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NEW ISRAEL CABINET TO BE SWORN IN TODAY IN ISRAEL PARLIAMENT

JERUSALEM, June 25. (JTA) -- The new Cabinet of Premier Designate Levi Eshkol will receive its expected vote of confidence and swearing in tomorrow morning in Israel's Parliament.

Normally, the installation of the new Government would follow completion of debate in the Knesset, which is scheduled to end tonight. However, three of the Cabinet Ministers of the National Religious party are attending the party's national convention in Tel Aviv, necessitating the brief postponement.

The Premier-Designate presented his proposed Government, based on the same political groupings as the one dissolved by the surprise resignation on June 16 of Prime Minister David Ben-Gurion, to the Knesset yesterday. The debate which followed included a warning by Herut leader Menachem Beigin that if the new Prime Minister failed to implement "the Knesset resolution about West German scientists working for Egypt," Herut would press for new elections.

Mr. Beigin also assailed Deputy Defense Minister Shimon Peres charging that he had "misled" the public and the Israel Foreign Affairs Committee on the issue of the West German scientists and had indirectly caused the resignation of Israel's security service chief. That official, whose name is never made public, resigned after Prime Minister Ben-Gurion reportedly rebuked him for the manner in which the issue of the West German scientists was handled.

Liberals Seek More Explanations from Ben-Gurion for His Resignation

Izhar Harari of the Liberal party said that Mr. Ben-Gurion owed the nation a more illuminating explanation of his resignation than "personal reasons." Mr. Ben-Gurion resigned both as Prime Minister and Defense Minister and also as a member of Parliament. Under pressure of his Mapai colleagues, he canceled his resignation as a Knesset deputy.

The Liberal deputy also contended that Pinhas Sapir should not be permitted to hold indefinitely both the Commerce Ministry he has in the present Cabinet and the Finance Ministry which he will have in the new one. In the new Government Mr. Eshkol will be also Defense Minister, as was Mr. Ben-Gurion, while the Finance Ministry will be temporarily headed by Mr. Sapir.

The Liberal deputy also criticized the plan for replacement of Abba Eban by veteran Mapai leader Zalman Aranne as Education Minister. Mr. Eban will become Deputy Prime Minister, a new post.

Yaacov Hazan of Mapam said that the Labor parties should have tried to form a new Government. He conceded that Achdut Avodah, which will continue in the new Government, had made such an effort, but that the "failure" of the effort proved that Achdut Avodah had little influence in the Government.

He reiterated that Mapam had declined the Achdut Avodah bid to join the new Government because this would have meant implied approval of the deeds of the outgoing Government. Mapam is strongly opposed to the Ben-Gurion bid for diplomatic ties with West Germany and the Ben-Gurion stand on handling of Israel's Arab minority. The Mapam deputy said the new Government was not ready to alter any of the basic policies of the outgoing one.

ISRAEL VOTES FOR U. N. FORCES IN MIDDLE EAST; ARAB STATES ABSTAIN

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y., June 25. (JTA) -- Israel was among the nations who voted here today in favor of a resolution authorizing the expenditure, until the end of this year, of \$9,500,000 for the operation of the United Nations Emergency Force stationed in the Middle East and in the Congo. The Arab states abstained from voting. The resolution was adopted by a roll-call vote of 79 in favor, 11 against and 17 abstentions.

The UN General Assembly will now decide to apportion the amount of \$2,500,000 among all member states, in accordance with the regular scale of assessments for 1963. The \$7,000,000 balance would be apportioned among member states in accordance with the regular scale, except that each "economically less developed country" would be assessed

an amount calculated at 45 percent of its rate under the regular scale. This would be an ad hoc arrangement for the present phase of this peace-keeping operation and would not constitute a precedent for the future, the draft resolution states.

The resolution lists the countries which are considered to be economically more developed, for the purposes of the apportionment. The Assembly would recommend that these states make voluntary contributions in addition to their assessments, in order to finance authorized expenditures in excess of the total amount assessed under this resolution, and would appeal to all other member states, in a position to assist to make similar voluntary contributions or to forego having their assessments calculated at the lower rate. The resolution states that voluntary contributions may be made in the form of services and supplies, acceptable to the Secretary-General, furnished for use by UNEF during this period.

In another resolution adopted by the General Assembly's Administration and Budgetary Committee, by a vote of 21 in favor, 13 against, with 3 abstentions, the Committee approved the principle of collective responsibility in peacekeeping operations. Both Israel and the Arab states voted in favor of this resolution.

U.S. REPLIES TO SOVIET PROPOSAL FOR NUCLEAR-FREE MEDITERRANEAN

LONDON, June 25. (JTA) -- The American reply to the Soviet proposal for declaring the Mediterranean a nuclear-free zone was delivered yesterday in Moscow to the Soviet Foreign Ministry, it was reported here today from the Soviet capital. The U.S. reply termed the Soviet proposal "a propagandistic attack against the presence of United States missile launching submarines in the Mediterranean."

The reply also said the Soviet proposal contained "a large number of gross misrepresentations." It contended that polaris submarines are in the Mediterranean only to defend the integrity of the countries concerned who were threatened by "a form of nuclear blackmail in which the Soviet Union could have attempted to force the Mediterranean countries to succumb to Soviet dictation or Soviet domination."

U.S. AIDED NASSER'S BUILDUP OF WAR MACHINERY, SENATOR KEATING CHARGES

WHITE PLAINS, N. Y., June 25. (JTA) -- Senator Kenneth B. Keating (R., N. Y.) tonight charged that Nasser would never have been able to carry out his own "ambitious preparation for war efforts" without U.S. assistance. Speaking at the inaugural dinner of the Westchester division of the American Jewish Committee, the Senator warned that it is not only unwise to subsidize Nasser's arms purchases, but it is "directly in contradiction to the aims of our aid program and of our over-all foreign policy in the Middle East."

The New York Senator pointed out that since 1952 more than \$862,000,000 of American aid has gone to Egypt, with the bulk of it spent on the food-for-peace program. "Yet, in many ways," said Keating, "it might be more appropriate to call it a food-for-war program." "There is no doubt," he said, "that United States readiness to supply Egypt with food has made it possible for Nasser to barter its cotton crop to the Soviet Union for military equipment and weapons."

The Senator discussed the legislation which he introduced last week requiring the President to suspend assistance to any nation which purchases military equipment from the communist bloc in quantities requiring a significant diversion of its own resources. He pointed out that "since Nasser in the past nine years has spent over \$700,000,000 on Soviet bloc weapons--nearly as much as our aid efforts--he would clearly qualify under this prohibition."

NEW IMMIGRANTS IN ISRAEL MAY NEED MORE THAN 20,000 HOUSING UNITS

JERUSALEM, June 25. (JTA) -- The more than 20,000 housing units planned or under construction for new immigrants during the current year may prove insufficient, it was reported here today at a meeting of the Jewish Agency executive.

The executive was informed that while it was not true to say that a majority of recent immigrants were social welfare cases, many of the newcomers had large families and few had any profession. It was also reported that while only a short time ago, Israel had a surplus of doctors, there was now a shortage.

Eliahu Dobkin, head of the Youth and Hechalutz department, reported that 750 professionals came to Israel last year under auspices of the Professional and Technical Workers Aliyah (PATWA) program and that it was hoped that the number would reach 1,000 this year.

ISRAEL AMBASSADOR CONFERS WITH CANADIAN PREMIER ON MIDDLE EAST

OTTAWA, June 25. (JTA) - Israel Ambassador Yaakov Herzog met with Canadian Prime Minister Lester Pearson at the Premier's office this morning. It is understood that they discussed Middle East affairs.

SENATE COMMITTEE CONTINUES CLOSED INQUIRY ON JEWISH AGENCY

WASHINGTON, June 25. (JTA) -- The Senate Foreign Relations Committee continued yesterday a closed inquiry on the activities of the Jewish Agency. Senator J. William Fulbright, Arkansas Democrat, chairman of the committee, identified a witness as Gottlieb Hammer of New York, formerly an officer of the New York section of the Jewish Agency for Israel. Since April 1960, Mr. Hammer has been executive vice chairman of the Jewish Agency, Inc., which is not a subject of this inquiry. He was accompanied by the Agency's attorney, Maurice Boukstein of New York.

The Senate committee has for several months been conducting a study of the administration of the Foreign Agents Registration Act of 1938. Numerous registered agents have been questioned by the Senate committee which is planning to recommend additional legislation. The Jewish Agency, American section, is registered under the law since it represents the World Zionist Organization and the Jewish Agency with its headquarters in Jerusalem.

U.S. JEWISH INTELLECTUALS SCORED FOR VIEWS AT JERUSALEM'S 'DIALOGUE'

SCUTH FALLSBURG, N. Y., June 25. (JTA) -- Rabbi Emanuel Rackman, professor of political science at Yeshiva University, today told the 27th annual convention of the Rabbinical Council of America, meeting here, that "the recent dialogue in Israel made it absolutely clear that most Jewish writers and intellectuals are creating a distorted image of the basic value of Orthodox Judaism. They have never acquired a firm and thorough understanding of the vital power and creative dynamism of religious beliefs and historical truths." The Rabbinical Council of America is the largest Orthodox Rabbinic body and represents 850 rabbis.

"The discussions in Jerusalem revealed that these literary scholars are assuming the mantle of self-appointed spokesmen and leaders for Judaism without justification and reason due to their divorce from and indifference to Jewish religious community living and the daily problems of religious orientation," Dr. Rackman said. "Because of the misrepresentation of these Jewish litterateurs, the non-Jewish world is denied an opportunity to appreciate the overwhelming contributions which Orthodox Jews are making in every avenue of modern endeavor such as physics, chemistry, literature, art, culture and music." Rabbi Rackman added that "Orthodox Judaism has managed to resist the encroachments of such alien philosophers as Marxism and Freudianism and to emerge with a more favorable position in the world of general ideas and moral concepts."

Avraham Harman, Israel's Ambassador to the United States, told the convention that "religious ideals cannot flourish and develop in a culture which is oppressive to the freedom-loving inclination of men. He said that the Rabbinical Council of America "is creating a powerful foundation on which future communications and contacts between the Jews of the United States and Israel will be strengthened." The Ambassador further maintained that "Israel is a loyal adherent to the basic western idea of full religious liberty for all faiths and denominations. It is creating those conditions of life which make possible the full flowering of the genius of traditional Judaism."

The convention opened last night with an address by Rabbi Abraham N. Avrutick lauding the U. S. Supreme Court decisions banning Bible reading and prayers in public schools. At the same time he suggested the enactment of legislation to grant income tax allowance to parents for tuition of their children attending religious schools. He also appealed to President Kennedy to use his good offices to terminate the armaments race in the Middle East.

"The American Government must issue an unequivocal declaration that it will insure the territorial integrity of Israel in the face of any and all aggression," he said, "Israel is a bulwark against the spread of communism in the entire Middle East, and should be aided in its valiant attempts to set up an economy of general stability and an administration of enduring strength."

CANADA'S ONLY YIDDISH DAILY NEWSPAPER TO APPEAR THREE TIMES WEEKLY

MONTREAL, June 25. (JTA) -- The "Canader Odler" (Jewish Daily Eagle), the only Yiddish daily newspaper in Canada, announced today that, beginning July 1, the paper will appear only three times weekly - Wednesday, Friday and Sunday. It has been appearing as a daily since its establishment in 1907.

The announcement emphasized that efforts to secure the continued appearance of the newspaper as a daily publication proved unsuccessful. The administration of the paper expressed hope that friends and supporters of a free and independent Jewish press in Canada "will continue to give their support to the paper in the future, as they have done in the past."

ANTI-FASCISTS FACE TRIAL IN LONDON FOR RAIDING MOSLEY'S QUARTERS

LONDON, June 25. (JTA) -- Six members of the anti-fascist Yellow Star movement were ordered committed for trial today at a hearing on charges that they raided the headquarters of Oswald Mosley's movement a couple months ago. They also were charged with attacking two Mosley officials during the raid.

GRADUATES OF ISRAEL MEDICAL SCHOOL EXCEL IN U.S. EXAMINATIONS

JERUSALEM, June 25. (JTA) -- Graduates of the Hebrew University-Hadassah Medical School topped the list of successful candidates in last year's examinations held by the Educational Council for Foreign Medical Students in the United States, it was reported here today.

The examination, in which 8,180 graduates of 78 universities participated, is required of all graduates of medical schools seeking to engage in post-graduate work in American hospitals. Sixty-one Israel-trained physicians received the highest average score on the entire examination and topped the lists in various individual subjects including basic medical sciences, internal medicine and pediatrics.

SIR ISAAC WOLFSON IS ELECTED FELLOW OF ROYAL SOCIETY IN LONDON

LONDON, June 25. (JTA) -- Sir Isaac Wolfson, the distinguished merchant and philanthropist, has been elected a fellow of the Royal Society, an honor usually conferred upon outstanding scientists.

Sir Isaac's election was made possible by a statute enacted in 1902 providing for the election to the Society of persons who have either rendered distinguished service to the cause of science or who, in the words of the statute, "are such that their election would be of signal benefit to the Society." Through the Isaac Wolfson Foundation, Sir Isaac has given away more than \$42,000,000 for causes ranging from cancer research to women's education at Cambridge.

BRANDEIS U. SELECTED AS FIRST RECIPIENT OF GRANT FOR GOVERNMENT

CHICAGO, June 25. (JTA) -- Brandeis University will be the recipient of the first James Gordon Grant for Government, worth \$180,000 in the next 10 years, it was announced here tonight at a dinner honoring Mrs. Florence Heller, a contributor of substantial sums to the university within recent years.

Mrs. Heller, of Chicago, was guest of honor at the annual banquet of the Chicago Life Members of Brandeis University, attended by some 150 members and friends. Announcement of the Gordon Grant of \$18,000 each year for the next 10 years was made by Burton G. Feldman, chairman of a four-member board of directors established under the will of James Gordon, a Chicago electrical equipment manufacturer who died last December.

The purpose of the grant as set forth in Gordon's will, Mr. Feldman said, is to "improve, through non-political activities, the training and skills of those who hold or aspire to public office, especially at the state and local government level." Brandeis, he said, was selected because of its "already impressive contributions in the fields of political science and government administration."

DELEGATION OF ISRAELI SCOUTS ARRIVES IN U.S. FOR A TEN-WEEK VISIT

NEW YORK, June 25. (JTA) -- Fourteen Israeli boys and girls, all seventeen years old, representing the Israel Scout Federation, arrived at Idlewild Airport for a ten-week visit in the United States. The delegation is the fifth annual contingent of Israel Scouts to visit this country under the joint auspices of the American Zionist Youth Commission and the Israel Scout Federation.

The broad aim of this project is the development of relationships and understanding between the youth of Israel and American Jewish youth through a summer of joint activities, travel and various public events. Five girls and six boys from the scout delegation will then depart separately for North Carolina, New Hampshire, Texas, Michigan and New York State to spend the summer camping season at five camps affiliated with National Young Judea, the Zionist youth organization.

From August 26 until their return to Israel on September 9, the delegation will visit Washington, Philadelphia, Boston and Buffalo, where they will participate in receptions, press, radio and television interviews and other public events.

JEWISH CONGRESS TO COMPILE MATERIAL ON HISTORY OF CANADIAN JEWRY

MONTREAL, June 25. (JTA) -- The Canadian Jewish Congress today announced that it will begin compiling material on the history of Canadian Jewry since 1900 to be used in the publication in 1967 of a volume on the subject scheduled to appear in connection with the centennial observance of Canadian Confederation. Sheldon J. Godfrey of Toronto will be in charge of the project.

The early history of Canadian Jewry was already published by the CJC several years ago. That work, "History of the Jews in Canada," was written by B.G. Sack of Montreal.

BOOK ON NAZI DEATH CAMP IN ESTONIA PUBLISHED; 100,000 JEWS PERISHED

LONDON, June 25. (JTA) -- A book about the Kloge death camp where close to 100,000 Jews perished has been written by Erwin Martinson, an Estonian writer, and published in Soviet Estonia; it was learned here. The author describes how the last survivors of the Vilna and Kovno ghettos were put to death in Kloge along with tens of thousands of Jews from Estonia, Latvia, Poland, Czechoslovakia, Germany and Norway.
