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JEWISH LEADERS IN ARGENTINA MUM; ARRESTED JEWISH SHOPKEEPERS RELEASED

BUENOS AIRES, July 5. (JTA) -- Jewish leaders here have so far made no statements on the raids on Jewish shops, which took place here last Friday following the overthrow of the Illia Government, and on the arrest of some Jewish shopkeepers who were suspected of selling smuggled goods. However, it was noted that under the Illia administration there have also been police raids on stores in the same shopping arcade. The raid on Friday is generally considered here a zealous police action.

(A report from Montevideo stated today that the arrested Jewish shopkeepers in Buenos Aires were released without any explanation and that they said that they were well treated by the police during their detention.)

The arrests of some Jewish and non-Jewish directors of the credit union cooperative is not considered here as an anti-Jewish measure, although the allegation that they shipped \$50,000,000 out of the country during the bank holiday last Tuesday and Wednesday is considered absurd. Nevertheless, their detention has caused grave concern in other cooperatives, mainly Jewish, which had to resist runs for withdrawal of funds caused by concern of what the Government's attitude toward them may be.

KNESSET REJECTS MOTION ON VISIT OF U.S. EXPERTS TO DIMONA REACTOR

JERUSALEM, July 5. (JTA) -- Parliament rejected tonight an opposition motion for debate on visits by United States Atomic Energy Commission scientists to Israel's nuclear reactor at Dimona after Prime Minister Levi Eshkol declared there was no inspection and no control by the United States over the Dimona reactor.

The Premier spoke on the motion offered by Yohanan Bader of the Gahal (Herut-Liberal) faction. Mr. Bader asked for discussion on American press reports about annual visits of American experts to the reactor on behalf of the United States Government. The Premier also declared that the visits by the engineers did not impair Israel's sovereignty and that they were made at the invitation of the Israel Government.

CABINET INQUIRY COMMISSION JUSTIFIES POLICE ACTION AT HEBREW U.

JERUSALEM, July 5. (JTA) -- Although a "small number of policemen" acted with undue violence in the clashes May 5 between the police and students at the Hebrew University during the visit of former West German Chancellor Konrad Adenauer, the special inquiry commission appointed by the Cabinet to investigate the incident found that in general, the police behaved "according to circumstances."

Asserting that members of both sides were at fault in the student demonstrations that gave rise to charges of police brutality, the commission's report noted that the students shouted abuse at the police and that the police used their batons too freely in putting down the demonstration.

The commission placed part of the blame for the violence on the fact that the students were not told of the special orders to police to prevent demonstrations within sight of the former Chancellor. The students were also not told that the University administration had agreed to the presence of policemen on the campus during Adenauer's visit there.

The special orders to the police, which originated at the Foreign Ministry, were aimed at preventing insults as well as bodily harm to the visitor. The fact that the orders were kept secret, the commission reported, confused the students who believed that quiet demonstrations were permitted on the campus as they had been in previous visits by other dignitaries.

EGYPTIAN BOAT INTERCEPTED IN ISRAELI WATERS; TOWED INTO HAIFA

TEL AVIV, July 5. (JTA) -- A 75-ton Egyptian boat was intercepted last night in Israeli waters and towed into Haifa by a coast guard vessel, the Army spokesman reported today. Its crew of four is now being interrogated, he added. The ship, bound from Egypt for Beirut with a cargo of seaweed, apparently entered Israeli waters by mistake, according to the spokesman.

ISRAELIS ANNOYED BY GERMAN AMBASSADOR; ENVOYS TAKE 'HOME LEAVE'

JERUSALEM, July 5. (JTA) -- Dr. Rolf Pauls, the West German Ambassador to Israel, left today for a seven-week home leave for consultations with the Bonn Foreign Ministry over recent developments causing new difficulties in relations between the two countries. Asher Ben-Nathan, Israel's Ambassador to West Germany, arrived here today for a similar home leave and consultations.

What observers termed an "awkward feeling" in those relations has reached a new peak because of a speech by Dr. Pauls last week at the Tel Aviv fair in which he criticized Israel for its recent statement of support for the Oder-Neisse line as the permanent boundary between Germany and postwar Poland. The issue is a sensitive one in Bonn. Dr. Pauls also said that Israel had failed to recognize its "debt of gratitude" to West Germany.

Dr. Pauls also said that Germany no longer needed to be regarded with suspicion and caution as a member of the family of civilized nations. His speech evoked sharp criticism in Israel and continued to be a cause of irritation among Israelis. Israeli newspaper columnist commenting on Dr. Pauls' home leave, noted that this was his fifth trip home for leave since his arrival a year ago. His functions will again be assumed by Dr. Alexander Toeroek, who will be acting Charge d'Affaires.

It was learned reliably that the Israel Government does not intend to bring the issue of Dr. Pauls' speech with West German officials, either here or in Bonn. In spite of pressures of leftwing members of the coalition, the Government has decided to let the matter pass without any official reaction.

MOVEMENT TO WAIVE PAY INCREASES BY WAGE EARNERS IN ISRAEL FAILS

TEL AVIV, July 5. (JTA) -- A much-heralded public movement by Israeli wage-earners to waive pay increases in the fight on Israel's inflation, which involved pledges by the Government to match pound for pound all such pledges, quietly sputtered out today. Leaders of the program, headed by Mrs. Beba Idelson of Mapai, met with members of the Cabinet and the central committee of the Histadrut, Israel's labor federation, to report failure. It appeared that the whole effort would be put aside.

The arrangement called for the Government to provide matching funds for sums waived and frozen in Israel's central bank with anticipated waivers of a total of 10,000,000 pounds (\$3,333,000). To date, only 5,000 pounds (\$1,600) has been deposited. Only 20 of the 180 groups and committees which committed themselves to arrange for such waivers by members actually did so.

The leadership of the Mapai Achdut Avodah alignment, the most powerful faction in the Israel Government, will meet this week to consider a social welfare program related to Israel's cost-of-living allowance program. Alignment leaders voted last week at a secret meeting to oppose the semi-annual cost-of-living payments scheduled for this month.

The projected program, for the next year or more, would take into account the question of compensation to beneficiaries for price increases. Alignment sources said that by this approach, it was hoped to include benefits normally provided under the cost-of-living program. The proposed social welfare program would provide higher age pensions and increased family allowances, particularly for wage earners in the lower income group.

The Histadrut, reported today that 20,000 of the 90,000 workers who went on strike during 1965 were employed in Histadrut enterprises. The Histadrut central committee also reported that 40,000 of the 200,000 work days lost in those strikes were suffered by Histadrut enterprises and offices.

HERUT-LIBERAL FACTION IN KNESSET ACCEPTS BEIGIN'S RESIGNATION

TEL AVIV, July 5. (JTA) -- The Herut section of the Gahal Herut-Liberal fusion faction in Israel's Parliament accepted yesterday the resignation of Menahem Begin as chairman of the faction and named Yohanan Bader to succeed him. The chairman of the faction rotates every three months between a Herut and a Liberal Member of Knesset.

Begin resigned last week as chairman of the Herut Party at the party's convention despite efforts of party leaders to refuse the resignation. He also offered to resign as a Parliamentary deputy. He accused members of the opposition in Herut of voting "behind his back."

PERES BRINGS BEN-GURION AN INVITATION FROM NEW YORK MAYOR

TEL AVIV, July 5. (JTA) -- Former Prime Minister David Ben-Gurion has been invited by Mayor John V. Lindsay to visit New York City. The invitation was extended by Mayor Lindsay through Shimon Peres, who arrived here today from a visit to the United States. Mr. Peres is secretary of Ben-Gurion's Rafi Party.

TRUMAN NOT GOING TO ISRAEL FOR CEREMONIES; ADVISED BY HIS DOCTOR

INDEPENDENCE, Mo., July 5. (JTA) -- Former President Harry S. Truman said today he had decided, on his doctor's advice, not to go to Israel for the ground-breaking ceremonies Monday for the Truman Center for the Advancement of Peace at the Hebrew University.

Mr. Truman said that former U.S. Solicitor Thurgood Marshall will represent him at the ceremonies. The former President had been scheduled to leave from New York by air next Saturday. There had been reports that Mr. Truman's physicians were concerned about the trip because of Mr. Truman's age. He is 82.

Plans for the Center, which will be a multi-million dollar project dedicated to application of scientific methods to the isolation and elimination of the causes of war, was announced here last January 20 in ceremonies attended by President Johnson, Mr. Truman, Chief Justice Earl Warren and other dignitaries. The Center will award an annual \$50,000 Truman Center Peace Prize as part of its comprehensive anti-war program.

ESHKOL URGES SCHOOLS TO TEACH ON IMPORTANCE OF JEWS IN DIASPORA

TEL AVIV, July 5. (JTA) -- Prime Minister Levi Eshkol called upon Israeli schools today to teach the importance of close ties between Israel and the Diaspora. Addressing the opening session of the 22nd convention of the Teachers Union, the Premier said that the schools must implant in children's minds the realization that we are a small part of a large nation.

Education Minister Zalman Aranne, another speaker at the convention, criticized what he termed "the Soviet Union's 50-year siege on the spiritual existence of her millions of Jews." Barring a miracle, Mr. Aranne said he feared Soviet Jewry would be completely cut off before long from Jewish national existence. The occasional reports from Russia, he said, on the publication of a Jewish prayerbook or Yiddish manuscript are nothing more than "mocking" by a formidable nation of her helpless Jews.

ISRAEL'S NATIONAL DEFENSE COLLEGE UNDER EXAMINATION FOR EXISTENCE

JERUSALEM, July 5. (JTA) -- Prime Minister Levi Eshkol today appointed a special three-man committee to examine the question of whether the continued existence of Israel's National Defense College is justified in view of the country's difficult economic situation.

The committee, which will be headed by Dr. Yigael Yadin, professor of archaeology at the Hebrew University and former Chief of Staff of the Israel Armed Forces, will also include Professor Yehoshua Prawer and Yaakov Arnon, director general of the Finance Ministry. Protests have been voiced from various quarters over plans to close the college which have been proposed as an economy measure.

ARAB STUDENTS DEMONSTRATE IN GERMAN UNIVERSITIES AGAINST ISRAEL

BONN, July 5. (JTA) -- Israel Week, a series of events organized by the German-Israel Study Group of the Universities of Erlangen and Nuremberg, was opened today with the participation of Israel's Minister to Bonn, Leo Savir, who addressed the gathering on Israel's foreign policy.

Arab students appeared in the two universities to demonstrate against Israel. They carried various anti-Israel placards including some bearing the slogan: "Why did you recognize Israel?"

AMERICAN JEWISH COMMITTEE LEADERS CONFER WITH EBAN IN ISRAEL

TEL AVIV, July 5. (JTA) -- President Morris Abram of the American Jewish Committee, and Judge Theodore Tannenwald, chairman of the group's Committee on Israel, were guests today at a luncheon given them by Foreign Minister Abba Eban. They reviewed with the Foreign Minister some of Israel's foreign relations.

They also met with Dr. Zorach Warhaftig, Religious Affairs Minister and Finance Minister Pinhas Sapir. During their stay, which will end Friday, they will also meet with Chief of Staff Yitzhak Rabin and other Ministers and local leaders.

United Nations Political Undersecretary Ralph Bunche is expected to arrive in Israel this week and is scheduled to confer with Prime Minister Levi Eshkol and Foreign Minister Abba Eban.

SOVIET AUTHORITIES DISMISS SYNAGOGUE CHAIRMAN IN MOSCOW

LONDON, July 5. (JTA) -- The Soviet Supervisor of Religious Institutions has dismissed Chaim Ochs from his post as chairman of the board of the synagogue at Cherki-zovo, one of the three Moscow synagogues, it was reported here today.

JEWISH CONFERENCES TO SEEK NEW TECHNIQUE TO COMBAT ASSIMILATION

NEW YORK, July 5. (JTA) -- A striving for new patterns of Jewish ed and a deep concern for arriving at new techniques to meet the problems of assimilation and alienation among Jewish youth and intellectuals will mark a number of international conferences being held in Europe this month, according to Mrs. Rose L. Halprin, man of the Jewish Agency-American Section.

In a statement issued today prior to leaving for Geneva to attend a mor series of meetings of the World Council on Jewish Education, the Memorial Found for Jewish Culture, the Conference of Jewish Organizations (COJO) and the World Congress, Mrs. Halprin said the meetings this summer "take on an unusual signifi because out of them may well emerge changing programs that can help assure Jew continuity and survival for years to come.

"Eighteen years after statehood for Israel, Jewish leadership must fac reality of changes that have occurred during the period," Mrs. Halprin said. "Jew leadership, both in the Diaspora and in Israel must give careful heed to these char We, who live in the United States, and the other free lands of the West, must prep fight one of our most difficult battles, a continuing struggle against the forces of a lation that thrive in our open society."

Mrs. Halprin also discussed the question of the reorganization of the Z movement, a subject, she said, that "has been growing in importance during the l few years. First, we must recognize that the growing public discussion is a mani tion of the self-analysis that exists among the Zionist leadership itself, and which taken active form with the appointment by Dr. Nahum Goldmann, president of the Zionism Organization, of Commissions on Zionist Reorganization which are now co ing world-wide surveys on the problem."

Pointing out that the Zionist movement, and a great majority of Zionis in the Diaspora, has for many years recognized the limitations of the party structu she said that Americans will welcome a "breakaway from the dominance of the par structure in Zionist life." Looking to the future, Mrs. Halprin said she hopes for vitalized Zionist movement, unencumbered by a structure it has outgrown. Freed party divisiveness, the Zionist movement can be strengthened as it assumes the le ship in the development and furtherance of cultural and educational programs that sential to the survival of the Jewish people both in Israel and the Diaspora," she s

FISHER-PINCUS STATEMENT STRESSES NEED TO HELP EMIGRATION TO ISRAEL

JERUSALEM, July 5. (JTA) -- Max Fisher of Detroit, general chairm the United Jewish Appeal, left Israel today for Geneva after four days of conferen Premier Levi Eshkol and other Government leaders. He conferred also with Fore Minister Abba Eban and Aryeh Pincus, chairman of the Jewish Agency executive.

Mr. Fisher and Mr. Pincus issued a joint statement stressing that 400 Jews, outside the Soviet Union, still need rescue. Mr. Fisher will attend the con on Jewish education in Geneva.

RUMANIAN JEWRY OBSERVES 25TH ANNIVERSARY OF MASSACRE OF JASSY J

BUCHAREST, July 5. (JTA) -- Jewish visitors from all parts of Ruma virtually the entire Jassy Jewish community took part in a memorial ceremony o the 25th anniversary of the slaughter of 11,000 Jassy Jews in a 1941 massacre during German occupation.

The pogrom took place at the instigation of the Gestapo but was carrie Fascist gangs of the Antonescu pro-Nazi regime. Chief Rabbi Moses Rosen said i sermon that the 500 year history of the Jews in Jassy had come to a tragic finale i the pogrom.

He said the present Government had punished the killers and created c tions which secured the liberty of the Rumanian Jewish people. A collective Pray the Dead was recited for the victims. Services also were held at the mass graves Jewish victims in two neighboring towns. At the Jewish cemetery of Roman, the another mass grave, a monument was unveiled to 370 victims buried there.

HASSIDIM CELEBRATE ANNIVERSARY OF LIBERATION OF LUBAVITCHER RE

NEW YORK, July 5. (JTA) -- Thousands of Lubavitcher hassidim her the Lubavitcher Center in Brooklyn celebrating the "12th of Tammuz," the date w late Lubavitcher Rebbe, Rabbi Joseph I. Schneersohn, was liberated from Soviet p in 1927. He had been arrested and sentenced to death for openly preaching his rel views, but was released due to the intervention of leading foreign statesmen.

A special address on the "miraculous liberation" of the Rebbe -- who came to the United States and who died in New York in 1950 -- was delivered at th bration by the present Lubavitcher Rebbe, Rabbi Menachem M. Schneersohn. Th vitcher movement exists in many countries and maintains day schools there.
