EUROPEAN CONFERENCE AIDS NORTH AFRICAN REFUGEES WITH \$750,000

GENEVA, Nov. 6. (JTA) -- More than \$750,000 to aid North African Jewish refugees in France was pledged today to the recently formed Emergency Aid Fund of the Standing Conference on European Jewish Community Services, at the organization's third annual assembly here.

The funds, of which more than \$300,000 has already been raised, were pledged by Jewish leaders from 11 European countries. The money will be used to supplement the aid given to the newcomers by the American Jewish Joint Distribution Committee and the French Government in efforts to absorb some 180,000 North African refugees now in France. The funds were raised after a warning yesterday by Charles H. Jordan, JDC director-general for overseas operations, who said that, even with French Government aid, there would be need for help to the refugees 'fyra a sustained period."

Claude Kelman, vice-president of the Fonds Social Juif Unifie, the central French Justish welfare agency, and Dr. A. Chouraki, president of the Oran Consistory in Algeria, told the assembly that the influx from North Africa had created "a new geography" of France with some Jewish populations quadrupling in size. They cited as a "striking example" the situation in Marseille whose Jewish population has rocketed from 12,000 to more than 60,000.

The complex of new needs created for the Joint Distribution Committee by the mass movement of Jews in recent months, was stressed in reports presented to the JDC's 16th annual Gountry Directors Conference, simultaneously in session here. In a summary statement, Moses A. Leavitt, of New York, JDC executive vice-chairman, pointed out that, due to the uprooting of over 200, 000 Jews from their homes inthe past 18 months, the needs which JDC must meet in 1963 must be substantially greater than those of the past year,

The scope of JDC's activities in various parts of the world was revealed in reports presented by country directors attending the conference from Europe, North Africa, Iran and Israel. The remaining Jewish inhabitants in Moslem countries, according to the reports, are estimated at 300,000. In these countries, the JDC network of activities aids some 100,000 persons each year. In spite of emigration from some of these countries, the needs for 1963 will be greater rather than less, because of the weakening of local leadership and the worsening of economic conditions, the reports showed.

ESHKOL REPORTS NEW ECONOMIC POLICY HAS SUCCEEDED SINCE DEVALUATION

JERUSALEM, Now 6. (JTA) -- Finance Minister Levi Eshkol told Israel's Parliament tonight that the Government's new economic policy, since the devaluation of the pound last February had proved to be a success both at home and abroad. Comparing the first nine months of this year with the same period of 1961, he said that production rose and the level of employment increased despite the large scale immigration of the period. He added that 15 percent more goods had been exported in the comparable periods.

The Finance Minister expressed cautious optimism concerning the negotiations for some kind of an Israeli trade link with the six-nation European Common Market scheduled to be resumed this month in Brussels. He said he anticipated an "overall dynamic arrangement" with Euromart and forecast that exports to the six nations and to England would total \$250,000,000 annually as compared with the \$105,000,000 exported by Israel last year.

ISRAELI PARLIAMENT HOLDS COMMEMORATIVE EXERCISES HONCRING WEIZMANN

JERUSALEM, Nov. 6. (JTA) -- The country-wide commemorative exercises honoring the name of the late Dr. Chaim Weizmann, who died 10 years ago, were joined last night by the Knesset, Israel's Parliament, which held a special solemn session in memory of Israel's first President,

Dr. Vera Weizmann, the late leader's widow, shared a box with President and Mrs. Lihak Ben-Zvi. Dr. Chaim Weizmann's son and sister were present, as were Chief Rabbi Yitzhak Nissim; Dr., Nahum Goldmann, president of the World Zionist Organization; members of the Jewish Agency executive, members of the academic and administrative staffs of the Hebrew University and the Weizmann Institute; Lord Rothschild and other dignitaries,

Speaker Kaddish Luz traced the career of the first President from his schoolboy days in Pinsk, where he distributed Zionist leaflets, through his Presidency of Israel.

QUEEN ELIZABETH II CONGRATULATES VISCOUNT SAMUEL ON 92ND BIRTHDAY

LCNDON, Nov. 6. (JTA) -- Queen Elizabeth II today sent a framed portrait of herself, with warm congratulations, to Viscount Herbert L. Samuel, Britain's High Commissioner in Palestine from 1920 to 1925, who celebrated his 92nd birthday. Professor Edwin Samuel, of the Hebrew University in Jerusalem, son of Viscount Samuel, attended a gathering of friends and relatives honoring his father's birthday.

MOROCCAN PARTY HITS JEWS AS ,KING DECORATES PROMINENT JEWISH FAMILY

CASABLANCA, Nov. 6. (JTA) -- The Movement Populaire, a rural rightist political party, demanded at its. annual Congress at Marrakech today that the Moroccan Government "take action" against Moroccan Jews for allegedly "working in the interests of many foreigners, rather than in the interests of their native Morocco." The party is a member of the Government, holding two posts in the Moroccan Cabinet.

Some months ago the movement published in Arabic a translation of the notorious "Protocols of the Elders of Zion," a classic forgery in the literature of anti—Semitism. As a result, Daniel Mayer, a Moroccan Jewish community leader, sent a letter of protest to Minister of National Defense Aberdane.

At the same time today, King Hassan conferred medals of Chavalier of the Order of the Throne on four members of the prominent Moroccan Jewish family of Botbol. The royal citations particularly singled out for high distinction ("for services rendered to the Royal family over a number of years" by Haim Botbol and his son Raphael. The Botbols had previously been honced with official Moroccan Government medals 10 years ago.

KEY NAZI IN MASS MURDER TRIAL SAYS HE KILLED TO ADVANCE SELF

COBLENZ, Nov. 6. (JTA) -- Georg Heuser, the chief defendant in the trial of 12 former Nazis charged with the mass murder of more than 35,000 Jews in Minsk during the Second World War, told the court here today that he did not hate Jews but killed them to advance his career. "It was a sort of political schizophrenia," he declared.

Asserting that he had never discussed the killings with other members of the execution squad, Heuser, who was a Rhineland-Palatinate police chief until his arrest, said that he "saw family men line up at the mass graves and shoot Jews. They behaved as all others did,"

The court admitted as prosecution exhibits, a number of historic documents, including a 1939 speech by Adolf Hitler in which, the prosecution pointed out, Hitler had "passed the death sentence" on all European Jews.

ITALIAN PARLIAMENT GROUP MCVES TOWARD COMPENSATION FOR NAZI VICTIMS

RCME, Nov. 6. (JTA) -- The Foreign Affairs Commission of the Italian Parliament began discussion today on ratification of a law on the Italo-German agreement of June 1961, to provide for the payment of 40,000,000 West German marks (\$10,000,000) to indemnify Italian victims of the Nazi persecution. The number of Jewish beneficiaries has been estimated at nearly 7,000, or about a third of all Italians who would be eligible for such indemnification.

The ratification law contains a provision which would empower the Italian Government to enact within six months a special measure to stipulate that all Italian citizens deported by the Nazis because of religion, race or political reasons would be indemnified in proportion to the length of time they spent in Nazi camps. There would be adequate provisions for the survivors of those who died in the camps or elsewhere as a result of Nazi persecutions.

While the power to enact such a law was expectee to whorten procedures leading to purpose it was estimated that two years would elapse between ratification and distribution of the money.

TWC GERMAN STUDY GROUPS TO DOCUMENT FATE OF JEWS UNDER HITLER

FRANKFURT, Nov. 6. (JTA) -- The first of a series of documentary reports on the fate of Frankfurt Jews during the Nazi regime, edited by a municipal commission on the history of the Jews in this city will be published soon, commission officials said today.

The first volume of the "Documents of the History of Frankfurt Jews, 1933-1945," deals with such questions as the number of Frankfurt Jews deported by the Nazis, the persons responsible for the deportation orders, and how those orders were carried out. The material is based on previously unpublicized material. The commission has been working under the active chairmanship of the Lord Mayor with the assistance of the Frankfurt Archives department.

At Wiesbaden, the Hesse provincial government announced today the creation of an office for research and documentation on the history of the Jews in Hesse. The new office will start its activities at the beginning of 1963.

Working in connection with the present study group for the history of Hesse in general, the new office will seek to portray the contributions made by Jews to the welfare of the province before Hitler, and their fate under the Nazi regime. The study office will seek to collect all relevant documents and historical sources.

KENNEDY HAILS 'DEVOTION' OF JEWISH CHAPLAINS IN U.S. SERVICES

NEW YCRK, Nov. 6. (JTA) -- President Kennedy has hailed the 100th anniversary of the commissioning of the first Jewish Army chaplain in 1862, as an era "marked by the service, devotion and valor of our Jewish chaplains in times of war and peace."

The statement appears in a book, "Rabbis In Uniform," describing the story of the American Jewish military chaplains during the past century, published this week as one of the events of the year-long observance of the centennial. The book was published by the Association of Jewish Chaplains of the Armed Forces, in cooperation with Jonathan David Publishers.

Ex-President Eisenhower also contributed an introductory statement, describing the record of chaplains "of all faiths" as one "in which Americans take great pride. In the struggle for human liberty and human rights in which we are now engaged, "stated Gen. Eisenhower, "the military chaplain stands forth sharply as a living symbol of those principles and qualities which differentiate our world of freedom from the world of

Jewish chaplains throughout the United States are handling a flood of hardship problems resulting from the personal needs of servicemen and their dependents uprooted by the Cuban crisis, it was reported here today by the :Commission on Jewish Chaplaincy and the Armed Forces of the National Jewish Welfare Board.

Jewish National Fund to Plant Grove Honoring John F. Kennedy

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 6. (JTA) -- A tree-planting project, which will culminate in the establishment of a grove in the American Freedom Forest in Israel in honor of President John F. Kennedy, was launched here last night at a Jewish National Fund dinner attended by 1,000 community leaders.

BenJamin Swig, of San. Francisco, president of the JNF Western region, announced the tribute to Mr. Kennedy, declaring that "the world owes a great debt of gratitude to this illustrious American leader, whose wise and considered actions averted a world conflagration." A total of \$100,000 was pledged for the project.

TARBUTH CONFERENCE TO CONSIDER GOALS OF HEBREW CULTURE IN U.S.A.

NEW YORK, Nov. 6. (JTA) -- Some 300 Jewish intellectuals, educators and community leaders in this country as well as a number of prominent figures from Europe and Israel will take part in a two-day conference in New York November 17 and 18 which will consider the problems and goals of Hebrew culture in the United States, it was announced here today by Dr. Emanuel Neumann, president of the Tarbuth Foundation for the Advancement of Hebrew Culture.

The Tarbuth Foundation, which is sponsoring the conference, was established earlier through initial gifts by Abraham and Jacob Goodman of New York. It aids in the promotion of Hebrew educational and cultural projects.

Guest speakers at the conference will include Abba Eban, Israel's Minister of Education, and P. E. Gilbert, former French Ambassador to Israel. Professor Harry Wolfson, of Harvard University, and Fhilip Lown, president of the American Association for Jewish Education, will be honored at the conference for their contributions to Hebrew scholarship and Jewish education.

NINTH AMERICAN STUDENT PROGRAM AT HEBREW UNIVERSITY IS LAUNCHED

NEW YORK, Nov. 6. (JTA) -- A new one-year study program for American college students at the Hebrew University of Jerusalem has been launched for the ninth consecutive year, it was announced here today by Philip G. Whitman, president of the American Frients of the Hebrew University, which sponsors this educational undertaking. The American Student Program Committee of the organization stated that applications must be received before January 15, 1963. Professor Oscar I. Janowsky, of the City College of New York, is chairman of the committee.

The program encompasses undergraduates who have completed at least two years of college, as well as recent college graduates. Although prior knowledge of Hebrew is not absolutely required, some familiarity with the language is regarded as highly derirable, and candidates are expected to begin to study Hebrew while still in America as preparation for the year in Israel, the committee stated.

ISRAELI ENGINEER NAMED AS ECONOMIC CONSUL FOR NEW ENGLAND

NEW YORK, Nov. 6. (JTA) -- Edni Avinoam, a leading Israeli engineer, has been as announced Economic Consul for the Government of Israel in the New England area, it was announced today by Avraham Taiber, director of the Israel Investment Authority of North America. Mr. Avinoam, whose headquarters will be in Boston, succeeds Michael Haft, who has returned to Israel following a two-year tour of duty.
