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ARAB 'SUMMIT CONFERENCE' ADOPTS THREE-POINT PROGRAM AIMED AT ISRAEL

LONDON, Sept. 10: (JTA) -- The Arab summit conference of 13 kings and other Arab heads of state, meeting at Alexandria since Saturday night, and devoted almost exclusively to the mapping of plans for war against Israel, entered its last day today by adopting a three-point Egyptian program for anti-Israeli conflict. But, otherwise, the conference showed more cracks than adhesions in the Arab "united front," dispatches from Egypt reported here today.

The three-point program, formulated by Egypt's President Gamal Abdel Nasser, embodies these objectives: 1. "Liberation of Palestine from Israeli occupation"; 2. Each Arab state should submit details of its ability to contribute to the unified Arab military forces for war against Israel; 3. The joint command should submit a report on the costs involved in establishing and maintaining the unified forces.

In a meeting lasting only five minutes, held outside the conference itself, five of the participating states pledged to contribute a total of 30,000,000 pounds sterling (\$80,000,000), over a period of five years, toward the costs of the unified Arab command. The states are Saudi Arabia, Kuwait, Libya, Morocco and Yemen. The conference heard the report of these pledges and voted agreement with Nasser's suggestion that each Arab League state formulate a military plan on the basis of the three-point program.

The anti-Israel war plans were considered by the conference of utmost urgency on the theory that, as soon as the Arab states begin their project for diverting the headwaters and tributaries of the Jordan River, Israel would open an offensive against bordering Arab riparian states--Jordan, Syria and Lebanon.

Conference Seen Split; Syria, Jordan, Lebanon Mistrust Nasser

The Times of London, noting the divisions in the Arab camp and the slow pace in the effort to establish a unified Arab command, said today: "If the Arabs set the pace of their technical work on the rivers (tributary to the Jordan River) by the pace of their military expansion, the whole double process will move slowly for sometime yet. Before it is finished, desalination of sea water may have been accelerated or some other developments may have changed the balance of needs and demands by the riparian countries, including Israel."

Actually, expert observers here noted, the summit conference is split in at least four different ways. Syria has openly accused Egypt of having its controlled press "distort" the reports emanating from the conference chamber, where the sessions are presumably "secret." Syria objected to a report in Cairo's daily newspaper, Al Ahram, which said that the conference yesterday applauded an anti-Syrian speech. Al Ahram is known to be very close to Nasser.

Syria, Jordan and Lebanon are still holding back on agreement to let the unified Arab command, controlled by Egypt, station foreign Arab troops on their soil. Yesterday, these states were reported agreeing that such troops may enter their territories in case of war with Israel, but not when there is no such war. Today, they reneged even on such limited steps, insisting that they must approve the entry of foreign Arab troops onto their soil even in case of war.

Syria, Jordan and Lebanon fear that, as soon as foreign Arab troops are stationed in their countries, Israel might start a shooting war against them. They want the Jordan River tributaries and headwaters diverted, so as to injure Israel's plans for withdrawing Jordan River waters, through Lake Tiberias, to irrigate the Negev Desert. But they don't want to be attacked by Israel and be at the mercy of the Egyptian armies for military aid.

Added to these difficulties is the fact that, thus far, Saudi Arabia and Egypt have not yet been able to agree about the war between royalists and so-called republicans in Yemen. Nasser has 40,000 troops in Yemen--and Saudi Arabia wants those Egyptian forces withdrawn before it pledges further cooperation with Nasser.

PROFESSIONALS IN ISRAEL CALL OFF WORK STOPPAGE; SEEK WAGE AGREEMENT

JERUSALEM, Sept. 10; (JTA) -- Representatives of professionals in Israel called off today a planned two-hour work stoppage after a meeting with Interior Minister Moshe Shapiro. A communique issued after the talks stated there were "reasonable expectations" of reaching a satisfactory agreement on the wage claims of the professionals;

TWO ARAB INFILTRATORS FROM GAZA STRIP KILLED BY ISRAELI PATROL

TEL AVIV, Sept. 10. (JTA) -- Two Arab infiltrators from the Gaza Strip were killed last night in a clash with an Israeli patrol. Two Israeli soldiers were wounded;

The clash occurred after midnight when the patrol intercepted the two Arabs who began shooting when they were challenged. The patrol returned the fire, killing the two Arabs. Two submachineguns were found near the bodies. Another Arab infiltrator was captured last night near the Jordanian border.

GERMAN RADIO STATION TO BROADCAST DOCUMENTARIES ON ISRAELI LIFE

JERUSALEM, Sept. 10; (JTA) -- Kdl Israel, the Israeli radio network, announced today it had agreed to prepare a series of documentaries on modern Israeli life for broadcast on the Hamburg radio;

The series, entitled "Israel Today," will include reports on immigrant absorption, water problems, music, an anthology of modern Hebrew literature and roundtable discussions in German on current issues in German. The Hamburg broadcasts will start early in 1965;

MOROCCAN EXTREMISTS SEEK BOYCOTT OF FRENCH FIRM FOR DEALING WITH ISRAEL

CASABLANCA, Sept. 10. (JTA) -- The Istiqlal opposition party demanded today that the Moroccan Government add to the anti-Israel blacklist the Transatlantic Navigation Company, a French firm, because the firm has represented since September 1 two Israeli lines in France;

The party demanded that "strict measures" be taken against the company which has many offices in Morocco. Al Alam, organ of the Istiqlal party, declared that "while the Arab states are trying to stop Zionist emigration from various parts of the world, Morocco favors it and helps Zionist organizations, permitting transfer of currency toward Israel;"

PUBLICATION OF 10 YIDDISH BOOKS FOR SCHOOLS ANNOUNCED IN WARSAW

LONDON, Sept. 10; (JTA) -- The Jewish Publishing House in Warsaw has announced the publication of 10 Yiddish books for the new school year, it was reported here today from the Polish capital. The books range in scope from elementary readers to a three-volume Yiddish grammar;

Another report from Warsaw said that ORT has decided to establish a new course of study in Lodz, Poland for the training of specialists in the manufacture of knitwear. The program will include a refresher course and advisory service for those already in the field;

4,200 TEACHERS FOR JEWISH SCHOOLS LICENSED IN NEW YORK IN 35 YEARS

NEW YORK, Sept. 10; (JTA) -- More than 4,200 teachers' licenses have been issued by the Board of License--which derives its budget from New York's Jewish Education Committee--since its inception in 1929, it was reported here today. Of them, 2,275 were temporary licenses, 1,796 permanent licenses, 217 principals licenses, and 30 music teachers licenses;

The Board of License prepares and administers examinations, issues temporary and permanent licenses, sees to it that the overall teaching picture grows brighter by building status for the profession, providing better teachers, making Jewish teaching an honorable way of earning a respectable living.

The Board of License was established under the auspices of the old Jewish Education Association of N. Y. and the chairmanship of the late communal leader Bernard Semel. Today the board consists of 21 members, all outstanding veteran educators--headed by Professor Evi Scharfstein. While these members were not invited to serve as representatives of a given ideologies or type of school, they nevertheless reflect all ideologies and all types of Hebrew schools in New York City.

The Board issues a Temporary License to graduates of accredited Teachers Training Schools here or abroad, and to those who pass the annual test administered by the Board. This Temporary License is valid for three years and can be exchanged for a permanent License after representatives of this Board have visited the applicant in his classroom, observed his work and evaluated it favorably.

LARGE ISRAEL PAVILION OPENED AT U.S. WORLD TRADE FAIR IN SAN FRANCISCO

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 10; (JTA) -- An exhibition of Israeli products and services, said to be the largest of its kind ever displayed in the United States, was unveiled in a special Israeli Pavilion at the United States World Trade Fair, which opened a 10-day showing here today. Israel is one of 22 nations displaying its wares at the Fair.

Israel's exhibition constitutes the first complete participation of Israeli industry on the West Coast, and is expected to provide "great stimulus" for trade between Israel and the West Coast of the United States, according to Michael Geiger, the Israel Government trade commissioner's representative here.

The Israeli Pavilion, one of the biggest at the Fair, consists of a 5,000-square foot display, especially designed for the exhibition here by Don Gelbart, one of Israel's greatest architects. Dr. E. Justice-Dayen, director-general of the Israel Company for Fairs and Exhibitions, who is currently directing Israel's participation in eight other international fairs, came here especially this week to cooperate with Mr. Geiger in the setting up of the U.S. World Trade Fair exhibit here.

The importance attached by Israel to the Fair here was emphasized today with the announcement that Pinhas Sapir, Israel's Minister of Finance, Commerce and Industry, is coming here Monday to head a large Israel Government delegation to participate in the Fair's special Israel Day. Other Israelis prominent in Israel's economic life will join Mr. Sapir.

The delegation includes Nachum Shamir, Economic Minister of Israel to the United States; Dr. Y. Foerder, president of Bank Leumi, Israel's national bank; Dr. H. Gruenbaum, Bank Leumi's deputy director-general; Gideon Strauss, director of the bank's New York office; Dr. Y. Arnon, director-general of Israel's Ministry of Finance; Dr. Max Leron, Israel's trade commissioner to the United States; and Y. Gil, director of the New York office of the Israel Investment Authority.

Featured at the Israeli Pavilion are exhibitions by Israel's two leading banks, Bank Leumi and the Discount Bank; a demonstration of the program of the Israel Investment Authority, which is responsible for foreign investments in Israeli industry; and a section devoted to a description of the work in Israel achieved through the proceeds from the sale of Israel bonds in the United States. There are also special exhibits by the Israel Government Tourist Office, El Al Israel Airlines and the Zim Israel-America Lines.

Among the leading exhibits from Israel are displays showing the work of the country's marketing organization for industry; a demonstration of automobiles manufactured and assembled in Israel; the diamond industry; building materials; stamps, coins and medals; foodstuffs; irrigation equipment; textiles, and handicrafts.

DETROIT ALLIED JEWISH CAMPAIGN REPORTS SUCCESSFUL 1964 FUND-RAISING

DETROIT, Sept. 10. (JTA) -- The Detroit Allied Jewish Campaign of 1964 raised \$100,000 more than in the previous year for a total of \$4,650,000, it was announced here by Hyman Safran, president of the Jewish Welfare Federation. "Equally significant," he added, "is the fact that the number of contributors continues to increase and this year will pass 24,000."

Mr. Safran noted that Isidore Sobeloff, who served as the Federation executive director for 27 years before assuming a similar post this year with the Los Angeles Jewish Federation-Council, had been succeeded by William Avrunin, who had been associate director since 1948.

He reported that the Detroit Jewish community "continues to build on a solid foundation of achievement and a long record of having served our people at home, in Israel and in all parts of the world." He described the services of 55 federation agencies and beneficiaries and the federation functions of fund-raising and budgeting as more than mechanical services for efficient performance. "They are," he said, "also instruments for enriching Jewish life in all the fields in which we support: health and welfare, community relations and particularly, in the areas of education and the advancement of Jewish cultural endeavor."

Declaring that progress had been notable, he cited the launching by the Sinai Hospital of a \$6,000,000 development program to enlarge its central facilities, expand its research and teaching functions and add 130 beds for patient care. He mentioned also construction of a new facility for the Jewish Home for the aged, the expansion of the United Hebrew Schools Library, and the initiation of a Hebrew-speaking unit at Camp Tamarack.

Mr. Avrunin said that federation officers were "facing their responsibilities with sincerity and vigor" in a changing philosophy of Jewish communal services. He said that "to the simple concepts of welfare, recreation, character building and personal adjustment, we added a new dimension of Jewish content and Jewish association." He emphasized the Federation view that "the organized Jewish community and the agencies and services under its auspices are major instruments of Jewish identification and survival."

BOSTON JEWISH COUNCIL WARNS JEWS ON ELECTION CAMPAIGN APPEALS

BOSTON, Sept. 10. (JTA) -- The Jewish Community Council of Boston appealed to Jewish voters this week, in an election campaign statement, to work for the elimination of prejudice and bigotry in the current election campaign.

The statement said that the JCC had "taken note of widespread dissatisfaction with certain election campaign appeals made to religious and ethnic groups" and it urged Jews to avoid the publication and the sending of campaign advertisements and communications in which "Jewish issues exclusively are dealt with" and in which "Jewish names exclusively are signed to appeals for the election of candidates."

Another practice opposed in the statement was the use of a Jewish organizational title or affiliation in endorsement of candidates which could give "the impression that the organization mentioned itself endorsed the candidate."

Voters also were urged to "insist on ascertaining the exact content of advertisements and endorsements in advance of publication" and to "refrain from disseminating assertions about a candidate's record implying antagonism toward the Jewish community."

The statement also opposed "endorsement of individual candidates by Jewish organizations" and "the presentation of Jewish organizational awards and citations to candidates during the election campaign."

OTTAWA CLUB, ACCUSED OF BARRING JEWS, ELECTS FOUR JEWISH MEMBERS

OTTAWA, Sept. 10. (JTA) -- The Rideau Club of Ottawa, an exclusive men's club accused of barring Jewish members, announced today the unanimous election of seven new members, including four prominent Jewish residents of Ottawa.

In making the announcement, club officials said it had not been the club's practice in the past nor would it in the future make public the results of membership elections. They said they had done so in this case because of publicity about the nomination of the four Jewish leaders. It was stressed that the initiative for their nominations did not come from them.

The four Jewish leaders are Louis Rasminsky, Governor of the Bank of Canada, Lawrence Freiman, department store head and former President of the Zionist Organization of Canada, Attorney Bernard Alexander, and David Golden, former Deputy Minister of Industry.

JEWISH EX-MEMBER OF CANADIAN PROVINCIAL CABINET TO ENTER ELECTION

WINNIPEG, Sept. 10. (JTA) -- Mainland Steinkopf, the first Jewish member of a Manitoba provincial cabinet, announced today he would enter a by-election for the Manitoba legislative seat he resigned two weeks ago.

He resigned as Minister of Public Utilities in the Manitoba Cabinet, as well as from the legislature, in a controversy stemming from his role as an unpaid agent for the government in land purchases for a centennial arts project in Winnipeg.

He added he would stand for the nomination in a Winnipeg riding for the Progressive Conservative Party and that he would produce all his files on the land purchases during the campaign. The election will be held September 30.

ARIZONA HIGH SCHOOL TO OFFER CLASS IN HEBREW FOR FIRST TIME

TUCSON, Ariz., Sept. 10. (JTA) -- A class in Hebrew will be offered for the first time at Pale Verde High School when the 1964-65 school year opens this week. Norman Shapiro, a teacher at a city junior high school and a Hebrew instructor for many years at the Talmud Torah of Congregation Anshei Israel, will teach the class.

ANNUAL LITERARY AWARD ESTABLISHED BY ARGENTINE JEWISH COMMUNITY

BUENOS AIRES, Sept. 10. (JTA) -- An annual prize of 100,000 pesos to be known as the Alberdi Award, to be given each year to an author of a book "on behalf of human solidarity and living together without prejudice," was established here today by DALA, the central body of organized Argentine Jewry. The prize is named after Juan Batista Alberdi, an Argentinian patriot who drafted the basis of this country's constitution 100 years ago.

SOVIET CHESS CHAMPIONS TO PARTICIPATE IN TOURNAMENT IN ISRAEL

TEL AVIV, Sept. 10. (JTA) -- Three Soviet chess champions will participate in the world chess tournament which will be held in Tel Aviv in November. Tournament officials said that 38 countries had already registered for the competition and that the total may go over 40, which would be a record for the competition.
