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### ISRAEL CABINET ACTS TO USE EMERGENCY LAWS AGAINST STRIKING ENGINEERS

JERUSALEM, Jan. 28; (JTA) -- The Israel Cabinet decided today, at its weekly meeting, to authorize Dr. Giora Josephthal, Minister for Housing and Development, to declare a state of emergency, without further reference to the Government, in an effort to force the 6,000 striking engineers, chemists, architects and agronomists to end their walk-out.

The strike, now in its 18th day, is being prolonged due to disagreement between the Government and the Engineers' Union about the latter's demand for a salary increase of 16.5 percent.

Prior to invoking the emergency, the Cabinet will issue another appeal to the strikers, all of whom are employed by public institutions, to return to work. Should this appeal fail, Mr. Josephthal has been authorized to invoke emergency regulations, to ensure sufficient manpower for essential services.

Dr. Josephthal had reported to the Cabinet that electric power has been interrupted and the construction of housing for immigrants has been interfered with, due to the strike. These are the services which the Housing and Development Minister are now empowered to declare as "essential services," giving him the right to recruit manpower to perform the needed work as "required by the State."

The Cabinet decision was taken after Finance Minister Levi Eshkol had issued a public statement, in which he blamed the strikers for refusing to accept terms he had offered them a few days ago in a meeting with the leaders of their union. "They came forward with new demands which could not be accepted," he said. On its part, the Engineers' Union issued a statement declaring that it had hoped Mr. Eshkol would "bring some suggestions to solve the problem." Since the Finance Minister had "come out only with a demand that we return to work, there could be no return unless some of the demands are dealt with," the statement said.

Meanwhile, the possibility of another strike--this time by salaried physicians--was in the offing today. Like the striking engineers, the Medical Association is dissatisfied with what they alleged is the "narrowing of the gap" between salaries paid professionals and wages paid to non-academic workers.

A committee representing the Government and Histadrut has offered the salaried physicians an increase of two percent. The Medical Association, insisting that only an 18 percent increase would "narrow the gap," voted today to "take all measures to ensure the meeting of the just demands for 18 percent."

### EICHMANN'S LAWYER SEEKS EXTENSION OF TIME FOR APPEAL AGAINST SENTENCE

COLOGNE, Jan. 28; (JTA) -- Dr. Robert Servatius, counsel for former Gestapo Col. Adolf Eichmann, who was sentenced to death in Israel as the executor of the Nazi program that resulted in the annihilation of 6,000,000 European Jews by the Nazi regime, announced here today he has requested that the court in Jerusalem grant him an extension of time for filing his appeal from the Jerusalem District Court's sentence to the Israel Supreme Court.

The period for the appeal, to have been filed within 10 days after December 15, when the sentence had been handed down, was extended by the Jerusalem court to January 25. Now, Dr. Servatius said, he has requested further extension, to February 5. He said that illness, from yellow jaundice, has prevented him from completing his appeal.

(A dispatch from Jerusalem today reported that Dr. Servatius' request for a further delay in filing his appeal has been received there, and the court will rule on the request tomorrow.)

### ISRAEL RABBINATE PROCLAIMS DAY OF PRAYER FOR JEWS IN SOVIET UNION

JERUSALEM, Jan. 28; (JTA) -- Israel's Chief Rabbinate today proclaimed next Thursday as a special day of prayer on behalf of the Jews in the Soviet Union. The Rabbinate called upon Jewish communities throughout the world to gather in their houses of worship Thursday, prescribing a special, solemn ritual and listing Psalms to be recited "in supplication for the deliverance of our brethren from the spiritual plight and disturbed peace of mind."

BEN-GURION SAYS HE BLAMES NO AMERICAN JEW FOR WISHING TO REMAIN IN U.S.

JERUSALEM, Jan. 28; (JTA) -- "As much as I want many American Jews to come here, I don't blame any Jew wishing to remain in the United States," Israel Prime Minister David Ben-Gurion told the Hadassah leaders who arrived here to celebrate the Golden Jubilee of their organization. However, he emphasized that Israel needs pioneering youth from every country.

"Remain in America as you wish--but stay a Jew," Mr. Ben-Gurion told the Hadassah mission composed of more than 150 delegates. At the same time he urged Hadassah to foster Hebrew and Jewish education in the United States, to strengthen personal relations with Israel, and to encourage the spirit of pioneering among American Jewish youth. He said he was certain that there are thousands of Jewish youths in the United States who could find profound satisfaction in rebuilding Israel.

The Prime Minister expressed his sentiments addressing a colorful meeting, in Convention Hall here, officially launching the celebration of the Golden Jubilee of Hadassah. Other speakers included President Lzhak Ben-Zvi, Dr. Nahum Goldmann and Mayor Mordechai Ish-Shalom of Jerusalem. A portrait of the late Henrietta Szold, who founded Hadassah in 1912, was flanked on the speakers platform by the United States and Israel flags.

Hadassah Influences Many Jewish Homes in U.S., Says Rose Halprin

Mrs. Rose Halprin, former national president of Hadassah, and a member of the Jewish Agency, who presided at the meeting, told the Prime Minister that Hadassah's influence reaches into more than a third of the Jewish homes in the United States. "We shall do," she assured him, "what has to be done, in the things we believe in--support of Israel and strengthening of Jewish life." Hadassah, she asserted, "looks to Israel as to a lodestar, for Judaism renewed, for all Jews, wherever they choose to live."

President Ben-Zvi told the assemblage of 2,000 persons in the hall that Hadassah "represents 50 years of valuable, fruitful activity." The organization, he said, "in its size, in its development and in its 50 years as a phenomenon, not only among Zionist bodies but among Jewish organization in general, holds the place of pride among the Jews living outside Israel."

Dr. Goldmann urged Hadassah to be "more ambitious" by playing a still greater role in American Jewish life and in world Jewish affairs; "You are such a strong organization," he said, "Go out into the Jewish communities, extend your spheres of influence."

The members of the Hadassah Golden Jubilee mission took part today in ceremonies at which a special Hadassah Forest was planted by the Jewish National Fund. Leaders of the JNF paid warm tribute to Hadassah's contributions toward afforestation and land development in Israel. The new forest adjoins the recently completed Hadassah-Hebrew University Medical Center.

Leading members of Israel's Cabinet and Parliament attended the ceremonies, and lauded Hadassah for developing modern hospitals throughout Israel, maintaining a high level of public health services, contributing toward the development of educational and vocational-training institutions, and constant stimulation of youth immigration to Israel.

ARGENTINE POLICE ACT ON JEWISH COMPLAINTS; RAID ANTI-SEMITIC GROUP

BUENOS AIRES, Jan. 28; (JTA) -- Argentine police announced today they have rounded up some members of a fascist organization, whose headquarters here were raided today, after leaders of the Jewish community complained of a series of anti-Semitic acts recently perpetrated in various parts of Argentina.

Jewish schools as well as synagogues had been painted recently with swastikas, tar has been hurled at Jewish homes, and other acts of vandalism and terrorism have been reported by Argentine Jews. A Jewish leader, complaining that "it takes only a few microbes to poison society," demanded that police take firmer action against the Fascist toughs held responsible for the anti-Semitic manifestations.

U.S. ARMY COMMISSARY GETS PACKAGES OF COOKIES STAMPED WITH SWASTIKAS

MANNHEIM, Germany, Jan. 28; (JTA) -- About 200 packages of cookies manufactured and packaged in the United States, stamped with the swastika symbol, were discovered by an American officer here today in the United States Army commissary.

The sales price on the packages, said the officer, had been superimposed by the swastika. The officer said he presumed the swastika stamp had been applied in the United States, and not in Germany.

EBAN ADDRESSES GRADUATES OF NUCLEAR SCIENCE INSTITUTE IN U.S.

CHICAGO, Ill., Jan. 28; (JTA) -- Graduates from 18 countries were addressed by Israel's Education Minister Abba Eban yesterday on receiving their diplomas at the International Institute of Nuclear Science and Engineering at Argonne, Ill. Mr. Eban, who appeared in his capacity as president of the Weizmann Institute of Science, was accorded a prolonged ovation on concluding his address. Four Israelis were among the graduates.

### JEWISH GROUPS SEEK U.N. ACTION ON RIGHT OF SOVIET JEWS TO EMIGRATION

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y., Jan. 28; (JTA) -- Appeals to the United Nations Subcommittee on Prevention of Discrimination and Protection of Minorities, now in session here, to include reunification of families in its report on the rights of individuals to emigrate from the country of their residence were voiced here yesterday by representatives of the World Jewish Congress and the Agudath Israel World Organizations. The appeals were aimed at securing the right of Jews to leave the Soviet Union and join their families abroad;

Appearing before the Subcommittee on behalf of the World Jewish Congress, Ralph Zacklin referred to two situations arising from the denial of this right, with a special humanitarian significance. These situations, he said, were: 1; The question of divided families; 2; The question of expatriation of a group to a country for which they felt some binding tie for national, religious or sentimental reasons. He expressed hope that these humanitarian problems will be taken into account by the Subcommittee in its survey.

Dr. Isaac Lewin, speaking at the Subcommittee on behalf of the World Agudah, also emphasized the need for specific mention of the right of persons to emigrate for purpose of family reunification; Denial of such a right, declared Dr. Lewin, was "perhaps the most serious form of discrimination." When that right is denied, he said, "national or territorial boundaries are converted into veritable, if sometimes invisible, prison walls."

### JEWISH CONGRESS DISCUSSES RAPID GROWTH OF RIGHT-WING GROUPS IN U.S.

NEW YORK, Jan. 28; (JTA) -- A report on the rapid growth of extreme right-wing groups in the United States was discussed here today by the National Governing Council of the American Jewish Congress. The Council, composed of more than 100 members from various parts of the country, is the agency's policy-making body, and concluded a two-day session this afternoon.

In submitting a report on this subject, Will Maslow, executive director of the American Jewish Congress, said that "the new right-wing coalition can no longer be dismissed as a miscellaneous collection of eccentrics" or political misfits. "The Far Right is now a public danger," he emphasized. "It is the task of the liberal community to resist these forces, even knowing that everything to the left of the John Birch Society will be labeled as subversive."

### PROTESTANT TEACHERS REQUEST EQUAL RIGHTS FOR JEWS IN QUEBEC SCHOOLS

MONTREAL, Jan. 28; (JTA) -- Demands that Jews in Quebec be given equal rights in education with Protestants and other non-Catholics were made this weekend by the Protestant Teachers Association of the Province of Quebec. The demands were filed with the Royal Commission on Education, which has been conducting a series of hearings on the issue.

A brief filed with the Royal Commission, on behalf of the 5,000 members of the Protestant teachers group, proposed reforms to relieve what they called the "disabilities" suffered by the Jews here. They pointed out that there are no Jewish members on the Protestant School Board of Montreal, in spite of the fact that nearly a third of the 63,000 students in the Protestant schools are of the Jewish faith. More than half of the total income of the Protestant education commission is derived from Jewish sources.

A meeting of the Canadian Jewish Congress committee on the position of the Jews in the educational system in this province will be held here Wednesday. The committee had invited suggestions from members of the Jewish community and from Jewish organizations as to what might properly be included in any brief that might be filed with the Royal Commission on behalf of the Jewish people here.

### NEW YORK LIBRARY GETS MICROFILMS OF RARE JUDAICA MANUSCRIPTS

NEW YORK, Jan. 28; (JTA) -- A collection of rare manuscripts -- on microfilm -- consisting of Hebraica and Judaica reproduced at the Oriental Library of the Hungarian Academy of Sciences at Budapest, became available to scholars today at the New York University's Library of Judaica and Hebraica. The material is part of the David Kaufmann Collection microfilmed in Russia and Hungary by Professor Abraham I. Katsh, curator of the NYU library.

The new material, heretofore unavailable to scholars in the West, includes microfilms of manuscripts pertaining to the Bible, commentaries on Hebrew literature, documents relating to the Mishnah and the Talmud, and works on Hebrew liturgy, mathematics, astronomy, medicine, theology and philosophy.

The new collection is the second received from Hungary, the first having been brought here last July. Altogether now, the augmented David Kaufmann collection consists of 15,000 rare documents and manuscripts. Some of the documents added now date back to the year 1021. Most of the documents are in Hebrew, but some are in Arabic, Aramaic, Judeo-Arabic and Italian.

LOS ANGELES JEWISH FEDERATION CELEBRATES 50 YEARS OF COMMUNITY SERVICE

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 28, (JTA) -- The Jewish Federation-Council here tonight celebrated its golden anniversary at its annual meeting marking 50 years of organized Jewish community service in Los Angeles. More than 1,000 Jews active in communal affairs attended the dinner at the Beverly Hilton Hotel;

Ambassador Philip M. Klutznick, United States representative on the United Nations Economic and Social Council, was the principal speaker. Attorney Walter S. Hilborn and Mrs. Edmond Lazard, civic and Jewish community leaders, were presented the annual Judge Harry Hollzer Memorial Award, established in 1945 in memory of the late jurist who was the first president of the Jewish Community Council, and awarded for "outstanding service in the field of human relations;"

Other highlights of the meeting included: The honoring of Ludwig Schiff, M;B; Silberberg, Mrs. J. A. Stödel and Mrs. Florine Wolfstein, pioneer community leaders, in recognition of their 50 years of continuous service; presentation of a Charter from the Jewish Federation-Council to the recently organized Southern Area Council, accepted by William Kane, president pro-tem; and the honoring of 19 executives and employees of the Jewish Federation-Council and its agencies who have marked a minimum of 25 years service.

PITTSBURGH JEWISH FEDERATION STARTS 50TH YEAR OF COMMUNITY SERVICE

PITTSBURGH, Jan. 28, (JTA) -- The United Jewish Federation of Pittsburgh began its 50th year of community service at its annual meeting today by revealing plans for Pittsburgh's first apartment house project for elderly people in good health.

The apartment will be built by Senior Citizens Housing, an agency recently created by the United Jewish Federation and the Jewish Home for the Aged. It will be a 96-unit, seven story building with special built-in physical features suited to the needs of aged persons. There will be room for 84 single individuals and 12 couples in the apartment, which is expected to be in use within a year.

CLEVELAND JEWISH WELFARE FUND SETS \$6, 011, 000 GOAL FOR 1962 DRIVE

CLEVELAND, Jan. 28, (JTA) -- The goal of the 1962 Jewish Welfare Fund Campaign here has been set at \$6, 011, 000, it was announced today by M. E. Glass, president of the Jewish Community Federation. The figure was set at a meeting of the board of trustees this week. Last year's campaign raised \$5, 431, 680, the greatest amount in the 58-year history of the Federation.

The Special Gifts section of the Jewish Welfare Fund Appeal will be headed by the veteran campaign leader Edward Ginsberg. This section solicits larger contributions to the Jewish Welfare Fund Appeal in advance of the official campaign period. Mr. Ginsberg headed last year's Jewish Welfare Fund campaign that raised the record sum and he was chairman of the 1960 drive.

\$3,000, 000 DRIVE FOR 'BOYS TOWN' IN JERUSALEM ANNOUNCED IN NEW YORK

NEW YORK, Jan. 28, (JTA) -- A campaign to raise \$3, 000, 000 for expansion of Boys Town Jerusalem was announced here today by Ira Guilden, head of the American Committee for Boys Town Jerusalem.

Boys Town Jerusalem provides academic and vocational training, and spiritual guidance, to 350 students from Jewish immigrant families that have come to Israel from 25 countries; About half of the students are orphans. The new fund will help finance a building program for the school on land recently acquired in Jerusalem, permitting the expansion of the school to accommodate 1, 000 boys.

DAVID MORGENSTERN, HEBREW SCHOLAR, HONORED; HEADS HERZLIAH INSTITUTE

NEW YORK, Jan. 28, (JTA) -- David Morgenstern, prominent Hebrew scholar and president of the Herzliah Hebrew Teachers Training Institute, was honored tonight at a dinner in the Pierre Hotel in recognition of his 25 years of "dedicated service to the furtherance of Hebrew education;"

Mr. Morgenstern was presented with an illuminated scroll by Abraham Goodman, who, with his brother Jacob, recently donated \$1, 000, 000 to the Tarbut Foundation for Hebrew Culture. The Herzliah Institute will receive \$750, 000 of this amount to develop it as an accredited degree-granting college for Hebrew studies.

CULTURAL CENTER TO BE BUILT IN ISRAEL IN MEMORY OF BENJAMIN MINTZ

TEL AVIV, Jan. 28, (JTA) -- Groundbreaking ceremonies were held here today for a district cultural center in Netiva settlement, 20 miles west of Jerusalem, to be named Yad Benjamin in memory of Benjamin Mintz, the late head of the Poalei Agudat Israel movement and former Minister of Posts.
