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## WORLD BANK MANAGEMENT RECOMMENDS \$27,500,000 LOAN FOR ISRAEL PORT

WASHINGTON, Aug. 1. (JTA) -- The management of the World Bank has concluded negotiations with an Israeli delegation and recommended a \$27, 500, 000 loan to Israel to construct a new port at Ashdod, about 20 miles south of Tel Aviv.

The board of directors of the bank is expected to act on the recommended loan on Aug. 18, when the board is scheduled to meet. Informed sources predicted that the loan will be approved without major difficulty. The negotiations were concluded here during the past weekend by an Israeli delegation headed by David Horowitz, Israeli delegate to the bank.

## ARGENTINE AND ISRAEL GOVERNMENTS TO END RIFT OVER EICHMANN TODAY

JERUSALEM, Aug. 1. (JTA) -- A joint Argentine-Israel statement ending the dispute over the capture of Adolf Eichmann, the Nazi leader who directed the mass extermination of the Jews in Europe, will be issued tomorrow or Wednesday, it was learned here today.

The statement will emphasize the desire of both countries for renewal of their friendship and will probably refer to the resolution adopted recently by the United Nations Security Council concerning the Eichmann case, in which the Council expressed hope of resumption of friendly relations between Argentina and Israel.

The statement is also likely to sum up briefly each country's position on the Eichmann case. Shabtai Rosenne, legal adviser to the Israel Foreign Ministry, is expected to return here from Buenos Aires after the joint declaration is published. Mr. Rosenne has met with Argentine President Arturo Frondizi and Foreign Minister Diogenes Taboada, over the issue.

It is expected that ambassadors will, nevertheless, not be exchanged between the two countries for some time. Argentine Ambassador Rodolfo Garcia Arias was called home from Tel Aviv two months ago. Israel Ambassador Arich Levavi was declared persona non grata last week by the Buenos Aires Government.

## NASSER'S ACTION AGAINST IRAN CONSIDERED MOVE TO GAIN MOSCOW'S FAVOR

LONDON, Aug. 1. (JTA) -- The more hysterical President Nasser of the United Arab Republic continues to get over the statement made by the Shah of Iran reiterating his country's de facto recognition of Israel, the more obvious it becomes here that his attacks on Iran are aimed at gaining more favor in the eyes of the Soviet Government which is unfriendly to the Shah.

Nasser needs now Moscow's favor more than ever, because the Soviet Government has recently shown inclination not to supply him with spare parts for Soviet-built military planes which he had acquired from the Soviet Union. Soviet pressure on Nasser is growing ever since it was announced that Israel had bought more jet bombers of the latest type from France which does not sell any arms to Egypt. Aware of the fact that Nasser is now dependent on Moscow more than ever before, the Soviet Government is seeking to maneuver him to a point where he could be useful in Moscow's hostile attitude toward the present regimes in Iran and Turkey.

Meanwhile it was reported here today that Iran has closed its consulate in Damascus, capital of the Syrian sector of the United Arab Republic, to complete its break in diplomatic relations with the U.A.R. It was also reported that the Saudi Arabian ambassador in Teheran, left for home to report to his government on the dispute between Iran and the U.A.R.

## Indian Press Asks Government to Emulate Iran and Recognize Israel

NEW DELHI, India, Aug. 1. (JTA) -- Leading Indian newspapers came out today with articles severely criticizing President Nasser of the United Arab Republic for his attacks on Iran, and suggesting that India should follow Iran's example and recognize Israel.

The Express, one of the largest Indian dailies, said in an editorial that "on no grounds save that of appeasing Nasser, can New Delhi's attitude to Israel be justified." Other

Indian-language newspapers take strongly the Iranian side against Nasser and laud Iran and Turkey for not permitting themselves to be involved in anti-Israel intrigues.

In advocating the recognition of Israel, the Express editorial asks: "If Democratic India can have diplomatic relations with Fascist Spain, what prevents according similar recognition to a democratic country such as Israel a member of the Afro-Asian world?" The paper praises smaller countries, such as Ghana and Ceylon, for extending de jure recognition to Israel, "undeterred by Cairo's threat."

Meanwhile, the Iranian charge d'affaires here today charged Cairo with creating a "breach between Iran and friendly Muslim countries" for the purpose of diverting the attention of the people of the UAR from internal problems. Addressing a press conference, M. Zelli specifically denied any Iranian decision to exchange diplomatic representatives with Israel. He said the recent U.A.R. verbal attacks on Iran were based on an "imaginary issue."

Pakistan's Foreign Minister said today, that Iran's decision to continue her diplomatic ties with Israel will have "no influence" on Pakistan. "Pakistan's position has been made abundantly clear and there will be no change" he said. Pakistan refuses to have any relations with Israel.

The continuation of this policy was evident in reports published in Pakistani papers today. According to the papers, the Pakistani Government has sent instructions to the Pakistan scout contingent attending the International Scout Jamboree in Teheran, to boycott the Jamboree and return home. The presence of Israel scouts at the Jamboree prompted Pakistan to take such action.

### THREE ISRAELI MEDICAL TEAMS START WORKING IN CONGO; ORGANIZE AID

JERUSALEM, Aug. 1. (JTA) -- Three Israel medical teams dispatched to the Congo last week have begun working in and around Leopoldville, according to reports received here today.

The largest group has been assigned to manage the 650-bed Kitambo Hospital in Leopoldville. A smaller group has been put in charge of the Leopoldville municipal Sanitation Department while a third unit is at work in the Institute of Tropical Diseases in that city.

A party of Jewish refugees from Elisabethville arrived here today via Rhodesia with virtually no possessions other than the clothes they were wearing. Jacob Shalom, who owned a grocery store in the Katanga capital, said that after his store was burned by rioters, he fled to Rhodesia along with many other white refugees. He said there were about 1,000 Jewish refugees from the Congo to Salisbury.

Among the arrivals here was an Israeli-born woman, Mrs. Godona Ben Atar who married and emigrated to the Congo seven years ago. She came with her two infant children in her arms. All of the newcomers said they were ready to do whatever work was given them and that many of the other Jewish refugees were considering settling in Israel.

### ISRAEL GOVERNMENT AND J. N. F. SIGN PACT ON AUTHORITY OVER LAND

JERUSALEM, Aug. 1. (JTA) -- A memorandum between the Israel Government and the Jewish National Fund, establishing the rights of each party with regard to land authority in Israel, was signed here today. Finance Minister Levi Eshkol signed on behalf of the Israel Government and Dr. A. Granott, president of the J. N. F. signed on behalf of his organization.

The signing of the covenant followed the approval last week by the Knesset, Israel's Parliament, of the Land Authority Bill under which all agricultural land, including J. N. F. land, will be administered by the Ministry of Agriculture. On the other hand, all soil improvement and afforestation in the country, including that of government land, will be carried out by the Jewish National Fund.

The Land Authority was devised to do away with the duplication effort in the domains of soil improvement and afforestation in Israel. Until now this type of work had been done by both, the Israel State Agricultural Department and the Jewish National Fund.

(In New York, Albert Schiff, president of the Jewish National Fund of America, hailed the establishment of the Land Authority as "the beginning of a new chapter not only in the history of the J. N. F., but also in the annals of the upbuilding of the Jewish State which stands to benefit much from a more efficient system of land reclamation and land development."

### ISRAEL OBSERVES TISHA B'AV; AMUSEMENT PLACES CLOSED; KNESSET ADJOURNED

JERUSALEM, Aug. 1. (JTA) -- The Knesset, Israel's Parliament, adjourned today until Wednesday, in observance of the Fast of Tisha B'Av which marks the destruction of the Temple. The fast was ushered in tonight with the closing of all movie theatres and other places of amusement throughout the country.

### SOVIET BLOC BOYCOTTS INTERNATIONAL SCIENCE PARLEY IN ISRAEL

JERUSALEM, Aug. 1. (JTA) -- The Soviet Union will not send any delegate to the international conference on the role of science in the development of new countries which is scheduled to be held this month in Rehovot, Israel, it was learned here today. This will probably be the case also with all other countries in the Soviet bloc.

In reply to the invitations, the Soviet Union and other East European countries said that the scientists invited had "previous engagements." Other Communist countries ignored the invitations and did not reply to them at all.

Meanwhile, Professor Yigael Yadin, a Hebrew University archeologist and Israel's former Chief of Staff, left for Moscow today to participate in the Moscow Congress of Orientalists to be held next week. He will be joined by five other Israeli scholars invited to the conference.

### DELEGATES TO EUCHARISTIC CONGRESS VISIT NAZI EXTERMINATION CAMP

MUNICH, Aug. 1. (JTA) -- Many Catholics attending the Eucharistic Congress here are visiting the site of the Dachau concentration camp where an exhibition has been set up depicting the atrocities committed by the Nazis during the Second World War. A pilgrimage to the site by Catholic youth attending the Congress will take place on Friday.

Displayed at the exhibit, which was prepared by former inmates of the camp, were torture instruments used by the Nazis, including steel-tipped whips and a blood-stained flogging block. Also displayed were SS documents authorizing medical experiments to be performed on camp inmates and uniforms worn by Nazi guards.

Visitors to the exhibition were given brochures explaining the operation of the camp during the Nazi regime. The brochures included a reproduction of SS Document Z-32, which listed the "rentability" of camp prisoners who could be rented to factories in the area for \$1.50 per day.

The average life of an inmate, according to the document, was estimated at nine months and the Nazis calculated that a prisoner was worth about \$225. The SS document added in a footnote, however, that "one must not forget there is also a little profit to be had from the bones and ashes which can be used as fertilizer." Prisoners were used as slave laborers in 139 factories in the Munich area, the document revealed.

### FRANKFURT CRIMINAL COURT REFUSES TO RELEASE EICHMANN'S ASSISTANT

FRANKFURT, Aug. 1. (JTA) -- The Frankfurt Criminal Court refused yesterday to release Herman Krumey, a former SS officer who served as adjutant to Adolf Eichmann and who had asked to be freed. Krumey, who has been detained since May 24, has been charged with participation in the executions of hundreds of thousands of Hungarian Jews in 1944.

Friedrich Tillman, who was instrumental in the killing of 60,000 Jews and other persons as part of the Nazi's so-called mercy killing program of mental patients during the Second World War, has been arrested, police here announced today. The 56-year-old former Nazi, who was apprehended two weeks ago, was an office aid of Dr. Werner Heyde, who was arrested last November on charges of having headed the Nazi "euthanasia program."

### LEADING BRITISH NEWSPAPER ABANDONS BAN ON CATHOLICS AND JEWS

LONDON, Aug. 1. (JTA) -- The Sunday Observer, one of Britain's most widely respected newspapers, has revised the deed of trust under which it has been managed for the past 15 years to eliminate a clause barring Catholics and Jews from serving on the paper's board of trustees or in senior staff positions.

The paper made the announcement yesterday in a statement in which it rejected charges made against it by the Beaverbrook newspapers that it had been anti-Catholic and anti-Semitic. "Our readers are well aware that there has never been the slightest evidence in our columns of religious discrimination or intolerance," it declared.

The London Daily Express, a Beaverbrook newspaper, welcomed the move in an editorial today. It termed it belated but commented: "Who can fail to rejoice when prejudice gives way to charity?" The Hon. F.D.L. Astor, a member of the noted British family of newspaper owners, is editor of the Observer. The paper has a circulation in excess of 660,000.

### ITALIAN PREMIER ALLOCATES FUNDS TO AID JEWISH PUBLICATION IN ROME

ROME, Aug. 1. (JTA) -- The office of the Premier has allocated funds to aid in the publication of "Israel," a monthly magazine on Jewish culture, edited by Italy's foremost Jewish scholar, Professor Dante Lattes. Such funds are allocated by the Government only to publications "of a high cultural value."

### DR. LUBIN LEAVES FOR ISRAEL TO STUDY JEWISH AGENCY PROGRAMS

NEW YORK, Aug. 1, (JTA) -- Dr. Isador Lubin, Consultant to the Jewish Agency for Israel, Inc., left today for Israel to study the Jewish Agency's rehabilitation and resettlement program and to lay the foundations for the Jerusalem office of the Permanent Representative of the New York corporation.

On his way to Israel, Dr. Lubin will spend a few days in Europe to confer with Dr. Nahum Goldmann and other Jewish Agency officials and to visit Jewish Agency transit centers. He expects to return to New York by the end of September to submit his preliminary report to the Board of Directors of the Jewish Agency for Israel, Inc.

His report will serve as a basis for determining allocations to be made by the New York organization for the budgetary year 1960/61.

### BULGARIA FAILS TO ISSUE PROMISED VISAS TO MACCABI FOOTBALL TEAM

HAIFA, Aug. 1. (JTA) -- The Maccabi football team was marooned in Athens today after promised Bulgarian visas failed to arrive. The team was invited to play several games in Sofia, the Bulgarian capital, and was told by the Bulgarian Legation in Tel Aviv that visas would reach the team in Athens.

When the visas failed to arrive, a phone call was made to the Sofia Lokomotive Sports Club. The secretary of the club told the Israelis, "Please believe us, we can do nothing about it. Please do not come now."

Meanwhile, an Israeli draft resolution, forbidding the holding of regional games in any country unwilling to grant entry visas to athletes of any other country in its region, was placed on the agenda for the next meeting of the International Olympic Committee. This draft resolution is aimed at prohibiting the holding of games in Arab and other countries if they do not grant visas to Israelis.

### ROME TO WELCOME ISRAELI SPORTSMEN PARTICIPATING IN OLYMPIC GAMES

ROME, Aug. 1. (JTA) -- Arrangements were completed today for the reception and housing of the Israeli squad due here to participate in the 1960 Olympic Games. The Israeli team is expected to include about 35 athletes and ten trainers and aides.

The Israelis will be housed in Olympic Village adjacent to the United States and Maltese teams. Their quarters will be on two floors and they will have two dining rooms, their own kitchen and two refrigerators. The Israelis will have their breakfast with the athletes of other countries in the common dining-hall but kosher food will be prepared for their other meals and served in their own dining-rooms.

The Rome Jewish community has set up a special Hospitality Committee for the Israeli visitors. Members include Chief Rabbi Elio Toaff of Rome, the president of the community and the president of the Union of Italian Jewish Communities. A gala service will be held in the principal synagogue of Rome early in September in honor of the Jewish athletes of all nations participating in the games. The Rome Jewish Community and the Jewish youth of Rome will tender receptions for the Israelis.

The Israeli team will be given a giant welcome when it arrives at Ciampino Airport and will be escorted from the airfield to Olympic Village by a motor cavalcade. A pool of 35-40 cars will be kept at the disposal of the Israeli athletes for the duration of their visit here for sight-seeing and social activities.

### MEXICO NAMES FIRST AMBASSADOR TO ISRAEL; SERVED IN MANY LANDS

MEXICO CITY, Aug. 1. (JTA) -- The Mexican Foreign Ministry announced today the appointment of this country's first Ambassador to Israel. He is Jorge Daesle Segura, a career diplomat who has served in posts in Washington, Havana, Prague, Geneva, Berne, Paris Guatemala and West Germany.

Until now Mexico had been represented in Israel by a charge d'affaires. The new envoy, whose appointment has already been approved by the Israel Government, will leave for Tel Aviv in several weeks.

### PHILIP PERLMAN, U.S. SOLICITOR GENERAL UNDER TRUMAN, DEAD; WAS 70

WASHINGTON, Aug. 1. (JTA) -- Philip B. Perlman, Solicitor General of the United States during the administration of President Harry S. Truman, died here yesterday, apparently of a heart attack. He was 70 years of age. He was co-chairman of the Platform Committee of the recent Democratic National Convention.

Born in Baltimore, Mr. Perlman first worked as a journalist while earning his law degree at the University of Maryland. After serving in several state posts, he went into private law practice until 1947 when he was named Solicitor General. After resigning as Solicitor General in 1952, Mr. Perlman was appointed by President Truman to head the Commission on Immigration and Naturalization. For many years Mr. Perlman was a member of the Board of the Associated Jewish Charities in Baltimore.
