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SHAZAR INAUGURATED AS ISRAEL'S PRESIDENT IN IMPRESSIVE CEREMONY

JERUSALEM, May 22. (JTA) -- Shneur Zalman Shazar was inaugurated today as Israel's third President in a ceremony reminiscent of the biblical pageantry which attended the proclamation of the jubilee year and coronations of Israelite kings.

Without cannon salvos or other military salute, his arrival at Parliament Square for the ceremony was heralded by army chaplains who sounded successive plaintive, staccato and triumphant notes on the shofar. He then entered the Parliament for a special session for taking the oath of allegiance.

The entire diplomatic corps, the Chief Rabbinate, Supreme Court justices and other dignitaries were present. Israel's new First Lady, Rachel Katznelson Shazar, and members of the Shazar family watched the ceremony from the Presidential Box in the gallery.

Before a standing House, the President-elect repeated the oath administered by Speaker Kadish Luz: "I, Shneur Zalman, son of Sara and Yehuda Leib Shazar, pledge allegiance to the State of Israel and to its laws and to faithfully fulfil my duty as President." In one hand, he held the Bible as he raised the other high. A fanfare of trumpets signalled the inauguration and the thousands who had lined Parliament Square broke out in lusty cheers.

Earlier, the President had received official notification of his election by an all-party delegation, including Arab deputies. He was cheered as he was escorted to the Knesset building. After the ceremony, the President and the First Lady were driven through the main streets in an open limousine preceded by mounted police and detectives. Thousands of school children joined in the enthusiastic plaudits which the President warmly acknowledged.

Appeals for Unity in Israel; Hopes for Peace with Arabs

Delivering his inauguration address at the Knesset, President Shazar said that the essential first condition to overcoming Israel's internal and external dangers was "a meeting of hearts among us all." Paying tribute to Dr. Chaim Weizmann, Israel's first President, and to Izhak Ben-Zvi, Mr. Shazar's predecessor, he said the lesson of the period preceding the restoration of Israel was "eternally graven in our hearts" and that "no sacrifice is too heavy for our people to safeguard the peace, freedom and future of the State of Israel."

"We cannot mitigate the pangs of Israel's redemption except by raising aloft the banner of love for Israel, by uprooting internecine hatred and erasing fanaticism, by fostering mutual respect and true tolerance," he declared.

"I hope that peace would not be long delayed--peace with our neighbors and peace throughout the region," he said. "Our hand is outstretched for peace and the day will come when peace between the nations and the peoples will be established all over the world. We, within the limits of our strength and influence, will be among those who helped to prepare and establish it."

Stressing that Israel was open to all the Jews of the world, he added "we shall always remember that we still have a people all over the world, a people that is our bone and flesh, a people subject to incitement in one corner and spiritual self-abasement in another, doomed to conformity and assimilation everywhere, either through lack of strength or lack of spirit, whether wittingly or unwittingly but nevertheless devoted to Israel's heritage and its hope of redemption."

He said that "Israel was with the Jewish people in its trials and tribulations and we long with all our hearts to see its sons share in our struggles and our constructive endeavors in Israel." Emphasizing that "like the best of states," Israel guarantees liberty and equality to all its citizens, he called for the fostering of "every creative spark of talent and knowledge" and the gathering together of the "scattered sparks of Jewish genius."

He said he prayed that he would be able to summon all the powers of his soul and body to carry out his "exalted mission." "With the assistance of the entire nation, and divine support, may we be privileged to witness the return of the sons to their borders. May Israel dwell in safety and may the world be built on loving kindness," he declared.

Speaker Luz hailed the election of Mr. Shazar, declaring that the new President "combines the best attributes of the people." The Speaker expressed the hope that the new President would be successful in the task of bringing about internal harmony in Israel.

ISRAELI GROUPS TO DEMONSTRATE AGAINST VISIT OF GERMAN EX-MINISTER

TEL AVIV, May 22. (JTA) -- Organizations of European wartime partisans and ghetto fighters decided last night to stage demonstrations in protest against the forthcoming visit to Israel of Franz Josef Strauss, former West German Defense Minister. He is scheduled to arrive next Sunday.

The organizations of former Nazi victims decided to hold the demonstrations in Tel Aviv in expectation that the precise time and date of the West German's arrival will be kept secret to forestall demonstrations at the airport.

The leftist Mapam also decided to stage a protest demonstration and a mass meeting at the Tel Aviv seashore on Saturday night with representatives of the partisan veterans as the principal speakers. The rightwing Herut proceeded with plans to concentrate what it said would be 5,000 people for demonstrations at Lydda Airport or at airport approach roads.

Police meanwhile proceeded with preparations for the West German leader's arrival. A strong police cordon will cut off the main building at the airport to prevent demonstrators from approaching. (In Munich, the office of the Christian Social Union, of which Mr. Strauss is chairman, said that the former German Defense Minister was adhering to his decision to start his Israel study tour on May 26 as originally scheduled.)

MCCOY REFUSES TO PAY ITS SHARE FOR U.N. TRUCE GROUP IN PALESTINE

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y., May 22. (JTA) -- The Soviet Union told the United Nations today it will refuse to pay any money at all to the upkeep of the United Nations Truce Supervision Organization in Palestine, as well as the United Nations Emergency Force.

The USSR has consistently refused to pay toward the upkeep of UNEF, the force on guard in the Gaza Strip and at Sharm el-Sheikh between Egypt and Israel. But until today it had never mentioned UNTSO, the organization that supervises implementation of the armistice agreements between Israel on the one hand and Egypt, Syria, Jordan and Lebanon on the other.

Nikolai T. Fedorenko, the new USSR permanent representative here, announced his government's decision at a meeting at the General Assembly's Administrative and Budget Committee this morning. The Assembly, which is in special session now, is concerned almost entirely with the financial problems facing the UN because of the refusal by the Soviet Union and a number of other states, including the Arabs, to pay for UNEF and for the UN Force in the Congo.

FELDMAN, KENNEDY'S AIDE, ADDRESSES JEWISH LEADERS; STRESSES J. T. A. ROLE

NEW YORK, May 22. (JTA) -- The importance of the Jewish Telegraphic Agency's role as a news agency, linking and informing world Jewry, was stressed today by Myer Feldman, Deputy Special Counsel to President Kennedy, in an address at a luncheon of directors of the JTA and communal leaders at the Cverseas Press Club.

Commending the objectivity of the JTA reports, Mr. Feldman indicated that President Kennedy was among the readers of JTA material. He cited the need for the JTA, terming the agency "unique in its service to the Jewish people." Mr. Feldman also delivered a background summary of Washington events from the viewpoint of his additional White House staff duties as the President's personal consultant on Jewish matters.

Sol Satinsky, of Philadelphia, who spoke in behalf of the JTA Board, called attention to the JTA's 47 years of service and urged that the agency be provided the opportunity to expand its facilities in the community interest. Charles Frost, industrialist and philanthropic-communal leader, who served as chairman, commended Mr. Feldman, stating that "while only a part of high-level White House duties pertain to liaison with the American Jewish community, this is the part of his job nearest to his heart" and said he figured in important policy decisions favoring Israel.

ISRAEL CITRUS SEASON ENDS; EXPORT BROUGHT \$72,500,000 TO COUNTRY

TEL AVIV, May 22. (JTA) - Israel's citrus season ended today with the departure of a shipment of 7,000 cases of fruit from Haifa port bound for Austria. The shipment brought total exports of citrus for the season to 12,500,000 cases netting Israel \$72,500,000.

During the current season, Israel tested citrus sales to North America. Canada took 180,000 cases and the United States 50,000 cases. The six European Common Market countries had absorbed a larger quantity of Israeli fruits than during the previous year. This fact made the problem of tariffs even more acute and vital to Israel than it would be otherwise.

HIGH ISRAEL POLICE OFFICIAL ARRIVES IN PARIS; INVITED BY FRENCH GOVERNMENT

PARIS, May 22. (JTA) - Haim Peled, director general of the Israel Ministry of Police, arrived in Paris today at the invitation of the French Government to study police and prison methods throughout France. He will be received tomorrow by the French Minister of Justice and other officials. He immediately began a tour of detention places in France and planned to visit both open and closed jails throughout the country.

HIMMLER'S AIDE CHARGED WITH KILLING 300,000 JEWS IN EASTERN EUROPE

MUNICH, May 22. (JTA) -- Karl Wolff, 62-year-old former SS General and personal aide to Gestapo Chief Heinrich Himmler, has been charged with complicity in the wartime murder of 300,000 Jews in Eastern Europe, it was disclosed here today.

A 400-page indictment was submitted to the Munich jury court against Wolff but the date for his trial was not indicated. Wolff, who has been under detention since January 1962, joined the Nazi party and the SS as early as 1931. From 1936 to 1943 he was chief of Himmler's personal staff and, until 1944, he was liaison officer between Himmler and Hitler.

EICHMANN'S AIDE GRANTED RETRIAL IN GERMANY; KILLED JEWS IN HUNGARY

BONN, May 22. (JTA) -- Otto Hunsche, former assistant to the late Adolf Eichmann at Budapest, today was granted a retrial by Germany's highest federal court, at Karlsruhe, after being convicted by a Frankfurt district court of the wartime murder of 1,200 Hungarian Jews.

The high tribunal found that there had been legal errors in the Frankfurt proceedings, where Hunsche had been convicted and given a sentence of five years at hard labor. While awaiting retrial at Frankfurt, however, Hunsche faces still another case. He is scheduled to go on trial soon for having helped murder 40,000 other Jews.

DR. GLOBKE, INVOLVED IN NUREMBERG LAWS, TO RESIGN FROM BONN POST

BONN, May 22. (JTA) -- Dr. Hans Globke, State Secretary in the office of Chancellor Konrad Adenauer, will resign October 1, "whether Dr. Adenauer is still in office or not," Christ and Welt, a newspaper published in Stuttgart, reported today. According to the paper, Dr. Globke had tried to resign several times in the last few years, but Dr. Adenauer had refused to act on his top aide's wish to leave his post.

Dr. Globke has constantly been accused of a pro-Nazi past, but has retained Dr. Adenauer's confidence. He has admitted that, during World War II, he had written the legal commentary on Hitler's infamous anti-Semitic Nuremberg laws, but has contended he had nothing to do with drafting those laws.

ECONOMIC DIFFICULTIES IN ARGENTINA HELP TO STIMULATE ANTI-SEMITISM

RCSARIO, Argentina, May 22. (JTA) -- Economic difficulties now being encountered by the general Argentine population, and in many cases unemployment, have created the new motives for anti-Semitism in this country, according to reports delivered here today at the annual convention of the DAIA, central body of organized Argentine Jewry.

The reports were delivered by delegates from Corrientes, La Plata, Rosario, Buenos Aires and other centers of Jewish population among the 28 Argentine cities represented here. The convention opened yesterday and is scheduled to end tomorrow.

Dr. Isaac Goldenberg, president of DAIA, summarizing the reports, declared that the recent problems that have beset Argentine Jewry "have demonstrated that the Jewish leadership has matured" and stated that "external shocks have fortified Argentine Jewry."

The 150 delegates, reviewing anti-Semitism in this country and planning to implement Dr. Goldenberg's plea for intensification of the fight against it, heard Leon Peretz, of Buenos Aires, say that "anti-Semitic techniques here have been imported from Europe, but have not taken permanent root here. Jews are the first, but not the sole victims."

LEADERS OF JEWISH COMMUNITIES IN 11 LANDS HOLD CONFERENCE IN ITALY

MILAN, May 22. (JTA) -- A check for 1,700,000 Belgian Francs (\$34,000) to aid the influx of North African Jews in France was presented today to the Standing Conference on European Jewish Community Services at the close of a two-day meeting.

The money was the proceeds of a national campaign among Belgian Jews, which Jewish leaders said marked the first time that a drive had managed to enlist the support of all elements of the Belgian Jewish community.

The delegates, representing the top lay leadership of health and welfare services of Jewish communities in 11 European countries heard reports from the various countries on the progress of the Conference's emergency aid fund for North African refugees in France.

In response to a plea from the Fonds Sociale Juif Unifie, the major French Jewish welfare agency, the Conference took special action to make places available as quickly as possible for children of the North African refugees in vacation camps operated by the different European communities. The delegates were told that such openings were urgently needed in large numbers to supplement camping facilities in France.

The conference also heard reports and discussions on activities of the commission on community health services, centers and camps, personnel and from the committee of Jewish community organization executives. Participants included Charles H. Jordan, overseas director general of the Joint Distribution Committee.

318 JEWISH IMMIGRANTS ENTERED CANADA IN FIRST QUARTER OF 1963

OTTAWA, May 22. (JTA) -- A total of 318 Jewish immigrants came to Canada in the first three months of 1963, compared with 346 in the same period a year ago, data released here today by the Dominion Department of Citizenship and Immigration showed. The aggregate number of immigrants into Canada during the first quarter of 1963 was 13,410, as compared with 11,762 in the corresponding months of 1962.

CONFERENCE ON JEWISH SOCIAL STUDIES MEETS; DISCUSSES CHURCH AND STATE

NEW YORK, May 22. (JTA) -- Professor Salo W. Baron, director of the Center of Israeli and Jewish Studies at Columbia University, was elected president of the Conference on Jewish Social Studies at the 30th anniversary meeting of the organization here tonight.

A group of 200 social scientists, communal workers and educators attended the meeting for which the theme was church and state in contemporary United States. Dr. Franklin H. Littell, Professor at the Chicago Theological Seminary, declared in a paper that those "who wish to defend the state-church system and legislated religion" should know that "the American people have never been Christianized."

"Religious liberty is an art which we are already learning to practice," he told the meeting. "It is not a possession of the past but something gone out after. Politically speaking, it is a right antecedent to the frame of government itself. Religiously speaking, it rests upon a foundation of faithful voluntary membership and support." He added a warning that religious liberty, like other liberties, "will not long endure if citizens neglect the disciplined initiative which brought it into existence in the first place."

Dr. Seymour Siegel, assistant professor of theology at the Jewish Theological Seminary of America, told the conference that while Jewish rights in the 19th century had been won under secular governments, "in the 20th century, it is important for the continuation of Jewish life to have a religious culture."

For that reason, he said, it was not beneficial for American Jewry "for the official Jewish bodies to be in the forefront in the struggle to remove the symbols and practices of the historical religions from our public life."

BOOK COUNCIL ANNOUNCES AWARDS FOR BEST JEWISH BOOKS OF YEAR

NEW YORK, May 22. (JTA) -- "The Slave," by Isaac Bashevis Singer, was selected today for the \$250 Harry and Ethel Daroff Memorial Fiction Award of the Jewish Book Council as the outstanding English-language work of fiction of Jewish interest published in the United States during 1962.

The award was one of six carrying cash prizes totaling \$950 for the best Jewish books of 1962 in fiction, non-fiction, poetry and juvenile fields presented at the annual meeting of the National Jewish Welfare Board's Book Council here.

"The Promised City," by Dr. Moses Rischin, received the first Frank and Ethel S. Cohen non fiction award, a prize of \$250. The \$250 Isaac Siegel Memorial Award for the best Jewish juvenile in English was awarded to Josephine Kamm for her "Return to Freedom." The two \$100 Harry and Florence Kovner Awards for Jewish poetry were awarded to "By the Waters of Manhattan," by Charles Reznikoff for poetry in English; and to "Der Mentsh Fun Fier" by Chaim Grade for Yiddish poetry.

Nine libraries were cited by the Jewish Book Council for having met the Council's stated criteria for a Jewish library. They were the libraries of the Oakland (N.Y.) Jewish Center, the Hillcrest Jewish Center, Jamaica, N.Y., Fairmount Temple, Cleveland, Temple Sinai of Lawrence, N.Y., Temple Beth El of Phoenix, Temple Israel of Swampscott, Mass., the Ada L. Goldberg Library of Temple Emanuel of Westwood, N.J., the Lewis E. Flax Library of Lincoln Park Jewish Center of Yonkers, N.Y., and Temple Israel of West Palm Beach, Florida.

The book council also honored Solomon Kirstein, its vice-president and vice-president of Bloch Publishing Company, for his "dedicated service to the Council since its inception" and for his contributions to Jewish culture and traditional Jewish education. Rabbi Gilbert Klaperman of Lawrence, N.Y., Council president, presided.

FAIRLEIGH DICKINSON UNIVERSITY ESTABLISHES SCHOLARSHIP FOR ISRAELI

RUTHERFORD, N.J., May 22. (JTA) -- Fairleigh Dickinson University has established a tuition scholarship for one Israeli student, who will be admitted to any of the institution's three campuses, in honor of Michael S. Gornay, Israel's permanent representative at the United Nations, Peter Sammartino, president of the university, announced here today. The university, which has campuses here, at Madison and Teaneck, N.J., has an enrollment of nearly 15,000 students.

OZER BUMASHNY, FOUNDER OF JEWISH DAILY NEWSPAPER IN ARGENTINA, DEAD

BUENOS AIRES, May 22. (JTA) -- Ozer Bumashny, a founder and director of Di Presse, a Yiddish daily, died here today at the age of 78 after a long illness. Born in Russia, he was active in the Jewish self-defense in that country during the Czarist pogroms on Jews. He was administrator of the daily until his retirement in 1955.
