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BEN GURION OUTLINES ISRAEL'S POLICY ON SUMMIT PARLEY; VOICES WARNINGS

JERUSALEM, July 29. (JTA) -- If and when a Security Council summit conference on the Middle East takes place and Israel is invited, she will demand that--in line with United Nations Charter provisions--the Arabs meet her face to face for peace talks. Premier David Ben Gurion told the Knesset today.

If Israel is not invited, he underlined, she will not consider herself bound by any decision of the conference. He further warned that any attempt to truncate Israel would "be met with the entire military force of the state." Mr. Ben Gurion's statements came in response to questions by deputies.

"If Israel is invited to the summit she will demand, among other things, that United Nations members in this area be required to comply with the principles of the United Nations Charter, namely, to settle relations with Israel by peaceful means, abstain from economic boycott, from blockading the Suez Canal against Israel shipping, and to put an end to lacitement against Israel's peace and very existence," Mr. Ben Gurion stated. The Premier insisted that the Arab states "should be required to meet Israel face-to-face in order to establish a permanent peace as they undertook in Article I of the armistice agreements."

Asked whether Israel would be willing to propose to the Great Powers that they invite her and Egypt to peace talks, Mr. Ben Gurion said: "There is no Great Power in the West or in the East that is unaware of the fact that we are prepared to sit down with any of our neighbors on the basis of equality and mutuality."

"If the summit conference is held, Israel will not regard herself bound by any decision adopted without her participation and without her consent in any case in which a decision injuriously affects Israel directly or indirectly," Premier Ben Gurion said.

Asked whether there was a danger that decisions at the summit parley might truncate Israel, the Premier replied: "I have no knowledge of such designs. But if such an attempt is made, it will be met with the entire military force of Israel."

Official Israeli sources declined today to comment on newspaper reports to the effect that Israel had asked Moscow to arrange a direct meeting between Premier Ben Gurion of Israel and President Gamal Abdel Nasser of the United Arab Republic.

According to the reports, the request to Moscow was made by Premier Ben Gurion through diplomatic channels. No reply has been received, the reports added. Additional reports circulating in this city assert that Mr. Ben Gurion also asked the USSR to supply Israel with the same arms it was giving the UAR.

ISRAEL SENDS EMISSARY TO PARIS, LONDON, WASHINGTON TO SEEK MODERN ARMS

PARIS, July 29. (JTA) -- Israel Ambassador Yaacov Tsaur conferred today with French Foreign Minister Cote de Marville prior to the latter's departure for Bonn to discuss Middle Eastern issues with the West German Government.

It is understood that Ambassador Tsaur stressed Israel's desire for neutrality and its anxiety for peace. At the same time, it was learned that he asked the French Foreign Minister to see to it that Israel's interests should be protected if and when a summit conference takes place.

France will not present Israel's position to the summit meeting, a Foreign Ministry spokesman said later. However, he expressed the opinion that Israel's stand would be discussed at the Great Power deliberations, as would the problem of borders and relations among the various Middle East states.

Shimon Peres, director general of Israel's Ministry of Defense, is due to arrive here from Jerusalem tomorrow. Later, he will proceed to London and Washington. France Solr, a leading evening paper, reports that Mr. Peres' mission is to obtain arms for Israel in the Western countries in view of the possible arms embargo on the Middle East. If such an embargo is imposed, the paper says, Israel will remain at a disadvantage in relation to the Arab states who have received modern arms from the Soviet Union as well as from the United States.

ISRAEL GOVT. TO REQUEST DEFENSE ARRANGEMENT FROM WESTERN POWERS

LONDON, July 29. (JTA) -- Israel will continue to request of the Western Powers some sort of a defense arrangement in which she might be included along the same lines as the arrangement provided for Turkey, Iran and Pakistan under the Bagdad Pact, it was reported here today following the return of U.S. Secretary of State John Foster Dulles to Washington after having discussed the Middle East situation with members of the Bagdad Pact Council here.

The report said that during yesterday's session of the Council, some of the delegates present warned that Jordan is now in greater danger than Lebanon. They expressed fear that Jordan might collapse and expressed the opinion that this might impel Israel to intervene and bring about a renewal of the Arab-Israel war. They, therefore, favored the maintaining of British troops in Jordan.

The announcement by Mr. Dulles here yesterday pledging the United States to defend Turkey, Iran and Pakistan was interpreted here today as an attempt to avoid interjecting Israel into the present conflict in the Middle East. The belief was expressed that the announcement did not go far enough toward protecting the non-Arab states of the Middle East from aggression.

LORD ATTLEE, BRITISH EX-PREMIER, ATTACKS ISRAEL IN HOUSE OF LORDS

LONDON, July 29. (JTA) -- Lord Attlee, former Labor Prime Minister, voiced anti-Israel sentiments today in the course of a Middle East debate in the House of Lords.

"We can no more support Israeli aggression than we can support Arab attack against Israel," he said. He held Israel responsible as one of the stimuli to Arab nationalism. In a reference to the proposed summit conference, Lord objected to New York as the site of the parley. "One has a memory of past controversies, the massed press, and one of the largest Jewish communities in the world," he stated.

Lord Stansgate, former president of the Inter Parliamentary Union, took issue with Lord Attlee, asserting that "one of the glories of British policy" was the founding of the Jewish national home. He criticized Israel's omission from the Bagdad Pact, noting that this made her position even more difficult. Lord Silkin, a Jew, appealed for an Arab-Israel settlement and underlined Britain's "sacred obligation" to see to it that Israel is allowed to live.

SEN. FLANDERS ASSAILS ISRAEL IN SENATE; IS RETIRING FROM CONGRESS

WASHINGTON, July 29. (JTA) -- Sen. Ralph E. Flanders, Republican, who is retiring from the Senate this session, today made a slashing attack on the State of Israel.

The Vermont Senator said that until the United States recognizes that Israel is the main problem undermining the peace of the Arab world, "we will continue to lose our influence and Western Europe's future of freedom and prosperity will be increasingly jeopardized."

The "vital concern" of the Arabs is an expanding Israel, he asserted. "The obvious overhanging threat of danger in the Middle East is presented by the growing strength and expansion of the new nation of Israel," he added.

He alleged that Israel "long ago completed the justifiable function" of providing a refuge for Jews actually displaced by persecution. He said that the plight of thousands of uprooted Arabs removed from their homes in Israel "is what the whole Arab world knows and sees." The Senator quoted approvingly an article condemning Israel by the late Iraqi Premier Nuri es-Said.

LEADING CATHOLIC ORGAN SAYS ISRAEL IS IN PERIL; ASKS FOR U. N. ACTION

WASHINGTON, July 29. (JTA) -- A leading national Catholic Weekly, "The Register," warned today that seizure of Lebanon by pro-Nasser elements would be "especially helpful to the United Arab Republic in its drive to eliminate the State of Israel."

A warning was voiced by the paper that Israel was in peril and that "unless courageous UN action is forthcoming the little republic, an outpost of tolerance and decency in the Near East, seems doomed." The national circulation of the magazine is over 1,000,000.

The Register cited a view of a Near Eastern Catholic that American intervention against Israel, Britain, and France "two years ago, at the time of the Suez Crisis, was a grave blunder." The paper said "the lot of Christians in Egypt, never good, has become almost intolerable since the advent of Nasser in 1952. Under social and economic pressures, numbers of native Christians have defected to Islamism."

U. N. BCDY RECOMMENDS EXPANDED PROGRAM OF TECHNICAL AID IN 1959

GENEVA, July 29. (JTA) -- The Technical Assistance Committee of the Economic and Social Council today approved a resolution expressing hope that the United Nations expanded program of technical assistance in 1959 would run at a moderately higher level than for the current year.

ISRAEL INFANTRY OFFICERS TO COME TO U.S. FOR WARFARE TRAINING TOUR

TEL AVIV, July 29. (JTA) -- A party of senior Israeli infantry officers is scheduled to leave this week on a training tour of the United States, Britain and France to acquaint themselves in the newest methods of infantry warfare training. The officers, headed by Col. Isachar Shadmi, assistant chief of the army's training division, will introduce the latest Western training methods to Israeli foot soldiers.

An Israeli helicopter on a mission of mercy made a forced landing on a United States Navy carrier in the Mediterranean Sea this morning when it ran out of fuel. The Israeli plane was heading for the Israeli freighter Negbah which had a seriously injured seaman aboard. The helicopter was refueled by the carrier, took off and landed next to the freighter, some 20 miles from shore. It took the patient aboard and returned safely to this city where the seaman, with a fractured skull, was hospitalized.

U. N. REPORT FIXES BLAME ON JORDAN FOR KILLING CHIEF OF ARMISTICE BODY

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y., July 29. (JTA) -- Lt. Col. George A. Flint, chairman of the Israel-Jordan Mixed Armistice Commission, who was killed in a battle on Mt. Scopus May 28, "was shot by a bullet fired from Jordanian controlled territory." After two months of investigation, this fact was formally established today by a report received from Maj. Gen. Carl v. von Horn, Chief of Staff of the United Nations Truce Supervision Organization in Palestine.

The report, circulated to the members of the Security Council by Secretary General Dag Hammarskjold, also blames Israel for contributing to possible "further incidents and aggravations" by limiting use of a road on Mt. Scopus leading from the Arab village of Issawiya to the Jordanian sector of Jerusalem.

Gen. von Horn's earlier report on the Mt. Scopus incident, dated last June 7, had supported an Israeli claim that Jordanians were responsible for Col. Flint's death only to the extent of stating Jordanian blame was "probable." Today's report, however, establishes, on the basis of tests conducted at the State Criminalistics Institute of Stockholm, Sweden, that Jordanian responsibility is definite.

According to Gen. von Horn, the bullet that killed the Canadian officer had been fired from a Lee-Enfield rifle and at least one of the four Israeli policemen also killed in the incident "was shot by a bullet fired by another rifle of the same type."

MEETING OF SMALL ZIONIST ACTIONS COMMITTEE POSTPONED INDEFINITELY

TEL AVIV, July 29. (JTA) -- Dr. Nahum Goldmann, president of the Jewish Agency, arrived here today for a week's stay during which he will preside over a meeting of the Agency executive.

Meanwhile, a meeting of the small Zionist Actions Committee, policy-making body of the world Zionist movement between congresses, which was scheduled to be held here Sunday has been postponed indefinitely on account of Middle East developments.

At the airport, Dr. Goldmann expressed the view that Israel was not facing an immediate military danger, but that the situation might change and that the entire Jewish situation must unite to forestall such peril for the Jewish State. Commenting on the meeting of the World Jewish Congress executive in Geneva, from which he had come here, the WJC president voiced the hope that Polish Jewry would soon affiliate with the Congress, as Hungarian Jewry had.

SENATE DEFEATS BILL FOR TWO-YEAR STUDY OF HUMANE SLAUGHTER

WASHINGTON, July 29. (JTA) -- Chairman Allen J. Ellender of the Senate Agriculture Committee today cited Jewish Orthodox religious opposition to a House-approved humane slaughter bill when an attempt was made on the Senate floor to substitute the House bill for one recommended by Sen. Ellender's committee.

The Senate took up the committee's milder bill which calls for a two-year study. Advocates of the House bill moved to substitute the stronger measure. This is the bill opposed by Orthodox Jewry.

Speaking against the House-approved bill urged by Sen. Hubert H. Humphrey, Minnesota Democrat, and 18 others, Sen. Ellender said an opinion was expressed before his committee by religious Jews that the House bill would "invade" Jewish religious rites.

In response, Sen. Humphrey and Sen. Richard Neuberger, Oregon Democrat, cited provisions they said adequately protected Jewish religious slaughtering methods.

A Louisiana Democrat, Sen. Ellender, said the House bill is inefficient and undesirable. He urged adoption of his committee's bill providing a long study to decide on humane slaughter legislation.

By a roll call vote of 43 to 40, the Senate rejected the Agriculture Committee's study bill. The Senate then started to discuss amendments to the controversial House bill.

JEWISH CONGRESS TESTIFIES AGAINST STATE DEPT. PASSPORT PROPOSAL

WASHINGTON, July 29. (JTA) -- The American Jewish Congress today criticized Administration proposals which would make "the exercise of the right to a passport" dependent upon the "largesse" of the Secretary of State and questioned State Department restrictions on travel to Israel after the Sinai war.

Testifying today before the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, Sanford H. Bolz, Washington counsel of the American Jewish Congress, expressed disapproval of the Administration's efforts to make passports an accessory of foreign relations.

In the statement submitted by Mr. Bolz, criticism was aimed at the State Department for denying passports for travel to Israel in 1957 "long past the time when disorder had ceased." He said this ban on passports to Israel was allowed to operate "as a form of economic sanction or pressure upon Israel sorely in need of the springtime Passover and Easter tourist traffic."

MOSES LEAVITT, J. D. C. LEADER, LEAVES ON WORLD-WIDE REFUGEE STUDY

NEW YORK, July 29. (JTA) -- Moses A. Leavitt, executive vice-chairman of the Joint Distribution Committee, left the United States on a world-wide survey of current refugee needs. Mr. Leavitt, a recognized authority on refugee aid, is a former chairman and now honorary chairman of the American Council of Voluntary Agencies for Foreign Service.

The JDC leader's mission will include an assessment of refugee programs on behalf of Jewish migrants in Europe and Israel and the absorption of newcomers by the Jewish community of Australia, as well as an inspection of general refugee conditions in Hong Kong and other areas. Mr. Leavitt will also attend the JDC country directors' conference to be held in Geneva later this year.

On his survey, the welfare leader expects to meet with government personnel, leaders of voluntary agencies and officials of various Jewish communities. Upon his return he will report his findings to the officers and directors of the JDC and of the United Jewish Appeal, from which JDC receives the bulk of its funds.

INTERNATIONAL PARLEY OF HEBREW TEACHERS DECIDES TO FORM WORLD BODY

JERUSALEM, July 29. (JTA) -- A proposal to form a world organization of teachers of Hebrew was approved here today at an international conference of Hebrew school teachers with 350 delegates from all parts of the world in attendance.

The proposal was put to the parley after a report by Dr. Shimon Pollack, president of the American Hebrew Teachers Association, which pointed out that the general low socio-economic status of the profession had failed to attract young people. As a result, Dr. Pollack said, there was now a serious shortage of Hebrew teachers.

Moshe Sharett, former Premier of Israel, addressed the final session on the role of Eliezer Ben Yehuda, Hebrew lexicographer and pioneer of the development of modern Hebrew culture.

CORNERSTONE FOR AMERICAN STUDENT HOUSE LAID AT HEBREW UNIVERSITY

JERUSALEM, July 29. (JTA) -- As American and Israeli dignitaries looked on, the cornerstone for an American student center at the Hebrew University in Jerusalem was laid at an academic convocation today. The \$400,000 building will serve as a dormitory and recreation-study center for students from the Jewish Theological Seminary of America spending a required year of study in Israel.

Premier David Ben Gurion told the gathering that no rabbi or teacher can faithfully fulfill his task unless he stays at least a year in Israel. He witnessed the conferring of an honorary Doctorate of Laws on Maryland Governor Theodore McKeldin. Gov. McKeldin is also president of the America-Israel Society which contributed the \$400,000 for the construction of the dormitory. Also honored, with a Doctorate of Hebrew Letters, was Zalman Shazar, member of the Jewish Agency executive.

FIRST ISSUE OF "INDO-ISRAEL REVIEW" APPEARS IN INDIA; STRESSES EXCHANGE

NEW DELHI, July 29. (JTA) -- "India has much to offer Israel in the way of raw materials, food, etc. Israel in her turn has much to offer India by way of scientific knowledge and technical personnel, so necessary for the industrial development of India," according to the "Indo-Israel Review" a new publication which made its appearance today.

"An exchange of cultural missions, technical missions, trade delegations etc., will be of mutual benefit to the two countries. The lessons in the experiment in socialism which has been so successful in Israel, will also be of great help to India at the present juncture," the paper stresses in its leading article.

Israel's Foreign Minister, Mrs. Golda Meir, in a message, wrote: "I understand that your publication will be dedicated to the fostering of an understanding and friendship between India and Israel by spreading knowledge of the history, culture and ideals of both countries."
