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## PARCEL POST BOMB IN DAMASCUS INJURES EICHMANN AIDE WHO LIQUIDATED JEWS

JERUSALEM, Oct. 12: (JTA) -- An exporter using the name George Fisher, who was wounded today by the blast of a parcel post bomb in a Damascus postoffice, was identified as Alois Brunner, one of Adolf Eichmann's top Gestapo aides in the slaughter of European Jewry during the war;

Brunner, whose name came up during the trial of Eichmann this summer, was known in Eichmann's headquarters as "Brunner Number one," to distinguish him from his brother, Anton, another Eichmann aide; Anton was tried for his war crimes by a court in Vienna and hanged;

During the Vienna trial, the prosecution stressed that both brothers were equally guilty and Alois Brunner was accused of sending 48,000 Vienna Jews to death camps. He was also charged with having supervised the liquidation of Jewish communities in Greece, France, Slovakia, Austria and Germany and the transport of those Jews to death camps; Dieter Wisliceny, another Eichmann aide, testified at the Nuremberg trials that Alois Brunner was one of the most cruel officials in Eichmann's headquarters;

Reports received here following the close of the Eichmann trial last August indicated that Austrian police had renewed their search for Brunner who disappeared; Subsequent reports suggested that the missing Gestapo official had fled to Egypt and that after the Egyptian-Syrian unification into the United Arab Republic, he went to Damascus; There, as George Fisher, he reportedly helped to organize the Syrian intelligence service and then went into the export-import business; Most recently he was reported to be engaged in supplying arms to the Algerian rebels;

## EGYPT REJECTS ISRAEL'S OFFER OF NON-AGGRESSION PACT AND DISARMAMENT

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y., Oct. 12: (JTA) -- Israel's offer to the Arab states for disarmament and for the conclusion of a non-aggression pact--voiced this week at the United Nations General Assembly by Foreign Minister Golda Meir--was rejected today by Mahmoud Fawzi, Foreign Minister of the United Arab Republic;

Addressing the General Assembly, Mr. Fawzi repeated the usual demand of the Arab leaders that Israel must fulfill "all" the United Nations resolutions on Arab-Israel issues and that the Palestine Arab refugees must be given the right to repatriation; He declared his government continued to "stand firmly by the side of the Arabs of Palestine until the full and actual recognition of their rights;" He then referred sarcastically to Mrs. Meir's declaration, though he did not mention the Israel Foreign Minister by name;

The Palestine Conciliation Commission, which is under instructions to submit to the General Assembly a report by Sunday on what progress, if any, had been made in implementing UN recommendations on the Arab refugee problem, was under pressure today by the Arab delegations here, who seemed to be unhappy about the outline of the report prepared by Dr. Joseph E. Johnson, president of the Carnegie Endowment for International Peace; Dr. Johnson recently visited the Middle East as a PCC emissary;

It is understood that the report gives a "balanced" view of the Arab refugee situation, placing equal responsibility for the solution of the problem on Arab governments and on Israel; It is that balance which caused dissatisfaction of the Arab delegations here; They insist that the PCC report should be "tough" with regard to Israel;

Meanwhile it was learned that Dr. Johnson, in his evaluation of the Arab refugee problem, pointed out that "resettlement of the Arab refugees in Arab lands and their integration in the Arab economy were possible alternatives to repatriation originally envisaged by a 1948 Assembly resolution dealing with that subject;

Because the PCC cannot as yet get the Arab leaders here to refrain from attacking those Johnson views, the PCC will only meet the October 15 deadline for its report in a formal manner; It will issue an interim report Monday morning, but the document will defer until later a substantive discussion of the refugee issue;

The report on Monday is expected to deal largely with routine commission affairs, touching on its continuing study concerned with identifying and determining the value of property in Israel claimed by Arab refugees;

## U.S. GOVERNMENT PRESENTS ISRAEL WITH \$350,000 FOR ATOMIC ENERGY REACTOR

WASHINGTON, Oct. 12: (JTA) -- Dr. Glenn T. Seaborg, chairman of the United States Atomic Energy Commission, presented today \$350,000 to the Government of Israel toward the cost of a research reactor recently certified as completed at the Israel Atomic Energy Commission's Nahal Sorek Research Center. Presentation of the U.S. Government check was made by Dr. Seaborg to Israel Ambassador Avraham Harman during a ceremony in the Commission's office here;

Commitment of the grant for the civilian-use project, a one-thermal megawatt, heterogeneous pool-type reactor, was made May 2, 1958. The Israeli research reactor was built by an American company, and achieved criticality on June 16, 1960. Uranium-235 fuel for the reactor was furnished by the United States, under the provisions of an agreement for cooperation which stipulates safeguards against use of the material for other than peaceful purposes;

In presenting the United States Government check, Mr. Seaborg said: "Israel, although a new nation, and one of the smallest in the world in population and area, has built up its scientific research and development to the point where it now compares favorably with that of advanced nations which have much greater resources and much longer experience in the field of science;

### Israeli Scientists Lauded; U.S. Scientists to Seek Experience in Israel

"Israeli scientists have already made significant discoveries in physics, chemistry and biology," Mr. Seaborg continued; "Only recently, I believe, we received a report from one of our consultants who has visited your varied nuclear energy facilities. He stated that in the near future, United States scientists will be seeking appointments in Israeli laboratories for specified training and work experience. It is my hope and expectation that the reactor at Nahal Sorek will prove a useful tool for further discoveries for the benefit of mankind. It gives me great pleasure therefore, to present you, Mr. Ambassador, with this check for \$350,000 which represents the United States Government's contribution to your reactor center at Nahal Sorek."

Ambassador Harman, replying to Mr. Seaborg, said:

"In expressing the appreciation of the Government of Israel for this very tangible expression of the United States assistance to us in the development of our reactor center at Nahal Sorek, I would like to place on record, Mr. Chairman, our feelings of admiration for the leadership that your country has taken in encouraging and stimulating the development of scientific research and ability in the smaller countries, particularly in the area of utilization of nuclear science for peaceful purposes;

"Speaking from our own experience, I would say that this attitude and the practical expression given to it is a most encouraging and stimulating factor. In the search for true independence, no country can neglect the need to develop its human resources in the area of science and technology. These resources are as vital to general, economic development as they are to the spiritual development of countries;

"I am grateful for your kind remarks about the scientists in our country. I believe that in their attitude to their work they are moved by the consideration that there is no limit to the resourcefulness of the free human spirit. They are indeed citizens of a small land and members of a small people, but in the world of scientific research and development they bear equal responsibilities in the search for truth and integrity and in dedicating that search for the benefit of mankind.

"It is our hope that just as we are privileged to receive this assistance from the United States, which is the symbol of international cooperation in this as in so many other vital areas, we may in our own humble way, in the course of time, be able to make our own small contribution to human welfare."

### ALLIANCE ISRAELITE IN MOROCCO ATTACKED BY PRESS AS 'AIDING ZIONISM'

PARIS, Oct. 12: (JTA) -- Right-wing newspapers in Morocco have opened a new attack against Moroccan Jewish organizations, it was reported here today from Casablanca. A particular target is the Alliance Israelite Universelle;

Al Alam, organ of the dominant Istiqlal party, declared that "under the pretext of providing instruction and assistance," the Alliance "openly plays a principal role in aiding Zionism and aiding the State of Israel." Al Alam stressed that Morocco would never recognize Israel as the homeland of Jews;

### MOROCCO ARRESTS EIGHT NON-JEWS ON CHARGE OF HELPING ZIONIST WORK

CASABLANCA, Oct. 12: (JTA) -- Five Moslems and three Spaniards were arrested by Moroccan authorities yesterday, charged with belonging to a "Zionist network," it was reported in the press here today;

#### ANTI-JEWISH BIAS IN PHILADELPHIA REPORTED LOW; STILL EXISTS IN HOUSING

PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 12. (JTA) -- Discrimination against Jews in Philadelphia is at a low level but there are still places in Greater Philadelphia where Jews cannot buy or rent homes, the 23rd anniversary dinner meeting of the Jewish Community Relations Council was told;

Jules Cohen, executive director, also reported that "there is evidence that in their admission policies, some colleges and universities still practice discrimination against Jews" in the Philadelphia area. Deputy City Solicitor Murray H. Shusterman, who was re-elected president, told the gathering that the Birch Society "is much more dangerous to the security and status of the Jewish community than Rockwell and his so-called American Nazi party."

#### CONNECTICUT RESIDENT FACES PROSECUTION FOR MAILING ANTI-SEMITIC LETTERS

NEW HAVEN, Conn., Oct. 12. (JTA) -- The prosecution of Alan S. Moyler of West Reading, Connecticut, on Federal charges of postal violations in anti-Semitic mailings was assigned today to Assistant United States Attorney Arnold Markle;

Moyler has admitted he mailed anti-Semitic letters in the Westport area over a two-year period to Jewish residents. Some of the packages he mailed included dead rodents. He was arrested on a variety of local, state and Federal charges three weeks ago after a two-year probe by postal inspectors and state and local police aided by the regional office of the B'nai B'rith Anti-Defamation League.

Westport authorities deferred prosecution on local charges until the Federal charges are acted on. Moyler will be arraigned in U.S. District Court in New Haven but a date has not yet been set.

#### TWO CHICAGO YOUTHS ADMIT BOMBING OF SYNAGOGUE; FACE GRAND JURY

CHICAGO, Oct. 12. (JTA) -- A Chicago grand jury had before it today the case of two teen-age youths arrested in connection with the January 11 bombing of the Anshe Emet synagogue. Paul Muhlig, 19, has admitted in a written statement that he was with Herbert Miklitsch, 19, on the night the synagogue was bombed. The structure suffered damages of \$2,000.

The youth said in the statement that he and Miklitsch had been drinking beer and that Miklitsch had suggested they "bomb a church." Muhlig declared he thought his companion was joking but that they got into Miklitsch's car and drove to the synagogue. Miklitsch took a lead pipe bomb from the trunk of the car and walked toward the synagogue while the other youth waited in the car.

Muhlig said in his statement that his companion was gone a few minutes and then returned. There was a violent blast and the two drove off. Muhlig said the synagogue was chosen because they had had an argument with some other youths there at a dance previously.

#### SAN FRANCISCO JUVENILES SENTENCED FOR ANTI-SEMITIC TELEPHONE CALLS

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 12. (JTA) -- The two juvenile members of a gang which conducted a 15-month campaign of viciously anti-Semitic telephone calls and vandalism against a Jewish couple were on indefinite probation today and sentenced to pay a share of the damage they caused.

The sentence was imposed by San Francisco Juvenile Court Judge Melvin I. Cronin, who described the activities of Gerald R. Kyle, 16, and George Kelley, Jr., 18, as "rotten." Expressing the opinion that "no question of anti-Semitism was involved," the judge told the two defendants that "you ought to be ashamed of yourselves and disgusted for the rest of your lives."

The ten older members of the gang will go on trial in Superior Court on October 23 for their harassment of Mr. and Mrs. William Bowman. In addition to the abusive telephone calls at all hours, gang members had slashed the tires of the Bowman car and set it afire. Mr. Bowman, when apprised of the sentence, said he felt that it amounted to a "free pass for further violence and harassment of other people."

#### YESHIVA UNIVERSITY GETS \$70,000 GRANT FOR RESEARCH IN MATHEMATICS

NEW YORK, Oct. 12. (JTA) -- A \$70,000 grant for research in the field of differential geometry has been awarded the Graduate School of Science of Yeshiva University by the National Science Foundation.

Dr. Harry E. Rauch, professor of mathematics, will direct the study. He said it would cover investigations in fields of pure mathematics, including aspects of geometry related to the theory of relativity and other topics of mathematical physics.

#### PIONEER WOMEN CONVENTION URGES INTENSIFICATION OF JEWISH EDUCATION

PITTSBURGH, Pa., Oct. 12. (JTA) -- Pioneer Women, the Women's Labor Zionist Organization of America, concluded its 17th biennial convention last night with the adoption of a series of resolutions urging the intensification of Jewish education, a liberalization of United States immigration policy and civil rights legislation. Mrs. Sidney A. Leff, of Brooklyn, was re-elected president of the organization at the concluding session of the conclave which was attended by more than 600 delegates.

Among the resolutions approved by the delegates was a call for the intensification of adult Jewish education and Jewish education for youth, including support of Jewish day schools. The convention also urged a "genuine basic revision and liberalization of United States immigration policy which will provide for the admission to this country of a larger number of immigrants than have been admitted under present law, and for a non-discriminating policy as between native-born citizens and naturalized citizens."

Yocheved D. Kopernik, special emissary to the convention from Moetzet Hapaolet, the Working Women's Council in Israel sponsored by Pioneer Women, was presented with a check for \$175,000 for the Israeli organization as an "advance" on the \$2,250,000 pledged by Pioneer Women. New projects announced for the next two years include six junior high schools in Israel for which equipment, furniture, machinery and tools will be made available by Pioneer Women.

#### FARBAND THREE-DAY CONFERENCE OPENS TODAY; WILL DISCUSS EXPANSION PLANS

NEW YORK, Oct. 12. (JTA) -- A two-year expansion program for the Farband-Labor Zionist Order will be started at the three-day annual conference of the Farband board of directors which will open here tomorrow, Meyer L. Brown, president, announced today. Speakers will include Mrs. Golda Meir, Israel's Foreign Minister and Senator Jacob K. Javits.

Mr. Brown said the expansion program, planned in connection with the 50th anniversary of Farband in 1963, included enlargement of Farband folk schools in the United States and Canada, particularly establishment of additional day schools, intensification of the Farband adult education program and broadening of the young adult program.

#### CONFERENCE ON SCIENCE AND TECHNOLOGY IN MIDDLE EAST OPENS IN NEW YORK

NEW YORK, Oct. 12. (JTA) -- The Fourth Annual Conference on Science and Technology in the Middle East, sponsored by the American Technion Society, will open here tomorrow.

Some 400 leaders of science, higher education, industry and government, will attend the parley to review developments of interest to all Middle East countries. These will include current and future energy sources, water needs and international cooperation through science and technology.

#### ZIONIST CONFERENCE IN CANADA DISCUSSES ENCOURAGEMENT OF HEBREW EDUCATION

OTTAWA, Oct. 12. (JTA) -- The need for the overall encouragement of the Hebrew education program in Canada was stressed here by Lawrence Freiman, national president of the Zionist Organization of Canada at the first regional conference of the organization's eastern region.

Mr. Freiman, who was the keynote speaker at the two-day meeting attended by some 200 delegates, pointed out that it was only by maintaining a high level of Hebrew education that world Jewry could maintain direct communication with the State of Israel. The learning of Hebrew was only one step in the education program, Mr. Freiman observed, adding that a continuing education process dealing with cultural, economic and political matters relating to the State of Israel was also important.

#### CLEVELAND JEWISH COMMUNITY CENTER LIMITS ITS ACTIVITIES ON SABBATH

CLEVELAND, Oct. 12. (JTA) -- The board of the Jewish Community Center of Cleveland rescinded plans to operate the center's health service on Saturday afternoons after the proposal evoked a sharp debate among supporters of the center. The board adopted a new plan which calls for a limited number of Sabbath activities at the center. Orthodox supporters had sought a complete shutdown during the Sabbath. Non-Orthodox elements favored a widespread program of activities on that day.

The new plan calls for a number of activities for children and teen-agers, including programs of Jewish folk songs, Israeli dancing, dramatization of Jewish stories and legends and similar programs centered on Jewish themes. The program provides that users must register in advance and only for the complete Sabbath program. This means that they will not be able to use the swimming pool or gymnasium on the Sabbath without registering for the cultural program as well.
