ARGENTINE JEWS ALARMED OVER EFFORTS TO MINIMIZE ANTI-SEMITIC EVENTS

BUENOS AIRES, Oct. 1. (JTA) -- A leading spokesman for Argentine Jewry expressed larm today over efforts by the Argentine Government to minimize the extent of the antilewish manifestations here because of their effect on public opinion abroad.

Dr. Isaac Goldenberg, president of DAIA, the central Argentine Jewish representaive organization, told a press conference today that the statement by Minister of the interior Alvaro Alsogaray that the Government intended to repress the anti-Semitic maniestations was "encouraging." He warned, however, that as long as the Government pernitted the formation and training of Nazi groups as assault troops, "there will exist the anger of physical aggression against Jews even if this might not be called 'anti-Semitism,!"

Dr. Goldenberg advised the Argentine Jewish community that although it was wellrganized, it was imperfectly prepared for the abnormal times through which Latin
merica is living. He noted that the anti-Semitic process was prolonged and the manistations would not soon subside. The community, he said, had reacted to them emoonally, rather than rationally and he said that, under existing conditions, the community
ust not rest.

The Government announced today the appointment of Carlos Alberto Muzzio, a retired rmy colonel, as Chief of the Federal Police. Col. Muzzio, who was director of prisons, occeeds Captain Enrique Horacio Green, a naval officer, who failed to halt the anti-wish incidents.

New anti-Jewish incidents were reported as the Government announcement was being ade. The newspaper La Razon reported from Bahia Blanca that an unsuccessful bomb tempt had been made at the Circulo Zionisa community center there. The walls of the ilding were smeared with swastikas and anti-Jewish slogans,

Argentine President Greets Jewish Community on New Year

BUENOS AIRES, Oct. 1. (JTA) - President Jose Maria Guido of Argentina offered a w Year's greeting to the Jewish community of Argentina in which he stressed that his intry respected human dignity and barred social or religious discrimination.

President Guido's message was addressed to Dr. Isaac Goldenberg, president of DAIA, central Argentine Jewish representative organization which, he said, represents "a commity which has contributed, by its noble and tenacious effort, to the progress of the ion,"

He said that "as President of a nation traditionally practicing respect for human nity and excluding any racial, social or religious discrimination, I send a cordial greetto the Jews of the Argentine in this celebration of the Jewish New Year,"

DAN COMPLAINS AT U.N. AGAINST AMERICAN SALE OF MISSILES TO ISRAEL

UNITED NATIONS, Oct. 1. (JTA) -- Jordan complained in the United Nations General embly today that the delivery of defensive ground-to-air missiles to Israel by the United ss was not only "a deadly threat to our security and survival" but would also increase eli "intransigeance" in "their aggressive designs upon the Arab countries."

Dr. Hazem Z. Nussibah, the Jordan Foreign Minister, told the General Assembly his country had received the American announcement last week with "deep disappoint: and grave apprehensions." The announcement referred to an American decision to it Israel to acquire "Hawk" missiles to strengthen its defenses against air attack missile is a purely defensive weapon.

The Jordanian spokesman warned the Assembly not to be misled if a proposal were again duced for direct Arab-Israeli talks. "To the uninitiated in the sordid record of this probe" he asserted, "this proposal may hold some attraction." But the crux of the matter, if, was whether the Israelis would implement United Nations resolutions on the Palesetinges.

ISRAELI BORDER PATROLMAN KILLED IN CLASH WITH JORDANIANS

TEL AVIV, Oct. 1. (JTA) -- An Israeli border pcliceman was shot and killed yesterday during a two-and-a-half hour exchange of fire with Jordanian troops near Baka el-Gharbiyah in central Israel, a military spokesman reported here today.

Israel informed the Mixed Armistice Commission that the Jordanians started the clash by firing on a routine patrol. The Israeli spokesman made no mention of any Jordanian casualties. United Nations military observers immediately opened an investigation into the incident.

GOLDMANN COMPLETES TALKS WITH BONN OFFICIALS ON INDEMNIFICATION

BONN, Oct. 1. (JTA) - Dr. Nahum Goldmann, president of the Conference on Jewish Material Claims Against Germany, left here today after a series of meetings with West German officials aimed at extending the period for completing indemnification payments to Jewish victims of the Nazis, correcting certain defects in the administration of the Federal Indemnification Law and remedying various injustices to certain groups of Nazi victims.

Some 800, 000 claims for indemnification have still not been processed under the provisions of the Indemnification Law, which had originally provided for payments to be made by the end of this year. Among the West German officials with whom Dr. Goldmann conferred were Finance Minister Starke, Vice Chancellor Ludwig Erhard, Foreigh Minister Gerhard Schroeder and other Government and Parliamentary Leaders.

Before his departure, Dr.Goldmann was assured that the issue would be settled within the next few weeks.

FRENCH JEWRY MEETS NEW YEAR FACING PROBLEM OF AID TO REFUGEES

PARIS, Oct. 1. (JTA) - Their numbers swelled by some 200,000 Jewish refugees from Algeria, Morocco, Tunisia and Egypt, French Jewry soberly marked the Jewish New Year's advent in the knowledge of the grave problems facing them in the coming year. Hundreds of temporary houses of worship were established to provide facilities for the thousands of newcomers. The famed Cirque d'Hiver in Paris was transformed into a synagogue for the weekend.

For many thousands of refugees, the New Year, traditionally a time of rejoicing, marked a period of personal difficulty and personal tragedy. Thousands of them still lack housing and are dependent on public and voluntary relief. The situation was described as particularly acute for the many Algerian Jewish children, uprooted from their homes and living in temporary shelters here and elsewhere in the country.

CZAR HATORAH TO CPEN SCHOOLS IN FRANCE FOR ALGERIAN REFUGEE CHILDREN

NEW YORK, Oct. 1. (JTA) -- Ozar Hatorah, the society for Orthodox Jewish youth education in the Middle East and North Africa, will open its first two schools in Lyon and Nice, in France, to provide Hebrew education for Jewish refugee children, it was announced here today by Dr. Mordecai Hacohen, director-general of the organization, following his return from France.

Dr. Hacchen also reported that his organization will provide a Hebrew program for Jewish refugee children from North Africa in a government-sponsor-1 vocational school near Paris. During his stay in Paris, Dr. Hacchen conferred with high officials of the French Ministry of Education and leaders of the French Jewish Community in connection with the establishment of Ozar Hatcras schools for Algerian refugee children in France.

He lauded the work of the Joint Distribution Committee and the Fonds Social Juif Unifie to meet the present emergency, and stressed that 30,000 refugee children "are in danger of being lost to Judaism through extreme assimilation in their new environment," if no immediate action for their education is taken.

JUSTICE ARTHUR GOLDBERG SWORN IN AS MEMBER OF U.S. SUPREME COURT

VASHINGTON, Oct. l. (JTA) - Arthur J. Goldberg, the fourth American of Jewish faith to serve on the United States Supreme Court, was sworn in today as the court opened its 1962-1963 term.

President Kennedy attended the brief swearing-in ceremony of his former Secretary others. Also in attendance were Attorney General Robert F. Kennedy, Vice-President Lyndon B. Johnson, several other Cabinet members, Speaker of the House John McCormack and a number of Congressional leaders. Chief Justice Earl Warren praised retiring Justice Felix Frankfurter as a "scholar, teacher and enlightened critic,"

AMERICAN N'AZI ARRESTED SNIPING AT FEFERAL FORCES IN MISSISSIPPI U.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 1. (JTA) -- Adherents of George Rockwell's American Nazi party, which maintains a so-called "Stormtroop" unit, have been reported among elements fighting Federal forces in the University of Mississippi area. One Rockwell follower, Melvin Bruce, 24, d Decatur, Ga., was arrested on the university campus, accused of sniping with a rifle from a campus building at Federal forces. He was seized by troops and brought to military headquarters.

ISRAELI INDUSTRIALISTS WARNED TO ADAPT THEMSELVES TO COMMON MARKET

JERUSALEM, Oct. 1. (JTA) -- Israeli agricultural and industrial producers were warned today by Pinhas Sapir, Minister of Commerce and Industry, to be ready "to adapt themselves, in quality and in price, to the requirements of the Common Market.

Addressing the nation in a radio broadcast, the Minister commented on the decision of the Council of Ministers of the European Common Market to negotiate the possibility of a link for Israel. He said that Israel would have preferred full acceptance to Euromart membership, or at least associate membership similar to the type granted to Greece. He expressed the belief that the link on the verge of approval now is only "a first step."

Meanwhile it was officially reported today that industrial production in Israel rose nearly 17 percent during the first half of 1962 compared with the same period in 1961. The industrial labor force increased by 11 percent over the same period in the previous year.

Salaries of regularly employed Israelis increased an average of 10.4 percent during 196. By March of this year, average salaries rose by another 3.7 percent. Best paid among the regularly employed were personnel in electricity and water services who, by the end of last March, averaged 799 pounds (\$266) monthly as compared with an average monthly salary of 503 pounds (\$168) in January 1961. The number of persons employed in these sectors, however, decreased by four percent.

U.S. STUDY RECOMMENDS EXPANSION OF ELECTRONICS INDUSTRY IN ISRAEL

NEW YORK, Oct. 1. (JTA) -- A study carried out in Israel for the Agency for International Development of the United States for a Stanford Research Institute team has established that conditions exist in Israel for the development of an expanded electronics industry, it was reported here today.

An initial finding by the Stanford research team was the presence of a widening gap between Israel's exports and imports of electronic goods. In 1960, Israel imported nearly \$8,000,000 more of electronic equipment than was exported. By 1961, the deficit was \$12,700,000 and an 1962, it is expected to reach \$17,800,000. The Stanford report noted, therefore, that "a growing local market for electronics obviously exists," and that "a healthy electronics manufacturing capability could possibly satisfy part of the market, save the foreign exchange now expended, and produce major items for export."

The Stanford survey also found that "the conditions specifically suitable" for the electronics industry "are to be found in Israel." The country has six trade schools which turn out 200 electronics technicians annually. Some 75 electronics engineers and physicists are graduated each year in Israel, while several others graduate from schools abroad. "Moreover," the Stanford report noted, "there are many fine research institutions which could add support to electronics manufacturing."

ISRAELI BANK ISSUES ADDITIONAL SHARES TO ITS SHAREHOLDERS IN U.S.

NEW YORK, Oct. 1. (JTA) -- Bank Leumi le-Israel has registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission on offering to shareholders of additional shares on the basis of four new shares for each five shares of both ordinary and Class A now outstanding. A total of 1,400,000 new ordinary shares and 3,920,000 new Class A shares would be issued, according to the offering.

Exact terms of the issue will be announced shortly before the offering which is expected to be made later this month. The offering will be underwritten in the United States by a group headed by Kuhn, Loeb and Company. The issue will be the first underwritten offering of Bank Leumi shares in the United States.

ISRAEL TO HELP TURKEY INCREASE ITS TRADE WITH AFRICAN LANDS

IZMIR, Turkey, Oct. 1. (JTA) -- Israel has made an offer to the Turkish Government to help this country increase its trade with West African markets where Israel has already established good commercial relations. An announcement of the offer was made here today by Haim Asher, Israeli Government trade attache, at a news conference.

The offer, said Mr. Asher, envisages the possibility that Israeli firms in West African trade would act as agents for Turkish exporters of various goods, including cement, sugar and textiles.

ISRAEL EDUCATORS TO HEAD FACULTIES OF UNIVERSITY OF ADDIS ABABA

JERUSALEM, Cct. 1. (JTA) - Two Israeli educators will head the faculties of engineering and humanities of the University of Addis Ababa, Ethiopia, it was announced here today. They are Professor Yehuda Petter, assistant professor of hydraulics at the Technion-Israel Institute of Technology, who will head the engineering faculty of the Ethopian university, and Dr. Zvi Yavetz of the history department of the University of Tel Aviv, who will head the faculty of humanities.

The services of the two educators are being sponsored by the International Cooperation Department of Israel's Foreign Ministry.

SCHOOL BOARD OF TORONTC SUBURB SEEKS CHANGES IN TEACHING RELIGION

TORONTO, Gct. 1. (JTA) -- A new direction in the contentious issue of religion in Ganadian schools is indicated by the school board of the Toronto suburb of North York which has instructed its director of education to meet with parents, teachers and clergymen to deal with the question.

Cntario law governing public schools differs from the American practice in that it provides for religious education in the schools. Canadians who seek to raise a barrier between the state and religion in the school find themselves ranged against the nation's constitution and traditions.

The difficulty has been that Ontario Jews and many others are not satisfied with the nature of the course on religion offered in the schools, and find it too nearly Protestant in its denominational character. The law provides for Jewish parents to have their children excused from religion classes, but many find it embarrassing to take advantage of this provision.

The North York school authorities intend that an entirely new course which would meet the needs of all religious groups, and would not merely provide instruction in Protestant Christianity, should be drafted. It is for this purpose that the board had convened interested persons to assist in the drafting of such a course.

The Toronto Star came out with an article suggesting a revision of the law to drop religious education in the public schools entirely and instituting instead a course for high schools on the comparative study of religions, reasoning that by high school age children have developed some reasoning ability.

Father George Gordon, head of the English-speaking Jesuits of Canada, stated that Canadian Jews who are seeking to undermine the teaching in the schools of the universal fatherhood of God--and the practical appeal to that fatherhood--are making a "grave error." He appealed to Jews to help in exorcising "the demon of anti-Semitism from those Christian hearts where it exists."

He related this opinion to the recent editorial to the American Catholic magazine "America" which also warned that Jewish attempts to uproot religious teachings from the schools are bount to feed anti-Semitism. "If 'America' has issued a camion, isn't it just possible that it could be a mark of true friendship?" he asked.

150TH ANNIVERSARY OF DEATH OF FOUNDER OF LUBAVITCHER MOVEMENT

NEW YORK, Oct. 1. (JTA) -- Rabbi Menachem M. Schneerson, the Lubavitcher Rebbe, today proclaimed the Jewish year, 5723, as the 150th anniversary year marking the death of Rabbi Shneur Zalman of Liadi, founder of the Chabad-Lubavitch Hassidic movement. A special program of studies of the works of the first Lubavitcher Rebbe and the establishment of a fund for their publication was announced by Rabbi Schneerson.

Rabbi Shneur Zalman passed away 150 years ago, on Teveth 24, (this year on January 20) leaving many unpublished works which have since been published, in part, by his successors, the Lubavitcher Rebbes, during their respective years at the helm of the Lubavitcher movement. The present Lubavitcher Rebbe, Rabbi Menachem M. Schneerson, a direct descendant of Rabbi Shneur Zalman and seventh in the dynasty of Chabad-Lubavitch leaders, has in recent years published several volumes of Rabbi Shneur Zalman's works.

FIRST ORTHODOX RABBINICAL COURT TO BE OPENED IN CHICAGO

CHICAGO, Oct. 1. (JTA) -- The Orthodox Chicago Rabbinical Council announced it will open a Jewish religious court, the first such tribunal under Orthodox rabbinical supervision in the area, after the High Holy Days. The court will hear cases dealing with divorce, Jewish dietary laws, conversion and other religious matters.

Rabbi Herman L. Davis, president of the Rabbinical Council, said the court would have three rabbis as Judges. The court will be housed in a hotel, the Sherman House, which made facilities available as a public service. Rabbi Davis said that the authority of the Jewish tribunal here, as in a few other similar Jewish courts in the United States, was dependent entirely on voluntary acceptance of its Jurisdiction by both litigants.

JEWISH YOUTHS FROM PERU AND BOLIVIA TO STUDY LEADERSHIP IN ISRAEL

LIMA, Peru, Oct. 1. (JTA) -- A group of 13 young people, five from Peru and eight from Bolivia, will leave for Israel early this month for study in leadership techniques in youth organizations on fellowships provided by the Government of Israel.

The courses, which will be in Spanish, are arranged under the cultural pact recently signed between Peru and Israel. Goal of the programs is to train leaders to organize youth groups similar to those in Israel with special regard to conditions in the South American countries.
