ISRAEL DISPLAYS MILITARY MIGHT IN INDEPENDENCE DAY PARADE IN TEL AVIV

TEL AVIV, May 13. (JTA) -- Ninety jet military planes roared through Tel Aviv skies today while 100 tanks rolled through the streets here in Israel's Independence Day military parade. An estimated half million Israelis, tourists and official guests watched the parade.

Eight French-Built Super-Mysteres, one of the world's fastest jet fighters, and 28 French-built Vautours, top-rated fighter bombers, took part in the first display of Israel's latest air acquisitions. The aerial display included 36 Mystere IV's, French-built Ouragons, British Meteors, propeller-driven Mosquitos and Mustangs and various types of training planes.

The prominent guests, headed by former French Premier Guy Mollet, watched intently as the sky parade was succeeded by the ground ceremony in which a motorized column led the marchers past the reviewing stands in blazing summer heat. Hundreds of jeeps, carrying the colors and emblems of the Israel defense units followed.

A motor-cycle contingent led the way for the various types of tanks, which included 40 American Super-Sherman tanks with 76-mm guns, lighter Shermans, 40 French light tanks and half-tracks carrying armored infantrymen and reconnaissance jeeps carrying border police and paratroopers, the latter, as always, the most applauded paraders.

The marching infantry column consisted of 3,000 men and women divided into units of six abreast. The units included air and sea cadets, the regular infantry, engineers, paratroopers, Druze, the women's corps, border police, communications and military police and Israel police.

Ben Gurion Foresees "True Alliance" Between Israel and Arab Lands

Taking the salute were President Ben Zvi, Premier David Ben Gurion, Chief of Staff Brig. Gen. Chaim Laskov and regional commanders. Mrs. Chaim Weitzmann, widow of Israel's first president, Dr. Nahum Goldmann, world Zionist leader and other dignitaries were on the reviewing stand. Other observers were members of the diplomatic corps, heads of the various churches and Arab and Bedouin leaders.

The Prime Minister opened the Independence Day observance with a message in which he foresaw the possibility that Israel's population would be augmented by its third million in the country's second decade partly through natural increase and partly through immigration. He expressed the hope that "certain countries" now banning emigration would eventually permit Jews wishing to come to Israel to leave without hindrance.

He said that in the "midst of a tempestuous sea of revolt, subversion and attempts at military and dictatorial domination by neighboring states," Israel "stands solidly with a regime based on human liberty and free elections."

He said he was confident that the day would come sooner or later when a "true alliance" would arise between Israel and the Arab states in which Israel would be able to cooperate with the Arab countries in cultural, economic and political areas for the advance of the prosperity of the Middle East and the strengthening of world peace.

He warned the people that while Israel's rapid progress was unprecedented in the annals of nationhood, there was no room for complete satisfaction. He said that eight per cent of Israel's immigrants still lacked permanent housing and that about 20 per cent still lacked regular employment.

Role of U.S. Volunteers Depicted at Independence Day Celebrations

Half of the "illegal" immigrants into Palestine prior to Israeli statehood were brought on ships manned by American and Canadian volunteers, it was revealed here at the Independence Day celebration today. Furthermore, it was disclosed, the Israeli air force during the War of Liberation was manned chiefly by foreign volunteers, and 50 per cent of all the overseas volunteers serving with the Israeli forces during that war were Americans and Canadians.

The figures were made public here as 200 former overseas volunteers joined Israel's Independence Day celebration today. Tributes to those among the overseas volunteers who died while on duty to further Israel's independence were voiced by three former volunteers from the United States: David Wahl, of Cleveland; Sonny Weintraub, of Baltimore; and Eliezer Whartman, of New York. The overseas volunteers called on the Israel Government to compile a special record, showing the services of Jewish volunteers on behalf of Israel's independence.

ISRAEL'S ANNIVERSARY CELEBRATED IN NEW YORK; LEADERS GREET BEN GURION

NEW YORK, May 13. (JTA) -- Israel's eleventh anniversary was observed here today by Jewish groups interested in the development of Israel, while Israel Consul General Simcha Pratt gave a reception in the Consulate to guests representing all walks in American Jewish life. The Consulate was also open to all Israeli nationals in New York.

Morris Berinstein, General Chairman of the United Jewish Appeal, in a message of greetings sent to Israeli Premier David Ben Gurion, said that American Jewry will continue to mobilize maximum financial support for Israel. He stressed the nationwide effort to raise \$40,000,000 in cash by June 21 as part of the 1959 UJA drive.

Herbert A. Friedman, executive vice chairman of the UJA, said that "as the community of Israel stands at the threshold of its 12th year of independence, it is assured the fullest measure of friendship and loyalty, of 'partnership' and support on the part of the Jewish communities of the United States and other free nations."

Mrs. Rose Halprin, acting chairman of the Jewish Agency, said in a statement: "As this anniversary year draws to a close, American Jews together with the people of Israel bend to the task of securing the means for the strengthening of this young democracy and for providing the resources which will assure that Israel's life-saving program of immigration, rehabilitation and reconstruction may continue in the years to come."

Abraham Feinberg, president of the Israel Bond Organization in a statement stressed the tremendous impact of Israel Bond investment capital on the growth and expansion of Israel's economy, and said: "The vitality of the State of Israel on its eleventh anniversary is underscored by the inner strength of its people as they tackle the tasks of building and development while welcoming and absorbing new immigrants."

Twenty thousand volunteer workers for the United Jewish Appeal will jam Madison Square Garden tomorrow evening to join in the Festival of Freedom which will mark the eleventh anniversary of Israel's independence. Mayor Robert F. Wagner heads the list of speakers who will address the Festival. Other speakers will be Dr. Abba Hillel Silver, noted American Jewish leader; Monroe Goldwater, president of UJA; and Abba Eban, Israel's Ambassador to the United States.

ISRAEL'S ANNIVERSARY CELEBRATED BY JEWISH COMMUNITIES IN MANY LANDS

LONDON, May 13. (JTA) -- Israel still has much to do to make conditions more normal and stable and to keep itself always ready to receive new immigrants, Eliahu Eliath, Israel Ambassador to Britain, told the 11th Israel Independence Day Dinner of the Mizrachi-Hapoel Hamizrachi Federation last night.

He credited a large part of Israel's progress to the continuous support of the Jewish communities of the free world, which, he said, understand that nothing could be more disastrous than the idea that Israel has reached the stage where the help of outside Jewry was no longer needed.

GENEVA, May 13. (JTA) -- Swiss Jewry celebrated Israel's 11th Independence Day with an observance, one feature of which was a party on a ship named the "Aliyah" on Lake Geneva. The Swiss Zionist Federation, which arranged the affair, banned any speeches or public declarations during the party.

STOCKHOLM, May 13. (JTA) -- A Yom Haatzmaut celebration sponsored by the Stockholm Zionist Federation and the Swedish-Israel Society was told by Chaim Yahil, Israel Ambassador, that a year of relative peace on Israel's borders has proved that the Israel-Arab controversy was not the reason for the prevailing Middle East crisis.

ALGIERS, May 13. (JTA) -- A series of meetings and rallies here, starting Sunday night and scheduled to culminate at a celebration tomorrow night, has marked Algerian Jewry's celebration of Israel's eleventh anniversary. Sunday's meeting combined the anniversary celebration with memorials for the martyrs of the Warsaw Ghetto revolt of 16 years ago. Tomorrow night's event, to be held at the auditorium of the Jewish Cultural Center, will be a gala affair.

TWO GERMAN POLICEMEN ARRESTED; CHARGED WITH KILLING JEWS UNDER NAZIS

BIELEFELD, Germany, May 13. (JTA) -- Two local policemen were arrested here today on orders of the chief prosecutor, charged with having participated in the murder of hundreds of Jewish civilians in Lithuania during World War II. The men are Ewald Sudau and Herbert Schmidke. According to the prosecutor, they were members of the Gestapo, and had committed the atrocities in 1941 and 1942.

GERMAN OFFICIAL REPORTS DIFFICULTIES IN PROBING NAZI CAMP CRIMES

LUDWIGSBURG, Germany, May 13. (JTA) -- The Central Commission for the Investigation of War and Concentration Camp Crimes is busy with "a great number" of preliminary investigations, Erwin Schuele, the director, told the Jewish Telegraphic Agency today.

He noted that the Commission was racing against a statute of limitations which has already ended possibilities of prosecution of many such crimes. Charges for first and second degree murder must be filed before 1965.

"Many of the crimes under investigation are so ghastly that it is humanly difficult to prepare the evidence necessary for prosecution," Schuele said. He reported also that there were substantial difficulties in collecting evidence, noting that witnesses were scattered through the world and that documents must be sought in areas of a number of countries, including those behind the Iron Curtain.

The Commission was created last August by the various provincial Ministries of Justice in West Germany to coordinate the prosecution of Nazi crimes. The Commission's principal function is to collect evidence which is turned over to local prosecutors for legal action.

PROTESTANTS BUILD HOME FOR JEWISH AGED IN BERLIN; RAISE 750,000 MARKS

BERLIN, May 13. (JTA) -- A two-story Home for Jewish Aged, built by Protestants and furnished with the aid of non-Jewish organizations and personalities in West Germany, was formally dedicated here today.

The construction costs, amounting to 750,000 Deutschemarks, was contributed by the Protestant Help for Jewish Citizens with the help of the Organization for Relief of Non-Jewish Victims of the Nuremberg Laws and of the Relief Administration for the Property of Dead Victims.

Among prominent Germans who have contributed toward furnishing the Home are Dr. Theodor Heuss, President of West Germany, Dr. Eugen Gerstenmaier, president of the Lower House of the Federal Parliament, and leaders of the Protestant Church in the country.

Diplomatic and church representatives from many foreign countries attended the dedication exercises, among them representatives from the United States, Britain, Switzerland, Belgium and The Netherlands.

SIR OSWALD MOSLEY, FASCIST LEADER, ANNOUNCES CANDIDACY FOR PARLIAMENT

LONDON, May 13. (JTA) -- Sir Oswald Mosley, leader of British fascists, was cheered and jeered, denounced as a would-be Hitler and hailed for the same reason, when he delivered a speech yesterday in Trafalgar Square, announcing his candidacy for Parliament.

While some men yelled "Down with Hitler," others cried: "Sieg Heil," as Mosley spoke. As some of the Mosley adherents cheered him, others cried: "Gestapo!" and "Down with Mosley!" He spoke for a full hour and boasted he would be elected to Parliament. One man in the Mosley audience was arrested, charged with creating a disturbance.

JEWISH CONGRESS TESTIFIES IN WASHINGTON ON ANTI-BOMBING BILLS

WASHINGTON, May 13. (JTA) -- The American Jewish Congress today called for a strong federal anti-dynamiting law that would cover homes as well as institutions and permit the FBI to move swiftly when religious or racial bombings occur.

Sanford Bolz, Washington counsel for the American Jewish Congress, testified before a House judiciary sub-committee. He said the introduction of over 40 anti-bombing bills reflected a "wide demand" in the House of Representatives for federal action. But he warned the various bills differ significantly both on coverage and enforcement.

He said his organization does not support H.R. 4344, introduced by Rep. Emanuel Celler, New York Democrat, because it would apply only to schools, churches and synagogues. "Any bill that does not apply to the bombing of homes will fail to do the job that must be done", said Mr. Bolz.

EBAN HONORED IN WASHINGTON; WILL PAY FAREWELL CALL TO EISENHOWER

WASHINGTON, May 13. (JTA) -- Israel Ambassador Abba Eban will pay a farewell call on President Eisenhower at the White House on Friday, it was learned here today. A national testimonial dinner marking the departure of Ambassador Eban was tendered here tonight with a number of government officials, congressmen, and diplomats in attendance.

On behalf of the sponsoring committee and the America-Israel Society, Mr. Eban was presented a beautiful facsimile of the Blackstone Memorial, submitted to U.S. President Harrison in 1891. The 1891 Memorial was a petition by a group of leading Americans for a Jewish national home in Palestine.

President Theodore R. McKeldin, of the America-Israel Society, presided at the dinner. Speakers included Senate Minority Leader Everett M. Dirksen, Illinois Republican; House Majority Leader John W. McCormack; French Ambassador Herve Alphand; Sen. Jacob K. Javits, New York Republican; the Very Rev. Edward B. Bunn, President of Georgetown University; and Philip M. Klutznick, national president of B'nai B'rith.

In his response, Mr. Eban surveyed American-Israel relations, and the situation in the Near East generally. He reflected on his impressions of the United States, obtained during his tour of duty. He lauded Presidents Eisenhower and Truman and "the three eminent Secretaries of State with whom I have held constant discourse and communion on the great theme of Israel's salvation."

PRATT OPENS IMPRESSIVE EXHIBIT OF ISRAEL CRAFTS IN NEW YORK MUSEUM

NEW YORK, May 13. (JTA) -- In a gala atmosphere which combined celebration of Israel's eleventh Independence Day with one of the most impressive exhibits of Israeli arts and crafts ever shown here, a traveling exhibit, entitled "Forms from Israel," was given a preview before prominent guests and representatives of the press tonight, at the Museum of Contemporary Crafts here.

The exhibit, which has already been shown in Baltimore, Indianapolis and Albany, will be at the Museum until August 30. It will be opened formally to the public Friday afternoon, with a visit from Mrs. Eleanor Roosevelt.

At the preview tonight, the principal participants were Simcha Pratt, Israel Consul-General in New York; Samuel Rubin, president of the America-Israel Cultural Foundation; Mrs. Paul Herzog, chairman of Crafts from Israel; and the treasurer of the latter organization, Adolph Held.

The exhibition, being previewed on Israel's eleventh anniversary, illustrates "the sovereignty and supremacy of man's creative genius over the forces of destruction and over those which withhold the true freedom of man's personality," Mr. Pratt stated.

"This exhibition," the Consul-General continued, "restates the ancient truth -- that man lives best, fulfills himself best, in freedom."

The exhibit is being co-sponsored by the Government of Israel, in cooperation with the America-Israel Cultural Foundation and Crafts from Israel. It was produced by the Israel Institute of Industrial Design, in consultation with the American Federation of Arts. The Federation is circulating the exhibit which, for 18 months after its showing at the Museum here, will be on view in Richmond, Va., Columbus, Ohio, Milwaukee, Seattle, San Francisco and Boston.

PRESIDENT OF NEW YORK UNIVERSITY LAUDS ISRAEL INSTITUTION OF LEARNING

NEW YORK, May 13. (JTA) -- Philosophers might benefit from visiting Israel to study "how the people there manage to preserve calm and avoid feelings of hate," a prominent American educator and philosopher declared today. He is Dr. Carroll V. Newsom, president of New York University, whose field of scholarship is in mathematics and philosophy.

Dr. Newsom delivered the principal address at a luncheon of the American Christian Palestine Committee, at the Carnegie Endowment Center. Speaking on the role of education in underdeveloped lands, with specific reference to Israel, which he has visited, Dr. Newsom voiced high praise of the scholarship and scientific equipment at Israeli institutions of higher learning, particularly the Weizmann Institute at Rehovot and Technion in Haifa.

LABEL KATZ, CANDIDATE FOR B'NAI B'RITH PRESIDENT, HONORED IN NEW ORLEANS

NEW ORLEANS, May 13. (JTA) -- Label A. Katz, candidate for president of B'nai B'rith, was presented a check in the sum of \$5,000 for the benefit of the Henry Monsky B'nai B'rith Building in Washington, D.C., at a dinner here last night on the eve of his departure for the triennial convention of B'nai B'rith in Jerusalem. The presentation was made in the presence of members and guests of New Orleans Lodge who sponsored the affair.
