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GOLDA MEIR URGES U.N. TO PAY INCREASED ATTENTION TO ARAB WAR THREATS

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y., Oct. 7: (JTA) -- Israel's Foreign Minister, Mrs. Golda Meir, urged the United Nations today to give increasing attention to armament preparation and threats of war such as those being carried out by the Arab states against Israel which, if allowed to continue, can "erode the foundations" of the United Nations itself.

In her major policy address at the U.N. General Assembly, Mrs. Meir said that acquiescence by the United Nations in the face of such belligerent threats as those voiced by the Arab states against Israel "is not only unjustified toward the state threatened by aggression; it erodes the foundation of the organization itself and impairs its moral authority in other cases."

The disruptive effects of such warlike threats, the Israeli Foreign Minister declared, "do not await actual hostilities. Long before that, the would-be attacker stocks arms to carry out his designs while the designated victim has to arm for his own defense." While noting the obvious dangers of nuclear warfare, Mrs. Meir also urged increased attention to the stockpiling of conventional arms;

Appeals to Arabs for Peace, Coexistence and Cooperation

The Foreign Minister reiterated in her address Israel's oft-repeated call to its Arab neighbors to "substitute for a doctrine of war the doctrine of peace, coexistence and fruitful cooperation;"

Commenting on the Arab war threats against Israel, voiced at the recent Arab summit meeting in Casablanca, as well as at similar earlier Arab conclaves, Mrs. Meir scored the Arab leaders for their deliberation on "a program of aggression against a member state, calling for a unified military command, piling up more weapons and even recruiting and training refugees supported by United Nations Relief and Works Agency to operate against our territory."

"Let no one feel reassured at the allegedly 'good news' that a war which Arab leaders describe as inevitable has been postponed for four years," Mrs. Meir stated. "By insisting on their war aims and pursuing their war preparations, they are condemning the region to years of a wasteful and escalating arms race, in which Israel too is obliged, against its will, to divert precious resources and efforts into maintaining its own armed strength since its defense capability is essential to deter its enemies."

"The price tag for such an arms race," she added, "includes the retarding of progress, the poisoning of young minds in the Arab countries with sentiments of hatred and revenge and the building up of explosive tensions. It is to us paradoxical that states that proclaim these doctrines of war and pursue these policies sit as members of the United Nations and even as members of the Security Council and disarmament committees. It is our contention that the United Nations as such cannot close its ears to doctrines and policies of war unless it wishes to abdicate its primary responsibility."

Says U.N. Shows Slow Progress in Draft on Religious Intolerance

While voicing concern over the slow progress of the drafts concerning religious intolerance, the Israel Foreign Minister told the Assembly however, that "a positive approach is apparent in what has already been done on this topic by the Commission on Human Rights." She nailed in her address the progress achieved by the United Nations in drafting declarations and conventions on racial prejudice and urged the specific inclusion of an article condemning anti-Semitism in such declarations;

In an obvious reference to the plight of Soviet Jewry, Mrs. Meir declared: "It remains a matter of sorrow and concern to us that a certain large Jewish community suffers serious disabilities and discrimination, which are causing distress not only to their fellow-Jews, but also to decent and liberal opinion in other lands. A few concessions have recently been made and we can only hope that they are signs of a more liberal policy. It is hard to understand what the great country concerned could stand to gain by stifling an an-

cient faith, culture and language, belonging to a minority group," Mrs. Meir also voiced Israel's opposition to "policies of racial or religious discrimination, colonialism and apartheid, wherever they exist."

Says U.N. Must Not Subsidize 'Palestine Liberation Organization'

Mrs. Meir, who is leaving for Israel this weekend until sometime after the Israeli Parliamentary elections November 2, told a press conference earlier today that Israel will press for action at the U.N. for the removal of the members of the "Palestine Liberation Organization" from the U.N. Relief and Works Agency list. If the U.N. fails to take action, she added, Israel would consider this a direct subsidy for war. The PLO is an Arab League organization recruiting refugees for infiltrator attacks on Israel border areas.

Mrs. Meir said that in her meetings with diplomats from various member states she found "friendly understanding" and that she was "extremely satisfied." During these talks, she said, she stressed the issues of the campaign against Israel carried out by El Fatah terrorists and Israel's membership in the "Group of 75," the organization of developing states in Asia, Africa and Latin America.

JORDAN TAKES ISRAEL'S WARNING ON RAIDS SERIOUSLY, U.N. OFFICIAL REPORTS

JERUSALEM, Oct. 7: (JTA) -- The Jordanian Government takes seriously Israel's warnings against continuation of El Fatah terrorist raids from Jordanian territory into Israel, Col. William Marsh, acting chief of the United Nations Truce Supervision Organization, reported today to the Israel Foreign Ministry.

Col. Marsh conferred last week with Jordanian Premier Wasfi Tal and transmitted to him the gravity of Israel's views on the repeated border incursions. The U.N. official asked the Premier to convey those views to King Hussein. It was reported also that King Hussein was aware of the possible internal threat to his regime if the El Fatah organization, which is controlled and financed mainly by Syria, continued its activities in Jordan unchecked.

It was indicated that Col. Marsh conveyed to Israel assurances from Jordan of efforts to suppress the El Fatah activities, as well as a Jordanian request to Israel to maintain patience pending the outcome of the Jordanian efforts.

Informed sources reported here today that the Arab states have decided to suspend effective support to the Arab League's "Palestine Liberation Organization," headed by Ahmed Shukairy, although the PLO will continue to exist on paper.

The abstention so far by Arab speakers at the United Nations General Assembly from demanding the "right" of the PLO to speak at the Assembly seemed to confirm that report. However, the observer said, it will not be known whether all of the Arab states will support the decision until the conclusion of Assembly debate.

THREE ISRAELI ARABS ARRESTED: CHARGED WITH ESPIONAGE FOR ARAB LANDS

TEL AVIV, Oct. 7: (JTA) -- Officials announced today the arrest of three Israeli Arabs on charges of espionage for two Arab countries. Two of the Arabs were arrested on charges of spying for Jordan, and one on charges of espionage for Egypt.

According to the officials, one of the suspects, a resident of Beit Tzafafa, ordered a large number of pictures of the Army Independence Day parade in Jerusalem from a photographer's shop. The shop reported the order to police, who arrested the Arab. During interrogation, the suspect said he had been asked by an Arab from Abu Gosh to buy the pictures for him. The Abu Gosh Arab was then arrested, and admitted spying for Jordan for some time.

The third Arab, a resident of Lydda, reportedly crossed the border into the Gaza Strip last week, and was ordered by Egyptian intelligence to buy copies of the Israeli army magazine and the new book on the Sinai campaign by Gen. Moshe Dayan. He was arrested after returning to Israel, near Ashkelon.

MEMBERS OF BRITISH K. K. K. GO ON TRIAL; PLANNED ANTI-JEWISH ACTION

LONDON, Oct. 7: (JTA) -- Six men and two women members of the British Ku Klux Klan pleaded innocent today to charges of illegal wearing of uniforms at a public meeting at which they were reportedly told that the goal of the group was to "rid Britain of Jewish control."

The prosecutor also told the court about a list of British leaders, including Labor leader and Minister Mrs. Barbara Castle and the Jewish wife of Labor Leader George Brown, of whom the movement planned to get rid.

EICHMANN'S LAWYER TESTIFIES IN CASE INVOLVING DEPORTATION OF JEWS

BONN, Oct. 7: (JTA) -- Dr. Hans Globke, State Secretary to former Chancellor Konrad Adenauer, and Dr. Robert Servatius, counsel for Adolf Eichmann in his Jerusalem trial, were the principal witnesses today in the trial here of Max Merten, former key German occupation official in Greece.

The latter is on trial on charges of making false accusations in declaring publicly five years ago that Dr. Globke, as a major official in the Nazi Justice Ministry, opposed a Merten proposal to save a large number of Jews from deportation from Salonika to Nazi death camps.

According to Merten, Eichmann agreed to the proposal and then telephoned Dr. Globke, who allegedly opposed it. Merten repeated the charges in full when he appeared at the trial last week. Dr. Globke charged that the Merten story was false and demanded an investigation which led to Merten's indictment and trial.

Dr. Globke said in his testimony today that the entire story was an "absolute falsehood," that he had never had any official contact with Eichmann, then head of the Gestapo Jewish Affairs department, and that he had met Eichmann only once. He also testified that even if Eichmann had wanted to telephone somebody to ask permission in such a situation, that he (Globke) was not in a position then to deal with such a request because it was outside his duties.

Dr. Servatius testified that, at the start of the Eichmann trial in Jerusalem, he had asked Eichmann about the Greek case and that Eichmann then said he could not recall either Merten or Globke but that later, Eichmann told him "now I remember." Dr. Servatius said that Eichmann had not wanted to involve Dr. Globke in his trial because he hoped that the West German Government would ask his (Eichmann's) extradition to West Germany.

BAMBERG CEMETERY RECONSECRATED; REPAIRS DONE BY GERMAN VOLUNTEERS

BAMBERG, W. Germany, Oct. 7: (JTA) -- A Jewish cemetery which was the target last June of what was considered the worst act of vandalism in postwar German history, was resealed in ceremonies on the day before Yom Kippur.

Swastikas and anti-Semitic slogans, such as "Six Million Were Too Few," were found daubed on 32 gravestones on June 13. After an intensive search, police arrested Reinhard Woltzik, 20-year-old son of a former member of the SS, who confessed the smearings. He was committed for psychiatric examination.

Volunteers who offered to repair the damage worked an estimated 700 hours and used 2,500 flowers and 100 tons of material in their renovation work, it was reported at the ceremony, conducted by Rabbi Hans Gruenewald of Munich.

AUSCHWITZ VICTIMS URGE GERMAN MAYOR TO BAN MEETING OF NAZI VETERANS

BONN, Oct. 7: (JTA) -- Plans of veterans of the Waffen SS, the branch of Hitler's Elite Guard assigned active duty on the war fronts, to hold their 11th annual reunion in the north German town of Rendsburg were vigorously protested today in a letter from the Dutch Union of Victims of Auschwitz to the Mayor of the town.

The Dutch Union declared that "the fact that those criminals march again instead of being punished seems incredible to their former victims and a danger to all living people." An estimated 1,000 former Waffen SS members will meet on October 24 for the annual meeting of HIAG, their organization of mutual aid.

DANISH GOVERNMENT URGED TO BAN NEWLY-FORMED PRO-NAZI ORGANIZATION

COPENHAGEN, Oct. 7: (JTA) -- Leading Danish newspapers called upon the Government today to dissolve the newly-organized "Nordic Freedom Movement," a group headed by the so-called "Danish Hitler," Bjorn Temester, and to arrest the group's leaders on charges of sedition.

The NFM is openly neo-Nazi, stating its purpose as a "fight against Jews, Negroes and Asiatics." Numerically small, the group issues a weekly journal, entitled "Nordic Front."

HAMBURG LAUNCHES PROJECT TO STUDY HISTORY OF JEWS IN CITY

HAMBURG, Oct. 7: (JTA) -- The City Council here has voted to establish an Institute for Research into the history of Hamburg Jews. The Institute will study the 700 years of Jewish settlement in the city, including the Nazi period.

LEADER OF ARGENTINE ANTI-SEMITIC MOVEMENT ARRESTED IN BUENOS AIRES

BUENOS AIRES, Oct. 7: (JTA) -- Patricio Errecalde Pueriedon, secretary of the National Revolutionary Tacuara movement which he publicly identified last June as a paramilitary anti-Zionist group, was arrested today on charges of subversion;

The leader of the rightwing movement also said in June that it had arms and training and was in close sympathy with the Arab states against Zionism. He also said "we have no problems with Jews as long as they are not Zionist." Other leaders of the movement were arrested shortly after he made his public statement on the aims of his movement.

ISRAEL'S ACHIEVEMENTS IN DESALINATION LAUDED AT WASHINGTON PARLEY

WASHINGTON, Oct. 7: (JTA) -- Prof. Nabor Carrillo, chairman of a session on engineering development of the first International Symposium on Water Desalination, today commended Israel's "amazing achievements" in desalination. He stressed Israel's contributions to developments in desalting technology, and said that he had personally witnessed such work during a visit to Israel.

Prof. Carrillo made the remarks in introducing one of the several Israeli scientists who submitted important research papers to the symposium. The Israeli delegation is headed by Prof. I. Dostrovsky, and includes Prof. Abraham Kogan, Prof. A. Kazir (Katchalsky), Z. Peled, and A. Peled. Israeli observers are I. Vilentchuk, Nathan Arad, Chaim Forgacs, R. Matz, and Prof. Ora Kedem.

Other Israelis attending the symposium are Hillel Aldaag, scientific counsellor of the Israel Embassy here; scientific attache Joseph Eyal; and a number of Israeli engineers and economists who are in the United States in connection with feasibility studies now being pursued by the American-Israel Joint Desalination Board.

Among the numerous papers either read orally or submitted for the record by Israelis were studies by Israel's leading desalination authorities. Among the papers submitted were a study of biological desalination by Prof. Kazir, a survey of water desalination in Israel by Dr. Vilentchuk, a report on the operation of the freeze desalination plant at Eilat, Israel, by Abraham Peled, and studies by Prof. Kogan, Chaim Forgacs, and Nathan Arad.

ABRAM NAMED CO-CHAIRMAN OF WHITE HOUSE PARLEY ON CIVIL RIGHTS

WASHINGTON, Oct. 7: (JTA) -- Morris B. Abram, president of the American Jewish Committee, has been appointed by President Johnson as co-chairman of the White House conference on civil rights, which will be held here in November. His co-chairman is William T. Coleman, a Negro lawyer, of Philadelphia.

The conference is to generate "new efforts to include the Negro American more fully in our society," the President said in announcing the appointments. Its recommendations will be considered by a larger conference in Washington next spring. Mr. Abram is also U. S. representative on the United Nations Human Rights Commission.

VALUABLE ART OBJECTS BELONGING TO NAZI VICTIMS TRACED IN AUSTRIA

VIENNA, Oct. 7: (JTA) -- An estimated 100 valuable paintings and other artistic objects belonging mostly to Jews and some other victims of the Nazi regime in Austria may become permanent possessions of the Austrian Government if their owners do not claim them by 1968, Simon Wiesenthal told a press conference here today.

The head of the Jewish Documentation Center here said he had traced the valuables to a secret depot of the Austrian Government. He said also that he had asked three Austrian Cabinet ministers for help in finding the owners. He stressed that many Jewish emigrants or their heirs were still living in poverty in many countries, not knowing that the valuables were waiting to be claimed.

JEWISH COMMUNITY OF GENEVA DEDICATES MONUMENT FOR NAZI VICTIMS

GENEVA, Oct. 7: (JTA) -- The Jewish community of Geneva has dedicated a monument in its cemetery in Veyrier to the memory of Jewish men, women and children slaughtered by the Nazis. Veyrier is a French town just on the outskirts of Geneva.

The inaugural ceremony was held on the eve of Rosh Hashanah before a solemn gathering of several hundred persons who watched as the memorial stone was unveiled. Dr. Alexander Safran, chief rabbi of Geneva, and Francois Brunschwig, president of the Geneva Jewish Community, spoke at the ceremony.

The community erected a memorial two years ago to commemorate the Jewish
