ISRAELI SAILORS CAPTURE NAZI FUGITIVE IN ITALY; TURN HIM OVER TO POLICE

HAIFA, Aug. 3, (JTA) -- Four Israeli seamen, on shore leave in Naples harbor, identified and captured the Nazi fugitive, Ludwig Zind, and turned him over to the Italian police, it was disclosed today. Zind, a former German school-teacher, had evaded the German police for two years following his conviction for anti-Semitism in Offenburg. A one-year prison sentence awaits him there.

Four members of the crew of the Israeli liner, the S.S. Herzl, spotted Zind in Naples last Monday evening as he was about to board the Egyptian freighter, Cite de Tunisia, for Tripoli, Libya. One of the quartet recognized the Nazi fugitive and they followed him. One of the seamen engaged Zind in conversation while the others went to call the police. Two Italian detectives arrived quickly and, after identification, detained the fugitive.

Zind, who was sentenced in West Germany for making anti-Jewish remarks publicly, fled before he was to begin serving his sentence. It was established in court that he called a Jewish businessman "another dirty Jew whom someone forgot to gas." When he was detained Monday in Naples, he was on his way to take up a job as a professor of geology at the University of Tripoli. He was traveling on a so-called laissez-passer.

The four Israeli sailors cabled Haifa today that "we captured the Nazi criminal." A cable confirming the role of the four crewmen was received by the line which operates the Herzl. The cable was signed by Zvi Trebish, 30, who was Premier Ben-Gurion's personal waiter last year when the Prime Minister sailed to France aboard the Herzl; Moshe Leizerowitz, 38, who publishes the ship's newspaper, Baruch Marco, 28, and Zvi Mader, 34.

Captured Nazi May Escape Extradition from Italy to Germany

BONN, Aug. 3. (JTA) -- Ludwig Zind, the fugitive ex-Nazi school teacher who was seized in Naples Monday may escape return to Germany to serve a one-year prison sentence for anti-Semitic activities, it was disclosed today.

West German Foreign Ministry officials said that the extradition of Zind was doubtful because the offenses for which Zind was convicted in Offenburg in 1958 might be considered "political crimes" under the Italian criminal code and, as such, not grounds for extradition.

Under the Italian code, libels against the dead and the making of anti-Semitic statements are not recognized as ordinary criminal offenses. Anti-Semitic statements are punishable in Italy, but only as a "political offense," the maximum sentence for which is six months. A one-year sentence is required to place the crime in the extradition category.

Under these circumstances, it was pointed out, the West German authorities will not make a formal request for Zind's extradition until this question has been discussed with the Italian authorities.

ISRAEL GOVERNMENT TO ANNOUNCE DATE OF EICHMANN TRIAL NEXT SUNDAY

LONDON, Aug. 3. (JTA) -- The Israel Government will announce next Sunday that Adolf Eichmann will go on trial in Jerusalem no later than March, 1961, the Jerusalem correspondent of the London Daily Mail reported today following an exclusive interview with Dr. Pinhas Rosen, the Israel Minister of Justice. The correspondent asserted that Dr. Rosen's description of how the trial is to be organized presents a "fantastic scene for future historians."

The five-column newspaper article on the Eichmann case included the fact that the trial would be held in Jerusalem's new Hall of Culture or Bet Haam and that workmen were on the job day and night rushing completion of the edifice in time for the trials. Dr. Rosen was quoted as declaring a first-aid station would be built alongside the court-

room to provide treatment for those affected by the gruesome exhibits and the appalling nature of some of the testimony to be presented during the proceedings.

The Minister of Justice declared that Eichmann's family was paying the cost of his defense. He described as "all rubbish" reports that Eichmann was awakened every four hours each night and that his cell was kept constantly brilliantly illuminated. "I don't know whether Eichmann is surprised at the fair treatment he is receiving," Dr. Rosen said, "but he does not complain."

The Justice Minister emphasized to the British correspondent that Israel was conscious of the fact that the eyes of the world were upon her and was anxious to act with scrupulous fairness and justice. "You may reassure everyone that there is no question of brainwashing or unfair treatment. Eichmann is too clever to become a victim of brainwashing. Nor could such measures be possible here. It is an insult to Israel to make any such suggestion," the Minister said.

JORDANIAN PREMIER ASSAILS NASSER FOR ABUSING THE SHAH OF IRAN

LONDON, Aug. 3. (JTA) -- Jordanian Premier Hazza Majali today denounced President Gamal Abdel Nasser of the United Arab Republic for his "irresponsible" abuse of the Shah of Iran for the latter's statement recognising Israel, it was reported here from Amman.

Addressing a press conference in the Jordanian capital on an exchange of notes between the Amman and Teheran governments in connection with the Shah's statement on Israel, Premier Majali said that Nasser had taken "a quick decision" on the matter and that the U.A.R. President was dealing with the Palestine case hypocritically. Premier Majali accused Nasser of abusing both Iran and King Hussein with the intention of diverting public attention from deteriorating internal conditions in the United Arab Republic.

In his note to King Hussein, the Shah reiterated his earlier statement that there had been no change in the de facto recognition of Israel by Iran. Official or legal recognition of Israel had never been the subject of discussion, the Shah noted. "It is regrettable," the Shah declared, "that certain Arab states with whom Iran has religious ties did not appreciate Iran's good intentions and did not show any sign of friendship towards Iran."

Pakistan Takes Neutral Stand on Iran's Recognition of Israel

NEW DELHI, Aug. 3. (JTA) -- President Ayub Khan of Pakistan declared today that no uniform policy regarding recognition of Israel was possible for member countries of the Central Treaty Organization. He told a press conference in Karachi that each member of the CENTO bloc was guided by its own policy with respect to Israel.

The Pakistani President denied press reports that he had written to United Arab Republic President Gamal Abdel Nasser regarding the break of diplomatic relations between the U.A.R. and Iran over the latter country's recognition of Israel. Diplomatic circles in Pakistan and India believe that Pakistan was placed in a difficult position by the situation in view of her growing relations with Arab countries and especially with the United Arab Republic.

U.S. GRANTS \$7,000,000 LOAN TO NASSER FOR INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENT

LONDON, Aug. 3. (JTA) -- The United Arab Republic and the United States signed an agreement today under which America's Development Loan Fund will lend the Egyptian Industrial Bank \$7,000,000 for industrial development. Egypt's Industrial Bank is the main source of loans for small medium private industries in Egypt.

ARGENTINE-ISRAELI RIFT OVER EICHMANN SETTLED; COMMUNIQUE READY

BUENOS AIRES, Aug. 3. (JTA) -- A Joint Argentine-Israeli statement, issued by both governments, will be made public tonight settling the differences which have arisen between Argentina and Israel in connection with the capture of Adolf Eichmann, the Nazi leader who directed the mass-killing of 6,000,000 Jews in Europe.

Following the issuance of the statement, Dr. Shabtai Rosenne, legal adviser of Israel's Foreign Ministry who came here to reach an understanding with the Argentine Government, will fly back to Israel tonight with a stop-over in New York.

Although friendly relations between Argentina and Israel will be fully resumed, it is not anticipated that the ambassadors of both countries will return to their posts. However, it is believed that new envoys will be named by both countries soon after the Jewish High Holy Days early in October.

HADASSAH--HEBREW UNIVERSITY MEDICAL CENTER DEDICATED IN ISRAEL

JERUSALEM, Aug. 3. (JTA) -- The \$25,000,000 Hadassah-Hebrew University Medical Center was dedicated here today at Kiryat Hadassah, on the western outskirts of Jerusalem, with thousands of persons from all parts of Israel participating in the ceremonies. More than 1,000 guests from abroad were also present, including several hundred Hadassah members who made a special pilgrimage from the United States.

Speakers at the dedication ceremonies were Prime Minister David Ben-Gurion; Ogden Reid, United States Ambassador to Israel; Dr. Miriam K. Freund, national president of Hadassah, the Women's Zionist Organization of America; Professor B. Mazar, president of the Hebrew University in Jerusalem; and Dr. Kalman J. Mann, director-general of the Hadassah Medical Organization.

Consolidated in the Medical Center will be all of Hadassah's medical, clinical, diagnostic and research facilities presently in Jerusalem. The Medical Center will include a 500-bed teaching hospital with service laboratories; a separate mother and child pavilion for maternity and infant care; an outpatient department, capable of handling more than 200,000 patient visits annually; the Hebrew University-Hadassah Medical School -- Israel's only medical school-- founded in 1949 by the Hebrew University and Hadassah; and the Henrietta Szold School of Nursing and Residence. In all, the Medical Center complex will comprise 17 structures. It is the largest complex of buildings in Israel.

The Medical Center will have the most modern equipment for treatment and research, including the newest type model of the cobalt bomb for cancer research and high voltage therapy. Most of this equipment has been purchased in the United States. Hadassah is also building six reservoirs --capable of holding a 50-day supply of water-- to service the Medical Center. These reservoirs will have a capacity of more than two million gallons. Medical Center water requirements are estimated at about 40,000 gallons a day. These reservoirs will be of vital importance since there is no rainfall in Israel for nearly eight months out of the year.

Ben-Gurion Lauds Hadassah; Pays Tribute to Henrietta Szold

Premier Ben-Gurion, in his address at the dedication, paid glowing tribute to the late Henrietta Szold, founder of Hadassah. The Premier described Miss Szold as "not only the greatest woman American Jewry has yet produced but undoubtedly one of the most noble personalities of our generation." The dedication ceremony coincided with the 100th anniversary of the birth of Henrietta Szold.

The Premier told the gathering that he recently flew over the site. "Words fail me to describe the majesty and beauty of vision that was revealed to our eyes from above -- the sight of the splendid building and even more the magical beauty of mountain scenery on which it stands, the like of which is hardly to be found anywhere in Israel," the Premier declared.

Mr. Ben-Gurion congratulated the Hadassah leadership for the project and expressed the confidence that the new medical center would attract the finest of Jewish scientists and medical men from all countries and especially from the United States.

Lauding Hadassah members for the great things they had done in the past, the Premier declared, however, that that was only part of what lies within their power. "It is not only the number of dollars that you invest in constructive enterprises in Israel for which you will be able to claim credit," he declared, "but for the number of sons and daughters that you will bring up to take part in building the regenerated Jewish people which is arising anew."

Dedication Celebrated in New York; Israel Consul Hails Hadassah

NEW YORK, Aug. 3. (JTA) -- Simultaneous with the ceremonies in Jerusalem, the dedication of the \$25,000,000 Hadassah-Hebrew University Medical Center was marked in New York today by a special celebration at Hadassah House in which 150 leaders and active members of the organization participated.

Binyamin Eliav, Consul General of Israel in New York, spoke in behalf of the Government of Israel. Mrs. Samuel W. Halprin, Mrs. David de Sola Pool and Mrs. Robert Szold, past presidents of Hadassah, reviewed the history of the organization's medical program, culminating in the new Medical Center. In addressing the meeting, Mr. Eliav said:

"To the Jews of Palestine --now the citizens of Israel-- Hadassah is the visible evidence of American support, scientific and technological achievement and the will of dedicated Zionists to make these available to Israel. The objective of Hadassah has been to serve in the fullest sense of the word. Not service for one people, but for all in the area: Christians, Moslems and Jews have been the beneficiaries of Hadassah's imaginative and skillfully-administered health program." Mr. Eliav also emphasized that "Hadassah has helped to make Israel the most medically advanced country in the Middle East."

JEWISH PUPILS IN TORONTO MAY BE EXEMPTED FROM RELIGIOUS INSTRUCTION

TORONTO, Aug. 3. (JTA) -- Parents of Jewish children attending two Toronto schools will hereafter have the option of obtaining exemption of attendance by their children at classes in religious instruction. Under Ontario provincial law, such classes must be provided in schools all of which, in Canada, are operated under Christian denomination-al auspices.

The compromise plan was arranged for Cedar Grove and North Wilmington schools in Toronto. It provides that parents will be asked, during registration periods, to state their preference regarding participation by their children in religious classes which have been shifted to a half hour between 3:30 and 4 p.m. weekly.

The compromise formula was agreed on after numerous meetings attended by Mrs. Dorothy Bishop, the Board of Education trustee for Ward Five of Toronto, and representatives of the Canadian Jewish Congress and local rabbis. In announcing the new plan, Mrs. Bishop said that "evolution, not revolution, is the aim. We want to avert bad feelings."

MACCABI FOOTBALL TEAM TO SUE BULGARIAN SPORT CLUB; WAS DENIED VISAS

HAIFA, Aug. 3. (JTA) -- The Maccabi football team will appeal to the International Football Association for \$12,000 damages from the Lokomotive Sports Club in Sofia, Bulgaria, it was reported today. The appeal arises from Lokomotive's breach of contract with Maccabi to be its host for a series of games this month in Bulgaria. The \$12,000 claim is to cover expenses incurred for the trip.

The Maccabi team was stranded this week in Athens when the promised Bulgarian visas failed to arrive. A phone call was made by the Israeli group to the Sofia club inquiring about the visas. The secretary of the club told the Israelis, "Please believe us, we can do nothing about it. Please do not come now."

ROME JEWISH COMMUNITY OPENS INFORMATION OFFICE FOR OLYMPIC GUESTS

ROME, Aug. 3. (JTA) -- The Jewish community here opened a special information office near the main synagogue today, to assist fellow Jews coming to Rome for the Olympic games. Other arrangements were being made for the holding of religious services.

Sergio Piperno, president of the Union of Italian Jewish Communities, received a letter from Monsignor Pavoni, president of the committee for Religious Assistance to Olympic Games, requesting the programs and schedules of religious services to be held in Rome. These schedules will be announced and broadcast over special loud-speakers in the Olympic Village where the Israeli athletes will be lodged.

RISE IN ISRAEL'S EXPORT REPORTED; TOTALED \$13,400,000 IN JULY

JERUSALEM, Aug. 3. (JTA) -- Israel's exports during July were 25 percent higher than July 1959, it was reported here today. A total of \$13,400,000 worth of goods were exported by Israel last month as compared with \$10,700,000 in exports in July 1959. The July figure brought to \$134,000,000, the total goods exported by Israel for the first seven months of this year, as compared with \$113,000,000 for the first seven months of 1959.

The July increase was particularly significant since the summer is usually an off-season for Israel's leading export -- citrus fruit. During the seven-month period citrus exports accounted for an increase of only \$800,000 -- from \$40,600,000 to \$41,400,000.

GROUP OF 95 AMERICAN ZIONIST YOUTHS START STUDY TOUR IN ISRAEL

TEL AVIV, Aug. 3. (JTA) -- A ninety-five member American youth delegation, representing the Young Zionists of the Zionist Organization of America, began an intensive month-long study tour of Israel today. After a reception and general briefing at the Z.O.A. house here, the group visited the Kfar Silver Agricultural school. Later they visited southern Israel and spent the evening with Israeli soldiers in a recreation camp at Ashkelon.

ISRAEL ENVOY TO HAITI AND DOMINICAN REPUBLIC PRESENTS HIS CREDENTIALS

MEXICO CITY, Aug. 3. (JTA) -- Israel's Ambassador to Mexico Mordechai Schneerson has presented his credentials as Israel's envoy to Haiti and to the Dominican Republic, it was reported here today. The envoy to the three countries was hailed enthusiastically by the press in the two Caribbean republics, which lauded relations between Israel and their own countries.

ITALIAN-JEWISH SCHOLARS TO PUBLISH NEW TRANSLATION OF BIBLE

ROME, Aug. 3. (JTA) -- A new Italian translation of the Bible will soon be published, it was disclosed today. The translation is being edited by a board of Jewish scholars including Rome's Chief Rabbi Elio Toaff and rabbis of other cities.
