STATE DEP'T SEEKS AUTHORIZATION FOR BUDGET THAT INCLUDES A \$50M GRANT TO AID BRAEL ABSORB SOVIET JEWS

WASHINGTON, March 20 (JTA)—The State Department sought authorization from Congress today for a fiscal 1973 budget that includes a \$50 million grant to Israel in supportive aid to ease the economic burden of absorbing Jewish immigrants from the Soviet Union. Joseph J. Sisco, Assistant Secretary of State for Near Eastern Affairs, disclosed that budgetary item before the House Foreign Affairs Committee where he appeared today.

He said the \$50 million was included *in recognition of the heavy defense burden that Israel bears and the additional strain on its resources resulting from the increased immigration of Soviet Jews," In reply to a question by Rep. Clement Zablocki (D.,Wisc.) who presided at the committee session, Sisco said the amount of \$50 million was based on a projection of the number of Soviet refugees coming to Israel and the amount the Israel government can assimilate in this period. He did not say how the funds would be ear-marked.

An earlier \$50 million grant to Israel for support in absorbing immigrants from the Soviet Union is contained in the recently passed Foreign Aid Bill for fiscal 1972. A State Department official told the Jewish Telegraphic Agency today that there was no connection between these sums and bills now pending in Congress for special assistance to Israel for the absorption of Soviet emigrees.

The official referred to a measure sponsored by Sen. Edmund Musicle (D.,Me.) and Rep., Jonathan Bingham (D.,N.Y.), which calls for \$85 million in such aid to israel and another sponsored by Sen. Henry M. Jackson (D., Wash.) which would provide \$250 million for the same purpose. These measures and the sum requested by the State Department are in the form of grants. In addition, the fiscal 1972 Foreign Aid Bill contains authorization of up to \$300 million in credits for Israel for military purchases here. Fiscal 1972 ends on June 30 and fiscal 1973 begins July 1.

Steps Taken To Maintain Arms Balance

In the portion of his testimony before the Foreign Affairs Committee relating to the Middle East, Sisco said that because the Soviet Union has been "unreceptive to US suggestions for the exercise of restraint in the supply of military weapons to this volatile region, we have taken steps to maintain the arms balance."

He said the arms balance "may not be a guarantee of peace and is not a substitute for negotiations or an end in itself, but it is a deterrent to war, a war that has the potential for escalation." Sieco said that "what gives the Israel-Arah dispute its most dangerous dimension has been the deep and direct involvement of the Soviet Union."

In his testimony, Sisco observed that in the Middie East "a peace settlement remains a hope rather than a reality." He said, however, that "on the plus side, the cease-fire arranged on our initiative over a year-and-a-half ago persists." Observing that President Nixon said recently that "the greatest threat to peace and stability in the Middle East remains the Arab-Israel conflict," Sisco said "our policies have incorporated" the factors of both hope and danger.

EGYPT DENOUNCES HUSSEIN FOR ABETTING COLONIALISM, IMPERIALISM; WEST BANK LEADERS URGE REASONABLE APPROACH

JERUSALEM, March 20 (JTA).—King Hussein of Jordan was denounced last night by the Egyptian National Assembly for his proposal to create a "United Arab Kingdom" linking the east and west banks of the Jordan River. The plan, which the King announced from Amman last week, has apparently divided West Bank residents, some of whom are condemning it while others say it should not be rejected without a fair hearing.

The Egyptian parliament made no bones about its objections to the plan. After hearing a speech by Foreign Minister Murad Chaleb who accused Hussein of "chasing illusions instead of fighting against the occupation," the Assembly adopted a resolution condemning the Hashemite ruler for abetting "colonialism and imperialism,"

The same charges were voiced at a demonstration yesterday by some 300 school children in Nablus who called Hussein a "collaborator with imperialism and Zionism." The children, obviously echoing their elders, stayed out of their morning classes in large numbers to protest the federation plan. Those who did attend classes heard lectures on "the dangerous dimensions of the C Hussein plan."

But the traditional West Bank leadership has called for a reasonable approach to the plan. It has mounted pressure to convene an area conference to discuss it and possibly to send a delegation to Amman. Two articles yesterday in the East Jerusalem Arabio newspaper, Al Kuds, called on the public to consider the Hussein plan and warned against the traditional habit of rejecting outright any proposed political settlement.

Hussein-Meir Meeting Denied

As far as Israel is concerned, the Hussein plan does not represent the offer of a viable political settlement. Premier Golda Meir's office today denied categorically a report in the current issue of Time magazine that Mrs. Meir met privately with Hussein in advance of his announcement of his federation plan.

Time reported that Deputy Premier Yigal Allon had lengthy talks with Hussein in Amman last Nov, which Mrs. Meir and the King followed with a private meeting "at which they discussed the prerequisities for peace between their nations."

A statement issued by the Prime Minister's office said that Mrs. Meir had not met Hussein and that reports that Israel had any prior knowledge of Hussein's proposals are false. Reliable sources here instated that Allon has not been to Amman and did not meet with Hussein at any time during the past few months when the details of his federation plan were being worked out.

WZO URGED TO INCREASE ALLOCATIONS TO JEWISH EDUCATION IN THE DIASPORA Emphasis is On Latin America

TEL AVIV, March 20 (JTA) — The Labor Zionist Movement has called on the World Zionist Organization to increase its allocations to Jewish education in the diaspora, especially in Latin America where Jewish schools face a serious financial crisis. The appeal followed a meeting yesterday of the Labor Zionist Secretariate at which the situation confronting Jewish schools in Argentina, Uruguay and Chile was discussed.

The Jewish communities in those countries are said. Their serious situation stems in part from the requirement that they convert from half-day Hebrew schools to full-day schools of general studies at which Hebrew is taught four hours daily. This change-over the last four years makes it difficult for Jewish schools to meet their financial obligations, the meeting was told.

Chaim Finkelstein of the Jewish Agency's Department of Education and Culture in Diaspora, said that 60,000 pupils are studying at Jewish schools in Latin America, the largest number in history. They comprise almost half of the Jewish school-age children

on that continent, he said.

INSTITUTE FOR JEWISH LIFE GETS UNDER WAY; PROF, JICK NAMED DIRECTOR

NEW YORK, March 20 (JTA)—Prof. Leon A, Jick, of Brandels University, has been named the first director of the institute for Jewish Life which was established by the Council of Jewish Federations and Welfare Funds at its General Assembly in Pittsburgh last Nov. Dr. Jick's appointment was announced by Irving Blum of Baltimore, chairman of the three committees charged with organizing the Institute, at the CIF's board of directors meeting which ended here today.

The Institute was created to seek and develop programs that will "strengthen and enhance the quality of Jewish life" and will be a division of the CIF, Dr. Jick, who is on leave from his duties at Brandeis, is a graduate of Washington University and holds degrees from Hebrew Union College with graduate and doctoral studies at Harvard and Columbia universities. He is the author of "in Search of a Way." a collection of lectures and a study, "The Relationship of the German industrialists to the Nazi Extermination Policy."

Prof. Jick is currently director of the Lown Graduate Center for Contemporary Jewish Studies at Brandels and associate professor there of Near Eastern and Judaic Studies. He is a founder and first president of the Association of Jewish Studies, a national body of university faculty members in fields

National Headquarters In Boston

The Institute for Jewish Life will open national headquarters in Boston on May 13. Prof. Jick will work with a national board of distinguished men and women including rabbis of the Orthodox, Conservative and Reform branches of Judaism. The establishment of the Institute developed from the work of a task force assigned at the CJF's 38th General Assembly in Boston in 1989. Its creation was described by the CJF as an initial step in answering the deep concern over the effectiveness and relevance of various elements in Jewish life.

Charged with developing innovative projects to strengthen the quality of Jewish life and given approval of a \$2.25 million "risk oapital fund" to carry out this charge, the Institute will focus on the total

fabric of Jewish life.

Among the areas of concern for which projects will be initiated are the erosion of family life, and Jewish education, including the relation of Jewish teaching and values to current issues and problems such as war and peace, poverty, sex, drug abuse, nationalism and internationalism. Given an isittal three-year life-span with follow-up review, the Institute for Jewish Life will be financed by the more than 230 local Federations and Welfare Funds of the CJF.

SUDANESE REBEL LEADER SAYS HIS PEOPLE WANT NO WAR WITH ISRAEL

JERUSALEM, March 26 (JTA) -- A leader of the south Sudanese rebels who signed a truce yesterday with the central government in Khartoum, told an israell radio reporter last night that his people want no part of the war against Israel. In a report broadcast from southern Sudan, the reporter quoted the rebel leader as saying: "We are Africans concerned with African matters, We do not want to be involved in Arab politics nor to become part of an Arab federation."

The leader's name was unintelligible due to poor atmospheric conditions which interfered with the broadcast. However, according to the Israell newsman, the south Sudanese do not want to become involved in events far from their borders nor do they accept Khartoum's contention that a formal state of war exists between it Sudan and Israel even though Sudanese units have fought with the Egyptian Army against Israel in the three Middle East wars since 1948.

Asked if their truce would be affected if Sudan were to join with Egypt, Syria and Libya in the federation they formed last year, the rebel leader said such a move would lead to a complete revision of the south Sudan's stand, the Israeli reporter said.

LIPSKY TO RETURN TO FRANCE

TEL AVIV, March 20 (JTA)—Claude Lipsky, the central figure in a major financial scandal in France, has abandoned his fight against extradition and will return to France of his own free will. Lipsky, who sought refuge in Israel last Oct., is expected to return to France within the next 48 hours accompanied by a French police official who is coming here to escort him.

Lipsky announced his decision yesterday through his licraell lawyer, Chaim Shenhav, and has informed his two French attorneys, Johannes Ambre and George Herisse that he will face French justice, in a statement issued through Shenhav today, Lipsky said he reached his decision after oareful consideration of his situation which convinced him that he will be cleared of the charges he faces in France.

14 ARMY RESERVISTS REFUSE TO TAKE BACK THEIR CARDS; WILL SERVE IF CALLED UPON

JERUSALEM, March 20 (JTA)—A group of 14 Jerusalem men who turned in their Army reserve cards in protest against their economic plight, refused to take their cards back last night but said they would serve if called to duty. Eleven of the group turned up for a meeting with Maj. Gen. Shlomo Lahat, Chief of the Army's manpower branch, who had invited all of the protestors for a talk at General Staff headquartors.

The General informed the reservists that they had broken Army regulations by turning in their cards. They told him they would report for duty if called but meanwhile they wanted their protest to be widely heard. The 14 protestors are all past the age for active military service and services.

CONGRESSMAN SAYS NIXON FAILED TO RALLY PUBLIC OPINION ON BEHALF OF SOVIET JEWS

Evers Calis For Black-Jewish Unity

CHICAGO, March 20 (JTA) -- Rep. Robert F. Drinan (D., Mass.), a 51-year-old Jesuit priest who has been in Congress since 1970, asserted in a speech scheduled for delivery tonight that President Nixon had failed to rally public opinion on be-

half of relief of the situation of Soviet Jews. Speaking to the second-day dinner meeting of the National Interreligious Consultation on Soviet Jewry at the University of Chicago's Center for Continuing Education, Drinan declared that in 1970 and 1971 the Nixon administration "appeared to default on its pre-election promise...to create world opinion, as well as document all the facts, in order that, through diplomatic and other channels, the concern of the American people for the cultural and religious freedom of Soviet Jews may be firmly communicated on many levels to the leaders of the Soviet

Drinan disclosed that he will visit Israel in late May on behalf of the Interreligious Consultation and will report to the delegates on his findings in re-gard to immigration. "I have the hope that American Christians will be aroused at the injustices being inflicted on persons of the Jewish faith in Russia. I hope also that Christians in America will recognize, as never before, and act upon the acute and profound problems which confront Israel because, by its nature, it is an ongoing ingathering of exiles and refugees."

Recalls Jewish Participation

Addressing the Consultation last night, Mayor Charles Evers of Fayette, Miss., declared that "It will be a disgrace to American Jews if President Nixon on his forthcoming visit to the Soviet Union does not tell the Russian authorities to 'let our people go." Evers, the brother of murdered civil rights leader Medgar Evers, stated: "I am here, all of you are here, because we care. I am proud to be a part of ending this oppression. I am also here because as one who remembers the Jewish participation in the Mississippi civil rights struggle I do not forget those who helped me."

Asserting that "our Jewish friends in the United States should join hands with us so that Blacks and Jews can be linked together in the struggle for human rights," Evers concluded: "Blacks and Jews have been the victims of the worst racism in the world. Tonight we are talking about ending racism." The Consultation is being attended by 165 Protestant, Roman Catholic, Greek Orthodox and Jewish leaders from across the country.

EXPERIMENTS CONFIRMING EINSTEIN'S THEORY OF GRAVITY SHARED BY TEL AVIV U, AND WEIZMANN INSTITUTE

TEL AVIV, March 20 (JTA) -- Tel Aviv University and the Weizmann Institute of Science in Rehovoth agreed today to share credit for a series of scientific experiments which purportedly confirm Einstein's theory that gravity acts in waves. The agreement followed a conciliatory meeting between the heads of the two institutions. The Welzmann Institute had objected to Tel Aviv University taking sole credit for the discovery.

The experiments were successfully conducted by Prof. Dror Sadeh of Tel Aviv University's department of physics and astronomy. Prof. Sadeh used the Weizmann Institute's geophysics observa-tory near Eilat, headed by Prof. Ari Ben Menahem. Tel Aviv U. announced the results on March 17, orediting Prof. Sadeh. Today, however, both institu-tions acknowledged that Prof. Sadeh and Prof. Ben

Menahem were partners in the discovery.

Albert Einstein predicted in 1917 that gravity acts in waves. The prediction was part of his General Theory of Relativity. But it could not be confirmed experimentally because the waves are extremely weak. The experiments conducted by Profs. Sadeh and Ben Menehem made use of the 1967 discovery of pulsars, a type of pulsating star assumed to have very high density and very rapid rotation. According to Einstein's theory, such bodies must emit gravity waves.

Prof. Sadeh's innovation was to use the earth as a detector, but because the effects of the waves is very small, a sophisticated electronic system had to be built by the university and the advanced equipment at the Weizmann Institute facility had

to be employed.

According to the announcement the experiment proved the existence of gravitational waves which up to now were merely an assumption; that pulsars are neutron stars having high density and a high rate of rotation; and that a seismograph on earth can serve as an astronomical telescope which measures the movements of stars.

POPE GRATIFIED BY CATHOLIC-JEWISH COOPERATION

ROME, March 20 (JTA) -- Pope Paul VI told B'nai B'rith leaders he was gratified by cooperative relationships that have developed between Catholics and Jews. The mutuality in understanding, he added, "must continue." The Pope conveyed his view to David M. Blumberg of Knoxville, Tenn., international president of B'nai B'rith, and four other officials of the Jewish service organization, whom the Pontiff warmly greeted during an audience at the Vatican last Wednesday.

Blumberg presented the Pope with a 3500year-old clay bowl from the era of the Biblical Patriarchs which the B'nai B'rith group had brought from Israel as "a symbol of the common spiritual heritage and ancestry" of Catholics and Jews. The B'nai B'rith leader told the Pope that the antiquity from the Holy Land expressed "the deep sense of spiritual affinity that the Jews of the world have with the land and the people of Israel."

In his response, the Pope said the spiritual meaning of the gift was "important" to him because it conveyed the tradition common to both faiths. He also recalled Vatican efforts to rescue Jews during the Hitler era. When Blumberg cited the development of closer Catholic-Jewish relationships in the United States and elsewhere, the Pope replied that such efforts must continue.

Others in the B'nai B'rith delegation were Rabbi Benjamin M. Kahn, its executive vice-president; Herman Edelsberg, director of international affairs, and Bernard Simon, director of public relations; all of Washington, D.C. AMMUNITION, MINES, FOUND IN RAFFAH AREA

TEL AVIV, March 20 (JTA) -- Large quantities of arms, ammunition and mines were discovered in the Raffah area -- in the southern Gaza Strip and northern Sinai -- in the course of transferring some Bedouins from the area to other locations in the Strip as part of a plan for Jewish settlements there, it was reported. The area, known as "Smuggler's Road," has been the scene of much terrorist activity; seven Israelis have been killed and 25 injured there in the past 18 months. Since Jan. 30, three terrorists have been captured there.

PARIS (JTA) -- The Swiss section of the International League Against Racism and Anti-Semitism (LICRA) has asked Poland's President Edward Gierek to permit Leopold Trepper and his wife "to leave Poland and join their children in Israel." The LICRA message signed by its president, Willy Donze, added: "Because of the couple's age and the state of their health and the services they rendered in the fight against Hitler Germany, we hope you will let them spend their last years close to their children." Trepper, 68, was the former head of Soviet intelligence in Europe during World War II, LICRA also sent a telegram to Soviet Premier Aleksei N. Kosygin asking the Soviet Union to allow Vladimir Slepak, Sylva Zalmanson Kuznetsov, Raiza Palatnik and Ilia Glezer to emigrate to Israel.

NEW YORK (JTA)—The third international Israeli youth festival will be held from July 10 to Aug. 21 in Bett Berl near Tel Aviv. According to Harold Zimman of Lynn, Mass., the festival's US chairman, about 500 teenagers from five continents will participate. Sieco said that "what gives the Israel-Arah dispute its most dangerous dimension has been the deep and direct involvement of the Soviet Union."

In his testimony, Sisco observed that in the Middie East "a peace settlement remains a hope rather than a reality." He said, however, that "on the plus side, the cease-fire arranged on our initiative over a year-and-a-half ago persists." Observing that President Nixon said recently that "the greatest threat to peace and stability in the Middle East remains the Arab-Israel conflict," Sisco said "our policies have incorporated" the factors of both hope and danger.

EGYPT DENOUNCES HUSSEIN FOR ABETTING COLONIALISM, IMPERIALISM; WEST BANK LEADERS URGE REASONABLE APPROACH

JERUSALEM, March 20 (JTA).—King Hussein of Jordan was denounced last night by the Egyptian National Assembly for his proposal to create a "United Arab Kingdom" linking the east and west banks of the Jordan River. The plan, which the King announced from Amman last week, has apparently divided West Bank residents, some of whom are condemning it while others say it should not be rejected without a fair hearing.

The Egyptian parliament made no bones about its objections to the plan. After hearing a speech by Foreign Minister Murad Chaleb who accused Hussein of "chasing illusions instead of fighting against the occupation," the Assembly adopted a resolution condemning the Hashemite ruler for abetting "colonialism and imperialism,"

The same charges were voiced at a demonstration yesterday by some 300 school children in Nablus who called Hussein a "collaborator with imperialism and Zionism." The children, obviously echoing their elders, stayed out of their morning classes in large numbers to protest the federation plan. Those who did attend classes heard lectures on "the dangerous dimensions of the C Hussein plan."

But the traditional West Bank leadership has called for a reasonable approach to the plan. It has mounted pressure to convene an area conference to discuss it and possibly to send a delegation to Amman. Two articles yesterday in the East Jerusalem Arabio newspaper, Al Kuds, called on the public to consider the Hussein plan and warned against the traditional habit of rejecting outright any proposed political settlement.

Hussein-Meir Meeting Denied

As far as Israel is concerned, the Hussein plan does not represent the offer of a viable political settlement. Premier Golda Meir's office today denied categorically a report in the current issue of Time magazine that Mrs. Meir met privately with Hussein in advance of his announcement of his federation plan.

Time reported that Deputy Premier Yigal Allon had lengthy talks with Hussein in Amman last Nov, which Mrs. Meir and the King followed with a private meeting "at which they discussed the prerequisities for peace between their nations."

A statement issued by the Prime Minister's office said that Mrs. Meir had not met Hussein and that reports that Israel had any prior knowledge of Hussein's proposals are false. Reliable sources here instated that Allon has not been to Amman and did not meet with Hussein at any time during the past few months when the details of his federation plan were being worked out.

WZO URGED TO INCREASE ALLOCATIONS TO JEWISH EDUCATION IN THE DIASPORA Emphasis is On Latin America

TEL AVIV, March 20 (JTA) — The Labor Zionist Movement has called on the World Zionist Organization to increase its allocations to Jewish education in the diaspora, especially in Latin America where Jewish schools face a serious financial crisis. The appeal followed a meeting yesterday of the Labor Zionist Secretariate at which the situation confronting Jewish schools in Argentina, Uruguay and Chile was discussed.

The Jewish communities in those countries are said. Their serious situation stems in part from the requirement that they convert from half-day Hebrew schools to full-day schools of general studies at which Hebrew is taught four hours daily. This change-over the last four years makes it difficult for Jewish schools to meet their financial obligations, the meeting was told.

Chaim Finkelstein of the Jewish Agency's Department of Education and Culture in Diaspora, said that 60,000 pupils are studying at Jewish schools in Latin America, the largest number in history. They comprise almost half of the Jewish school-age children

on that continent, he said.

INSTITUTE FOR JEWISH LIFE GETS UNDER WAY; PROF, JICK NAMED DIRECTOR

NEW YORK, March 20 (JTA)—Prof. Leon A, Jick, of Brandels University, has been named the first director of the institute for Jewish Life which was established by the Council of Jewish Federations and Welfare Funds at its General Assembly in Pittsburgh last Nov. Dr. Jick's appointment was announced by Irving Blum of Baltimore, chairman of the three committees charged with organizing the Institute, at the CIF's board of directors meeting which ended here today.

The Institute was created to seek and develop programs that will "strengthen and enhance the quality of Jewish life" and will be a division of the CIF, Dr. Jick, who is on leave from his duties at Brandeis, is a graduate of Washington University and holds degrees from Hebrew Union College with graduate and doctoral studies at Harvard and Columbia universities. He is the author of "in Search of a Way." a collection of lectures and a study, "The Relationship of the German industrialists to the Nazi Extermination Policy."

Prof. Jick is currently director of the Lown Graduate Center for Contemporary Jewish Studies at Brandels and associate professor there of Near Eastern and Judaic Studies. He is a founder and first president of the Association of Jewish Studies, a national body of university faculty members in fields

National Headquarters In Boston

The Institute for Jewish Life will open national headquarters in Boston on May 13. Prof. Jick will work with a national board of distinguished men and women including rabbis of the Orthodox, Conservative and Reform branches of Judaism. The establishment of the Institute developed from the work of a task force assigned at the CJF's 38th General Assembly in Boston in 1989. Its creation was described by the CJF as an initial step in answering the deep concern over the effectiveness and relevance of various elements in Jewish life.

Charged with developing innovative projects to strengthen the quality of Jewish life and given approval of a \$2.25 million "risk oapital fund" to carry out this charge, the Institute will focus on the total

fabric of Jewish life.

Among the areas of concern for which projects will be initiated are the erosion of family life, and Jewish education, including the relation of Jewish teaching and values to current issues and problems such as war and peace, poverty, sex, drug abuse, nationalism and internationalism. Given an isittal three-year life-span with follow-up review, the Institute for Jewish Life will be financed by the more than 230 local Federations and Welfare Funds of the CJF.

SUDANESE REBEL LEADER SAYS HIS PEOPLE WANT NO WAR WITH ISRAEL

JERUSALEM, March 26 (JTA) -- A leader of the south Sudanese rebels who signed a truce yesterday with the central government in Khartoum, told an israell radio reporter last night that his people want no part of the war against Israel. In a report broadcast from southern Sudan, the reporter quoted the rebel leader as saying: "We are Africans concerned with African matters, We do not want to be involved in Arab politics nor to become part of an Arab federation."

The leader's name was unintelligible due to poor atmospheric conditions which interfered with the broadcast. However, according to the Israell newsman, the south Sudanese do not want to become involved in events far from their borders nor do they accept Khartoum's contention that a formal state of war exists between it Sudan and Israel even though Sudanese units have fought with the Egyptian Army against Israel in the three Middle East wars since 1948.

Asked if their truce would be affected if Sudan were to join with Egypt, Syria and Libya in the federation they formed last year, the rebel leader said such a move would lead to a complete revision of the south Sudan's stand, the Israeli reporter said.

LIPSKY TO RETURN TO FRANCE

TEL AVIV, March 20 (JTA)—Claude Lipsky, the central figure in a major financial scandal in France, has abandoned his fight against extradition and will return to France of his own free will. Lipsky, who sought refuge in Israel last Oct., is expected to return to France within the next 48 hours accompanied by a French police official who is coming here to escort him.

Lipsky announced his decision yesterday through his licraell lawyer, Chaim Shenhav, and has informed his two French attorneys, Johannes Ambre and George Herisse that he will face French justice, in a statement issued through Shenhav today, Lipsky said he reached his decision after oareful consideration of his situation which convinced him that he will be cleared of the charges he faces in France.

14 ARMY RESERVISTS REFUSE TO TAKE BACK THEIR CARDS; WILL SERVE IF CALLED UPON

JERUSALEM, March 20 (JTA)—A group of 14 Jerusalem men who turned in their Army reserve cards in protest against their economic plight, refused to take their cards back last night but said they would serve if called to duty. Eleven of the group turned up for a meeting with Maj. Gen. Shlomo Lahat, Chief of the Army's manpower branch, who had invited all of the protestors for a talk at General Staff headquartors.

The General informed the reservists that they had broken Army regulations by turning in their cards. They told him they would report for duty if called but meanwhile they wanted their protest to be widely heard. The 14 protestors are all past the age for active military service and services.

CONGRESSMAN SAYS NIXON FAILED TO RALLY PUBLIC OPINION ON BEHALF OF SOVIET JEWS

Evers Calis For Black-Jewish Unity

CHICAGO, March 20 (JTA) -- Rep. Robert F. Drinan (D., Mass.), a 51-year-old Jesuit priest who has been in Congress since 1970, asserted in a speech scheduled for delivery tonight that President Nixon had failed to rally public opinion on be-

half of relief of the situation of Soviet Jews. Speaking to the second-day dinner meeting of the National Interreligious Consultation on Soviet Jewry at the University of Chicago's Center for Continuing Education, Drinan declared that in 1970 and 1971 the Nixon administration "appeared to default on its pre-election promise...to create world opinion, as well as document all the facts, in order that, through diplomatic and other channels, the concern of the American people for the cultural and religious freedom of Soviet Jews may be firmly communicated on many levels to the leaders of the Soviet

Drinan disclosed that he will visit Israel in late May on behalf of the Interreligious Consultation and will report to the delegates on his findings in re-gard to immigration. "I have the hope that American Christians will be aroused at the injustices being inflicted on persons of the Jewish faith in Russia. I hope also that Christians in America will recognize, as never before, and act upon the acute and profound problems which confront Israel because, by its nature, it is an ongoing ingathering of exiles and refugees."

Recalls Jewish Participation

Addressing the Consultation last night, Mayor Charles Evers of Fayette, Miss., declared that "It will be a disgrace to American Jews if President Nixon on his forthcoming visit to the Soviet Union does not tell the Russian authorities to 'let our people go." Evers, the brother of murdered civil rights leader Medgar Evers, stated: "I am here, all of you are here, because we care. I am proud to be a part of ending this oppression. I am also here because as one who remembers the Jewish participation in the Mississippi civil rights struggle I do not forget those who helped me."

Asserting that "our Jewish friends in the United States should join hands with us so that Blacks and Jews can be linked together in the struggle for human rights," Evers concluded: "Blacks and Jews have been the victims of the worst racism in the world. Tonight we are talking about ending racism." The Consultation is being attended by 165 Protestant, Roman Catholic, Greek Orthodox and Jewish leaders from across the country.

EXPERIMENTS CONFIRMING EINSTEIN'S THEORY OF GRAVITY SHARED BY TEL AVIV U, AND WEIZMANN INSTITUTE

TEL AVIV, March 20 (JTA) -- Tel Aviv University and the Weizmann Institute of Science in Rehovoth agreed today to share credit for a series of scientific experiments which purportedly confirm Einstein's theory that gravity acts in waves. The agreement followed a conciliatory meeting between the heads of the two institutions. The Welzmann Institute had objected to Tel Aviv University taking sole credit for the discovery.

The experiments were successfully conducted by Prof. Dror Sadeh of Tel Aviv University's department of physics and astronomy. Prof. Sadeh used the Weizmann Institute's geophysics observa-tory near Eilat, headed by Prof. Ari Ben Menahem. Tel Aviv U. announced the results on March 17, orediting Prof. Sadeh. Today, however, both institu-tions acknowledged that Prof. Sadeh and Prof. Ben

Menahem were partners in the discovery.

Albert Einstein predicted in 1917 that gravity acts in waves. The prediction was part of his General Theory of Relativity. But it could not be confirmed experimentally because the waves are extremely weak. The experiments conducted by Profs. Sadeh and Ben Menehem made use of the 1967 discovery of pulsars, a type of pulsating star assumed to have very high density and very rapid rotation. According to Einstein's theory, such bodies must emit gravity waves.

Prof. Sadeh's innovation was to use the earth as a detector, but because the effects of the waves is very small, a sophisticated electronic system had to be built by the university and the advanced equipment at the Weizmann Institute facility had

to be employed.

According to the announcement the experiment proved the existence of gravitational waves which up to now were merely an assumption; that pulsars are neutron stars having high density and a high rate of rotation; and that a seismograph on earth can serve as an astronomical telescope which measures the movements of stars.

POPE GRATIFIED BY CATHOLIC-JEWISH COOPERATION

ROME, March 20 (JTA) -- Pope Paul VI told B'nai B'rith leaders he was gratified by cooperative relationships that have developed between Catholics and Jews. The mutuality in understanding, he added, "must continue." The Pope conveyed his view to David M. Blumberg of Knoxville, Tenn., international president of B'nai B'rith, and four other officials of the Jewish service organization, whom the Pontiff warmly greeted during an audience at the Vatican last Wednesday.

Blumberg presented the Pope with a 3500year-old clay bowl from the era of the Biblical Patriarchs which the B'nai B'rith group had brought from Israel as "a symbol of the common spiritual heritage and ancestry" of Catholics and Jews. The B'nai B'rith leader told the Pope that the antiquity from the Holy Land expressed "the deep sense of spiritual affinity that the Jews of the world have with the land and the people of Israel."

In his response, the Pope said the spiritual meaning of the gift was "important" to him because it conveyed the tradition common to both faiths. He also recalled Vatican efforts to rescue Jews during the Hitler era. When Blumberg cited the development of closer Catholic-Jewish relationships in the United States and elsewhere, the Pope replied that such efforts must continue.

Others in the B'nai B'rith delegation were Rabbi Benjamin M. Kahn, its executive vice-president; Herman Edelsberg, director of international affairs, and Bernard Simon, director of public relations; all of Washington, D.C. They were ac-companied at the Papal audience by Dr. Joseph Lichten, B'nai B'rith's representative in Rome,

AMMUNITION, MINES, FOUND IN RAFFAH AREA

TEL AVIV, March 20 (JTA) -- Large quantities of arms, ammunition and mines were discovered in the Raffah area -- in the southern Gaza Strip and northern Sinai -- in the course of transferring some Bedouins from the area to other locations in the Strip as part of a plan for Jewish settlements there, it was reported. The area, known as "Smuggler's Road," has been the scene of much terrorist activity; seven Israelis have been killed and 25 injured there in the past 18 months. Since Jan. 30, three terrorists have been captured there.

PARIS (JTA) -- The Swiss section of the International League Against Racism and Anti-Semitism (LICRA) has asked Poland's President Edward Gierek to permit Leopold Trepper and his wife "to leave Poland and join their children in Israel." The LICRA message signed by its president, Willy Donze, added: "Because of the couple's age and the state of their health and the services they rendered in the fight against Hitler Germany, we hope you will let them spend their last years close to their children." Trepper, 68, was the former head of Soviet intelligence in Europe during World War II, LICRA also sent a telegram to Soviet Premier Aleksei N. Kosygin asking the Soviet Union to allow Vladimir Slepak, Sylva Zalmanson Kuznetsov, Raiza Palatnik and Ilia Glezer to emigrate to Israel.

NEW YORK (JTA)—The third international Israeli youth festival will be held from July 10 to Aug. 21 in Bett Berl near Tel Aviv. According to Harold Zimman of Lynn, Mass., the festival's US chairman, about 500 teenagers from five continents will participate.
