ISRAEL MAINTAINS BLACKOUT ON SECURITY DECISIONS; KEEPS EYE ON JORDAN

JERUSALEM, April 28, (JTA) -- A complete blackout was maintained today on the results of the deliberations of the Cabinet meeting during which a possible pro-Nasser revolution in Jordan affecting Israel's security was discussed.

The blackout was seen as prompted by the consideration not to disclose details of whatever decisions might have been reached both in the field of security preparedness and diplomatic action. It was noted here that while Premier David Ben-Gurion's oft-repeated statement that Israel would not remain idle if the status quo in neighboring Jordan was radically altered still held good, recent developments had made the exact definition of the meaning of a change in the status quo more complicated.

The view seemed to be that although King Hussein of Jordan had managed to so far control the drive of Nasser elements against his throne and that this had brought some relaxation of tension, Cairo's stepped-up anti-Jordan radio campaign spreading false reports about demonstrations in Jordan and openly citing to revolt were considered a grave omen.

The announcement by the Dutch Foreign Ministry that the Dutch Government had "promised to support Israel in the event of an attack by the Arab nations" was viewed as the first of that kind which might be expected from a number of European countries. However, the key to the danger was viewed as being in Washington.

It is understood that Washington stressed in talks with Israel, Egypt and Jordan that the United States remains firmly in support of King Hussein. However, Israel would like to see the United States come out with a more firm and public statement aimed at making it clear as possible the United States attitude and its support of Hussein, accompanied by a stern warning to President Nasser of Egypt to leave no room for any "miscalculation" on his part.

U.S. Watches Developments in Jordan with Special Interest

WASHINGTON, April 28, (JTA) -- Acting Secretary of State George W. Ball this weekend called in Israel Ambassador Avraham Harman for what was described as an opportunity to express condolences on the death of President Ben-Zvi, but which actually involved a discussion of regional developments including events in Jordan.

The Washington Post today reported that the question of how Israel would react if King Hussein's Government in Jordan is seriously endangered is a matter of prime interest to the United States. The newspaper said "the uncertain situation in Jordan was being watched with special attention by the White House and the State Department" this weekend. Specialists on the area engaged in a series of conferences.

The United States Government is "deeply concerned" over missile development in the Middle East, the State Department said yesterday, adding that the Department was "watching the situation" and discussing the problem "with the parties concerned." The statement was made by Frederick G. Dutton, Assistant Secretary of State, in a letter to Rep. Samuel Stratton, New York Democrat.

Rep. Stratton sent telegrams to the State and Defense Departments, protesting the work of West German scientists on advanced weapons development in Egypt. He asked both departments to "suggest possible American courses of action to prevent these developments." Mr. Dutton also told the Congressman that the State Department did not feel that the United Arab Republic program of producing jet aircraft would necessarily affect the security of the Middle East.

ISRAEL STARTS INDEPENDENCE DAY CELEBRATION; BEN-GURION WARNS NATION

TEL AVIV, April 28, (JTA) -- Calling upon the nation to "show no fear" but to indulge in "no calm," Prime Minister David Ben-Gurion warned here tonight, in a national radio broadcast on the eve of Israel's celebration of its 15th anniversary, that "the utmost alertness must be maintained." He said that the current situation in the Middle East calls for utmost national unity, without needless panic--but also without complacency or inaction.

The theme was emphasized also in an Independence Day statement by Gen. Zvi Tsur, Chief of Staff of Israel's defense forces. "We are convinced," said Gen. Tsur, "that the

Israel army can now overpower any possible enemy. But it is possible that while the military strength of our enemies will increase, one or more of the Arab countries may believe they are stronger than Israel and start a war against Israel."

Huge Crowds to Watch Military Parade Today in Haifa

Hundreds of thousands of people are expected to watch Israel's official Independence Day military parade tomorrow to be held in Haifa. The official celebration of Israel's 15th anniversary--muted with mourning for the late President Izhak Ben-Zvi, who died last Tuesday--got under way at sundown today when torches were lighted here atop Mount Herzl.

Due to the continuance of the traditional seven-day mourning period honoring the memory of Mr. Ben-Zvi, all entertainment programs previously scheduled as part of the Independence Day celebration were canceled. Rabbi Shlomo Goren, chief chaplain of Israel's army, who had just been promoted from the rank of colonel to brigadier general, ruled today that brass bands will be permitted to play during the military parade in Haifa tomorrow, but not near the saluting stand, where the flags will fly at half-mast and the army colors will be draped in black in mourning for Mr. Ben-Zvi.

Taking the salute for the military parade will be Acting President Kadish Luz; Prime Minister Ben-Gurion; and Gen. Zvi Tsur, the army's Chief of Staff. Among those invited to the saluting stand are Dr. Nahum Goldmann, president of the World Zionist Organization, and Dr. Vera Weizmann, widow of the late first President of Israel, Dr. Chaim Weizmann.

Memorial Day Observed for Heroes Fallen in War of Liberation

Today, as usual on the day preceding Independence Day, Israel observed Memorial Day for its dead who gave their lives in the War of Liberation. Torches honoring the dead were lighted throughout the country last night. At 10 o'clock this morning, wailing sirens sounded, initiating a two-minute period of silence, during which all work and traffic halted throughout the country.

Official Remembrance Day rites were held on Mount Herzl. Veterans of Haganah, the pre-State Jewish defense force of Palestine, paraded here, the salute being taken by Minister of Justice Dov Joseph and Jerusalem Mayor Mordechai Ish-Shalom. At that very moment, candles were lighted at all military cemeteries and in synagogues throughout the country, where memorial services were conducted.

Actually, some of the formalities connected with the Independence Day celebration opened on Friday. Michael Bodrov, Soviet Ambassador here and dean of the diplomatic corps, visited Acting President Kadish Luz and, on behalf of all the diplomats as well as for his Government, felicitated the temporary Chief of State and the people of Israel on the State's 15th birthday. At the same time, Ambassador Bodrov extended the condolences of the diplomatic corps on the passing of Mr. Ben-Zvi.

A diplomatic reception in celebration of Independence Day was held in the Knesset, Israel's Parliament. But here too the celebration was coupled with mourning, and the usual orchestral participation was omitted. Mr. Luz thanked the diplomats corps formally and concluded the ceremonies with toasts. Later, Mr. Luz received the new ambassadors from Costa Rica and the Central African Republic, who presented their letters of credence.

Ben-Gurion Says Egypt, Not Jordan, Is Danger for Israel

In an article in Maarachot, the Israeli army's professional journal, Prime Minister Ben-Gurion spelled out today the security situation precisely. He declared that "danger to Israel will come from the South, not from the North or East." Thus he had warned that the real threat to Israel could come from Egypt, rather than from Syria or Jordan. "Israel," he stated, "is facing more trials--these will be even harder than the trials we faced during the Sinai campaign in 1956."

In his Independence Day broadcast tonight, over Kol Israel, the government's radio network, the Prime Minister assured the country: "Israel's defense forces are ready and alert to repel any attack or aggression and we must all maintain the same alertness."

Reviewing the State's achievements since its rebirth in 1948, the Prime Minister said: "As a people attacked by its neighbors in the very day of the State's rebirth, Israel is entitled to view with no little satisfaction the ground we have covered in the brief period since Statehood was proclaimed. Under conditions of beleaguering along all of our borders, and under constant threat of destruction, we have brought into our land more than 1,000,000 immigrants, built more than 550 urban and rural settlements, tripled our population, increased industrial output sevenfold and exports tenfold.

On the negative side of the ledger, the Prime Minister listed: An adverse balance of trade; the need for greater productivity; and the disturbing educational gap between children of European origin and those from Asian or African origin."

KENNEDY CABLES 'HEARTIEST CONGRATULATIONS' TO ISRAEL ON 15TH ANNIVERSARY

WASHINGTON, April 28. (JTA) -- President Kennedy today sent a message of congratulations to Israel on its 15th anniversary. The message, addressed to Kadish Luz, Acting President of Israel, reads:

"The people of the United States of America join me in extending to Your Excellency and to the people of Israel best wishes and heartiest congratulations on the 15th anniversary of the Independence of Israel.

"Like millions of Americans from every walk of life, I am saddened that our congratulations must be accompanied by profound regret over the death of Izhak Ben-Zvi, President of Israel for more than 10 of the 15 years marked by this anniversary. President Ben-Zvi left his imprint on a vital and fruitful era of Israel's history. His wisdom and patience, his gentle but sure leadership were evident in every aspect of the nation's life.

"It is a privilege for me at this time to pay our Nation's tribute to Israel's splendid growth and achievement during the past 15 years. New frontiers have been explored, a haven and a new way of life have been provided for countless thousands, and new and promising paths have been charted for the nation. We look forward with you to future proud horizons."

15TH ANNIVERSARY OF ISRAEL'S INDEPENDENCE CELEBRATED IN NEW YORK

NEW YORK, April 28. (JTA) -- Warning that the current tensions in the Middle East constitute "a threat to the peace of the world," Dr. Abba Hillel Silver called on the Washington Administration tonight to make "a clear-cut statement regarding Israel's security.

Dr. Silver was the principal speaker at the 15th anniversary observance of Israel's independence at an event in Philharmonic Hall, at New York's new Lincoln Center for the Performing Arts. The event mixed sorrow with celebration, since part of the program was devoted to a memorial service honoring the late President Izhak Ben-Zvi of Israel.

Conducted under the auspices of the American Zionist Council, coordinating body of all Zionist organizations in this country, the assembly was greeted by messages from Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller and Mayor Robert F. Wagner. Rabbi Irving Miller, chairman of the American Zionist Council, presented to Dr. Silver the organization's annual Louis D. Brandeis Award in recognition of his "historic services to the Zionist ideal and to the rebirth of Israel."

Having recently returned from Israel, Dr. Silver told the capacity audience crowding the auditorium that, while he found Israel prosperous and its people "busily at work building their homeland," one of the problems that disturbed them most deeply was their national security. Two events that disturbed the Israelis particularly, he said, were the discovery that Egypt is employing many German scientists to build jet fighters and to develop missiles, and "the latest attempt by Egyptian President Gamal Abdel Nasser to unite the Arab world, with hatred of Israel as the cement for achieving their unity."

Dr. Silver Urges U.S. to Rebuke Arabs for Threatening Israel

He took strong issue with a statement recently made by W. Averell Harriman, Under Secretary of State, in which the latter expressed his opinion that removal of German rocket scientists from Egypt might cause their replacement "by Soviet bloc personnel, equally qualified on such work, again forcing the United Arab Republic into greater reliance on the USSR." Declaring that he found it difficult to follow Mr. Harriman's reasoning, Dr. Silver stated:

"We wonder whether this is all the wisdom and statesmanship our State Department can bring to bear upon the very perilous situation which is fast developing in the Middle East. Does not the situation call for a clear-cut statement on the part of our Government, regarding its deep concern for the continued security of Israel? Should not a word of rebuke be spoken to the Arab governments who are so shamelessly threatening to destroy a peaceful and sovereign state?"

The New York anniversary observance ushered in similar functions in many other major American communities throughout the country under the auspices of the American Zionist Council. Dr. Miriam K. Freund, former president of Hadassah, and Rabbi I. Usher Kirshblum, a national vice-president of the Zionist Organization of America, served as co-chairmen of tonight's event. Samuel H. Daroff, of Philadelphia, is national chairman for the anniversary celebrations.

The observance here was highlighted by a musical program with the participation of members of the New York Philharmonic Orchestra, under the baton of Elyakim Shapira, of Israel. Two Israeli artists, Erick Friedman and Netania Davrath, were soloists.

Israel's Anniversary to be Celebrated Today at City Hall

Ceremonies marking the celebration of Israel's anniversary will be held tomorrow in City Hall Plaza with Mayor Robert F. Wagner as one of the major participants. The Mayor will address the open-air rally, along with Katriel Katz, Israel's Consul General here. The

city's fire department will stage a ceremony of massing of the colors, while a city band will play and choral and dance groups will stage special performances.

Gov. Nelson H. Rockefeller, in a formal greeting acclaiming Israel, said that "there are many practical reasons, as well as those of sentiment, for acclaiming this milestone in the history of a State which has proved itself a staunch ally, its institutions and way of life firmly rooted in libertarian principles."

Leaders of major American Jewish organizations issued statements today hailing Israel's anniversary. Joseph Meyerhoff, general chairman of the United Jewish Appeal, declared that "this notable anniversary is a time for all of us to renew our dedication and support to one of history's most inspiring efforts to save and rebuild humankind. He warned that "Israel's period of hardship and struggle is not over."

Various organizations, meanwhile, today continued to send messages of condolence over the death of President Izhak Ben-Zvi to Israeli Premier David Ben-Gurion. Samuel H. Daroff, president of the American Jewish League for Israel, declared in a cable to Mr. Ben-Gurion: "We join with all the Jewish world in mourning the loss of Israel's President Izhak Ben-Zvi, whose modesty and scholarship endeared him to his people and earned the admiration of all who knew him. His loss will long be felt."

JEWISH CONGRESS CRITICIZES STATE DEPARTMENT'S MIDDLE EAST POLICY

NEW YORK, April 28. (JTA) -- The American Jewish Congress today criticized as "shortsighted and counterproductive" present American policy in the Middle East, which, it charged, was based on the premise that "the United States must purchase Arab support, almost unconditionally, as the only means of immunizing that area from Soviet influence."

In a resolution adopted by its Governing Council, the AJCongress called for a change in the "complicit disposition" of the State Department to "the undisguised campaign of territorial and political aggrandizement by President Nasser's United Arab Republic."

"The UAR's program of aggression and expansion has been encouraged by the silence and passivity especially of those governments, including our own, that have a clear national interest in preserving the peace of the region," the resolution said, adding: "If hostilities do break out, responsibility will rest with those who either foment or condone the kind of provocation that will make such hostilities inescapable."

Senator Keating Calls for Middle East Pilot Arms Control Parley

KLAMESHA LAKE, N. Y., April 28. (JTA) -- Senator Kenneth B. Keating (R. N. Y.) today urged the U. S. to exert leadership in having the United Nations arrange a "regional arms compact" between Israel and the Arab States to ease the "real crisis in the Middle East." He said he thought there was a "fighting chance" for a Middle East arms agreement constituting a "breakthrough on a limited scale which could serve as a model for a world-wide understanding to save all mankind from the inferno of a nuclear conflict."

In an address delivered before the 34th annual convention of National Federation of Jewish Men's Clubs at the Concord Hotel, Sen. Keating called upon U. S. officials to "get tough" and "act to pull the fuse out of the Middle East powder-keg." He said Congress may deny foreign aid to Egypt's President Nasser if he does not stop using our assistance to divert funds to develop an offensive missile capacity.

The Senator also decried the lack within our government of "real feeling about the plight of Israel--and of America's commitment to the preservation of a free and secure Israel." He said a "strong and clear reaffirmation" by the President of America's dedication to Israel would "command proper respect in the Arab world."

More than 1,000 delegates from the United States, Canada and Puerto Rico are attending the four-day NFJMC conclave. The Federation is comprised of 331 men's clubs and brotherhoods with a total membership of 70,000 congregants in Conservative synagogues in the three countries.

GEN. DORI ADDRESSES TECHNION PARLEY IN CHICAGO ON ISRAEL'S SECURITY

CHICAGO, April 28. (JTA) -- Israel's security problem has not changed in the past 15 years, General Yaacov Dori, president of the Technion, Israel Institute of Technology, told the National Planning Conference of American Technion Society attended by 200 delegates from all parts of the United States. General Dori, who lead Haganah and served as Israel's first Chief of Staff, emphasized that "We still face the threat of being annihilated by our neighbors."

"We are not panicking but it is essential for everyone in Israel and abroad to understand the seriousness of the situation," he stressed. "If we want Israel to survive we must fight our battle of survival everyday. We cannot, under any circumstances afford to be complacent."

Three major problems confront Israel today, he reported. These are: security, an abnormal economy and the cultural gap between Israel's Afro-Asian and European communities. The security situation is serious not because of events of the past weeks, he said, but because of a lack of understanding of seriousness of this problem. "We must sacrifice and mobilize all our spiritual resources and if we do everything that must be done then we will be able to face up to any contingency," he stated.

CHILEAN COURT BARS EXTRADITION OF NAZI WHO KILLED 97,000 JEWS

SANTIAGO, April 28. (JTA) -- Former SS officer Walter Rauff was a free man today after the Chilean Supreme Court rejected a request from West Germany for his extradition to face charges of complicity in the wartime slaughter of 97,000 Jews.

The full Supreme Court held that despite the charges against Rauff, who was arrested here last December and has been under detention since, the Chilean statute of limitations barred court action against him. The Chilean statute of limitations is 15 years. That of West Germany is 20 years. The ruling meant that Rauff was free to remain in Chile.

In its 10-page decision, which overturned a ruling both by a lower court and by a single Supreme Court Justice, the high court held that mass slaughter of human beings for racial reasons was a perfidious crime meriting the loathing of the civilized world but that a court of justice had the duty to accept the statute of limitations, and to support the principles of international justice.

BRITISH NAZI LEADER REFUSED PERMISSION TO HOLD RALLY IN LONDON

LONDON, April 28. (JTA) -- Colin Jordan, leader of the British National Socialist movement, has been refused permission to hold another rally in Trafalgar Square on May 19, a Government spokesman said today.

"It was decided that in view of the likelihood of serious disorders occurring at any such meeting, it would not be in the interests of the public to allow the meeting to take place," the spokesman said.

Jordan will complete on May 7 a nine-month prison term imposed for breach of the public order act, partly arising from his arrest for his leading a violently anti-Semitic rally in the same square last July.

FRENCH COURT OF APPEALS ACQUITS ANTI-SEMITIC; RULING PROVOKES PROTEST

PARIS, April 28. (JTA) -- The Court of Appeals at Limoges this weekend reversed a lower court ruling, finding a not guilty verdict and ordering the acquittal of Pierre Poujade, editor of the periodical "French Fraternity." He had previously been convicted by the lower court at Limoges of "virulent anti-Semitism" and of libel, due to some articles printed in his publication.

Protesting the acquittal, the attorney for the Movement Against Racism and anti-Semitism and for Peace told the court that some of Poujade's words "were similar to the worst anti-Semitic utterances of the Nazis." The attorney gave notice that he will appeal the appellate court's ruling to the highest tribunal in France, the Court of Cassation.

PRESIDENT KENNEDY DECLINES TO SEND GREETINGS TO COUNCIL FOR JUDAISM

WASHINGTON, April 28. (JTA) -- President John F. Kennedy has declined to send a customary annual greeting to a conference of the American Council for Judaism to be held in New York City on May 4 and 5, it was learned today.

Council leaders had sought to solicit a message of greeting from President Kennedy prior to their anti-Zionist meeting in an attempt to add stature to the occasion. But White House authorities reviewed recent extremist activities of the Council, viewed as harmful to Israel-American relations, and also noted recent charges by the Jewish War Veterans of the U. S. A. that the anti-Zionist group sought to "whitewash" Soviet anti-Semitism. The White House then decided to abstain from sending a message to the conference.

URUGUAYAN NATIONAL COUNCIL AND PARLIAMENT PAY TRIBUTE TO BEN-ZVI

MONTEVIDEO, Uruguay, April 28. (JTA) -- The National Governing Council, under the chairmanship of President Daniel Fernandez Crespo, paid formal tribute to the memory of Israel's late President Izhak Ben-Zvi, as official and non-official Uruguayans, non-Jewish and Jewish, joined in paying honor to the memory of Israel's deceased Chief of State. Mr. Crespo, who eulogized Mr. Ben-Zvi, noted that he had met Israel's late President personally.

Official tributes were also paid to Mr. Ben-Zvi's memory in the Senate and in the Chamber of Deputies. All of the leading newspapers here featured articles expressing their condolences and emphasizing Mr. Ben-Zvi's statesmanship and scholarship. The biggest of the memorial services, from the viewpoint of attendance, was held at Penarol Stadium here, where 8,000 persons gathered to pay homage to Mr. Ben-Zvi's memory.

Religious services commemorating Mr. Ben-Zvi are scheduled to be held Tuesday, at the end of the traditional seven days of mourning. Government representatives are scheduled to attend these rites, to be held in the Main Synagogue here.

JEVISH LEADERS RECEIVED BY ROMAN CATHOLIC DIGNITARIES IN VENEZUELA

CARACAS, Venezuela, April 28. (JTA) -- Marc Turkow, the secretary of the South American executive of the World Jewish Congress, accompanied by leaders of the Venezuelan Jewish community and members of the B'nai B'rith, were received in special audience by Cardinal Quintero and Monsignor Henriquez. The Cardinal expressed his sympathy with the terms of the memorandum submitted by the World Conference of Jewish Organizations to the Vatican, and condemned racial hatred as being anti-Christian.

CLEVELAND JEWISH WELFARE FUND GETS \$3,733,224 AT OPENING OF 1963 DRIVE

CLEVELAND, April 28. (JTA) -- Pledges totaling \$3,733,224 for 62 percent of its record-high goal of \$6,036,000 were reported at the official opening meeting last night of the Jewish Welfare Fund Appeal. Rabbi Arthur J. Lelyveld, general chairman of the campaign, presided at the kick-off event.

United Jewish Appeal medals and scrolls were presented to a group on the occasion of the national fund-raising organization's 25th anniversary. Forty-two men and women were presented silver Kiddush cups in recognition of 25 or more years of service to the Cleveland Jewish Welfare Fund Appeal, and 21 women, current and former chairmen of the Women's Division, received similar gifts.

M.E. Glass is president, and Henry L. Zucker, executive director, of The Jewish Community Federation, sponsor of the annual appeal, of which Gerald S. Soroker is campaign director. The Cleveland campaign closes on the evening of May 16.

TORONTO JEWISH WOMAN LEAVES \$1,540,675 TO NINE JEWISH INSTITUTIONS

TORONTO, April 28. (JTA) -- A probate of the will of Mrs. Annie Robinson of Toronto, who died last January, disclosed an estate of \$1,540,675 to be distributed among nine Jewish religious, educational and charitable institutions.

The beneficiaries are the Associated Hebrew Schools of Toronto, Etz Chaim Schools, Ner Israel Yeshiva College of Toronto, new Mount Sinai Hospital, Jewish Home for the Aged, Yeshiva Hadarom Rechovet in Israel, Shomrei Shabbat Synagogue, United Jewish Welfare Fund of Toronto and Youth Aliyah.

The will provided that the income from the estate is to be distributed to the institutions for ten years at which time they will share equally in the estate. Mrs. Robinson was the widow of the late Elias Robinson, who was born here about 90 years ago. Her father was Abraham Franklin, a jeweler, who died in 1905.

JESUIT ORGAN BACKS EXEMPTION FOR ORTHODOX JEWS FROM SUNDAY LAW

NEW YORK, April 28. (JTA) -- America, the national Roman Catholic weekly, has come out strongly in its current issue in support of a Fair Sabbath law for New York City. The stand was considered a major break in the previously unyielding Catholic opposition to any changes in Sunday closing laws.

The editorial was apparently evoked by the action of the New York Legislature approving authorization for New York City to enact such a law between September 1 and December 31 of this year. A spokesman for the Jesuit periodical said this appeared to be the first time that the magazine had explicitly endorsed passage of a municipal Fair Sabbath law.

"The people who stand to benefit most from the Sabbatarian exemptions are mostly Orthodox Jews who religiously observe Saturday as their day of rest," the America editorial said. "To allow them to open shop on Sunday will not seriously impede the Sunday closing law's purpose of keeping one day a week free of business occupations and will relieve conscientious Jews of what they regard as an inequality."

ROSENBERG PAINTINGS TO AID ESTABLISHMENT OF HEXTER CHAIR AT BRANDEIS

NEW YORK, April 28. (JTA) -- An exhibition of 50 recent paintings by James N. Rosenberg, noted American Jewish leader and lawyer whose paintings can be found in the leading art museums in the United States and in numerous American embassies in various countries, opened here today to aid the establishment of the Maurice B. Hexter Chair in American Philanthropy at Brandeis University. The paintings are offered by Mr. Rosenberg as gifts to friends and supporters of the establishment of this Chair.

On the occasion of the exhibition, Dr. A. L. Sachar, president of Brandeis University, revealed that Mr. Rosenberg was responsible for teaming up the Harvard Law School with Brandeis in a project that helped to codify a legal system for the State of Israel. Dr. Sachar emphasized that Mr. Rosenberg has made many important art gifts to university collections. "I have known few men who have balanced so ably and so amiably the claims of community service and of the inner life," Dr. Sachar stated.

HARVARD LAW SCHOOL TO HONOR FRANKFURTER; WILL ESTABLISH PROFESSORSHIP

CAMBRIDGE, Mass., April 28. (JTA) -- Plans for the establishment of a Harvard Law School professorship in honor of former Supreme Court Justice Felix Frankfurter were announced here yesterday at the annual meeting of the Council of the Harvard Law School Association.

John O'Melveny, of Los Angeles, a former student here under Mr. Frankfurter, when the latter taught at the Law School, was named chairman of a committee to raise \$400,000 for the professorship. Justice Frankfurter retired from the Supreme Court last August, after serving on the high tribunal since 1939. From 1914 to 1939, Justice Frankfurter taught at Harvard Law School.
