AMERICAN GROUND-TO-AIR HAWK MISSILES ARRIVE IN ISRAEL; READY FOR USE

TEL AVIV, April 19. (JTA) -- The ground-to-air Hawk missiles purchased by Israel from the United States were in place today at their specially prepared Israeli bases, and are ready for use, with Israeli crews trained for the purpose in the United States, it was officially announced.

"The Hawks will increase the Israeli army's deterrent force," Prime Minister Levi Eshkol declared today, as he and Israel's other topmost defense chiefs inspected the installations.

The Hawks arrived recently at Haifa, brought to this country by a vessel owned by the El Yam Shipping Company, which had donated its services to the Government. On hand to watch the unloading of the missiles--which was done during the night--were Mr. Eshkol, Deputy Minister of Defense Shimon Peres, chief of staff Yitzhak Rabin, and other army and defense ministry officials; From the docks, the Hawks were transported to the previously prepared sites.

It took four years from the time negotiations were first started with the United States Government for the purchase of the Hawks until their arrival here, Mr. Peres noted. In the interim, Israelis were being trained in the United States for the operation of these weapons. The Hawks, he stated, would greatly strengthen Israel's anti-aircraft defense system.

Mr. Eshkol, after observing that Israel's deterrent force has now been strengthened, added: "It is our aim to deter aggression, prevent attack on Israel and, at the same time, be prepared to repulse any attack. These Hawks have been integrated into our military security line as its major deterrent weapon against the enemy air force." The missiles, he said, "are not the only babies possessed by the Israeli army. While we have them now, we shall see to it that other branches of the Israeli army are also strengthened," he declared.

NASSER SENDS PERSONAL MESSAGE TO JOHNSON; SEEKS IMPROVED RELATIONS

WASHINGTON, April 19. (JTA) -- Phillips Talbot, Assistant Secretary of State for Near Eastern Affairs, will return to Washington from his Middle East mission with a personal message from Egyptian President Nasser to President Johnson, according to an official Egyptian report from Cairo.

The Cairo report did not provide details on the contents of the Nasser message. There was speculation that it pertained to ideas for improved American-Egyptian relations and a request for \$500,000,000 aid in surplus food. Nasser has recently received personal messages from President Johnson, according to the Cairo report.

Meanwhile, State Department spokesman Robert McCloskey said here today the United States had not as yet received a new aid request from Egypt. He said that "no discussions on this subject are currently under consideration by this Government."

In answer to questions, Mr. McCloskey also said that no final determination has been made on shipment of \$37,000,000 in aid authorized for Egypt under previous agreements, which expire June 30. State Department sources, however, indicated it was likely that the aid would be provided, although the reported new request for a massive program would depend on President Johnson.

DESALINATION PLANT IN ISRAEL TO COST \$200,000,000, U. S. EXPERT SAYS

JERUSALEM, April 19. (JTA) -- The experimental plant to test the possibilities of the use of nuclear energy for seawater conversion--a joint United States-Israel project--will cost about \$200,000,000, it was indicated here today.

The estimate was made by Philip Sporn, American nuclear power expert who heads the joint America-Israel Seawater Conversion Commission, who conferred here with Premier Levi Eshkol and Finance Minister Pinhas Sapir. Mr. Sporn added that he felt the maximum United States contribution would be about \$50,000,000;

Experts said that, on the basis of those estimates, the water cost would be about 15 cents per cubic meter, but that this cost could be lowered if the United States assumed the major part of the capital costs of the project.

ANTI-SEMITISM IN AUSTRIA DENOUNCED BY CHANCELLOR AND ARCHBISHOP

VIENNA, April 19. (JTA) -- Chancellor Klaus deplored deeply in a radio address the death of Ernst Kirchweger, a Nazi concentration camp survivor, who was killed by a neo-Nazi student in one of a series of student clashes over a former Nazi who is now on the faculty of the Austrian College of World Trade. More than 10,000 Austrians joined last weekend in a continuing protest over the former Nazi professor, Taras Borodajkewicz, by participating in funeral rites for Kirchweger.

The Chancellor called anti-Semitism one of the most "horrible" manifestations of modern times and he added that the generation who knew Nazism from personal experience had a duty to tell the facts to a younger generation which knew about it only by hearsay. Declaring that Austria could not allow a relapse into the barbarism of the Hitler years, the Chancellor sharply condemned all statements which could create racial and religious prejudice among Austrian young people.

Firm denunciation of anti-Semitism was also expressed by Cardinal Franz Koenig, Austrian Archbishop, in a meeting with Chief Rabbi Akiba Eisenberg. The Archbishop promised Rabbi Eisenberg that he would order all Austrian parishes to condemn anti-Semitism from the pulpits as a grave offense against religion and law. Both religious dignitaries are expected to meet again later this spring.

Although Prof. Borodajkewicz denies he is still a Nazi, his lectures contain anti-Jewish innuendoes; Jewish groups and resistance organizations have demanded his dismissal and student friends and foes of the professor have met in violent clashes over the issue. Kirchweger was slain in one of those clashes and police have arrested Gunter Kumel, who admitted he struck the 67-year-old victim.

FIVE-DAY EUROPEAN CONFERENCE OF JEWISH YOUTH HELD IN WEST BERLIN

BERLIN, April 19; (JTA) -- The first international Jewish youth conclave in Germany since the Hitler era was held in West Berlin for five days and was devoted to discussions about the problems of the existing Jewish community in Germany. Some 60 youth leaders have attended the Inter-European Conference of Jewish Youth.

Rabbi Gunther Hirschberg of New York, who was born in Berlin, and who was the only American rabbi participating in the conference, spoke at the Sabbath Evening Service of the Liberal Synagogue in Berlin which the youth leaders attended. The conference, which had representation from Britain, Holland, West Germany and other countries, was organized by the Reform World Union for Progressive Judaism.

The program included seminars and discussions with German and Jewish secular authorities and talks with the theologians at the Free University of Berlin. The youth leaders reviewed the political situation developing from the extension of the West German statute of limitations for prosecution of Nazi war criminals.

SDEH BOKER BANS ESTABLISHMENT OF GERMAN-ISRAELI CENTER IN KIBBUTZ

TEL AVIV, April 19. (JTA) -- The Kibbutz Sdeh Boker, where former Prime Minister David Ben-Gurion lives as a member of the collective settlement, is opposed to the establishment of a West German-Israeli "Friendship Center" there, the secretary of the kibbutz announced today.

He confirmed a report printed in the Hamburg illustrated newspaper, Der Spiegel, which had stated that Mr. Ben-Gurion supported the idea of such a cultural center in Sdeh Boker, to have been constructed by a German Protestant youth group. According to the Kibbutz secretary, however, the collective had earlier adopted a resolution opposing the presence there of any German group. "Unless this resolution is reversed," he stated, "there is no place there for further discussion of the project."

EICHMANN'S PROSECUTOR ENUMERATES CRIMES OF NAZIS WHO ARE STILL FREE

NEW YORK, April 19. (JTA) -- There are no ex-Nazis, but just a lot of free ones who must be apprehended, tried and punished, Gideon Hausner, former Attorney General of Israel and Eichmann's prosecutor states in an article published in the current issue of Esquire.

Mr. Hausner enumerates the crimes of some of the major Nazi criminals who are still at large. Also, he reviews the history of anti-Semitism in Germany that pre-dated Hitler; the present attitude toward the prosecution of Nazis; and the political implications of the cutoff date for new prosecutions.

JEWISH AGENCY EXECUTIVE TO START PLENARY SESSION NEXT WEEK

JERUSALEM, April 19. (JTA) -- The Jewish Agency executive announced today that a plenary session will be held from April 26 through May 2 with the participation of American members and Dr. Nahum Goldmann. Dr. Israel Goldstein told the executive that Britain's Keren Hayesod drive will bring a total of 2,350,000 pounds (\$6,550,000), which he said would be an increase of 100,000 pounds (\$280,000) over the previous year.

JEWISH LIFE IN U. S. TO BE PRESENTED IN RADIO BROADCASTS IN ISRAEL

NEW YORK, April 19. (JTA) -- Kol Yisroel, Israel's radio network, and the Council of Jewish Federations and Welfare Funds are cooperating to develop a pilot radio program which, if successful, will represent the first in a series to be broadcast in Israel on Jewish life in North America, it was reported here today.

Israeli radio executives are completing this pilot project in an attempt to answer some of their listeners' questions about the United States and Canada--about American-Jewish identification, Jewish commitment, Jewish communal organization and Jewish youth.

Work on this project began late in January when an Israeli program representative in this country met with executives of the CJFWF in New York. Early in February, the Council contacted two organizations in Essex County, New Jersey--the Jewish Community Council and the Jewish Education Association. These, in turn, developed a program plan involving students enrolled in local Jewish and Hebrew schools and a group studying at various nearby colleges.

Actual taping began about three weeks ago. Childish voices sang Hebrew songs, older children discussed life in Israel, a still older group demonstrated its knowledge of some of the ethical questions posed in the Bible, and Hebrew teachers-in-training discussed the work of a distinguished Hebrew poet. All of the above scenes were produced in Hebrew.

But a single segment was prepared in English with Hebrew narration to be added. This was a discussion among several college students concerning Jewish identification in America in 1965. The Jewish college students were all members of Atid, the college youth group of the United Synagogue of America. They considered such matters as assimilation, mixed marriages and the question of the relationship to Israel of American Jewry.

This English portion will be reproduced and distributed to student and parent groups as an aid to further community discussions of these questions. The different segments of the program will be united through a running "Huntley-Brinkley" type of exchange between Dr. Elijan Bortnicker, executive director of the Jewish Education Association, and a staff member of Kol Yisroel stationed in this country. If this pilot is successful, the remainder of the series will be produced on location in communities throughout the United States and Canada.

CUBAN JEWISH COMMUNITY ACKNOWLEDGES RECEIVING MATZOH FROM CANADA

MONTREAL, April 19. (JTA) -- The Canadian Jewish Congress today received confirmation that a special relief shipment of Passover supplies sent to the Cuban Jewish community has been safely received.

Sigmund Unterberg, assistant treasurer of the Canadian Jewish Congress, said that the Canadian Jewish Congress has been sending relief Passover supplies to Cuba since 1961 in response to urgent appeals from the Jewish community there. "In Cuba," he explained, "practical considerations make it extremely difficult for Jews to manufacture these supplies and, in order to ensure that the Cuban Jewish community can observe Passover in the traditional manner, Canadian Jewry has come to its rescue by sending kosher Passover supplies."

The shipment, which was sent by boat from Halifax on March 31, comprised 13,000 pounds of matzoh, 4,000 pounds of matzoh meal, 1,500 pounds of canned meat, 1,400 bottles of wine, 3,000 pounds of oil and a quantity of tea and horse radish. "Although the Cuban Jewish community is relatively small," Mr. Unterberg said, "it is gratifying for Canadian Jewry to know that they can help their brethren overseas in a most positive way."

ROCKWELL ADDRESSES 2,800 STUDENTS AT OHIO UNIVERSITY; IS RIDICULED

ATHENS, Ohio, April 19. (JTA) -- George Lincoln Rockwell, leader of the American Nazi Party, addressed 2,800 students of Ohio University here and was subjected to derisive laughter. He then complained that he had "a totally different reception here than at any other of the 40 or 50 schools where I have spoken."

Rockwell had been invited to the campus by the residents of Bush Hall, a men's dormitory, as part of a program to raise money for a scholarship fund. University officials had refused requests by some students and faculty members, as well as by Jacob Mirviss, director of the Hillel Foundation here, to bar his appearance. The officials held that the students are entitled to "an open and free campus."

Dr. David Levinson, professor of economics, had advocated picketing Rockwell but, at the request of Mr. Mirviss, Jewish and other anti-Rockwell students pledged not to picket or to throw eggs at the Nazi. The lecture went off peacefully, but when many of the students laughed at him, Rockwell said: "Next year, I will run for Governor of Virginia, then you will laugh out of the other sides of your mouths."

As soon as Rockwell had finished, another faculty member, Prof. Ernest M. Collins, of the Political Science Department, told the students from the same platform "Rockwell is well versed in the art of villification and misinterpretation."

ANNIVERSARY OF UPRISING IN WARSAW GHETTO COMMEMORATED IN POLAND

WARSAW, April 19. (JTA) -- The 22nd anniversary of the Jewish uprising against the Nazi army in the Warsaw Ghetto was commemorated here today with a mass-pilgrimage to the Monument of the Ghetto Fighters, the work of the famous sculptor Nathan Rapaport, which stands in the section of the city where the Jews put up their heroic fight against the German military might. The participants then marched in silence through the streets named for Mordecai Anilewicz and Josef Levartowsky, the leaders of the ghetto revolt, and proceeded to the street named "The Road of the Ghetto Fighters."

The Polish Ministry of Culture agreed here today that a special Jewish exhibit be erected at the site of the former Auschwitz concentration camp, and that Israel be represented on the committee to plan the Jewish exhibit. The agreement was made between the Ministry and Stehan Grajek, head of Israel's delegation to an assembly held here by the International Conference of the Auschwitz Organization and Underground Fighters.

Five European countries in addition to Israel were represented at the assembly, where the establishment of several exhibits was discussed as part of the permanent shrine at Auschwitz. Mr. Grajek, who had urged the planning of a Jewish exhibit at the former murder camp for the last two years, was elected a member of the Conference executive committee.

Anniversary of Jewish Revolt in Warsaw Ghetto Observed in New York

NEW YORK, April 19. (JTA) -- Several thousand persons attended a mass-meeting here tonight, under the auspices of a number of Jewish labor groups, commemorating the anniversary of the Warsaw Ghetto rebellion against the Nazi army and the 6,000,000 victims of Hitler's holocaust.

The meeting was arranged jointly by the Jewish Labor Committee, the Workmen's Circle, the Jewish Labor Bund, Jewish Socialist Varband and the United Survivors of Jewish Persecution.

ISRAEL TECHNION GETS OVER \$1,000,000 BEQUEATHED BY U. S. PHILANTHROPIST

NEW YORK, April 19. (JTA) -- Executors of the estate of Meyer Gold today presented the American Society for Technion-Israel Institute of Technology, Inc., which provides financial and technical assistance to Technion-Israel Institute of Technology in Haifa, with a check for \$163,000 and securities valued in excess of \$700,000. Together with specific bequests at the time of his death in 1960, gifts received by the American Technion Society from Meyer Gold will total over \$1,000,000.

The presentation was made at the Technion office to Horace W. Goldsmith, treasurer of the American Technion Society, and Col. J. R. Elyachar, honorary president of the American Technion Society, and by attorney Sydney L. Weintraub of Miami, one of the co-executors of the estate of Meyer Gold.

Maurice M. Rosen, president of the American Technion Society, said the Technion in Haifa will utilize the funds from the bequest for the establishment of the "Meyer Gold Library Wing" on the campus of the Institute, occupying a 300-acre site on Mount Carmel, and also for the setting up of a permanent endowment fund to provide a continuing source of funds for the acquisition of new technical books, periodicals and other library materials.

ISRAEL YOUNGSTER DESIGNS ELECTRONIC COMPUTER; WILL DISPLAY IT IN U. S.

NEW YORK, April 19. (JTA) -- A 16-year-old Israeli high school student faced a press conference here today and explained to newsmen the workings of a digital, electronic computer which he had designed and built, and will display next month at the National Science Fair-International, to be held at St. Louis.

The boy is Zvi Klein, a sixth-grade pupil at the Rehovoth Secondary School. He was the winner of this year's annual Israeli science model contest. The Fair at St. Louis is to be conducted under the auspices of Science Service, sponsored by the National Academy of Sciences; the National Science Research Council, the American Association for the Advancement of Science, the E. W. Scripps Estate and the American journalistic profession.

Young Klein described his computer as an elementary adding and subtracting machine with a capacity of two digits, able to perform any number of both operations in any order within certain limits. His electronic circuitry comprises 968 assorted components. The contest among Israeli high school students aged 14 to 18, was conducted by the Weizmann Institute of Science, in the boy's home town of Rehovoth, in cooperation with El Al Israel Airlines.

FOUNDATION UNDERWRITES RECORDINGS OF SHOLEM ALEICHEM FOR THE BLIND

NEW YORK, April 19. (JTA) -- The entire collected works of Sholem Aleichem, in Yiddish, consisting of 16 volumes, are being recorded for the blind on long-playing high-fidelity discs by the Jewish Braille Institute of America, it was announced here by Mrs. Harry J. Finke, president of the organization.

Made possible through a grant from the Morris Morgenstern Foundation, the project will take several years to complete and, it is estimated, will require approximately 225 records with a total of 450 sides.
