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EICHMANN'S AIDE ORDERED TO LEAVE SWITZERLAND; ESCAPED FROM ITALY

GENEVA, April 10. (JTA) -- Swiss police today told Erich Rajakovic, a one-time key aide of Adolf Eichmann, that he must leave Switzerland immediately or be expelled as an undesirable alien.

The police said that Rajakovic arrived in Switzerland yesterday, after fleeing from Italy, and spent the night in a Bern Hotel. Police went to his hotel and told him to leave. However, there was a possibility that Rajakovic might lodge an appeal against the police order.

The Dutch Government had been reported considering a request to Switzerland for extradition of Rajakovic as the Nazi official who deported 110,000 Jews from Holland to the Mauthausen, Auschwitz and Treblinka murder camps. One of those he was alleged to have sent to their deaths was Anne Frank, whose diary of her suffering during the Nazi occupation has become a world classic.

However, late today, Dr. Anton Beerman, the Dutch Justice Minister, announced that the Dutch would not ask for extradition because Dutch files did not contain enough juridical material for a trial in Holland. He added that the Government would cooperate with any trial of Rajakovic held elsewhere by making available material from the State Office for World War II Documentation at Amsterdam.

The former Nazi and his wife disappeared from their home in Italy last Friday, a few hours before the Milan newspaper, "Corriere della Sera," identified Rajakovic as a former assistant to Eichmann, who was tried, sentenced and hanged in Israel last year for his role in the wartime slaughter of 6,000,000 European Jews.

PASSOVER CELEBRATION IN NEGEV MARRED BY RAINSTORM; MANY STRANDED

TEL AVIV, April 10. (JTA) -- Hundreds of guests en route to a Passover celebration at Israel's southernmost point, the port city of Eilat, were stranded in the Negev by a sudden rainstorm that dumped as much water on the area in two hours as it normally gets in two years.

The road to Eilat was cut and large portions of the road were submerged. The travelers found shelter in Beersheba and Mitzpeh Ramon where they waited while kibbutz volunteers and army units worked around the clock to repair both the road and battered telephone lines.

The airport at Eilat also was damaged by heavy currents. Communications were restored this morning with the port city and people started to pour in for the festivities tonight and tomorrow which will feature a huge display on the life of Eilat in ancient days and now.

Passover ceremonies were held for the first time since Roman days on Massada Hill overlooking the Dead Sea. The Seder commemorated the heroic fight for freedom of the Jews against the Romans.

Israel's kibbutzim were filled to capacity by the Passover visitors and, in the north, the weather was pleasant, swelling the ranks of hitchhikers.

Passover Marred in Belgian City by Synagogue Fire; 11 Torahs Destroyed

ANTWERP, Belgium, April 10. (JTA) -- Passover celebrations were marred here by a fire that broke out in the Great Synagogue, leading congregation of the Orthodox community, causing the destruction of 11 Torah scrolls. Police are investigating the origin of the fire.

Officials said that the synagogue on the ground floor can be repaired, but the Beth Hamidash on the first floor was totally destroyed despite efforts of firemen and many Jews who joined with them to fight the blaze. Many prayerbooks, phylacteries and other sacred objects also were destroyed. Damage was estimated at 7,000,000 Belgian francs (\$140,000).

GERMANY PREPARES LAW TO PREVENT ARMS EXPERTS FROM WORKING FOR EGYPT

BCNN, April 10. (JTA) -- A proposed law to prevent West German arms experts from working in Egypt or any other foreign country, except with Government permission, will be discussed April 18 by a committee representing all West German political parties and Ministers concerned, it was reported here today.

The draft measure is being prepared by Professor Boehm, a West German Parliamentary expert. The proposed law represents a turnabout in the attitude of West German officials who had previously maintained they could not prevent nationals from working for other countries because freedom of movement was guaranteed by the West German constitution.

WASHINGTON URGED TO INVESTIGATE GERMAN ARMS DEALINGS WITH EGYPT

WASHINGTON, April 10. (JTA) -- Rep. Samuel S. Stratton, New York Democrat, announced today that he had requested the Secretaries of State and Defense to investigate reports that Prof. Willy Messerschmitt, one of Hitler's leading aircraft designers, was working with the Egyptian Government to develop a Mach-2 jet fighter in violation of the West German constitution.

A number of vital parts for the jet are reportedly being manufactured in the Messerschmitt factory in West Germany and shipped to Egypt. Rep. Stratton said: "These reports, if true, reveal a most serious threat to peace in the Middle East. It is incredible that countries which receive our aid, and with one of which we are closely allied, should be permitted to participate in military development activities which clearly threaten the security and independence of Israel."

EX-NAZI POLICE OFFICERS TO GO ON TRIAL FOR KILLING 10,000 JEWS

FRANKFURT, April 10. (JTA) -- The Freiburg public prosecutor's office announced today that three former Nazi police officers will go on trial here on charges of complicity in the murder of some 10,000 Jews in Nazi-occupied Russia during the war.

The defendants are Joseph Uhl, 54, Gerhard Riebel, 48, and Heinz Gerd Huelsemann, 44. The killings took place in Bialystok, Minsk and Mogilew. The trial is expected to start in May and some 80 witnesses will be called to testify.

The trial of former Nazi euthanasia specialist Werner Heyde and two co-defendants, originally slated to begin in the Limburg jury court on April 23, has been postponed until the late summer or fall, officials here announced today. No reason was given for the postponement.

Dr. Heyde is charged with the murder of at least 100,000 persons in the Nazi program for disposing of individuals deemed to be too sick or old to be allowed to continue to live. Dr. Hans Hefelmann and Dr. Bernard Bohne, the co-defendants, are charged with responsibility for the murders of 73,000 and 15,000 persons, respectively.

Two former SS men went on trial in Hanover today on charges of the murder at Luneberg Heath of three Hanover concentration camp prisoners to prevent them from being saved by approaching Allied forces early in 1945. The two defendants are William Genth of Helmstadt, 68, retired on a pension, and Paul Maass, 55, a Lubeck bricklayer.

GHANA IGNORES GERMAN REQUEST FOR EXTRADITION OF NAZI CAMP PHYSICIAN

FRANKFURT, April 10. (JTA) -- Dr. Fritz Bauer, Chief Public Prosecutor of Hesse, disclosed today that the extradition of Horst Schumann, a former Nazi concentration camp doctor, from Ghana had been sought as far back as 1961 but that Ghana still had not complied with the request.

Dr. Bauer made the disclosure in connection with a request for Schumann's return to West Germany to face war crimes charges. The request was submitted by the Organization of Former Concentration Camp Prisoners in Israel to the International Association of Resistance Fighters and Deportees in Brussels.

COLOGNE MUNICIPALITY GIVES BOOK ON ISRAEL TO 10,000 SCHOOL CHILDREN

COLOGNE, April 10. (JTA) -- More than 10,000 Cologne boys and girls leaving school at Easter will each receive from the municipality a book on Israel's history, geography and economic development written by Johannes Giesberts, the city's chief education officer. Mr. Giesberts has been organizing the school children's study tours of Israel for some time.

BOOK ON NAZI ANNIHILATION OF JEWS WINS COVETED PRIZE IN POLAND

LONDON, April 10. (JTA) -- Aaron Eisenach, a research worker at the Jewish Historical Institute of Warsaw, has been awarded one of the Politika Prizes for his book, "The Hitlerite Extermination of the Jews," according to a dispatch from Warsaw received here today. The prize is given for best works on political science, and is greatly coveted among Polish writers. The award has a value of 10,000 zlotys.

FOUR JEWS WIN SEATS IN CANADIAN PARLIAMENT; THREE ARE RE-ELECTED

TCRONTO, April 10. (JTA) -- Canada's general elections, which took place on Monday and for which tabulations were completed today, left the number of Jews in the House of Commons unchanged, with four Jews still in the national Parliament. One Jewish deputy, David Lewis, of the Toronto suburb of York South, was defeated on the New Democratic Party's ticket, but was replaced by another Jew, Marvin Gelber, a Liberal.

The Social Credit Party, which has been charged with tolerating anti-Jemitic spokesmen among some of its leaders and candidates, lost six seats nationally, going down from 30 in the previous Parliament to 24 elected in Monday's balloting.

Herbert A. Gray, a Jew running on the Liberal ticket in Essex-West, at Windsor, Ontario, was re-elected. Milton Klein, in Montreal-Cartier, was elected to succeed to the seat previously held by Leon Crestohl, Mr. Crestohl died several weeks ago. In Winnipeg-North, David Orlikow was re-elected on the New Democratic ticket.

Mr. Gelber, who defeated Mr. Lewis in York South, is well known in Jewish communal and Zionist circles, having held office in the Zionist organization of his district as well as nationally. His father, Louis Gelber, and four brothers are also prominent in Zionist, cultural and Jewish communal affairs on the local and international levels.

MOROCCAN JEWISH LEADER REPORTS ON STATUS OF JEWS TO U. S. GROUPS

NEW YORK, April 10. (JTA) -- David Amar, Secretary General of the Federation of Jewish Communities in Morocco, hailed today the new Moroccan constitution guaranteeing freedom of religion to all citizens as "a major advance in the Moslem world." At the same time, Mr. Amar urged the Moroccan Government to implement the constitutional guarantees, which would "grant legal status to the Jewish community" in that country.

Mr. Amar spoke at the American Jewish Committee's Institute of Human Relations. The meeting was attended by representatives of Jewish organizations who expressed their full support of the aspirations of the Moroccan Jewish community to gain legal status and equal rights in a democratic Morocco.

Mr. Amar, who is head of the organized Jewish community in Morocco, stressed that the new constitution is "anchored on fundamental liberties and respect for the dignity of man." He said that the constitution had been conceived and offered to the Moslem people by King Hassan II. He hailed the King for "seeking a regime which guarantees equal rights for all its citizens." The constitution was overwhelmingly adopted last year by popular referendum.

Mr. Amar said that proposals currently being considered by the Moroccan Government would give Moroccan Jewry "jurisdiction in matters of personal status, such as marriage and divorce, education and welfare." He added: "Early enactment of these measures would not only carry out the provisions of the constitution, but, in addition, create favorable conditions for equal participation by Moroccan Jews in the political, economic and social development of Morocco."

In addition to representatives of the American Jewish Committee, the meeting was attended by leaders of the American Friends of the Alliance Israelite Universelle, the American ORT Federation and other Jewish welfare organizations with operating programs in Morocco.

REDEMPTION OF FIRST ISRAEL BONDS STARTS; HOLDERS TO RECEIVE 150 PERCENT

NEW YORK, April 10. (JTA) -- Holders of 1951 Israel Independence Savings Bonds will be able to redeem their bonds beginning May 1, it was announced today by Dr. Joseph J. Schwartz, vice-president of the Israel Bond Organization.

The redemption procedure relating to Israel bonds is similar to the methods used in the collection of payment on other bonds. Almost any bank will arrange for the redemption of maturing Israel bonds, with payment made in dollars through a State of Israel check. Local Israel bond offices are prepared to assist bondholders in redemption.

Of the total \$52,700,000 in Israel bonds that were sold in 1951, 59 percent were 15-year coupons that do not mature until 1966, and 41 percent were savings bonds that fall due this year, on the twelfth anniversary of the purchase of these bonds. Savings bonds dated May 1, 1951 will be redeemable on or after May 1, 1963; Savings bonds dated June 1, 1951 will be redeemed on or after June 1st of this year, and so on. Payment will be made on the basis of 150 percent of the issue price. Thus a person who redeems a \$100 bond will receive \$150.

In inviting holders to collect on maturing bonds, Dr. Schwartz stated that those persons who do not cash their bonds will not receive additional interest for any period beyond the due date of their bonds. However, he added that persons who wish to continue their investment in Israel's economy should arrange to buy new Bonds after they have redeemed the bonds that have matured.

DEMAND FOR KOSHER FOODS IN U. S. REPORTED 'STEADILY INCREASING'

NEW YORK, April 10. (JTA) -- The demand for kosher foods in the United States "has been increasing steadily in recent years," the Wall Street Journal reported following a survey of the kosher market.

The survey found that about 2,000 kosher products of more than 400 companies were now being produced under the rabbinical supervision of the Union of Orthodox Jewish Congregations of America. The figures were compared by the financial daily with "only 1,000 producers and 225 companies four years ago." Many of the largest food producers in the United States were listed as making kosher products under that supervision.

The survey cited the availability this year of foil-wrapped kosher dinners of chicken, beef and turkey as an example of how American food manufacturers "are adapting modern processing and packing techniques to the ancient rituals that govern the preparation of kosher foods."

The Wall Street Journal reported that a number of new hotels in New York City have separate sets of dishes and cutlery for kosher affairs and that when the 46-story New York Hilton opens in June, it will have a kosher kitchen able to serve 3,700 people. The Sheraton Park Hotel in Washington stores 15,000 pieces of china and 300 pots and pans in its recently opened kosher kitchen, the financial daily also reported.

FOUR COLLEGE CREDITS TO BE AWARDED FOR SEVEN-WEEK HEBREW COURSE

NEW YORK, April 10. (JTA) -- A seven-week conversational Hebrew course, on beginning, intermediate and advanced levels for college students and high school seniors, sponsored by the Student Zionist Organization in cooperation with the Herzliah Hebrew Teachers Institute, will start during the summer vacations of 1963, it was announced here today.

Successful students will be awarded four credits by the Herzliah Hebrew Teachers Institute. These credits are recognized automatically by colleges in New York City and through special arrangements by out-of-New York colleges. The beginning class is planned for students with no previous knowledge of Hebrew. In the advanced class, students with a Hebrew background will have an opportunity to perfect their command of spoken and written Hebrew.

The South Branch Hotel in South Branch, New Jersey, will serve as the site of the course. The hotel combines features of a summer hotel and summer camp. The fee for the entire seven-week period, including tuition, room and board, but not including travel, laundry and insurance, will be \$295. An additional fee of \$10 will be charged for registration. Qualified candidates may receive scholarships up to \$100.

GEN. YAKIR, EXECUTED BY STALIN, IS REHABILITATED AS SOVIET HERO

LONDON, April 10. (JTA) -- General Johan Yakir, Jewish hero of the Soviet armed forces who was executed in a Stalin purge in 1936, has now been officially rehabilitated as one of the USSR's "great men," according to a dispatch from Moscow received here today. Gen. Yakir is one of a number of Soviet heroes whose lives are depicted glowingly in a new movie just released by the Soviet Film Unit for Documentaries. The film is entitled "Lives of Great Men."

Jonah Yakir, who was born and brought up in Kishinev, entered the Bolshevik army as a youth and, by 1918, had become a general. He was hailed widely by the Soviet leaders for his victory over White Guard anti-Bolsheviks in the Battle of Zhitomir, in 1918. However, in 1936, he, along with Soviet Marshal Tukhachevsky and other high officers of the Soviet army, was accused by the Stalin apparatus of having had treasonous dealings with the Nazi regime in Germany. All, including Yakir, were executed, after a show trial typical of the Stalin purges.

EXHIBITION OF WARSAW GHETTO REVOLT RELICS OPENS IN EAST BERLIN

LONDON, April 10. (JTA) -- An exhibition of documents, photographs and relics of the Warsaw Ghetto has been opened in East Berlin and will be on view at the Polish Center there until the end of this month, it was reported here today from Warsaw.

Sponsors of the exhibit included the Jewish community of East Berlin, Chief Rabbi Riesenburger attended the opening ceremony. Others who were present included Dr. Witkowski, the Vice-Premier of the East German Republic, Dr. Wendel, the Foreign Minister and leaders of the East German Communist Party.

The 20th anniversary of the Warsaw Ghetto Revolt also was commemorated at a mass meeting in Prague. Dr. A. Ehrmann, chairman of the Jewish community of Prague, was one of the speakers.

BENNO MOISEWITSCH, WORLD-FAMOUS JEWISH PIANIST, DIES IN LONDON; WAS 73

LONDON, April 10. (JTA) -- Benno Moisewitsch, world-famous Russian-born Jewish pianist, died here last night at the age of 73. Born in Odessa, he attended the Imperial School of Music there and won the Anton Rubinstein Prize at the age of nine. He made his debut in England when he was 18, and in the United States in 1919. He made England his home, and became a British subject.
