SHAZAR'S VISIT TO CHILE CONTINUES TO EVOKE PUBLIC ENTHUSIASM

SANTIAGO DE CHILE, June 30. (JTA) -- The smaller nations of the world, like Chile and Israel, "must unite our efforts to enjoy the fruits of our work through exchange of our respective experiences," Israel's President Zalman Shazar told Chilean President Eduardo Frei here.

Mr. Shazar made that statement last night when, at the end of the second full day of his eight-day state visit to this country, he gave a dinner in honor of President Frei, followed by a gala reception. There were 60 guests at the dinner, and thousands of the country's leading personalities, including leaders of the country's Jewish community, at the reception. The events were held at Cousino Palace, a large, beautiful, 19th century mansion, which is the Chilean Government's official guest house.

"From my contact with President Frei, and with other personalities of your country, I know what a bright future awaits the Chilean people," President Shazar said. "Israel's people admire the Chileans because you have built a solid fortress of freedom, justice and democracy on this narrow piece of land -- just as Israel has on its narrow slice of soil. The Israeli people admire President Frei because his life is a noble example of the life of a fighter.

"We admire and are grateful to the Chilean people for their friendship. Chile has always shown its friendship to Israel. Israel will always be on the side of Chile, sharing with it the ideals of brotherhood, freedom and social justice. Both of us will always stand together with those others who, like your people and ours, fight for those causes since the roots of both our nations come from the same source, the Sacred Book that inspires us." Mr. Shazar concluded with a toast to Chile's prosperity and to "our growing friendship and cooperation."

The visit of Israel's President here continues to evoke the most enthusiastic and laudatory comments from thousands of people in the streets, from all of the country's highest officials, from Catholic leaders and intellectuals, and from the press, radio and television networks. Even the Communist organ here, *Siglo*, featured Mr. Shazar's visit on its front page -- alongside the revolution in Argentina.

In isolated instances, there were some outbursts by persons who are either anti-Israeli, or anti-Semitic, or anti-democracy -- or all of these tendencies. One television broadcast has shown a drunken man in the village of Melipilla, near this city, ripping down an Israeli flag. The man was arrested. A radio station reported that three unidentified men had smashed windows in the Jewish Bank of Chile in Santiago. But there have been no fears of genuine attack against the Israeli President and his party.

GROUP OF ISRAELI INTELLECTUALS WARN GOVERNMENT ON NUCLEAR DANGER

JERUSALEM, June 30. (JTA) -- Fifty-five Israel intellectuals, speaking as members of the Committee for Nuclear Disarmament in the Arab-Israeli Region, called on the Israel Government last night to take the initiative to prevent the spread of nuclear arms into the Middle East.

Most of the signators are members of the faculties of the Hebrew University, the Technion-Israel Institute of Technology at Haifa and the Weizmann Institute. The statement warned that Israel's vulnerability to nuclear attack was far greater than that of Egypt and added that even if a nuclear second strike by Israel was feasible, it would be -- for Israel -- a "posthumous revenge."

The committee urged the Government to assert its readiness to start negotiations on the issue with the Arab governments and with international organizations. It expressed the hope that such negotiations could ultimately lead to conventional disarmament.

Defense Ministry sources meanwhile expressed "dissatisfaction" and "irritation" over the "unauthorized attendance" by former Deputy Defense Minister Shimon Peres and Prof. Ernst Bergman, who recently resigned as chairman of Israel's Atomic Energy Commission, at the recent nuclear disarmament conference in Toronto. Mr. Peres, now secretary general of former Premier David Ben-Gurion's dissident Israel Workers Party (Rafi) and Prof. Bergman, are known to hold views on this subject contrary to those of the Government.

HIGH-RANKING OFFICIAL OF ISRAEL'S INTELLIGENCE SERVICE RESIGNS

JERUSALEM, June 30. (JTA) -- A high-ranking official of Israel's intelligence services -- who can not be identified either by name or rank -- resigned today. This resignation follows yesterday's announcement by Isser Harel, special adviser to Prime Minister Levi Eshkol, that he has quit his post.

Several members of the security and foreign affairs committee of Israel's Knesset (Parliament) said today they will investigate Mr. Harel's resignation and request him to testify and state the reasons for his exit. He was reported to have been due to disagreements about his prerogatives in the security job.

Mr. Harel's name and rank, like those of the person who quit today, were highly-confidential secret during the years he held the job of chief of Israel's intelligence and counter-intelligence service.

WAGE EARNERS IN ISRAEL MAY LOSE COST-OF-LIVING PAYMENTS IN JULY

JERUSALEM, June 30. (JTA) -- The executive of the Mapai-Achdut Avodah alignment decided in principle last night against payment of the scheduled cost-of-living allowance in July to Israeli wage earners. Although the decision, if implemented by the Government, will hit hardest at the lower level wage earners, no strikes or other immediate protest repercussions were expected.

Details will be worked out at another meeting of the executive of the alignment, the dominant force in the coalition Government. The decision followed a compromise worked out between Mapai and Achdut Avodah leaders at a top-level secret meeting of the executive Tuesday night. The secret session was attended by Prime Minister Levi Eshkol, Finance Minister Pinhas Sapir, Trade Minister Haim Zadok, Transport Minister Moshe Carmel, Labor Minister Yigal Allon, Minister Without Portfolio Yigal Galilee, and Mrs. Golda Meir, secretary general of Mapai.

BEIGIN WINS NARROW VICTORY OVER OPPOSITION AT HERUT CONVENTION

TEL AVIV, June 30. (JTA) -- Menachem Beigin's leadership of the Herut Party -- despite Mr. Beigin's official resignation from his chairmanship yesterday -- won a narrow victory over the party's opposition at an all-night session which was adjourned until 3:30 o'clock this morning. The stormy dispute was over the election of the party's Permanent Committee. When the battle was over, and convention votes were counted, Mr. Beigin's group had won by 252 to 249 against the Herut opposition led by Eliezer Shostak and Shmuel Tamir.

The final showdown between the two factions is expected tomorrow, at the convention, being held all this week at Ramat Gan, near this city, is to elect the new central committee. Mr. Beigin's backers said today that, if the "spirit" shown in yesterday's meeting is evidenced again tomorrow, Mr. Beigin would withdraw his resignation and resume leadership of the party. Some members of the opposition declared that, on the other hand, they would not permit Mr. Shostak and Mr. Tamir to join the central committee unless the opposition faction can muster a majority.

EX-NAZI OFFICIALS CHARGED IN GERMANY WITH KILLING DUTCH JEWS

MUNICH, June 30. (JTA) -- Three officials of the Nazi security police who occupied Holland were charged yesterday with aiding in the wartime murder of thousands of Dutch Jews. Arrested last January 12, the three former Nazis are now in Munich jail. No date was set for the trial.

Wilhelm Farster, 61, chief of the security police, was accused of the murder of 82,856 victims. Wilhelm Zeepe, 58, an adviser to Farster on Jewish affairs, was charged in 56,382 cases of murder. Gertrud Slotke, 63, another aide, was accused in 54,982 murders.

AUSTRIAN HIGH COURT ORDERS RETRIAL OF NAZIS WHO KILLED JEWS

VIENNA, June 30. (JTA) -- The Austrian High Court ordered today a retrial for two former SS men who were in effect acquitted in a trial in Salzburg last February on charges of mass murder of Jews in occupied Poland. The judge said the court could not accept the verdict and ordered the case sent to the High Court for review.

Although 30 witnesses testified that Wilhelm Mauer, 48, and his brother Johann Mauer, 52, had personally tortured and murdered Jews in Stanislaw, Poland, six men and two women found that they had acted under "irresistible coercion," meaning that they had been forced to obey orders and could not therefore be held responsible for their actions, in the jury's view.

RABBINICAL COUNCIL CONVENTION APPEALS TO RUSSIA ON SOVIET JEWS

FALLSBURG, N.Y., June 30. (JTA) -- A resolution calling on the Soviet Government to grant to Jews "free and unqualified" freedom to practice their religion was adopted here today at the closing session of the national convention of the Rabbinical Council of America.

COUNCIL FOR JUDAISM DENIES ITS EXECUTIVE HEAD VISITED KING FAISAL

NEW YORK, June 30. (JTA) -- The American Council for Judaism today denied a report in the New York press that Elmer Berger, its executive vice-president had visited King Faisal of Saudi Arabia and expressed regret over the cancellation by Mayor John V. Lindsay and Governor Rockefeller of arrangements with the king for his remarks in Washington that Jews supporting Israel were his "enemies."

"Neither Elmer Berger nor any authorized spokesman for the Council was anywhere near the Waldorf-Astoria and King Faisal, wither last Tuesday or any time since the king has been in the United States," a statement issued by Richard Korn, ACJ president, said.

The statement emphasized that Benjamin Friedman, who was reported to have visited the king, is "far from being a member of the Council" and that he is "the chief contributor to Conde McGinley's anti-Semitic publication, Common Sense." Mr. Korn also stressed that Alfred Lilienthal, who was also reported to have visited the Saudi Arabian ruler, "had no authority to say anything to anyone as a spokesman for the Council."

137 U.S. STUDENTS LEAVE FOR A YEAR OF STUDY AT HEBREW UNIVERSITY

NEW YORK, June 30. (JTA) -- Some 400 American Jewish youth are leaving this week for varying periods of summer study in Israel.

A group of 137 students sailed today on the SS Shalom for a year of study at the Hebrew University. Representing 63 colleges and universities in 26 states and Canada, they are enrollees in the 12th annual American Student Program of the American Friends of the Hebrew University.

Thirty-eight members of Junior Hadassah left by air last night for a seven-week summer institute. The girls range in age from 16 to 19. They will visit and work in various cooperative settlements and in Eilat. They will take part in special courses and seminars with emphasis on the Hebrew language, and will visit Hadassah institutions. They will also be given opportunities to live in the homes of Israeli families.

Another group of 120 students will participate in the Yeshiva University Tenth Annual Summer in Israel and European Extension Tour program. The program will begin with the departure of the young men and women from the United States on July 3. It will conclude with a return on August 24. The participants will spend 17 days in five European countries before going to Israel on July 21.

More than 100 teen-agers, Jewish high school students from all parts of the United States and Canada, will leave by air on July 6 for a seven week work-and-study tour of Israel under auspices of the Masada Young Zionists, the youth division of the Zionist Organization of America. Another group of young adults will leave New York on July 13 for a 21-day tour of Israel and Europe under Masada auspices. It will be made up of adults aged 18 to 30.

The enrollment in the Hebrew University program is 50 percent larger than the 1965 group and is a record for the program, officials said. Participants were chosen from nearly 200 applicants and will receive credit from their schools in the United States for their study at the Hebrew University. Intensive study of Hebrew will be provided aboard ship and will continue for the first three and a half months of the year of study.

Scholarships of varying amounts totaling \$51,000 have been awarded to 70 of the students by the American friends of the Hebrew University. Contributions for the scholarships included \$10,000 from the Sundel and Margaret Doniger Foundation and a grant of 20,000 Israeli pounds (\$7,000) from the Israel District of B'nai B'rith.

ISRAELI ELECTED DIRECTOR OF INTERNATIONAL CENTER AFFILIATED WITH U.N.

ROME, June 30. (JTA) -- H. Darin-Drabkin of the Hebrew University has been elected director for the next four years of the International Research Center for Rural Cooperative Communities. His election means that the Center secretariat will be in Jerusalem for that period.

The Center, which was started in 1956, will work with the Food and Agricultural Organization, a specialized agency of the United Nations. The Center includes some of the world's top experts in rural cooperation. It will make studies in Tanzania, Malaysia, India, Israel, the Soviet Union, Poland and a Latin American country.

MAX FISHER, U.J.A. GENERAL CHAIRMAN, ARRIVES IN ISRAEL FOR TALKS

JERUSALEM, June 30. (JTA) -- Max Fisher of Detroit, general chairman of the United Jewish Appeal, arrived here yesterday for a six-day stay during which he will confer with Premier Levi Eshkol and other Israeli leaders. He will also meet with Foreign Minister Abba Eban, and Aryeh Pincus, chairman of the Jewish Agency executive. He will examine which of the most urgent needs of Israel can be met by the UJA.

SOVIET YIDDISH MAGAZINE REPRINTS ARTICLE FROM U.S. ZIONIST ORGA

NEW YORK, June 30. (JTA) -- For the first time in its existence, *So Heimland*, the only Yiddish-language magazine appearing in the Soviet Union, put an article by a non-Communist writer in its current issue, reprinting it from a Zionist publication.

The writer is Jacob Glatstein, noted American Yiddish poet and novelist. An editorial disclaimer at the end of the article notes that Mr. Glatstein's "opinions often called forth 'serious disagreements' on the part of the magazine but that he was being printed nevertheless for its interest to readers. Mr. Glatstein's article which tells about Sholem Aleichem's translator and son-in-law, J.D. Berkovitch Aviv, appeared originally in the Labor Zionist magazine "Kemfer," published in New York. Its reprinting in the June issue of *Soviet Heimland* was in connection with the 50th anniversary of Sholem Aleichem's death.

AMERICAN NAZIS PICKET CALIFORNIA CONVENTION OF JEWISH WAR VETE

LONG BEACH, Calif., June 30. (JTA) -- Members of the American Nazi Party, costumed in Nazi-type uniforms embellished with swastikas, picketed the convention here of the California department of the Jewish War Veterans of the United States. In two small trucks, they circled the hotel where the parley was held, bawled anti-Semitic slogans. However, at the request of its officers, who denounced them from the podium, the veterans ignored the Nazi pickets and staged no counter-demonstration. The session continued without disturbance.

One of the features of the convention was the presentation of a JWV award for a "valiant fight" on behalf of California legislative consideration of United States ratification of the United Nations Convention Against Genocide. The award was given to B. Gach, publisher of the California Jewish Voice, of Los Angeles.

TWO JEWISH COMMUNAL BUILDINGS DEFACED IN BALTIMORE; PROBE STA

BALTIMORE, June 30. (JTA) -- Police here were investigating today the defacement of Petach Tikvah Synagogue and the building next door belonging to the Independent Order Brith Sholom where vandals scrawled obscene inscriptions along with threats to Eichmann. Many of the scrawls were misspelled or almost illiterate in their printing.

A spokesman for Brith Sholom said that the latest incident, in which the synagogue suffered most of the damage, followed a series of burglaries, broken windows and other damage to the two buildings.

BOSTON JEWS PROTEST INCLUSION OF RIGHTIST AS SPEAKER AT PUBLIC I

BOSTON, June 30. (JTA) -- Jewish leaders here expressed sorrow and protest over plans by the sponsors of the "God and Country Rally" to be held here which include an appearance by Dr. Reville P. Oliver, known for his rightist views.

The Jewish Community Council of Metropolitan Boston and the Anti-Defamation League of B'nai B'rith, noted in their protest over the rally appearance that Oliver published an article in "American Opinion," a publication of the John Birch Society, in which he contended that "it is a lie that the Nazis killed 6,000,000 Jews."

GUSTAV SARON LAUDED FOR 30 YEARS OF SERVICE TO SO. AFRICAN JEW

JOHANNESBURG, June 30. (JTA) -- Gustav Saron will complete tomorrow thirty years of service in South African Jewry's top administrative post -- that of secretary of the South African Jewish Board of Deputies. Warm tributes on this occasion in South African Jewish communal service were paid to him by communal leaders at an inter-provincial conference of the Board in Johannesburg.

Born in Johannesburg 60 years ago, Gustav Saron had a brilliant academic career at the Witwatersrand University and Queen's College, Oxford. Returning to Oxford, he joined the staff of the Witwatersrand University, first as lecturer in Hebrew, and then as lecturer in the Bar, where he practiced law. He was invited to assume the senior Board of Deputies post in July 1936. He played a central role in South African Jewry's defense work against Nazi propaganda in the following years, and under his administration the Board expanded to become the formidable organization of South African Jewry of the present day. Mr. Saron has represented South African Jewry at numerous overseas conferences.

CLUB FOR BLOWING THE SHOFAR ESTABLISHED AT SAN FRANCISCO SYNA

SAN FRANCISCO, June 30. (JTA) -- A unique class designed to teach men the art of blowing the shofar has been established at Temple Sherith Israel. The class will be taught by Dr. Bertram Wolfsohn, a local dentist who has been blowing the shofar at the Temple since 1930. The initial class will consist of two men in their forties and three boys in their early teens. They are expected to complete their training by the High Holy Days.
