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## ISRAEL ENVOY ARRIVES IN GERMANY; SEES MISSION AS 'MILESTONE'

BONN, Aug. 17: (JTA) -- Asher Ben-Nathan, former director-general of Israel's Ministry of Defense, arrived at the Bonn-Cologne airport yesterday to take up his duties as Israel's first Ambassador to West Germany. In a brief statement -- read first in German, then repeated in English and in French -- he declared he saw his mission here as "a further milestone on the road toward a better future which will bring lasting peace and understanding between our two people." He added that, "deeply aware" of the significance of his mission on German soil, he looked forward to his tasks here "with great expectation."

Mr. Ben-Nathan noted also in his airport statement that he realized he was carrying a heavy responsibility and that Israel could not forget "the past." However, he expressed the hope that the relations between Israel and the Federal Republic of Germany would insure that "the past" would not be repeated.

Ehrenfried von Holleben, chief of protocol of the German Foreign Ministry, formally greeted Israel's envoy. Several leaders of the German Jewish community were also present to receive him. A few dozen spectators watched the brief ceremony from an airport balcony, since, as a matter of security, police allowed no one but Government officials, invited guests and journalists on the field.

Karl-Guenther von Hase, chief spokesman for the Government, issued a statement later saying that, with the arrival of Mr. Ben-Nathan here and last week's arrival in Israel of Dr. Rolf Pauls, Bonn's Ambassador to Israel, "preconditions have been created for good and objective cooperation" between the two governments.

Mr. Ben-Nathan was accompanied by his wife and their two children, Amnon, 17, and Miriam, 10. He was driven to a hotel in Cologne, 20 miles north of the city, where he will make his home temporarily until Israel's new Embassy is completed at Bad Godesberg, a suburb south of the capital.

The Israeli envoy is expected to present his letters of credence to President Heinrich Lübke on August 24 or 25. Today, he made his first visit to a West German official, paying a courtesy call on Dr. Karl Carstens, State Secretary of the Foreign Ministry and acting Minister in the absence of Foreign Minister Gerhard Schroeder.

## PICKETING PLANNED FOR PAULS CEREMONY; DEMONSTRATIONS CONTINUE

JERUSALEM, Aug. 17: (JTA) -- A wide variety of former partisans, ghetto fighters and representatives of all political parties except Premier Levi Eshkol's Mapai announced today plans to stage protest demonstrations here when Dr. Rolf Pauls, West Germany's first Ambassador to Israel, presents his credentials to President Zalman Shazar. The presentation ceremonies will probably be held Thursday.

The demonstrators plan to picket the route expected to be used by Dr. Pauls in the center of Jerusalem, leading to the President's House, where the ceremony will be held.

In the continuing demonstrations against the establishment of diplomatic relations between the two countries, the leftist Mapam Party sponsored a march last night. Several scores of placard-carrying youths marched through one of the main streets of Jerusalem, demonstrating against Dr. Pauls and urging "remembrance," a term used in reference to the Nazi genocide of European Jewry.

After the demonstrators finished their scheduled and approved march, they turned to other streets and began disrupting traffic. Several of the youths went to the home of Mrs. Golda Meir, Israel's Foreign Minister, and sang the national anthem, Hatikvah. Police restored quiet, but made no arrests.

Protest rallies and marches have been held in half a dozen cities since Dr. Pauls arrived last week. Arrests have been made in a number of the protests, mostly on charges of disturbing the peace and defacing public property. Some of the youth group demonstrators painted Stars of David with a "J" in the center, recalling the emblem the Nazis forced their Jewish victims to wear, on walls in several cities.

# MAPAI COURT OF HONOR SUMMONS DAVID BEN-GURION FOR HEARING TODAY

TEL AVIV, Aug. 17: (JTA) -- The Mapai Party Court of Honor, which is hearing arguments for expelling Former Premier David Ben-Gurion and six of his followers for forming an independent Workers List for the November Parliamentary elections, decided today to summon the former Prime Minister and two of his followers to testify;

A. Shapiro, the attorney representing the Mapai Secretariat, said, "I want them here to tell us what Rafi (the Ben-Gurion Israel Workers List) is, why they are against the party, and why they defame it." He added that he would prove that Rafi actually was a separate party;

Micha Kaspi, representing Rafi, said that the former Premier did not have to appear before the prosecution ended its presentation. The court agreed to call Mr. Ben-Gurion, and two of his Rafi supporters, Yizhar Smilansky and Hanna Lamdan, to the next meeting of the tribunal tomorrow;

At the third session yesterday, the court overruled a series of objections raised by Rafi advocates concerning the competence of the court and its composition. Shimon Peres, who resigned as Deputy Defense Minister earlier this year to back Mr. Ben-Gurion's challenge to Premier Eshkol's leadership of the party and the nation, had contended at the first session that two of the five Court of Honor judges were not impartial;

## ARABS REPORTED GIVING JORDAN \$32, 200, 000 FOR WATER DIVERSION

LONDON, Aug. 17: (JTA) -- Iraq has paid Jordan 750, 000 pounds sterling (\$2, 100, 000) toward the construction of the Mukheiba Dam, scheduled to begin next month, as part of the plan to divert the waters of the Jordan River. This was reported here today by the Times of London from Amman;

According to the report, Jordan received a joint contribution of 11, 000, 000 pounds sterling (\$30, 800, 000) from other Arab states. An Egyptian company has reportedly been awarded the contract to construct the dam at a cost of 11, 500, 000 pounds sterling (\$32, 200, 000);

## ARABS CHEER ESHKOL, PRAISE ISRAEL BUT PRESENT FURTHER DEMANDS

TEL AVIV, Aug. 17: (JTA) -- Thousands of Arab residents of small villages in the "Triangle," in Galilee, enthusiastically applauded Premier Levi Eshkol at a reception given in his honor today at the village of Taybeh. Praising at great length the benefits they had received from the Israel Government in the economic field -- water, electricity, telephones, schools and clinics -- presented several demands, asking for "equality with Jewish villages."

Premier Eshkol said he hoped for the day peace would come to the Middle East "and, together with the Arabs, we can declare war on poverty and ignorance, conquer wastelands and fight the ravages of nature." He described the progress made in the past, adding, "let it be a guarantee for the future."

## 'CONCISE ENGLISH DICTIONARY' REMOVES TERMS OFFENSIVE TO JEWS

LONDON, Aug. 17: (JTA) -- Odhams Press Ltd., one of the largest publishing firms in Britain, acted swiftly today to carry out a pledge to remove from its "Concise English Dictionary" slurring definitions of Jews.

The Glasgow Jewish Times had sent a protest earlier this month to Odhams director C. K. Jones, noting that the dictionary definition of Jews include the synonyms of "extortionist, bargainer, moneylender" and used the word as a verb, meaning "to cheat, outwit." Mr. Jones promised immediate action;

Today the firm notified the Jewish newspaper that several thousand copies of the dictionary, scheduled for delivery this month, were being amended, as were all unbound copies in stock in the publishing plant;

The amended definition for Jew reads: "A member of the Hebrew branch of the Semitic race; Israelite; believer in the Hebrew religion." Mr. Jones said that the change "will involve us in considerable expense" and added: "It is something we willingly undertake. In our lifetime, anti-Semitism has brought death to millions and untold misery to hosts who survived. We will not wittingly lend our support to racial or religious discrimination."

Jewish circles here expressed satisfaction with the publisher's decision to amend a wrong. Morris Linden, editor of the Glasgow Jewish newspaper, was lauded for having initiated the protest to Odhams Press;

# HADASSAH URGES U.S.A. TO PROTECT FIRMS OPPOSED TO ARAB BOYCOTT

NEW YORK, Aug 17. (JTA) -- Hadassah, the women's Zionist organization of America, urged the United States Government today to implement a new law aimed at protecting American business firms from being forced to engage in the Arab boycott against Israel. The action was taken at the 51st annual Hadassah convention which also featured the presentation to Vice-President Hubert H. Humphrey of the 1965 Henrietta Szold Award the organization's highest honor.

The new law is an amendment to the 1959 Export Control Act, enacted into law earlier this year. It would protect American firms from being compelled to take part in any foreign boycott against countries friendly to the United States, but it leaves implementation to the President. The Hadassah resolution also called on local chambers of commerce throughout the United States to ask American firms "not to cooperate" in such "restrictive trade practices or boycotts."

During the sessions today, the third day of the four-day conclave, the delegates also approved a resolution urging a continuing program of "public action and protest, designed to bring the facts of Soviet anti-Semitism to the attention of the American Government and people and to the attention of the Soviet Government."

Charging that "abundant evidence" existed that the Soviet Government is "still maintaining a policy aimed at the spiritual and cultural extinction of Soviet Jews," the delegates declared that despite some recent concessions, Soviet Jews were "still deprived of the means and institutions to maintain their cultural and religious heritage and to transmit it to their children." The resolution added that "this violation of elemental human rights will not be accepted in silence by a generation that has in its own lifetime learned the fearful price of silence."

## Humphrey Honored for Sponsorship of Medical Research; Gets \$1,000 Prize

The Henrietta Szold Award, which carries with it a prize of \$1,000, was given to Mr. Humphrey with a citation lauding him for "advancing the idea of freedom" and for "active sponsorship and energetic encouragement of national and international medical research." Medical research in various countries, including Israel, and sponsorship of the Hadassah-Hebrew University Medical Center in Jerusalem, are among the major Hadassah achievements.

The award was presented to the Vice-President by Mrs. Herman Shulman, chairman of the women's organization's award committee, at tonight's convention dinner. In accepting the award, Mr. Humphrey paid tribute to Miss Szold, saying he felt she would have been "very much at home in America of 1965 because today we are building the free and compassionate society she worked for all her life."

At another session, Dr. Moshe Davis, director of the Institute of Contemporary Jewry in Jerusalem, and former provost of the Jewish Theological Seminary of America, told the delegates that the present generation of Jews was probably the most educated in history in general studies, and perhaps "the least literate" in Jewish learning. He said this fact posed the challenge to Jewish educators and leaders to discover new formulas "to interpret and transmit the eternal universal and particular values of the Jewish tradition" to such a Jewish generation.

Dr. Davis said that the fact that religious pluralism was taking root in the United States offered Jews "a singular opportunity to play a distinctive role on the world scene" for, while the Jews are a people, "the special quality of their group expression derives from the religious basis." He stressed that religion "will be the only bridge between American Jewry and other world communities, and between them and Israel." The real hope, therefore, for cohesiveness between Jews in Israel and Jews in other countries, he contended, "is to find the religio-cultural thread which will be the unifying factor."

He also appealed for more immigration from American Jewry to Israel, asserting that "a Jewish community that wants to be part of the mainstream of the Jewish tradition should inspire a portion of its numbers to want to go to Jerusalem. Otherwise, it may not succeed in becoming a Jewish community at all." He urged American Jewry to reintroduce the concept that "we should direct ourselves and our young to spend at least a portion of our life in the Holy Land."

I. L. Kenen, executive director of the American Israel Public Affairs Committee, told the delegates that, if the United States could not stop the Middle East arms race because "the Soviet Union insists on using surplus weapons for political currency, then we must ask our Government to adopt a frank and open policy to strengthen Israel's deterrent capacity." Noting statements by President Nasser of Egypt that war with Israel was inevitable, and that he was acquiring growing quantities of arms from Russia "to fight that

war," Mr. Kenen said that the United States "should do everything it can to make it harder for him -- and nothing to make it easier." He added that, before the United States resumed economic aid to Egypt, "it should insist that Nasser cease the accumulation of weapons and once and for all give up his wars against his neighbors."

Dr. Miriam K. Freund, chairman of the Hadassah Zionist Affairs committee, stated in another address that Hadassah worked for the day when Arabs and Israelis would join to advance the interests of all Middle East peoples. "We hope," she declared, "that our Government will contribute its great prestige and leadership" to induce the Arabs to meet with Israel for peace talks."

Mrs. Harry P. Fierst, Hadassah Jewish National Fund chairman, reported that Hadassah had started a three-year program to raise \$2,500,000 for a 2,200-acre project, "Hadassah Ha-Galil," to be located near the Lebanese border. She said it was of vital importance to Israel's security that this land in the central Galilee be reclaimed, that roads and homes be built, and industries be developed for Jewish settlers. She reported that the JNF planned to develop two new towns in Hadassah Ha-Galil, Nahalot and Jar-miel.

#### JOHNSON ANNOUNCES GRANT TO HADASSAH-HEBREW U. MEDICAL CENTER

WASHINGTON, D.C., Aug. 17: (JTA) -- President Johnson announced today that the United States Department of Health, Education and Welfare had made a grant of \$176,400 to the Hadassah-Hebrew Medical Center, in Jerusalem, to establish an artificial kidney center.

#### \$80,000 GRANT TO FINANCE SPECIAL STUDIES AT WEIZMANN INSTITUTE

NEW YORK, Aug. 17: (JTA) -- A grant of \$80,000 to the Weizmann Institute of Science by D. Kaltman & Co. Inc., a pharmaceutical company, to be used over a two-year period for the development of medical applications of ferromagnetic materials, was announced here today. The research work will be carried out under the direction of Professor E. H. Frei, head of the Institute's Electronics Department.

#### AMERICANS PLEDGE MULTI-MILLION 'BIBLE LAND' PROJECT IN ISRAEL

TEL AVIV, Aug. 17: (JTA) -- A check of \$100,000, the first installment of several million dollars to go toward building a "Bible land" on a five-acre plot on the outskirts of Holon, a suburb of Tel Aviv, was presented today to the town's mayor, Pinhas Eylon, by Emanuel Henigman, of Memphis, Tenn. His colleague in the project, Asfran Wilensky, of Jacksonville, Fla., pledged to raise the rest of the money by 1970.

#### ISRAEL BONDS LEADERS DISCUSS EXPANSION WITH CABINET MEMBERS

JERUSALEM, Aug. 17: (JTA) -- Talks between top officials of the Israel Bonds Organization and Cabinet Ministers for expansion of the bond organization, which began here last night, continued today.

Participants included Samuel Rothberg, of Peoria, Ill., national campaign chairman; Louis Boyar, of Los Angeles, chairman of the Bonds Organization board of governors; Dr. Joseph J. Schwartz, executive vice-president; and Finance Minister Pinhas Sapir, Commerce Minister Haim Zadak, and other Cabinet members.

#### CONSERVATIVE TEMPLE DROPS NON-KOSHER PRACTICE AFTER EXPULSION

NEW YORK, Aug. 17: (JTA) -- One of two California congregations disaffiliated from the United Synagogue of America for permitting non-kosher foods in their synagogues, has halted the practice and applied for reinstatement, an official of the Conservative congregational organization said today.

The Pasadena Jewish Temple and Center of Pasadena, and the New Foothill Jewish Temple and Center in Arcadia, Calif., were ousted from membership in the United Synagogue for the violations. The ousters, in July, followed several months of negotiations to obtain an end of the practice.

Dr. Bernard Segal, executive director of the United Synagogue, said that the Pasadena congregation reacted to the disaffiliation with a notice that it had dropped the practice of having a non-kosher caterer serve the congregation, and was applying for re-admission. The executive added that the usual investigation had been ordered, and reinstatement would follow when the congregation's action in ending non-kosher service had been confirmed.

Dr. Segal said that a total of about 18 congregations have been disaffiliated during the 52-year history of the United Synagogue, 15 for permitting bingo. Conduct unbecoming a congregation is the third cause for ousting a congregation, he said.
