### BRITAIN RELUCTANT TO DEPORT ROCKWELL; ENTERED COUNTRY DESPITE BAN

LONDON, Aug., 6. (JTA) -- British authorities were in a quandary today with regard to George Lincoln Rockwell, leader of the American Nazi Party, who succeeded in entering England despite the fact that the Home Office issued an order last week banning his admission to the country.

Rockwell, along with neo-Nazi leaders of German, Austrian, Hungarian and French nationality, is attending a conclave of British fascists held at a private estate in Gloucestershire, organized by Colin Jordan. The latter, a school teacher recently dismissed from his job by the school board of Coventry, is leader of the British National Socialist Party.

Rockwell landed at Shannon Airport, Ireland, last Thursday, it was ascertained today, and managed to get by the British immigration officials who had been instructed by the Home Office to keep him out of this country as an "undesirable person." Today, it appeared that the Home Office was reluctant to start deportation proceedings against the American Nazi.

After a conference at the Home Office between police and immigration authorities, it was indicated that long and complicated legal moves may preclude the issuance of a deportation order and that, pending the issuance of such an order, Rockwell will be allowed to go wherever he pleases in England. A Home Office spokesman said today "the Home Secretary is now considering reports to see whether any official action is necessary" on the Rockwell case.

### Delivers Long Speech Against Jews at Fascist Parley

Rockwell delivered a long tirade against Jews at Colin Jordan's rally at Gloucestershire yesterday. Teenagers armed with heavy sticks and air rifles guarded the estate, while Rockwell shouted praises of Hitler. Jordan and many of his cohorts wore fascist uniforms, emblazoned with the swastika, parading in jackboots reminiscent of Hitler's hordes. Scotland Yard plainclothesmen visited the site of the fascist conference today to check on the activities there.

Jordan, refusing to leave the grounds, told a newspaper correspondent, talking to the latter across a fence: "Our principles and beliefs are, and we unashamedly admit them, the same as prewar Germany's. We are proud that we are a racial movement."

Leading newspapers here featured the reports of the Nazi conference at Gloucestershire and the fact that Rockwell had entered Britain in the face of the Home Office order. The Daily Express bannerline read: "Fuehrer Beats Ban."

Meanwhile, a second fascist group, the British National Party, led by Andrew Fountaine, continued its own conference today, at Fountaine's estate at King Lynne, about 100 miles north of London. That conference also opened yesterday, and is being attended by about 50 British and foreign fascists.

Today, it was reported, the Fountaine group discussed plans for a rally scheduled to be held at Trafalgar Square here on September 2. Rallies have been held recently at that Square by Jordan's group as well as by the third fascist group in this country, Sir Oswald Mosley's British Union Party. Both those rallies, as well as others held elsewhere by the Jordan and Mosley groups, resulted in riots and in many arrests.

### ISRAEL DISCOUNTS RETALIATION FOR REFUSAL TO FLY SOBLEN TO U.S.

JERUSALEM, Aug. 6. (JTA) -- Airline circles here today discounted purported British threats to cancel Israel's airport landing rights if El Al Israel Airlines refuses to fly Dr. Robert A. Soblen to the United States. Such a suggestion,

it was said, is not to be taken seriously. Israel has already given assurance to the British that it is willing to fly Dr. Soblen out of England -- but not to the United States.

Yesterday's Cabinet meeting here discussed various ramifications of the case of the American psychiatrist, who sought asylum here to escape a life sentence in the United States, where he had been convicted of espionage on behalf of the Soviet Union. In the event that Dr. Soblen is returned here, the Cabinet decided, Israel will have no alternative but to permit him to find an asylum of his own choice. Such a choice is believed to exist, since Czechoslovakia has reportedly offered asylum to Dr. Soblen.

Rep. Walter Warns El Al on Landing Rights in U.S.A.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 6. (JTA) -- Chairman Francis E. Walter, of the House Committee on Un-American Activities, today urged in a speech in Congress, that the State Department revoke the United States landing rights of El Al Israel Airlines, if the line "cooperates" in moves that result in the liberation of Dr. Robert A. Soblen.

Rep. Walter told the House that the Secretary of State should notify El Al in advance that "they will be held responsible for preventing the decision of the United States courts to be carried out." He indicated that the Israel Government would be held responsible by his committee if it rejects England's demands that an El Al plane fly Dr. Soblen to the United States.

Charging that "a strange combination of forces is working to thwart" Soblen's return, he said: "We must deal with our friends" as the United States dealt with Poland years ago, when it barred the Polish ship Batory from docking in the U.S. because that vessel had been used by Gerhard Eisler, when the latter jumped bail as a convicted Communist.

ISRAEL CONSIDERS NON-RENEWAL OF 80,000 PASSPORTS FOR ISRAELIS ABROAD

JERUSALEM, Aug. 6. (JTA) -- The Cabinet decided yesterday to appoint a special ministerial committee to investigate the "use of Israeli passports by emigrants who, for all practical purposes, severed ties with the State." The committee, comprising Foreign Minister Golda Meir, Justice Minister Dov Joseph and Interior Minister Moshe Shapiro, will study the problem and recommend measures to rectify the situation.

Among the measures to be studied by the committee are to establish strict procedures among Israeli consulates abroad regarding the renewal of passports, and to require Israelis abroad to return home within a specified time to retain their citizenship.

It is estimated that of 120,000 emigrants from Israel, some 80,000 continue to use their Israeli passports, despite the fact that they have severed ties with Israel.

ISRAEL RABBINATE TO FIGHT AGAINST PROPOSED CALENDAR REFORM

JERUSALEM, Aug. 6. (JTA) -- The Chief Rabbinate Council decided here today to establish a calendar committee to work in cooperation with other organizations in Israel and abroad in opposition to the adoption of a proposal for calendar reform.

The proposal is to be considered at the forthcoming Ecumenical Council in Rome. It provides for one blank or dateless day each year. The effect of the calendar change would be that the Jewish Sabbath would fall on a different day of the week every year.

Describing the proposed calendar change as "unfair discrimination against the Jewish faith," the Chief Rabbinate Council solemnly affirmed that the fixity of the Sabbath as the seventh day of the week was fundamental to Biblical precepts and the Jewish faith. Any change, the Council declared, would inflict unnecessary hardships on its adherents.

U.S. URGED TO SEEK ENVOY'S REPORT ON SOVIET ANTI-SEMITISM

WASHINGTON, Aug. 6. (JTA) -- Senator Thomas J. Dodd expects an answer tomorrow from the State Department, in response to a request that the United States Ambassador be recalled from Moscow for consultation about the Soviet Union's anti-Semitic policies, it was disclosed here today.

The Connecticut Democrat announced on a television program yesterday that he had made such a request in a letter to Secretary of State Dean Rusk.

# BONN COOL TO ISRAEL'S DESIRE FOR LINK WITH EUROPEAN COMMON MARKET

BONN, Aug. 6. (JTA) -- The West German Government is cool to Israel's desire for the establishment of a link with the European Common Market, diplomatic sources here revealed today. Germany is one of the six members of the European Economic Community, parent of the Euromart. The other members are France, Italy, and the Benelux countries, Belgium, The Netherlands and Luxembourg.

Instead of favoring an Israeli-Euromart link, diplomats said, Germany holds the view that Israel should initiate bilateral negotiations concerning its trade problems with the individual governments represented in the EEC. On the other hand, it was noted here, West Germany is conducting broad trade and foreign aid talks with Egypt and with at least one Arab country, Jordan. Jordan's Foreign Minister, Hasim Seiba, arrived here today for a brief official visit. Several Egyptian local government officials also arrived.

While the Bonn Government is not expected to rush into a trade agreement with Egypt before consulting its allies, especially the United States, serious consideration is being given here to the possibility of starting formal trade negotiations between Germany and Egypt. German officials are talking about the need for economic negotiations with Egypt in view of what they see as "Egypt's predominant position in the Arab world and in the near East."

• One series of talks is now under way here regarding Germany's pledge of last year to provide aid valued at 650,000,000 Deutschmarks (about \$165,000,000) for the developments in Syria. Since Syria broke away from the United Arab Republic, Germany is now discussing with Egypt the manner of modifying that agreement.

# ISRAEL TO SEEK STRONGER STAND FROM BONN AGAINST GERMANS AIDING NASSER

LONDON, Aug. 6. (JTA) -- Press reports here today said that the Israeli Government is considering taking up with the German Government a request that Bonn take a stronger attitude regarding the West German rocket experts and technicians who have been aiding Egypt's rocketry program. There are about 200 of these German rocket experts in Egypt, the reports stated.

(The New York Times, in a cable today from its correspondent, C. L. Sulzberger, reported that either of the two rockets which Egypt produced could bombard all of Israel from bases well in the rear, and that "the design and fabrication of these rockets were made possible by signal contributions from three Germans, Professors Saenger, Brandner and Pilz, aided by over 100 German technicians." Mr. Sulzberger added that Saenger and Brandner once held important positions with jet and ordnance firms and institutes in West Germany. Brandner worked in Russia after World War II helping design Ilyushin engines. Pilz is credited with inventing an astonishingly inexpensive missile which, although it still has a short range, costs only \$50,000 and has been vital to Nasser's tests.

"Bonn has been aware for many months of this special German role in the Middle East arms race. Its security branch eventually forced all concerns in the Federal Republic with which the three scientists had ties to sever these connections. But passports have not been withdrawn from the professors," Mr. Sulzberger reported.)

# GERMAN TEACHERS INSTRUCTED TO TEACH ANTI-NAZISM IN PUBLIC SCHOOLS

BONN, Aug. 6. (JTA) -- The Ministries of Education of all German states today instructed all history teachers and history textbook writers to explain to public school students the history of the Nazi era as an element of democracy's struggle against totalitarianism.

The state ministries, which have jurisdiction over education in their provinces, had agreed on these instructions earlier, and the new regulations came formally into force today when they were published in the Government's Official Gazette.

Under the new instructions, not only will Nazism be presented to students as a form of totalitarianism, but resistance movements will also be explained as part of history. "Glorification of war and totalitarianism" will be forbidden in the public schools.

# GERMAN PARTY URGED TO EXPEL ANTI-SEMITIC MEMBERS FROM ITS RANKS

BONN, Aug. 6. (JTA) -- Dr. Erich Mende, leader of the Free Democratic Party, today called for an immediate investigation of the nationalist and anti-Semitic attitudes of certain party members in Bavaria. For such elements, he said, there is no room in the party.

### ISRAEL'S FOREIGN TRADE BALANCE REPORTED SHOWING IMPROVEMENT IN 1962

JERUSALEM, Aug. 6. (JTA) -- A marked improvement in Israel's foreign trade balance was noted here today for the first six months of 1962, as compared with the corresponding period of 1961.

Israel's exports rose by \$15,400,000 to \$150,600,000, while imports rose by only \$6,600,000 to \$298,500,000. The rise in total imports was occasioned entirely by increased imports of producer goods -- plant and raw materials -- while the value of consumer goods imported during the period under review continued to decline.

### THREE ISRAELI BANKS REPORT EQUIVALENT OF \$925,600,000 IN DEPOSITS

NEW YORK, Aug. 6. (JTA) -- Israel's three largest banks, led by Bank Leumi le-Israel, "recorded an amazing gain of 40.05% during 1961, with combined deposits of the equivalent of \$925.6 million," the American Banker disclosed in its International Banking issue, published this week.

The publication's annual listing of the 500 largest banks in the free world showed the Bank Leumi le-Israel in 139th place. Two other Israel banks, Israel Discount Bank and Bank Hapoalim, ranked 384th and 385th respectively. The consolidated assets of Bank Leumi, including its New York branch, its offices and subsidiaries in Israel, London and Zurich, exceed 1.2 billion Israel pounds. Bank Leumi now ranks as the largest bank in the Middle East.

### ISRAEL TO CELEBRATE 80TH ANNIVERSARY OF FIRST MODERN PIONEERS

JERUSALEM, Aug. 6. (JTA) -- This year will be declared "First Settlers Year" in commemoration of the 80th anniversary of the first settlers of the Bilu movement, the first modern Zionist pioneering movement established in Russia in 1882, according to a decision yesterday of the Cabinet.

A special ministerial committee will work out detailed proposals for the celebrations which will include special programs for schools and the issuance of special stamps. Petach Tikvah, which also celebrates the 80th anniversary of its founding, will be the site of Israel's Independence Day parade next May. Other settlements celebrating their 80th anniversary this year include Zichron Yaakov and Rishon Lezion.

### ZIONIST CONVENTION OPENS IN CHILE; CONDEMNS ARGENTINE TERRORISM

SANTIAGO, Chile, Aug. 6. (JTA) -- The recent outbreak of anti-Semitic violence in Argentina and Uruguay was condemned here today at the opening of the annual convention of the Zionist Federation of Chile. The protest against the anti-Jewish incidents was made by Israel Pollak, president of the Federation, who addressed the convention, attended by more than 100 delegates.

Senator Ramoniro Tomic of the Christian Democratic party, who recently visited Israel, lauded the Jewish State for its progress in the economic and cultural fields. Other speakers included Israel Ambassador Eliezer Doron, Gil Sinay, president of the Central Committee of Jewish Communities and Yosef Tchernicky of the Jewish Agency. Miguel Maladavsky was elected the new president of the Federation.

### YESHIVA UNIVERSITY ANNOUNCES PLAN TO BUILD \$3,500,000 DORMITORY

NEW YORK, Aug. 6. (JTA) -- A new seven-story, \$3,500,000 dormitory building will be built by Yeshiva University at its main center here, it was announced today by Dr. Samuel Belkin, president of the university.

The building, which will be the second structure to be built in the university's \$30,000,000 campus development program, will house 312 students in 156 double rooms and will include four faculty suites, six married students' apartments, student lounges, a director's office and a superintendent's apartment.

### LOUIS P. SMITH, BOSTON JEWISH LEADER, NAMED TRUSTEE OF CITY HOSPITAL

BOSTON, Aug. 6. (JTA) -- Louis P. Smith, president of the Combined Jewish Philanthropies of Greater Boston and member of the National Cabinet of the United Jewish Appeal, was named today to the five-man Board of Trustees of the Boston City Hospital by Mayor John F. Collins. The 1,200-bed institution is part of the teaching program of Harvard, Tufts, and Boston University medical schools.

Mr. Smith is also treasurer of Ford Hall Forum, Fellow of Brandeis University, a trustee of Beth Israel Hospital, trustee of the National Multiple Sclerosis Society and member of the Board of the Council of Jewish Federations and Welfare Funds.
