISTER HINTS

LONDON, July 22. (JTA) -- British Foreign Secretary Selwyn Lloyd, discussing the proposed Big Power summit meeting on the Middle East, indicated in Commons today that the Israeli-Arab conflict may come up for consideration by the leaders of the East and West blocs.

Mr. Lloyd told Parliament that although the discussions would basically concern themselves with Lebanon and Jordan, they would also be involved with "long term objectives in the Middle East." While he said that wider settlements could emerge, he thought it unwise to specify their "exact nature."

The Foreign Secretary emphasized the "great advantages" of a summit meeting in the Security Council as proposed by the West. Among the advantages he listed keeping the matters of immediate concern--Lebanon and Jordan--within the framework of a UN settlement. He noted the UN's already significant role in the area with regard to the Arab-Israeli armistice agreements, its functioning truce supervision organization and the UN Emergency Forces in Gaza and Lebanon.

International Guarantees of Israel-Arab Borders Urged in Commons

Aneurau Bevan, the Labor Party's opposite number to Mr. Lloyd, called for international guarantees of the existing borders of Israel and the Arab states as a means of extending security in the area.

"In this new period," Mr. Bevan asserted, "nothing would give a greater sense of security than if it were found possible in a major settlement for the great powers to guarantee the frontiers of Israel and Israel's neighbors, with such rectification of frontiers that may be mutually agreed. Israel has always been prepared to wipe out certain obvious faults in the drawing of the frontier line."

He added that such guarantees would remove from the area one of the principal sources of contention and give moderate Arab leaders, "who believe Israel was there to stay," an opportunity to answer their followers and move in the direction of peace.

Conservative B. Nafin told Commons that the cause of Middle East unrest was the failure to solve the Arab-Israeli dispute and that there could be no peace or stability in the region until a long-term solution of the problem is found. All of Britain's influence must be concentrated on one objective--finding a solution of the problem which came into existence with the creation of Israel--he said.

Failure to solve the situation, he continued, could well change danger into disaster. He appealed for a special committee of small nations not involved in the Middle East to work out a fair and just solution.

SENATE COMMITTEE APPROVES FORMATION OF PERMANENT U.N. MID-EAST FORCE

WASHINGTON, July 22, (JTA) -- The Senate Foreign Relations Committee unanimously approved today a resolution calling for establishment of a permanent United Nations Emergency police force to keep peace in the Middle East and other trouble zones.

The resolution was sponsored by Sen. John J. Sparkman, Alabama Democrat. It would put both the Senate and House on records favoring emergency police forces under UN auspices as "an important instrument for the maintenance of international peace and security."

DR. GOLDMANN SAYS CURRENT CRISIS MAY LEAD TO MIDDLE EAST STABILIZATION

GENEVA, July 22, (JTA) -- Dr. Nahum Goldmann, world Jewish leader, said today that current developments in the Middle East may lead to stabilization in that area, inasmuch as Russia has been made to realize that the Western Powers have decided to defend their interests there. He called for a guarantee by the Soviet and Western blocs of existing Middle East frontiers and for an arms embargo.

Dr. Goldmann spoke at a press conference preceding the opening tomorrow of the World Jewish Congress five-day parley here which is to be attended by 90 delegates from 60 countries. The major problems which will be discussed at the parley, he announced, will include: 1. Consolidation of Jewish community life in the Soviet Union; 2. The right of North African Jews to emigrate to Israel; 3. Development of a cultural and educational offensive against Jewish assimilation.

Dr. Goldmann stressed that although anti-Semitism still exists in various countries, it does not enjoy official support anywhere. He said that Israel must be considered the spiritual center of world Jewry and the ultimate destination for East European Jewry.

JERUSALEM POLICE RESCUE COMMUNIST PROPAGANDISTS FROM ANGRY CROWD

JERUSALEM, July 22, (JTA) -- The timely arrival of police units today saved a handful of Israeli Communists from a bad beating by a large angry crowd of Israelis near the Parliament building.

The Communists were distributing leaflets attacking Anglo-American "aggression" in the Middle East and criticizing the flights of British planes and troops over Israel to Jordan. Some of the passers-by attempted to seize the throw-aways and a scuffle developed, with only the police preventing more serious trouble.

Premier David Ben Gurion met again today with British Ambassador Sir Francis Russell, presumably about Israel's request that the British end their over-flights. It is understood that British reinforcements are currently being flown to Jordan by a circuitous route--Cyprus to Libya to Aqaba to Jordan.

The Israel public is becoming incensed over the continuing anti-Israel demonstrations of King Jordan of Hussein, whom they believe Israel befriended by allowing British troops to be flown there when he was threatened by a coup. Hussein has made new and bitter anti-Israel speeches and, for the first time in years, Jordanians are being put on trial for listening to Israeli radio broadcasts.

PREMIER OF GHANA SAYS HE AGREES WITH NASSER ON AFRICA, NOT ON PALESTINE

OTTAWA, July 22, (JTA) -- Prime Minister Nkrumah of Ghana, who is currently visiting here, said today that he was in agreement with President Nasser of the United Arab Republic on the latter's African policy but not in the Palestine question. "The Prime Minister was commenting on a recent meeting between himself and the UAR Chief Executive. The Ghanaian leader expressed confidence that there would some day be a solution of the conflict between Israel and the Arab states.

Dr. Nkrumah, who said he intended to "visit Israel shortly and see my good friend Mr. Ben Gurion," expressed satisfaction with the relations between his country and the Jewish State. Economic relations "so far are very good," he said. He reviewed high points in this relationship, including Israeli technical aid to Ghana, the launching of the joint Black Star Line and the exchange of diplomatic envoys.

ISRAEL'S FOREIGN MINISTER TO STAY FOUR DAYS IN PARIS FOR TALKS

PARIS, July 22, (JTA) -- Israel's Foreign Minister Golda Meir, who is due here this week-end for important talks with leaders of the French Government, will remain in Paris four days, it was learned today. She is scheduled to be received by Premier Charles de Gaulle and will also consult with Foreign Minister Maurice Couve de Murville.

Meanwhile, Shimon Peress, director general of the Israel Defense Ministry, is scheduled to leave for Rome tomorrow after a busy round of talks here. He is due in Israel within three or four days.

JEWS WILL BE TOLERATED IN IRAQ IF THEY ARE NOT "ZIONISTS," EMBASSY SAYS

LONDON, July 22. (JTA) -- The Iraq Embassy here, which has pledged loyalty to the new military regime in Baghdad, announced today that Jewish citizens of Iraq had no reason to fear the new regime "provided they have no connection with Israel or Zionism."

The announcement was made by Col. Faik, Chief of the Embassy, following a conference with Harry Goodman, leader of the Agudas Israel in England. "Iraqi Jews are Iraqi citizens," the statement said. "Any Jews who are in possession of Iraqi citizenship will come to no harm under the new regime--as under the previous regime--provided they have no connection with Israel or Zionism."

BONN OFFERS MIDDLE EAST MEDIATION TO PREVENT INVOLVEMENT OF ISRAEL

BONN, July 22. (JTA) -- The West German Government has officially offered its "services" to help relieve tension in the Middle East and prevent the conflagration from spreading to Israel and other countries in the region, it was learned here today following a Bonn Cabinet meeting last night at which Chancellor Konrad Adenauer told his colleagues that West Germany would continue to follow its policy of neutrality in the current crisis.

Earlier yesterday, the elderly Chancellor had conferred with the Ambassadors of the United States, Britain and United Arab Republic in this capital. Only a week ago, Dr. Adenauer, who has remarked that "no matter what happens President Nasser will remain," told newsmen that Germany will keep herself aloof from the Middle East conflict in order to be in a position to carry on conciliation talks with Col. Nasser. He noted that once before, in the Suez-Sinai campaign, Germany "gave the world this service."

Meanwhile, several protest demonstrations scheduled by Arab students in Germany against Anglo-American action in the Middle East have been banned by the Federal police.

Israel Communist Leader Addresses Germans; Assails Ben Gurion

BERLIN, July 22. (JTA) -- The Communist Party of Israel opposes and will continue to fight the policy of the Ben Gurion Government which assists "imperialist" plans and intrigues in the Middle East and thereby threatens the peace and security of the world, Esther Wilenska, Israel Communist deputy, told the fifth national meeting of the Socialist Unity (Communist) Party of East Germany.

Addressing the meeting in the Eastern sector of this city, Miss Wilenska expressed the Israel Communists' solidarity with the "anti-imperialist fight" of all of Israel's Arab neighbors and condemned the Anglo-American intervention in Lebanon and Jordan. She called for a "neutralist" policy for Israel.

She charged that the Ben Gurion Government was attempting to divert the attention of the Israeli people from the government's "bankrupt" domestic and foreign policy through: Attacks on the Arab population of Israel and the Communist Party of Israel; "high-handed" arrests, military courts and "heavy punishments" for innocent people, and threats to outlaw the Communist Party.

Miss Wilenska also struck out at the policy of "collaboration" between the Israel Government and the West German regime which she charged was re-establishing Nazism and militarism.

NAZI COMMANDERS COULD HAVE AVOIDED EXECUTIONS OF JEWS, GERMAN TESTIFIES

ULM, Germany, July 22. (JTA) -- A top German student of events in Hitler Germany, testified here at the trial of ten members of a special SS unit on trial for the mass execution of thousands of Jews and others that there was no life-and-death pressure on SS members to commit executions.

In sharp challenge to defense assertions throughout the three months' course of this trial that the defendants had to murder Jews and Lithuanians or themselves face the firing squad, Prof. Guenther Seraphim, director of the Goettingen Institute of Current History, testified that his extensive studies had not uncovered a single instance where a member of the SS was punished for refusing to carry out an execution order.

Prof. Seraphim cited orders by both Hitler and Heinrich Himmler, head of the Gestapo units that SS members who were too "soft" to execute people were to be transferred to other units. The individual SS members who chose could either volunteer for service at the front or ask for transfer to another unit, rather than act as an executioner, the expert witness said.

PUBLICATION IN BOMBAY TO STRENGTHEN RELATIONS BETWEEN INDIA AND ISRAEL

BOMBAY, India, July 22. (JTA) -- Announcement of the launching of a new publication, "The Indo-Israel Review," dedicated to strengthening understanding and friendly relations between India and Israel was made here at a reception by the Bombay Zionist Association. S. S. Mirajkar, Mayor of Bombay, and M. Pavkas, former Governor of Bombay, were among the prominent guests.

H. Cynowicz, chairman of the Zionist Association, said there was a common bond of understanding between the peoples of the two countries. He said this bond was forged by a common regard for human values.

LOS ANGELES PUBLIC SCHOOLS RE-OPEN ON ROSH HASHANAH; JEWS DISPLEASED

LOS ANGELES, July 22. (JTA) -- The Los Angeles Jewish Community Council said today assurances had been received from the Board of Education that no Jewish child would be penalized for absence on the opening day of the fall public school term which coincides with the first day of Rosh Hashanah.

The statement said that Ellis Jarvis, Superintendent of Schools, and the Board had "earnestly sought" to avoid the conflict but that efforts to change the date of school opening proved unworkable. The Council urged all Jewish children to report on September 11 and 12 for conferences with counselors to facilitate planning of each pupil's class schedule.

Under arrangements worked out between the Board of Education and the Jewish Community Council, no Jewish child is obligated to report on the first two days of Rosh Hashanah. The Council added, however, that Jewish children should report, along with non-Jewish ones, for pre-scheduling and pre-registration. Parents may register children for first school attendance or enroll them in a different school any time after September 1.

Representatives of the Board of Rabbis and of the Community Relations Council expressed "deep regrets" to school officials about the conflict of dates but they refrained from insisting on a change in the school calendar, it was reported, because the Jewish leaders felt such a demand would endanger the Jewish community position opposing religious encroachments on state decisions.

CONFERENCE ON ISRAELI AND ARGENTINE MEDICINE OPENS IN BUENOS AIRES

BUENOS AIRES, July 22. (JTA) -- A symposium on Israeli and Argentine medicine opened here under the chairmanship of Prof. Florencio Escardo, dean of the Buenos Aires Medical School.

Among the first day's speakers at the symposium honoring Israel's tenth anniversary, were: Dr. Hector Noblia, Argentine Minister of Health; Dr. Arieh Kubovi, Israel's Ambassador to Argentina; Dr. Moses Rachmilewitz, dean of the Hadassah-Hebrew University Medical College, and Prof. Escardo, who heads the Council for Argentine-Israeli Culture Exchange's medical committee.

Dr. Rachmilewitz reported that despite political alarms and other obstacles, the medical and social rehabilitation of new immigrants was proceeding apace. He revealed that Oriental diseases which were not previously known in Israel, like bilharzia, the parasitic water-borne disease, have been introduced into the country by immigrants.

ZIONIST CONVENTION IN BRAZIL DECIDES TO STRENGTHEN JEWISH EDUCATION

RIO DE JANEIRO, July 22. (JTA) -- The fifth national convention of the United Zionist Organization, a Brazil-wide federation of Zionist groups of all political hues, adopted today a resolution calling for strengthened Jewish education and pioneering activities in this country. It was also decided to continue the linkage between the United Zionist Organization and the Keren Hayesod, fund-raising arm of the Zionist movement.

Among the delegates to the convention were: 52 representatives of the Mapai; 26 General Zionists; 25 Mapam members; 21 Revisionists; 10 representatives of the United Religious movement (formerly Mizrahi and Poale Mizrahi); seven members of Achdut Avodah, and five independents.

150 JEWISH YOUTHS TO LEAVE ENGLAND FOR ISRAEL SUMMER STUDIES

LONDON, July 22. (JTA) -- The troubled Middle East situation has not changed plans of 150 young people to participate in a Summer-in-Israel program organized by the Hechalutz Department of the Jewish Agency, officials said today.

The 150 young boys and girls, who are between 16 and 18 years of age, will leave next week for a four-week stay during which they will tour Israel and work in kibbutzim.

AMERICAN NAMED EXECUTIVE OF ISRAEL TOURIST CORPORATION

NEW YORK, July 22. (JTA) -- Dr. Abba Abrams, national director of tourism for the American Committee for Israel's 10th Anniversary Celebration, has been appointed executive administrator of the Tourist Industry Development Corporation, Ltd., Lawrence G. Laskey, American chairman of the board of directors, announced today.

The corporation was recently established by the Israel Government to further the development of the tourist industry by granting loans for the building of hotels, motels, Bible Inns and for the modernization and improvement of existing enterprises.

In the past 7 months the corporation enabled 16 motels to add 430 new rooms and helped 19 hotels to carry out considerable improvements. The corporation is encouraging private investments for the development of beaches, seaside resorts, golf links and fishing facilities, to attract and hold tourists.
