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MIXED ARMISTICE COMMISSION CENSURES JORDAN STERNLY FOR KILLING ISRAELI

JERUSALEM, Sept. 5. (JTA) -- The Israel-Jordan Mixed Armistice Commission condemned Jordan today "in the most strenuous terms" for a shooting affray last Tuesday, in which an Israeli workman was killed near Jerusalem.

The killing occurred when Jordanians fired across the Jerusalem demarcation lines at a truck transporting workers at Orah settlement. The commission termed the shooting "a flagrant breach" of the armistice, and called on Jordan to take "appropriate measures" to prevent a recurrence. The commission also condemned Israel for firing across the same lines, presumably after the Jordan shooting, saying evidence showed that the Israel action was not necessarily "an exchange of fire."

LEBANON COOLS TOWARD ANTI-ISRAEL BOYCOTT; OPPOSES ARAB LEAGUE PLAN

JERUSALEM, Sept. 5. (JTA) -- The first significant internal breach in the Arab anti-Israel boycott wall was reported here today from Beirut where, Lebanon informed the Arab League Secretariat it opposed a planned conference in Lebanon of heads of the boycott offices of the various Arab countries.

An official communique cited "internal Lebanese and inter-Arab problems" as the reason for Lebanon's stand. It was reported here that economic sources in Lebanon have, for some time, contended that the boycott was hurting Lebanon and the other Arab countries more than it was damaging Israel.

RELATIONS BETWEEN N. AFRICAN STATES AND ISRAEL SEEN AS 'CONSIDERABLY' WORSE

PARIS, Sept. 5. (JTA) -- Relations between the three major North African new states--Tunisia, Morocco and Algeria--on the one hand, and Israel on the other, have considerably worsened recently, the influential French daily, Le Monde, declared today.

Le Monde stated that President Bourguiba of Tunisia had never before described the Arab fight against Israel as "the most important and most urgent task of all the Arabs," as he did last week. The indicated worsening of relations with Israel, the newspaper declared, might presage a step toward Tunisia's alignment with the Arab League.

After examining the strong anti-Israel stand taken by Morocco at the Security Council session this week on Israeli and Syrian complaints and counter-complaints on border incidents, Le Monde considered the situation of Algeria, calling it "the most anti-Israel state of them all."

The review stressed the efforts of the Ben Bella regime in Algeria to blur the distinctions between Israeli and Israeli citizens, and Algerian and foreign Jews. The newspaper also noted that the FLN, the pre-independence Algerian underground movement, has often paid tribute to the aid it received from various Christians, but has never mentioned the sacrifices which many Jews accepted for the Algerian revolution. At one time, Le Monde concluded, it had been hoped that the North African countries might serve as arbitrators between Israel and the Arab states, but such hopes appear doubtful now.

Morocco, Libya Agree to Aid Arabs to Recover 'Palestine Rights'

CASABLANCA, Sept. 5. (JTA)-- Libyan Premier and Foreign Minister Mohieddine Fekkin today joined King Hassan II of Morocco in a communique expressing their loyalty to the Palestine Arabs and the "firm intention" of the two nations to collaborate with "friendly" countries for "aiding the people of Palestine to recover their rights." The communique was issued at the conclusion of a state visit to Morocco by the Libyan Premier.

At the same time, the ultra-nationalist Istiqlal (Freedom) Party, now in the opposition, demanded that the Moroccan Government set up a bureau for the boycott of Israel "conforming to the ideals of the Arab League."

The party violently attacked the Government, accusing it of "sympathy" for Israel. Istiqlal demanded that the Government set up a bureau as soon as possible to boycott Israel "economically, commercially and industrially."

An article in the Istiqlal Party organ, Al Alam, also charged that Jewish schools and other institutions in Morocco were "providing Zionist teaching," and that these teachers were Jews who had come to Morocco "with French passports issued to them by the Israeli Ambassador in Paris."

CENTER TO AID AGRICULTURE IN NEW COUNTRIES VOTED AT REHOVOT CONFERENCE

REHOVOT, Sept. 5. (JTA) -- The second International Conference on Science in the Advancement of New States concluded at the Weizmann Institute here today with the adoption of a proposal by Professor Gunnar Myrdal, of Sweden, for the establishment here of a permanent International Center for Agricultural Research and Development. The Center will be part of the Rehovot National Agricultural Institute. The Conference dealt with agricultural planning for developing countries. Attending the conference were top officials from 29 countries.

In an address at the closing session, Israel Foreign Minister Golda Meir emphasized that Israel as a developing country, readily shares her experience with other countries. "I don't believe there is any country today," Mrs. Meir declared, "that can live secluded and isolated. We cannot solve our problems each for himself. Our problems can be solved only through cooperation."

Deputy Prime Minister Abba Eban announced that a third conference will take place at Rehovot to deal with either the prevention of disease and the prolonging of life, or scientific education and research in developing countries.

Israel's Aid to Emerging Nations Lauded by British Trade Union Leader

BRIGHTON, England, Sept. 5. (JTA) -- The 95th Trade Union Congress of Britain paid tribute here today to Israel's "effective assistance" to developing countries. A. Donnet, district secretary in Scotland, and a member of the general council of the National Union of General and Municipal Workers, told the 1,000 delegates from 176 British unions that Israel, "starting from scratch," had achieved an outstanding record in development problems. He recently visited Israel with a delegation on behalf of his union, the third largest in Britain, with more than 800,000 members.

"Israel is a young country with creative energy and the idealistic spirit so essential to newly emerging nations," he told the packed audience. He stressed that Histadrut, Israel's Labor Federation, has a "unique structure" in trade unionism and cooperative activities, which had been of great help to working people in developing countries "and an inspiration to trade unionists everywhere."

He stated he had been particularly impressed by the Histadrut's Afro-Asian Institute which, he said, had trained in its first year 640 students from 51 countries. Referring to the urgent needs of these countries, he declared that it was an "international duty" to aid newly emerging nations struggling to achieve economic progress.

"Israel shares its problems and has an unusual skill in providing solutions" to such problems, he said, adding that he believed that Israel's contributions to social and economic progress could be great not only in Africa, Asia and Latin America, but also in the Middle East.

"We hope peace can and will be maintained all over the world, including the Middle East," he said. "We are sure that this is not only in the interest of the peaceful development efforts of Israel and its trade union movement, but also in the interest of Israel's neighboring countries."

MOSHE DAYAN TO RESIGN FROM ISRAEL CABINET; CLASH WITH ESHKOL SEEN

JERUSALEM, Sept. 5. (JTA) -- Agriculture Minister Moshe Dayan today formally notified Prime Minister Levi Eshkol of his intention to resign next Tuesday.

Senior Ministry officials attributed Mr. Dayan's decision to a series of disputes with Premier Eshkol over a number of demands the Agriculture Minister put forward last June, as a condition for his remaining in the Cabinet. These included the formation of a Council of Ministers for Economic Planning, the establishment of a permanent advisory panel of Mapai members of the Ministerial Security Committee, and the transfer of all authority on food supplies to the Ministry of Agriculture.

While it is understood that some Mapai members are still trying to dissuade Mr. Dayan from resigning, his decision appears to be final. Mr. Dayan reportedly also wanted to resign his Knesset seat, but the Mapai faction declined to accept his resignation.

ISRAEL TO TRAIN 30 MEXICAN FARMERS UNDER LATIN AMERICAN AID PROGRAM

MEXICO CITY, Sept. 5. (JTA) -- Thirty Mexican farmers will be sent to Israel in the near future for a three-month course in agronomy under Israel's technical assistance program for Latin American countries, it was announced here today by Javier Rojo Gomez, president of the Federation of Mexican Farmers. Israel's charge d'affaires here, Menahem W. Loval, confirming the announcement, said his Government will send its chief of Latin American technical assistance to Mexico to help work out the details of the training program for farmers from this country.

Mexico's President Adolfo Lopez Mateos told the Farmers' organization that Mexico will pay the travel costs for the agronomy trainees going to Israel, while Israel will defray the expenses in its own country. Mr. Loval announced also that Israel will conduct a course for Latin American experts in the field of irrigation, and will provide scholarships for Mexican and other Latin American specialists in irrigation.

ADENAUER REPORTED PRESSING BONN TOWARD DIPLOMATIC TIES WITH ISRAEL

LCS ANGELES, Sept. 5. (JTA) -- Chancellor Konrad Adenauer will make one final effort to establish full West German-Israel diplomatic ties before he retires this fall, the Los Angeles Times reported from Bonn.

The report quoted sources in the Chancellor's Christian Democratic Union and in the Foreign Ministry at Bonn as saying that such recognition was one of the Chancellor's "fondest hopes." The report also said his chances of succeeding were "regarded as good." The report cited the large group of West German Parliamentarians who favored the move, both in behalf of improved West German-Israel ties and to increase trade with Israel.

The opposition was reported stemming from another large group, mostly in the Foreign Office, which feels that establishment of diplomatic ties with Israel would wreck a basic West German policy of refusing to recognize any regime which recognizes East Germany. The argument, the report said, was that, the moment Bonn recognized Israel, most of the Arab states would recognize East Germany--thus imperiling West German ties with the Arab world.

'EUTHANASIA' DOCTOR GUARDED HEAVILY AS ESCAPE PLOT IS UNCOVERED IN GERMANY

FRANKFURT, Sept. 5. (JTA) -- Dr. Werner Heyde, awaiting trial on charges of participating in the "euthanasia" killings of thousands of persons during the Nazi era, has been transferred to a new jail, after a plot to free him was uncovered, Hesse provincial officials disclosed today.

Heyde was moved from the jail in which he had been held since his arrest to one with greater security measures. The Hesse prosecutor's office issued a statement declaring that documents had been uncovered pointing to an escape plot.

Another defendant in the case, Gerhard Bohne, 61, fled from his Dusseldorf home last month. He had been freed from pre-trial detention for reasons of health.

MOSCOW REPORTS REHABILITATION OF PERETZ MARKISH, MARTYR IN STALIN REGIME

LONDON, Sept. 5. (JTA) -- A museum in memory of Peretz Markish, the Soviet Yiddish writer and poet who was killed during the Stalin purge of Jewish intellectuals, has been established in Polonne, Russia, the birthplace of the Jewish literary figure, it was reported here today from Moscow.

The Markish Museum, which is part of the general museum of the town, contains manuscripts and other mementos of his life and works. Accounts of the opening of the museum, which appeared in the Soviet press received here today, described the Yiddish poet as "tragically lost." During the Stalin purges, Markish was arrested, deported from Moscow, and never heard from again.

SOVIET JEWISH EDITOR INDICATES SHIFT IN ATTITUDE TOWARD HEBREW TONGUE

LONDON, Sept. 5. (JTA) -- A switch in the doctrinaire Soviet opposition to Hebrew appeared to be indicated in a lengthy article in the current Sovietch Heimland, a Yiddish bi-monthly, by its editor-in-chief. Hebrew has always been treated by the Russian communists as a "tool of Zionism and capitalism."

Editor Samuel Vergelis declared in the article that it was "silly" to treat Hebrew as part of reactionary paraphernalia. He wrote that Hebrew is used by "progressive" Israeli writers "fighting for a better order of society." The fact that Bialik wrote in Hebrew, Vergelis declared, must not be considered as diminishing from his value as a Jewish poet. The article was considered as pointing to a possible official divorce of Hebrew from politics in the USSR, and to its possible treatment in Russia as just another language.

65 JEWS FROM BRAZIL LEAVE FOR PERMANENT SETTLEMENT IN ISRAEL

RIO DE JANEIRO, Sept. 5. (JTA) -- A group of 65 Brazilian Jews left here today for Israel, where they plan to settle permanently. This brings to 300 the number of Brazilian Jews who have emigrated to Israel in the past eight months.

ISRAEL, BOLIVIA SIGN AGREEMENT FOR ESTABLISHMENT OF MODEL FARM

LA PAZ, Bolivia, Sept. 5. (JTA) -- Israel will assist the Government of Bolivia in the establishment of a model farm under terms of an agreement signed here today by the two countries. The agreement was signed for Israel by Nathaniel Lorch, who serves as non-resident ambassador to Bolivia, and also as resident envoy to Peru.

TWO OLD SYNAGOGUES MERGE IN CURACAO; JEWISH POPULATION TOTALS 1,000

WILLEMSTAD, Curacao, Sept. 5. (JTA) -- The 310-year-old Mikveh Israel Synagogue and the 99-year-old Reform Temple Emanuel here have been merged. The Mikveh Israel synagogue has followed the Sephardi ritual. The two congregations will use the older Mikveh Israel synagogue and the Reconstructionist rituals. The entire Jewish population of Curacao numbers about 1,000.

N. J. SCHOOL BOARD ORDERS BIBLE READING IN CLASSES, DEFIES RULINGS

HAWTHORNE, N. J., Sept. 5. (JTA) -- The Board of Education here today defied the U. S. Supreme Court ruling, and has ordered the town's six schools to continue the reading of the Bible and prayer recitation observances in classes which opened here today. The decision, which was voted unanimously by the Board, followed a ruling by a New Jersey court that the Supreme Court ban applied in this state.

Board of Education attorney Alexander Fasoli said that the Board's decision was in line with the policies of Alabama, Delaware and Florida. He said the attorneys general of those states feel that the Supreme Court decision "doesn't affect their states and we feel it doesn't affect ours."

Joseph Hoffman, counsel to the state education commissioner, said that nothing immediate would be done to force compliance by the Hawthorne School Board with the Supreme Court ruling. "We're not going to do anything now in the hope that local authorities can convince these people that what they are doing is wrong."

In nearby Elizabeth, the Rev. William S. Smothers, vicar of the Grace Episcopal Church, announced he would open his church 10 minutes before each school day to hold religious exercises for public school children.

N. Y. BOARD OF RABBIS SETS 'CIVIL RIGHTS SABBATH' TO AID NEGRO CAUSE

NEW YORK, Sept. 5. (JTA) -- The New York Board of Rabbis today designated this Saturday as "Civil Rights Sabbath." The Board called on its more than 800 members to offer special prayers and to speak from their pulpits "for the purpose of awakening the conscience of the American people to the task that lies ahead of all of us in helping our country to live up to its promise of being a land of equal freedom and opportunity for all," it was announced by Rabbi Israel Mowshowitz, president of the Board.

"Having been the victim of discrimination for over 20 centuries," Rabbi Mowshowitz declared, "the Jewish people can sympathize fully with any group that is being discriminated against because of race, color or creed. It is for this reason that the plight of the American Negro has always been a basic concern of the Jewish people."

Windows Smashed at Chicago Synagogue; Rabbi Active Against Bias

CHICAGO, Sept. 5. (JTA) -- Police here today were investigating an attack on Congregation Kehilath Israel in which 12 windows in a set of four doors, and a bulletin board window, were broken early in the morning before services. A resident across the street from the synagogue was awakened by the breaking of glass at 4 a. m., and saw an adult race for a car and drive away. The witness said, however, that it was too dark to see the culprit or the car clearly.

Rabbi Eliot Einhorn, spiritual leader of the congregation, intimated that the present integration problem "may be a reason for this destruction of property." He is active in the South East Community Organization, which recently came out for open occupancy laws. The South Chicago police, who ordered the synagogue watched, said that there have been no outbreaks of a similar nature against any houses of worship in the neighborhood in recent months.

Alabama Segregationists Employ Anti-Semitic Slogans

BIRMINGHAM, Ala., Sept. 5. (JTA) -- Anti-Semitic aspects emerged among white segregationists who this week picketed public schools being desegregated under Federal court orders, according to press accounts of demonstrations at the schools. The pickets carried signs including such slogans as "NAACP is Jewish financed." Noted among the demonstrators were such extremists as Robert Shelton, of Tuscaloosa, imperial wizard of the Ku Klux Klan; and Edward Fields, head of the National States Rights Party.

JEWISH DRAFTEES EXEMPT FROM EXAMS AND INDUCTION DURING HIGH HOLY DAYS

NEW YORK, Sept. 5. (JTA) -- The National Jewish Welfare Board's Commission on Jewish Chaplaincy was officially advised by the Selective Service Commission today that all draft boards have been asked to give "favorable consideration, whenever possible" to requests from Jewish registrants for postponement of physical examination or induction into the armed forces during the Jewish High Holy Days.

This word was received by Rabbi Israel Miller, spiritual leader of the Kingsbridge Heights Jewish Center in the Bronx, the Commission chairman, from Brig. Gen. Lewis B. Hershey, director of the Selective Service System.

ISRAELI MINISTER TO CONFER WITH ISRAEL BOND LEADERS; 500 TO ATTEND PARLEY

NEW YORK, Sept. 5. (JTA) -- Israel's Minister of Development and Housing, Yosef Almogi, has accepted an invitation to address the forthcoming fall planning conference of the Israel Bond Organization, according to an announcement here today by Abraham Feinberg, president of the bond group. The conference is to be held in Washington Sept 13-15, and is expected to be attended by more than 500 Jewish leaders from the United States and Canada. They will adopt a program which, Mr. Feinberg said, should make the 1963 Bond drive "the most successful" in the history of the organization.
