ISRAELI ARMORED CAR HITS MINE ON SYRIAN BORDER; INCIDENTS ARE FREQUENT

TEL AVIV, Oct. 14. (JTA) -- An Israeli armored car on border patrol duty along the Syrian frontier ran over a land mine planted inside Israeli territory this weekend, according to an announcement here today. No one was injured.

The occurrence was the second of its kind along the Syrian border in the last week. A mine exploded under an Israeli army vehicle near the Syrian border last week. Israeli military officials traced footmarks from the scene of that explosion to the Syrian side of the frontier. One spokesman, though not an official, said "this isn't news any more; it is almost a daily occurrence."

ITALIAN JEWS GREET ECUMENICAL COUNCIL, HOPE CHURCH WILL ADVANCE PEACE

ROME, Oct. 14. (JTA) -- The Union of Jewish Communities in Italy today sent a message to the Ecumenical Council at the Vatican, expressing the hope that the conclave of Church Fathers would "open to the world new perspectives of peace and fraternal collaboration between all peoples and all religions."

Alluding to the fact that Pope John XXIII had already altered certain Catholic liturgy and prayers, eliminating references offensive to the Jewish people, the message stated: "Mindful of decisions already made by His Holiness, John XXIII, Jews nurture the hope that this solemn assembly may follow the road already traced so that, in an hour of grave crisis, common spiritual values will become reinforced and new ways of mutual respect and brotherhood among men disclosed."

NEW YORK POLICE ARREST JEWISH CEMETERY DESECRATOR IN QUEENS

NEW YORK, Oct. 14. (JTA) -- Police today arrested a 15-year-old boy for overturning several headstones in a Jewish cemetery in suburban Maspeth, Queens. Nazi literature and emblems were found in the boy's home at the time of the arrest, police authorities said.

The boy, whose name was withheld because of his age, will be tried in Queens County Children's Court. He will be charged with committing acts of vandalism during a period of several weeks in Mt. Zion Cemetery.

BRITISH FASCISTS DUE TO HEAR COURT VERDICT TODAY; YOUNG MOSLEY BANNED

LONDON, Oct. 14. (JTA) -- The jury in the trial of four leaders of the British National Socialist movement was in seclusion here today, pondering a verdict due tomorrow on whether the four neo-Nazis had violated the British Public Order Act. Testimony was completed Friday. The defendants, who acted as their own counsel, during the nine-day trial, are Colin Jordan, leader of the movement; John Tyndall, secretary; Denis Pirie, and Roland Kerr-Ritchie.

The defendants consistently denied they had organized and equipped a paramilitary branch of the movement called Spearhead for the purpose of displaying force to gain political objectives in violation of the Public Order Act. They also denied organizing Spearhead "in such a manner as to arouse reasonable apprehension in other persons," as charged against them.

In his charge to the jury, Justice A. Barry indicated doubt that the prosecution had demonstrated that Spearhead was organized and trained for the display of force. In considering the lesser charge of arousing apprehension, the judge told the jury that it was essential to know the type of literature issued to Spearhead members, the kind of speeches made, the sort of uniforms worn and the exercises they carried out.

One of the last of the defense witnesses was John Bean, leader of the British National Party, one of the country's smaller neo-Nazi, anti-Semitic groups. Bean testified that he broke with Jordan's group because he objected to its "brain washing" methods.

In another development here concerning resurgent fascism, students at Leicester University today voted to cancel an invitation previously extended to Max Mosley, son of Sir Oswald Mosley, leader of the fascist Union, to participate in a campus debate scheduled for tomorrow.

Young Mosley was to have proposed during the debate this week a motion stating that the students at Leicester "believe the present laws governing the right of free speech should

not be altered." Plans to propose an amendment to those laws are being advanced in Parliament now, and are directed against the Mosleyites as well as against other fascist and neo-Nazi elements in Great Britain. Protests poured in on the student leadership when the announcement was made that young Mosley would speak and propose his motion. The invitation was canceled after a two-hour discussion by the Student Council.

N. Y. FEDERATION OPENS \$22,500,000 CAMPAIGN; DRIVE IS LARGEST OF ITS KIND

NEW YORK, Oct. 14. (JTA) -- The largest fund-raising campaign ever conducted in the United States for a local health and welfare association, calling for a total of \$22,500,000 on behalf of 116 agencies, was launched here last night at the 1962-1963 drive-opening dinner of the Federation of Jewish philanthropies of New York. Bernard J. Lasker, campaign chairman, pointing out that this year's goal calls for \$3,200,000 above the amounts raised by the Federation last year, declared "the record goal was established to meet increased demands for service; to offset rising costs of supplies, service, wages and equipment; and to provide philanthropic support to an increased number of agencies now associated with the Federation."

Governor Nelson A. Rockefeller and Mayor Robert W. Wagner were among the prominent speakers who addressed a gathering of 2,000 at the opening campaign dinner, which was attended by the presidents of all of the Federation's affiliated agencies. Other leaders of the state and city governments were present, as well as heads of many civic, welfare and educational institutions.

Governor Rockefeller praised the Federation as "a superb example of American voluntary action, dating back to the earliest days of our nation's frontiers and to Judeo-Christian traditions of conscience, charity and brotherhood." Mayor Wagner, citing the increasing numbers of aged in the city, said "it is not a partisan question," and called for "decisive action in the next Congress to make sustaining medical and hospital care available to those of our senior citizens who need it."

Other speakers included Lawrence A. Wien, Federation president, who was chairman of the dinner; Irving M. Felt, president-elect; and Mrs. Alan H. Kempner, chairman of the Federation's women's division board.

Last year, according to Federation officials, the association's hospitals, homes for the aged, child care, family service agencies and Jewish educational services provided assistance to 850,000 New Yorkers of all races and faiths. The number is expected to increase by 10 percent in 1963.

Awards were presented to presidents of member Federation agencies in honor of their community leadership and service. A symbolic presentation was made to Mrs. Samuel Zahn, who has headed the Beth Abraham Home, in The Bronx, for 30 years.

Federation's campaign will be conducted by 15,000 volunteers organized by businesses, professions and communities. It is expected that more than 500 fund-raising dinners and luncheons will be held before the drive ends on January 31, 1963.

RABB FAMILY CONTRIBUTES \$250,000 TO BRANDEIS; OVERALL GOAL IS \$65,000,000

WALTHAM, Mass., Oct. 14. (JTA) -- A contribution of \$250,000 from the family of Norman S. Rabb has been announced as the first gift from the New England phase of a national campaign to raise \$65,100,000 for Brandeis University.

Mr. Rabb, who is chairman of the Brandeis board of trustees, announced the gift on behalf of his family. The national goal is aimed at providing funds to endow the university's academic program, complete the building plans, and meet current expenses.

The university's plans envisage needs of \$43,500,000 for faculty salaries, scholarships, graduate teaching assistantships and retirements. Another \$11,850,000 is needed for construction, most of which has already been subscribed. An additional \$9,750,000 is sought for current needs during the campaign.

ISRAEL NAMES COMMITTEE TO OBSERVE U. J. A. 'S 25TH ANNIVERSARY

TEL AVIV, Oct. 14. (JTA) -- A 74-member public committee, headed by Jewish Agency executive chairman Moshe Sharett, was announced here today to prepare the program in Israel for the celebration of the 25th anniversary of the United Jewish Appeal.

The committee includes Cabinet Ministers, members of Parliament, mayors, newspaper editors and other Israeli leaders. Mr. Sharett told the first meeting of the committee that the UJA has raised \$1,100,000,000 and had helped more than 2,500,000 Jews including the 1,250,000 Jews who had emigrated to Israel.

The program, starting October 22, with the arrival of the 145 members of a UJA Study Mission, the eighth of its kind, will include a special stamp issued by Israel for the occasion.

ARGENTINA REPORTED HAVING LARGEST CONCENTRATION OF NAZIS IN WORLD

NEW YORK, Oct. 14. (JTA) -- Argentina has perhaps the largest concentration of Nazis in the world, and the Nazis are there "to stay," Look magazine declared today in a special article to be published next week. The seven-page article, by Chester Morrison, declared that, among the factors that have helped the growth of Nazi-style youth organization in Argentina are widespread unemployment and inner political chaos. The Nazis in the country, he reported, have successfully infiltrated the nation's armed forces as well as various governmental institutions.

Photographs show members of the anti-Semitic "Tacuara" youth group in illegal maneuvers outside of Buenos Aires. The youths, ranging in age from 16 to 24, are also shown in military-type formation giving the Nazi salute. A similar organization also comprising boys of 16 to 24, but from well-to-do families, known as "Guardia Restauradora Nacionalista," was said to have a Roman Catholic priest as its spiritual leader.

The priest, the Rev. Julio Meinvielle, was described as "sinister" and was said to have political as well as spiritual influence over the group. He is the author of an anti-Semitic book in Spanish entitled, "The Jew in the Mystery of History." A Guardia leader, Alberto Ezcurra Uriburu, agreed with Father Meinvielle that Argentina's Jews alone were responsible for the recent wave of anti-Semitic outbreaks. The Jews wanted to be able to blame them "on us," he said. Ezcurra Uriburu expects to be the next president of Argentina, Look reported.

ARGENTINE FOREIGN MINISTER ADDS ASSURANCES TO KATZ ON ANTI-SEMITISM

BUENOS AIRES, Oct. 14. (JTA) -- Label A. Katz, of New Orleans, international president of B'nai B'rith, was assured here this weekend by a third member of Argentina's Cabinet that the Argentine Government "will not tolerate any racial or religious discriminations" and that the Federal authorities will "take all measures necessary and possible to make democratic practices and freedoms here secure."

These assurances were given Mr. Katz by Dr. Carlos M. Muriz, Foreign Minister of Argentina. Mr. Katz, who discussed the recent wave of anti-Semitism in conferences here with other topmost Government personalities, had been given similar assurances by President Jose Mario Guido, Minister of the Interior Rodolfo Martinez, and Minister of the Economy Alvaro Alsogaray.

Mr. Katz left for home after being feted by leaders of the Jewish community here. Meanwhile, Saul E. Joffes, director of the B'nai B'rith International Council, who had accompanied Mr. Katz here, left for visits to other Latin American centers to survey the situation of the Jews there. Among the countries to be visited by Mr. Joffes are Chile, Peru, Guatemala and Panama.

25 LATIN AMERICAN LABOR LEADERS GO TO ISRAEL FOR HISTADRUT STUDY

NEW YORK, Oct. 14. (JTA) -- A group of 25 Latin American labor leaders left here last night from the International Airport here, via El Al Israel Airlines, for a six-week study mission in Israel, after completing an advanced course in labor studies in Mexico under the auspices of ORIT, the inter-American Regional Organization of Workers. In Israel the 24 men and one woman will concentrate on field studies of the agricultural and industrial cooperative movement and labor organization at Histadrut's Institute for Labor Studies, in Tel Aviv.

Morris Paladino, assistant secretary-general of ORIT, a branch of the International Confederation of Free Trade Unions, heads the study mission composed of representatives from 12 Latin American countries--Bolivia, Ecuador, Colombia, Chile, Salvador, Guatemala, Honduras, Mexico, Peru, Uruguay, Paraguay and Panama.

The program is part of the comprehensive service rendered by Histadrut, the Israel labor federation, to labor movements in newly developing nations, whose leaders are groping for methods suitable for the democratic advancement of their countries. Since Israel is a prime example of how a small nation with limited resources has established a viable economy within a democratic political framework, she has attracted the attention of scores of emerging nations in Asia and Africa during the past decade. Latin Americans are also finding Israel a "living model" of a small nation attaining high standards of material and cultural values, according to Mr. Paladino.

DR. GLOBKE'S FITNESS TO SERVE IN ADENAUER GOVERNMENT IS QUESTIONED

BONN, Oct. 14. (JTA) -- The propriety of allowing Dr. Hans Globke, State Secretary in the office of Chancellor Konrad Adenauer, to continue holding high office in the West German Government was questioned again this weekend in Parliament.

Dr. Oswald Kohut, of the Free Democratic parliamentary fraction, asked the Minister of Justice, Dr. Wolfgang Stammberger, whether Globke's status should not be re-examined in the light of recent exposures of former Nazi judges.

Dr. Globke was the author of a commentary on the racist Nuremberg Laws of 1935, during the Hitler regime. The Justice Minister replied that he was not authorized to answer Dr. Kohut's question. The Free Democratic Party is a member of the present Government coalition.

JULIUS ROSENWALD CENTENNIAL CELEBRATED BY CHICAGO FEDERATION

CHICAGO, Oct. 14. (JTA) -- Four hundred of Chicago's outstanding business, civic and social leaders attended here tonight a dinner honoring the memory of the late Julius Rosenwald, one of America's most outstanding philanthropists, who was born 100 years ago. Chicago Mayor James J. Daley officially proclaimed the next seven days as "Julius Rosenwald Centennial Week in Chicago."

The dinner, conducted by the Jewish Federation of Metropolitan Chicago, heard speakers extol the achievements of the late Mr. Rosenwald, whose philanthropies had totaled \$63,000,000. Mr. Rosenwald, who had served nine years as president of the Federation, had helped organize, support and consolidate many of the Federation's welfare agencies.

Nearly all of Mr. Rosenwald's children and grandchildren were present at the event. Included among them were two sons, William Rosenwald, former general chairman of the national United Jewish Appeal, and chairman of the advisory committee of the American Jewish Committee; and Lessing J. Rosenwald.

The principal address was delivered by Charles Aaron, immediate past president of the Federation, who referred to the late Mr. Rosenwald as "the architect of the unified Jewish charities that became the Federation." William Rosenwald spoke at the dinner on behalf of the assembled members of the Rosenwald family.

Joseph L. Gidwitz, Federation president, announced the grant of the first Julius Rosenwald Memorial Award to Frank L. Sulzberger, a past president of the Federation. The gold medallion will, hereafter, be awarded each year, as it was tonight to Mr. Sulzberger, to the "individual who has achieved most in the advancement of the Jewish Federation and the welfare of the Jewish community." Mr. Sulzberger, who served on the Federation's board of directors for 25 years, was also a director of the Community Fund of Chicago. He serves now on the Federation's executive committee. Another address was delivered at the dinner by the Federation's executive vice-president, Samuel A. Goldsmith.

ORT PLANS EXPANSION OF VOCATIONAL TRAINING TO MEET HIGHER NEEDS

NEW YORK, Oct. 14. (JTA) -- ORT will expand its vocational training programs to meet the current increase in Jewish immigration to France and Israel, it was announced today by Mrs. Max M. Rosenberg, president of Women's American ORT.

In a report on the organization's plans for the months ahead, Mrs. Rosenberg noted that "the number of people who need ORT training has multiplied greatly." She attributed this to accelerated Jewish emigration in recent months.

Mrs. Rosenberg said the Jewish population in Marseilles has increased from 10,000 to 40,000 in the last five years. She announced that ORT's vocational training center in Marseilles expected to increase its enrolment from 200 last year to 500 in the coming term.

Stressing the recent heavy influx of immigrants into Israel, she cited ORT's role in providing nearly half of Israel's vocational training facilities. Mrs. Rosenberg stressed the problem Israel faces with the growing number of "impoverished teenagers who were born in underdeveloped countries, and who lack the prerequisites for high school."

EINSTEIN SCULPTURE MAY GO TO GERMANY; AMERICANS NOT INTERESTED

NEW YORK, Oct. 14. (JTA) -- A sculptured memorial to the late Professor Albert Einstein, done by an American artist, may go to West Germany because no Americans have come forth to finance the memorial, it was announced here today by the sculptor, Robert Berks. The memorial is in the form of a disc, 21 feet in diameter, at one side of which sits a replica of the late scientist with a book in one hand.

According to Mr. Berks, West Germans have offered \$180,000 for the sculpture but no one in the United States has offered to purchase the work and erect it. Mr. Berks said that, thus far, no memorial has been put up to Dr. Einstein in this country, though his death occurred in 1955.

ACKERMAN NAMED DIRECTOR OF UNITED SYNAGOGUE'S DEPT. OF EDUCATION

NEW YORK, Oct. 14. (JTA) -- The appointment of Dr. Walter I. Ackerman as director of the department of education of the United Synagogue of America was announced today by its executive director Dr. Bernard Segal. The United Synagogue of America is the congregational arm of the Conservative movement in Judaism. The department of education serves the schools of the organization's synagogue affiliates in the U. S. and Canada.

Dr. Ackerman was also named director of the United Synagogue's Commission on Jewish Education, which provides curricula and study materials for a nationwide network of Hebrew schools, including the Solomon Schechter day school system. The Commission is one of the country's leading publishers of Jewish textbooks in Hebrew and English.
