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DULLES TO PROPOSE TODAY ESTABLISHMENT OF U. N. PEACE FORCE FOR MID-EAST

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y., Sept. 17. (JTA) -- Creation of a stand-by United Nations peace force and establishment of a regional economic development agency to aid the Arab states will be among the proposals to be made to the General Assembly here tomorrow by Secretary of State John Foster Dulles.

As Mr. Dulles, the first Big Power Foreign Minister to address the Assembly this year, was drafting his speech today, American sources here revealed some of the subjects that are "likely" to be raised in Mr. Dulles' policy address. An American spokesman said that the Secretary will refer to some of the proposals laid before the recent emergency session of the Assembly, dealing with the Middle East crisis, by President Eisenhower on Aug. 13:

The idea of a stand-by UN peace force appears to be high on America's plans in regard to the Middle East at this time. It was indicated clearly that Mr. Eisenhower's suggestion for the regional economic development plan to assist the Arab nations will also be revived by Mr. Dulles. However, it was implied that Mr. Dulles would probably not mention President Eisenhower's earlier suggestion that the Assembly take steps to "avoid a new arms race spiral" in the Middle East.

Mr. Dulles conferred today for the second successive day with Britain's Foreign Minister Selwyn Lloyd, and a British spokesman confirmed reports that the stand-by peace proposal was one subject discussed by them. A clue to the subject of yesterday's conference was provided by the fact that Mr. Dulles was accompanied by William M. Rountree, his Assistant Secretary for Near Eastern Affairs.

Andrei A. Gromyko, Foreign Minister of the Soviet Union, will address the Assembly tomorrow afternoon, while Mr. Lloyd is slated to voice next week his government's foreign policy as it affects the United Nations.

Mrs. Golda Meir, Israel's Foreign Minister, is expected here Friday. She is certain to meet with many Foreign Ministers during her stay here. This year, the Assembly is attended by the largest number of high government officials ever gathered here--three Prime Ministers, 52 Foreign Ministers, and seven other government leaders of Ministerial rank.

State Department Official Stresses Urgent Need for U. N. Peace Force

The importance which the United States attaches to the idea of United Nations peace force was emphasized by Francis C. Wilcox, Assistant Secretary of State. Addressing a meeting of the American Association for the United Nations, he said:

"I hope that the session of the UN General Assembly will be able to take additional action to further the objectives of the program outlined by the President. The Assembly should give urgent consideration to steps looking toward the creation of a United Nations stand-by peace force. Such a force could make a substantial contributor to the strengthening of the United Nations machinery for peaceful settlement of international disputes."

Mr. Wilcox also emphasized that part of the Arab resolution adopted by the special UN Assembly session which affect Israel's security--without, however, mentioning Israel. Mr. Wilcox said of the Arab resolution that among the important propositions in that measure, adopted by all members of UN, was that "they agreed that all members of the United Nations should act strictly in accordance with the principles of mutual respect for the territorial integrity and sovereignty of other states, of non-aggression, and of strict non-interference in each others internal affairs."

"The United States," continued Mr. Wilcox, "welcomes and supports the initiative of the Arab states in developing this formula. Scrupulously respected, such a formula could offer bright prospects for the future of the Middle East. It could be the harbinger of a new era."

But Mr. Wilcox virtually challenged the Arab states to implement the formula, saying "I would be less than candid, however, if I did not remind you that concrete deeds are far more convincing than resolutions--even those that are approved by unanimous vote. It remains to be seen whether the Arab states will justify the vote of confidence given them by the General Assembly and will work out their problems in a spirit of mutual cooperation and goodwill."

ISRAEL'S CHIEF OF STAFF SAYS ARMY IS ALWAYS ALERT FOR POSSIBLE WAR

JERUSALEM, Sept. 17. (JTA) -- Brig. Chaim Laskov, Chief of Staff of the Israel armed forces, told a meeting of military correspondents that Israel was building a military training center in the Negev which would contribute to the security of the Negev and at the same time help to populate it.

Declaring that the Israel Army is always on the alert and ready for any war that might break out, the Chief of Staff said that while another encounter with the Arabs would be more difficult than was the Sinai campaign, he was certain that the Israel army would win.

SYRIAN BOAT INTERCEPTED BY ISRAEL; BROUGHT INTO HAIFA HARBOR

TEL AVIV, Sept. 17. (JTA) -- A Syrian boat of 150 tons was intercepted by an Israel coastal patrol boat in Israel territorial waters near Ashkelon during Rosh Hashanah, officials reported today. The boat was brought by tug into Haifa harbor and the crew placed under surveillance. It was believed the boat was en route from Gaza towards Beirut.

A 16-year-old Arab youth from a border village in the Little Triangle has been arrested on suspicion of espionage, it was reported today. The arrest was made following the imprisonment of an Arab alleged spy group in Israel last July. The entire group is awaiting trial for which a date remains to be set. The youth's name was withheld.

JORDAN DENIES ENTRANCE TO JEWISH MEMBER OF BRITISH PARLIAMENT

LONDON, Sept. 17. (JTA) -- Sidney Silverman, a British Labor M. P., was denied permission to enter Jordan from Israel for the purpose of visiting British troops stationed in the Hashemite kingdom, the Times of London reported from Jerusalem.

The Times report declared that Mr. Silverman was barred because of Jordan's rule against the entrance of Jewish visitors. Mr. Silverman, on whose behalf the British Ambassador in Amman intervened, had not known of Jordan's rule, the Times dispatch said.

ISRAEL AND TWO ASIAN SHIPPING LINES TO ESTABLISH LONGEST ROUTE

JERUSALEM, Sept. 17. (JTA) -- One of the longest regular shipping routes in the world will be opened by Israel's Zim Shoham Company in partnership with two Asian shipping companies soon, it was announced today.

The new line is being established in cooperation with the Gold Star Company and the Black Star Company of Ghana, both of which the Israeli company is a partner. The new service will carry African raw materials to America, American products to Israel and Israel products to the Far East. Four ships are scheduled to be chartered by the company in the first stage of the new service.

Officials of the Black Star Company, who spent two weeks in Israel, reported plans to buy a new ship in Israel to be added to the company's fleet.

SOVIET CANCELS PILGRIMAGE OF CHASSIDIM TO GRAVE OF BRATZLAVER RABBI

JERUSALEM, Sept. 17. (JTA) -- Ten Bratzlaver chassidim, who had completed all the formalities for a pilgrimage to the grave of Rabbi Nachman Bratzlaver, one of the founders of the Chassidic movement, at Uman in the Ukraine, had their hopes dashed at the last minute. The Soviet Embassy in Tel Aviv, which originally promised to grant them visas, informed them today that Uman is not included on the itinerary of foreign visitors to the USSR.

The chassidim had applied for permission to undertake the tour in time for Rosh Hashanah and, when permission did not come, had hoped to make the trip by Yom Kippur. The Israel Treasury had allocated them \$300 each in foreign currency to defray the expenses of their pilgrimage.

7,000 JEWS AIDED BY UNITED HIAS TO MIGRATE TO UNITED STATES, AUSTRALIA

PARIS, Sept. 17. (JTA) -- The United Hias Service assisted 7,000 Jews from European and North African countries to migrate to countries other than Israel during the past Jewish year, it was announced here by Harold Traube, director of United Hias.

The largest number of immigrants, 1,700, went to the United States, he revealed, while more than 1,500 settled in Australia. The movement to Australia, he reported, had become particularly important and, in the past eight months, had outstripped immigration to the United States.

JEWISH LEADER IN MOROCCO DECORATED FOR WAR VETERAN ACTIVITIES

CASABLANCA, Sept. 17. (JTA) -- Jacques Garcon, vice chairman of the OSE Committee of Morocco, has been awarded the Medaille Militaire for his activities as vice chairman of the Association of War Veterans in Morocco.

SO. AFRICA'S NEW PREMIER PLEDGES FRIENDLY POLICY TOWARDS JEWRY

JOHANNESBURG, Sept. 17. (JTA) -- The Jewish community of South Africa had assurance today from the new Premier, Dr. Hendrik Verwoerd, that he would pursue the same sympathetic policy toward South African Jewry and Israel as did his predecessors, Dr. Daniel Malan and Johannes G. Strijdom.

The new Premier made his statement to the Johannesburg daily, Die Vaterland, which made the statement its main page one story under the headline, "The Premier on His Jewish Policy." The newspaper asked the Premier for the statement after publication of a report in an Israel daily alleging that South African Jews feared the new Premier would introduce an anti-Semitic policy and place restrictions on South African Jewry's aid to Israel.

The report was denounced by Max Melamet, chairman of the Capetown section of the Board of Jewish Deputies, as "nonsense," when he was asked for comment by the Capetown Nationalist newspaper, Die Burger.

"This is the sort of unfounded and nonsensical comment overseas concerning which the Government is justified in complaining," the Jewish leader said. "Similar comment also was made about Malan and Strijdom, although the truth was that their attitude toward the Jewish community was friendly and highly appreciated by the Jewish community. We know of no reason for it to be different under Premier Verwoerd."

Israel Dunsky, chairman of the Zionist Federation of South Africa, in a letter to the Premier, extended his "heartiest congratulations and best wishes" upon his accession as the sixth Premier to the Union. "May South Africa under your leadership continue to go from strength to strength and enjoy peace and prosperity," Mr. Dunsky wrote.

JEWS THROUGHOUT WORLD CELEBRATE ROSH HASHANAH; GREETED BY STATESMEN

BONN, Sept. 17. (JTA) -- Leading German political personalities greeted the Jews of Germany on the occasion of Rosh Hashanah. Heading the list was Bonn President Theodor Heuss, who singled out for special congratulatory mention the Leo Baeck Institute which has undertaken a project to record the history of German Jewry.

Chancellor Konrad Adenauer, in his message to the Jews on the High Holy Days, expressed the hope that "the shadows of the past" would soon be forgotten. Similar sentiments were voiced by members of the Federal Cabinet and leaders of provincial governments.

BERLIN, Sept. 17. (JTA) -- Willy Brandt, Mayor of Berlin, and president of the Upper House of the West German Parliament, congratulating German Jewry on the occasion of the New Year, expressed the hope that understanding and cooperation between the Jews and the German people would grow "better and deeper."

BUENOS AIRES, Sept. 17. (JTA) -- President Arturo Frondizi of Argentina, in a holiday message to the DAIA, central representative body of Argentine Jewry, sent his best wishes and "fraternal greetings" to the Jews of this country "whose contribution to the spiritual and material progress of Argentina has made itself felt on every level of the nation's life." The message emphasized that Argentina "rejects prejudice and racial discrimination, offering equal opportunities to all human beings."

RIO DE JANEIRO, Sept. 17. (JTA) -- In a special message greeting the Jews of Brazil on the occasion of Rosh Hashanah, Brazil's President Juscelino Kubitschek praised the "hard working Jewish community." His message was addressed to the Federation of Jewish Institutions in this city.

CANBERRA, Sept. 17. (JTA) -- The Prime Minister of Australia, Robert G. Menzies, issued a special New Year's message to the Jews of this country, greeting them on the occasion of Rosh Hashanah.

JERUSALEM, Sept. 17. (JTA) -- Rosh Hashanah greetings from the Moscow Chief Rabbi and from heads of communities in Rumania, Bulgaria, Czechoslovakia and Poland, were received here by the office of the Chief Rabbinate of Israel. The greetings from Moscow arrived Tuesday night, having been apparently delayed.

LONDON, Sept. 17. (JTA) -- British Chief Rabbi Israel Brodie presented his Rosh Hashanah message and a special talk on the holiday over the British Broadcasting Corporation's facilities. In his message to the Jews, the Chief Rabbi expressed the hope that the coming year would bring "good tidings of the spiritual, cultural and social advancements of all communities which together constitute Jewry."

PARIS, Sept. 17. (JTA) -- Rabbi Emil Leipziger of New Orleans conducted special Rosh Hashanah services in the Rue Copernic Synagogue here for some 300 American and British residents and tourists. This is the third successive year that English-language High Holiday services have been conducted in Paris under the auspices of the World Union for Progressive Judaism.

PRIVATE FUNERAL HELD FOR MRS. WARBURG; JEWISH ORGANIZATIONS MOURN

NEW YORK, Sept. 17. (JTA) -- A private funeral was held today for Mrs. Frieda Schiff Warburg, one of the outstanding philanthropist and welfare leaders in this country, who died Monday at the age of 82.

Statements eulogizing Mrs. Warburg, widow of the late Jewish leader and philanthropist Felix M. Warburg and daughter of the late Jacob M. Schiff, were issued by major Jewish organizations in which she was active and to which she had made generous contributions during her lifetime. Messages of condolence were also received by the family from Israel.

Among Mrs. Warburg's many contributions were: The former Warburg home on Fifth Avenue which now houses the Jewish Museum; a \$100,000 fund given to the Hebrew University in Jerusalem in 1949 in memory of the late Dr. Judah L. Magnes for medical fellowships at the Hebrew University-Hadassah Hospital; a \$500,000 fund to support the Visiting Nurse Service of New York; and many very large gifts to the Joint Distribution Committee, the United Jewish Appeal and other Jewish organizations, concerned with overseas aid.

One of her larger contributions was made in February, 1951, to the United Jewish Appeal, when in addition to her regular gift of \$150,000 she added \$500,000 to be used for housing and education for new immigrants in Israel. She also contributed large sums to the Federation of Jewish Philanthropies of New York City, to Young Women's and Young Men's Hebrew Associations, and many other civic and charitable causes. Edward M. M. Warburg, chairman of the Joint Distribution Committee, is one of her surviving sons.

The United Jewish Appeal said in its message: "Frieda Schiff Warburg gave splendid expression to her love for her fellow-Americans and her fellowmen everywhere. Her never ceasing efforts to lift up Europe's distressed and shattered Jews; and to rescue and restore refugee newcomers to this country and to Israel marked her as a true mother in Israel. The United Jewish Appeal knew her as one of its great benefactors, and as an honorary chairman in many of its campaigns."

The Joint Distribution Committee, of which Mrs. Warburg was honorary chairman, stated: "Until her husband's death, she served with tireless and inspiring devotion side by side with him in the cause of aiding the needy, particularly distressed Jews overseas; after her husband's death, she continued her efforts in the tradition of philanthropy and humanitarianism which both her husband and her father represented. For more than 40 years we of the Joint Distribution Committee had the benefit of her wise counsel, her deep interest and great understanding; they will be sorely missed."

The Federation of Jewish Philanthropies said: "The beloved and revered Frieda Schiff Warburg lives on in the countless things she touched with her wisdom, generosity, grace and warmth. She inherited a rich tradition of philanthropy from her parents; gave it new meaning, beauty and spirit, and in turn passed it on to her children and theirs. She walked side by side with her late husband, the great Felix M. Warburg, a founder and the first president of the Federation in helping to create in 1917 this network of medical and welfare agencies to serve as New York Jewry's organized philanthropic expression. The millions whose lives have been benefited during these past four decades owe her a great debt of gratitude. She gave her inspiration and leadership to the activities of many Federation institutions on whose boards she served, and she was a founder of our Women's Division and one of its guiding spirits throughout the years. She will be deeply missed but never forgotten."

The American Jewish Committee declared: "For more than half a century, together with her eminent father, her distinguished husband and her communally minded sons and daughter, she was exemplary in her devotion and service to the cause which the American Jewish Committee espouses. She leaves an indelible imprint on the philanthropic horizon of America."

The Jewish Agency for Israel, expressing its "profound sorrow and regret" at the passing of Mrs. Schiff, said: "She devoted her lifetime to the service of her fellow-man and particularly to the upbuilding of Israel as a haven for oppressed and downtrodden Jews. Her many benefactions and services in Israel will enshrine her noble name in the history of the Jewish people."

The National Board of Hadassah, emphasizing that Mrs. Warburg served unceasingly in behalf of Jewish causes in this country and abroad, stated: "She did much toward easing the manifold tasks of Youth Aliyah for the rescue of Jewish children from persecution in European and North African countries, and their rehabilitation in Palestine and Israel. And her deep interest in advancing medical science in Israel manifested itself in the creation of the Magnes-Warburg Fellowship Fund to enable physicians and scientists of the Hebrew University-Hadassah Medical School to pursue post graduate studies in the United States. Her great humanitarian spirit was an inspiration to all who knew her."

Messages of condolence were sent also by: American Technion Society, American Friends of the Hebrew University, Palestine Economic Corporation and a host of other organizations and institutions.
