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### WASHINGTON COURT POSTPONES ROCKWELL TRIAL; WILL HEAR TWO CHARGES

WASHINGTON, Aug. 17. (JTA) -- George Lincoln Rockwell will be tried on two charges of disturbing the peace pending against him, on August 26. This was decided today by Municipal Court Judge George B. Neilson upon a motion of Assistant Corporation Counsel Clark King.

The trial on charges of disorderly conduct at a rally on July 3, scheduled for today, was continued to be held together with the trial on similar charges arising from a later incident. Both hearings will now be held jointly on August 26, the date which was previously set for the trial on charges of "violating an act of Congress" at a Nazi rally on July 24 when Rockwell signaled his troopers to attack hecklers.

Meanwhile, the Nazi "commander" has filed a libel suit against the Washington Daily News demanding \$110,000 damages. The newspaper today concluded a three-part series on Rockwell and his group. It accompanied each of the three articles with an editorial remark saying that the best way to handle Rockwell, in the opinion of the paper, is "to keep him in the open where everyone can see him and his Nazi demagoguery for what it is."

(In New York, the Civil Liberties Union said today that it will support a petition filed by Rockwell with the State Supreme Court to force New York City to let him hold a public meeting in Union Square. The city had denied him a permit for such a meeting on July 4 after a wave of public protest. The hearing on the petition will take place in the State Supreme Court next Wednesday.)

### ISRAEL AND ARGENTINA EXPECTED TO EXCHANGE NEW ENVOYS IN OCTOBER

TEL AVIV, Aug. 17. (JTA) -- Israel and Argentina will probably exchange new envoys early in October, Shabtai Rosenne, legal adviser to the Israeli Foreign Ministry, said today.

Mr. Rosenne, who returned to Israel from Buenos Aires, said that all the Argentinian personalities he met -- the President, the Foreign Minister and the legal adviser to the Foreign Ministry -- expressed their desire to consider the Eichmann case as closed and hoped for the restoration of friendly relations as soon as possible.

Mr. Rosenne was sent to Argentina to work out an agreement with that government in Buenos Aires after diplomatic relations between Israel and Argentina were severed as a result of the capture of Eichmann.

### ISRAEL SENDS HIGH OFFICIAL TO CYPRUS; ACTS ON DIPLOMATIC RELATIONS

JERUSALEM, Aug. 17. (JTA) -- Arthur Liveran, head of the Foreign Ministry's Division of British Commonwealth Affairs, left for Cyprus today on a special mission in connection with the establishment of diplomatic relations between Israel and the new Cyprus Republic. Cyprus achieved independence yesterday.

The Ministry declined to confirm reports that Mr. Liveran was the bearer of a special message on this subject from the Government of Israel to the new Cypriot President, Bishop Makarios.

Israel's move is an aftermath to mounting pressure by the United Arab Republic, aimed to prevent the establishment of regular diplomatic relations between this country and Cyprus. Cairo Radio has broadcast a claim that Cyprus has decided to establish an Embassy in Cairo, and has rejected the suggestion of accrediting an Israeli Embassy at Nicosia. Neither of these claims by Cairo has proven true, so far.

Israel has long had a consulate at Nicosia. Cyprus had originally planned to open only four full Embassies -- at Athens, Ankara, London and Washington, and to have only consulates in ten or 12 other countries, including Israel.

Indicating Israel's expanding contacts with new nations, it was announced here today that regular teleprinter service has been established between Israel and the Republic of the Congo and the Mali Federation.

### ESHKOL TO SEEK INVESTMENTS FOR ISRAEL IN U.S., ENGLAND, FRANCE

TEL AVIV, Aug. 17. (JTA) -- Levi Eshkol, Israel's Finance Minister, is coming to the United States next month to explore the possibilities of further American investments in Israel and to try to reach an agreement with the International Bank for Reconstruction and Development for a loan to aid industrial development of the Dead Sea potash works, it was revealed here today. Possibilities for further investments in Israel will also be discussed by him, during his September tour, with financiers in England and France.

At the present time, Mr. Eshkol declared here today, he is trying to face up to increased governmental expenses that are straining the government's budget. Among the unexpected expenses are those caused by an increase in salaries for school teachers. This item, he declared, may run into "several million pounds." He promised that the extra expenses would be raised without new taxation. The added monies, he stated, would come from the increased duties on certain imports.

### ISRAEL ASKS U.S. TO PERMIT EXPANSION OF POULTRY AND EGG EXPORTS

JERUSALEM, Aug. 17. (JTA) -- Minister of Agriculture Moshe Dayan asked U.S. Secretary of Agriculture Ezra Taft Benson to withdraw American opposition to expansion of Israel's egg and poultry exports. Mr. Benson, who left Israel today, said he would transmit the request to Washington.

Last year, American and European poultry farmers asked for a limitation of Israel's exports in the field, contending that Israel was using American surplus fodder to compete with the Americans and Europeans in the European markets. In response to those objections, Israel agreed, six months ago, to limit its exports to 300,000,000 eggs and \$600,000 worth of poultry annually.

Mr. Benson said that during 1959, Israel imported \$60,000,000 worth of American agricultural products making the U.S. the chief agricultural supplier to Israel.

### MOROCCO SUSPENDS RADIO SERVICE TO ISRAEL; FOLLOWS ARAB LEAGUE POLICY

JERUSALEM, Aug. 17. (JTA) -- The Moroccan Government has suspended radio communications with Israel, the International Telecommunications Union informed the Post Office here today. The move was apparently made in deference to the policy of the Arab League banning all contacts between League members and Israel.

Earlier this year, under pressure from the Arab League, Morocco stopped mail service with Israel, causing considerable hardship to tens of thousands of families in Israel who are unable to correspond directly with relatives in the North African country.

### ISRAEL EXPECTED TO PRODUCE 60 EXECUTIVE-TYPE JET PLANES A YEAR

LONDON, Aug. 17. (JTA) -- Details of the production plans by Israel Aircraft Industries, Ltd., of executive-type jet aircraft for export were revealed here today by Barclays Bank Overseas Review. According to the Review, Israel will produce 60 of the jet craft a year. The ships are said to be planned to fly at 420 miles per hour, at an altitude of 33,000 feet.

The Review also reports that Israel's diamond exports during the first six months of this year have totalled a value of \$28,648,000, an increase of \$6,220,000 over the comparable period of 1959. Diamond imports from January to June this year were valued at \$8,221,000, by comparison with \$6,335,000 in the same period of 1959.

### ISRAEL GOVT. TO UNIFY INFORMATION WORK OF VARIOUS DEPARTMENTS

JERUSALEM, Aug. 17. (JTA) -- The Government has decided to set up a unified Information Center under the auspices of the Prime Minister's Office, it was reported here today.

The New Information Center will coordinate the information activities of various Government departments and public bodies including the Press Information Office, the Public Relations and Culture departments of the Foreign Ministry, the Kol Yisrael State radio network, and the Public Information Department of the Ministry of Education. Harry Zinder, director of Kol Yisrael, is expected to be appointed head of the Center.

### ISRAEL FIRM TO CONSTRUCT PARLIAMENT BUILDING IN SIERRA LEONE

JERUSALEM, Aug. 17. (JTA) -- Final agreement has been reached between the Joint National Construction Company of Sierra Leone and Solel Boneh, here, for the construction of the new Parliament building at Freetown, it was announced here today by Rogers Wright, Sierra Leone Development Minister. Solel Boneh is the construction arm of Histadrut, the Israel Federation of Labor.

According to the plans announced by Mr. Wright, the main building of Sierra Leone's Parliament will be ready by April, 1961, when the present British protectorate achieves independence.

### GERMANY ESTABLISHES ADVISORY BODY TO STRENGTHEN ANTI-NAZI EDUCATION

BONN, Aug. 17. (JTA) -- A 12-man commission of scholars and educators was established by the West German Government here today to advise the states in the Federal Republic about increasing and improving civic education, so that the pupils in the German schools may know more about the anti-democratic and anti-Semitic policies and practices of the Nazi regime.

The commission was set up in accordance with plans proposed in Parliament last spring by Dr. Gerhard Schroeder, Federal Minister of Education. He proposed the plan as a result of the outbreak of swastika-smearings and anti-Semitic sloganeering that spread throughout the country last winter. Prof. Max Horkheimer, prominent Jewish-German social scientist, is a member of the commission.

The plan is for the commission to advise the states on methods of teaching pupils in civics and history courses in such a way that they would understand the unsocial nature of Nazism. The Federal Government itself does not control the educational systems in the states, jurisdiction in that respect being reserved, constitutionally, to the state governments.

#### Germany's Entertainment Industry Mobilized for Anti-Nazi Education

NEW YORK, Aug. 17. (JTA) -- The West German entertainment industry has been mobilized to carry to the German people the truth about the Third Reich, the newspaper Variety reported here today. It said show business was "playing a major role via television, films, traveling exhibits and shows in intensifying the examination of the Third Reich."

The paper reported that at the recent Mannheim documentary film fest, "thousands of students saw films dealing with the Nazi era." It said the West German Government had bought prints of the French documentary, "Night and Fog," dealing with the Nazi regime, and was showing the film to students and organized groups.

In Frankfurt, "10,000 shocked Germans" attended the first week of an exhibit, "Night Descended Over Germany," depicting the crimes of the Hitler regime, the paper stated. In Dortmund, an exhibit of newspaper clippings and documents on National Socialism was opened for schools by the Westphalian-Lower Rhenish Institute for Newspaper Research, it reported.

The West German television network recently carried a program dealing with the Jews who survived the concentration camps and now live in Germany. Another TV program dealt with the torture of the Jews under the Hitler regime. This fall, the paper reported, the West German network will carry a series of programs sponsored by the Cologne station and the South German network called "the road into the Abyss, 1933 to 1945."

On the stage, the paper said, Berthold Brecht's play, "Schweik in the Second World War," has been a sensation. The story is of a Czech soldier who defies the Nazis in an attempt to protect his Jewish friends.

The paper noted that "the film industry in Germany has yet to meet the problems of the Nazi era head-on with a true examination of Hitler and his henchmen." It criticized a number of recently produced films on the Nazi era which, it said, made the Nazis "the traditional 'bad men' and the non-Nazi Germans the 'good brave soldiers' playing out their roles in a war not of their making."

### GERMAN COURT SENTENCES SON OF NAZI GUARD AT DACHAU CAMP FOR SLANDER

MUNICH, Aug. 17. (JTA) -- The 25-year-old son of a former Dachau camp guard was sentenced today to seven months imprisonment for slander and defamation of the dead. The prisoner, Martin Siegler, created an uproar last week among visitors to the museum erected at the camp site in memory of the Nazi victims exterminated there, when he told an attendant that the crematorium had been constructed by the Americans after the war as a propaganda device.

Siegler also said to the Jewish attendant, who was a former inmate of the camp, that "They must have forgotten to shove you into the oven." The prisoner claimed that his father was an SS guard at the camp who had been sentenced to a 15-year jail term but had served only five years.

### MICHIGAN STATE BODY TO GUARD AGAINST BIAS IN ELECTIONS REACTIVATED

DETROIT, Aug. 17. (JTA) -- Gov. G. Mennen Williams has reactivated the State's Fair Election Practices Commission, according to an announcement here today. The chairman of the commission is the Rt. Rev. Richard S. Emrich, Bishop of the Catholic Diocese of Michigan, and the members include Protestants and Jews, among them Rabbi Morris Adler.

The commission's goal, according to Bishop Emrich, is "to guard against the intrusion of racial or religious issues and of unethical practices" in this year's election campaign in this state.

### STATE SUPPORT TO JEWISH DAY SCHOOLS IN CANADA OPPOSED BY LEADER

MONTREAL, Aug. 17. (JTA) -- Opposition to the granting of government funds for the support of Jewish day schools and private Jewish schools was expressed here today by Saul Hayes, executive vice-president of the Canadian Jewish Congress.

"The general practical consideration," declared Mr. Hayes, "is that, if tax monies are used for private schools, a great drain on the public treasury will take place, which will not be to the benefit of the citizen and will create very serious arguments." He held that Jewish day schools must be considered private schools.

"The specific practical question," he continued, "is how Jewish schools would operate if the government supported them. To my mind, the issue is clear. There would be such an interference by the Department of Education, which would insist on a certain curriculum; which would measure the amount of time that would have to be given for the complete curriculum on the basis of what is given in the public schools; and that would leave all other subjects, such as Hebrew and Jewish history, to extra-curricular time-tables.

"I believe dogmatically that, if the Jewish schools accept government monies, within a few years the whole character of the schools will be changed, and the Jewish day school will be back to the old system of Jewish subjects after school hours. Then the whole fuss will be about having Jewish children in a building owned by Jews, but nothing else."

As for the position of the Canadian Jewish Congress, Mr. Hayes asserted that "actually, Congress has not taken any official view of the day school. Nowhere will you find any resolutions to this effect. It is frankly and avowedly in favor of 'bigger and better' Jewish education, and that is all."

"I will candidly admit," the executive asserted, "that there is a general feeling that the day schools are good ideas, but only for gifted children, being those who can take a full course according to the curriculum of the Department of Education in any given province and who can add to this during the school hours, Jewish history, Hebrew and such other distinctly Jewish subjects as give a school a Jewish character. For people who want this for their children, either the community should pay for the gifted children, or parents should do so, or as is now the case in Jewish high schools, a combination of both. To ask government to do so may or may not run counter to the Congress philosophy, but there is no known or stated position as yet."

### BELZER HASSIDIM HOLD WORLD CONCLAVE; NAME YOUTH AS BELZER REBBE

JERUSALEM, Aug. 17. (JTA) -- Twelve-year-old Issacher Dov "Berele" Rokeach will be named the new Belzer Rebbe when he reaches the age of 18, it was decided here today at a meeting of some 2,000 Belzer hassidim, including 100 delegates from overseas.

The meeting was convened to coincide with the third anniversary of the death of Rabbi Aaron Rokeach, the late Belzer Rebbe. The Belzer dynasty dates back four centuries and was named for Belz, the town in Poland where the rabbinic family lived.

The hassidim also decided to raise \$250,000 to enlarge the Belzer Yeshiva in Jerusalem and to construct a new synagogue building here to honor the late Rebbe. The speakers, all of whom stressed the need for strengthening the Belzer influence throughout world Jewry, included Rabbi Moses Shapiro, head of the American Belzer hassidim.

### YIVO PUBLISHING BIBLIOGRAPHY OF WORKS DEALING WITH NAZI ATROCITIES

NEW YORK, Aug. 17. (JTA) -- Publication of a series of books containing a bibliography of works dealing with the Nazi atrocities against Jews, from 1933 to 1945, and including also materials dealing with the background and aftermath of these atrocities, was announced here jointly today by the Yivo Institute for Jewish Research and the Yad Vashem Remembrance Authority of Jerusalem. The latter is the official documentary center for materials dealing with the Nazi holocaust.

The first volume of the series, "Guide to Jewish History Under Nazi Impact," is now out, written by Jacob Robinson and Philip Friedman. The second, edited by Mr. Friedman, is "Bibliography of Hebrew Books on the Catastrophe and Heroism," just published in Jerusalem.

Other works in the series will be: "Bibliography of Yiddish Books on the Catastrophe and Heroism," edited by Mr. Friedman; "The Hungarian Jewish Catastrophe," edited by Randolph L. Brahm; and "A Bibliography of Books, Pamphlets, and Newspapers of the Sheerit ha-Pleta," by Joseph Gar.

In preparation also is a two-volume "Bibliography of Articles in Hebrew Periodicals," by Baruch Ofir; and volumes by Joseph Gar, John Fried, Rose Klepfisz and Henry Sachs. YIVO undertook the project in 1954 after concluding an agreement in Jerusalem with Yad Vashem.
