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### ONE ISRAELI KILLED, THREE WOUNDED BY JORDANIAN FIRE IN DIVIDED JERUSALEM

JERUSALEM, June 14. (JTA) -- One Israeli was killed and three wounded, one of them injured seriously, when Jordanian troops suddenly opened fire on an Israeli patrol unit here shortly before noon today. The attack occurred as the patrol walked its beat about 200 yards from the Mandelbaum Gate which divides Israel's Jerusalem from the Old City under Jordanian jurisdiction.

The crowded Musrara District of the city, where the attack took place, was thrown into confusion when the firing started. As the four men of the Israeli patrol fell, a second patrol unit rushed forward. The second unit retrieved the stricken border patrolmen while the Jordanian firing continued. Then, the firing stopped as suddenly as it had begun. It was the first time violence erupted along the Jordanian-Israeli border in the Jerusalem area in four years.

Israel immediately lodged a vigorous protest with the United Nations Truce Supervision Organization whose No-Man's-Land headquarters are less than a mile from the scene of the attack, close to the spot where the Israeli patrolmen fell. United Nations military observers opened an investigation into the occurrence immediately.

### FRANCE WILLING TO HELP ALGERIAN JEWS TO SETTLE IN ISRAEL; PACT DUE

TEL AVIV, June 14. (JTA) -- An agreement under which France will help Algerian Jews settle in Israel if they so desire is about to be signed between France and Israel, was reported here today.

The projected agreement will cover those Algerian Jews who are currently eligible for assistance in settling in France. The agreement would give them the same French aid they decided to settle in Israel.

Housing Ministry officials meanwhile announced at a press conference here today that major effort would have to be made to boost construction of housing for new immigrants. To meet that objective and to cope with a shortage of builders and construction workers, they said, all non-essential construction will be halted. The officials offered a projection that the Israeli population would increase during this year by 150,000.

### CONGRESSIONAL BODY 'DEEPLY DISTURBED' OVER ARAB ACTION AGAINST U.S. JEWS

WASHINGTON, June 14. (JTA) -- The House Foreign Affairs Committee has taken vigorous exception to official U.S. tolerance of Arab discrimination against American Jews; publication of the report of the Committee's Foreign Assistance Bill showed today.

"The Committee was deeply disturbed to receive, during its consideration of the Foreign Assistance Act of 1962, evidence that certain foreign nations continue to make distinctions between American citizens because of color, religion or race in the granting of personal or commercial access and in the exercise of other rights available to American citizens," the report states. It labels such discrimination "totally unwarranted and repugnant to our principles."

The report characterizes as a "strong expression" the amendment by Democratic Congressman Leonard Farbstein of New York which the Committee wrote into the bill, an amendment which was included in the measure as cleared today by the House Rules Committee for House debate, reiterates Congressional opposition to Arab discrimination and calls for adherence to the principle of equal rights for all Americans in U.S. negotiations with foreign powers under terms of the aid bill. The amendment provides also the filing of regular annual reports by the Secretary of State to Congress on steps being taken to counter Arab discrimination.

Democratic Congressman Emanuel Celler of New York told the House of Representatives today that a majority of its members--232--have now attached their names to a resolution he sponsored last month congratulating Israel on its 14th anniversary and calling for an Arab-Israel peace.

Mr. Celler told the House that an additional 61 members signed the statement subsequent to its original sponsorship by 171 members. The New York lawmaker placed in the record a full list of the names of all the signatories who represented every section of the nation.

## AMERICA-ISRAEL 'DIALOGUE' ENDS AFTER BEN-GURION SEES POSSIBLE RIFT

JERUSALEM, June 14. (JTA) -- Closing a three-day "dialogue" between American Jewry and Israelis, Dr. Joachim Prinz, president of the American Jewish Congress, declared at the concluding session tonight that, in his opinion, "a new chapter" has been opened at this conference between American Jewry and Israel. "We came here to destroy false images and do away with fallacies, and establish what we consider to be the real image of American Jewry," he told the 500 Americans at the conference.

Theodore Kolleck, director-general of Prime Minister David Ben-Gurion's office, emphasized the value of the "dialogue" by telling the conference, just before it closed, that "understanding between world Jewry and Israel is rapidly becoming one of Israel's central problems."

Other speakers at the concluding session denied that American Jewry faced obliteration through assimilation, stressed the right of Jews outside Israel to influence Israeli decisions, and insisted that American Jewry was just entering "a golden age of Jewishness." They held that Israeli creativeness is not greater than the creativeness of American Jewry which has proven that it grow and develop in the free American society.

Prime Minister Ben-Gurion had predicted, in his major address to the conference last night, that differences between American Jewry and Israeli Jewry would grow as Israel advanced to cultural and economic independence. He pointed out that such a development would make more difficult the problem of relations between Jews inside and outside of Israel.

Mr. Ben-Gurion said there was the possibility of difficulties for American Jews when the United States developed into a unitary society, which he foresaw within 15 to 20 years. He did not think that this would necessarily endanger American Jews, but that it did raise questions. He expressed doubt whether the group status of American Jewry would enable it to withstand the pressures of assimilation.

### Urges Deepening of Jewish Consciousness, Stressed Hebrew Education

He stressed the need to deepen Jewish consciousness and urged substantial programs of Hebrew education and closer personal contacts between American Jews and Israel by the sending of youth to Israel to study, and increased participation in Israel's economic development.

Citing the ideal of Jewish and universal redemption as one of the basic precepts of Judaism, the Prime Minister stressed that Israel could never clash with any country seeking peace and justice or with the Jews of such a country. He also said that in making policy, Israel "always kept in mind the interests of other Jewish communities."

Reiterating one of his favorite stands, the Prime Minister remarked that if all Jews were Zionists but had followed the example of Zionist leaders "who are not coming to Israel," the Jewish State would never have been established. Moreover, he said, the first Jewish settlements were established before there was a world Zionist movement.

The Prime Minister was promptly challenged by Dr. Prinz. Rabbi Prinz urged the Prime Minister and Israelis to discard illusions and "face the reality" that American Jews would not emigrate to Israel and that Hebrew would not become their second language.

He said he agreed with the Prime Minister that Israel was different from all other Jewish communities and that only in Israel could one live a full Jewish life. But, he added, it was urgent that it be understood that Israel's relations with American Jewry "must be built on the existing realities" of American Jewry's determination to maintain its Jewishness even if the Jewishness was relegated to only a corner of its existence.

He echoed the Prime Minister's call for sending American youth to study in Israel and for a major program of cultural and personal interchange between the Jewries of the two countries.

## MONUMENT FOR MARTYRED EUROPEAN JEWS BLASTED IN JOHANNESBURG

JOHANNESBURG, June 14. (JTA) -- Police experts in explosives began an intensive investigation today to find the person who damaged Sculptor Herman Wald's massive memorial to martyred European Jews in Johannesburg's Westpark Jewish Cemetery with a dynamite blast.

The vandalism apparently was connected with a telephone call yesterday to the Johannesburg "Star," from a man who said "I am Adolf Eichmann, see me in Westpark Cemetery." The blast destroyed the Ner Tamid which lights up the sculptured phrase "Lo Tizach" ("Thou Shalt Not Kill") but did not wreck the monument which was apparently the objective of the dynamiter.

The dynamiting, which was discovered today, apparently was done early yesterday. Caretaker Jay Friedland told police he heard a noise then but he thought it was a door slamming in the wind. Damage was estimated at about \$700.

### ROME JEWS THANK ITALIAN MINISTER FOR ACTION AGAINST ANTI-SEMITES

ROME, June 14. (JTA) -- The gratitude of the Rome Jewish community for actions taken by the authorities against Rightist election campaigners who invaded the Jewish district of Rome and clashed with Jews was conveyed today to Interior Minister Taviani.

The Cabinet member received Chief Rabbi Elio Toaff and Professor Pitigliano, president of the Rome Jewish community, who presented the thanks of the Rome Jews. The incidents occurred on June 5 and 6.

The Minister reiterated to the two Jewish leaders the determination of the Italian Government to prevent any renewals of acts of intolerance of an anti-Semitic character and to guarantee constitutional freedom to all citizens.

### TRKEY PLANS NO SPECIAL TAX ON NATIONAL MINORITIES, PREMIER SAYS

ISTANBUL, June 14. (JTA) -- Prime Minister Ismet Inonu personally denied today reports that he was planning to impose a new "wealth" tax on Jews and other national minorities of the type he had promulgated 20 years ago. The old "wealth" tax known as "Varlik tax," resulted in ruining the economic position of many Jews in Turkey.

Reports about Premier Inonu's plans for a revival of the "wealth" tax had been spread among political opponents trying to hamper his effort to form a new coalition government. Inonu broadcast over the Turkish radio network a statement categorically denying such "unfounded reports."

### RELIGIOUS GROUP WINS MAJORITY SEATS IN ISTANBUL'S COMMUNITY ELECTIONS

ISTANBUL, June 14. (JTA) -- A list of candidates running on the religious ticket won a majority of the seats in the main, city-center Jewish Community Council here, according to tabulations of the Council elections made public here today.

Jewish communities in nine sections, in the city and in the suburbs, held Council elections for the first time in seven years. The Turkish authorities recently lifted the ban against such elections. The religious group ran its own ticket, including Orthodox congregational and lay leaders. Two other tickets were composed of an independent group of members of the old Council.

The group that won control in the main city Council had pledged various reforms. The separate Councils deal with Jewish religious, cultural and welfare activities in their areas.

### GERMANS FORBID THEIR CHILDREN TO WATCH ANTI-NAZI DOCUMENTARY FILMS

BREMEN, June 14. (JTA) -- West Germans are forbidding their children to watch television or films which depict the facts of German history under the Nazi regime, according to a survey conducted here by the Bremen Radio and Television Authority.

The study showed that many young Germans, in the age brackets between 10 and 15, were ordered by their parents not to watch the series of 14 TV programs, aired last year, entitled "The Third Reich." The series had been hailed as a documentary with high educational value.

The Bremen broadcasting authority added that German television and film coverage of the Adolf Eichmann trial in Israel had also been "verbotten" to youngsters by parents who did not want them to know too much about the Nazi atrocities.

### DETROIT JEWISH COUNCIL ANNOUNCES POLICY ON EXTREME RIGHT-WING GROUPS

DETROIT, June 14. (JTA) -- Counter action to extreme right-wing activities is an obligation of the entire community and to the extent that such activities are required, Jewish groups should coordinate their programs with those of other civic bodies. This advice was given to a Delegate Assembly of the Jewish Community Council of Detroit by Dr. Alan Westin of Columbia University, who has written extensively on the issue.

The JCC adopted a policy statement that right-wing groups have a negative approach to many local, national and international problems and that "not infrequently attract people whose activities have identified them as racial and religious bigots." For this reason, the statement said, the community must be concerned with the activities of groups frequently referred to as the "radical right." This concern must be with a recognition of the "right of legitimate expression."

The statement urged the Jewish Community Council "to continue its ongoing programs and goals particularly in those fields in which these and other anti-democratic groups have a most articulate."

Dr. Westin warned the delegates against applying a "hate label" to the extremists. He said some representatives with records of racial or religious history had identified themselves with organizations of the extreme right but he added their influence had not been reflected in the overt actions of such movements.

440 GRADUATE FROM YESHIVA UNIVERSITY; HARMAN AWARDED HONORARY DEGREE

NEW YORK, June 14. (JTA) -- Four hundred and forty degrees and diplomas and nine honorary degrees were conferred today by Yeshiva University at its 31st annual commencement exercises which ended the University's year-long 75th anniversary celebration. Among those receiving honorary degrees were Avraham Harman, Israeli Ambassador to the United States, Senator Kenneth B. Keating, New York Republican, and Mayor Robert F. Wagner.

In addition to his own honorary degree, Ambassador Harman picked up a Hebrew Teacher's Diploma awarded to his son, David, 18, in absentia. The youth is now serving in the Israel Army. He graduated from Yeshiva University High School for Boys last June and attended the Teachers Institute for Men while in the United States. Called into military service soon after his high school graduation, he completed the last of his Teachers Institute examinations in Israel and therefore was awarded his diploma.

Dr. Samuel Belkin, University president, awarded 226 undergraduate and 214 advanced degrees to graduates of ten of the University's 17 schools and divisions. Separate exercises to be held by the other schools will raise the total number of degrees and diplomas awarded this month to 853.

Dr. Albert B. Sabin, discoverer of the oral anti-polio vaccine bearing his name, received the Mordecai ben David Award, established in 1940 by the late Enrico Garda, Ambassador from San Marino to France. The award is presented to the person who has been judged to have most advanced "self-respect, independence and courage among members of the Jewish faith."

SIDNEY RABB, NOTED JEWISH LEADER, AWARDED HONORARY DEGREE AT HARVARD

BOSTON, June 14. (JTA) -- Sidney R. Rabb, noted Boston Jewish communal leader, was awarded an honorary Master of Arts degree today at Harvard University's 311th annual commencement.

The citation to Mr. Rabb, a past campaign chairman and executive committee member of the Combined Jewish Philanthropies of Greater Boston, read: "A loyal son of Harvard, his managerial talent and high social responsibility advance the interests of his native city." Mr. Rabb is also chairman of the Beth Israel Hospital of Boston, is a Harvard Medical Center trustee and president of the Boston Public Library.

An honorary doctorate of science was awarded by Harvard University to Dr. Herman L. Blumgart, physician-in-chief and director of medical research at Beth Israel Hospital, a constituent agency of the CJP, and professor of medicine at Harvard. The citation read: "Distinguished physician, Harvard teacher, imaginative experimentalist, his ear is ever attuned to the heartbeat of mankind."

NEW YORK U.J.A. HONORS PEOPLE OF NETHERLANDS FOR EFFORTS TO SAVE JEWS

NEW YORK, June 14. (JTA) -- The United Jewish Appeal of Greater New York today honored the people of the Netherlands and Senator Jacob K. Javits for distinguished efforts on behalf of Jewish refugees. B.J. Slingenberg, Dutch Consul-General, and Senator Javits received awards from the UJA at ceremonies in UJA headquarters.

The Dutch people were cited for their courageous efforts to save Jews from the Nazis during the war and for their readiness to accept immigrants now even though their country is over-populated, as well as for their cooperation with agencies of the United Jewish Appeal and the Dutch Jewish community in aiding Jews to emigrate. Senator Javits was cited for his "staunch and unswerving support of the United Jewish Appeal" and for his friendship for the people of Israel. Consul-General Slingenberg and Senator Javits received scale replicas of Michelangelo's Moses as testimonials of the occasion.

'STEPHEN S. WISE ROAD' TO BE DEDICATED IN ISRAEL AT HEBREW U. CAMPUS

NEW YORK, June 14. (JTA) -- A "Stephen S. Wise Road" will be dedicated in Jerusalem next month in honor of the memory of the late Rabbi Stephen Wise, one of American Jewry's outstanding leaders, it was announced here today by the Israel Bond Organization. The foremost Jewish civic, communal and religious leaders in the United States have joined the committee for the Stephen S. Wise Memorial.

The street to be named in honor of Rabbi Wise, is located on the campus of the Hebrew University in Jerusalem. Principal participants in the dedication ceremonies will be Israel Prime Minister David Ben-Gurion; Walworth Barbour, United States Ambassador to Israel; Mayor Mordechai Ish-Shalom of the City of Jerusalem, and Dr. Nelson Glueck, President of the Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion.

AMERICAN RED MOGEN DOVID PLANS TO SEND 30 AMBULANCES TO ISRAEL

NEW YORK, June 14. (JTA) -- The first of 30 new ambulances for Magen David Adom, Israel's equivalent of the Red Cross, was presented here today by the family and friends of the late Mrs. Fanny Gutwirth of New York, who was a member of the Emanuel Celler Chapter of the American Red Mogen Dovid, the supply and support wing of Magen David Adom.
