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ISRAEL CABINET WANTS JOINT AMERICAN-RUSSIAN GUARANTEE OF BORDERS

JERUSALEM, May 5. (JTA) -- The Israel Cabinet discussed today the security position of the country for the third consecutive meeting. It dealt primarily with the possibilities in Jordan and the implications of the new tripartite United Arab Republic composed of Egypt, Syria and Iraq.

As a result of today's meeting, Prime Minister David Ben-Gurion will address the Knesset, Israel's Parliament, tomorrow and suggest that the United States and the Soviet Union join in a mutual guarantee of Israel's borders as the best way to assure stability in the Middle East. He will also propose that the Big Powers require Egypt to formally recognize Israel, if the Cairo Government is to receive further aid.

A Cabinet spokesman revealed that it was decided to form a Ministerial body to survey the adequacy of Israel's civil defense set-up, including air raid shelters and the need for their expansion in view of the developments in the neighboring Arab countries.

Ben-Gurion Outlines Views on Guaranteeing Israel's Borders

JERUSALEM, May 5. (JTA) -- Prime Minister David Ben-Gurion today proposed that the United States and the Soviet Union should jointly guarantee Israel's territorial integrity. In an exclusive interview with CBS news producer Don Kellerman--for broadcast Wednesday over WCBS-TV, New York--Mr. Ben-Gurion said there can be no stability in the Middle East as long as President Nasser of Egypt maintains a state of war with Israel in violation of the United Nations Charter.

He said the United States and Russia could best assure peace by issuing a joint warning to Nasser that, unless he agrees to recognize the existence of Israel and to negotiate a peace with her in keeping with the UN Charter, they will cut off all aid to him, military and financial.

As an alternative to this joint U. S. -USSR action, the Israel Premier offered the suggestion that the United States act on its own to guarantee Israel's territorial integrity--joining Israel in a bilateral treaty--declaring that an attack on one is an attack on the other.

U. S. IS COMMITTED TO ISRAEL'S INTEGRITY, KENNEDY'S AIDE ASSURES

WASHINGTON, May 5. (JTA) -- Myer Feldman, Deputy Special Counsel to President Kennedy today told a conference of the American Israel Public Affairs Committee that the United States was committed to the integrity of Israel and did not intend "to sit on the sidelines if there is any threat."

Mr. Feldman cited the American supply of Hawk anti-aircraft missiles to Israel and said the United States had made clear that it is opposed to any arms race in the Near East. Mr. Feldman spoke also of large scale development loans to Israel and other measures to insure her prosperity. He said that Israel's friends must be persistent advocates of peace, that the United States counted Israel as a member of "the family of freedom," and said that a world which allowed Israel to fail could not survive.

The AIPAC issued an appeal to the President and the Congress for new measures including a security guarantee committing the United States to deter aggression, the grant of arms to Israel, administration of the U. S. aid program to ensure that none of the American aid to Egypt is diverted to finance preparations for aggression, that our aid program must not assist belligerent countries which threaten neighbors, and other measures.

The conference called attention to recent developments including the new United Arab Republic threat to Israel, continued Egyptian acquisition of Soviet arms, German rocket scientists helping Nasser, and Western governments providing unconditional economic assistance to Egypt despite her war preparations.

Israel Ambassador Avraham Harman told the conference that the Arabs could choose now they wished to unite but that the elimination of Israel was "an unrealistic goal." He said that Israel would not be another "Warsaw Ghetto." He expressed hope that the world would continue urging settlement of Near Eastern disputes through peaceful negotiations. He said Israel's defense policy aimed not to win a war but to deter conflict and avoid miscalculation by enemies.

WASHINGTON ADMINISTRATION OPPOSES CUTTING OFF U. S. AID FROM EGYPT

WASHINGTON, May 5. (JTA) -- William S. Gaud, Assistant Administrator of the U. S. Agency for International Development, in the Near East bureau, indicated today in a CBS-TV interview that the State Department opposes an amendment, introduced in Congress by Rep. Seymour Halpern, New York Republican, to sever aid to Egypt.

The Halpern amendment would terminate aid because of Egypt's diversion of its own funds for a military build-up, including acquisition of Soviet arms and use of German missile technicians.

Mr. Gaud defended aid to Egypt, stating that Israel has received an average of \$410 per capita in American aid while Egypt has only received an average of \$26 per capita. He said also that Israel had gotten \$900,000,000 from the United States since the beginning of the aid program, and Egypt had only received \$600,000,000.

He said assistance to Egypt kept her from being totally dependent on the Soviet bloc, enabled America to maintain friendly relations with Egypt, and encouraged Nasser's concentration of the last few years on peaceful development. He said that cutting off aid to Egypt would throw the country into the hands of the Communists.

SEN. JAVITS TO ASK FOR MUTUAL DEFENSE TREATY FOR MIDDLE EAST

NEW YORK, May 5. (JTA) -- Senator Jacob K. Javits announced today that he will introduce into the Senate a resolution calling on the United States Government to initiate negotiations for a mutual defense treaty in the Middle East with the United Kingdom, France, Israel and any Middle East state including the Arab states which would be willing to hold the borders of its neighbors inviolate.

In an address at the annual national dinner of the Union of Orthodox Jewish Congregations of America here, the New York Senator warned of "a mounting war threat in the Middle East" arising from the "declared intentions" of the United Arab Republic "to liquidate Israel and to push the Israelis into the sea."

The resolution, Sen. Javits said, would also express the sense of Congress that the United States "re-state at the very least, the declaration about the inviolability of borders in the Middle East made in 1950 between the United Kingdom, France and the United States." He said the resolution, which will be introduced next week, will consolidate the ideas expressed during the past week in the Senate in the debate on the Middle East situation.

Noting that Egypt's President Nasser received U. S. aid last year totaling an estimated \$250,000,000, Sen. Javits stated: "We must determine whether we want to let Nasser continue his state of war with Israel. He is interfering in every state in the Middle East; in Saudi Arabia and Jordan where the government is under attack through riots said to be fomented on a pro-Nasser basis and in Yemen where he has just had his troops. In addition, he is acquiring large amounts of arms from the Soviet Union and other Communist sources, creating a very dangerous arms race in that area of the world."

ALGERIAN PREMIER CALLS FOR ARAB UNITY; SAYS ISRAEL IS 'COMMON ENEMY'

LONDON, May 5. (JTA) -- In the face of the continued Syrian purge of pro-Nasser elements from the army and civil service, just a few weeks after Syria agreed to join Egypt and Iraq in a new tripartite United Arab Republic, Ahmed Ben Bella, Prime Minister of Algeria, appealed to Syria and Iraq this weekend to stay united with Egypt.

"Beware of Israel, our common enemy," the Algerian Prime Minister said in a statement in Algiers. He was greeting Egypt's President Gamal Abdel Nasser, who came on a four-day state visit to Algeria. The Algerian Prime Minister also said in his speech that he hoped that his country would enter the new United Arab Republic.

(In Washington, the endorsement by the Algerian Premier of the new Arab Federation was interpreted as a general statement of sentiment rather than commitment to join the union as full member.)

U. N. REPRESENTATIVE FLIES TO JORDAN TO STUDY ACTION THERE

LONDON, May 5. (JTA) -- Britain and the United States have asked U Thant, Secretary General of the United Nations, to strengthen the United Nations diplomatic "presence" in Jordan to deal with "the threatening Middle East crisis," the Sunday Observer here reported today. According to the newspaper, John Spinelli, head of the European office of the UN, will fly Wednesday from his headquarters in Geneva to Amman, to deal with the situation. Officially, Mr. Spinelli is the UN official who embodies the United Nations "presence" in Jordan.

(In Washington, officials denied that Egypt had been "warned" against intervening in Jordan. They said the State Department sought the assessment and views of both Israel and Egypt on intentions in connection with Jordan. The U. S. Sixth Fleet alert and the ready status of some British forces in the Eastern Mediterranean was not necessarily directed against Egypt but pertained to the defense of Jordan against outside aggression from any quarter, the officials indicated.)

ANTI-SEMITIC GROUP BANNED IN ARGENTINA; LEADER ARRESTED; JEWS GRATIFIED

BUENOS AIRES, May 5. (JTA) -- Argentine Jewish leaders expressed gratification today over the action of the Argentine Government this weekend in banning Tacuara and another extremist group but cautioned that the real test would be on how vigorously the orders were implemented.

The Tacuara, an extreme right-wing youth group with a long record of anti-Semitic expressions and assaults on Jews, and the Guardia Tesrauradora Nacionalista (GRN) were ordered suppressed in a decree signed Friday by President Jose Maria Guido and Interior Minister General Enriaue Rauch.

"It is the purpose and fundamental duty of governments to insure public tranquility, internal peace, respect for the human person and the essential rights of all," the order stated. "Considering that the Tacuara and GRN activities consist of personal aggression and acts of violence and that it is inconceivable that in an organized society there should be attacks against the ideological, political or religious pluralism which constitute the basis of the democratic structure, it is ordered that any activity of both groups is prohibited, their headquarters and centers closed down."

Jewish sources said the decree was a "good measure" by the Government which satisfied a strong feeling of public opinion that everything would depend on the vigor of enforcement. They said it was likely that the two groups would go underground in response to the ban. Alberto Ezcurra Uriburu, chief of the Tacuara, was arrested well before the ban was published and is now under Government detention. Simultaneously, 14 Tacuara members were arrested in Tres Arroyos on charges of painting swastikas and anti-Semitic slogans in the city. Various firearms were found in possession of the members.

The influential La Prensa reported today that a meeting had been held between Gen. Juan Carlos Ongania, commander-in-chief of the Argentine Army, and Cardinal Antonio Caggiano, Archbishop of Buenos Aires. La Prensa said that the General called the attention of the Cardinal to the ultra-nationalist propaganda disseminated through the Catholic hierarchy by groups interested in "climbing to power." The General reportedly told the prelate that such action was not conducive to internal peace.

NEGRO ANTI-SEMITISM DEPLORED; JEWISH EFFORTS FOR NEGRO EQUALITY CITED

NEW YORK, May 5. (JTA) -- Whatever anti-Semitic quotient exists in the new Negro militancy is "tragically misguided" because American Jews and their organizations have played a major role in helping to bring about the progress the United States has made toward "equal opportunity for all," Dore Schary, national chairman of the Anti-Defamation League of B'nai B'rith, told a meeting of the League's national executive committee held here today.

He said that the American Jewish community, particularly since the Hitler holocaust, has thrown "much of its energy and ideological strength into the fight for democracy for all as the one assurance of security for itself." He cited organized Jewish efforts in support of "the spread of human relations councils after World War II, education for FEPC and other types of civil rights legislation, and in the development of intercultural and human relations education nationally" as factors that have brought the Negro to his improved status today.

SEN. FULBRIGHT ADDRESSES COUNCIL FOR JUDAISM, BUT NOT ON ISRAEL

NEW YORK, May 5. (JTA) -- The American Council for Judaism concluded its annual conference here last night with the usual speeches against Israel and Zionism. However, Senator J.W. Fulbright, who was the featured guest speaker, abstained from making any reference to Zionism, Israel or the Middle East. The Arkansas Democrat and chairman of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee spoke primarily against the race between the United States and the Soviet Union to land on the moon.

Sharp criticism against the Council was voiced yesterday by leading New York rabbis from their pulpits. Dr. William Berkowitz, in his sermon at the B'nai Jeshurun Congregation, said that "the American Council for Judaism" is neither Council, neither Judaism, neither American." He charged the Council with ignoring the pluralism of the American way of life. Dr. William F. Rosenblum, of Temple Israel, proposed to ignore the Council by giving it the "silent treatment." Dr. Judah Nadich, at the Park Avenue Synagogue, said that the Council is false both to its religion and to America.

RICHARD RODGERS, U.S. COMPOSER, PRESENTS \$200,000 TO HEBREW UNIVERSITY

JERUSALEM, May 5. (JTA) -- The Hebrew University was today presented with a check for \$200,000 by American composer Richard Rodgers on behalf of an American committee set up to finance a wing in the university's department of experimental medicine and cancer research. The wing is to be named after Mr. Rodgers and the late Oscar Hammerstein, II.

CORNERSTONE FOR NEW \$35,000,000 BUILDINGS LAID AT EINSTEIN COLLEGE

NEW YORK, May 5. (JTA) -- Cornerstone ceremonies for a new Research Center and new College Hospital were held today at the Albert Einstein College of Medicine of Yeshiva University. The two buildings, the Ullmann Research Center for the Health Sciences, and the Einstein College Hospital, will be completed at a cost of \$35,000,000 on the college campus.

The new Research Center will house several major research institutes. This 12-story tower of research will include institutes of genetics, biophysics, molecular biology, cell biology, and blood and cancer research. There will also be special sections devoted to research in cardiology, environmental medicine, obstetrics and gynecology, rheumatology and metabolic diseases. The Center is scheduled to open in the Fall of this year.

JEWISH PHILANTHROPIST GIVES \$1,000,000 GIFT TO NEW YORK UNIVERSITY

NEW YORK, May 5. (JTA) -- A gift of \$1,000,000 was made to New York University by Joe Weinstein, noted Jewish philanthropist. The money will be used to build student residences at the university's Washington Square Center in lower Manhattan.

James N. Hester, University president, said the new residence halls, a pair of nine-story buildings, would be named the "Joe Weinstein Residence Halls." The buildings, one for men and one for women, will provide housing for 575 students. Dr. Hester said the residences would help to reduce a housing shortage. There are more than 1,500 foreign students at the center. The halls will be completed this fall.

EL AL REPORTS SUCCESS OF ITS NEW GROUP FARE; ENDORSED BY A. S. T. A.

NEW YORK, May 5. (JTA) -- El Al Israel Airlines reported today that, following the controversy over the new Israel group air fare of \$535 for groups of travelers of 40 or more, "a number of encouraging facts were emerging which should not only dispel some initial doubts but which point to a bright outlook for travel to Israel under the new tariff."

The airline reported that at least 2,000 tourists flew to Israel on the group plan during the first month of the new fare, which became effective April 1. Airlines and tour operators indicated a generally "favorable" response and that they listed group bookings into the summer as "good," El Al said in its report.

"Virtually everyone of the 45 groups departing in April were booked by travel agents, which indicates agents may have earned as much as \$150,000 in commissions on the new program," the report stated. "Revenue on the \$535 fare has exceeded \$1,000,000, with total tour sales estimated at a minimum of \$1,500,000."

El Al, chief proponent of the new fare, carried more than 60 percent of the Israel-bound group clients during April, and expects to transport this year 20,000 people in groups as against 14,000 transported on charters during the same period last year, officials of the airline indicated. This represents an increase of over 40 percent in mass transportation to Israel.

The new Israel group fare received the overwhelming endorsement of the American Society of Travel Agents, whose board adopted unanimously a resolution "commending and supporting the Israel fare group concept."

FUNERAL SERVICES HELD FOR RABBI ELKAN C. VOORSANGER IN SAN FRANCISCO

SAN FRANCISCO, May 5. (JTA) -- Funeral services were held here today for Rabbi Elkan Cohen Voorsanger, who served as senior chaplain with the American Expeditionary Force in France during World War I and later with the Joint Distribution Committee in Europe. He died at his home here where he lived in retirement for the last three years. He was 71.

Born in San Francisco, the son of a rabbi, he was graduated from the University of Cincinnati in 1913. He was ordained at Hebrew Union College in 1914 and served at Temple Emanuel in Grand Rapids, Mich. Later he served as rabbi of Temple Shaare Emeth in St. Louis. When World War I broke out, he gave up his post at the temple and enlisted in the army as a private and went over to France with the first 750 Americans. He was successively promoted to sergeant, lieutenant-chaplain, captain and senior chaplain of the 77th division. He held the French Croix de Guerre decoration and several American citations, including the Purple Heart.

After the war, he was named overseas director of the Jewish Welfare Board and later served the JWB in World War II as chaplaincy commissioner. He went to Poland for the Joint Distribution Committee in 1918. In 1934, after entering the business field, he was named superintendent of the bureau of compensation of the Chicago Public Works Department. In 1936 he was named director of finance of the Union of American Hebrew Congregations and later was executive director of the Milwaukee Jewish Welfare Federation.
