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GOLDA MEIR HEADS ISRAEL'S DELEGATION TO UNITED NATIONS GENERAL ASSEMBLY

JERUSALEM, Sept. 13. (JTA) -- Israel's Foreign Minister Golda Meir will leave for New York on September 19 as head of the Israeli delegation to the United Nations General Assembly which opens next week, it was announced here today. The delegation will be composed of at least 23 members, including six members of the Israel Parliament.

Informed sources said here today that Israel will reiterate at the UN Assembly its suggestion that the first stage of world disarmament, under foolproof control, should be implemented in Israel and the neighboring countries. The Israeli delegates will express this idea during the general debate at the Assembly and in the debate on disarmament.

Israeli speakers will also reiterate Israel's willingness to negotiate with the Arabs but it was believed unlikely that Israel would renew its proposal to negotiate on specific problems in Israel-Arab relations, such as the Arab refugee question, separately before general Israel-Arab peace talks. The present Israel position was reported to be that if the Arabs are ready to sit down to a peace parley, Israel is willing to negotiate all outstanding problems.

The Israeli delegation to the Assembly this year will be the largest ever sent. In addition to Mr. Meir, it will include Arieh Levavi, assistant director-general of the Foreign Ministry; Simcha Pratt, director of the Foreign Ministry's International Organization Division; Shabtai Rosenne, the Foreign Ministry's legal adviser; and Ambassador Eliahu Sasson, envoy to Italy.

The delegation will also include Michael S. Comay, permanent representative at the United Nations; Ambassador Arieh Eshel, deputy permanent representative; Bin-yamin Eliav, Minister Plenipotentiary and Consul General in New York; Arieh Eilan and Miss Hava Hareli, members of the permanent mission to the UN, and Nathan Bar-Yaacov, labor attache at the Washington Embassy.

Arab Diplomats Seek Invitation for Nasser to Washington

WASHINGTON, Sept. 13. (JTA) -- Arab diplomats here are using pressure to have President Nasser of the United Arab Republic invited to Washington as an official guest of the United States Government during his visit to the United Nations as head of his country's delegation to the UN Assembly, it was revealed here today.

Indicating to Washington officials that Nasser was expecting such an invitation, the Arab diplomats were trying to create an impression that Nasser's visit to Washington would improve Arab relations with the United States. Some officials in the State Department favor the extending of such an invitation, while others believe that such a gesture would provoke strong protests in this country among Jews.

(In New York, Former President Harry S. Truman yesterday denounced Nasser along with heads of Communist states planning to attend the United Nations General Assembly. Speaking before a group of foreign-language newspaper editors, Mr. Truman declared: "I don't think any more of Nasser than I do of Khrushchev, and they can both go to the bottom of the Atlantic as far as I'm concerned.")

Nasser Seeks 'Summit Conference' of Afro-Asian Leaders at U.N.

LONDON, Sept. 13. (JTA) -- President Nasser of the United Arab Republic, making his first visit to a western country to attend the United Nations General Assembly, will stay in the United States at least a week and possibly longer, it was reported today from Cairo.

The longer visit would develop if African leaders at the General Assembly decide to hold their own "summit conference" at the UN, the report said. Arrangements were being made between the UAR, Yugoslavia and Afro-Asian officials on the date for a meeting of the heads of state in New York, the report revealed.

The report also said that before leaving for a first visit to Norway en route to New York, UAR Foreign Minister Mahmoud Fawzi said: "We want to have a hand in everything that goes on. International problems are no longer the monopoly of the Big Powers."

AMERICAN DRUG FIRM WILL EXPAND TRADE WITH ISRAEL; IGNORES ARAB THREAT

TEL AVIV, Sept. 13. (JTA) -- The Winthrop Drug Corporation, an American firm, is going to expand its trade activities in Israel, despite pressures from the Arab League's boycott office to halt trade activities in this country, it was announced here today by the Israeli agents of the corporation.

Rumors had been circulated that Winthrop intended to yield to Arab pressure and pull out of Israel, after the corporation had canceled another agent's franchise here. The rumors arose from the change and do not reflect the American firm's policy, the new agent declared.

HADASSAH CONVENTION TOLD OF MEDICAL WELFARE SERVICES TO AFRICAN LANES

NEW YORK, Sept. 13. (JTA) -- The Hadassah Medical Organization is helping African nations meet their pressing medical and health needs "in a strenuous effort to save human life, which is being wasted needlessly for want of trained medical personnel and adequate health facilities," Dr. Kalman J. Mann, director general of HMO, told the 46th national convention of Hadassah today.

He said that Africa needs at least 60,000 physicians "immediately" to meet the "urgent" health problems confronting the continent's population, estimated at from 200,000,000 to 250,000,000 persons.

Dr. Mann said that the number of native born African doctors ranges from "none in the Congo, which has a population of 15,000,000 to 314 in Ghana--the most medically advanced country--which has a population of 6,500,000."

Dr. Mann addressed more than 2,500 delegates and guests, representing Hadassah's more than 318,000 members. He said that Hadassah was now seeking "international funds" for a stepped-up program to educate Africans as physicians, nurses and pharmacists. Dr. Mann, who is also a member of the committee of Specialists of the World Health Organization, declared:

"A comprehensive program of undergraduate and of post-graduate training for medical students and physicians, nurses, dentists and pharmacists should be launched immediately under the auspices of the World Health Organization with the cooperation of international funds and the world's leading medical institutions.

"Within this scheme, the Hebrew University-Hadassah Medical School would be ready to do its utmost. The Medical School has already begun the nucleus of training undergraduate African students in medicine and nursing."

Details of Medical Education Aid to African Nations Outlined

Dr. Mann said that at the requests of the Governments of Ethiopia and Liberia, Hadassah has already surveyed the medical and health needs of these countries. As a result, he added:

1. A limited number of Ethiopian medical students are now being trained at the Hebrew University-Hadassah Medical School in Jerusalem.
2. Liberian nursing students are now being trained at Hadassah's Henrietta Szold school of nursing in Jerusalem.
3. A special hospital has been set up in Liberia to combat eye diseases. A Hadassah ophthalmologist is now in Liberia to supervise the work of this hospital.

Dr. Mann said that the Hadassah Medical Organization is also cooperating with the Israel Medical mission in the Congo.

Earlier, in behalf of Hadassah, Mrs. Nathan D. Perlman, national chairman of the Hadassah Medical Organization in the United States, presented Dr. Mann with a "surgical stapler" developed in the Soviet Union. The mechanical instrument, designed for joining the ends of blood vessels and nerves, will be taken to Israel by Dr. Mann for use by surgeons of the Hadassah Medical Organization.

At the session devoted to a review of Hadassah's medical work in Israel, Professor Bernhard Zondek, head of Hadassah's Department of Obstetrics and Gynecology and Professor of Obstetrics and Gynecology at the Hebrew University-Hadassah Medical School, reported on the results of five years of experimentation which led to his discovery of a method of determining whether a fetus is in danger during the last four months of pregnancy. Dr. Zondek, internationally known as the co-discoverer of the Ashem-Zondek test for pregnancy and for his work on female endocrinology has spent more than 30 years in his search for such a method.

Dr. Amiel Adler, head of Hadassah's department of physical medicine and rehabilitation, reported on his research in the use of short wave radiation for treatment of arthritis and allied conditions.

Mrs. Mortimer Jacobson called upon the leaders of Hadassah to undertake a campaign to "re-educate the total American community on the true meaning and philosophy of Zionism." Mrs. Jacobson asserted that "too many unfriendly sources have been trying to befuddle the lofty objectives of Zionism, especially now that the State of Israel is established."

RUMANIA RELEASES RABBIS UNDER AMNESTY; WERE IMPRISONED FOR YEARS

LONDON, Sept. 13. (JTA) -- Several rabbis who have been in Rumanian prisons for a number of years for alleged offenses against the state have been released on Presidential amnesties, the Agudah World Executive reported here today on the basis of information from Bucharest. The executive listed Rabbi Arie Leib Halpert as one of those released.

The Orthodox organization had submitted a list of imprisoned rabbis to the Rumanian Minister in London and with the list a request that the Rumanian President exercise clemency and release the religious leaders on humanitarian grounds.

TERRORISTS BOMB JEWS IN ALGERIAN TOWN; TWO ATTACKS IN ONE WEEK

ALGIERS, Sept. 13. (JTA) -- A Jewish merchant and two other men were injured here today when terrorists tossed a hand grenade into the jewelry store owned by Jacob Allouche. The others injured, in addition to Mr. Allouche, were a clerk in his store and a passerby. It was the second attack of the kind in a week, in the Jewish quarter of Constantine. Last week, a bomb was thrown at another store.

Neither the terrorist who threw the grenade today, nor the one who tossed the bomb last week, has been apprehended. Residents of the Jewish quarter are concerned about the attacks. Until now, Jews have largely escaped attack by terrorists here.

BONN GOVT. REQUESTS EXTRADITION OF GERMAN ANTI-SEMITES FROM ITALY

BONN, Sept. 13. (JTA) -- The West German Foreign Ministry today formally requested Italy to extradite Ludwig Zind, convicted German schoolteacher who was nabbed in Naples after escaping from Germany after he was sentenced to a year's imprisonment.

Zind was about to board a ship several weeks ago at Naples for Libya, where a teaching job awaited him, when he was recognized by Israeli sailors along the piers. They called Italian police who arrested him. The man is now in an Italian jail. Officials here expressed opinions, privately, that they are not certain the Italian Government would honor the extradition request. There is no extradition treaty between Germany and Italy.

GERMAN DEFENSE MINISTRY SATISFIED WITH WEAPONS MADE IN ISRAEL

BONN, Sept. 13. (JTA) -- Delivery of weapons purchased from Israel in the spring of 1959 is progressing smoothly, a spokesman for the West German Defense Ministry said here today. The purchase included grenades valued at \$6,700,000, 40 percent of which have been delivered, and Uzi submachine guns valued at \$1,500,000, half of which have been delivered.

The spokesman said the weapons "have fully satisfied our expectations," adding that "we would not have signed the contract in the first place if preliminary tests had not proved that they were the best to be had." He also said that currently there were no further arms contracts under consideration.

INTERNATIONAL BODY GETS EVIDENCE AGAINST NAZI CAMP PHYSICIAN

BONN, Sept. 13. (JTA) -- New evidence against Dr. Josef Mengele, Nazi camp physician at Auschwitz, whom West Germany seeks to prosecute for criminal activities, has been turned over to the public prosecutor at Freiburg, the International Auschwitz Committee announced here today.

Mengele has been reported in hiding in Argentina, and the Federal Republic has requested Argentina to extradite him. However, Argentine authorities have said they could not find the man. According to the Auschwitz Committee, the new evidence against Mengele includes statements sworn by some of Mengele's accomplices, testifying to his conduct of medical "experiments" with Jewish victims at the death camp.

(In New York, the offices of the World Jewish Congress have announced that steps are being taken in Germany to prosecute a number of ex-Nazis responsible for war crimes at the Treblinka camp, where about 700,000 Jews were put to death. The WJC has requested Treblinka survivors in the United States who can testify about the atrocities to contact its New York headquarters.)

WELL-KNOWN BAVARIAN MUSICIAN ARRESTED; CHARGED WITH KILLING JEWS

BONN, Sept. 13. (JTA) -- A well-known Bavarian musician, 39-year-old Peter Blum, was arrested at his home at Schweinsfurt on charges of murdering Jews in Poland during World War II. During the war, Blum was a member of the Nazi SS.

STUDENTS IN TURKEY REQUEST MINORITIES TO SPEAK TURKISH IN PUBLIC

ISTANBUL, Sept. 13. (JTA) -- Through posters and publicity in the press, the National Union of Turkish Students, supported by a number of Turkish professional groups, today launched a country-wide campaign to get peoples of minority groups in this country to speak Turkish in public. The campaign affects Jews living in Turkey. Many of the older generation of Jews speak either Ladino or French.

1,000 U.S. JEWS SETTLED IN ISRAEL DURING YEAR, JEWISH AGENCY REPORTS

JERUSALEM, Sept. 13. (JTA) -- Approximately 1,000 Jews emigrated to Israel from the United States, during the Hebrew year 5720, according to figures released here today by the Jewish Agency.

Included among the newcomers from the U.S.A., the data showed, were 148 Halutzim, 76 Hassidim, 161 elderly persons, and 155 Americans who had decided to remain here after coming as visitors.

DOBKIN URGES ZIONIST MOVEMENT TO OPEN ITS DOORS TO ALL JEWISH GROUPS

NEW YORK, Sept. 13. (JTA) -- The need for the Zionist movement to open its door to other Jewish organizations, especially in the United States, to work with the movement for the common goal of supporting Israel and strengthening Jewish life everywhere, was emphasized by Eliahu Dobkin, member of the Jerusalem section of the Jewish Agency, addressing the concluding session of the national conference of the Farband Labor Zionist Order. He also urged that the Zionist movement should extend its activities in countries outside of Israel in the fields of Hebrew and Jewish education, youth and Chalutzut.

Mr. Dobkin recommended that the Farband delegation to the World Zionist Congress should support a proposal that at least 10 percent of the total budget of the Jewish Agency, which amounts to over 200 million pounds annually, be designated for activities in countries outside of Israel. He stressed the dire need of the Zionist movement to strengthen the Zionist position in Jewish education and enable the movement to expand the activities for Chalutzut, which, he said, is of primary importance for the State of Israel.

COL. KATZIN NAMED HEAD OF U.N. SECURITY DURING KHRUSHCHEV'S VISIT

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y., Sept. 13. (JTA) -- United Nations Secretary General Dag Hammarskjold announced yesterday that he has appointed Alfred G. Katzin, a South African, to over-all charge of UN security, protocol and press relations during the early part of the UN General Assembly session. During this period Soviet Premier Khrushchev and other heads of state will be present.

Col. Katzin, 54 years old, is a Jew who was educated at Diocesan College, Rondebosch, South Africa. During World War II he served on active duty in East Africa, Egypt, the Middle East and North Africa, and later was attached to the Allied military headquarters for the Balkans. He has been on the staff of the United Nations since 1948. He has been active head of the UN Office of Public Information, a deputy undersecretary and, in 1956-1957, special assistant to Mr. Hammarskjold for clearance of the Suez Canal. He has also carried out, over the years, many other special assignments for the Secretary General.

I. L. O. NAMES FRIEDA MILLER FOR STUDIES IN ISRAEL AND MOSLEM LANDS

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y., Sept. 13. (JTA) -- Miss Frieda S. Miller, former director of the Women's Bureau of the United States Department of Labor, and one-time Industrial Commissioner for the State of New York under the governorship of Herbert H. Lehman, today was named by the International Labor Organization to make special surveys of labor conditions affecting children and youth in the Near and Middle East.

Miss Miller, who will make her headquarters at the ILO office in Istanbul, will conduct her surveys through visits to Iraq, Iran, Israel, Lebanon, and the United Arab Republic as well as in Turkey. Her report will be filed at the world headquarters of ILO in Geneva.

IRON CURTAIN COUNTRIES REJECT DR. HERZL STAMP ISSUED BY ISRAEL

JERUSALEM, Sept. 13. (JTA) -- Israeli postal officials disclosed today that new stamps bearing a likeness of Theodor Herzl are being rejected by postal officials in Iron Curtain countries. Letters with such stamps are returned from these countries stamped "unacceptable."

The Herzl stamp is the second rejected by Communist countries. The first was one issued in conjunction with World Refugee Year. It depicted a Yemenite Jewish family sitting on a flying carpet as a symbol of the Ingathering of the Exiles.

N. Y. FRATERNAL GROUPS TO SELL \$1,000,000 OF ISRAEL BONDS IN 100 DAYS

NEW YORK, Sept. 13. (JTA) -- A special 100-day campaign to raise \$1,000,000 for the economic development of the State of Israel was launched by the Fraternal Division of the Israel Bond drive today at a leadership conference held at the Piccadilly Hotel.

The conference, attended by representatives of more than 3,000 fraternal organizations in the New York metropolitan area, formulated action to be taken to help mobilize investment capital for the Jewish State through the sale of Israel bonds. The special drive is expected to bring to \$15,000,000 the amount of Israel bonds sold through fraternal organizations since the inception of the campaign ten years ago.
