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F. B. I. REPORTEDLY EXPECTS TO SOLVE ATLANTA CASE WITHIN 24 HOURS

ATLANTA, Ga., Oct. 16. (JTA) -- Atlanta police and the FBI continued today their 'round the clock hunt for the bombers of the synagogue here. A major break in the case appeared imminent. Reliable sources said the FBI expected to solve the case within the next 24 hours. FBI agents here refused to comment on the report.

Police said they were looking for a sixth man for questioning. They indicated that many of their findings had involved persons in cities other than Atlanta. The police were especially interested in investigating a man, described as once prominent in public affairs, as the possible "angel" financing the anti-Semitic terrorists.

Meanwhile, the police here were today ordered to show cause by 10 A.M. tomorrow why four of five men held in the bombing of The Temple should not be released. The court order was signed by County Superior Court Judge V. B. Moore. The four are George Bright, Luther Corley, Kenneth Griffin, and Robert Bowling. A fifth man, Wallace H. Allen, is held on a charge of dynamiting a building.

Morton L. Weiss, president of the Atlanta Jewish Community Council, today issued a statement -- the first by Atlanta Jewry since the synagogue bombing -- declaring that 'the spontaneous response from all segments of our community in an outpouring of generosity of spirit and heart, is a magnificent demonstration of sympathetic understanding and goodwill.'

"It is an encouraging manifestation of our faith in the reality of good community relationships in Atlanta," the statement continued. "We have complete confidence in the efforts of our city and state officials and the law enforcement agencies of our community with the helpful participation of the FBI of tracking down those guilty of the heinous crime and bringing them to justice."

The statement, which was issued following a meeting of the assembly of the Jewish Community Council, added: "We desire to point out that our job is not done with mere expressions of shock and sympathy. We must rededicate ourselves to do all we can to root out from our midst intolerance bigotry and hatred. The task will not be completed until we realize that goal."

Teams of Atlanta police and FBI agents armed with search warrants today raided a number of homes and seized quantities of anti-Jewish literature, swastikas, and correspondence. A police official said a network was closing in on the group responsible for the temple bombing. Confiscated anti-Semitic material was removed to police headquarters.

(In New York police today arrested a suspected member of the "Confederate Underground" in a 42nd Street moving picture theater after he had made a threatening call to the national headquarters of the Anti-Defamation League of B'nai B'rith. Robert D. McNamara, 19, had said in a telephone threat to the ADL that "New York is next." He apparently referred to cities where anti-Jewish bombings are planned. McNamara has a record of anti-Semitic activity, according to files in Washington.

(In Minneapolis, police reported today that a large rock smashed the window of Sh'ar'it Israel Synagogue here. It was presumed that anti-Semitism was the reason for the vandalism. Police are investigating and maintaining surveillance.)

FATE OF SOVIET JEWS IS OF UTMOST CONCERN TO WORLD JEWRY, GOLDMANN SAYS

JERUSALEM, Oct. 16. (JTA) -- Except for the strengthening of Israel, the most serious concern of the Zionist movement at present is the fate of Soviet Jewry, Dr. Nahum Goldmann declared here in an address to the Small Zionist Actions Committee.

Dr. Goldmann told the Actions Committee that an increase in the Israel immigration quota has been decided on as a result of unexpected, unheralded and unnegotiated emigration from East European countries. He added that while some changes were evident in the Soviet satellites, in the Soviet Union itself, the situation of the Jews was unchanged. He said that the Soviet leaders had evinced some sensitivity to criticism from non-Jewish quarters on Soviet policies toward its Jewish population.

ISRAEL MILITARY TRIBUNAL SENTENCES EIGHT POLICEMEN FOR KILLING ARABS

JERUSALEM, Oct. 16. (JTA) -- A military tribunal today sentenced eight Israel border policemen to prison terms ranging from seven to 17 years in the killing of 43 Arab villagers two years ago. The villagers, residents of Kafr Kassem, were killed on the eve of Israel's Sinai campaign. The sentencing wound up a trial which lasted almost the entire two years.

The court also stripped all officers among the defendants of their rank, demoting them to privates. It sentenced Major Shmuel Malinki to 17 years; Lt. Gabriel Dehan and Lance Cpl. Shalom Offer received 15 year terms; Gavriel Ulliel and Edmond Nachmani--both corporals--and Makhlu Karoush, Eliyahu Avraham and Albert Pahims--all privates--were sentenced to seven year terms.

Major Malinki, who was blamed for the tragedy by Army Col. Issachar Shadmi, is 44. Major Malinki has been in uniform for 22 years since the Haganah period. Lt. Dehan, originally from Morocco, had a brilliant record in the War of Liberation and in anti-fedayeen action. Cpl. Offer, 27, was born in Tel Aviv. Cpl. Ulliel, 27, was born in Algiers. Private Karoush, 24, is from Morocco, and Private Avraham, 23, is from Rumania. Private Pahims, 22, and Cpl. Nachmani, 25, are both from Morocco.

Before stating the sentence, prosecutor Colin Gillon cited the unblemished service records of the defendants, in explaining why he had not asked the maximum sentence of life imprisonment. He noted also that the defendants had been in custody for almost two years.

During the trial, the tribunal had sharply criticized Col. Shadmi, who had been a prosecution witness, calling his order "manifestly illegal." It is understood that army authorities are analyzing the judgment on Col. Shadmi in an effort to determine his future status.

Defense attorneys for the eight policemen presented character witnesses to the military tribunal as part of a defense plea for mitigation in advance of sentencing. The defense also cited the fact that a "Sulha,"--the traditional Arab ceremony of reconciliation--had been held in Kafr Kassem in which the injured parties forgave the offenders.

It was also noted that compensation of more than 500,000 pounds has been paid to families of the victims. The wounded and incapacitated among the villagers also received full hospital treatment and were given a lump sum of 300 pounds above monthly disability compensation, plus a substantial insurance program.

BEN GURION ASKS YOUNG WOMEN TO JOIN ISRAEL'S SOLDIER-FARMER CORPS

JERUSALEM, Oct. 16. (JTA) -- Premier David Ben Gurion called last night on more young women of Israel to join Nahal, the army's soldier-farmer corps. Addressing the fourth Nahal national rally, the Premier said that only half as many girls as young men joined the corps, which is stationed in Israel's border areas in new settlement. He called this an "untenable" situation.

The corps' commander, Col. Itamar Ben Barak, told the rally that a number of foreign nations are studying Nahal's structure with an eye to introducing similar units. These countries, he said, include Burma, Ghana, Liberia and the Philippines.

ISRAEL OFFICIAL LEAVES FOR MOSCOW TO STUDY SOVIET HEALTH SYSTEM

JERUSALEM, Oct. 16. (JTA) -- Y. Btesh, director general of the Israel Ministry of Health, left today for Moscow where he will spend ten days studying Soviet health facilities.

Last night, Minister of Health Israel Barzilai announced that a regular exchange of information on health matters would be instituted between the USSR and Israel. He made his announcement in a report to the National Health Council of Israel on his recent visit to Warsaw as a guest of the Polish Government.

GOLDA MEIR HONORED AT CANADIAN GOVERNMENT LUNCHEON IN OTTAWA

OTTAWA, Oct. 16. (JTA) -- Mrs. Golda Meir, Israel's Foreign Minister, was honored today at a Canadian Government luncheon. Yesterday, she was welcomed to Canada by the Governor General, Prime Minister John Diefenbaker and Minister for External Affairs Sidney Smith. This afternoon Mrs. Meir conferred with a party of 62 national Jewish leaders headed by Samuel Bronfman, president of the Canadian Jewish Congress.

ISRAEL TO UNDERTAKE COTTON GROWING RESEARCH FOR UNITED STATES

WASHINGTON, Oct. 16. (JTA) -- The United States Department of Agriculture and the Israel Government's Institute of Fibres and Forest Products today signed a contract for cotton research to be done in Israel. The program to be financed with 236,000 Israeli pounds obtained by the U.S. Government for the sale of surplus U.S. agricultural products to Israel, is designed to improve cotton growing in both countries.

BRITISH JEWS INTERVENE WITH RUMANIAN MINISTER ON JEWISH EMIGRATION

LONDON, Oct. 16, (JTA) -- A delegation from the Board of Deputies of British Jews called on the Rumanian Minister to London to discuss lowering of emigration barriers in Rumania for Israel-bound Jews, the Board's foreign affairs committee reported here today.

During the meeting, the Board delegates stressed the humanitarian aspects of re-uniting families divided between Israel and Rumania when the Bucharest Government suddenly clamped a lid on Jewish emigration some years back. The Board also raised the question of Rumanian Zionist leaders who, following their release from prison several years ago, were promised permission to leave for Israel but still have not been provided with the necessary exit documents.

The foreign affairs committee's announcement said that it received reports from abroad that some 1,800 Jews have been allowed to quit Rumania for Israel. On the other hand, these reports speak of many new arrests among Rumanian Jews. Pending clarification of the picture, the Board has decided to hold up further action.

The Board's foreign affairs unit also expressed concern over recent actions of the Bourguiba Government of Tunisia--the friendliest toward Jews in any of the Arab states--which dissolved Jewish communal organizations, set up new groups to represent the Jews, and appointed a Chief Rabbi without prior consultation with the communities. Although the civic rights of Jews have not been interfered with, the government "frowns upon" any relationships between Jews in Tunisia and Jews abroad, it was pointed out.

Meanwhile, another Board unit, the Trades Advisory Council, lashed out today at the wave of violence in Britain springing from racial prejudice. Offering its support to the government and voluntary organizations seeking to "stamp out this evil," the council, which concerns itself with anti-Semitism and discrimination in industry and commerce, called for "practical steps in the creation of goodwill between all races and peoples of all religions."

SITUATION OF JEWS IN MOROCCO EVOKES CONCERN OF BRITISH JEWRY

LONDON, Oct. 16, (JTA) -- Concern over the deterioration of relations between Jews and Moslems in Morocco was expressed here last night at a meeting of the Anglo-Jewish Association by its president, R.N. Carvalho.

Mr. Carvalho said that the latest alarm came as a result of a confidential report of the situation in the North African country. He publicly called on the Moroccan authorities to bear in mind their responsibilities to the Jewish citizens of the country and to afford them full protection against local extremists.

Of the general situation in North Africa, Mr. Carvalho said that it was so ominous that most Jewish organizations were apprehensive over the fate of Jews in the Moslem countries. He held the recent accession of Tunisia and Morocco to the Arab League to blame for the increased pessimism, though he called "encouraging" Tunisia's rejection of Egyptian domination in the Arab League.

Morocco continued to be a worrisome factor, he added, because of its continued refusal to allow resumption of Israel-bound immigration. He spoke of the hundreds of "poor Jews (who) are still rotting in primitive refugee camps" in Tangiers and Tetuan.

In comment on the recent meeting of the Conference on Jewish Material Claims Against Germany, Mr. Carvalho expressed approval of the conference decision to give assistance only to Jewish schools reestablished in countries occupied by the Nazis or in countries which have taken 50 percent of the refugees from Nazi havoc. He said "wealthier communities such as Britain should not seek funds urgently required elsewhere."

He also expressed pleasure over "close" Anglo-Israel relations and over Britain's decision to "help Israel be militarily strong not for aggression, but to forewarn any would-be attackers." He also appealed for British economic and industrial aid for the Jewish State.

U. N. BODY INTENSIFIES EFFORT ON INTERNATIONAL DEFENSE ON HUMAN RIGHTS

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y., Oct. 16, (JTA) -- As steps got under way here today to speed the entire process of the years-long effort to transform the Universal Declaration of Human Rights into international treaties, Israel today continued its fight in one of the General Assembly committees to obtain approval for a clause outlawing the use of human beings in so-called medical or "scientific" experimentation.

The fight for approval of this clause, in which Dr. Eliezer Yapou, a member of the Israel delegation, has been one of the leaders, seemed this afternoon to have gained enough backing to pass in the General Assembly's Social and Humanitarian Committee.

HADASSAH'S 44TH ANNUAL CONVENTION OPENS THIS WEEK-END IN MIAMI BEACH

MIAMI BEACH, Oct. 16. (JTA) -- More than 2,500 delegates and guests, representing Hadassah's 315,000 members throughout the United States, will attend the 44th annual convention of the Hadassah organization, which opens here this week-end. The convention will last four days.

Hadassah's program for the next twelve months, embracing its manifold activities in the United States and Israel, will be formulated at the convention, according to an announcement here today. Also high on the agenda will be a discussion of United States foreign policy and international affairs with special emphasis on latest developments in the Middle East. A highlight of the convention will be a special report by Dr. Miriam K. Freund, national president of Hadassah, who will also outline Hadassah's plans for the future.

Other speakers will include Israel Ambassador Abba Eban, Dr. Nahum Goldmann, president of the Jewish Agency for Israel and of the World Zionist Organization, who will discuss the situation of World Jewry today; Dr. Kalman J. Mann, director-general of the Hadassah Medical Organization in Israel, who will report on Hadassah's medical work in Israel; and Moshe Kol, world head of Youth Aliyah, international agency for the relief of underprivileged Jewish children and their rehabilitation in Israel, who will speak on youth problems. Hadassah is the official representative of Youth Aliyah in the United States. The largest Zionist group in the world today, Hadassah spends \$9,000,000 a year on its activities.

THREE-DAY PARLEY OF AMERICAN WOMEN DECIDES TO EXPAND AID TO ORT

NEW HAVEN, Conn., Oct. 16. (JTA) -- Expansion of ORT facilities and program in the direction of aiding major portions of the population currently unable to take advantage of the standard ORT technical high schools, was voted here at a three-day meeting of the national board of the Women's American ORT which concluded here last night.

In addition to calling for the formalizing of plans to initiate short-term vocational school programs, the national board also voted to raise its financial commitment to the Dr. Aron Syngalowski Vocational Training Center in Tel Aviv. Originally, the women's group agreed to remit \$500,000 in five years, but because of the increased tempo of Israel's industrial requirements, it was decided to remit \$1,100,000 in an eight-year period.

The move to expand its Israel commitment followed an address by Prof. William Haber, president of the American ORT Federation and the central board of the World ORT Union, who pointed out that the movement's 70 schools in Israel was doing yeoman work but was faced with a prospective enrollment greater than ever before. Mrs. Joseph C. Gayl of Philadelphia was elected president of the Women's American ORT.

BARON ROTHSCHILD INVESTS IN MIDDLE CLASS HOUSING IN ISRAEL

JERUSALEM, Oct. 16. (JTA) -- The establishment of a 3,000,000 pound development corporation to build middle class housing and tourist facilities at Caesaria, on the Mediterranean coast north of Haifa, was announced here last night by Baron Edmond de Rothschild. Rothschild interests will invest half the capital and the Government of Israel the other half, the Baron revealed.

The first villa in the new Caesaria development has already been purchased by Mr. and Mrs. M. Hungerleider of Yardley, Pennsylvania. Mrs. Hungerleider is the daughter of the late S. D. Gottesman, American philanthropist who advanced the funds needed to buy the Dead Sea Scrolls now in possession of the Israel Government.

LABOR UNIONS PLAN \$2,000,000 ISRAEL BOND DRIVE TO HONOR LEHMAN

NEW YORK, Oct. 16. (JTA) -- More than 800 union locals in the New York area have undertaken a special campaign to provide \$2,000,000 in Israel Bond investment capital in honor of former Senator Herbert H. Lehman, it was announced today. Labor leaders have already announced purchases of more than \$200,000 in Israel Bonds as part of this intensive drive.

SCHNEERSON, "FATHER" OF JEWISH MARTYRS MEMORIAL, DECORATED BY FRANCE

PARIS, Oct. 16. (JTA) -- Isaac Schneerson, guiding force behind the Jewish Documentation Center and originator of the idea of the World Memorial to the Unknown Jewish Martyr, which stands in Paris, was awarded today the ribbon of the Legion of Honor. M. Schneerson began collecting documents on the fate of French and European Jewry during the Nazi occupation when, as a member of the Resistance, he had access to documents captured from the Germans.

PRESIDENT OF PERU LAUDS ISRAEL'S ACHIEVEMENTS; ISRAEL ENVOY CHEERED

LIMA, Peru., Oct. 16. (JTA) -- Israel's "valiant stand and great achievements against tremendous odds" were praised here today by President Manuel Prado at an impressive ceremony at which he formally received the credentials of Israel's Ambassador to this country, Tuvia Arazi. Hundreds lined the square in front of the Presidential palace, cheering Mr. Arazi as he arrived at the Palace in the President's State coach.
