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## RABIN OFFERS PEACE SETTLEMENT WITH JORDAN WHICH INCLUDES RETURN OF SOME WEST BANK TERRITORY

TEL AVIV, Jan. 8 (JTA)--Yitzhak Rabin, a candidate for a ministerial post in the next Cabinet, presented his own plan for a peace settlement with Jordan here last night which called for the return of inhabited areas of the West Bank to Jordanian sovereignty but with an Israeli military presence overlooking a Jordanian civil administration in those areas for a 15-20 year interim. According to Rabin's plan, there will be no return to the pre-June, 1967 borders and Israel will retain sovereignty over some parts of the Judea-Samaria regions and all of the Gaza Strip.

Rabin, who unveiled his plan to journalists at Beth Sokolow, the gathering place for newsmen, asserted that an interim period of two or three decades would have to pass before a political settlement between Israel and its neighbors became a real peace. The former Israeli Ambassador to the United States who was elected to the Knesset on the Labor Alignment ticket, said Jerusalem would remain united under Israeli sovereignty but with special arrangements for religious interests.

### Palestinian Refugees' Resettlement Included

Rabin said his plan would allow for the resettlement of Palestinian refugees, including those in the Gaza Strip, mainly in east Jordan but also on the West Bank. He estimated it would take 15-20 years to complete the refugee resettlement, a period coinciding with the continued Israeli military presence in Jordan administered areas.

He offered no plan for a settlement with Egypt. He noted the major problems in effecting a separation of forces, now under discussion between Israeli and Egyptian military negotiators in Geneva, were the depth of an Israeli pull-back from the Suez Canal and the nature of Egyptian forces that will remain on the east bank of the waterway.

Rabin said the nature of the buffer zone separating the two forces was a secondary problem, but said he doubted Egypt's willingness to accept the principle of non-belligerency even after disengagement is achieved. He claimed that Cairo's aim is not to allow the creation of a new status quo and not to give up its bridgehead on the east bank of the canal.

### WAITING FOR WORD FROM EGYPT ON DAYAN'S DISENGAGEMENT PLAN

JERUSALEM, Jan. 8 (JTA)--Well-placed sources here said today that Israel was awaiting word from Washington on Egypt's reaction to the ideas on separation of forces which Defense Minister Moshe Dayan put to U.S. Secretary of State Henry A. Kissinger in their weekend talks in Washington. (See Monday's News Bulletin, P. 1) Thus far no word has been received, but the sources say they are not surprised since the Egyptians, and probably the Russians, too, would want to carefully consider the ideas. The Egyptian reaction is due to come through Kissinger--and if it is favorable the

Cabinet will then make detailed concrete proposals based on Dayan's ideas.

There were reports here yesterday and again today that Kissinger would make another sweep through the Mideast within the next 10 days--regardless of State Department spokesman George Vest's denial yesterday. Officials here note that such a trip had been mooted but nothing definite or even half-definite had been arranged. A source close to Dayan said no mention of such a trip had been made during the talks over the weekend in Washington. This source asserted that no progress was likely at the continuing military talks at Geneva until an Egyptian reaction was forthcoming to the Dayan ideas as transmitted by Kissinger.

### DISCLOSE EGYPT, JORDAN THWARTED PLAN TO AID PALESTINIAN REFUGEES

AMSTERDAM, Jan. 8 (JTA)--A former Common Market official has revealed that Egypt and Jordan purposely opposed Europe's bid to help solve the Palestinian refugee problem.

Speaking on a Labor broadcasting organization radio program, Sicco Mansholt implied that Egypt and Jordan's refusal of Europe's offer of rehabilitation aid to the Palestinians was a political maneuver to keep the Palestinian problem alive. Mansholt, until recently the Dutch vice-chairman of the Common Market's "European Committee," said this knowledge had long been kept a secret behind Common Market walls.

He said the European committee had proposed giving large scale aid in the form of food and training to help integrate the Palestinians, but Egypt and Jordan turned it down. As for the oil issue, Mansholt called "repulsive" the attempts of many European governments to "obtain a few thousand tons of oil from the Arabs by bowing to their demands."

### THROUGH A VEIL, DARKLY

JERUSALEM, Jan. 8 (JTA)--Some Arab women may have used their veils to hide more than their faces during last week's election. They may have used their veils to engage in a little voting chicanery, according to Justice Haim Cohn, chairman of the Elections Committee. Cohn disclosed that he has ordered a police investigation into complaints that some Arab women hiding behind their veils voted more than once. There was some suspicion, he noted, that some Moslem women whose identity cards do not have their photographs because of religious objections, may have gone to desert polling booths several times using the voting cards of their friends. The identity of the veiled women could not be checked at the polling booths.

### SNAG IN EFFORTS TO CREATE A LABOR-LED GOVERNMENT COALITION ILP Balks At Demands Of Religious Bloc

TEL AVIV, Jan. 8 (JTA)--Attempts to create a new Labor-led coalition government ran into a snag today when the Independent Liberal Party balked at joining any government that would surrender to demands by the Religious bloc. ILP leader Moshe Kol said at a press conference here that his party was unalterably opposed to any

change in the status quo which defines the extent of the Orthodox religious establishment's control of national life. He said the ILP would join a coalition only if it was guaranteed freedom of vote in questions of conscience including religious matters and women's rights according to religious law.

The ILP stand coincides with that of Mrs. Shulamit Aloni's Civil Rights list which won three Knesset seats in the election. The ILP retained its four seats and is negotiating with Mrs. Aloni to form a bloc of their two factions. Premier Golda Meir's Labor Alignment, which came out of the election with 51 seats as against 56 in the last Knesset, is seeking to form a coalition of the ILP, the National Religious Party and possibly the Aguda bloc. That would give Labor a very comfortable working majority of up to 70 Knesset seats.

The religious parties are expected to demand increased religious control and some key Cabinet portfolios as their price for joining a Labor-led coalition. The NRP is also being pressured by internal elements to demand the establishment of a national coalition government embracing the opposition Likud, something Labor refuses to consider.

#### Likud Warns Against Geneva Agreements

Likud, bolstered by its gain of seven seats in the election for a total of 39, warned today that the present government, as a care-taker regime, has no right to make any decisions affecting the future of Israel and the national security. That statement, issued by the Likud Executive at its first post-election meeting, served notice on Premier Meir that she cannot enter into any basic agreements at the Geneva conference before a new government is established.

When that will be is hard to say considering the obstacles Labor must overcome before putting together a new coalition. But the government is presently involved in disengagement talks with Egypt and certain proposals are currently before Mrs. Meir's care-taker Cabinet which may have to make decisions before a new government is established. The eighth Knesset will be sworn in Jan. 21 and it is difficult to say whether the new Knesset will ratify decisions taken by an outgoing government. (By Yitzhak Shargil.)

#### 4 ISRAELI SOLDIERS WOUNDED DURING

#### FLARE-UP ON THE SYRIAN FRONT

Blockade of Egyptian-Algerian Force Continues

TEL AVIV, Jan. 8 (JTA)--Four Israeli soldiers were wounded today in a three-hour exchange of artillery and tank fire on the Syrian front. The incident occurred south of Mazraat Beth Jan where Syrian forces opened an artillery barrage and later brought up tank guns. Israeli forces returned the fire. The shooting began at 3 p.m. local time and continued intermittently until about 6 p.m., well after sundown.

Egyptian forces fired mortar shells at Israeli positions east of El Balah today and the fire was returned. Other shooting incidents on the Egyptian front were reported west of Fayid, in the Adabiyeh area and in the Ismailia region. All involved small arms fire and no casualties were reported. Israeli forces countered a heavy Egyptian artillery barrage yesterday with a barrage of their own east of El Ballah island. According to an Israeli military spokesman, direct hits were scored and the Egyptians suffered numerous casualties.

Meanwhile, Israeli forces are continuing

their blockade of an Egyptian-Algerian pocket east of the Bitter Lake. The pocket was created when Israeli forces broke through to the west bank of the Suez Canal during the second week of the Yom Kippur War. The Egyptians have attempted to resupply the encircled units by water. An Israeli military spokesman said that two attempts were successful but two others failed after Israeli gunners fired on boats ferrying supplies across the Bitter Lake.

#### DETAILS EMERGE IN BOUSHICKI MURDER TRIAL

OSLO, Jan. 8 (JTA)--State attorneys presented today a detailed account of a massive manhunt with walkie-talkies and a fleet of rented cars carried out by six alleged Israeli agents on trial here in connection with the so-called Boushicki murder case. Flanked by police on all sides, the defendants listened intently as the prosecution outlined events leading up to the July 21 slaying of Ahmed Boushicki.

The prosecution based its account primarily on statements given police interrogators by two of the defendants, Dan Aerbel and Marianne Gladnikoff. Boushicki was murdered by a 15-man liquidation squad "acting on orders from the Israeli intelligence organization, Mossad," Aerbel told police according to State Prosecutor Haakon Wiker. The group converged on the quiet resort town of Lillehammer several days before the slaying, having tailed an Arab acquaintance of the murder victim from Oslo. According to Aerbel's statement, the defendants believed both Boushicki and Karim Benemane, were Black September members.

Certain portions of today's session were held behind closed doors. In calling for the temporary expulsion of newsmen and observers, Wiker cited "consideration for Norway's relations with foreign states." Aerbel has worked for Mossad several times, on occasion together with another of the defendants, Sylvia Rafael, Wiker said. Informed sources here said details of these intelligence operations were presented during closed-door proceedings.

In the weeks preceding the Boushicki murder, Michael Dorff, a defendant, was given part-time employment at the Israeli Embassy in Oslo, Wiker claimed. Members of the liquidation group maintained close contact with the Israeli security attache in Norway, Yigal Eyal. Several meetings were held in Eyal's apartment, Wiker said. Dorff and Zvi Steinberg, another defendant, were apprehended in the apartment two days after the slaying.

Toward the end of the day, Miss Gladnikoff, daughter of a Swedish physician, was called to the stand. Her testimony confirmed many of the prosecution's claims. She admitted having "gathered information" about Benemane and Boushicki, but claimed to be a minor member of the group. "I didn't know what the real aim of the operation was," she said. The Boushicki case is being tried by a special tribunal consisting of three judges and four laymen. The six defendants all face a maximum sentence of life imprisonment if found guilty.

#### FRANCO-SAUDI OIL ACCORD CONFIRMED

PARIS, Jan. 8 (JTA)--The government confirmed today reports of a Franco-Saudi Arabian oil agreement, but made no mention of Mirage fighter-bombers. The agreement concluded by the two nations and announced by Saudi Arabian Oil Minister Ahmed Zaki Yamani in Geneva last night provides for the delivery of 30 million tons of Saudi Arabian crude oil to France over a 3-year

period. Although press reports, that France in return would provide Saudi Arabia with Mirages were neither denied or confirmed, well informed sources indicate "that negotiations for the provision of some kind of military equipment to Saudi Arabia are still in progress. Several press reports have recently speculated about a Franco-Saudi Arabian arms-for-oil agreement in which France would furnish the Arab nation with Mirage jets." A spokesman for the aircraft company, Dassault, builder of Mirages, called these rumors "absolutely false and erroneous."

Meanwhile, Foreign Minister Michel Jobert has set Jan. 23 or 24 as the date of departure for his first visit to Saudi Arabia. He is also due to stop off in Kuwait and has hinted he may also go to Jerusalem.

#### **FORD HINTS OIL EMBARGO MAY LEAD TO HALTING FOOD SUPPLIES TO ARABS**

WASHINGTON, Jan. 8 (JTA)--Vice-President Gerald Ford hinted today that continuation of the Arab oil embargo could lead to a curtailment of food shipments to Arab countries where food commodities are perennially in short supply. "North Africa and the Middle East have some of the greatest food deficits in the world," Ford said addressing a luncheon meeting of the Manufacturing Chemists Association here.

"Close an oil valve in the Middle East and you threaten to shut down a farm tractor in our Middle West. Half that tractor and some people in the world will hunger for bread," the Vice-President said. Although he expressed "optimism" that the oil embargo would soon end, Ford observed that a "circular flow" was required to keep the industrialized nations running and to provide the Middle East with its basic needs, meaning a flow of oil to the west and a flow of food to the Mideast.

State Department sources, asked to comment on Ford's remarks and on remarks by Defense Secretary James R. Schlesinger Sunday which some Arab circles took as a threat of U.S. military intervention to restore the flow of oil, said today that these remarks were not threats "so much as a straightforward description of facts which have to be regarded in their largest context."

Schlesinger, appearing on a television interview, had warned that if the oil embargo continues, the American people would call for some form of action to keep oil flowing to the industrialized nations. The sources said that Ford's and Schlesinger's remarks were wholly consistent with what Secretary of State Henry A. Kissinger has been saying.

Meanwhile, reports that Kissinger plans to visit Cairo and Jerusalem within the next 10 days to try to promote an agreement between Israel and Egypt on a formula for a separation of forces were again denied by the State Department. George Vest, Department spokesman, repeated today what he said yesterday, that there were "no plans" for Kissinger to visit the Mideast.

#### **SOLIDARITY PILGRIMAGE TO ISRAEL**

NEW YORK, Jan. 8 (JTA)--The Rabbinical Council of America, an association of Orthodox rabbis, has converted its annual midwinter conference into a loyalty-solidarity pilgrimage to Israel, according to Rabbi Zev Segal of South Orange, N.J., chairman of the pilgrimage. He said that the assembly of Rabbinical Council

members, wives and officials of some congregations served by Rabbinical Council rabbis will be held in Jerusalem, starting Jan. 14.

Rabbi Segal said the event will be held for 10 days and that some 300 participants were currently planning to participate and that it was hoped a total of 500 would take part. He said that, in addition to the regular proceedings connected with the organization's midwinter conference, the delegates will meet with the Israeli chief rabbis and Israeli political leaders for briefings.

Rabbi Louis Bernstein, president of the Rabbinical Council of America, said "The purpose of the convocation is not only to underscore the unity between the people in Israel and the American Jews but also to combat insidious assimilation, intermarriage and other trends which serve to inhibit the spiritual growth of Jewish communities." He noted that another purpose for the meeting in Jerusalem at this time is to proclaim to the world during the Geneva Conference, that the city of Jerusalem is indivisible, that it is the spiritual center of world Jewry.

Rabbi Walter Wurzbarger of Far Rockaway, N.Y., asserted that "American Jews have helped Israel financially during this period. We must now demonstrate that we identify with them wholly in their time of trial." Rabbi Bernard Twersky, the Council's public relations director, stated that "according to recent reports, over 5000 American young men and women volunteered during the Yom Kippur War to serve as replacements in kibbutzim, in factories and in settlements throughout the country."

#### **RAFAEL, ALMOGI ON MISSIONS ABROAD**

TEL AVIV, Jan. 8 (JTA)--Israel's Ambassador-designate to Britain and the newly elected Mayor of Haifa left Ben Gurion (Lod) Airport this morning on missions that will take the former to London and the latter to the U.S. and Canada.

Ambassador-designate Gideon Rafael said on his departure that he had specific instructions from the Foreign Ministry as to what questions to raise first when he takes up his new post at the Court of St. James. Rafael said the improvement of relations between Britain and Israel depend not on Israel but on the British. He said Israel did not object to improved Anglo-Arab relations but insists that they not be at Israel's expense.

Yosef Almogi, the former Labor Minister who was elected to the Haifa mayoralty by a sweeping 58 percent majority, took off for the U.S. and Canada on a mission for the United Jewish Appeal, untroubled by the need to form a coalition to govern his city. He interpreted the national election results as a mandate for Israel to seek peace through territorial compromise but stressed that as long as there is no peace, Israel must remain on its present lines.

#### **4 PALESTINIANS FACE CHARGES IN W. BERLIN**

BONN, Jan. 8 (JTA)--Four Palestinians arrested in West Berlin on Oct. 24 are to be charged with possessing explosives and conspiring to make explosive attacks, it has been announced by the legal authorities in the city. Police discovered five kilograms of high explosives in a suitcase in their rooms after a tip-off. The four men, between the ages of 18 and 33, were said to have flown from Beirut to East Berlin on Lebanese passports, and then to have crossed the sector boundaries to West Berlin. One of the Palestinians said he had been given the suitcase in Beirut. He had been told it contained narcotics, and would be collected in West Berlin.

## WORLD NEWS BRIEFS

**BRUSSELS (JTA)**--A group of terrorists believed to be Palestinians and armed with SAM-7 rockets is suspected of having crossed the French border into Belgium in a van over the weekend, Belgian security service authorities said. These authorities suspect the rockets may have already been passed on to other collaborators and indicate their final destination may well be Schiphol Airport near Amsterdam. Observers here note that the Belgium-Netherlands border checks are presently quite lax and would facilitate such a crossing. According to Belgian authorities, the terrorists may have entered Europe from North Africa in a vehicle with false license plates.

**LONDON (JTA)**--The Austrian Chancellor, Dr. Bruno Kreisky, will lead a fact-finding mission to the Middle East in mid-Feb. This was announced after a special meeting of the Socialist International which took place here Sunday and was attended by representatives of 14 Social Democratic parties, among them Michael Harish, the international secretary of Israel's Labor Party. The mission, which will probably conclude its work in mid-March, will include representatives of the British Labor Party and the Socialist Parties of Holland, Belgium, France, Germany, Italy, Luxembourg and Sweden. A spokesman for the Socialist International told the JTA that the mission will endeavor to study "the conditions and views of the people in the Middle East."

**JERUSALEM (JTA)**--Supreme Court Justice Haim Cohn, who headed the Central Elections Committee, has recommended that the whole system be drastically overhauled in future elections. He said there was far too much complicated paperwork--both in the voting process itself and in the subsequent checking and counting process. Cohn advocated the American-style electric voting machine as a much needed simplification. He said he was gratified by the high turnout and by the very low number of blank ballots used by protest voters for whom none of the 21 lists were adequate to receive their protest vote.

**TEL AVIV (JTA)**--Rabbi Meir Kahane, whose Jewish Defense League ticket failed to win enough votes for a single Knesset seat in the Israeli elections, said he wants his passport back so that he can return to the U.S. to warn Jews there of the dangers of "anti-Semitism and catastrophe" they allegedly face. Kahane's American passport was confiscated by the police last year after he was indicted on several criminal charges including attempts to smuggle arms out of the country and incitement against the Arab population. He said Monday that he would go on a hunger strike in front of the Interior Ministry in Jerusalem to demand his passport and claimed that JDL members in the U.S. would support his demand by demonstrating in front of the Israeli Embassy and consulates.

**NEW YORK (JTA)**--An extraordinary international conference of Jewish leaders will be held in Israel at the invitation of Prime Minister Golda Meir from Jan. 26-Feb. 3. More than 600 Jewish leaders from the United States, Canada, Western Europe and other parts of the free world will meet to consider the impact of the Yom Kippur War on the economy of Israel. The conference, sponsored by the Israel Bond Or-

ganization, will launch a Billion Dollar Reconstruction and Development Loan to be raised through the sale of Israel Bonds in the United States and other parts of the free world, it was announced by Sam Rothberg, general chairman of Israel Bonds. This represents the largest Bond issue ever floated by Israel. The government was prompted to take this action as a result of the Yom Kippur War which drained the country's economic resources and led to unexpectedly record defense expenditures.

**AMSTERDAM (JTA)**--A "Bureau for Economic Relations Between Europe and Israel" has recently been set up in The Hague. The bureau's main objective will be to enable Israeli businessmen and industrialists to consult with their European counterparts in the areas of marketing, administrative know-how, financing and training procedures. The bureau's board of governors includes Dutch Jewish industrialist Oscar Vanleer, Sir Edmond Warburg of England, Francois Periere of France and Walter Hesselbach of West Germany.

**JERUSALEM (JTA)**--Officials in Jerusalem believe tourism to Israel is now reviving after the post-war deep drop. December's figures published Friday show 40,700 tourists visited Israel during the X-Mas and Chanukah month--some 4000 less than December, 1972, but still much better figures than those of Nov. They brought the year's final total up to 661,600 compared to 727,500 in 1972. The 1973 figure was thus a drop of some 19 percent on 1972 and about equal to that of 1971. When the war broke out in Oct. the 1973 figures had just caught up with 1972 figures after a slump early in the year. But the war ruined Oct. and Nov. tourism--and the industry is now hoping that the Dec. resuscitation bodes well for the new year.

**TEL AVIV (JTA)**--Police said that Sunday's fire that forced the evacuation of several hundred guests and employees from the Dan Hotel was a cover for robbery. The blaze broke out in the Tifani Club which occupies the basement of the 11-story structure on the Tel Aviv beach front. According to police the club's safe was found opened and cash missing. Police said the safe was opened with a key but the thieves tried to make it appear that it had been forced open. The fire was set to remove the evidence of robbery, a police spokesman said.

**PROVIDENCE (JTA)**--Five local veterans groups here have endorsed a resolution on Israeli POWs which calls upon U.S. government leaders to "use their good offices to obtain compliance of the government of Syria with the Geneva Convention." Endorsers of the statement are the Rhode Island departments of the American Legion, the Amvets, the Italian-American War Veterans, the Jewish War Veterans, and the Veterans of Foreign Wars. In calling on the President and others to "actively seek the speediest possible exchange of Israeli and Syrian POWs," the veterans stressed that their recent experience with the Vietnam POW situation had sensitized them to this issue.

**NEW YORK (JTA)**--Mrs. Charlotte Stein, national president of Pioneer Women, will be the hostess of a new series of programs on Radio Station WEVD-AM on the first Monday of each month, 12:30-12:45 p.m., it was announced Tuesday. The programs will be devoted to the activities of Pioneer Women in the United States, Israel, and a dozen countries around the world.
