### ALGERIAN REBELS ATTACK JEWISH QUARTER IN ORAN; BURN DOWN FOUR STORES

PARIS, Sept. 26; (JTA) -- Commandos of the Algerian rebel organization, the FLN, slipped into the Jewish quarter of Oran last night undetected by security forces and burned down four Jewish shops, it was reported here today from Algeria.

The attack sparked fears that there might be a renewal of the violence which took place during the two days of Rosh Hashanah, in which three Arabs were killed and scores of Jews and Arabs attacked. A few days later, a Jew was killed and a 15-year-old Jewish boy wounded in new rioting between Jews and Moslems in the Jewish section. French security forces have been on duty in the area since the initial fighting.

### ALL PARTIES IN ISRAEL, EXCEPT COMMUNISTS, BACK BORDER SHOOTING OF ARABS

JERUSALEM, Sept. 26; (JTA) -- The Foreign Affairs and Security committee of Israel's Parliament was reported today to be planning to consider the border incidents of last week in which five Israeli Arabs were killed while trying to cross over into the Egyptian held Gaza Strip. It was emphasized, meanwhile, that all factions, excluding the Communists, were backing the stand of the Government in upholding the border actions.

Reports by Chief of Staff Zvi Tsur, police inspector Joseph Nahmias and the head of security services at a special Cabinet meeting on the border security situation and the circumstances of the shootings convinced Cabinet members that the border forces had no alternative but to fire at the potential border trespassers.

After hearing the reports, the leftist Mapam withdrew its proposal for establishment of an inquiry committee to review the shootings. A Cabinet statement stressed that it was the duty of security forces to prevent illegal border crossings and to defend Israel from spies, saboteurs and murderers. The statement stressed that documentary evidence had demonstrated that rumors of alleged mutilation of the bodies of the five Arabs were spread by elements "hostile to the state."

"The Cabinet is satisfied that the security forces acted in accordance with the law," the statement said. It was recalled at the Cabinet meeting that a member of a kibbutz near the Gaza Strip was killed when he failed to identify himself while walking near the border.

### Police Track Down Arab Instigators; Two Communist Leaders Detained

The Cabinet emphasized that any Israeli citizen can leave the country legally and that the fact that the five Arabs tried to cross illegally indicated that they were involved in illegal activities. It was assumed they were part of an organized group acting on behalf of the United Arab Republic intelligence and that they apparently intended to return to Israel. Israel sources indicated that UAR intelligence activities have been stepped up considerably in recent months.

As life in the Arab towns which were the centers of protest demonstrations returned to normal, police began today a crackdown of "Nasserite elements" known to have been behind the anti-Israel demonstrations. The suspects, who are believed to be part of an organized group, and whose names are known to police, disappeared from their homes as soon as the demonstrations were brought under control.

Some of the organizers of the demonstrations were hiding in the hills around Nazareth. They were detained when they returned to their homes last night. The leaders of the Communist party in Nazareth, Toufik Ziad, secretary of the Nazareth Communist party and a member of the Municipal Council, and Loufi Zari, a Communist leader in the Habun village, were found hiding and detained on charges of inciting the demonstrations.

Nazareth shop and restaurant owners apparently were the main victims of the disturbances, which led tourists and Israelis who come to Nazareth on Sundays and holidays to cancel such plans last week.

### BEN-GURION IS 75 TODAY; HAILED BY DR. GOLDMANN; DECORATED BY DAHOMEY

JERUSALEM, Sept. 26; (JTA) -- The "great contributions of Prime Minister David Ben-Gurion to the realization of the Zionist vision" was hailed today on the occasion of his 75th birthday in a message from Dr. Nahum Goldmann in behalf of the World Zionist executive.

The cable also lauded the Prime Minister's "contributions in the establishment of Israel's armed forces" and his initiative in the proclamation of the Jewish State. The message added

that "despite basic differences of opinion between the movement and you about the tasks of the Zionist movement, we see you in historical perspective today as one of the supreme Zionists of our time;"

The Prime Minister, who will be 75 tomorrow, received his first present two days ahead of his birthday. It was the "Grand Croix Dahomenc," the highest order of Dahomey, one of the new African states. The order was presented to the Prime Minister at his desert retreat in Sde-Boker by Dahomey's president, Hubert Maga. The Dahomey president and his entourage members were guests at a luncheon in the kibbutz dining hall.

The two leaders held a 60-minute private talk, which was conducted in French and which was reported to have dealt with world peace problems, the African role in contribution to world peace and Israel-Dahomey ties. The Dahomey leader was a guest of Tel Aviv today and was greeted by thousands of Tel Aviv adults and school children when he and his party walked through the streets of Tel Aviv. #### U.N. DELEGATES CRITICIZE ASSEMBLY PRESIDENT FOR SNUBBING GOLDA MEIR

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y., Sept. 26; (JTA) -- Amazement was expressed here by leading delegates to the United Nations at the deliberate snubbing of Israel's Foreign Minister, Mrs. Golda Meir, by Mongi Slim, representative of Tunisia, who is now President of the UN General Assembly. The snub was termed by delegates here as a violation of the rules of etiquette and as "poor diplomatic judgment."

The snub took place yesterday at an informal reception held by President Kennedy after his address to the Assembly. In the reception line were also Assembly President Slim, Mrs. Kennedy, Secretary of State Dean Rusk and U.S. delegation chairman Adlai Stevenson. As the chairmen of all UN delegations moved forward in the reception line, Mrs. Meir came along as head of Israel's delegation, with Israel's permanent representative, Michael S. Cornay, behind her.

When Mrs. Meir reached the official reception line and was ready to put out her hand to Mr. Slim, the Assembly President turned his back on her and engaged in a conversation with the outgoing Assembly President, Frederick H. Boland of Ireland. Mrs. Meir, followed by Mr. Cornay, then shook hands with President Kennedy and the others in the reception line, and continued on her way.

The tactless action of Mr. Slim has raised today the question among various UN delegations as to whether he is fit to occupy the post of Acting Secretary General of the United Nations to which he aspires. It was pointed out that such a position for Mr. Slim would put Israel in jeopardy, since the late Mr. Hammarskjold had personal responsibilities in many functional areas affecting Arab-Israeli disputes.

The United Nations Truce Supervision Organization, the four mixed armistice commissions--consisting of representatives of Israel, and the Arab states--as well as the UN Emergency Force and the Palestine Conciliation Commission--all of these vital Middle East agencies are directly under the authority of the UN Secretary General. So, also, is the UN Relief and Works Agency for Arab refugees.

Mr. Slim, as the former permanent representative of Tunisia, is now the outstanding personality among all the Arab and Moslem states at the United Nations. As a Moslem state and a member of the Arab League, Tunisia does not recognize Israel.

#### U.N. EMISSARY ON ARAB REFUGEE PROBLEM MEETS WITH SECRETARY RUSK

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y., Sept. 26; (JTA) -- Dr. Edward E. Johnson, the United Nations Palestine Conciliation Commission's special Middle East emissary on the Arab refugee problem, conferred here today with United States Secretary of State Dean Rusk. The United States, France and Turkey are members of the Commission.

Dr. Johnson, who spent more than two weeks visiting the capitals of Israel, the United Arab Republic, Jordan and Lebanon, as well as the Beirut headquarters of the United Nations Relief and Works Agency, is now preparing his report to the PCC. The Commission must report to the General Assembly by October 15 on whether any progress had been made toward "repatriation" of Arab refugees into Israel or their compensation by Israel.

A United States source confirming the Johnson-Rusk meeting declined to offer any further comment regarding the conference. The United States source, incidentally, also said that Mr. Rusk, in the course of "meeting as many foreign ministers as possible," expected to meet also with Mrs. Golda Meir, Israel's Foreign Minister. However, no date for that talk has as yet been set.

#### GERMAN CLERGYMAN WHO TESTIFIED AT EICHMANN TRIAL TO BE HONORED IN ISRAEL

JERUSALEM, Sept. 26; (JTA) -- Dean Heinrich Gruber, the West German Evangelical leader who testified here several months during the Adolf Eichmann trial, will be honored here by a special "Heinrich Gruber Forest" to be planted by the Jewish National Fund, it was announced today. The German anti-Nazi has been invited to come to Israel to help dedicate the forest on his 70th birthday, next month.

### C. J. F. W. F. STARTS NATIONWIDE DRIVE TO SPUR COMMUNITY CASH COLLECTIONS

NEW YORK, Sept. 26, (JTA) -- An unprecedented nationwide effort to help its member communities collect millions of dollars in still outstanding pledges was launched by the Council of Jewish Federations and Welfare Funds, Irving Kane Council president, announced today.

According to Mr. Kane, this unusual step was taken because cash is needed immediately to contend with an unforeseen rise in immigration to Israel--beyond all expectations and budgetary provision--and to deal with the mounting costs of services provided by the overseas, national, and local agencies included in the welfare funds and federations of the United States and Canada.

He added that the Council's board decided to initiate this massive effort after consideration of the report of the Council's overseas delegation, which recently returned from a survey of needs in Israel and Europe; and after a community-by-community analysis of the cash collection situation in relation to the funds required to meet federation and welfare fund responsibilities.

Mr. Kane, who headed the overseas delegation stated that the most immediate and practical form of help for the increased current needs is to provide the cash already pledged; He pointed also to the backlog of unmet needs for immigrants already in Israel, especially the 150 agricultural settlements which can be made self-supporting within the next two years.

"Vigorous support now will not only speed the day when they no longer will be drawing on American Jewish aid, but will be contributing positively to developing Israel into a productive, self-sufficient nation," he declared. He also stressed the aid needed for the health-giving and life-saving work of the Joint Distribution Committee in Europe and North Africa.

Mr. Kane explained that the campaign machinery which the Council is now forging to help its 215 member federations and welfare funds raise the utmost possible cash during the next several weeks will stress especially contributors' commitments for 1960 and prior years. By removing the backlog of accounts past due, not only will urgently needed income be realized for use now, but it will pay the way for raising the greater sums required in 1962.

The CJFWF president strongly urged the Council's member communities to conduct this vital cash solicitation with the same efficiency, vigor and dedication with which they carry out their fund-raising drives, and pledged the complete cooperation of the officers, the members of the board and the staff of the CJFWF. This assistance will be adapted to the special differences and circumstances in each city. The best methods and techniques that communities have developed throughout the country will be brought to each city for such adaptation and use as may fit its needs, he emphasized.

The Council's cash mobilization effort in the total context of federations and welfare funds will be coordinated closely with the assistance of the National United Jewish Appeal, which will receive the bulk share of these proceeds for its overseas requirements.

### U. S. JEWISH COMMUNITIES PLAN TO CELEBRATE BEN-GURION'S 75TH BIRTHDAY

NEW YORK, Sept. 26, (JTA) -- The month of October will witness scores of dinners and other events throughout the United States and Canada dedicated to the 75th birthday of Prime Minister David Ben-Gurion, it was announced today by Dr. Joseph J. Schwartz, vice-president of the Israel Bond Organization.

According to the Hebrew calendar, Mr. Ben-Gurion's birthday will occur on Wednesday, September 27. However, in 1886, the year of his birth, the Gregorian calendar date was October 16. Following the latter date, special celebrations in honor of Israel's leader will be held during October under the auspices of Israel Bonds, Dr. Schwartz said. Cables of congratulation were addressed today to Prime Minister Ben-Gurion by Abraham Feinberg, president and Dr. Schwartz, vice-president of State of Israel Bond Organization.

"We believe that in arranging 75th birthday celebrations, Jewish communities are motivated not only by a genuine desire to honor Israel's world famous leader, but to advance the cause of Israel bonds which Mr. Ben-Gurion has characterized as the indispensable foundation for the country's continued growth economically, socially, culturally and scientifically," Dr. Schwartz declared.

### FIRST RABBINICAL SEMINARY IN ARGENTINA DEDICATED; HAS TWENTY STUDENTS

BUENOS AIRES, Sept. 26, (JTA) -- The first rabbinical seminary in Argentina, organized here three months ago, was officially dedicated here, with the participation of many of the leaders of the Argentine Jewish community.

The seminary, which has 20 students, is headed by an Orthodox rabbi, Rabbi Jacob Fink. The seminary is intended to train Jewish spiritual leaders, not only for the Argentine but also for service and leadership in neighboring countries.

### CATHOLIC NUNS IN BOSTON TO ESTABLISH SCHOOL SEEKING JEWISH PUPILS

WASHINGTON, Sept. 26; (JTA) -- The National Catholic Welfare Conference today made known that a community of nuns dedicated to winning the friendship of Jewish school children will be established within a year in Boston.

Cardinal Cushing announced the goal of the new order in the Catholic publication, "The Pilot," stating the Sisters of our Lady of Zion--founded in Paris in the last century--will include nuns wearing secular garb. The cardinal said the nuns would "welcome Jewish children in all their schools" and "help Catholics to understand and love them."

"The social service sisters undertake a variety of social work, wherever possible directly for the Jews; Their aim is not so much to convert the Jews as to overcome whatever mistrust they (the Jews) may have toward Catholics," Cardinal Cushing said.

"The contemplatives live in strict enclosure and pass a great part of their time before the blessed sacrament, adoring God in the name of the Jewish people and making continual intercession for them. They dedicate themselves to promoting understanding between Catholics and Jews, combatting anti-Semitism wherever they find it," the announcement stated.

### PHILADELPHIA RABBIS WILL NOT SERVE AT FUNCTIONS VIOLATING KASHRUTH

PHILADELPHIA, Sept. 26; (JTA) -- The Conservative rabbinate of Philadelphia has served notice that its members will refuse to officiate or participate in any religious and social events at which violations of the Sabbath and the Jewish Dietary Laws are likely. The 52 rabbis, affiliated with the local branch of the Rabbinical Assembly of America, made this position known during services at their synagogues.

Calling on all Jewish organizations to honor the dietary laws at public functions, the rabbis called the violation of Sabbath and kashruth a threat to the survival of Judaism. They condemned the manner in which some religious occasions have been celebrated in the Philadelphia Jewish community in recent years. Kosher caterers in Philadelphia agreed to abide strictly with the edict for all occasions booked since September 1.

The ban applies to such Sabbath violations as smoking, candle-lighting, photography or music other than vocal at functions sponsored by Jewish families or Jewish organizations. In their statement, the rabbis said they would not "attend or officiate at any time at functions catered by kosher caterers who permit any of these Sabbath violations."

### AMERICAN ZIONIST COUNCIL TO TRAIN TEACHERS IN MODERN HEBREW METHODS

NEW YORK, Sept. 26; (JTA) -- The Department of Education and Culture of the American Zionist Council announced today the establishment of a workshop to train teachers in modern methods of teaching Hebrew to adults.

The course, which will be without fees, is open to persons who have an adequate command of Hebrew and who are interested in teaching Hebrew to adults. The course, which is based on methods of teaching Hebrew to adults developed in Israel and adapted to American conditions, will consist of 20 hours of lectures and discussions and will be conducted in Hebrew. It will begin on October 14.

### DR. ALFRED HIRSCHBERG, JEWISH LEADER IN BRAZIL, HONORED ON 60TH BIRTHDAY

SÃO PAULO, Brazil, Sept. 26; (JTA) -- Dr. Alfred Hirschberg, executive director of the United Jewish Campaign here and representative of the Jewish Telegraphic Agency in Brazil was the recipient today of congratulations from numerous Jewish organizations in this country and abroad on the occasion of his 60th birthday which will be observed tomorrow.

Tribute to Dr. Hirschberg's services in Brazil and in pre-war Europe was paid in articles in a special edition of the "Chronica Israelita" published here. Dr. Hirschberg, who was held by the Nazis in the notorious Sachsenhausen concentration camp in 1938, came to Brazil in 1940 and became director of the Congregação Israelita Paulista. He later held the posts of executive director of Keren Hayesod and secretary of the Joint Distribution Committee in Brazil. He was also secretary of the Friends of the Hebrew University in São Paulo.

Prior to his settling in Brazil, Dr. Hirschberg was one of the leaders of the Central Verein of the Jews in Germany, leading representative body of German Jewry. He was also the editor of the CV-Zeitung, official organ of this organization. He received his doctorate at the University of Leipzig in 1927 and is the author of a number of works.

### JUDGE LOUIS GOODMAN DIES IN SAN FRANCISCO; WAS ACTIVE IN JEWISH AFFAIRS

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 26; (JTA) -- Louis E. Goodman, United States District Judge and chief judge of the District Court, died of a heart attack at the age of 69.

Judge Goodman had been a member of the board of directors of the Jewish Welfare Federation, a board member of Mt. Zion Hospital, a member of the Jewish Community Relations Council and other San Francisco Jewish organizations.
