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Page Four VI Urges Extension Of Mideast Cease-Fire And Resolved Dispute

WASH., Nov. 3 (AP)—Page Four VI urged his followers yesterday to pay for an extension of the Middle East cease-fire and a "tentative cessation" of the current Mideast dispute in the United Nations General Assembly last fall before the year end by applying pressure by collectively boycotting. He told his followers they should be prepared to do this, but he stressed that the Mideast crisis would become aggravated, possibly involving other nations. He expressed confidence in the "bravery and sense of responsibility" of both sides in the conflict and in "the measured judgment" of the General Assembly. He said the world must stay firm over such a year-end extension through December.

British Foreign Secretary Calls For Israel's Withdrawal To Pre-1947 Borders

LONDON, Nov. 3 (AP)—The British government's first minister yesterday in the Middle East gave the Conservative Party last night another line year-end Israeli and pro-Israelist circles have attacked and argued over what has become a "tentative cessation" of Britain's position from the spirit of the Security Council's Nov. 29, 1947 resolution on the Mideast. Foreign Secretary Sir Alan Douglas Jones called the government's stand in a speech at Harrogate yesterday. It envisaged Israel's withdrawal from all of the occupied Arab territories, in effect a return to the pre-1947 borders with only "minor" alterations of Israel's old borders with Jordan. He also specifically excluded the Golan Heights as an area Israel must eventually evacuate, stated that the status of Jerusalem remains a matter to be settled and proposed the return of those Palestinian refugees who wish to, to their former homes if they show that they are prepared to live peacefully with their neighbors. Sir Alan's speech attracted the "ambiguity of the completion of territory to use." It did emphasize and in other places it reminded the Mideast peace plan submitted last December by United States Secretary of State William E. Rogers which provided Israeli live at the time. Israeli circles have appeared especially displeased at the timing of Sir Alan's speech which was delivered only three days before the arrival here of Professor Golda Meir for talks with Prime Minister Harold Macmillan.

His stand was regarded "highly significant" when Sir Alan's speech was referred to last in New York yesterday. He is expected to attend a conference when also meets Mr. Macmillan on Wednesday. Sir Alan made his statement last night after visiting officials here with British Foreign Minister Ernest A. Greenwood. The Middle East was described as an important subject on their agenda but not the major one. The official communique issued by the Foreign Office Thursday night stressed the importance of a political settlement under the framework of the Security Council's Resolution 242 of Nov. 29, 1947 and the recognition of the Jewish people's right to their own state. The communique also called for both sides to extend the cease-fire "for a period to be determined." According to reliable sources here, the British government backed toward the Soviet view with regard to Egyptian resolutions of the Security Council. The British position reportedly was that there should be agreement to the return of the Jewish folk on the grounds that a successful outcome of the talks would make the issue irrelevant. It was reportedly made clear to the Soviet Foreign Minister however that Britain's position and attitude differ greatly from those of the Soviet Union. Sir Alan stressed in the speech that Britain wants to maintain friendship with Israel and "cannot accept a program which would involve disappearance of the State of Israel, or the Palestinian population desired."

He Also, Like Two Several Days Earlier, Urges Recognition Of Palestinian Rights

He added, however, "We must work for a settlement which will attract the agreement of all peoples in the area including the Palestinians and take account of their legitimate aspirations." He also said, in connection with the refugees, that those who wish to return to their homes and were prepared to live in peace with their neighbors should do so while those who do not wish to return should be enabled to settle elsewhere with compensation. He added that Britain should not "ignore the political aspirations of the Palestinian Arabs and their desire to be given means of self-expression." He called for the recognition of the rights of the Palestinians approved by the resolution by United Nations subsidiary bodies in the United Nations, Charles W. Trout, who, in his address yesterday to the General Assembly, declared that the U.S. recognized that the "legitimate concerns and aspirations" of the Palestinians should be taken into account if there is to be peace in the Middle East. Mr. Trout added that the U.S. had no pre-conceived view as to the form Palestinian participation would take in a settlement. Sir Alan's statement on the refugees was almost totally in contrast with Israel's view. Israeli sources here said he proposed that the refugees issue be settled only after other issues represented a "very broad-based" framework on UN mediated General Assembly. In earlier negotiations, he already reached an agreement that the refugee problem be part of an overall "package deal."

Believed Israel To Retain Hope That Conservative Government Would Be Pro-Israel

Israel sources also took strong issue with the British Foreign Secretary's failure to mention de-annexation of occupied territories after Israeli withdrawal or "timely and measured agreements" between the two sides. They were particularly angered by his failure to mention in the principle of an undivided Jerusalem. Sir Alan said in that connection that the issue of Jerusalem needs earlier agreement, particularly regarding freedom of access to the holy places which he described as an "essential part of any settlement." The Israelis maintain that as long as Jerusalem is under their rule, no pretense could be made regarding access to the holy places. Especially anxious from Israel's

point of view was Mr. Auer's proposal that the old boundaries between Israel and Syria be restored, which means that Israel must give up the Golan Heights and Syria accept the Nov. 23, 1947 resolution. He also called for restoration of the old international borders in Iraq between Israel and Egypt, then to be dealt with by special arrangements taking into account the massive concentration of refugees from there. He suggested that the pre-1947 line between Israel and Jordan be subject to future changes as the occupied West Bank.

A spokesman for the Israeli Embassy here said today that Mr. Auer said that no reliable peace could be made unless there "exists and recognized boundaries" about to be between Israel and its neighbors as this was a condition for the parties themselves to determine. The spokesman said Israel's position on the future boundaries will be determined by its vital security needs. Israel's course was also dictated by Mr. Auer's failure to mention "division of occupation." He spoke only of guarantees of passage through the Straits of Tiran, the Gulf of Aqaba and the Red Sea. The spokesman here stressed in a statement that Israel was international territory, the Israelis pointed out. He also stressed that the existing agreements between Israel and the Arab states including the obligation of all states to refrain from acts of hostility and to do all in their power to prevent such acts. Mr. Auer refused to pass on a discussion of the Arab reaction. He said, "I believe that international efforts should be made by all concerned to grasp the opportunity to make peace which I think exists." Mr. Auer's statement apparently came as a big disappointment to those who thought the Conservative government would adopt a Middle East policy similar to that with Israel's interests than the policies followed by the pro-Israel Labor government. The Israeli spokesman remarked today, "An officially article issued Israel has invited to parties British action."

McConnell, British Section, Oppose Mr. Auer's Middle East Views Intimidate To Peace

LONDON, Nov. 2 (UPI)—The British section of the World Jewish Congress charged today that Foreign Secretary Sir Alan Douglas-Boscawen's statement of Britain's Middle East policy last night was "not confined to the establishment of a just and lasting peace in the Middle East." The charge was contained in an emergency resolution adopted at the close of the WJC's annual conference. The WJC called on the British government to re-affirm its support of the Security Council's Resolution 242 regarding a peace settlement based on secure, recognized boundaries for Israel and full recognition of her sovereignty by her Arab neighbors. The resolution called further for a British reaffirmation of support for freedom of navigation for all in international waters and for the government to recognize that the unity of Jerusalem under Israeli rule has been to the benefit of all its inhabitants. The resolution noted that the British government has placed control of the holy places in the city in the hands of the religious denominations for which they have the deepest meaning.

The conference, attended by delegates from 48 organizations, was addressed by Israel's Ambassador, Michael Comay and by Dr. Joachim Peles, chairman of the WJC's governing council. Mr. Comay said that Israel would not "speculate over her prospects for a short peace." Dr. Peles complained that Western Jews are extremely ignorant of Jewish life and feeling and use of a "diffusion quality" that the six million European Jews destroyed by Hitler. "For the longest generation within Christian Jewry and within other Jewries it is impossible search for a meaningful existence as Jews," Dr. Peles said. He noted that many young Jews feel disillusion in Israel where "life, even death, becomes meaningless." He went on to say that it was now quite clear that world Jewry could not exist without Israel.

Lord Rothschild Named By Heath To Head Key Advisory Body to Government

LONDON, Nov. 1 (UPI)—Renowned Mayor Victor Rothschild, the Lord Rotschild, has been named by Prime Minister Edward Heath to head a new key advisory body of the British government. The 60-year-old member of the House of Lords, though a member of the famed banking family, spent much of his life as a biochemist at Cambridge and joined the Shell Oil Company in 1929 as director of research. He has just returned from the latter post. He will be in charge of the Central Policy Review Staff, a group of about 20 men and women that will weigh all major proposed proposals within the government, consider the costs and consequences and render an analysis advisory to the cabinet. According to news observers, the new body will be one of the most powerful within the Conservative administration. Lord Rothschild will be paid the top-most service salary of \$25,000. The Spring Observer described him as "brilliant." The Daily Telegraph commented that Lord Rothschild "is known for his breadth of the views. As a bio-chemist, he practices everything and that is why Heath picked him." Lord Rothschild's paternal great grandfather, Lionel Nathan, was the first Jew to sit in the House of Commons. His grandfather, made a peer in 1870, was the first professor Jew in the House of Lords. The present Victor Rothschild was educated at Harrow and Trinity College, Cambridge. A fellow of the Royal Society, he was awarded the George Medal during World War II. "Our language will be incoherent circumstances," President Harry S. Truman reacted from the Legion of Honor for working out in heavy and positive ways of understanding many savings banks placed to steps and observers.

Mrs. Meir Meeting With Trades, Jewish Organizations and Leaders Of Canada

TORONTO, Nov. 2 (UPI)—Israel's Premier Golda Meir, arriving here this morning on a special plane provided by the Canadian government to participate in school conferences and private meetings with leaders of major Jewish organizations. She is scheduled to meet tomorrow with Canada's Prime Minister Pierre Elliott Trudeau and other top government officials. After arriving, Mrs. Meir went directly to a meeting sponsored by the Labor Jewish Organization and was scheduled to appear later in the afternoon and evening at conferences sponsored by the Central Jewish appeal and Israeli Youth Organization in Toronto. Interviews with Mrs. Meir were to be reported this afternoon for contribution broadcasts on all Canadian television systems. The Israeli Premier will leave for London in a few days to meet with Israeli government leaders in Ottawa and discuss the country's attitude toward Israel and the problems of peace in the Middle East.

Left-Wing Blacks Agree Consensus, Israeli Identity With Terrorists, Moslems

NEW YORK, Nov. 3 (UPI)—A group of left-wing Black Americans issued an today an U.S. support of Israel and expressed their solidarity with their "Palestinian brothers and sisters." Most of them, supporters, representatives and well known activists in the left-wing movement, demanded "that all leftists lay off an insistence of my kind to Israel and stop. Superficial and Division that out will get out of the Middle East. We call for anti-American solidarity with the Palestinian people's struggle for national liberation and to expel all of their alien land." A number of signatories were identified as members of the Socialist Workers Party, a Trotskyist organization which opposes the most violent anti-Israel, anti-Jewish views in the left-wing movement. Several other signatories are leaders in the civil rights movement, including Phil Hardage, former chairman of the Student Non-Violent Coordinator along Communist (SNCC); the Rev. Albert Cleage of Detroit; Robert Williams, who returned recently from several years of exile in Cuba and (from whom) Young his home in Monroe, North Carolina stands as was involved in organizing the civil resistance of the black community there; Clarence B. Kennedy, a New York attorney; and Clarence Neal, a leader of the Third World Women Alliance.

The consensus attack on Israel and Zionism by the group which calls itself "Coalition of Black Americans for Truth About the Middle East," appeared in a full-page advertisement in today's New York Times. The statement expressed solidarity with the large number Arab guerrilla groups and sought out an anti-Israel group which Israel is proud that anti-Zionism exists even among Jews. The group stepped out in the Israeli Socialist Organization, known more popularly as "Workers' Children." This particular group calls for the dismantling of the Israeli state and lives in the line of the Democratic Popular Front for the Liberation of Palestine which is led by Dr. Yusef Kawar. It traces its roots to that of the leaders of Moslems, Arab labor, as Israeli, has been covering the United States under the sponsorship of a group whose list of members include James Chemistry and whose secretary is Betty Longtin, a member of the Socialist Workers Party. The Coalition of Black Americans stated that they are not anti-Zionist. "We are anti-Israel and against the Zionist State of Israel, the support of American imperialism in the Middle East," they declared. "Zionism is a reactionary racist ideology that justifies the exploitation of the Palestinian people from their lands and homes, and attempts to cheat the Jewish masses of Israel and elsewhere in the service of imperialism to keep both the Middle East divided."

The signatories also blamed that it is the United States which is responsible for "the slaughter of Palestinian refugees and freedom fighters" because of its financial and moral support of the Israeli government during the recent Jordanian civil war. "America's support for King Hussein is consistent with its support of reactionary dictatorships throughout the world," they continued. They also criticized, without any facts or proof to back them this resolution statement, that "Israel supported the United States in the Korean War; aided France and the Nationalist Chinese Army Organization in Algeria against the Algerian revolution; opposed the international independence movements in Morocco, Tunisia, Indonesia and elsewhere; treated the regular revolutionary anti-communist of General Mikoyan who was one of the persons responsible for the murder of Patrick Lachance in the Congo; and generally provides arms and other equipment to the Portuguese troops fighting against the Angolan and Mozambique liberation fighters." The advertisement also includes an appeal for funds and invites the reader to send away for a "booklet about the Middle East."

Black Editor Warns Of Rising Tide Of Pro-Israel Feelings Among Black Muslims

ST. LOUIS, Nov. 3 (UPI)—A leading Negro newspaper has warned here that right that while Black Muslims are generally sympathetic to Israel, a "rising tide of pro-Israel feeling" could in a variety of ways, be becoming increasingly evident among segments of Black Muslims, intellectuals and persons living in the lower cities. Edward B. Woods, editor and publisher of the St. Louis Post-Dispatch, presented this analysis of the rise of such opinion in the Middle East resulted in a conference of local Jewish communal and student leaders convened here by the (New World International Council) and the Jewish Community Relations Council of St. Louis. The "specter" of such Black Muslims, Mr. Woods said, "is to be anti-Zionist. Most they view the establishment as being pro-Israel, they feel they must be pro-Israel." Mr. Woods said that anti-Israel feelings among Black people is self-developed rather than could possibly be attributed to "being directed attributed to outside influences rather than being based on international situations." Mr. Woods, who was part of a group of ten publishers of Negro newspapers that toured Israel in a two-day study mission last year, said the "great masses" of Black people have "an affinity and warmth for the land" of Israel as "the rest of Christianity."

But, Mr. Woods added, the feeling "does not necessarily spin off to include the Israeli people and their supporters." He said that some Muslim led the United States in "search of their commonness" while "trying to connect with other communities. The bridge about an attitude, especially among Black intellectuals, of a double standard in international affairs which conditions thinking in other international situations, including the Middle East." Mr. Woods said that the "speakers of colored blacks in over countries should not be raised lightly in the context of their opinion toward Israel." The publisher called his visit to Israel a "unique experience" that impressed him with the Israeli people, their high religious observance and the courage of the kibbutz as a source of development. He said that in order for the U.S. to push for withdrawal of military personnel in Egypt and ending a five-point for a Middle East war" must, there must be a transformation of American opinion—including that of blacks—to consider as that there is more involved than the Jewish-Arab-Israeli problem. What is involved," he said, "is a major moral struggle to extend its jurisdiction over the entire Middle East."

Whitney Young Rejects Myth Of Arab-Black Amity; Calls For U.S. Aid To Israel

NEW YORK, Nov. 3 (UPI)—Whitney Young Jr., executive director of the National Urban League, has rejected "the myth of Arab-Black amity" in a letter expressing his support of American military

and to Israel. "It seems as if to read and absorb such countries have given the struggling new nations of black Africa, although the Israelis have a very impressive program of technical assistance to the so-called 'developing' countries, even to nations that hate the Arab but to the US." Mr. Young wrote in reply to a letter objecting to his signature on a New York Times advertisement in support of Israel last June. That year's issue to the Middle East, the United League official wrote, "It would increase to better providing Israel with the weapons she needs to defend herself against those who have sworn to destroy her. Mr. Young's letter, dated October 1, was released today by the American Jewish Congress, which has approved it for distribution among its members. Mr. Young's opinion, "that history and culture is replace with measures of racial prejudice. Today, the Arab rulers of the States are waging a systematic war against the Arab people of the southern region of that country, and Arabs in Chad are at war with the black government of that country."

The United League director also said he was "amazed" at what his critics—who was not identified—called the "Arab-baiting." Mr. Young wrote, "If the Arab nations had really been concerned with improving the social, economic and political conditions of their people, they would long ago have ceased threatening to push Israel into the sea and concentrated their energies on improving the lives of their people." In the letter Mr. Young contrasted the situation in the Arab countries as well as the structural racism in America, with Israeli efforts on behalf of the growing population of Oriental Jews. "We still think to Israel improved upon us in that the Israelis are unable to tolerate the gap of differing their Oriental population and are taking steps—educational and economic—to close it." The civil rights leader observed that the Oriental Jews of Israel came to that country to flee "the most brutal kind of religious oppression and social and economic discrimination." The advertisement signed by Mr. Young in the New York Times last June 30 was sponsored by the A. Philip Randolph Institute. It was signed by 44 Negro leaders of organizations, church officials, educators and institutions.

It urged "our government to take steps to help guarantee Israel's right to exist as a nation." In the October 7 letter explaining his stand, Mr. Young sharply repudiated accusations of Israel's complicity of former Arab-territories. He noted that the Israeli occupation of the West Bank has been "the most brutal and unprovoked occupation in history. Despite the repeated acts of armed terrorism, West Bank Arabs enjoy self-government under the leaders appointed by the Jordanian public and Israeli newspapers and freely demonstrate against the Jordanian, an extraordinary situation." He added that West Bank Arabs have found jobs and higher pay within Israel itself, have joined the Histadrut and receive equal payment in employment and other benefits. Mr. Young observed that in the years preceding the Israeli occupation, civil liberties were "thoroughly and systematically violated by the Jordanian ruling classes."

Mrs. Blair Urges Members To Aid Jewish Jews In Their Effort To Emigrate

UNITED STATES SEN. J. W. FULBRIGHT—senator from Missouri—today urged his fellow members of the Senate to "take your good offices with the government of the Soviet Union and urge it to cooperate with sympathy and understanding in the application of laws which make possible only their freedom and their growth in Israel." Fulbright's remarks came just following their meeting on Friday last in Moscow, Fulbright's ambassador to the US and a man with Jewish ancestry, probably will bring up the matter with Soviet authorities but generally does not need to visit the political hot spot. Mrs. Blair promised Dr. Heston with a copy of a recent letter from Fulbright to Moscow from to Secretary (see end of item), the US House of Representatives, the Soviet government and the Israeli government. The letter, addressed to Heston, "takes your office in protest against the wretched of Jewish rights and justice" and to "take effective steps for the implementation of the rights of the Jewish people in return to the land of Israel."

Mrs. Blair said to Dr. Heston that "the files of the United Nations International are filled with Israel-appeal" similar to that case. Soviet Jews' pleas to Soviet authorities are "of no avail," she said. "The applications are rejected, time and time again, without explanation or reason being given. Of the numerous appeals for exit permits to Israel, only a few have received favorable replies." Mrs. Blair said she hoped Dr. Heston would urge the Soviet and Soviet authorities "to do as early as possible, in the spirit of the Charter and the Universal Declaration of Human Rights." Mrs. Blair also appealed to Dr. Heston to letter as well as to persons, concluded by saying, "I hope and pray that your humanitarian efforts will have fruit and help bring redemption to the great host of Jewish Mother who will be happy to serve in the United States."

AACongress 'Hot Line' On Soviet Jewry In Operation; First Message Now Available

NEW YORK, Nov. 1 (JTA)—The opening phase of the Soviet Jewry "hot line" operated by the American Jewish Congress, went into effect successfully this weekend. Letters during this Thursday-Friday in special phase set up by the Highgate West Congress House have—based a message submitted by Rabbi Leifeld J. Lefkowitz, President of the AACongress, describing Israel developments affecting the three million Jews in the Soviet Union. The first message transmitted a letter sent to Mrs. Heston, AACongress Executive Director, to Soviet Moscow Jews. The letter, the first sent directly to an American Jewish organization, begged for help in their struggle to leave the Soviet Union and emigrate to Israel.

"We are demanding the right to emigrate to Israel and we are being deflected by force by the USSR to Soviet authorities. Despite attempts to deprive us of our citizenship, we will retain our right to live in what we consider to be our Land—Israel," declared the seven Moscow Jews who signed their full names and addresses to what Rabbi Lefkowitz termed "unheard of letters." Rabbi Lefkowitz commented that his letter demonstrates that actions on behalf of Soviet Jewry by American Jews "give them great confidence, courage and hope."
