DAYAN ASKS LABOR PARTY TO PLAN CHANGE IN RELIGIOUS STATUS QUO FOR ITS NEXT ELECTION CAMPAIGN

JERUSALEM, July 31 (JTA) -- A major challenge to the religious status quo in Israel was made last night by Defense Minister Moshe Davan in an assertion that the time was ripe for a change in that status quo and that his Labor party should go into its scheduled 1973 elections with a commitment to change the situation under which Israel's Orthodox rabbinate controls all issues of personal status

But Gen. Davan expressed agreement with Finance Minister Pinhas Sapir's view that the National Religious Party was the most "natural" and closest party in the Labor-dominated coalition of Premier Golda Meir. Speaking at a meeting of the Labor Center on state and religion, Gen. Dayan stressed the need for changes in the religious situation but urged against any "harsh" decisions to avoid any threat of endangering the Labor party's continued partnership with the NRP.

Gen. Dayan said he would have supported the Independent Liberal Party's proposal for a limited introduction of civil marriage in certain cases, now banned by the Orthodox rabbinate. He added. however, that if the Independent Liberals wanted to make such a change, they should have done so in accord with the government and the Prime Minister and "not push the government to the wall." This was not the proper procedure for a working coalition, he declared. Gen. Davan was referring to a battle within the coalition over the limited civil marriage proposal on which the Knesset Presidium voted on July 11 to postpone consideration until next fall when the Knesset reconvenes after its summer recess.

Gen. Davan also suggested that veshiva boys. now exempt from military service, should be recruited for training and brief military service and then permitted to return to their studies. He said he could see no reason why the NRP should pull out of the coalition over that proposal which he argued "even they must accept,"

Rabbi Menahem Hacohen, who is head of the department of supply of religious needs in the Histadrut, expressed total opposition at the meeting to the present "rabbinical establishment." He declared that what Israel needed was a rabbinate which would function within a "religious, traditional and historic Jewish framework," a rabbinate which would be "a living body that lives the problems of the public of today and not remote as it has turned out to be when whoever is greater in saying 'no' is regarded as a better rabbi.

He said the rabbinate had estranged the kibbutz movement, asserting that "certain rabbis" consider kibbutz members as being "out of the Jewish community." Rabbi Hacohen urged that the Labor party insist on removing religious and traditional problems from the "political game," Party officials said that more meetings were needed

and would be held on the issue.

BIPARTISAN MEASURE TO ASSURE ISRAEL CREDIT FOR MILITARY
PURCHASES INTRODUCED IN SENATE

WASHI'GTON, July 31 (JTA) -- Bipartisan legislation to insure continuity of Israel's line of credit

for purchase of military equipment from the United States was introduced in the Senate today by Sen. Henry M. Jackson (D. Wash.) with Senators Gordon Allott (R. Col.) and Abraham Ribicoff (D. Conn.) co-spensoring the measure, Sen. Jackson urged approval of an amendment to the Defense Procurement Act, now under debate in the Senate, which would extend authorization of "unlimited credit" to Israel for an additional 15 months to Dec. 31, 1973. Section 501 of that act, providing the credit, expires next Oct. 31.

Sen. Allott also spoke for the authorization but Sen. John Stennis (D. Miss.) opposed it on technical grounds, contending it should come from the Senate Foreign Relations Committee.

The original credit measure, also introduced by Sen. Jackson, which brought about the first line of credit of \$500 million for Israel, was approved by the Senate in Sept., 1970 by a vote of 87 to seven, over the opposition of Sen. J. William Fulbright (D. Ark.), chairman of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, Sen. Jackson said he was introducing the new legislation in view of the Senate rejection, on July 24, of the foreign military aid bill in which Israel was to have received a military credit of up to \$300 million and a supporting economic grant of \$85 million.

Meanwhile, the House Foreign Affairs Committee sent to the House floor today legislation for a new military sales act providing a total of \$629 million of which \$300 million is earmarked as a credit for Israel to buy equipment, and an additional \$50 million as a grant for economic supporting assistance. The Jewish Telegraphic Agency was told that the House is not expected to act on that measure until next week.

#### EXILED GREEK COMPOSER CONTINUES BATTLE AGAINST REGIME IN ISRAEL

TEL AVIV, July 31 (JTA) -- Mikis Theodorakis, the world-famous composer who is in exile from his native Greece, is carrying on his campaign against the "regime of the Colonels" during his current visit to Israel, a campaign which drew a flat denial today from Defense Minister Moshe Dayan of an alleged promise several years ago to the composer to help him in his anti-government effort.

The composer came to Israel to participate in the annual drama and music festival and has spent some of his time meeting with leftist groups in Israel at which he has expressed his opposition to the Greek regime. One of the meetings was held at the home of Amos Kenan, a dissident Israeli iournalist. There the composer reportedly said that several years ago, Gen. Dayan promised himhelp in creation of a Greek underground. Theodorakis, said then to have been a member of the Communist Party, told the meeting at Kenan's home that he had brought the purported Dayan offer before his colleagues and that they rejected it. A spokesman for Gen. Dayan said the Defense Minister had never met the composer and had accordingly never talked about such a proposal.

Another unusual development stemming from the composer's visit was a public declaration to him last Friday from Yitzhak Ben Aharon, Histadrut secretary general, that Israel's laborers were ready to provide "any material act" that would help the composer "in your struggle to free \_9

Greece from the reign of dictatorship." Political sources here expressed astonishment at the comnitment but they added that as leader of Israel's workers, Ben Aharon could express his opinions as he wished

The Histadrut official also told the composer: "Don't hesitate to tell us to do so." The occasion was a visit to the Histadrut headquarters by the composer. Ben Aharon also told the composer that he hoped the present Greek regime would end and that the Greek nation, like Israel, would live in independence and freedom. He described Israell laborers as being "in the first line of national freedom and social struggle."

#### HERTZBERG WARNS JEWS OF U.S., ISRAEL AGAINST SECURITY HOPES IN EITHER LEFT OR RIGHT REGIMES

JERUSALEM, July 31 (JTA).—Rabbi Arthur Hertzberg, the president of the American Jewish Congress, warned here tonight that the security of the Jews in America and in Israel could not be achieved by any permanent alliance with either the left or the right. Speaking at the opening session of the tenth annual American-Israel Dialogue at the Van Leer Jerusalem Foundation, the Englewood, N.J. rabbi declared that "Jews are safest in the non-dootrinaire, non-declogical regimes."

He added that when revolutions of both right and left try to remake men to fit their image they "always find the Jew to be obdurate and peculiar."
Rabbi Hertzberg, who is also a Columbia University history professor, assailed the "thesis of leftwing opinion that revolutionary change towards a new social order will inevitably make an end of anti-Semitism." The AJCongress-sponsored dialogue annually brings together some 40 leading American Jewish and Israeli scholars. The theme this year is "Jews and Revolutionary Forces."

Rabbi Hertzberg added that modern revolutionaverage added that the Jew was "inretrievably allen and even dangerous and that the new world of the future had to safeguard itself by excluding him." He said "it is not at all surprising that the State of Israel has not succeeded in convincing the third world that it is the forerunner of contemporary post-colonial national development,"

But he also criticized Jews in Israel and in the United States who "overreacted" and moved rad-loally to the right. He said that "right-wing regimes are no friendlier to Israel than the new dictatorships of the left." He added that "in the United States, there is some reason to suspect that reactionary forces are quite consciously willing to offer much of the Jewish position in American scotlety to other ethnics—not only Blacks—so that those who really control the American sconomy will be left relatively untouched."

#### MARKMAN, SEIZED FOR 'HOOLIGANISM,' CHARGED WITH TWO MORE 'CRIMES'

LONDON, July 31 (JTA)—Jewish sources in the Soviet Union report that Vladimir Markman, who was arrested April 29 at the Sverdlovsk railway station for hooliganism and still awaits trial in Moscow, has been charged with two additional offenses. The first is Article 74 of the penal code, distribution of anti-Soviet propaganda, and the second is Article 190-191, sending abroad information which is deleterious to the Soviet Union and receiving pay for such information. Markman's trial may begin early in August, the sources said,

In addition to the five Jewish prisoners of the Poima forced labor camp who were transferred last week to Pernskaya Oblast in the Western Urals, five more Poima prisoners are being sent to another camp in the same Pernskaya Oblast district, Jewish sources in the Soviet Union report. The five are: David Chernoglaz, Mark Dymshitz, Wolf Zalmanson and Yosif Mendelevich, all sentenced at the Lenigrad trials of Dec., 1970, and a fifth unamed prisoner.

The house of Lazar Lubarsky, a Rostow Jewish activist arrested July 17, on charges of anti-Soviet activities, was thoroughly searched recently by the police while his family was away. His wife was not allowed to enter her home for two days after the search, Jewish sources report. The authorities confiscated photos and important documents belonging to Lubarsky, which had been sent to him by the Ovir offices in Tbilisi, the sources said.

### SADAT WILLING TO TALK TO MEIR --IF 'BIG FOUR' HAVE 'FINAL SAY'

PARIS, July 31 (JTA).—President Anwar Sadat of Egypt has indicated he is ready to meet with Israelil Premier Golda Meir, presumably for peace talks, but only on condition that representatives of the four major powers "be present at the meeting and have the final say," it was disclosed here today. He made that statement to a five-member French Parliamentary group which visited him last week in Cairo, according to one of its members, a Jewisb deputy named Claude Gerard Marcus.

Marcus told the Jewish Telegraphic Agency that Sadat said he was "all for peace" but that he was "but prepared to give up a single inch of Egyptian territory." He also told the group he had been the first Arab ohief of state to "recognize". Israel and that "I have not changed my position since then." He apparently did not explain the nature of the recognition. The French deputies also visited Syria and Lebanon as guests of the Arab League. Marcus also told the JTA that he had been unable to meet with Syrian Jews.

#### WEIZMANN EXPERTS FIND POSSIBLE CLUE TO CONTROL OF LEUKEMIA

TEL AVIV, July 3l (JTA).—A Weizmann Institute research team under Prof. Leo Sachs, director of the genetics department, has discovered through tests with animals what scientists hope may be an effective tool in arresting leukemia and other white blood-cell diseases. The team of biologists has been working since 1987 on a protein substance known as MCI, which induces maturation and differentiation of the white blood cells, Dr. Sachs said,

Leukėmia in its most severe form involves an excessive production by the body of white blood cells, or leukocytes, mainly in the bone marrow, spleen and liver until they swamp the marrow, whose function it is to produce red blood cells. It is not known what causes this excessive production but it has been found that the introduction of MGI causes white cells to mature and hence slows down their rate of multiplication. Although tests have not yet been conducted on human beings, it is hoped that the successful tests or animals will be equally successful in controlling blood cancer in humans, Dr. Sachs added.

Twenty-one-year old Israeli immigrant Irina Markish, wife of Jewish writer David Markish, who is being held in Russia, said Sunday on her return to Israel from Europe and the United States, that she was optimistic that her efforts would lead the Soviet authorities to grant her husband a visa to emigrate to Israel. David, a post like his late father Pereix Markish, was expelled last week from the Russian Writers Association and is now working as a porter.

# 'Obligation To Show Concern' GOP CONGRESSMAN ANSWERS YOUTH WHO QUESTIONED PLANK PROPOSAL FOR AID TO SOVIET JEWS

WASHINGTON, July 31 (JTA)—An Alabama Congressman, challenged by a young Republican, said today he had urged a plank for the Republican national convention for US government aid to Soviet Jewry because "we have a special obligation to show sensitivity toward and act in protection of the rights of the Jewish people who have endured such tribulations and unspeakable persecution in our time."

The exchange between Rep. John N. Buchanan and a George Washington University student, who was not identified, took place at one of the hearings held by the Young Republican National Federation which is drafting a platform for presentation to the Republican Party convention next month, The student asked Rep. Buchanan "why should the United States government interfere with the internal affairs of the Soviet Union regarding Soviet

Rep. Buchanan, who as a Baptist minister served churches in several southern states before being elected to Congress, replied generally that "it is our obligation to show concern for human rights anywhere in the world" and that he felt the need for a special sensitivity for Jews "against the background of the 20th century." He asserted that "at this point in history, the Soviet Union finds it in her national interest to seek an improvement in relations with the United States and has become more sensitive to world opinion than ever before,"

Accordingly, he added, "our protest can have an effect on the policies of the Soviet government. If the Kremlin was wise, it would not only consent to open the doors to those who wish to emigrate to Israel or elsewhere, but it would reverse the policies of suppression which prevent Jews from expressing their faith or their Jewishness within the Soviet Union itself," He added that Jews are treated as an ethnic as well as a religious group "but are denied rights of other ethnic groups in the Soviet Union."

He added that "the concern which Soviet Jewry has shown in expressing protests against such policies should be an inspiration to all freedom-loving people. They merit our continued encouragement and support," he said, The Young Republican Federation included recommendations for assistance to Soviet Jewry in its platform proposals. The text of Rep, Buchanan's comments were made available to the Jewish Telegraphic Agency at its request.

#### ISRAEL GOV'T UNIT URGES BAN ON CIGARET ADS ON RADIO AND TV

JERUSALEM, July 31 (JTA)—Recommendations by a government committee of oivil servants that oigaret advertising be banned from radio programs and that ofgaret packages carry health warnings similar to those required in the United States were reported yesterday by the Ministry of Health which said the proposals will be considered for legisla tive action.

The committee also recommended reducing government subsidies to Israeli tobacco growers and encouraging them to switch to less dangerous crops. Also proposed is a ban on persons shown smoking during television appearances. Israel does not carry advertising on its TV programs but if advertising is introduced, the committee said, a similar ban on cigaret advertising should be applied. The committee was named by Attorney General Meir Shangar. His deputy, Zeev Sheer, served as its chalrman,

#### JORDAN OPENS AIRPORT AT AKABA; IGNORES ELATH APPEAL ON CONTROL

TEL AVIV, July 3l (JTA)--A representative of the International Aviation Organization arrived in Elath Sunday to inspect the problem of air safety, created by the opening of a Jordanian airport in nearly Akaba. The Israelis claim that the Jordanians are refusing to cooperate with the Elath Airport control tower regarding takeoffs and landings of planes. Repeated requests by the Elath authorities have been turned down, Elath officials said.

The International aviation official spent the day in Elath and even took a light plane flight over the approaches to the Elath runway to evaluate the dangers presented by the Akaba Airport. The official is expected to go to Akaba following his investigation in Elath in order to arrange for the safety of planes at both airports. The Akaba Airport services two daily flights to Amman, besides small aircraft and army planes. The name of the expert was withheld.

#### DULTZIN FEARS DROP IN ALIYA FROM WEST FOR LACK OF HOUSING

LONDON, July 31 (JTA)—Leon Dultzin, Jewish Agency treasurer, commenting on reports that 100,000 Jews had applied for visas to leave the Soviet Union, said here yesterday there was a possibility of an increase in Jewish emigration from Russia following the withdrawal of Soviet advisors from Egypt. He also told a meeting of honorary officials of the British Zionist Federation that in 1971 Israel received 21,000 immigrants from the west but that he felt there could be a 10 percent drop in western aliya, mainly because of Israel's housing shortage.

He warned that adequate funds and resources must be made available for the anticipated rise in aliya from the Soviet Union. He said the Jewish Agency adopted in February a minimum budget of \$500 million a year for its programs. He added that since 1967, the Jewish Agency has had a 50 percent participation in Israell social services, health and education, particularly in higher learn-

### GERMAN JEWISH GROUP PROTESTS GIVING JEWISH AWARD FUND TO POLES

BONN, July 31 (JTA)—The West German Central Council of Jews is contesting a decision of the German Book Trade Committee to transmit the committee's 1972 Peace Award, awarded posthumously to Polith—Jewish intellectual Janusz Korozak, to the Warsaw Korozak Committee. The Central Council is against giving the \$3500 prize money to a Polish organization "as long as Jews are being discriminated against in Poland," a Council official said.

Korczak, a teacher and poet in Poland, volunteered in 1942 to accompany Jewish children to the Treblinka gas chambers. He was chosen for this year's peace prize by the German Book Trade Committee, which awards the prize annually to an outstanding international personality for his contributions towards peace. Since Korczak has no living relatives, the committee decided to give his prize money to the Pollsh body, established in Korczak's memory.

However, that decision has drawn strong protest from the Central Council of Jews, which is suggesting that the money be given to the Korozak Committee in Germany, the International Red Cross for the suffering children of Bangladesh, or to UNICEF, Many Return Home To Be Accepted As True Jews ORTHODOX GROUP CHARGES ISRAEL REGISTERS NON-JEWS AS JEWS;

SOME AMERICANS INCLUDED

NEW YORK, July 31 (JTA).—The Committee for J Jews, charged today that the Israel government was registering non-Jewish immigrants as Jews and that many such registrants were returning to their home communities with the Israell "proof" that they were Jews and should be accepted as such. They include

Americans, the Committee said.
Yosef Wilenkin, general secretary of the Committee, said that Committee members in Israel handed a report last month to the Knesset Interior Committee, making the charge and listing the names, registration numbers and other information on what the Committee said were 160 non-Yews who had been registered in Israel as Jews on their entry papers and identity cards. Wilenkin told the Jewish Telegraphic Agency that the Committee had offices in Israel, Britain, Canada, France, Brazil, and in Los Angeles, Mismil, Philadelphia and Chicago in this

country.

Wilenkin said that the report given to the Knesset committee was based on two months of "grass roots" research by Committee members in Israel, the United States and Britain. Asked why non-Jews would want such "proof," he said that there had been a recent trend by conversion-seeking Gentiles who, "for one reason or another are pushed off from conversion or are not accepted as converts in their communities" to seek acceptance by spending some time in Israel as an immigrant and then returning home where they are fully accepted as Jews in their communities.

Included among such Gentiles, Wilenkin said, were non-Jews married to Jews who wish to enroll their children in a Hebrew school or join a synagogue, and non-Jews seeking to marry Jews. He said "they often find it tedious and sacrificing to obtain an Orthodox conversion. Many of them do not want a Reform conversion and even those who do, often find it time-consuming." He asserted that "for a Gentile to become converted to Jew through the allya process is not at all difficult. In many cases, the immigration authorities do not ask the applicant's religion and in other cases the applicant merchiles."

He said the Committee had conducted its study in the United States, Britain and Israel. He said Committee members had interviewed persons who had either returned home after a brief stay in Israel or who were living in Israel with identity cards bearing the label "Yehudi." He asserted that some of them were married to or intending to marry Orthodox parhers who assumed they were Jews.

The specifics on 160 such persons, he said, had been presented to the Interior Committee by Rabbi Shmuel Chafer and Yehuda Paldi. He charged that Interior Minister Yosef Burg, who direct all immigration activities, had responded to the Committee's report by asking Israel's scort service to investigate the Committee, known in Israel as the Committee for Jewish Integrity, to learn how it obtained the information in the report." He charged Dr. Burg "wants to keep the whole matter concealed."

## Levy Named Coordinator PRESIDENTS' CONFERENCE STARTS PLANS FOR ERAEL'S 25TH ANNIVERSARY IN U.S.

NEW YORK, July 3! (JTA)—Jacob Stein, chairman of the American Committee for Israel's 25th anniversary celebration, announced today the appointment of Raphael Levy, director of special services for the United Jewish Appeal, as coordinator for the observance plans. Levy is on loan from the UJA to serve as coordinator.

The anniversary committee, now in formation under the aegis of the Conference of Presidents of Major American Jewish Organizations and other groups, will coordinate the nation-wide observance of the anniversary, scheduled to start this fall. Stein said. The celebrations will reach their peak on the anniversary date, the fifth day of the Hebrew month of Iyar, which next year falls on May 7. Stein, who is chairman of the Presidents' Conference, said that, through the celebrations "which will take place in hundreds of communities across the country, we desire to salute Israel for its inspiring attainments in the arts, sciences, social problems and for its contributions to the advancement of human freedom." He said that in the observances, American Jews would "recall the outstanding contributions made by the American government, the American Jewh community and the American people as a whole to Israel's outstanding progress as a vital democratic state."

#### UJA ANNOUNCES THREE CHAIRMEN FOR ISRAEL MISSION CAMPAIGNS

NEW YORK, July 31 (JTA)—Paul Zuckerman, United Jewish Appeal general chairman, announced today the appointments of three UJA national chairmen to chairmanships of israel mission programs. Louis S, Goldman of Dayton, Ohio will act as chairman for UJA's regular Operation Israel flights, and Gerald S, Colburn of Milwaukee, Wisconsin will serve as chairman for the Lew "Cameo" missions. Albert B, Adelman, also of Milwaukee, has been appointed chairman of UJA's Annual Study Conference Committee.

Operation Israel is planning a total of ten missions for the coming year, according to Zuckerman. The first will begin Oct, 15, with the departure of a Women's Division Leadership flight. Four cameo missions, intensified four-to-five day programs, are currently being planned, Zuckerman said. The annual study conference is an eight-day in-deph study of the problems confronting the people of Israel today. Zuckerman announced that the leadership mission would depart for Israel Oct, 1.

#### WOMAN NAMED NCJW REPRESENTATIVE TO U.S. COMMISSION FOR UNESCO

NEW YORK, July 31 (JTA).—The National Council of Jewish Women today announced the appointment of Mrs. Shirley Joseph of Buffalo, N.Y. as the NCJW's representative to the United States Commission for UNESCO. The appointment was made by Secretary of State William P. Rogers.

The commission, which was created by Congress in 1946, consists of 100 distinguished Americans drawn mainly from the fields of education, science and culture. Since its inception, the national commission has focused on interests and rights of youth and minority groups, which the NCW says has also been its concern over the past 80 years.

BIPARTISAN MEASURE TO ASSURE ISRAEL CREDIT FOR MILITARY
PURCHASES INTRODUCED IN SENATE

WASHI'GTON, July 31 (JTA) -- Bipartisan legislation to insure continuity of Israel's line of credit

for purchase of military equipment from the United States was introduced in the Senate today by Sen. Henry M. Jackson (D. Wash.) with Senators Gordon Allott (R. Col.) and Abraham Ribicoff (D. Conn.) co-spensoring the measure, Sen. Jackson urged approval of an amendment to the Defense Procurement Act, now under debate in the Senate, which would extend authorization of "unlimited credit" to Israel for an additional 15 months to Dec. 31, 1973. Section 501 of that act, providing the credit, expires next Oct. 31.

Sen. Allott also spoke for the authorization but Sen. John Stennis (D. Miss.) opposed it on technical grounds, contending it should come from the Senate Foreign Relations Committee.

The original credit measure, also introduced by Sen. Jackson, which brought about the first line of credit of \$500 million for Israel, was approved by the Senate in Sept., 1970 by a vote of 87 to seven, over the opposition of Sen. J. William Fulbright (D. Ark.), chairman of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, Sen. Jackson said he was introducing the new legislation in view of the Senate rejection, on July 24, of the foreign military aid bill in which Israel was to have received a military credit of up to \$300 million and a supporting economic grant of \$85 million.

Meanwhile, the House Foreign Affairs Committee sent to the House floor today legislation for a new military sales act providing a total of \$629 million of which \$300 million is earmarked as a credit for Israel to buy equipment, and an additional \$50 million as a grant for economic supporting assistance. The Jewish Telegraphic Agency was told that the House is not expected to act on that measure until next week.

#### EXILED GREEK COMPOSER CONTINUES BATTLE AGAINST REGIME IN ISRAEL

TEL AVIV, July 31 (JTA) -- Mikis Theodorakis, the world-famous composer who is in exile from his native Greece, is carrying on his campaign against the "regime of the Colonels" during his current visit to Israel, a campaign which drew a flat denial today from Defense Minister Moshe Dayan of an alleged promise several years ago to the composer to help him in his anti-government effort.

The composer came to Israel to participate in the annual drama and music festival and has spent some of his time meeting with leftist groups in Israel at which he has expressed his opposition to the Greek regime. One of the meetings was held at the home of Amos Kenan, a dissident Israeli iournalist. There the composer reportedly said that several years ago, Gen. Dayan promised himhelp in creation of a Greek underground. Theodorakis, said then to have been a member of the Communist Party, told the meeting at Kenan's home that he had brought the purported Dayan offer before his colleagues and that they rejected it. A spokesman for Gen. Dayan said the Defense Minister had never met the composer and had accordingly never talked about such a proposal.

Another unusual development stemming from the composer's visit was a public declaration to him last Friday from Yitzhak Ben Aharon, Histadrut secretary general, that Israel's laborers were ready to provide "any material act" that would help the composer "in your struggle to free \_9

Greece from the reign of dictatorship." Political sources here expressed astonishment at the comnitment but they added that as leader of Israel's workers, Ben Aharon could express his opinions as he wished

The Histadrut official also told the composer: "Don't hesitate to tell us to do so." The occasion was a visit to the Histadrut headquarters by the composer. Ben Aharon also told the composer that he hoped the present Greek regime would end and that the Greek nation, like Israel, would live in independence and freedom. He described Israell laborers as being "in the first line of national freedom and social struggle."

#### HERTZBERG WARNS JEWS OF U.S., ISRAEL AGAINST SECURITY HOPES IN EITHER LEFT OR RIGHT REGIMES

JERUSALEM, July 31 (JTA).—Rabbi Arthur Hertzberg, the president of the American Jewish Congress, warned here tonight that the security of the Jews in America and in Israel could not be achieved by any permanent alliance with either the left or the right. Speaking at the opening session of the tenth annual American-Israel Dialogue at the Van Leer Jerusalem Foundation, the Englewood, N.J. rabbi declared that "Jews are safest in the non-dootrinaire, non-declogical regimes."

He added that when revolutions of both right and left try to remake men to fit their image they "always find the Jew to be obdurate and peculiar."
Rabbi Hertzberg, who is also a Columbia University history professor, assailed the "thesis of leftwing opinion that revolutionary change towards a new social order will inevitably make an end of anti-Semitism." The AJCongress-sponsored dialogue annually brings together some 40 leading American Jewish and Israeli scholars. The theme this year is "Jews and Revolutionary Forces."

Rabbi Hertzberg added that modern revolutionaverage added that the Jew was "inretrievably allen and even dangerous and that the new world of the future had to safeguard itself by excluding him." He said "it is not at all surprising that the State of Israel has not succeeded in convincing the third world that it is the forerunner of contemporary post-colonial national development,"

But he also criticized Jews in Israel and in the United States who "overreacted" and moved rad-loally to the right. He said that "right-wing regimes are no friendlier to Israel than the new dictatorships of the left." He added that "in the United States, there is some reason to suspect that reactionary forces are quite consciously willing to offer much of the Jewish position in American scotlety to other ethnics—not only Blacks—so that those who really control the American sconomy will be left relatively untouched."

#### MARKMAN, SEIZED FOR 'HOOLIGANISM,' CHARGED WITH TWO MORE 'CRIMES'

LONDON, July 31 (JTA)—Jewish sources in the Soviet Union report that Vladimir Markman, who was arrested April 29 at the Sverdlovsk railway station for hooliganism and still awaits trial in Moscow, has been charged with two additional offenses. The first is Article 74 of the penal code, distribution of anti-Soviet propaganda, and the second is Article 190-191, sending abroad information which is deleterious to the Soviet Union and receiving pay for such information. Markman's trial may begin early in August, the sources said,

In addition to the five Jewish prisoners of the Poima forced labor camp who were transferred last week to Pernskaya Oblast in the Western Urals, five more Poima prisoners are being sent to another camp in the same Pernskaya Oblast district, Jewish sources in the Soviet Union report. The five are: David Chernoglaz, Mark Dymshitz, Wolf Zalmanson and Yosif Mendelevich, all sentenced at the Lenigrad trials of Dec., 1970, and a fifth unamed prisoner.

The house of Lazar Lubarsky, a Rostow Jewish activist arrested July 17, on charges of anti-Soviet activities, was thoroughly searched recently by the police while his family was away. His wife was not allowed to enter her home for two days after the search, Jewish sources report. The authorities confiscated photos and important documents belonging to Lubarsky, which had been sent to him by the Ovir offices in Tbilisi, the sources said.

### SADAT WILLING TO TALK TO MEIR --IF 'BIG FOUR' HAVE 'FINAL SAY'

PARIS, July 31 (JTA).—President Anwar Sadat of Egypt has indicated he is ready to meet with Israelil Premier Golda Meir, presumably for peace talks, but only on condition that representatives of the four major powers "be present at the meeting and have the final say," it was disclosed here today. He made that statement to a five-member French Parliamentary group which visited him last week in Cairo, according to one of its members, a Jewisb deputy named Claude Gerard Marcus.

Marcus told the Jewish Telegraphic Agency that Sadat said he was "all for peace" but that he was "but prepared to give up a single inch of Egyptian territory." He also told the group he had been the first Arab ohief of state to "recognize". Israel and that "I have not changed my position since then." He apparently did not explain the nature of the recognition. The French deputies also visited Syria and Lebanon as guests of the Arab League. Marcus also told the JTA that he had been unable to meet with Syrian Jews.

#### WEIZMANN EXPERTS FIND POSSIBLE CLUE TO CONTROL OF LEUKEMIA

TEL AVIV, July 3l (JTA).—A Weizmann Institute research team under Prof. Leo Sachs, director of the genetics department, has discovered through tests with animals what scientists hope may be an effective tool in arresting leukemia and other white blood-cell diseases. The team of biologists has been working since 1987 on a protein substance known as MCI, which induces maturation and differentiation of the white blood cells, Dr. Sachs said,

Leukėmia in its most severe form involves an excessive production by the body of white blood cells, or leukocytes, mainly in the bone marrow, spleen and liver until they swamp the marrow, whose function it is to produce red blood cells. It is not known what causes this excessive production but it has been found that the introduction of MGI causes white cells to mature and hence slows down their rate of multiplication. Although tests have not yet been conducted on human beings, it is hoped that the successful tests or animals will be equally successful in controlling blood cancer in humans, Dr. Sachs added.

Twenty-one-year old Israeli immigrant Irina Markish, wife of Jewish writer David Markish, who is being held in Russia, said Sunday on her return to Israel from Europe and the United States, that she was optimistic that her efforts would lead the Soviet authorities to grant her husband a visa to emigrate to Israel. David, a post like his late father Pereix Markish, was expelled last week from the Russian Writers Association and is now working as a porter.

# 'Obligation To Show Concern' GOP CONGRESSMAN ANSWERS YOUTH WHO QUESTIONED PLANK PROPOSAL FOR AID TO SOVIET JEWS

WASHINGTON, July 31 (JTA)—An Alabama Congressman, challenged by a young Republican, said today he had urged a plank for the Republican national convention for US government aid to Soviet Jewry because "we have a special obligation to show sensitivity toward and act in protection of the rights of the Jewish people who have endured such tribulations and unspeakable persecution in our time."

The exchange between Rep. John N. Buchanan and a George Washington University student, who was not identified, took place at one of the hearings held by the Young Republican National Federation which is drafting a platform for presentation to the Republican Party convention next month, The student asked Rep. Buchanan "why should the United States government interfere with the internal affairs of the Soviet Union regarding Soviet

Rep. Buchanan, who as a Baptist minister served churches in several southern states before being elected to Congress, replied generally that "it is our obligation to show concern for human rights anywhere in the world" and that he felt the need for a special sensitivity for Jews "against the background of the 20th century." He asserted that "at this point in history, the Soviet Union finds it in her national interest to seek an improvement in relations with the United States and has become more sensitive to world opinion than ever before,"

Accordingly, he added, "our protest can have an effect on the policies of the Soviet government. If the Kremlin was wise, it would not only consent to open the doors to those who wish to emigrate to Israel or elsewhere, but it would reverse the policies of suppression which prevent Jews from expressing their faith or their Jewishness within the Soviet Union itself," He added that Jews are treated as an ethnic as well as a religious group "but are denied rights of other ethnic groups in the Soviet Union."

He added that "the concern which Soviet Jewry has shown in expressing protests against such policies should be an inspiration to all freedom-loving people. They merit our continued encouragement and support," he said, The Young Republican Federation included recommendations for assistance to Soviet Jewry in its platform proposals. The text of Rep, Buchanan's comments were made available to the Jewish Telegraphic Agency at its request.

#### ISRAEL GOV'T UNIT URGES BAN ON CIGARET ADS ON RADIO AND TV

JERUSALEM, July 31 (JTA)—Recommendations by a government committee of oivil servants that oigaret advertising be banned from radio programs and that ofgaret packages carry health warnings similar to those required in the United States were reported yesterday by the Ministry of Health which said the proposals will be considered for legisla tive action.

The committee also recommended reducing government subsidies to Israeli tobacco growers and encouraging them to switch to less dangerous crops. Also proposed is a ban on persons shown smoking during television appearances. Israel does not carry advertising on its TV programs but if advertising is introduced, the committee said, a similar ban on cigaret advertising should be applied. The committee was named by Attorney General Meir Shangar. His deputy, Zeev Sheer, served as its chalrman,

#### JORDAN OPENS AIRPORT AT AKABA; IGNORES ELATH APPEAL ON CONTROL

TEL AVIV, July 3l (JTA)--A representative of the International Aviation Organization arrived in Elath Sunday to inspect the problem of air safety, created by the opening of a Jordanian airport in nearly Akaba. The Israelis claim that the Jordanians are refusing to cooperate with the Elath Airport control tower regarding takeoffs and landings of planes. Repeated requests by the Elath authorities have been turned down, Elath officials said.

The International aviation official spent the day in Elath and even took a light plane flight over the approaches to the Elath runway to evaluate the dangers presented by the Akaba Airport. The official is expected to go to Akaba following his investigation in Elath in order to arrange for the safety of planes at both airports. The Akaba Airport services two daily flights to Amman, besides small aircraft and army planes. The name of the expert was withheld.

#### DULTZIN FEARS DROP IN ALIYA FROM WEST FOR LACK OF HOUSING

LONDON, July 31 (JTA)—Leon Dultzin, Jewish Agency treasurer, commenting on reports that 100,000 Jews had applied for visas to leave the Soviet Union, said here yesterday there was a possibility of an increase in Jewish emigration from Russia following the withdrawal of Soviet advisors from Egypt. He also told a meeting of honorary officials of the British Zionist Federation that in 1971 Israel received 21,000 immigrants from the west but that he felt there could be a 10 percent drop in western aliya, mainly because of Israel's housing shortage.

He warned that adequate funds and resources must be made available for the anticipated rise in aliya from the Soviet Union. He said the Jewish Agency adopted in February a minimum budget of \$500 million a year for its programs. He added that since 1967, the Jewish Agency has had a 50 percent participation in Israell social services, health and education, particularly in higher learn-

### GERMAN JEWISH GROUP PROTESTS GIVING JEWISH AWARD FUND TO POLES

BONN, July 31 (JTA)—The West German Central Council of Jews is contesting a decision of the German Book Trade Committee to transmit the committee's 1972 Peace Award, awarded posthumously to Polith—Jewish intellectual Janusz Korozak, to the Warsaw Korozak Committee. The Central Council is against giving the \$3500 prize money to a Polish organization "as long as Jews are being discriminated against in Poland," a Council official said.

Korczak, a teacher and poet in Poland, volunteered in 1942 to accompany Jewish children to the Treblinka gas chambers. He was chosen for this year's peace prize by the German Book Trade Committee, which awards the prize annually to an outstanding international personality for his contributions towards peace. Since Korczak has no living relatives, the committee decided to give his prize money to the Pollsh body, established in Korczak's memory.

However, that decision has drawn strong protest from the Central Council of Jews, which is suggesting that the money be given to the Korozak Committee in Germany, the International Red Cross for the suffering children of Bangladesh, or to UNICEF, Many Return Home To Be Accepted As True Jews ORTHODOX GROUP CHARGES ISRAEL REGISTERS NON-JEWS AS JEWS;

SOME AMERICANS INCLUDED

NEW YORK, July 31 (JTA).—The Committee for J Jews, charged today that the Israel government was registering non-Jewish immigrants as Jews and that many such registrants were returning to their home communities with the Israell "proof" that they were Jews and should be accepted as such. They include

Americans, the Committee said.
Yosef Wilenkin, general secretary of the Committee, said that Committee members in Israel handed a report last month to the Knesset Interior Committee, making the charge and listing the names, registration numbers and other information on what the Committee said were 160 non-Yews who had been registered in Israel as Jews on their entry papers and identity cards. Wilenkin told the Jewish Telegraphic Agency that the Committee had offices in Israel, Britain, Canada, France, Brazil, and in Los Angeles, Mismil, Philadelphia and Chicago in this

country.

Wilenkin said that the report given to the Knesset committee was based on two months of "grass roots" research by Committee members in Israel, the United States and Britain. Asked why non-Jews would want such "proof," he said that there had been a recent trend by conversion-seeking Gentiles who, "for one reason or another are pushed off from conversion or are not accepted as converts in their communities" to seek acceptance by spending some time in Israel as an immigrant and then returning home where they are fully accepted as Jews in their communities.

Included among such Gentiles, Wilenkin said, were non-Jews married to Jews who wish to enroll their children in a Hebrew school or join a synagogue, and non-Jews seeking to marry Jews. He said "they often find it tedious and sacrificing to obtain an Orthodox conversion. Many of them do not want a Reform conversion and even those who do, often find it time-consuming." He asserted that "for a Gentile to become converted to Jew through the allya process is not at all difficult. In many cases, the immigration authorities do not ask the applicant's religion and in other cases the applicant merchiles."

He said the Committee had conducted its study in the United States, Britain and Israel. He said Committee members had interviewed persons who had either returned home after a brief stay in Israel or who were living in Israel with identity cards bearing the label "Yehudi." He asserted that some of them were married to or intending to marry Orthodox parhers who assumed they were Jews.

The specifics on 160 such persons, he said, had been presented to the Interior Committee by Rabbi Shmuel Chafer and Yehuda Paldi. He charged that Interior Minister Yosef Burg, who direct all immigration activities, had responded to the Committee's report by asking Israel's scort service to investigate the Committee, known in Israel as the Committee for Jewish Integrity, to learn how it obtained the information in the report." He charged Dr. Burg "wants to keep the whole matter concealed."

## Levy Named Coordinator PRESIDENTS' CONFERENCE STARTS PLANS FOR ERAEL'S 25TH ANNIVERSARY IN U.S.

NEW YORK, July 3! (JTA)—Jacob Stein, chairman of the American Committee for Israel's 25th anniversary celebration, announced today the appointment of Raphael Levy, director of special services for the United Jewish Appeal, as coordinator for the observance plans. Levy is on loan from the UJA to serve as coordinator.

The anniversary committee, now in formation under the aegis of the Conference of Presidents of Major American Jewish Organizations and other groups, will coordinate the nation-wide observance of the anniversary, scheduled to start this fall. Stein said. The celebrations will reach their peak on the anniversary date, the fifth day of the Hebrew month of Iyar, which next year falls on May 7. Stein, who is chairman of the Presidents' Conference, said that, through the celebrations "which will take place in hundreds of communities across the country, we desire to salute Israel for its inspiring attainments in the arts, sciences, social problems and for its contributions to the advancement of human freedom." He said that in the observances, American Jews would "recall the outstanding contributions made by the American government, the American Jewh community and the American people as a whole to Israel's outstanding progress as a vital democratic state."

#### UJA ANNOUNCES THREE CHAIRMEN FOR ISRAEL MISSION CAMPAIGNS

NEW YORK, July 31 (JTA)—Paul Zuckerman, United Jewish Appeal general chairman, announced today the appointments of three UJA national chairmen to chairmanships of israel mission programs. Louis S, Goldman of Dayton, Ohio will act as chairman for UJA's regular Operation Israel flights, and Gerald S, Colburn of Milwaukee, Wisconsin will serve as chairman for the Lew "Cameo" missions. Albert B, Adelman, also of Milwaukee, has been appointed chairman of UJA's Annual Study Conference Committee.

Operation Israel is planning a total of ten missions for the coming year, according to Zuckerman. The first will begin Oct, 15, with the departure of a Women's Division Leadership flight. Four cameo missions, intensified four-to-five day programs, are currently being planned, Zuckerman said. The annual study conference is an eight-day in-deph study of the problems confronting the people of Israel today. Zuckerman announced that the leadership mission would depart for Israel Oct, 1.

#### WOMAN NAMED NCJW REPRESENTATIVE TO U.S. COMMISSION FOR UNESCO

NEW YORK, July 31 (JTA).—The National Council of Jewish Women today announced the appointment of Mrs. Shirley Joseph of Buffalo, N.Y. as the NCJW's representative to the United States Commission for UNESCO. The appointment was made by Secretary of State William P. Rogers.

The commission, which was created by Congress in 1946, consists of 100 distinguished Americans drawn mainly from the fields of education, science and culture. Since its inception, the national commission has focused on interests and rights of youth and minority groups, which the NCW says has also been its concern over the past 80 years.

Mrs. Joseph, a board member of the NCJW, is a acted in the Jewish and general communities, serving the Board of Governors of the United Federation of Buffalo, the United Jewish Fund Campaign as chairman of its Women's Division, and the American Field Service Committee.

Israeli officials report that 350 students from the Gaza Strip and Northern Sinai are studying in Egyptian institutions of higher learning. They regularly visit relatives in occupied territory.
