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EICHMANN'S FILES ON LIQUIDATION OF JEWS DISCOVERED IN WASHINGTON

WASHINGTON, Aug. 7, (JTA) -- West German war crimes investigators have found the "complete file" of Nazi S. S. Col. Adolf Eichmann's Jewish liquidation quarters and have uncovered documents spelling out the war crimes guilt of many other Nazis who may now be brought to trial.

The Eichmann files and a mass of evidence incriminating other Nazis were located here in various warehouses and in the archives of the Library of Congress by a West German investigating team that was given permission to search for the missing Nazi records.

The Eichmann files were found in a huge and poorly catalogued mass of documents captured in Germany by the American forces and brought here after the war. The Germans indicated that the material will be turned over to Israel for use in preparing for the forthcoming trial of Eichmann there on charges of crimes against the Jewish people and crimes against humanity.

Announcement of the discovery was made here at a press conference at the German Embassy by Erwin Schuele, head of the West German Central Office for Prosecution of Nazi War Crimes, a cooperative bureau maintained by the justice ministries of the various West German states.

Mr. Schuele was granted permission to search here for documents that might provide evidence against Eichmann and other war criminals. The German investigator, who began his research in Washington three weeks ago, said he now had the records of Eichmann's notorious "Section IV-B-4" of the Gestapo, the German secret police. This office controlled the liquidation of Jews throughout German-occupied territories.

Mr. Schuele reported that he had found a mass of "immensely valuable" documents stored in warehouses here and in the Library of Congress archives. American authorities apparently, in all the years since World War II, did not conduct a thorough research of the war crimes material.

Mr. Schuele and his aid, Kurt Hinrichsen, expect to spend as much as ten more weeks here exploring the mountain of material they have uncovered. Already, many documents have been found to prove the guilt of several other Nazi criminals who face trial in West Germany. He declined to identify these Nazis.

The German researchers avoided criticism of the American authorities but could not conceal their amazement that, in the many years since the war, the Eichmann material and other data about the liquidation of the Jews by the Nazi regime had remained buried here.

BEN-GURION MAY VISIT ARGENTINA; SETTLEMENT OF EICHMANN ISSUE LAUDED

LONDON, Aug. 7, (JTA) -- Israeli Premier David Ben-Gurion may visit the Argentine "within the next few months," the London Daily Telegraph reported from Buenos Aires yesterday.

The paper said that this gesture of friendship would coincide with the resumption of normal diplomatic relations by the reappointment of an Israeli Ambassador to Argentina. The paper remarked that the joint Israel-Argentine communique of last Wednesday "wiped the slate clean" between those two countries whose relations were severed as a result of the Eichmann affair.

(The Jewish Telegraphic Agency correspondent in Buenos Aires reports that the Argentine press hailed the settlement of the dispute between Argentina and Israel. An exception was La Prensa, one of the leading daily newspapers in the country.)

ISRAEL ANNOUNCES ARRANGEMENTS FOR PRESS COVERAGE OF EICHMANN TRIAL

JERUSALEM, Aug. 7, (JTA) -- The Israel Government today announced details of the arrangements made for the trial of Adolf Eichmann, notorious Nazi leader who directed the mass-killing of 6,000,000 Jews in Europe. At the same time it was also announced that the German lawyer, R. Servatius, has been found acceptable as the lawyer for

Eichmann after an investigation which established that he never belonged to the Nazi party and had no connection with it.

The trial, which is expected to start in the spring of next year, will be conducted in Hebrew with simultaneous German translation, today's announcement said. It is also hoped that simultaneous translation in French and English will be available to newspaper correspondents. The correspondents will receive a daily record of the proceedings in four languages.

Today's announcement is intended primarily as information to editorial offices throughout the world which may wish to assign special correspondents to cover the Eichmann trial. The deadline for registration of such correspondents is given in the announcement as September 30. The Government Press Office reserves the right to reject or accredit any correspondent not registered by that date.

News agencies, newspapers, radio and television stations wishing to send correspondents to cover the trial should submit their requests for accreditation in writing, stating the number and the names of the correspondents, if possible. Under court practice in Israel, no filming or photographing is permitted in the court room. However, it is contemplated to have one official cameraman or photographer who will supply films to all interested.

The correspondents will have to make their own arrangements for hotel accommodations. Israeli diplomatic and consular representatives abroad will be kept informed of all preparations for news coverage and will be consulted for further clarification.

The Israel Parliament will soon approve a special bill amending the Lawyers' Ordinance that only attorneys registered in Israel can appear in Israeli courts. This will be done in order to enable the German lawyer to appear as Eichmann's defense counsel. All political parties in Israel, except the Communist Party, have agreed to approve this amendment without any debate, in order to avoid discussion which would inevitably involve the Eichmann case now sub judice.

ENVOY STRESSES 'DECISIVE NATURE' OF AID SENT BY ISRAEL TO CONGO

TEL AVIV, Aug. 7. (JTA) -- Moshe Pearlman, Israel's special emissary to the Congo with the rank of Ambassador, returned from a month-long visit to that country today and said that Israel's aid to the Congo was of a "decisive nature" since it was the first to arrive there.

He said that Israel's medical group arrived in Leopoldville when there were practically no physicians in the Congo. He further said that Israeli statistician, David Dinur, is now helping Congo's Finance Ministry draw up the first Congolese national budget.

TWO TEHERAN JEWS IN CONTEST FOR JEWISH SEAT IN IRANIAN PARLIAMENT

TEHERAN, Aug. 7. (JTA) -- Two Iranian Jews, Morad Arie and Amshid Kashfi are contesting the seat allotted to the Jewish community in the election to the Majlis (lower house).

Arie is a member of the Opposition, the People's (Mardom) party, and Kashfi of the governing Nationalist party. The Jewish community favors Kashfi since Arie, who is titular head of the community, has alienated many Jews by his anti-Zionist stand.

SEN. KENNEDY STATES HIS VIEWS ON SUEZ BLOCKADE AND ARAB REFUGEE ISSUE

NEW YORK, Aug. 7. (JTA) -- Addressing representatives of the foreign language press here, Senator John F. Kennedy, Democratic candidate for President, said that the Suez Canal must be open to all nations, including Israel. He urged Arabs to recognize the fact that "Israel is here to stay."

The Presidential candidate said that he supports the idea of speeding up the resettlement of Arab refugees in the Middle East. He emphasized that "Israel cannot accept them all" and stated that some arid Arab lands could be made productive by water development projects enabling them to absorb larger populations.

ROCKWELL AVOIDS DISPLAYING NAZI SYMBOLS; IS FACING TRIAL ON WEDNESDAY

WASHINGTON, Aug. 7. (JTA) -- George Rockwell, self-styled leader of the American Nazi party, changed his tactics today and appeared at his weekly rally without displaying any Nazi symbols. His troopers wore no uniforms and did not surround him as a bodyguard, as they had done in the past. No banners or armbands with swastikas were seen.

Rockwell, who was last Thursday released from the District of Columbia General Hospital after he was found to be sane, will face a trial this Wednesday on charges of disorderly conduct. He announced today that he will sue the Anti-Defamation League of B'nai B'rith as the alleged organizer of the riots against him on July 3rd for which he is charged with disorderly conduct.

U.S. EXPERT URGES ISRAEL TO INCREASE CURRENCY; SEES NO INFLATION DANGER

JERUSALEM, Aug. 7. (JTA) -- A report on the industrial financing policy of the Israel Government prepared by an American consultant for the United States Operations Mission, was described as "one-sided and self-contradictory" by David Horowitz, Governor of the Bank of Israel, in an interview with The Jerusalem Post here today.

The consultant, Edward Tennenbaum, president of the Continental-Allied Company of Washington, had asserted in his report that Israeli industry was severely hampered by a shortage of working capital caused by the Government's credit-restricting policies which gave rise to an expensive black market in credits. Mr. Tennenbaum had also urged the infusion into the country's money supply of some 100,000,000 pounds (\$56,000,000) -- about 13 percent of the currency in circulation. The American expert challenged the Israel Government's assumption that there was danger of inflation as "no longer correct."

Mr. Horowitz asserted here that easing of credits would again start inflationary pressures and deteriorate the balance of payments. He quoted World Bank and International Monetary Fund reports which described inflation as a destructive element in Israel's economy. Even a ten percent increase in the annual volume of credits was excessive, Mr. Horowitz declared.

PLAN FOR ESTABLISHMENT OF 'YOUTH STATE' IN NEGEV REVEALED BY ESHKOL

TEL AVIV, Aug. 7. (JTA) -- A plan for the establishment of a "youth state" in the Besor region, arid lands in a 125,000-acre area west of Beersheba, was proposed here today by Levi Eshkol, at a conference of Mapai aimed at formulating a pioneering program to attract Israel's youth. He said the young generation in Israel would be able to set up its own "state" in the area with 15,000 agricultural units in any form of settlement centered about an urban center.

Mr. Eshkol disclosed that his Ministry was already blueprinting the project which, he said, would give fuller economic and social life to Israeli youth who could establish a movement based on this task. The Finance Minister urged Mapai to call on the youth to settle the region when the plans were completed and when the Negev water pipeline was ready for use. He stressed that, while Mapai would initiate the project, it would be carried out by the State and the distribution of lands would not be along party lines.

Author Izhak Smilanski, in an address to the conference, described Israel's youth as the "Espresso Generation" whose only thoughts centered about where to go out in the evenings. Deputy Minister of Defence Shimon Peres bemoaned the fact that Israeli youth lacked a pioneering spirit. Prime Minister David Ben-Gurion is scheduled to address the conference this week.

ROGOSIN PLANT IN ISRAEL TO START PRODUCTION OF NYLON YARN TODAY

TEL AVIV, Aug. 7. (JTA) -- The first nylon yarns will come out of the Rogosin Industries of Israel plant at Ashdod tomorrow, while production of polypropylene fibers is scheduled to start next January 1, it was reported today. Output of each is expected to be 2,500,000 pounds a year. Between 25 and 40 percent of the production will meet Israel's domestic requirements and the surplus will be exported.

Israel Rogosin, founder of the \$20,000,000 enterprise, said that the plant would produce goods to the value of \$12,000,000 in 1961. Semi-processed fibers for the rayon production and chemicals for nylon and polypropylene are to be imported at a cost of about \$7,000,000 so that the added value accruing to Israel will be some \$5,000,000.

Mr. Rogosin said that under an agreement reached in 1958 with the Israeli Government, \$9,000,000 worth of shares were subscribed by stockholders and the Government undertook to invest \$11,000,000. He said he hadn't asked the Government to put any money into the enterprise but that now he would call on it to supply working capital to keep the enterprise working at full capacity. He added that his own investment had been \$6,000,000 and that most of his shares had been contributed to charities in the U. S. and Israel.

BRIG. SHALTIEL DECLINES TO DISCUSS CHARGES ON LOSS OF 'OLD CITY'

JERUSALEM, Aug. 7. (JTA) -- Brigadier David Shaltiel declined today to enter into debate with Dov Joseph, on the latter's charges that mistakes by Brig. Shaltiel--the commander of besieged Jerusalem during Israel's War of Independence-- led to the loss to the Arabs of the Jewish quarter of the Old City. Dr. Joseph, who was the wartime Governor of Jerusalem, made the charges in a book of memoirs published last week.

Asked for comments, Brig. Shaltiel, who now heads the Foreign Ministry's department combatting the Arab boycott of Israel, said that he had respect for Dr. Joseph during the war and still had respect for him. He pointed out that Dr. Joseph never mentioned his charges to him personally neither during the War of Independence nor since.

Declaring that he had not yet read Dr. Joseph's book but had read only excerpts published in the press, Brig. Shaltiel implicitly ridiculed the contention that Dr. Joseph was unaware of how desperate was the situation of the defenders of Old City's Jewish quarter.

BERMUDA HOTELS PRACTICE NO ANTI-JEWISH DISCRIMINATION, A. D. L. REPORTS

NEW YORK, Aug. 7, (JTA) -- Anti-Semitic discrimination, long practiced by some of the Bermuda resort hotels, is now a thing of the past, according to a study published today by the Anti-Defamation League of B'nai B'rith.

The League sent Harold Braverman, director of its national discriminations department, to conduct the survey at the urging of the Bermuda Trade Development Board, a Bermuda Government Agency. The request for the survey followed news reports last January which charged an American representative of an important Bermuda hotel with engaging in a program designed to reduce Jewish patronage.

All of the island's hotels and guest houses were surveyed. According to the League report, "With some unimportant exceptions all replied. They indicated that religion was not a test of a guest's acceptability." The report concluded; "Most of the practices of anti-Semitic discrimination in Bermuda are over. Now there seems to be a genuine impulse to get rid of the stigma of anti-Semitism as well."

ANTI-BIAS COMMISSION TO APPEAL AGAINST COURT RULING ON RESORT AD

NEW YORK, Aug. 7, (JTA) -- The New York State Commission Against Discrimination indicated today that it would appeal against a decision by Supreme Court Justice Kenneth S. MacAffer in which he ruled that the phrase "serving Christian clientele since 1911" was not evidence of discrimination. The decision was issued last week.

This phrase appeared in resort advertisements promoting Trowbridge Farm, an inn at Kyserike, New York. The commission ordered the resort to stop using the phrase. It issued this order May 11 on the complaint of Robert E. Sachs of the Bronx and the Anti-Defamation League of B'nai B'rith.

Trowbridge Farm appealed this order and was upheld by Justice MacAffer, who said that the words might be called descriptive of the clientele of the resort but did not "suggest that other than Christians are unwanted or excluded."

The opinion of the Justice, which is now being appealed, cited advertisements reading "Italian cuisine" "French cooking" and "Kosher diet observed" and asked rhetorically whether these "would establish that the author was engaging in a discriminatory phrase."

ISRAELI SCIENTIST DEVELOPES METHOD TO PREDICT HEIGHT OF OCEAN TIDES

HELSINKI, Finland, Aug. 7, (JTA) -- A method of predicting mathematically the height of the tide along any coastline or at any port, developed by the Weizmann Institute of Science in Israel, was reported at an international conference on geophysics which concluded here yesterday. The method will help scientists to detect earth vibrations -- a problem which has baffled mathematicians since 1775.

The report was presented by Prof. Chaim Leib Pekeris, of the Weizmann Institute, under whose guidance the Institute carried out a three year study on the subject. The progress of this research into ocean tides was made possible through "Weizac" a high-speed electronic computer which was completed in 1958.

Professor Pekeris decided to tackle this subject some years ago when he felt that ocean depths were reasonably well fathomed except along the Arctic regions. He then concluded, that it should be possible to predict mathematically the height of tides along the whole coast.

COUNCIL FOR JUDAISM DONATES \$3, 000 TO PROTESTANT FUND FOR ARABS

NEW YORK, Aug. 7, (JTA) -- The Church World Service, relief and rehabilitation agency of the National Council of Churches, announced yesterday that it had received a \$3, 000 gift from the American Council for Judaism for its revolving loan fund for Arab refugees.

The fund is used to assist Palestinian refugees in Gaza and Jordan. It makes available small interest-free loans for refugees to procure agricultural tools or set up small businesses. Commenting on the gift, the Rev. Dr. A. Russell Stevenson, director of the Overseas Program of the National Council said it would help the church group "to join hands with members of the Jewish community in serving the needs of Palestine refugees.

YAACOV TSUR, JEWISH AGENCY LEADER, TO VISIT SOUTH AMERICAN COUNTRIES

JERUSALEM, Aug. 7, (JTA) -- Yaacov Tsur, member of the executive of the Jewish Agency, will leave for South America later this month to participate in two major events, it was announced here today. He will attend the South American Zionist conference in Montevideo on August 21. A week later, Mr. Tsur will take part in the 100th anniversary celebration of the Argentine Jewish community. Mr. Tsur was formerly Israel's Ambassador to Argentina.
