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Kahane Says All JDL Womens "Legal" Plans New Bomb-Making Seminar

WOODBURNE, N.Y., July (JTA)--Rabbi Meir Kahane, national chairman of the Jewish Defense League, told the Jewish Telegraphic Agency today that "The JDL will not be turnling in any illegal weapons because we have none." Kahane, who pleaded guilty in Brooklyn Federal District Court Friday to a conspiracy charge involving the manufacture of explosives, was referring to a stipulation by the Government that the JDL turn over to Federal authorities any illegal weapons and fire arms in its possession and submit to an inspection of its camp site here. Those were part of the conditions laid down by Government attorneys when they agreed to accout guilty pleas by Kahane and two other JDL co-defendants on the explosives charge while dropping charges against Kahane and 12 others of conspiracy to transport fire arms across state lines. Kahane. 38. and his no delemante Chaim Blaher in, and Stewart Cohen, 18, originally pleaded not guilty to the explosives charge before Federal Judge Jack B. Weinstein. After changing their plea, Kahane's lawyer, Barry Slotaick, said the agreement had the approval of the U.S. Attorney General's office in Washington.

Interviewed by the JTA at Camp Jedel here, Kahane said the JDI had "quite a few gune" at the camp but that all were "registered and legal." He said that the manufacture of explosives at the camp got him into trouble because of ignorance of the law. He said he didn't know that the JDL needed a \$250 Federal stamp in order to explode a bomb on its own property. And that his nurrose in making and quivering a besitt was to show campers now radical groups prepared their own bombs. Kahane said that he planned a similar demonstration for the press next week and that this time he would "invest \$250 in a stamp." He said his guide in the bomb-making seminar would be instructions published in a Black Panther newspaper. Kahane faces sentence later this month on the explosives charge. He told the JTA that if he is jailed he did not expect the JDL to collapse. "We have thousands of young members who won't be stopped by this," he asserted, adding that he expected to continue to play a leadership role in the JDL even from jail,

(Kahane defended his philosophy that violence in a righteous cause was justified on a television talk show broadcast Friday night. He was a guest on the 90-minute David Frost Show (Ch. 5) along with two prominent critics of JDL tactics, playwright Doros Schary, honorary chairman of the B'nail B'rith's Anti-Defamation League and Prof. Hans Morgenthau, a political scientist on the faculty of the University of Chicago and CUNY. On the show, taped June 28, Kahane denied that JDL members ever engaged in bombing or spitting. He said, "I think it's very easy for people who have lived in this country and have freedom to sit back and say, Well, it's not nice to do certain things to Russian diplomats.' That's quite right, it isn't nice. A war is never nice. This is in effect a war between the Soviet Union and Jews. Soviet diplomats' lives should be made as bearable or unbearable as Soviet Jews' lives are... I am in favor of any violence if it is necessary" even though "violence is ugly."

He continued, "While it is very easy to incite young Jews in New York to the kinds of misdeeds which we have witnessed, it is very easy to forget that three million Jews are hostages to the government of the Soviet Union. And the government of the Soviet Union can do with those Jews whatever it wants. This I think, is a danger which is completely overlooked in those self-satisfying, narcissistic activities which we are discussing here and which require absolutely no heroism.")

JERUSALEM, July 11 (JTA) -- The first visit to Israel by an incumbent West German Foreign Minister ended yesterday when Walter Scheel took off for Boan after a four-day stay which included two days of political talks with Israeli Foreign Minister Abba Eban, meetings with Premier Golda Meir and other officials and a courtesy call paid to former Premier David Ben Gurlon. The visit was a friendly one and there were no serious incidents to embarrass the German statesman or his hosts. But informed circles analyzing the political results tested deniced that from israpi's point of view it was a "voly limited success." Nevertheless, Scheel put many israelis at ease when he stated that "The Federal Republic does not believe that a total withdrawal of Israel from all occupied territories is a pre-regulatic of peace in the region." He declined however to be drawn into a statement on Israel's future borders saying, "I find that a public discussion of this question by a representative of the Federal Republic is not indicated. We do not want to assume the role of arbiters."

Referring to the Mideast document prepared last May by Common Market experts and fostered by France, Scheel said he caw no contradiction between the desire of his government to constantly improve the relations with Israel on the one hand and a reconcillation with France on the other. COJO Plenary Ends; Solidarity With Israel, Soviet Jewry Pledged

GENEVA, July II (JTA).—The World Conference of Jewish Organizations (Cojo) wound up its three-day planery meeting here with the adoption of the absolution pladeing full approach for its conference of the solution pladeing full approach for a just and lasting peace? and another declaring its "unbreakable brotherly solidarity with the Jews of the Soviet Union." A third resolution pledged "brotherly solidarity with the Jews of the Middle East., now held hostages in some Arab countries, particularly Syria." Adoption of an emergeicy resolution was prompted by news of the terrorist rocket attack on Petach Tikvah last Wedeneday night which claimed four lives, "This conference again expresses its abhorence of terrorist activities which seek to achieve political ends through the deliberate and indiscriminate killing of unarmed, innocent man, women and children," the resolution declared. It urged "all governments and peoples to condemn unequivocally all such outrages."

The Cojo plenary, attended by the leadership of 11 major Jewish organizations, was marked by a transfer of leadership. Dr. Nahum Goldmann, who founded the organization 13 years ago, retired from the chairmanship to be succeeded by Dr. William Wexter, international president of Brian Brith, one of the Cojo constituents. Louis A. Pincus, chairman of the Jewish Agency in Jerusalem, and Dr. Joachim Prinz of the World Jewish Congress were elected co-chairmen. New vice chairmen are Michael Fidler, MP, president of the Board of Doputies of British Jews; Monroe Abbey, chairman of the Canadian Jewish Congress; and Sion Cohen Imach, of the DAIA in Buenos Aires, the central representative body of Argentine Jewry. Yehuda Heilman, of New York, was elected secretary general. The sessions, which began last Wednesday, were highlighted by a discussion of the changing Jewish community in America, introduced by Rabbi Arthur Hertzberg, of Englewood, N.J., a member of the Jewish Agency executive and a report on relations with world church bedies, delivered by Dr. Gerhard M. Riegner, of the World elwish Congress, speaking on behalf of the International Jewish Committee on Inter-Religious Relations. Gen. Silmon Gazi, head of the Military Government department of Israell General Headquarters, provided a detailed analysis of the condition of Arabs living under Israeli rule in the occupied territories.

Rabbi Hertzberg said the real problem of American Jewry was the direction the next generation will take. "We are actually the last of the Eastern European generation, and this includes even those of us born in the West," he said. "It is obvious we shall have no more Jewish ghettos of any kind. But this does not solve the problem of Jewishness, even if it may solve the problem of Jews. At this juncture," Rabbi Hertzberg said, "Anierican Jews are themselves a problem, not a problem-solver. American Jews need the help of Israel and the cooperation of the rest of Jewry in their search for a solution to their problem, the problem of the next Jewish generation in America." Dr. Riegner said, "Difficulties developed on several levels in our relations with the Protestants and Roman Catholics. The most important aspect of these difficulties is a change of attitude toward Israel. Positions are taken up in regard to largel which we have to counter and resist. I cannot say that I see a solution for these difficulties in the near future. But we consider our relations with the churches of the world of great importance in many respects." Speaking of the occupied territories, Gen. Gazit said. "It was our policy, from the very beginning, not to interfere with the lives of the Arabs under our rule except where security is involved. We are determined not to cause unnecessary hardships or even inconveniences and to avoid e mbarrassments. We den't even hoist the Israell flag in the Arab towns. Needless to say, maitreatment of Arabs under any circumstances is not permitted.

Discussing the economic aspects of Israell occupation of Arab territories, Gen. Gazit said, "We have now in the Arabs under our rule another million consumers for the products of israell industries. On the other hand, 40,000 Arabs from the occupied territories have regular employment in Israel at wages ten times higher than they had in the old days—when they could find work."

Dayan Claims Egyptian Pressure Delaying New U.S. Arms To Israel

TEL AVIV. July II (ATA)—Two Israell leadors have volced concern that their country's best friends do not regard its security needs with sufficient urgency. Defense Minister Moshe Dayan, interiwed on Kol Israel radio yesterday charged bluntly that Egyptian pressure on the United States was preventing Israel from getting the combat aircraft it needed. "Israel is not getting a steady flow of arms" into U.S. he said. He warned that the withholding of American supplies to Israel under Egyptian pressure was a barrier to negotiations for a peace sattlement while Russia continued to supply all of Egyptis will that needs. Premier Golda Meir, addressing a Labor Party rally at Ramat Gan Frider gold the main argument with "our best friend, the U.S.A., and we have no groater friend, as well as with other friendly nations, is to try to bring home to them the basic premise of Israel's security which is secure borders." JERUSALEM, July II. (JTA).—A Foreign Ministry spokesman confirmed tonight that Israel's Ambassador to Washington, Yitchek Bahin, has been instructed to posttone his roturn to Jerusalem for consultations, originally scheduled for next week. The official reason for the delay was that the Government wants time to study the results of the latest American diplomatic mission to Cairo in the persons of Donald Bergus and Michael Sterner, Bergus is the ranking American diplomat in Cairo and Sterner heads the State Department's Egyptian Desk. Earlier, sources here said that U.S. Assistant Socretary of State for Near Eastern Affairs, Joseph J. Sisco, was expected in Israel next week and Rabir's return was believed scheduled to coincide with Sisco's presence here. Sources here said Sisco regards Egypt's current stand on an interim settlement to reopen the Suez Canal to be more moderate than in the past. The Israell view is that any Egyptian show of raoderation is only "play acting."

Petach Tikvah Rocket Attack Claims Two More Victims, Arrests Made

TEL AVIV, July II (JTA).—The terrorist rocket attack on Petach Tikvah Wednesday night claimed two more victims today, both elderly III women. Zehava Chodorov, 69 and Carolina Zazar, 70, died of injuries they suatained when a Katyusha rocket scored a direct hit on their ward in the Beth Rivka Hospital, an institution for the chronically III. The other victims, who were killed instantly, were Anat Darbashi, Iive whose home was struck by a rocket and Esther Vitas, 71, a patient at Beth Rivka. The search for the perpetrators is continuing.

Security forces announced the arrests of several persons suspected of having aided the terrorists in carrying their equipment to within range of Petach Tikvah. On Friday helicopters spotted the rocket launcher less than a mile east of the Green Line the boundary between israeli territory and the occupied West Bank. Two local Arab boys who approached the launcher were wounded by the explosion of booby traps set by the terrorists. Israeli security forces inspecting the launching site found evidence that the terrorists had camped there for some time and had made a meal. Israeli authorities are convinced that they could not have carried out the attack without aid from nearby villagers. All villages east of the Green Line have been under curfew since Thursday, though not Arab villages on the Israeli side of the line. The residents of several of the latter have sent condolences to the Mayor of Petach Tikvah over the tragedy.

10 Soldiers Rurled, Victims Of Helicopter Crash

TEL AVIV. July 11 (17A)—Separate funeral services were held in various parts of lerael today for ten atr-borne soldiers killed when their belicopier crashed into the sea off northern Sinai near El Arish Thursday. The bodies were discovered and identified after a two-day search by combined Army. Air Force and Navy teams. The names of the crash victims were not disclosed. An Air Force inquiry commission headed by a Li. Col. has been set up to investigate the causes of the accident. Defir from the helicopter was still being fished out of the sea today. A military spokesman said the possibility of sabotage was virtually ruled out by a preliminary investigation. He said it was most probable that human error was responsible for the tragedy.

The helicopter was reported missing Taursday afternoon. Shortly afterwards a Bedouin tribesman reported that he had seen a low flying helicopter crast into the sen after being struck by waves. Post mortems disclosed that the occupants of the helicopter died as a result of the impact when the sircraft struck the sea.

Harvard, Wisconsin U. Accused Of Directiminating Against Jews

WASHINGTON, July 8 (JTA)—Jews are discriminated against by Harvard and Wisconsin Universities because they are visibly in the forefrost of change, according to Dorothy Rabinowitz in the summer issue of Change Magazine, a monthly on controversial social and academic topics supported by the Esso Education and Ford Foundations. According to the article entitled "Are Jewish Students Different?" Harvard has reduced the number of students from suburban schools, with a resulting discrimination against Jews. Harvard Dean of Admissions Dr. Chase Peterson is quoted as saying that the number of students from "the donuts around the big cities" has been reduced. A Jewish faculty member is quoted as having retorted "Those aren't donuts, they're baggle."

241 Americans Salling For Israel Monday To Settle

NEW YCRK, July II, (3TA).—Two-hundred and forty-one Americans, comprising 56 families and Jourteen individuals will sall for Israel tomorrow sheard the Greek Here Queen Amaria. Together with the first group which left for Israel in January the number of Sherut La'am participants in 1971 will total 400.

Church Group Condemns Communist Governments Dealed Of Emigration Rights

NEW YORK, July II, (JTA).—The Executive Council of the two militon member United Church of Christ announced adoption of a resolution condemning Communist and other authoritarian governments for heiding political prisoners, discriminating against persons who dissent against governmental policy and detaining ethnic and religious groups who wish to emigrate. The resolution was introduced at the Eighth General Space of the United Church of Christ which met in Grand Rapids, Mich., June 23-29 and referred to the Executive Council. The Council acts as the Synod in the interim between Synod meetings. "As Christians we value freedom of expression and freedom of person as basic human rights," the resolution said, it went on to call upon the Government of the United States to use its influence especially to persuade authoritarian governments to grant permission to emigrate to those who wish to leave the countries.

In 1924 the organized his own distillery and in 1928 he acquired the loseph Seagram distilleries with plants in Waterloo, Ontario and Lassillo, Quibbeo, He was president of Distillers Corp. Seagrams Ltd., Calvert Distillers Ltd., Thomas Adams Distillers Ltd., Seagram Overseas Corp. Ltd., Seco Investments Ltd. and the Globe Bedding Co. He was director of Joseph E. Seagrams and Sons Ltd. Bronfman was president of the Canadian Jewish Congress from 1938-1962 and chairman of its Board of Governors from 1962 until I his death. He was active in Jewish and Canadian communal work serving as honorary president of the Zionist Organization of Canada, the Jewish Community Services of Montreal and the Combined Jewish Appeal.
