#### 80,000 PERSONS FROM 120 NATIONS PAY HOMAGE TO II SLAIN ISRAELI ATHLETES

MUNICH, Sept. 6 (JTA).—The huge Olympic stadium was the scene of grief and mourning today as 80,000 persons from 120 nations gathered to pay homage to the II members of the Israeli Olympic squad murdered by Arab terrorists. Two of the Israelis were Blain yesterday in a pre-dawn raid on the Israeli quarters in the Olympic Village. Nine others were killed 23 hours later during a

shoot-out between the terrorists and West German police at the Furstenfeldbruck military airport outside Munich from where the terrorists had expected to fly their hostages to Cairo. The bodies of the slain Israelis will be flown to Israel for burial. The surviving members of the Israeli Olympic squad are scheduled to return home tomorrow.

The atmosphere at the Olympic stadium today

was a grim contrast to what it had been a day before, Instead of the cheers of spectators the vast arena echoed to sobbing and murmered prayers, Dozens of dignitaries from all over the world, among them West German Chancellor Willy Brandt and Prince Philip of Britain seemed overcome as the Munich Philharmonic Orchestra, conducted by Padolf Kemfer, played Beethoven's Funeral March.

All figgs were at half-mast. Avery Brundage, chairman of the Olympic Committee, declared this day a "day of mourning." Brundage announced that the games will continue tomorrow. "We will not let a handful of terrorists disrupt the Olympic spirit,"

he said.

### Will Play In 1976 Olympics

Members of the Israeli Olympic squad sat in the front line of seats. Most of them wore skull caps and were seen murmering to themselves the Hebrew prayer for the dead. Eliashly Ben-Horin, Israel's Ambassador to West Germany, and Haim Lankin, chief of the Israeli Olympic squad, addressed the services in Hebrew. Lankin said later, "This tragedy will not prevent us from participating in future games. Israel will play again in the same spirit of fraternity and peace." The next Olympic games are scheduled to be held in Montreal in 1976.

Dr. Gustav Heinemann, President of the West German Federal Republic, spoke at the memorial services. "Those countries which do not put a stop to the oriminal activities of the terrorists bear the real responsibility" for the massacre, Heinemann

said.

Contrary to earlier reports, none of the Arab delegations attended this murning's services. According to reports, all of them remained in their hostels. The Egyptian delegation which announced its withdrawal from the Olympic games in the aftermath of the tragedy reportedly returned home today.

#### Confusion Continues Over Deaths

There were still confusing reports today as to the actual events of the bloodbath in which five terrorists and one German policeman were killed in addition to the Il Israeli victims. The initial attack on the Israeli quarters in Clympto Village occurred in the early hours of Tuesday morning. Most of the Israeli squud managed to escape.

Nearly 24 hours of fruitless negotiations ended at shout 9:45 p.m. local time yesterday when the Ger-

man authorities agreed to the terrorist demands that they be allowed to fly to Cairo with the hostages. A bus transported terrorists and hostages to the Olympic Village landing area where three helicopters were parked.

Bruno Merk, the Bavarian Minister of Interior said afterwards that the police could not intervene against the building where the hostages were held because it would have meant certain death for all of them. "We had to act at the airport," Merk said. Two of the helicopters conveyed the terrorists and their victims to Furstenfeld-bruck where a Boeing 727 jet supplied by Lufthanss, the West German airline, waited. The third helicopter containing Merk and other officials followed. The terrorists apparently believed they were going to Municht's civilian airport.

When they arrived at Furstenfeldbruck they spotted West German police and apparently realized they had been led into an ambush. According to the accounts of Merik and Mayor George Kronawitter of Munich who witnessed the events at the airport, a gunbattle broke out during which one helicopter pilot was wounded. Four of the five Arab terrorists were killed or committed suicide and a fifth was shot down by police.

Before they died, two of the terrorists killed the hostages. Merk said that as far as he could see, one opened fire on the first helicopter in which the victims were apparently bound hand and foot and the other threw a grenade into the second helicopter, demolishing it. "It was terrible, an awful carnage, I will not forget it as long as I live," Kronawitter said later.

# DEAD ATHLETES BEING FLOWN HOME

TEL AYIV, Sept. 6 (JTA)—A special El Al plane let for Münich this afternoon to bring home the members of Israel's Olympic squad who escaped death at the hands of Arab terrorists. A second plane is expected to leave tonight to bring back the victims in their coffins. The Israeli squad was ordered home by Depuly Premier Yigal Allon who is in overall charge of sports matters.

The team members themselves asked to be removed as soon as possible from the scene of the tragedy. But the problem of identifying the dead may delay the return of the coffins of some of the squad members who may be required to

identify their dead team mates, Rabbi Mordechai Firon, chief chaplain of the

Israeli Army, flew to Munich earlier today to help identify the bodies and prepare them for burial as soon as they arrive in Israel. One of the main problems was the condition of the bodies. Some were badly burned when the helicopter in which they were held was set fire by a terrorist grenade and exploded. There is also the problem of identifying and removing the bodies of the terrorists killed in the same explosion.

#### State Funeral For Victims

The Cabinet decided today on a State funeral for the victims. No date or time has been announced. No State mourning was declared. But the impact of the Munich tragedy was visible all over israel. Very few people went to the movies tonight and the usually crowded cafes in Tel Aviv were almost empty.

Many people gathered on street corners to

listen to speakers demanding retaliatory action against the terrorists "wherever they are." Herut leader Menachem Beigin called for an all-out offensive across the borders and Gen. Ezer Weisman, chairman of the Herut Executive noted that it was mainly Syria and Egypt that aid the terrorists.

CONGRESS UNANIMOUSLY ADOPTS RESOLUTIONS
URGING OSTRACISM OF NATIONS AIDING,
ABETTING, MURDER LIKE THAT IN MUNICH

WASHINGTON, Sept. 6 (JTA)—Box houses of Congress adopted identical resolutions today calling on the civilized world to ostracize nations and peoples who aid and abet such acts as the murder of in members of the Israeli Olympic squad. The resolutions were adopted unanimously. The tally in the Senate was 82-0 and in the House 346-0. Both chambers directed that their resolutions be presented to Secretary of State William P, Rogers "for appropriate transmittal."

President Nixon this morning directed Secretary Rogers to "foonsult other governments on an urgent basis as to what collective measures by the international community can be brought to bear on the problem of terrorism," Nixon's move came during a 75-minute meeting held at the White House with Rogers and the President's National Security Advisor Dr. Henry Kissinger to review the events in Munich. The announcement of the meeting was made by White House Press Secretary Ronald , Ziegler. He gave no indication what activities the Nixon administration might take to meet the terrorist acts.

The President cabled Premier Golda Meir/to-day extending the sympathy of the American people for what he described as "a tragedy for all the people and all the nations of the world,"

Security Messures Strengthened At Missions

After expressing "deep sorrow" and "alarm" at the terrorism in Munich and sympathy for the families of the victims, both resolutions stated; "It be further resolved that all means be sought by which the civilized world may cut off from contact with civilized mankind any peoples in any nation giving sanctuary, support, sympathy, aid or comfort to acts of murder and barbarism such as those just witnessed in Munich."

Shortly after his meeting with the President, Rogers met with a half dozen top-ranking State Department officials who he asked for creative ideas on halting terrorism. Rogers also telephoned the Israel Ambassador, Yitzhak Rabin, and arranged to meet with him at the State Department late this afternoon. Discussing the developments stemming from the Munich murders, State Department spokesman Charles Bray desoribed terrorism as "obviously a very complex, difficult and perhaps protracted problem."

Bray told newsmen that the US had moved to strengthen security measures at the Israell, German and Arab missions in Washington by the Executive Protective Service, a special federal police force catabilished to guard forcing installations. Bray said that in New York the US Ambassador to the United Nations, George Bush, received the whole-hearted cooperation of the New York City police in protecting the installations of those same countries. He said similar police cooperation

had been extended in a dozen other major cities where foreign legations are located.

Bray said the State Department was coordinating security measures for the protection of Israelis in the Us which President Nixon pleigad yesterday. Regarding threats against Arab diplomats, he said "regardless of one's feelings, and for most of us they are intense in the wake of yesterday's tragedy in Munich, further violence directed against diplomats to whom we have obligations as people is clearly no solution."

#### WARNING; STEPPED UP ACTION AGAINST TERRORISTS AND THOSE WHO AID THEM

JERUSALEM, Sept. 6 (JTA)—Israel warned today that it would step up its actions against Arab terrorists and that "those who aid them" would be held responsible for their actions. The warning came in an official statement issued following a special session of the Cabinet this morning devoted to the aftermath of the massacre of II members of the Israeli Olympic squad by Arab terrorists in Munich. Prenier Golda Meir expressed her appreciation for the West German decision to employ force against the terrorists.

force against the terrorists.

The Cabinet statement condemned the murder of the Israelis and said that it proved for the world to see the real nature of Arab terrorism. It stated that the Israel government joined the families of the victims in their mourning. "Israel will continue its aelf-defense activition," the statement said, "and will not exempt those who ald them from responsibility for the acts of the terrorists." The statement continued, "The Israel government will appeal to governments and political bodies and demand the adoption of cifective measures against colls and units of the terrorist organizations with the aim of paralyzing them and extirpating their bases."

The statement said the Cabinet had decided on a "concentration of information" concerning both German and Israeli security precautions before the attack and concerning the steps taken during the attack. This appeared to mean that an unoficial inquiry will be held with the Germans. The "relevant authorities" were asked to report back to the next Cabinet meeting which is scheduled for the Tuesday after Rosh Hashan.

The West German Ambassador, Jesco Von Puttkammer issued a statement on the events in Munich. Recalling the "shameful times of my country," he branded the terrorists as "monsters" and said all Germans joined with Israelis in their sorrow.

# MCGOVERN: EGYPT, LEBANON, RESPONSIBLE

LOS ANGELES, Sept. 6 (JTA).—Sen. George McGovern charged here today that two Arab governments, Egypt and Lebanon, shared responsibility for the "brutal wave of terrorism carried out by international gangsters" to destroy the State of Israel. Addressing a meeting of the Southern California Beard of Rabbis, the Democratic Presidential nominee declared that "the world community must ostracize and punish any country that harbors or offers sanctuary to these criminals,"

# LINDSAY CALLS FOR DAY OF MOURNING

NEW YORK, Sept. 6 (JTA).—Mayor John V. Lindsay called on all New Yorkers today to join in a day of mourning jomorrow for the 11 deal Israell athletes. In a cable to Premier Golda Meir he denounced the terrorist violence and said: "Your youth have been a symbol of strength and courage to young people everywhere. That the flower of that youth should be violtims of suicidal extremists is an unspeakable tragedy."

#### EUROPE AGHAST AT BLOODBATH

PARIS, Sept. 6. (JTA)--French President Georges Pompidou today sent a cable to Israel President Zalman Shazar expressing his sympathy over the killings in Munich. Following a French Cabinet session prestided over by Pompidou, government spokesman Jean-Philippe Lecat said, "The government expresses its indignation at the attack and its sympathy for the victims and their families."

Foreign Minister Maurice Schumann said that he was "overwhelmed by the Munich drama," and remarked that "the Olympio peace has been broken by a bloodbath which took place only a few kilometers from the site of the Dachau concentration camp," However Schumann stressed that none of the Arab governments had tried to excuse the terrorists and even the Palestinian organizations have "disassociated themselves from the Munich attack."

Diplomatic observers here interpret this last ramark as an oblique appeal to Israel not to undertake reprisal action and to confine its anger to those who have actually carried out the terrorist activities. French Prime Minister Pierre Messmer expressed his indignation and called for the respect of human rights.

Jewish organizations, as well as Catholic and Protestant churches, are holding memorial meetings throughout France in remembrance of the

murdered athletes.

Elsewhere, Pope Paul VI this morning deplored the attack during a speech given before 5000 persons from his summer residence of Castel Gondolfo. In a message to Israeli President Zalman Shazar, the Pope expressed his "profound sorrow." He said, "We deplore this act of violence and all acts of violence." Italian President Joseph Saragat also sent a cable to the Israel President expressing his conditioness.

#### Communist Bloc Condemns Munich Terror

The East German Communist Party condemned this morning "without reserve" the terrorist attack calling it "a horrible crime," that would harm the interests of the Arab states themselves. The Soviet Union said that the chief of its delegation in Munich had expressed his "regrets" to the Olympic Committee and presented his "condolences."

Radio Budapest declared that "this act of terrorism lowers the Palestinian movement to the level of political gangstevism..... The terrorists cannot count on the sympathy of anyone." Radio Warsaw said, "the terrorists have rendered the worst possible service to the Arab cause," Leaders of the Czech delegation condemned "this act which prejudices the Olympic movement." Radio Belgrade called it "an lusane extremits attempt,"

In Amsterdam Dutch Premier Barend Blesheuvel and Foreign Minister Norbert Schmeltzer personally signed the condolence book at the Israell Embassy in The Hague today. The Netherlands Palestinian Organization said that although it regretted the terrorist actions, they must be seen in the context of the Palestinians' expulsion from their country. The three Jewish Dutch congregations, the Ashkenazi, Sephardic and Liberal have jointly cabled the Dutch government to immediately withdraw the Dutch delegation from the games.

Queen Margaret of Denmark cabled President Zalman Shazar saying she was participating in the mourning of the Israell people. Prime Minister Jens Otto Krag, Foreign Minister K,B, Andersen and the Speaker of Parliament sent cables to Israel. The Belgian Committee for a Negotiated Peace Between Israel and the Arab Countries in a communique today expressed its indignation at the attack committed against the Israell delegation to the Olympic games,

# Day Of Mourning Proclaimed

In London, Dr. Nahum Goldmann, President of the World Jewish Congress, said, "We are all utterly numbed and appalled by this shocking barbarism. No civilized human being can ever accept such a callous and brutal assault on the dignity of man and on those principles of humanity for which we all stand."

Britain's Chief Rabbi Immanuel Jakobovits proclaimed aday of mourning for Anglo-Jewry next Monday. In Johannesburg, South African Premier B.J. Vorster expressed his deepest sympathy for Israel over the Munich massacre. Vorster said he could not condemn this outrage in strong enough terms. He warned that as long as some governments and organizations advocated and subsidized terrorism such orimes would recur. The South African Zionist Federation and individual deputies cabled to the Israel government their deepest sympathy and shock at the dastardly deed, Special synaggue services were planned for tomorrow.

#### JEWISH LEADERS URGE END OF VIOLENCE

NEW YORK, Sept. 6 (JTA) -- American Jewish leaders expressed shock and dismay today over the tragic events in Munich. David Rivlin, Israeli Consul General, called on all nations to put an end to the syndrome of extortion, hijacking and bloodshed of innocent people which he said was due to indifference and to "nations and organizations that encourage blackmailers to continue acts of crime." In a telegram to President Nixon, Mrs. Max Matzkin, president of Hadassah, said that Hadassah urged that he recall the US Olympic team "to protest the barbaric action of Arab terrorists against the Israeli participants." Mrs. Eleanor Marvin, president of the National Council of Jewish Women said "the deliberate selection of innocent Israeli athletes as the victims of Arab guerrilla attacks is a heinous act of atrocity."

Judah J, Shapiro, president of the Labor Zionist Alliance, suggested that everyone individually engage; in some personal act of mourning on the day of the funeral of the Munich victims. The Zionist Organization of America, said the tragedy at Munich might have been averted if an international anti-hijacking treaty had been in existence. Harold Ostroff, Workmen's Circle president, cabled the International Olympic Committee urging that "all sports stadia around the world dim their lights and hold brief memorial services before games in tribute to the slain Israeli Olympic members,"

Throughout the New York area and across the country memorial services were held today, and others scheduled tomorrow, for the slain Israeli athletes. A joint memorial service was held at the Jewish Agency building by the American Zionist Federation and the American Section of the World Zionist Organization. Traffic was halted this morning in the vicinity of the B'nai B'rith building in New York where the Anti-Defamation League of B'nai B'rith and District I B'nai B'rith held public memorial services outside their headquarters. A special memorial service was also conducted at the Union of American Hebrew Congregations' House of Living Judaism Chapel.

Christian and Jewish leaders will conduct a special memorial meeting tomorrow at Congregation Kehllath Jeshurun in New York. In Washington, a community-wide memorial meeting will be held at the Lincoln Memorial at noontime tomorrow. Philip M, Klutznick, official of the Jewish United Fund of Metropolitan Chicago urged men of peace throughout the world to condemn the terrorist carages in Munich.

## FAMILIES PLUNGED INTO GRIEF

TEL AVIV, Sept. 6 (JTA).—The families of the ill leraelis murdered by Arab terrorists in Munich spent a night of alternating hope and despair only to plunged into utter grief this morning as messengers brought the news that their loved ones were dead. Their angulsh was made even more cruel by unfounded reports from Munich earlier in the evening that all of the hostages held by the terrorists had been saved. Some families had begun to celebrate with neighbors at this news when their doorbells rang and they were told the grighty truth.

"It is impossible," exclaimed Mrs. Kehat Shour, wife of the Israeli rifle toam's coach, when she learned this morning that her husband was among the victims. Only a few hours earlier she had heard that all the hostages were saie. There was terror in her eyes as she faced the grim delegation that brought her the news at her home—a representative of the sports organization, a lown council member and a physician. They could tell her no details of what happened in Munich, only that her husband was dead

At Herzlitah, north of Tel Aviv, lights burned all night at the home of Amitzur Shapira, an athletics coach. His wife, children and parents had been glued to their radio for almost 24 hours. At midnight their hopes rose when it was reported that the hostages were safe. But early in the morning a police car drew up in front of the Shapira home with the message of death.

#### Refused To Believe Reports

At the home of Joseph Romano, a weightlifter, mourning began at midnight when it was confirmed that he was one of the two Israelis slain by the terrorists in their pre-dawn ratid yesterday on the Israeli compound at Olympio Village. The scene at the home of wrestler Mark Slavin was even more tragic. Recent emigres from Russia, his parents do not understand Hebrew. They had been told that Slavin was safe. Friends and neighbors came to congratulate them. They were in the middle of a toast when the news came that their son was dead.

The aged father of Joseph Gutfreund, a wrestling team referee, refused to believe the radio news report that the hostages were safe. "I never believed the Germans," he said. He remained awake in his Jerusalem home waiting for a telephone call from Munich that never came. He was told of his son's death this morning by two government officials and a physician, Mrs. Gutfreund collapsed and was treated by the dootor,

In Haifa the parents of weight-lifter Zeev Friednan were unconsolable. His mother cried hyster-ically. His father was silent with warm tears running down his face. At the home of the wrestler Eliezer Haifin, another emigre from Russia, there was profound bitterness among the tears. Most of the Haifin family was killed in the Nazi holocaust. The young athlete's father said only one sentence: "The Germans enabled this once again."

There was no one to receive the news of the death of David Berger, a weight-lifter who came to israel only nine months ago from Cleveland, Ohio. Berger is a bachelor. When police came, they found his flat looked.

#### JEWISH PROTESTORS ARRESTED IN MOSCOW

NEW YORK, Sept. 6 (JTA)—The National Conference on Soviet Jewry confirmed this afternoon an earlier report that 30 Jews, most of themyouths, were arrested in front of the Lebanese legation by Moscow police as they were protesting the Arab terrorist violence in Munich. Among those arrested were Esther and David Markish. The group had planned to submit a letter protesting the terrorist

# action to the Lebanese legation. WALDHEIM EXPRESSES SORROW

UNITED NATIONS, Sept. 6 (JTA) -- Kurt Waldheim, Secretar, General of the United Nations. sent a cable late last night to Israel Premier Golda Meir expressing his sorrow at the death of the Israeli athletes. His cable stated: "Madame Prime Minister, I wish to express to you and through you to the people of Israel my profound sorrow at the tragedy which has taken place at Munich. Despite all the efforts of those who sought to avert this senseless disaster, death has come to all of the Israeli athletes who were kidnapped. Words cannot express the revulsion and shock which all people of goodwill must feel at this appalling event. I ask you to extend my heartfelt sympathy and condolences to the families of the victims."

#### 3000 DEMAND CANCELLATION OF GAMES

PARIS, Sept. 6 (JTA)—More than 3000 persone demonstrated tonight in the Place de L'Opera in the heart of Paris demanding that the 1972 Olympic games be cancelled in protest against "the blood-bath in Munich." Although the throngs blocked traffic at one of this city's busiest intersections, police did not interfere or try to disperse the demonstrators.

From the Opera, thousands marched later to the city's Central Synagogue where thousands more were massed in adjacent streets to hear a special service for the Israeli victims. French Jewish organizations, non-Jewish groups and organizations devoted to amity between France and Israel issued statements expressing horror at the latest terrorist act.

Even the Franco-Arab Solidarity Association withous usually supports acts said to be in behalf of Palestinians condemned the attack, it said the terrorists had shown "tragic irresponsibility" by introducing bloodshed and violence at the Olympic games,

The France-Israel Association said it was "inconceivable that passions can exert themselves in the middle of an international festival of youth where no one is armed." The France-Israel Allance expressed condolences to the families of the Israeli victims and said it spoke for the French people who felt horror and indignation. The French Jewish Consistory and the Paris

Consistory held memorial services tonight."
Raymond Triboulet, president of the France-Israel Friendship group in the National Assembly, said that international organizations should totally repudiate "blind racial violence." The International League Against Anti-Semitism said "If international opinion does not react energetically, it will alsa prove that the Munich spirit (of violence) still reigns."

#### CHURCH OF CHRIST EXPRESSES SYMPATHY

NEW YORK, Sept. 6 (J7A).—The Rev. Dr. Robert V. Moss, president of the United Church of Christ, today called upon the denomination's congregations to join in prayers of mourning Sunday in memory of the slain members of the Israeli Olympic team in Munich.

He asked the church's members to "join with Christians and Jews and all other persons of good will to uphold the sacredness of human life and to oppose the outlaws among us who seek to destroy civilization through a reign of terror." He also called for "expressions of sympathy" to loved ones of the dead youths and to their Jewish breth-ren. He termed the killings "a crime against all humanity."

Dr. Gustav Heinemann, President of the West German Federal Republic, spoke at the memorial services. "Those countries which do not put a stop to the oriminal activities of the terrorists bear the real responsibility" for the massacre, Heinemann

said.

Contrary to earlier reports, none of the Arab delegations attended this murning's services. According to reports, all of them remained in their hostels. The Egyptian delegation which announced its withdrawal from the Olympic games in the aftermath of the tragedy reportedly returned home today.

#### Confusion Continues Over Deaths

There were still confusing reports today as to the actual events of the bloodbath in which five terrorists and one German policeman were killed in addition to the Il Israeli victims. The initial attack on the Israeli quarters in Clympto Village occurred in the early hours of Tuesday morning. Most of the Israeli squud managed to escape.

Nearly 24 hours of fruitless negotiations ended at shout 9:45 p.m. local time yesterday when the Ger-

man authorities agreed to the terrorist demands that they be allowed to fly to Cairo with the hostages. A bus transported terrorists and hostages to the Olympic Village landing area where three helicopters were parked.

Bruno Merk, the Bavarian Minister of Interior said afterwards that the police could not intervene against the building where the hostages were held because it would have meant certain death for all of them. "We had to act at the airport," Merk said. Two of the helicopters conveyed the terrorists and their victims to Furstenfeld-bruck where a Boeing 727 jet supplied by Lufthanss, the West German airline, waited. The third helicopter containing Merk and other officials followed. The terrorists apparently believed they were going to Municht's civilian airport.

When they arrived at Furstenfeldbruck they spotted West German police and apparently realized they had been led into an ambush. According to the accounts of Merik and Mayor George Kronawitter of Munich who witnessed the events at the airport, a gunbattle broke out during which one helicopter pilot was wounded. Four of the five Arab terrorists were killed or committed suicide and a fifth was shot down by police.

Before they died, two of the terrorists killed the hostages. Merk said that as far as he could see, one opened fire on the first helicopter in which the victims were apparently bound hand and foot and the other threw a grenade into the second helicopter, demolishing it. "It was terrible, an awful carnage, I will not forget it as long as I live," Kronawitter said later.

# DEAD ATHLETES BEING FLOWN HOME

TEL AYIV, Sept. 6 (JTA)—A special El Al plane let for Münich this afternoon to bring home the members of Israel's Olympic squad who escaped death at the hands of Arab terrorists. A second plane is expected to leave tonight to bring back the victims in their coffins. The Israeli squad was ordered home by Depuly Premier Yigal Allon who is in overall charge of sports matters.

The team members themselves asked to be removed as soon as possible from the scene of the tragedy. But the problem of identifying the dead may delay the return of the coffins of some of the squad members who may be required to

identify their dead team mates, Rabbi Mordechai Firon, chief chaplain of the

Israeli Army, flew to Munich earlier today to help identify the bodies and prepare them for burial as soon as they arrive in Israel. One of the main problems was the condition of the bodies. Some were badly burned when the helicopter in which they were held was set fire by a terrorist grenade and exploded. There is also the problem of identifying and removing the bodies of the terrorists killed in the same explosion.

#### State Funeral For Victims

The Cabinet decided today on a State funeral for the victims. No date or time has been announced. No State mourning was declared. But the impact of the Munich tragedy was visible all over israel. Very few people went to the movies tonight and the usually crowded cafes in Tel Aviv were almost empty.

Many people gathered on street corners to

listen to speakers demanding retaliatory action against the terrorists "wherever they are." Herut leader Menachem Beigin called for an all-out offensive across the borders and Gen. Ezer Weisman, chairman of the Herut Executive noted that it was mainly Syria and Egypt that aid the terrorists.

CONGRESS UNANIMOUSLY ADOPTS RESOLUTIONS
URGING OSTRACISM OF NATIONS AIDING,
ABETTING, MURDER LIKE THAT IN MUNICH

WASHINGTON, Sept. 6 (JTA)—Box houses of Congress adopted identical resolutions today calling on the civilized world to ostracize nations and peoples who aid and abet such acts as the murder of in members of the Israeli Olympic squad. The resolutions were adopted unanimously. The tally in the Senate was 82-0 and in the House 346-0. Both chambers directed that their resolutions be presented to Secretary of State William P, Rogers "for appropriate transmittal."

President Nixon this morning directed Secretary Rogers to "foonsult other governments on an urgent basis as to what collective measures by the international community can be brought to bear on the problem of terrorism," Nixon's move came during a 75-minute meeting held at the White House with Rogers and the President's National Security Advisor Dr. Henry Kissinger to review the events in Munich. The announcement of the meeting was made by White House Press Secretary Ronald , Ziegler. He gave no indication what activities the Nixon administration might take to meet the terrorist acts.

The President cabled Premier Golda Meir/to-day extending the sympathy of the American people for what he described as "a tragedy for all the people and all the nations of the world,"

Hugh Scott of Pennsylvania. The House resolution was introduced by Rep. Emanuel Celler (D. N.Y.), dean of the House and chairman of its Judiciary Committee.

Security Messures Strengthened At Missions

After expressing "deep sorrow" and "alarm" at the terrorism in Munich and sympathy for the families of the victims, both resolutions stated; "It be further resolved that all means be sought by which the civilized world may cut off from contact with civilized mankind any peoples in any nation giving sanctuary, support, sympathy, aid or comfort to acts of murder and barbarism such as those just witnessed in Munich."

Shortly after his meeting with the President, Rogers met with a half dozen top-ranking State Department officials who he asked for creative ideas on halting terrorism. Rogers also telephoned the Israel Ambassador, Yitzhak Rabin, and arranged to meet with him at the State Department late this afternoon. Discussing the developments stemming from the Munich murders, State Department spokesman Charles Bray desoribed terrorism as "obviously a very complex, difficult and perhaps protracted problem."

Bray told newsmen that the US had moved to strengthen security measures at the Israell, German and Arab missions in Washington by the Executive Protective Service, a special federal police force catabilished to guard forcing installations. Bray said that in New York the US Ambassador to the United Nations, George Bush, received the whole-hearted cooperation of the New York City police in protecting the installations of those same countries. He said similar police cooperation

had been extended in a dozen other major cities where foreign legations are located.

Bray said the State Department was coordinating security measures for the protection of Israelis in the Us which President Nixon pleigad yesterday. Regarding threats against Arab diplomats, he said "regardless of one's feelings, and for most of us they are intense in the wake of yesterday's tragedy in Munich, further violence directed against diplomats to whom we have obligations as people is clearly no solution."

#### WARNING; STEPPED UP ACTION AGAINST TERRORISTS AND THOSE WHO AID THEM

JERUSALEM, Sept. 6 (JTA)—Israel warned today that it would step up its actions against Arab terrorists and that "those who aid them" would be held responsible for their actions. The warning came in an official statement issued following a special session of the Cabinet this morning devoted to the aftermath of the massacre of II members of the Israeli Olympic squad by Arab terrorists in Munich. Prenier Golda Meir expressed her appreciation for the West German decision to employ force against the terrorists.

force against the terrorists.

The Cabinet statement condemned the murder of the Israelis and said that it proved for the world to see the real nature of Arab terrorism. It stated that the Israel government joined the families of the victims in their mourning. "Israel will continue its aelf-defense activition," the statement said, "and will not exempt those who ald them from responsibility for the acts of the terrorists." The statement continued, "The Israel government will appeal to governments and political bodies and demand the adoption of cifective measures against colls and units of the terrorist organizations with the aim of paralyzing them and extirpating their bases."

The statement said the Cabinet had decided on a "concentration of information" concerning both German and Israeli security precautions before the attack and concerning the steps taken during the attack. This appeared to mean that an unoficial inquiry will be held with the Germans. The "relevant authorities" were asked to report back to the next Cabinet meeting which is scheduled for the Tuesday after Rosh Hashan.

The West German Ambassador, Jesco Von Puttkammer issued a statement on the events in Munich. Recalling the "shameful times of my country," he branded the terrorists as "monsters" and said all Germans joined with Israelis in their sorrow.

# MCGOVERN: EGYPT, LEBANON, RESPONSIBLE

LOS ANGELES, Sept. 6 (JTA).—Sen. George McGovern charged here today that two Arab governments, Egypt and Lebanon, shared responsibility for the "brutal wave of terrorism carried out by international gangsters" to destroy the State of Israel. Addressing a meeting of the Southern California Beard of Rabbis, the Democratic Presidential nominee declared that "the world community must ostracize and punish any country that harbors or offers sanctuary to these criminals,"

# LINDSAY CALLS FOR DAY OF MOURNING

NEW YORK, Sept. 6 (JTA).—Mayor John V. Lindsay called on all New Yorkers today to join in a day of mourning jomorrow for the 11 deal Israell athletes. In a cable to Premier Golda Meir he denounced the terrorist violence and said: "Your youth have been a symbol of strength and courage to young people everywhere. That the flower of that youth should be violtims of suicidal extremists is an unspeakable tragedy."

#### EUROPE AGHAST AT BLOODBATH

PARIS, Sept. 6. (JTA)--French President Georges Pompidou today sent a cable to Israel President Zalman Shazar expressing his sympathy over the killings in Munich. Following a French Cabinet session prestided over by Pompidou, government spokesman Jean-Philippe Lecat said, "The government expresses its indignation at the attack and its sympathy for the victims and their families."

Foreign Minister Maurice Schumann said that he was "overwhelmed by the Munich drama," and remarked that "the Olympio peace has been broken by a bloodbath which took place only a few kilometers from the site of the Dachau concentration camp," However Schumann stressed that none of the Arab governments had tried to excuse the terrorists and even the Palestinian organizations have "disassociated themselves from the Munich attack."

Diplomatic observers here interpret this last ramark as an oblique appeal to Israel not to undertake reprisal action and to confine its anger to those who have actually carried out the terrorist activities. French Prime Minister Pierre Messmer expressed his indignation and called for the respect of human rights.

Jewish organizations, as well as Catholic and Protestant churches, are holding memorial meetings throughout France in remembrance of the

murdered athletes.

Elsewhere, Pope Paul VI this morning deplored the attack during a speech given before 5000 persons from his summer residence of Castel Gondolfo. In a message to Israeli President Zalman Shazar, the Pope expressed his "profound sorrow." He said, "We deplore this act of violence and all acts of violence." Italian President Joseph Saragat also sent a cable to the Israel President expressing his conditioness.

#### Communist Bloc Condemns Munich Terror

The East German Communist Party condemned this morning "without reserve" the terrorist attack calling it "a horrible crime," that would harm the interests of the Arab states themselves. The Soviet Union said that the chief of its delegation in Munich had expressed his "regrets" to the Olympic Committee and presented his "condolences."

Radio Budapest declared that "this act of terrorism lowers the Palestinian movement to the level of political gangstevism..... The terrorists cannot count on the sympathy of anyone." Radio Warsaw said, "the terrorists have rendered the worst possible service to the Arab cause," Leaders of the Czech delegation condemned "this act which prejudices the Olympic movement." Radio Belgrade called it "an lusane extremits attempt,"

In Amsterdam Dutch Premier Barend Blesheuvel and Foreign Minister Norbert Schmeltzer personally signed the condolence book at the Israell Embassy in The Hague today. The Netherlands Palestinian Organization said that although it regretted the terrorist actions, they must be seen in the context of the Palestinians' expulsion from their country. The three Jewish Dutch congregations, the Ashkenazi, Sephardic and Liberal have jointly cabled the Dutch government to immediately withdraw the Dutch delegation from the games.

Queen Margaret of Denmark cabled President Zalman Shazar saying she was participating in the mourning of the Israell people. Prime Minister Jens Otto Krag, Foreign Minister K,B, Andersen and the Speaker of Parliament sent cables to Israel. The Belgian Committee for a Negotiated Peace Between Israel and the Arab Countries in a communique today expressed its indignation at the attack committed against the Israell delegation to the Olympic games,

# Day Of Mourning Proclaimed

In London, Dr. Nahum Goldmann, President of the World Jewish Congress, said, "We are all utterly numbed and appalled by this shocking barbarism. No civilized human being can ever accept such a callous and brutal assault on the dignity of man and on those principles of humanity for which we all stand."

Britain's Chief Rabbi Immanuel Jakobovits proclaimed aday of mourning for Anglo-Jewry next Monday. In Johannesburg, South African Premier B.J. Vorster expressed his deepest sympathy for Israel over the Munich massacre. Vorster said he could not condemn this outrage in strong enough terms. He warned that as long as some governments and organizations advocated and subsidized terrorism such orimes would recur. The South African Zionist Federation and individual deputies cabled to the Israel government their deepest sympathy and shock at the dastardly deed, Special synaggue services were planned for tomorrow.

#### JEWISH LEADERS URGE END OF VIOLENCE

NEW YORK, Sept. 6 (JTA) -- American Jewish leaders expressed shock and dismay today over the tragic events in Munich. David Rivlin, Israeli Consul General, called on all nations to put an end to the syndrome of extortion, hijacking and bloodshed of innocent people which he said was due to indifference and to "nations and organizations that encourage blackmailers to continue acts of crime." In a telegram to President Nixon, Mrs. Max Matzkin, president of Hadassah, said that Hadassah urged that he recall the US Olympic team "to protest the barbaric action of Arab terrorists against the Israeli participants." Mrs. Eleanor Marvin, president of the National Council of Jewish Women said "the deliberate selection of innocent Israeli athletes as the victims of Arab guerrilla attacks is a heinous act of atrocity."

Judah J, Shapiro, president of the Labor Zionist Alliance, suggested that everyone individually engage; in some personal act of mourning on the day of the funeral of the Munich victims. The Zionist Organization of America, said the tragedy at Munich might have been averted if an international anti-hijacking treaty had been in existence. Harold Ostroff, Workmen's Circle president, cabled the International Olympic Committee urging that "all sports stadia around the world dim their lights and hold brief memorial services before games in tribute to the slain Israeli Olympic members,"

Throughout the New York area and across the country memorial services were held today, and others scheduled tomorrow, for the slain Israeli athletes. A joint memorial service was held at the Jewish Agency building by the American Zionist Federation and the American Section of the World Zionist Organization. Traffic was halted this morning in the vicinity of the B'nai B'rith building in New York where the Anti-Defamation League of B'nai B'rith and District I B'nai B'rith held public memorial services outside their headquarters. A special memorial service was also conducted at the Union of American Hebrew Congregations' House of Living Judaism Chapel.

Christian and Jewish leaders will conduct a special memorial meeting tomorrow at Congregation Kehllath Jeshurun in New York. In Washington, a community-wide memorial meeting will be held at the Lincoln Memorial at noontime tomorrow. Philip M, Klutznick, official of the Jewish United Fund of Metropolitan Chicago urged men of peace throughout the world to condemn the terrorist carages in Munich.

## FAMILIES PLUNGED INTO GRIEF

TEL AVIV, Sept. 6 (JTA).—The families of the ill leraelis murdered by Arab terrorists in Munich spent a night of alternating hope and despair only to plunged into utter grief this morning as messengers brought the news that their loved ones were dead. Their angulsh was made even more cruel by unfounded reports from Munich earlier in the evening that all of the hostages held by the terrorists had been saved. Some families had begun to celebrate with neighbors at this news when their doorbells rang and they were told the grighty truth.

"It is impossible," exclaimed Mrs. Kehat Shour, wife of the Israeli rifle toam's coach, when she learned this morning that her husband was among the victims. Only a few hours earlier she had heard that all the hostages were saie. There was terror in her eyes as she faced the grim delegation that brought her the news at her home—a representative of the sports organization, a lown council member and a physician. They could tell her no details of what happened in Munich, only that her husband was dead

At Herzlitah, north of Tel Aviv, lights burned all night at the home of Amitzur Shapira, an athletics coach. His wife, children and parents had been glued to their radio for almost 24 hours. At midnight their hopes rose when it was reported that the hostages were safe. But early in the morning a police car drew up in front of the Shapira home with the message of death.

#### Refused To Believe Reports

At the home of Joseph Romano, a weightlifter, mourning began at midnight when it was confirmed that he was one of the two Israelis slain by the terrorists in their pre-dawn ratid yesterday on the Israeli compound at Olympio Village. The scene at the home of wrestler Mark Slavin was even more tragic. Recent emigres from Russia, his parents do not understand Hebrew. They had been told that Slavin was safe. Friends and neighbors came to congratulate them. They were in the middle of a toast when the news came that their son was dead.

The aged father of Joseph Gutfreund, a wrestling team referee, refused to believe the radio news report that the hostages were safe. "I never believed the Germans," he said. He remained awake in his Jerusalem home waiting for a telephone call from Munich that never came. He was told of his son's death this morning by two government officials and a physician, Mrs. Gutfreund collapsed and was treated by the dootor,

In Haifa the parents of weight-lifter Zeev Friednan were unconsolable. His mother cried hyster-ically. His father was silent with warm tears running down his face. At the home of the wrestler Eliezer Haifin, another emigre from Russia, there was profound bitterness among the tears. Most of the Haifin family was killed in the Nazi holocaust. The young athlete's father said only one sentence: "The Germans enabled this once again."

There was no one to receive the news of the death of David Berger, a weight-lifter who came to israel only nine months ago from Cleveland, Ohio. Berger is a bachelor. When police came, they found his flat looked.

#### JEWISH PROTESTORS ARRESTED IN MOSCOW

NEW YORK, Sept. 6 (JTA)—The National Conference on Soviet Jewry confirmed this afternoon an earlier report that 30 Jews, most of themyouths, were arrested in front of the Lebanese legation by Moscow police as they were protesting the Arab terrorist violence in Munich. Among those arrested were Esther and David Markish. The group had planned to submit a letter protesting the terrorist

# action to the Lebanese legation. WALDHEIM EXPRESSES SORROW

UNITED NATIONS, Sept. 6 (JTA) -- Kurt Waldheim, Secretar, General of the United Nations. sent a cable late last night to Israel Premier Golda Meir expressing his sorrow at the death of the Israeli athletes. His cable stated: "Madame Prime Minister, I wish to express to you and through you to the people of Israel my profound sorrow at the tragedy which has taken place at Munich. Despite all the efforts of those who sought to avert this senseless disaster, death has come to all of the Israeli athletes who were kidnapped. Words cannot express the revulsion and shock which all people of goodwill must feel at this appalling event. I ask you to extend my heartfelt sympathy and condolences to the families of the victims."

#### 3000 DEMAND CANCELLATION OF GAMES

PARIS, Sept. 6 (JTA)—More than 3000 persone demonstrated tonight in the Place de L'Opera in the heart of Paris demanding that the 1972 Olympic games be cancelled in protest against "the blood-bath in Munich." Although the throngs blocked traffic at one of this city's busiest intersections, police did not interfere or try to disperse the demonstrators.

From the Opera, thousands marched later to the city's Central Synagogue where thousands more were massed in adjacent streets to hear a special service for the Israeli victims. French Jewish organizations, non-Jewish groups and organizations devoted to amity between France and Israel issued statements expressing horror at the latest terrorist act.

Even the Franco-Arab Solidarity Association withous usually supports acts said to be in behalf of Palestinians condemned the attack, it said the terrorists had shown "tragic irresponsibility" by introducing bloodshed and violence at the Olympic games,

The France-Israel Association said it was "inconceivable that passions can exert themselves in the middle of an international festival of youth where no one is armed." The France-Israel Allance expressed condolences to the families of the Israeli victims and said it spoke for the French people who felt horror and indignation. The French Jewish Consistory and the Paris

Consistory held memorial services tonight."
Raymond Triboulet, president of the France-Israel Friendship group in the National Assembly, said that international organizations should totally repudiate "blind racial violence." The International League Against Anti-Semitism said "If international opinion does not react energetically, it will alsa prove that the Munich spirit (of violence) still reigns."

#### CHURCH OF CHRIST EXPRESSES SYMPATHY

NEW YORK, Sept. 6 (J7A).—The Rev. Dr. Robert V. Moss, president of the United Church of Christ, today called upon the denomination's congregations to join in prayers of mourning Sunday in memory of the slain members of the Israeli Olympic team in Munich.

He asked the church's members to "join with Christians and Jews and all other persons of good will to uphold the sacredness of human life and to oppose the outlaws among us who seek to destroy civilization through a reign of terror." He also called for "expressions of sympathy" to loved ones of the dead youths and to their Jewish breth-ren. He termed the killings "a crime against all humanity."
