PRELATE PREDICTS ECUMENICAL COUNCIL APPROVAL OF DOCUMENT ON JEWS

TEL AVIV, Sept. 7: (JTA) -- Archbishop George Hakim, head of the Greek Catholic Community in Israel, expressed the belief today that the draft declaration on Catholic-Jewish relations would receive final approval at the fourth and last session of the Ecumenical Council opening on September 14: A strong document, explicitly denying any guilt for the Jewish people, past and present, in the death of Jesus was provisionally approved by an overwhelming majority at the close of the Council's third session last winter.

Archbishop Hakim, who will leave this week for the final session at the Vatican said that the document would probably be amended somewhat but that the "essence of the satisfactory text adopted last year will be maintained."

ISRAEL'S RAID INTO JORDAN WORRIES THREE ARAB STATES, PARIS REPORTS

PARIS, Sept. 7: (JTA) -- Jordan, Lebanon and Syria have shown "great anxiety" over the "apparent certainty" that Israel will respond militarily to any further attacks against its territory by Arab terrorists, Le Monde reported here today in a dispatch from Beirut: The three governments of the Arab states adjacent to Israel are worried, Le Monde reported, over the implications of Israel's raid, last Saturday night, against a Jordanian base in reprisal for El Fatah raids which blew up a water pump in an Israeli settlement near the Jordanian border: In the retaliatory action, Israel blasted 11 pumping stations and irrigation installations near Kalkilia, on the Jordanian side of the frontier.

The governments in Beirut, Amman and Damascus now feel, according to the dispatch, that, in the future, Israel's response "to Arab terrorist attacks will consist of direct military action against the territory of the state from which the attacks are launched."

Le Monde reported that the security forces of Jordan and Lebanon were seriously worried also by the activities of El Fatah and planned repressive measures against it; Syria was reported to be the only Arab country which backs El Fatah, whose members consist mainly of Palestinian Arab refugees: The newspaper reported that the other Arab countries were doing their best to discourage El Fatah activities which might provoke a serious clash between them and Israel.

French political circles were understood not to have been surprised by the Israeli reprisal raid: In recent weeks, the Israeli Embassy here has maintained continuous contact with the French Foreign Ministry, keeping it informed of terrorist attacks on Israeli territory: French officials were understood to have presumed that Israel might launch an operation to discourage future raids on its territory.

ESHKOL, BEN-GURION LEAD LISTS AS ISRAEL PARTIES NAME CANDIDATES

JERUSALEM, Sept. 7: (JTA) -- Israel's major parties made public today the names of the candidates for the November 3 Parliamentary elections which they hope will have maximum voter appeal in the new situation created by the first split in the long-dominant Mapai Party: The split was signaled by the entry of a competing Israel Workers' List (Rafi), led by former Premier David Ben-Gurion, challenging the national and party leadership of Prime Minister Levi Eshkol.

The Mapai list, as expected, was headed by Premier Eshkol, Knesset Speaker Kadish Luz, Foreign Minister Golda Meir, followed by the other Mapai Cabinet ministers: Three "new faces" were listed among the first 36 Mapai places -- Aryeh Elfav, Zeev Sharaf and Zvi Dinstein, special adviser to the Defense Minister: Mr. Dinstein in effect replaced Deputy Defense Minister Shimon Peres, who resigned in support of Mr. Ben-Gurion: Mapai secretary Reuven Barkat is another new name on the Mapai list.

First place on the new Rafi list went, as expected to Mr. Ben-Gurion: Others in order are: Yizhar Smilansky, Mr. Peres, Matilda Ghez, former Housing Minister Yosef Almogi, Yitzhak Navon, former Agriculture Minister Moshe Dayan and former Chief of Staff Zvi Tsuri: A Rafi spokesman hinted yesterday that a return to the Premiership by Ben-Gurion was not a prior condition to Rafi's joining a future coalition: Two former

Chiefs of Staff, Haim Laskov and Mordecai Maklef, closed the Mapai list; The Rafi list was closed by former Chief of Staff Yaacov Dori. Thus five former Chiefs of Staff appear on the two lists.

Religious Parties Reject Common Front, Offer Separate Tickets

Israel's three religious groups -- National Religious Party, Agudat Israel and Poale Agudat Israel -- will run separate tickets; Negotiations for a united religious front failed after the Council of Sages advised Agudat Israel against participation in such a front;

Top places on the list of the National Religious Party (Mizrachi-Hapoel Hamizrachi) went as expected to such key figures as Health Minister Moshe Shapiro, Social Welfare Minister Yosef Burg, and Religious Affairs Minister Zoran Warnhaftig. The party said that Yitzhak Rafael, former Deputy Health Minister, had not been placed on the list because he had been associated with a scandal in the Health Ministry in which a high official was sentenced to prison for allegedly receiving kickbacks from contractors. Mr. Rafael resigned to clear his name;

Achdut Avodah's list, which will be offered as an alignment slate with Mapai, included most key leaders in the outgoing Knesset; The list included Israel Galili, Gen. Yigal Allon, Moshe Carmel, Mordechai Bibi, Ruth Hektin, Zeev Tsur and Moshe Erem;

The joint Herut-Liberal list (Gahal) included Yosef Sapir, Elimelech Rimalt, Yosef Serlin, Mordechai Stern and Prof. Hans Klinghoffer. The Herut candidates for the joint list included all party leaders, headed by Menahem Beigin and Yohanan Bader. The list did not include Aryeh Altman, Nachum Levin and Binyamin Arditi, all members of the Fifth Knesset;

The left-wing Mapam, an opposition party, was the first to complete its list, which was announced last week; The list was featured by an effort to give a "new look" to its candidate offering. Four of the first nine places, considered certain of election were given to new candidates;

ISRAELI ENVOY'S TALK WITH GERMAN CHANCELLOR POSTPONED TO NEXT WEEK

BONN, Sept. 7: (JTA) -- Informed sources here said today that the scheduled first meeting between Chancellor Ludwig Erhard and Asher Ben-Nathan, the Israeli Ambassador, would not be held before the West German Parliamentary elections, next week;

The Israeli envoy meanwhile continued his visits to West German officials and institutions; He met today with Ludwig Rosenberg, head of the West German Trade Union, which has 5,000,000 members; Previously he met for an hour with A. Westrick, West German Minister for Special Affairs, who is considered Chancellor Erhard's special political adviser;

DR. YAACOV HERZOG, OF ISRAEL, GIVES UP POST OF BRITISH CHIEF RABBI

LONDON, Sept. 7: (JTA) -- The office of the British Chief Rabbinate Council announced in a formal statement today that Dr. Yaacov Herzog, of Jerusalem, had informed the Council that, for reasons of health, he would be unable to assume the post of British Commonwealth Chief Rabbi. He was named to the post last May, and was to have assumed his duties in November;

(In Jerusalem, it was reported today, that Dr. Herzog recently underwent a difficult abdominal operation. Dr. Herzog was absent from Jerusalem, and was not available for comment on the London announcement;)

The announcement came as a shock to British Jewry but affected British Jewish organizations refrained from any immediate comment; The apartment in which Dr. Herzog had planned to live as Chief Rabbi, near St. John's Wood Synagogue, had been renovated and prepared for his use;

It was learned that no move will be made to name a replacement for Dr. Herzog before the High Holy Days; It was indicated that it would take between six months and a year for the necessary steps for naming a new Chief Rabbi;

The formal announcement by Alfred H. Silverman, Council secretary, said that the Council had received "with deep regret" a communication from Dr. Herzog, "intimating that, owing to serious deterioration of his health, he is unable on medical advice to undertake the post of Chief Rabbi of the United Hebrew Congregations of the British Commonwealth of Nations, to which he was appointed last May 31;"

Chief Rabbi Israel Brodie, whom Dr. Herzog was scheduled to succeed in November, retired last June after serving in the post since 1948;

12 EX-NAZIS ON TRIAL FOR KILLING THOUSANDS OF JEWS IN SOBIBOR CAMP

HAGEN, Germany, Sept. 7: (JTA) -- Twelve ex-Nazis went on trial here today on charges of helping to kill thousands of Jews at the Sobibor concentration camp, near Lublin, Poland, during the Second World War.

Among the defendants is Hermann Lambert, who was sentenced to four years' imprisonment last week for his role in the mass killing of Jews at the Treblinka death camp. Another defendant, Kurt Bolender, 53, is charged with at least 360 murders and complicity in 86,000 others; Karl Frenzel, 54, is accused of 42 murders and 250,000 counts of complicity; Franz Wolf, 52, is charged with one murder and complicity in 115,000 others.

SURVIVORS OF BERGEN-BELSEN THANK BRITISH FOR AIDING REHABILITATION

LONDON, Sept. 7: (JTA) -- Former British Prime Minister Anthony Eden, now the Earl of Avon, paid tribute here last night to the survivors of the Bergen-Belsen Nazi death camp and to the British medical officers and British troops who labored to save the surviving inmates when the camp was liberated.

He was the guest of honor at a dinner given by Joseph and Hadassah Rosensaft, to mark the 20th anniversary of the liberation of the murder camp and to thank the British people publicly, for the first time, for helping to rehabilitate the inmates. The dinner was given on behalf of the World Union of Belsen Survivors, of which Mr. Rosensaft is president.

Mr. Rosensaft lauded "all those liberated inmates who worked with unmatched courage and devotion to save those of their fellows who could still be saved." He also thanked the British "who dedicated themselves to salvaging lives," and recalled that "a number of those who came to help died on duty after contracting typhus, and they are buried with the victims of the Nazis."

BRAZILIAN NEWSPAPER LINKS ZIONIST YOUTH GROUP WITH 'NAZI' RACISM

RIO DE JANEIRO, Sept. 7: (JTA) -- The Confederation of Jewish Communities of Brazil protested today against a daily newspaper published in Recife, capital of the State of Pernambuco, which charged that Jewish youth organizations advocating Zionism, strengthening of Jewish education and Jewish emigration to Israel are "conspiring" to advocate "Nazi, racist" theories.

According to officials of the Confederation, the management of the newspaper, Jornal do Comercio, has declared that the "conspiratorial" document emanating from Zionist youth groups had been "forced" on the editors by "highest police authorities," and that Brazilian security agents are now "probing" the activities of the Zionist youth.

NEO-NAZI ON TRIAL IN TORONTO; CALLED FOR 'DEATH TO THE JEWS'

TORONTO, Sept. 7: (JTA) -- John Beattie, 23-year-old Toronto neo-Nazi, acted as his own attorney today in his trial on charges of causing "a public disturbance." The charge developed from a riot at a Beattie rally in Toronto's Allan Gardens last May. Jews in the audience charged and mauled Beattie after he had shouted "Death to the Jews."

The neo-Nazi tried but failed to subpoena Mayor Philip Givens and City Alderman David Rotenberg, both present at the riot scene, and both Jewish. Beattie tried first to obtain a subpoena from a Justice of the Peace; Magistrate Hayes, who is presiding at Beattie's trial, listened to the prosecution's case, then ruled that the Mayor and the Alderman could not contribute anything as witnesses. However, the Magistrate ruled that Police Inspector Adamson's evidence could be useful and the trial was recessed for nine days until the inspector, who is on vacation, returned to Toronto.

Police constables testified that, after an initial violent response by the crowd to Beattie's remarks, policemen pulled him away from his attackers. They testified that, at this point, Beattie shouted "Death to the Jews" and "Nazi supremacy over the Jews," and that these and similar remarks spurred demonstrators to greater violence.

Other News in Brief

VIENNA, Sept. 7: (JTA) -- The ancient synagogue here, known as the Schiffschul, burned down yesterday. Authorities investigated the conflagration and said that the cause of the fire was faulty electrical wiring. The Schiffschul was badly damaged by the Nazis after World War II, but was subsequently restored. It was located in Vienna's Jewish section, Der Judegasse.

LONDON, Sept. 7: (JTA) -- A street in Sofia has been named for Emil Sheker-dzhiski, a Jewish resistance hero who fell in battle against the Germans in August 1944, it was reported here today from the Bulgarian capital.

YOUTH PARLEY TOLD JEWISH FUND-RAISING IS FORCE UNIFYING COMMUNITY

STARLIGHT, Pa., Sept. 7: (JTA) -- Some 200 Jewish youths, representing 23 national Jewish youth organizations, were told here today that, to understand American Jewry, one must realize that the American Jewish community, as manifested by federations and community councils, has "people as its principal asset," that it is "voluntary in nature," that it "depends more or less on consensus," and that fund-raising -- despite criticism leveled against it -- "is a tremendous unifying force, bringing Jews of all viewpoints together in a common effort."

Speaking at the second North American regional conference of the World Consultative Committee for Cooperation Among Jewish Youth, Charles Miller, director of community planning of the Federation of Jewish Agencies of Greater Philadelphia, further told the delegates that, although unity on an ideological basis is impossible in a democracy, it is being achieved on the basis of community participation in common planning and action.

The delegates, representing youth groups with memberships of more than 250,000, grappled with the problem of how youth can make its voice heard on behalf of such causes as civil rights, the revitalization of Jewish education, the continued building of Israel, and the development of closer ties between Jewish youth groups throughout the world. The four-day conclave will continue through Thursday.

ORTHODOX GROUP CALLS ON NCRAC UNITS TO REJECT STAND ON EDUCATION

NEW YORK, Sept. 7: (JTA) -- The Union of Orthodox Jewish Congregations of America today reaffirmed its support of the Federal Aid to Education Act, which benefits Hebrew Day school pupils, and announced that it had "dissociated itself from the position recently taken by the National Community Relations Advisory Council in opposition to many aspects of the Act." In a statement issued by Moses I. Feuerstein, national president of the organization, the UOJCA said that the NCRAC position on the Act was a "hypersensitive" one in which any possible benefits for students of "non-public schools" were considered to be an "intrusion into the sphere of religion."

In a letter circulated by the UOJCA to other affiliated and constituent agencies of the NCRAC, Mr. Feuerstein called upon these bodies to "adopt a positive attitude" toward the Federal Education Act in spite of the position of the parent body. He urged the NCRAC affiliates to "act within the limitations emerging from the position of the Orthodox Jewish community" which, generally supports the Act. The Orthodox Union is an affiliate of the National Community Relations Advisory Council.

TORONTO POLICE CHIEF DENIES CHARGES OF BIAS AGAINST JEWS ON FORCE

TORONTO, Sept. 7: (JTA) -- Answering charges of bias against Jews and other minorities in police recruiting policies, Toronto Police Chief James Mackey denied last night that the force prefers men of British origin. He said that the Toronto force had more than 85 non-Anglo-Saxon policemen, though he said he could not give exact figures. He added that the force had placed advertisements in the "ethnic press" to recruit "anyone who was interested and qualified." Chief Mackey made the statement in reply to a charge made by an attorney, Arthur Maloney, at the Canadian Bar Association.

The police official said that, currently, there was one Jewish cadet on the force, and that there had been a few other Jewish policemen in the past but that they had quit. He asserted that strong Jewish family ties tended to make young Jews follow their father's professions or take over the father's business.

The attorney also had charged that "complete and utter ignorance" of a minority group's customs had been shown in the arrest of Rabbi Norbert Leiner on a Jewish Sabbath in 1962, which led to a Royal Commission inquiry. Chief Mackey replied that, since that incident, the force had instituted courses familiarizing its men with the customs and practices of various faiths.

Other News in Brief

WASHINGTON, Sept. 7: (JTA) -- Lt. Col. Maurice Kleinberg, Jewish chaplain for the military district of Washington, was promoted today to full colonel, making him the highest ranking Jewish chaplain in the Army. Promotion was conferred upon him at ceremonies in the office of Maj. Gen. Charles E. Brown, Jr., chief of chaplains, at the Pentagon.

JERUSALEM, Sept. 7: (JTA) -- President Zalman Shazar today extended an invitation to A. R. Malachi, American Hebrew and Yiddish writer, to come to Israel with Mrs. Malachi on an official state visit. Mr. Malachi, who was born in Jerusalem, is known for his work on the history of the Holy Land and on Hebrew and Yiddish literature from the time of the enlightenment.
