EGYPTIAN MISSILES FIRED

AT ISRAELI PLANES First Such Incident Since Sept.

TEL AVIV. July 24 (JTA) -- Two Israel Air Force planes were attacked by Egyptian groundto-air missiles while on a routine flight over the Sinai peninsula today. The planes evaded the missiles and returned safely to their bases, according to military sources here. The attack was the first of its kind since last Sept. when Egyptian missiles downed an unarmed Israeli transport plane over the Sinai.

Israeli sources said it was still unclear whether today's attack was at the initiative of a local commander motivated by patriotic feelings on the 20th anniversary of Egypt's independence or was carried out on orders from higher echelons. Some sources here said the departure of Soviet advisors from Egypt may have undermined the strict discipline maintained on Egyptian officers and men manning the Suez Canal defenses.

Israel has lodged a complaint with the United Nations Truce Supervision Organization (UNTSO) over the incident. It was learned that four missiles were fired of the SAM-2 and SAM-3 type from batteries located at Ismailia in the central sector of the Suez Canal zone. Egyptian anti-aircraft guns also went into action. There was no Israeli return

The type of Israeli planes fired on was not disclosed, (Cairo radio claimed today that an Israeli Phantom let was downed.)

STATE DEPT, 'NO COMMENT' ON SADAT CHARGES AGAINST U.S. Egyptian Leader Assails American Guarantees To Israel

WASHINGTON, July 24 (JTA) -- State Department officials maintained a stony silence today on Egyptian President Anwar Sadat's charges of broken American promises to Egypt and American guarantees to Israel, Department spokesman Charles Bray told newsmen he could not respond to any questions related to Sadat's four-hour speech to the national congress of the Arab Socialist Union in Cairo today on the occasion of the 20th anniversary of the Egyptian revolution.

Bray said the State Department had not had a chance to study Sadat's speech which, according to incomplete translations reaching here this morning, was devoted at some length to attacking the US but seemed ambiguous as to why the Egyptian leader suddenly ordered Soviet advisors out of Egypt last

Sadat said in his speech that three factors prompted him to remove Soviet military advisors from Egypt. These he said were a US government pledge to Israel that it would oppose any Security Council resolution which calls on Israel to withdraw from the territories it occupied in June, 1967; would enable Israel to maintain military superiority over Egypt; and would not impose, or allow the imposition of a settlement in the Middle East which did not provide for direct negotiations between Israel and its Arab neighbors. Sadat said these three points formed a central issue to the current Egyptian-Soviet situation but he did not say specifically how they were connected with his ordered reduction of the Soviet military presence in Egypt.

Sadat told the Arab Socialist Union, his country's only political party, that there were differences in strategy between the Soviet Union and Egypt. He said he had tried to dissuade the Soviet Union from maintaining a position that he described as "over cautious." He said that if Egypt and the Soviet Union did nothing but keep on waiting, it would mean acceptance of the Israeli occupation as a fait accompli. Sadat drew his loudest applause when he declared, "This we rejected."

He spent an hour describing how, he claimed, the US had repeatedly blocked efforts for a Middle East settlement. He devoted about the same length of time to detailing his attempts to bring about a harmony of views with the Soviet Union. Sadat charged that the US was conducting a war of nerves with Egypt. He said the US has been shipping military supplies into Israel since last Jan. "as if to tell us, what does the Soviet Union give you? What can the Soviet Union do for you?" Sadat said that in Oct, 1971 the Soviet Union had promised to implement a "certain agreement" but 1971 ended without the agreement, which the Egyptian President did not describe, being fulfilled.

CABINET PONDERS EVENTS IN EGYPT Limited Renewal of Hostilities Possible In Wake of Russian Pull-Out

JERUSALEM, July 24 (JTA) -- A Cabinet minister told the Jewish Telegraphic Agency last night that the government still lacked clear information on several aspects of the pull-out of Soviet personnel from Egypt, ordered by President Anwar Sadat last week. The Cabinet spent four hours discussing the development yesterday. Assessments were made by Foreign Minister Abba Eban, Defense Minister Moshe Dayan, Chief of Staff Gen. David Elazar and Gen. Aharon Yariv, head of military intelligence. The Defense Minister's special assistant Zvi Tsur also participated in the discussion. But the government continued to maintain official silence pending Premier Golda Meir's address to the Knesset Wednesday.

The JTA learned that one possibility raised at the Cabinet meeting was a renewal of limited hostilities along the Suez Canal by Egypt. This was considered possible in view of popular dissatisfaction in Egypt with the "no-war-no-peace" situation and Sadat's need to bolster his position. The departure of the Russians may mean that the Soviet restraints on the Egyptian military may have been

loosened, sources here said.

(The Lebanese newspaper Beirut reported yesterday that Syria was planning to follow the Egyptian lead and expel Soviet advisors attached to its armed forces.) Israeli military sources believe there are no more than 1000 Soviet advisors in Syria. There has been no confirmation of the Beirut report.

JARRING MISSION UNAFFECTED BY SOVIET WITHDRAWAL FROM EGYPT, WALDHEIM SAYS

UNITED NATIONS, July 24 (JTA) -- UN Secretary General Kurt Waldheim said in Vienna yesterday that the withdrawal of Soviet personnel from Egypt had nothing to do with the peace mission of UN Mideast mediator Gunnar V. Jarring, it was reported here today. Dr. Waldheim made the remark to an Austrian Press Agency correspondent when he arrived in Vienna from Moscow. The

correspondent had asked him if the Jarring misston may have been made somewhat easter by the developments in Egypt and whether chances for an interim settlement proposed by US Secretary of State William P, Rogers had become more favorable.

Waldheim said the events in Egypt were a matter concerning the two countries involved and unrelatived to the 3arring mission. He said the Jarring mission was based on Security Council Resolution 242, would continue on that basis and the UN would make every effort to contribute to a solution of the Middle East problem.

JUDY FLIES TO MOSCOW WITHOUT VISA;
OUSTED BY SOVIET AUTHORITIES
State Dept, Discloses Surprise Trip

WASHINGTON, July 24 (JTA)—Judy Silver Shapiro landed at Moscow Airport this morning without a visa, was denied entry by Soviet authorities and was placed on a return flight to London, State Department sources disclosed today. Mrs. Shapiro's surprise flight to Russia was apparently a desperate bid to visit her husband Gavriel who is scheduled to go on trial in Moscow Thursday. She had been trying without success to obtain a Soviet visa since June.

The State Department sources said Mrs. Shapiro boarded a Soutet Acrollot jet at New York last night and apparently made the flight alone. When she arrived in Moscow, alrport officials refused to allow her to leave the terminal and ordered her on the next plane to London. The State Department may have been aware of her flight. The sources said an American Consular official directed to meet her at the airport was unable to communicate with her. State Department officials said they were awaiting details from the US Embassy in Moscow.

Mrs. Shapiro, a Cincinnati social worker, was religious ceremony at his Moscow home last June 8 but had to leave Russia on June 12 when her visa expired. Soviet authorities refused to extend her visa at the time. She applied for a new visa at the Soviet Consulate in Washington June 28 but was never issued one

Mrs. Shapiro, who has spoken to her husband frequently by telephone from Moscow, said last week that he told her it was essential that she be present at his trial. Shapiro has been charged with evasion of military duty under Art, 198 of the Soviet penal code although he had completed his required military service as an officer in the Red Army reserve. Shapiro applied for and was granted israeli citizenship in absentia last year. He is seeking an emigration visa.

YOUNG REPUBLICANS ADOPT
MDDLE EAST STANCE
Pro-Israel Planks To Be Offered
To GOP Convention Next Month

WASHINGTON, July 24 (JTA).—The Young Republican National Federation has adopted a five-point statement of policy for the United States regarding the Middle East which it hopes will be a part of the Republican Party's platform in the Presidential campaign.

The policy statement will be presented to the Republican platform committee in Miami Beach during the week of Aug. 14. That committee will offer its recommendations to the party convention the following week. The Federation's five points, which closely approximate the plank adopted by the Democratic Party Convention in Miami Beach two weeks ago, says the following:

"An important goal of American foreign policy is seeing a just and lasting peace achieved in the Middle East. The United States cannot and should not dictate the terms of peace in the area Observing the sovereignty and territorial rights of all the nations of the Middle East is inherent in the administration's pursuit of a generation of peace. We specifically recommend: 1. Direct face-to-face Arab-Israeli negotiations: 2. The continued supply of military equipment and aircraft sufficient to maintain a balance of strength in the area: 3. Recognition of Jerusalem as the capital of Israel and relocation of the United States Embassy there; 4. Assistance to both Israel and the Arab states in relocating refugees and encouraging the help of the other nations of the world in this problem; 5. The resumption of diplomatic relations with all Arab nations willing to accept our policy of friendship.'

Regarding Soviet Jewry, the Federation's recommendation declares in a section titled "humanitarian concerns" that "We believe in the right of all people in all nations to pursue their own religious, notition and economic lives "

religious, political and economic lives,"
Like the Democratic platform, the Young Republicans' recommendations advocate moving the American Embassy in Israel from Tel Aviv to Jerusalem. Neither the Democrats nor the Young Republicans mentioned UN Security Council Resolution 242 upon which the Nixon administration's current Middle East policy is based. Unlike the Democrats, the Young Republicans did not include in the Middle East section a recommendation for stationing American forces in Europe and in the Mediterranean to deter as the Democrats say, the Soviet Union from bringing "unbearable pressure on Israel."

HERUT POSTPONES DECISION ON SPLIT WITH LIBERALS

TEL AVIV, July 24 (JTA) -- The Herut central committee debated last night and into the early hours of this morning whether to dissolve their partnership with the Liberals and decided to postpone a decision until next week. The decision, suggested by Herut leader Menachem Beigin, may save the Gahal faction which appears to be foundering over the Liberals' support of a Labor-sponsored electoral reform bill.

Political observers here said the week's breathing spell would allow temperatures to cool. But
it appeared that unless the Liberals renounce their
support of the measure which is hitterly opposed
by Herut, a showdown is inevitable. A large segment of the Herut leadership insisted last night
that the partnership which represents Israel's
largest opposition party, be broken. But Gen.
Ezer Weizman, chairman of the Herut executive
said a continuation of Gahal was essential in view
of the crucial problems facting the country. He
mentioned the recent developments in Egypt and
referred to possible attempts by the US to revive
the Rogers plan.

Beigin, who didn't speak until the debate had gone on for five hours, said the main problem was not Gahal but the electional reform bill which would introduce direct elections for a majority of Knesset members. Beigin charged again that the measure was a Labor Party device to achieve an absolute majority that "fit doesn't deserve."

ISRAELI NET ARTISTS TAKE 4TH PLACE IN EUROPE TOURNAMENT

TEL AVIV, July 24 (JTA).—The Israell Youth Basketball. Team took fourth place in the European Youth Championship games in Yugoslavia last night after sustaining a 70-63 defeat by the Russian team winch they had defeated in an earlier game. The Israell coach said he didn't expect his team to repeat their upset victory over the Muscovites because the Israell players were "exhausted."

INTERIOR MINISTER SAYS HE WILL TIGHTEN ENTRY RULES TO KEEP OUT 'UNDESIRABLES'

JERUSALEM, July 24 (JTA).—Interior Minister Yosef Burg told the Knesset today that he planned to post stricter regulations regarding entry to Israel to keep out so-called "undesirables." He was referring to purported Jewish and other oriminal elements from abroad who seek have in Israel.

Dr. Burg said he intended to amend the 1955 entry laws because "they were inadequate for current needs." The new regulations, he said, would clearly define under what conditions foreign nationals would be permitted to enter. One of the reasons for tightening the rules, he said, was because "we have been witnessing the phenomenon of citizens of states friendly to Israel who wrongly exploit the hospitality of this country." He said the border control officials "have been helpless to act in the face of this development."

CANDY WORKERS STRIKE; WANT PAY CHECKS SWEETENED

TEL AVIV, July 24 (JTA)—About 3000 employes of strike today after an all-night negotiating session ended in failure. The strikers, from the Elite and Lieber companies in Tel Aviv, the CD factory in Nazareth and the Instant Coffee plant in Safad, are demanding a share in the profits they claim the companies made through two consecutive price increases which were not accompanied by wage hikes,

The workers made other demands which management turned down on grounds that they exceeded the agreement with the Histadrut last Jan, for a relatively small pay increase. The clerical workers of Assaf Harofeh Hospital in Sarafand went on strike today.

*SEX BOUTIQUE' REOPENS AS NON-SHOP; POLICE ALERTED FOR DEMONSTRATIONS

JERUSALEM, July 24 (JTA).—Jerusalem police were preparing tonight for possible demonstrations by ultra-Orthodox elements against the Eros "sex boutique" which was shut down by the Municipality two weeks ago but reopened today in a somewhat different guise,

The shop, which accepted mall orders for erotic photographs and "sexual aids" was closed down because it lacked a license, a move that apparently satisfied the Orthodox who had been picketing and praying in front of the establishment because it "profaned" the Boly City. The shop opened its doors again but only as a place where customers might peruse catalogues of erotica. As no money was exchanged, its owners claimed it is no longer a shop and does not require a license,

The Municipality took no action. A police spokesman told the Jewish Telegraphic Agency today that he was prepared to take Amram Blau, leader of the ultra-Orthodox Neturel Karta sect, into the shop to convince him that it has been "cleaned up." The parent Eros shop in Tel Aviv was fire-bombed three weeks ago. Two yeshiva students are being held without bail in connection with the bombling.

SOVIET JEWISH SCIENTIST EXPELLED FROM ACADEMY, STRIPPED OF OTHER POSTS Action Against Prof. Levich Followed Visa Application

NEW YORK, July 24 (JTA)—Prof. Venyamin Levich, a noted electrochemist was expelled from the Soviet Academy of Science after he applied for a visa to emigrate to Israel the National Conference on Soviet Jewy reported today. Dr. Levich was also

fired from his post at Moscow University and was dropped from the editorial boards of two journals, Electrochemistry and the Journal of Chemical Engineering. He lost his membership in scientific associations in which he had been active, the National Conference said.

The 55-year-old chemist was a signer of petitions upholding Jewish claims for freedom to emigrate. He was summoned to appear before the Academy's disciplinary committee where he was told of the decision to expel him. He was also told his invitation to lecture at Oxford University had been "annulled," because his appearance there would not "benefit the Academy." Levich was further denied the right to accept an invitation from the Polytechnic Institute in Grenoble, France. Scientific aides working under Levich at the Moscow University were told he was no longer their advisor.

HISTADRUT OFFICIAL SAYS 100,000 JEWS SEEK EXIT FROM SOVIET UNION

TEL AVIV, July 24 (JTA)—Hillel Seidel, head of the Histadrut Absorption Department, told the Histadrut Central Committee today that about 100,000 Russian Jews are currently seeking permission to emigrate to Israel. He made the report after returning from Vienna where he visited the transit camp for Russian Jewish emigres.

A large group of Russian Jews arrived here last night. They included Prof. Vladimir Bravoj, a noted chemist from Kiev and his wife, son and daughter. The scientist and his son were arrested several times during their efforts to obtain exit visas. Both were arrested several months ago for participating in a rally outside the Kiev synagogue. They were released two weeks ago and told they could obtain their visas. However, Bravoj's son's wife was denied a visa and is still in the Soviet Union.

AMNESTY INTL, TO OPEN ISRAEL BRANCH

TEL AVIV, July 24 (JTA)—A provisional committee to establish a branch of Amnesty International has been formed under the chairmanship of Tel Aviv's Deputy Mayor Aharon L. Melizer. RADAR, HELICOPTERS EMPLOYED TO CATCH JERUSALEM SPEEDERS

JERUSALEM, July 24 (JTA)—Terusalem police are employing radar and helicopter observers to apprehend speeding motorists and other traffic violators responsible for a rash of fatal highway accidents in and around the capital in recent weeks. About 300 summonses for reckless driving have been issued to motorists since the new methods were put into effect two weeks are.

Police officials attribute much of the traffic accidents to road repair and construction work which, they say, should have resulted in greater caution by motorists but apparently has had the opposite effect, Jerusalem motorists are rapidly becoming as bad as thoje in Tel Aviv who are notorious for speeding and discourtesy, Jerusalem police officials said.

Ten Arabs were killed and an undetermined number were injured this morning when their bus crashed head on into a seven-ton produce truck en route to Tel Aviv. The Arabs, all construction workers from Nablus, were on their way to jobs as construction workers in the building industry.

Medical Specialist Warns SMOKING VIOLATES JEWISH LAW; RABBIS URGED TO SET EXAMPLE

NEW YORK, July 24 (JTA) -- A physician who is an authority on Jewish medical ethics claims in a book just published by Yeshiva University that cigarette smoking is a violation of Jewish law because it is contrary to the Biblical injunction against in-

tentionally placing one's life in danger.

In a series of topical essays titled "Modern Medicine and Jewish Law," Dr. Fred Rosner, chief of the hematological division at Queens Hospital Center, noted that "In light of the overwhelming medical evidence proving the causal relationship of cigarette smoking to cancer of the lung, heart disease and chronic bronchitis, Jewish law absolutely prohibits this practice." He cited the Biblical passage (Deut. 4:9) as the injunction against smok-The avoidance of danger, Dr. Rosner wrote, is stressed throughout the Bible, Talmud and Codes of Jewish law and is exemplified in the positive commandment of making a parapet for one's roof (Deut, 22:8) so that no man may fall therefrom.

Dr. Rosner urged the Jewish community to marshal its forces against smoking. He suggested that rabbis give up smoking "in order to practice what they preach and teach by example."

GEN. HUGHES, WHO LIBERATED BERGEN-BELSEN, HAILED ON 80TH BIRTHDAY

LONDON, July 24 (JTA) -- The Jewish community and survivors of Nazi concentration camps are paying tribute to Brig. Gen. Hugh Llewelyn Glyn Hughes, the chief medical officer of the British Second Army which liberated Bergen-Belsen camp on April 15, 1945. Gen. Hughes celebrates his 80th birthday tomorrow. Joseph Rosensaft, president of the World Federation of Bergen-Belsen Associations said today that "the 80th birthday of this great man provides an opportunity for recording our feelings of gratitude for what he has done and accomplished in those bitter days after liberation, when so many were free but not vet certain whether they would live to sayour their freedom."

Gen. Hughes is credited with "super-human efforts" to save the lives of many camp survivors who were thought to be beyond recovery when they were liberated. Following the war he served for several years as president of "Bridge" an organization that arranges youth exchanges between Britain and Israel.

Rosensaft said, "I know I speak not only for myself but for the survivors of Bergen-Belsen in Israel, the US. Canada and elsewhere across the globe in expressing on this occasion our boundless gratitude and in sending our affectionate regards to the man who came on Liberation Day and re-

mained a friend until today."

ISRAELI AVIATION OFFICIAL REJECTS DUTCH COMPLAINT ON LANDING RIGHTS

JERUSALEM, July 24 (JTA) -- A senior Israeli civil aviation official today rejected complaints by the Netherlands government over Israel's refusal to grant the Dutch airline, KLM, additional landing rights at Lydda Airport. Naftali Ben-Yehuda, head of the Civil Aviation Authority, also accused KLM of unfair practices. He noted that Israel had agreed to a fourth KLM flight to Lydda each week which, he said, was sufficient for bona fide Dutch passengers.

Ben-Yehuda alleged that KLM was actually carrying American tourists to Lydda on flights from New York which were re-numbered at Amsterdam

to create the impression that they opposed there. "We discovered that three extra ilights are not for their own nationals but mainly for US tourists," he said. Ben-Yehuda's remarks were in reply to the Netherlands Foreign Minister Norbert Schmeltzer who said yesterday that he was "seriously concerned and disappointed" by the Israeli restriction.

Schmeltzer, who visited Israel earlier this year, appeared satisfied at the time with the agreement to increase KLM flights from three to four a week. Israeli officials said they were still waiting for a reciprocal move by the Dutch government to persuade the government of the Netherlands West Indies to grant Israel's national airline, El Al, landing rights at Curacao.

GOREN TO ATTEND BIRTHDAY OF RUMANIA'S CHIEF RABBI

TEL AVIV, July 24 (JTA) -- Tel Aviv Chief Rabbi Shlomo Goren will go to Rumania tomorrow to participate in the 60th birthday celebration of Rumania's Chief Rabbi Moshe Rosen. The Jewish community of Bucharest is sponsoring the celebration.

Goren will deliver personal greetings from Premier Golda Meir and the Israeli government, He will attend Sabbath service in the Bucharest Choral Synagogue and will deliver the main sermon. He is also expected to meet with leaders of various other religions in Rumania. Rabbi Goren will be accompanied by his wife and MK Itzhak Koren, who heads the Israeli-Rumanian Friendship League.

ARAB POLICE INSPECTOR APPOINTED IN JEWISH AREA

TEL AVIV, July 24 (JTA) -- An Arab police inspector who is a 20-year veteran of the Israeli police force, has been given jurisdiction over a Jewish community in the Nazareth area it was announced today. Inspector Jaber Jabarin, 39, thus becomes the first Arab law enforcement official in a Jewish district. Jabarin, who was born in Um el Fahem village, has been described as an outstanding police officer by his superiors. ISAIAH RABINOVICH, HEBREW

WRITER, DEAD AT 69

TORONTO, July 24 (JTA) -- Dr. Isaiah Rabinovich, educator, Hebrew writer and labor Zionist, died here at the age of 69. He was for many years principal of the Toronto Farband Folk School and later a faculty member of the College of Jewish Studies in Chicago before retiring. Dr. Rabinovich received his doctorate from the Jewish Theological Seminary in New York. He was the author of several books on Hebrew letters: Hasifrut Bemashber Hador (Literature in the Crisis of our Generation), Yetzer V'tzirah (Impulse and Creativity), Ner Dolek (A Burning Candle) and B'Hevley Doram (Studies in Hebrew Literature of the 1920's and 1930's). He received the Louis Lamed Prize in 1947. He is survived by his son Solomon Rabinovitch, a physician.

CANADIAN ZIONIST LEADER DIES AT 73

TONONTO, July 24 (JTA)--Kalmen Berger, a national and local leader of the Labor Zionist Movement in Canada, died here at the age of 73. A native of Staszow, Poland, Berger immigrated to Canada in 1927 where he was a jeweler and later a builder. He was a leader in the Farband Labor Zionist Order and in the Canadian Jewish Congress. An active proponent for Yiddish in Jewish education, he attended the World Zionist Congress in Basle in 1946.

Bray said the State Department had not had a chance to study Sadat's speech which, according to incomplete translations reaching here this morning, was devoted at some length to attacking the US but seemed ambiguous as to why the Egyptian leader suddenly ordered Soviet advisors out of Egypt last

Sadat said in his speech that three factors prompted him to remove Soviet military advisors from Egypt. These he said were a US government pledge to Israel that it would oppose any Security Council resolution which calls on Israel to withdraw from the territories it occupied in June, 1967; would enable Israel to maintain military superiority over Egypt; and would not impose, or allow the imposition of a settlement in the Middle East which did not provide for direct negotiations between Israel and its Arab neighbors. Sadat said these three points formed a central issue to the current Egyptian-Soviet situation but he did not say specifically how they were connected with his ordered reduction of the Soviet military presence in Egypt.

Sadat told the Arab Socialist Union, his country's only political party, that there were differences in strategy between the Soviet Union and Egypt. He said he had tried to dissuade the Soviet Union from maintaining a position that he described as "over cautious." He said that if Egypt and the Soviet Union did nothing but keep on waiting, it would mean acceptance of the Israeli occupation as a fait accompli. Sadat drew his loudest applause when he declared, "This we rejected."

He spent an hour describing how, he claimed, the US had repeatedly blocked efforts for a Middle East settlement. He devoted about the same length of time to detailing his attempts to bring about a harmony of views with the Soviet Union. Sadat charged that the US was conducting a war of nerves with Egypt. He said the US has been shipping military supplies into Israel since last Jan. "as if to tell us, what does the Soviet Union give you? What can the Soviet Union do for you?" Sadat said that in Oct, 1971 the Soviet Union had promised to implement a "certain agreement" but 1971 ended without the agreement, which the Egyptian President did not describe, being fulfilled.

CABINET PONDERS EVENTS IN EGYPT Limited Renewal of Hostilities Possible In Wake of Russian Pull-Out

JERUSALEM, July 24 (JTA) -- A Cabinet minister told the Jewish Telegraphic Agency last night that the government still lacked clear information on several aspects of the pull-out of Soviet personnel from Egypt, ordered by President Anwar Sadat last week. The Cabinet spent four hours discussing the development yesterday. Assessments were made by Foreign Minister Abba Eban, Defense Minister Moshe Dayan, Chief of Staff Gen. David Elazar and Gen. Aharon Yariv, head of military intelligence. The Defense Minister's special assistant Zvi Tsur also participated in the discussion. But the government continued to maintain official silence pending Premier Golda Meir's address to the Knesset Wednesday.

The JTA learned that one possibility raised at the Cabinet meeting was a renewal of limited hostilities along the Suez Canal by Egypt. This was considered possible in view of popular dissatisfaction in Egypt with the "no-war-no-peace" situation and Sadat's need to bolster his position. The departure of the Russians may mean that the Soviet restraints on the Egyptian military may have been

loosened, sources here said.

(The Lebanese newspaper Beirut reported yesterday that Syria was planning to follow the Egyptian lead and expel Soviet advisors attached to its armed forces.) Israeli military sources believe there are no more than 1000 Soviet advisors in Syria. There has been no confirmation of the Beirut report.

JARRING MISSION UNAFFECTED BY SOVIET WITHDRAWAL FROM EGYPT, WALDHEIM SAYS

UNITED NATIONS, July 24 (JTA) -- UN Secretary General Kurt Waldheim said in Vienna yesterday that the withdrawal of Soviet personnel from Egypt had nothing to do with the peace mission of UN Mideast mediator Gunnar V. Jarring, it was reported here today. Dr. Waldheim made the remark to an Austrian Press Agency correspondent when he arrived in Vienna from Moscow. The

correspondent had asked him if the Jarring misston may have been made somewhat easter by the developments in Egypt and whether chances for an interim settlement proposed by US Secretary of State William P, Rogers had become more favorable.

Waldheim said the events in Egypt were a matter concerning the two countries involved and unrelatived to the 3arring mission. He said the Jarring mission was based on Security Council Resolution 242, would continue on that basis and the UN would make every effort to contribute to a solution of the Middle East problem.

JUDY FLIES TO MOSCOW WITHOUT VISA;
OUSTED BY SOVIET AUTHORITIES
State Dept, Discloses Surprise Trip

WASHINGTON, July 24 (JTA)—Judy Silver Shapiro landed at Moscow Airport this morning without a visa, was denied entry by Soviet authorities and was placed on a return flight to London, State Department sources disclosed today. Mrs. Shapiro's surprise flight to Russia was apparently a desperate bid to visit her husband Gavriel who is scheduled to go on trial in Moscow Thursday. She had been trying without success to obtain a Soviet visa since June.

The State Department sources said Mrs. Shapiro boarded a Soutet Acrollot jet at New York last night and apparently made the flight alone. When she arrived in Moscow, alrport officials refused to allow her to leave the terminal and ordered her on the next plane to London. The State Department may have been aware of her flight. The sources said an American Consular official directed to meet her at the airport was unable to communicate with her. State Department officials said they were awaiting details from the US Embassy in Moscow.

Mrs. Shapiro, a Cincinnati social worker, was religious ceremony at his Moscow home last June 8 but had to leave Russia on June 12 when her visa expired. Soviet authorities refused to extend her visa at the time. She applied for a new visa at the Soviet Consulate in Washington June 28 but was never issued one

Mrs. Shapiro, who has spoken to her husband frequently by telephone from Moscow, said last week that he told her it was essential that she be present at his trial. Shapiro has been charged with evasion of military duty under Art, 198 of the Soviet penal code although he had completed his required military service as an officer in the Red Army reserve. Shapiro applied for and was granted israeli citizenship in absentia last year. He is seeking an emigration visa.

YOUNG REPUBLICANS ADOPT
MDDLE EAST STANCE
Pro-Israel Planks To Be Offered
To GOP Convention Next Month

WASHINGTON, July 24 (JTA).—The Young Republican National Federation has adopted a five-point statement of policy for the United States regarding the Middle East which it hopes will be a part of the Republican Party's platform in the Presidential campaign.

The policy statement will be presented to the Republican platform committee in Miami Beach during the week of Aug. 14. That committee will offer its recommendations to the party convention the following week. The Federation's five points, which closely approximate the plank adopted by the Democratic Party Convention in Miami Beach two weeks ago, says the following:

"An important goal of American foreign policy is seeing a just and lasting peace achieved in the Middle East. The United States cannot and should not dictate the terms of peace in the area Observing the sovereignty and territorial rights of all the nations of the Middle East is inherent in the administration's pursuit of a generation of peace. We specifically recommend: 1. Direct face-to-face Arab-Israeli negotiations: 2. The continued supply of military equipment and aircraft sufficient to maintain a balance of strength in the area: 3. Recognition of Jerusalem as the capital of Israel and relocation of the United States Embassy there; 4. Assistance to both Israel and the Arab states in relocating refugees and encouraging the help of the other nations of the world in this problem; 5. The resumption of diplomatic relations with all Arab nations willing to accept our policy of friendship.'

Regarding Soviet Jewry, the Federation's recommendation declares in a section titled "humanitarian concerns" that "We believe in the right of all people in all nations to pursue their own religious, notition and economic lives "

religious, political and economic lives,"
Like the Democratic platform, the Young Republicans' recommendations advocate moving the American Embassy in Israel from Tel Aviv to Jerusalem. Neither the Democrats nor the Young Republicans mentioned UN Security Council Resolution 242 upon which the Nixon administration's current Middle East policy is based. Unlike the Democrats, the Young Republicans did not include in the Middle East section a recommendation for stationing American forces in Europe and in the Mediterranean to deter as the Democrats say, the Soviet Union from bringing "unbearable pressure on Israel."

HERUT POSTPONES DECISION ON SPLIT WITH LIBERALS

TEL AVIV, July 24 (JTA) -- The Herut central committee debated last night and into the early hours of this morning whether to dissolve their partnership with the Liberals and decided to postpone a decision until next week. The decision, suggested by Herut leader Menachem Beigin, may save the Gahal faction which appears to be foundering over the Liberals' support of a Labor-sponsored electoral reform bill.

Political observers here said the week's breathing spell would allow temperatures to cool. But
it appeared that unless the Liberals renounce their
support of the measure which is hitterly opposed
by Herut, a showdown is inevitable. A large segment of the Herut leadership insisted last night
that the partnership which represents Israel's
largest opposition party, be broken. But Gen.
Ezer Weizman, chairman of the Herut executive
said a continuation of Gahal was essential in view
of the crucial problems facting the country. He
mentioned the recent developments in Egypt and
referred to possible attempts by the US to revive
the Rogers plan.

Beigin, who didn't speak until the debate had gone on for five hours, said the main problem was not Gahal but the electional reform bill which would introduce direct elections for a majority of Knesset members. Beigin charged again that the measure was a Labor Party device to achieve an absolute majority that "fit doesn't deserve."

ISRAELI NET ARTISTS TAKE 4TH PLACE IN EUROPE TOURNAMENT

TEL AVIV, July 24 (JTA).—The Israell Youth Basketball. Team took fourth place in the European Youth Championship games in Yugoslavia last night after sustaining a 70-63 defeat by the Russian team winch they had defeated in an earlier game. The Israell coach said he didn't expect his team to repeat their upset victory over the Muscovites because the Israell players were "exhausted."

INTERIOR MINISTER SAYS HE WILL TIGHTEN ENTRY RULES TO KEEP OUT 'UNDESIRABLES'

JERUSALEM, July 24 (JTA).—Interior Minister Yosef Burg told the Knesset today that he planned to post stricter regulations regarding entry to Israel to keep out so-called "undesirables." He was referring to purported Jewish and other oriminal elements from abroad who seek have in Israel.

Dr. Burg said he intended to amend the 1955 entry laws because "they were inadequate for current needs." The new regulations, he said, would clearly define under what conditions foreign nationals would be permitted to enter. One of the reasons for tightening the rules, he said, was because "we have been witnessing the phenomenon of citizens of states friendly to Israel who wrongly exploit the hospitality of this country." He said the border control officials "have been helpless to act in the face of this development."

CANDY WORKERS STRIKE; WANT PAY CHECKS SWEETENED

TEL AVIV, July 24 (JTA)—About 3000 employes of strike today after an all-night negotiating session ended in failure. The strikers, from the Elite and Lieber companies in Tel Aviv, the CD factory in Nazareth and the Instant Coffee plant in Safad, are demanding a share in the profits they claim the companies made through two consecutive price increases which were not accompanied by wage hikes,

The workers made other demands which management turned down on grounds that they exceeded the agreement with the Histadrut last Jan, for a relatively small pay increase. The clerical workers of Assaf Harofeh Hospital in Sarafand went on strike today.

*SEX BOUTIQUE' REOPENS AS NON-SHOP; POLICE ALERTED FOR DEMONSTRATIONS

JERUSALEM, July 24 (JTA).—Jerusalem police were preparing tonight for possible demonstrations by ultra-Orthodox elements against the Eros "sex boutique" which was shut down by the Municipality two weeks ago but reopened today in a somewhat different guise,

The shop, which accepted mall orders for erotic photographs and "sexual aids" was closed down because it lacked a license, a move that apparently satisfied the Orthodox who had been picketing and praying in front of the establishment because it "profaned" the Boly City. The shop opened its doors again but only as a place where customers might peruse catalogues of erotica. As no money was exchanged, its owners claimed it is no longer a shop and does not require a license,

The Municipality took no action. A police spokesman told the Jewish Telegraphic Agency today that he was prepared to take Amram Blau, leader of the ultra-Orthodox Neturel Karta sect, into the shop to convince him that it has been "cleaned up." The parent Eros shop in Tel Aviv was fire-bombed three weeks ago. Two yeshiva students are being held without bail in connection with the bombling.

SOVIET JEWISH SCIENTIST EXPELLED FROM ACADEMY, STRIPPED OF OTHER POSTS Action Against Prof. Levich Followed Visa Application

NEW YORK, July 24 (JTA)—Prof. Venyamin Levich, a noted electrochemist was expelled from the Soviet Academy of Science after he applied for a visa to emigrate to Israel the National Conference on Soviet Jewy reported today. Dr. Levich was also

fired from his post at Moscow University and was dropped from the editorial boards of two journals, Electrochemistry and the Journal of Chemical Engineering. He lost his membership in scientific associations in which he had been active, the National Conference said.

The 55-year-old chemist was a signer of petitions upholding Jewish claims for freedom to emigrate. He was summoned to appear before the Academy's disciplinary committee where he was told of the decision to expel him. He was also told his invitation to lecture at Oxford University had been "annulled," because his appearance there would not "benefit the Academy." Levich was further denied the right to accept an invitation from the Polytechnic Institute in Grenoble, France. Scientific aides working under Levich at the Moscow University were told he was no longer their advisor.

HISTADRUT OFFICIAL SAYS 100,000 JEWS SEEK EXIT FROM SOVIET UNION

TEL AVIV, July 24 (JTA)—Hillel Seidel, head of the Histadrut Absorption Department, told the Histadrut Central Committee today that about 100,000 Russian Jews are currently seeking permission to emigrate to Israel. He made the report after returning from Vienna where he visited the transit camp for Russian Jewish emigres.

A large group of Russian Jews arrived here last night. They included Prof. Vladimir Bravoj, a noted chemist from Kiev and his wife, son and daughter. The scientist and his son were arrested several times during their efforts to obtain exit visas. Both were arrested several months ago for participating in a rally outside the Kiev synagogue. They were released two weeks ago and told they could obtain their visas. However, Bravoj's son's wife was denied a visa and is still in the Soviet Union.

AMNESTY INTL, TO OPEN ISRAEL BRANCH

TEL AVIV, July 24 (JTA)—A provisional committee to establish a branch of Amnesty International has been formed under the chairmanship of Tel Aviv's Deputy Mayor Aharon L. Melizer. Amnesty International is a voluntary private organization headquartered in London, which defends political prisoners all over the

RADAR, HELICOPTERS EMPLOYED TO CATCH JERUSALEM SPEEDERS

JERUSALEM, July 24 (JTA)—Terusalem police are employing radar and helicopter observers to apprehend speeding motorists and other traffic violators responsible for a rash of fatal highway accidents in and around the capital in recent weeks. About 300 summonses for reckless driving have been issued to motorists since the new methods were put into effect two weeks are.

Police officials attribute much of the traffic accidents to road repair and construction work which, they say, should have resulted in greater caution by motorists but apparently has had the opposite effect, Jerusalem motorists are rapidly becoming as bad as thoje in Tel Aviv who are notorious for speeding and discourtesy, Jerusalem police officials said.

Ten Arabs were killed and an undetermined number were injured this morning when their bus crashed head on into a seven-ton produce truck en route to Tel Aviv. The Arabs, all construction workers from Nablus, were on their way to jobs as construction workers in the building industry.

Medical Specialist Warns SMOKING VIOLATES JEWISH LAW; RABBIS URGED TO SET EXAMPLE

NEW YORK, July 24 (JTA) -- A physician who is an authority on Jewish medical ethics claims in a book just published by Yeshiva University that cigarette smoking is a violation of Jewish law because it is contrary to the Biblical injunction against in-

tentionally placing one's life in danger.

In a series of topical essays titled "Modern Medicine and Jewish Law," Dr. Fred Rosner, chief of the hematological division at Queens Hospital Center, noted that "In light of the overwhelming medical evidence proving the causal relationship of cigarette smoking to cancer of the lung, heart disease and chronic bronchitis, Jewish law absolutely prohibits this practice." He cited the Biblical passage (Deut. 4:9) as the injunction against smok-The avoidance of danger, Dr. Rosner wrote, is stressed throughout the Bible, Talmud and Codes of Jewish law and is exemplified in the positive commandment of making a parapet for one's roof (Deut, 22:8) so that no man may fall therefrom.

Dr. Rosner urged the Jewish community to marshal its forces against smoking. He suggested that rabbis give up smoking "in order to practice what they preach and teach by example."

GEN. HUGHES, WHO LIBERATED BERGEN-BELSEN, HAILED ON 80TH BIRTHDAY

LONDON, July 24 (JTA) -- The Jewish community and survivors of Nazi concentration camps are paying tribute to Brig. Gen. Hugh Llewelyn Glyn Hughes, the chief medical officer of the British Second Army which liberated Bergen-Belsen camp on April 15, 1945. Gen. Hughes celebrates his 80th birthday tomorrow. Joseph Rosensaft, president of the World Federation of Bergen-Belsen Associations said today that "the 80th birthday of this great man provides an opportunity for recording our feelings of gratitude for what he has done and accomplished in those bitter days after liberation, when so many were free but not vet certain whether they would live to sayour their freedom."

Gen. Hughes is credited with "super-human efforts" to save the lives of many camp survivors who were thought to be beyond recovery when they were liberated. Following the war he served for several years as president of "Bridge" an organization that arranges youth exchanges between Britain and Israel.

Rosensaft said, "I know I speak not only for myself but for the survivors of Bergen-Belsen in Israel, the US. Canada and elsewhere across the globe in expressing on this occasion our boundless gratitude and in sending our affectionate regards to the man who came on Liberation Day and re-

mained a friend until today."

ISRAELI AVIATION OFFICIAL REJECTS DUTCH COMPLAINT ON LANDING RIGHTS

JERUSALEM, July 24 (JTA) -- A senior Israeli civil aviation official today rejected complaints by the Netherlands government over Israel's refusal to grant the Dutch airline, KLM, additional landing rights at Lydda Airport. Naftali Ben-Yehuda, head of the Civil Aviation Authority, also accused KLM of unfair practices. He noted that Israel had agreed to a fourth KLM flight to Lydda each week which, he said, was sufficient for bona fide Dutch passengers.

Ben-Yehuda alleged that KLM was actually carrying American tourists to Lydda on flights from New York which were re-numbered at Amsterdam

to create the impression that they opposed there. "We discovered that three extra ilights are not for their own nationals but mainly for US tourists," he said. Ben-Yehuda's remarks were in reply to the Netherlands Foreign Minister Norbert Schmeltzer who said yesterday that he was "seriously concerned and disappointed" by the Israeli restriction.

Schmeltzer, who visited Israel earlier this year, appeared satisfied at the time with the agreement to increase KLM flights from three to four a week. Israeli officials said they were still waiting for a reciprocal move by the Dutch government to persuade the government of the Netherlands West Indies to grant Israel's national airline, El Al, landing rights at Curacao.

GOREN TO ATTEND BIRTHDAY OF RUMANIA'S CHIEF RABBI

TEL AVIV, July 24 (JTA) -- Tel Aviv Chief Rabbi Shlomo Goren will go to Rumania tomorrow to participate in the 60th birthday celebration of Rumania's Chief Rabbi Moshe Rosen. The Jewish community of Bucharest is sponsoring the celebration.

Goren will deliver personal greetings from Premier Golda Meir and the Israeli government, He will attend Sabbath service in the Bucharest Choral Synagogue and will deliver the main sermon. He is also expected to meet with leaders of various other religions in Rumania. Rabbi Goren will be accompanied by his wife and MK Itzhak Koren, who heads the Israeli-Rumanian Friendship League.

ARAB POLICE INSPECTOR APPOINTED IN JEWISH AREA

TEL AVIV, July 24 (JTA) -- An Arab police inspector who is a 20-year veteran of the Israeli police force, has been given jurisdiction over a Jewish community in the Nazareth area it was announced today. Inspector Jaber Jabarin, 39, thus becomes the first Arab law enforcement official in a Jewish district. Jabarin, who was born in Um el Fahem village, has been described as an outstanding police officer by his superiors. ISAIAH RABINOVICH, HEBREW

WRITER, DEAD AT 69

TORONTO, July 24 (JTA) -- Dr. Isaiah Rabinovich, educator, Hebrew writer and labor Zionist, died here at the age of 69. He was for many years principal of the Toronto Farband Folk School and later a faculty member of the College of Jewish Studies in Chicago before retiring. Dr. Rabinovich received his doctorate from the Jewish Theological Seminary in New York. He was the author of several books on Hebrew letters: Hasifrut Bemashber Hador (Literature in the Crisis of our Generation), Yetzer V'tzirah (Impulse and Creativity), Ner Dolek (A Burning Candle) and B'Hevley Doram (Studies in Hebrew Literature of the 1920's and 1930's). He received the Louis Lamed Prize in 1947. He is survived by his son Solomon Rabinovitch, a physician.

CANADIAN ZIONIST LEADER DIES AT 73

TONONTO, July 24 (JTA)--Kalmen Berger, a national and local leader of the Labor Zionist Movement in Canada, died here at the age of 73. A native of Staszow, Poland, Berger immigrated to Canada in 1927 where he was a jeweler and later a builder. He was a leader in the Farband Labor Zionist Order and in the Canadian Jewish Congress. An active proponent for Yiddish in Jewish education, he attended the World Zionist Congress in Basle in 1946.
