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ACTIVISTS OF PALESTINE LIBERATION ORGANIZATION ARRESTED IN JORDAN

JERUSALEM, Nov. 28. (JTA) -- Israel continued today to watch developments in Jordan with a feeling that King Fussein seems to have entrenched himself there after a few days of unrest during which extremists held demonstrations demanding his resignation and open war against Israel.

The anti-government demonstrations in Jordanian towns along the Israeli border were firmly checked today by the military authorities especially in Nablus and Hebron. The curfew was eased in the Jordanian part of Jerusalem. The situation was peaceful on the Jordanian-Israeli frontier, but not so on the Syrian-Israeli border where the Syrians fired from their positions on cars moving along the road in the Euleh area. No casualties were reported.

Several hundred followers of Ahmed Shukairy, the leader of the Palestine Liberation Organization -- who instigated the anti-government and anti-Israel demonstrations in Jordan from his residence in Egypt -- were arrested today in Jordan following an order issued last night by the King of Jordan. They included a number of known terrorists, some of whom have boasted that they have succeeded in infiltrating into Israel and in returning back to Jordan.

Under King Hussein's order, Jordanian security forces closed the quarters of the Palestine Liberation Organization in the Old City of Jerusalem, in Hebron, in Nablus and in other centers. The offices were sealed and all documents confiscated. Armed guards were posted in front of the buildings. The roundup continued all day today.

Meanwhile, the Israel Foreign Ministry announced today that Israel had withdrawn its complaint lodged with the Israel-Jordan Mixed Armistice Commission over the mining incident in the Hebron area of November 12 in which three Israeli soldiers were killed and six were wounded. The step was taken in protest against the "legalistic" attitude taken by the MAC chairman when dealing with such incidents.

In the case of an earlier incident involving the derailment of a train on the outskirts of Jerusalem, the MAC chairman had failed to fix the blame on Jordan because of a technical point. The Foreign Ministry said that Israel had withdrawn the complaint claiming that any MAC inquiry under the circumstances, would be "pointless," The Ministry spokesman said that the Commission chairman had systematically refused to blame Jordan for such terrorist activities.

ESHKOL CHIDES U.N. SECURITY COUNCIL FOR IGNORING ARAB AGGRESSION

JERUSALEM, Nov. 28. (JTA) -- Premier Levi Eshkol, addressing a session of the Israel Cabinet last night, criticized the resolution of censure adopted last Friday by the United Nations Security Council against Israel for the retaliatory raid on a Jordanian village on November 13. The Cabinet meeting was devoted to the Security Council resolution and its implications, and was addressed also by Foreign Minister Abba Eban.

The Premier expressed regret that the majority of the Sacurity Council ignored the cause which provoked the raid and which generates tension on Israel's borders. He also regretted the fact that the Security Council dealt with the results of one incident only without taking into consideration the series of similar-finidents directed against-Israel-by-some of the neighboring Arab states.

The reason for the border tension, he pointed out reason foliate or before the sension aggression conducted by Arab governments against the real outside the street of the street against repeated aggression. It was a distulbing fact that the Security was all the once again ignored the Arab policy which constitutes a violation of the United Nations Charter and the existing armistice agreements, he emphasized.

The Premier reaffirmed Israel's right to defend herself under Article 51 of the U.N. Charter so long as the Security Council does not take effective measures to halt the aggressors. He said that the one-sided resolution by the Security Council does not serve to maintain stability and peace in the Middle East.

ISRAEL CABINET APPROVES 1967 BUDGET; BELIEVED TO BE \$1,700,000,000

JERUSALEM, Nov. 28. (JTA) -- The Cabinet last night approved Israel's budget for the next fiscal year beginning April 1, 1967. While details of the budget were not revealed, the budget is believed to total \$1,700,000,000, which would be a 10 percent increase over this year's figure. The budget will be presented to the Knesset, Israel's Parliament, in three weeks and will be discussed well in advance of the start of the new fiscal year.

The Jerusalem Muncipality today approved the budget of the city's Religious Council totaling 1,600,000 pounds (\$533,000) nearly two thirds of which the Municipality will have to provide. The approval was voted over the abstention of the Mapai-Achdut Avodah Alignment and despite sharp criticism at the meeting of the Religious Council for what was described as excessive spending and padding the payroll with unqualified officials,

28,000 STUDENTS IN ISRAEL GO ON STRIKE; OBJECT TO RAISED TUITION

TEL AVIV, Nov. 28. (JTA) -- Some 28,000 students in all of Israel's institutions of higher learning went out on strike today over a decision by the Government to raise the uniform nationwide tuition fees from 600 pounds (\$2020) to 700 pounds (\$2033) annually.

The walkout was viewed with surprise here in view of the fact that the students had already agreed to an increase of 60 pounds (\$20), only 40 pounds (\$13) short of the Government figure. In Jerusalem, where most Hebrew University students were out on strike, students of the Bezalel School of Art and the School of Pshyiotherapy joined in the strike. A group of students at the Hebrew University, however, organized a demonstration against the strike.

In Haifa, several thousand students gathered on the campus of the Technion-Israel Institute of Technology carrying posters protesting the stationed guards near the entrances of the institution to prevent "strike-breaking" students from entering the buildings.

ISRAEL CUTS EXPORT OF COTTON GOODS TO U.S.; YIELDS TO WASHINGTON

JERUSALEM, Nov. 28. (JTA) -- The Ministry of Commerce and Industry today ordered Israeli textile firms to discontinue further shipments of certain categories of cotton fabrics to the United States after the American Government lodged a protest over Israeli shippers exceeding the established quota according to the terms of an agreement between the two governments. The U.S. Government complained to Israel a few weeks ago that Israeli shippers had exceeded the quota.

(In New York, Israel's Economic Minister, Nahum Shamir, pointed out that Israeli shippers had used about 25 percent of the cotton goods quota for the year beginning October 1, 1966 and that, due to strong demand for certain items, quotas of two individual categories had been exceeded. He stressed that Israel had never exceeded the quotas in any previous years since the agreement first went into effect in 1963. He said that Israeli and U.C. representatives would meet soon to negotiate a new agreement.)

EUROMART COUNCIL INDICATES READINESS TO CONSIDER ISRAEL'S REQUEST

BRUSSELS, Nov. 28. (JTA) -- The Council of the European Economic Community reiterated here its intention to consider on December 6 procedures for handling Israel's request for a comprehensive agreement with the six-nation Euromart bloc. Israel has a limited agreement now which will expire at the end of next June. It has formally asked for either a much more comprehensive agreement or for associate status.

The Council noted that there had been "progress" in talks with Austria, Spain, Israel and the Maghreb (North Africa) countries. It was agreed that the issues would be discussed when the Foreign Ministers of the six nations of which the Council is composed meet with the Council on December 6-7. In regard to Israel, the Council indicated that the basic decision was whether the EEC Commission should be asked to initiate exploratory talks to sound out Israeli wishes or whether the six countries should first consider the free.

In a related problem, the EEC Commission said it could not make an anticipated decision authorizing use of a chemical called duphenyl which is used by Israel and other countries shipping citrus fruits to Euromart countries by sea to protect the fruit in transit. The Commission asked the Council of Ministers to extend the present temporary authorization to use duphenyl for another six months until June 1967 when the Council will, it was hoped, make a final decision. Without the use of some such preservative, Israeli citrus would snoil before arrival.

FIVE ARRESTED IN HOLLYWOOD; SHOUTED 'HEIL HITLER' AND PROVOKED FIGHT

HOLLYWOOD, Cal., Nov. 28. (JTA) -- Five men who drive around a Jewish neighborhood here shouting "Heil Hitler," were arrested today after they got into fights with angry residents aroused by the incident. The man, who were armed with a chain, were booked on suspicion of assault with a deadly weapon. The five men were accompanied by two teenaged girls.

GOLDMANN CONSIDERS RISE OF NEO-NAZISM IN GERMANY 'NOT TOO DANGEROUS'

LONDON, Nov. 28. (JTA) -- Dr. Nahum Goldmann, president of the World Jewish Congress said here today that the growth of neo-Nazis in Germany was "not too dangerous," However, while advising Jews "not to get panicky," Dr. Goldmann warned them against underestimating developments such as the election successes of the National Democratic

Noting that the Germans were used to and insisted upon strong leadership, Dr. Goldmann said that he viewed the National Democratic Party's election success "more as an expression of disgust at a weak regime and the politically chaotic situation which has recently prevailed." He warned, however, that "there are too many old Nazis in the new party's rank and file" and that the party "uses slogans and methods that remind one of the old Nazi days."

SIR BARNETT JANNER RAISES GERMAN NEO-NAZI ISSUE IN BRITISH PARLIAMENT

LONDON, Nov. 28. (JTA) -- Sir Barnett Janner, British Jewish leader, drew attention in the House of Commons today to a proposed motion which referred to the "grave consequence of the rise of neo-Nazism in West Germany in the elections in Fesse and Bavaria" where the extremist National Democratic Party won Parliamentary seats for the first time this month.

Sir Barnett told the Plouse that despite the statements of the "new Nazi party" that it has no "sinister intent," a very serious situation had arisen in West Germany. He asserted that "precisely the same argument was used by the Nazis when they came to power, with disastrous results to civilization."

Replying to Sir Barnett, Richard Crossman, a Labor deputy who is House leader, said that anyone who remembered the events of the 1920's when the Nazis were a negligible group in precisely that part of Bavaria would have a "macabre feeling" at seeing German history "apparently repeating itself." He added, however, that "one should not jump to that conclusion." He said that there would soon be a foreign affairs debate in the House and the issue could be discussed then.

BRITISH BILL AGAINST BIAS TO INCLUDE RELIGIOUS DISCRIMINATION

LONDON, Nov. 28. (JTA) -- An amendment to the Race Relations Act of 1965 which would also include religious discrimination, was introduced into Parliament today by Lord Fenner Brockway.

The amendment contains a clause prohibiting discrimination in clubs and would make it an offense not only to "stir up hatred" against a section of the public on racial grounds, but would also ban the promoting of "contempt" for a section of the public on racial grounds.

INCREASED ANTI-JEWISH PROPAGANDA NOTED IN AUSTRALIAN UNIVERSITIES

SYDNEY, Australia, Nov. 28. (JTA) -- The Public Relations Committee of the Jewish Board of Deputies has been asked to take action against anti-Jewish and anti-Israel propaganda at universities here which have reached serious proportions during recent weeks.

A representative of the Board said that there was increased activity in printing anti-Semitic propaganda in Sydney. The spokesman also warned the community against a small youth group going around among the Jewish community collecting money for a so-called "protective society." The community was warned not to give aid to this group but to contact the Board of Deputies, if approached by them.

ANTI-JEWISH REFERENCES NOTED IN SWEDISH TEXTBOOKS; ELIMINATION URGED

STOCKHOLM, Nov. 28. (JTA) -- The Swedish newspaper Dagens Nyheter called today for the elimination of anti-Semitic references in Swedish school textbooks. In an editorial on the subject, the paper calls attention to a charge by the noted Yiddish writer Ingemar Lundborg that such references had been introduced inadvertently into Swedish school books.

Mr. Lundborg had cited the example of the assertion in one school textbook that Jesus died at the hands of the "Jewish people." Another example he cited was the assertion that the "Jews killed Christ and refused to accept him ever since." Mr. Lundborg, the editorial noted, had written to the Archbishop of Sweden about the matter, but nothing had been done about it.

ISRAEL SURGEONS COMPLETE SUCCESSFUL HEART OPERATION IN JERUSALEM

JERUSALEM, Nov. 28. (JTA) -- Surgeons at the Hadassah-Hebrew University Hospital today inserted artificial valves in the heart of a resident of Kiryat Gat. The operation is one of the first of its kind to be successfully completed.

MANY JEWISH BUSINESSES DESTROYED IN FLORENCE FLOOD, J.D.C. REFCRTS

NEW YORK, Nov. 28. (JTA) -- A grant of \$25,000 to the Jewish community of Florence was today made available by the Joint Distribution Committee and the Conference on Jewish Material Claims Against Cermany, it was announced by Charles H. Jordan, JDC executive vice-chairman. The grant will match a similar sum contributed by Italian Jewish communities to provide immediate assistance to residents of the JDC-supported old age home as well as other needy Jews in the city, which was inundated by recent floods,

"Vast sums have already been allocated for the relief of the people of Florence by the Italian Government," Mr. Jordan declared, "Flowever, our grant is designed to demonstrate the continuing concern of the JDC, the Claims Conference, and American Jewry for the Jewish community of Florence, which was a long-time beneficiary of our aid after World War IL."

A representative of JDC headquarters in Geneva, who surveyed the flood damage in Florence, reported this week that the forty residents of the Old Age Home have been forced to take shelter on the second floor of the building. The Home and other community buildings are in the heart of the disaster area. About 15 inches of water and mud still remain in the gymnasium of the Jewish school. The ground floor is now being used to store food and clothing. More than two-thirds of the 15,000 books in the Jewish community library were under water.

"It is still too early to evaluate what help the Jewish community will eventually require," Mr. Jordan noted. "Renovation of the community buildings will certainly be needed; while the foundation of the synagogue does not appear to require extensive repairs, it is still too early to be sure. However many of the city's 1,400 Jewish residents have seen everything they own destroyed -- in their homes as well as their businesses. A small number of families who lost everything in the floods will require immediate welfare grants. A larger number will need long-term loans to help them get back on their feet."

J.W.B. FORESEES INVESTMENT OF \$77,500,000 IN JEWISH CENTERS

NEW YORK, Nov. 28. (JTA) -- By the end of 1966, Jewish Community Centers and YM-YWHAs affiliated with the National Jewish Welfare Board will have built 107 new buildings since World War II at a cost of approximately \$102,000,000, the JWB reported today.

Based on current and contemplated community studies, the report predicted that the construction of new Center and YM-YWHA buildings will continue unabated through 1975. It estimated that from 1966 through 1975, at least \$77,500,000 will be invested in the construction of 66 new JCC and YM-YWHA buildings and major additions, exclusive of the cost of land, equipment, architectural fees and related expenses.

"During 1966 alone, eight new JCC and YM-YWEA buildings will be completed at a total cost of \$9,085,000," the report said. "The growth in new Center and YM-YWHA construction is particularly striking with the recognition of the fact that the combined original investment in facilities which have not yet been replaced was \$18,000,000. Thus by the end of 1966, properties of Jewish Community Centers and YM-YWHAs, exclusive of resident camp sites and country day camp sites, will represent a capital investment of \$120,000,000 - four times the investment before the start of the new Center construction boom,"

The projection, according to the JWB, is that by 1975, "practically all Centers will either have moved into new buildings or will have added extensively to previously existing facilities. The total investment in all of these projects will be in the neighborhood of \$190,000,000. Thus, in a span of slightly more than a quarter century, investment in Jewish Community Center buildings will have multiplied nearly seven-fold,"
